## Rusting away - -

The old, rusting caboose at the railroad crossing in downtown Mt. Vernon is going to get a face lift in the next few weeks, hopefully.

The Mt. Vernon City Council discussed the caboose at a meeting Monday night and appointed Councilman Tom Welch to look into the cost of painting and refurbishing the rail car.

Owned by the now defunct Jaycees, the caboose was used as a meeting place for the club from about 1968 to about two years ago when the club went out of business.

Reportedly, the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce may want to use the caboose for a tourist information center at some future time if an easier entrance can be provided.

The old rail car sits on city property. The city council at the time gave the Jaycees permission to use the space, despite some protest at the time. It was moved from a temporary home to the Health Department to the present location.

Roy Martin, who was Jaycee president at the time, said he did not recall if any kind of contract was signed with the city to use the location, or with the railroad for the caboose.

"We checked around the time and wrote letters to several railroads to find a caboose, and one morning it appeared on the side track. The L & N brought it here, but I don't recall where it came from," Martin related.

# Sewer plant work to begin

Work is expected to begin about Mar. 20 to upgrade and expand the sewer disposal plant at Mt. Vernon, the Mt. Vernon City Council was told at its meeting Monday night.

Officials of Tius Construction Co., of Dayton, Ohio, were on hand to see the council approve a motion to sign a contract and a

notice to proceed with the work. A pre-construction conference was held this week.

Tius had the bid on the expansion work totaling \$1,621,745.

The city received a grant of \$1,443,305 for the project and needs \$481,102 as its share, but only has \$220,000. An increase in sewer rates to make up the difference is expected soon.

The council was also told construction on sewer lines on Fairground Hill is continuing by Karish Construction Co. of Mt. Vernon, but there is a problem with at least one property easement. The council put the matter in the hands of City Attorney Carl Coetz to resolve as quickly as possible, including possible condemnation proceedings.

## Man shot during attack police say

A Rockcastle County man is under treatment at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington from gunshot wounds received early Sunday.

No charges have been filed. The incident remains under investigation by Detective Jim McWhorter and Trooper Gary Lane.

## Gasoline prices may level off

Gasoline station operators in Southeastern Kentucky mostly agree gas prices are about as low as they'll go, with regular selling in some stations at 69.9 cents a gallon, but mostly in the 70 and 80 cent range in Rockcastle. Then there's Monticello, where a price war brought the cost down to 29.9 cents a gallon.

## Briefly ...

### We escaped

Rockcastle was lucky, weatherwise, if compared to other areas of the state. Although the clouds were black and the wind blew and the rain came pouring down Monday night, only 3/1 of an inch fell at the weather station at Cox Funeral Home. Other areas were not so lucky. Parts of Lexington and Northern Kentucky had damaging winds.

### A little unhappy

Elmo Greer, whose company is constructing the Ky. 461 bypass at Mt. Vernon, doesn't get all the big contracts. He was a little unhappy last week when a Mississippi firm was awarded a \$12.3 million contract for site preparation at the proposed Toyota plant at Georgetown. Greer's bid was \$21 million. "We thought they were going to let Kentucky contractors do the job," Greer said.

### At the legislature

State Rep. Danny Ford is a co-sponsor of three bills now being considered by the Legislature. One would mandate that schools begin after Labor Day, meaning school would start in September and end in June. Another bill would make it a Class D felony to duplicate albums and tapes for profitable reasons, and a third would require hospitals to itemize patients' bills.

### Another raid

Friday is not a good day for Clifton Kearney of Chestnut Ridge Road. State Police troopers conducted a second raid at his residence last Friday and seized a quantity of alcoholic beverages. The troopers and detective Ernie Boggs had conducted a similar raid on Friday, Feb. 28, at which time police reported they got a considerable amount of beer and whiskey.

## Consultant employed to guide search for industry

Rockcastle County has its first professional business and industrial consultant, courtesy of the Bank of Mt. Vernon.

He is Jim Caldwell of Somerset, who has been hired through the Bank of Mt. Vernon for a three-month period with his salary to be paid by the bank.

He has assumed his duties in an office at the bank annex, but bank president Dan McKinney stressed Caldwell is not a bank employee.

"He will answer to a committee composed of various organizations including the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce, the Improvement Council, Industrial Authority and the Mt. Vernon Local Development Corporation," McKinney said. "We here at the bank are providing this professional service to the county. We hope in the next three months to lay the groundwork for business and industrial growth."

Caldwell's job, among others, will be to contact various firms and state agencies about business and industrial prospects and advise how to go about recruiting them for the county.

"With the Toyota plant coming to Central Kentucky, we believe we are in a position to recruit some kind of satellite industry to the area," McKinney stated. "Mr. Caldwell, with his experience, should be a considerable help."

Caldwell resigned Mar. 4 after eight months as industrial recruiter for the Somerset-Pulaski County Industrial Foundation. He told a meeting of the foundation he was going on a "consulting basis," but would remain available to assist the foundation as needed.

Caldwell holds a bachelor and master of arts degrees from the University of Mississippi. He has 17 years experience as chief executive officer of Chamber of

# Four forest fires reported

The spring forest fire season got off to a fast start this past weekend with four fires reported in Rockcastle County, blamed on carelessness and high winds.

On Saturday an acre of woodland burned on the Pittman farm about two miles south of the Burr Interchange of I-75. Three fires were reported Sunday. An acre burned in the Sand Hill area; a half-acre on the Leo Hunt farm; and a half-acre belonging to Wallace Williams near Boone.

The spring forest fire hazard season started Mar. 1 and will run through May 15, according to Steve Bullen, Rockcastle County Ranger for the Kentucky Division of Forestry.

The 4.30 Burning Law is in effect during the Fire Hazard Season.

The law makes it illegal to do any outdoor burning within 150 feet of any woodland or brushland before 4:30 p.m. Other laws require that the burning area be

adequately cleared around before lighting the fire, and that someone be with the fire at all times until it is completely out. As in the past, these laws will be strictly enforced.

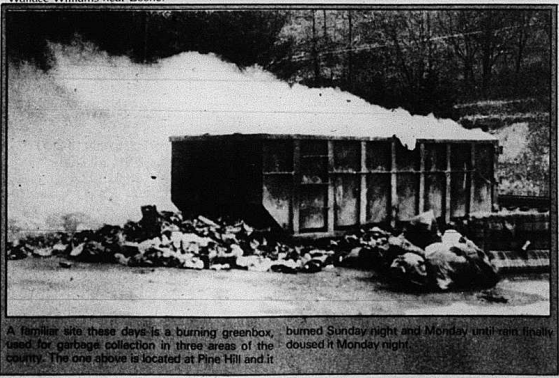
In 1985, Rockcastle County had 26 fires which burned a total of 1,150 acres. Almost all of these fires were caused by careless or illegal burning and could easily have been prevented.

38 legislative days that have transpired thus far in the 1986 session. The House Appropriations and Revenue Committee approved a \$13.4 billion budget bill this week and the full House will add the measure next week.

Although the first grant step has been taken, the Budget Bill has miles to go before it rests on the Governor's desk. It must pass the House, the Senate committee system, the full Senate and a final version must be agreed upon by the House and Senate.

We have been able to enhance the Governor's initial appropriation proposal by prioritizing some good programs that the Collins administration overlooked.

The Collins budget earmarked nothing for the serious brucellosis problem facing our farmers. We added \$400,000 in subcommittee hearings and in a strong victory for rural legislators, we increased the appropriation to \$1.2 million to fund brucellosis eradication in the bill approved by the House committee.

The budget will soundly fund elementary, secondary and higher education in Kentucky. There is strong funding for health and welfare, economic development, and law enforcement in the budget bill also.

There are several other vital programs we hope to include in the budget, either on the House floor, by way of amendment or in House-Senate conference committees.

We will seek expanded funding to address the surgical waiting list for handicapped children and to provide pediatric surgery for babies and young children.

State dollars will be sought to fund computerized fingerprint capabilities for the State Police, which should seriously complicate

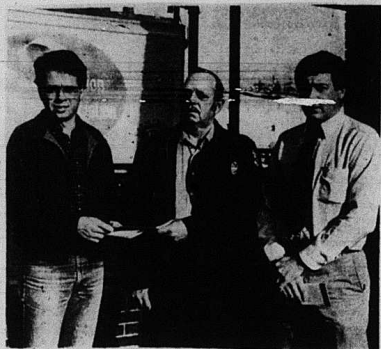

## House approves important tobacco program changes

The U.S. House of Representatives has passed and sent to the Senate a major budget reconciliation bill, which includes provisions to make important changes in the federal tobacco program.

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said, "We won a major battle," but added that "obstacles still remain in getting the entire bill signed into law."

"These changes in the tobacco program are essential to getting the program back to good financial health," said Rogers. "The selling off of the surplus tobacco, plus the changing of the tobacco companies of any future market cost fees—are necessary steps in solving our long-term tobacco problems. We have worked long and hard to iron out this plan, and now we have taken a major step toward getting approval for it."

But Rogers cautioned that other parts of the budget bill may affect its passage.

"There is still some concern by some about provisions in the bill which have nothing to do with tobacco," said Rogers. "But I am hopeful that these differences can be worked out. If not, we may have

to look at some other way to resolve this situation.

Both the Senate and the President must approve the legislation in order for it to become law.

### SOME IRA TIPS

Individual Retirement Accounts are becoming increasingly popular as a way to shelter some income from taxation while building funds for retirement. Here are some facts that may be helpful.

• Your 1985 IRA contribution can not be made any later than April 15, 1986. You can no longer get an extension for making your contribution similar to extending the filing date for your income tax return.

• There is no minimum IRA contribution requirement; the maximum contribution is \$2,000 per year. You can skip a contribution for any year if you wish, but you cannot make up missed contributions in future years.

• Pay the trustee's fee separately and not out of your IRA funds. You can then take the fee as a miscellaneous itemized tax deduction and leave more money to grow tax-free in your retirement account.

• You can't contribute to your IRA after you reach age 70½. But if you have a non-working spouse under 70½, you can make a contribution of up to \$2,000 to his or her IRA.

• Allimony payments are considered earned income for purposes of determining allowable IRA contributions.

• Allimony payments are considered earned income for purposes of determining allowable IRA contributions.

• Advisors sometimes suggest that you borrow money to make an IRA contribution if you don't have the cash. Before doing so, compare the yield in your IRA and the borrowing rate. Also, give thought to whether you'll have funds later in the year to repay the loan. If you won't have, don't borrow.

• Using IRAs in divorce property settlement situations may be beneficial to both parties. In lieu of a larger property settlement, a husband might agree to pay an extra annual \$2,000 in allimony which is tax deductible by him. The wife then takes the \$2,000 into an IRA for herself, and she does not have to pay the money either until retirement.

In a collision, a child held in an adult's arms is crushed between the adult and the dashboard.

It's impossible to hold onto a child in a collision - even at speeds as slow as 30 miles per hour.

If a seatbelt is strapped across a child and an adult, the child can be crushed between the person and the belt.

A safety seat will not protect the child if it is not used properly. Call your health department today about borrowing a safety seat for your child.

children develop good eating habits while providing them opportunities for development and learning.

A good time to try this is during March, National Nutrition Month, when we are celebrating "Good Nutrition—Feel the Difference."

Even small children can learn that good foods can make them "feel the difference." However, they need to be taught about foods in an environment that encourages independence and a sense of achievement.

Permit the child to eat without being forced. Never set strict rules about "cleaning the plate." Such rules just lead to arguments and can set up patterns of overeating which lead to obesity. However, you should teach that the child is expected to eat food that is prepared for him or her.

Do not bribe and coax the child to eat. Don't say, "If you don't eat, you'll go straight to bed!" or "Eat every bite if you want dessert." Dessert should not be offered as a reward.

Serve small portions that provide a feeling of success when eaten. Fill glasses or cups only one-third to three-quarters full. Introducing a new food, serve only a small spoonful. A large serving on a small plate overwhelms a child and prevents him from trying it.

Allow the child to feed himself. Children often feel very independent when allowed to pour their own beverage or serve themselves from a dish of food.

Provide easy-to-eat foods. Finger foods are just right for toddlers and pre-schoolers. Small sandwiches, bites of real vegetables, fruit and cheese are just right. Do not serve those which may cause choking, such as popcorn, nuts, fruits with large seeds and gristle around bones to very small children.

Give children some responsibility for preparing and serving food. Pre-schoolers can help plan menus, set the table and prepare simple foods.

Provide appropriate eating utensils. Along with being small in size, dishes and utensils should be of the right material. Unbreakable deep dishes and small cups with weighted bottoms are best for young children.

**Mowing contract awarded**

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract for a mowing project on 73.4 miles of roadway in Laurel, Rockcastle and Whitley counties.
