

# Blood drive at vocational school yields 61 pints

On Friday, April 4, 61 people, mainly students, donated blood at the Harry Sparks Vocational School. The drive was sponsored by Central Kentucky Blood Center and the Rockcastle County High and Vocational Schools. Contributing to the successful drive were the Library Club at the high school and the Future Business Leaders of America at the vocational school. The Rockcastle County blood program is greatly aided by the community support of the schools.

Blood donors are extraordinary people who give a vital human resource to help patients on their way to recovery. Central Kentucky Blood Center recognizes this effort and gives awards of appreciation based on the number of times a person has donated.

Upon completing their eighth donation (one gallon), donors are eligible to receive a special key chain which is imprinted with the donors' blood type and number of gallons given. New key chains are given after completing each additional gallon. The key chain is numbered and postage guaranteed if the keys are lost and dropped in a mail box.

When a donor reaches 10 gallons, a special plaque is presented to recognize outstanding contributions to their community.

The Central Kentucky Blood Center depends on the generosity and support of Rockcastle County blood donors to help meet the increasing need for blood and blood components.

### ASPARAGUS AND RHUBARB... TWO SURE SIGNS OF SPRING

One of the most welcome signs of spring is the arrival of fresh asparagus and rhubarb at the supermarket. And, if you are fortunate to live in warmer parts of the country, you can watch these vegetables sprout in your own garden.<sup>1</sup>

Early spring is peak season for asparagus, so enjoy it while it is at its best. Look for fresh appearing, crisp stalks with tightly closed tips. Asparagus keeps best refrigerated in an airtight container and is best used in one to two days.

The microwave cooks fresh asparagus beautifully. To prepare, wash well and remove scales on stalks, if necessary. Snap off bottoms of stalks. (They will break just between the tender and tough portions.) Leave whole or cut or break into one or two-inch pieces. Allow about one-third pound per serving for whole asparagus.

As with asparagus, we also use the stalks of the rhubarb plant. (The frilly pale yellow green leaves are poisonous.) The normal season for rhubarb is February through June. Technically a vegetable, rhubarb has been used by cooks for generations as a fruit. Because rhubarb makes such delicious pies, our grandmothers nicknamed it "pie plant."

Rhubarb is low in calories, but this is of little benefit because it requires heavy sweetening to be palatable. It is often combined with berries with great results. When selecting rhubarb, look for cherry-red or pink stalks which are firm and crisp. To store, wrap and refrigerate one to two weeks. Peeling is not necessary if stalks are young and tender.

Rhubarb can be frozen easily. Just rinse stalks and cut into slices or chunks and freeze. The following recipes have been tested with both fresh and frozen rhubarb, so you can enjoy them year round. Enjoy these two produce items while at their peak. You will taste the promise of spring in every bite.

#### ASPARAGUS VINAIGRETTE

(This combination of asparagus and tomatoes is as attractive as it is delicious. Serve as a salad or vegetable.)

- 2 tablespoons water

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# Fishing Report

Despite the slight cooling trend, heavy fishing activity was reported at most of the state's lakes. Good catches of crappie, largemouth bass, bluegill, muskie and white bass were being made during the April 12-13 period covered by this report. The lake-by-lake rundown is as follows:

**WEST:** Heavy crappie fishing activity was reported at Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley. Good catches were being made on tube jigs and minnows in secondary creek channels and by drift fishing the banks in 4-14 feet of water. Bass were being caught on crankbaits and spinnerbaits cast across rocky points and fallen trees at both lakes. At Lake Barkley, good catches of catfish were being taken off the old river channel by drift fishing minnows.

**KENTUCKY:** Clear to murky, rising, 3 feet below summer pool, 69 degrees.

**BARKLEY:** Clear, rising very slowly, 2 1/2 feet below summer pool, 67 degrees.

**WEST CENTRAL:** At Barren River Lake, crappie were hitting minnows fished around brush piles in 3-5 feet of water; bass by flipping jig and pork rind combinations over stump runs in 3-8 feet of water. In the tailwaters, good catches of crappie reported on jugs and trout on spinners. At Nolin Lake, bass were hitting crankbaits fished over points and rocky banks in 3-8 feet of water. Crappie on jigs and minnows over brush piles in 8-12 feet of water. At Rough River Lake, crappie were being caught on minnows and jigs in 3-8 feet of water over brush and bass on crankbaits, spinnerbaits and jig and pork rind combinations over rocky banks.

**WEST CENTRAL:** Clear, rising slowly, 1 1/2 feet below summer pool, 62 degrees.

**NOLIN:** Clear, stable, 4 feet below summer pool, 69 degrees.

**ROUGH RIVER:** Clear, falling slowly, 10 feet below summer pool, 61 degrees.

**CENTRAL:** At Taylorsville Lake, bass were being taken on spinnerbaits, crankbaits and plastic worms over shallow banks and wooded inlets. At Lake Cumberland, bass were being caught by casting crankbaits over submerged creek channels in 10 feet of water, crappie on minnows in 4-8 feet of water over flooded willow tops and deadfalls. At Herrington Lake, white bass were being caught by trolling crankbait and spinner combinations along

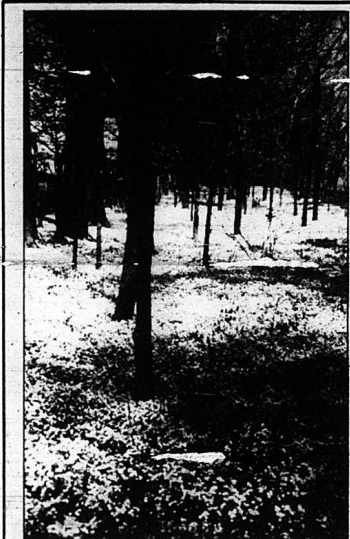
His "log book" reads 33-plus years, and to Gatliff Craig, working that long is long enough.

## Fiscal court gets "zapped" by insurance premiums

More than doubling of the county's 1986-87 liability insurance premium brought the Rockcastle Fiscal Court into a hurried special session Tuesday to "do something."

The court did it. It agreed to borrow \$22,000 from the Bank of Mt. Vernon for a 20 percent down payment and premiums for the rest of the fiscal year (May and June) on a big \$55,410 annual premium due on Apr. 16, up from \$22,500 for the 1985-86 fiscal year.

Faced with no alternative, the court took insurance from Singleton & Associates through the Illinois Insurance Exchange of Chicago, the only group now with available liability insurance.

The coverage is for \$50,000 on a claims made basis. It covers public official liability (errors and omissions), general liability, liability on county vehicles and physical

damage on vehicles. ♦Dorrie Singleton, insurance agent, who has handled county liability since 1982, told the court the same story he has told other local government bodies, "that many companies are getting out of the liability insurance business, and gradually cancelling insurance of various kinds that is considered unprofitable."

Large awards to individuals made in recent times by juries has helped bring on an insurance crisis nationally.

Actually, the magistrates had little choice but to buy the insurance since each magistrate could be sued individually for errors or omissions resulting from actions by the fiscal court.

The insurance package bought by the court does not include county jail, or law, enforce-

## Interchange annexation talks slated by city council for May

A discussion that could lead to the annexation of property along and including the two I-75 interchanges has been placed on the May 12 meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council.

"Let's hear from everyone," was the Mayor Roland Mullins responded after Councilman Jerry Pensol brought up the

subject of extending the city limits, at a meeting of the council Monday night.

"The mayor said the council will be willing to listen to anyone who wants to be heard about the subject at the May 12 meeting of the council."

There was no legal action taken on the matter Monday night. The subject had come up earlier, including, at that time, a motel/

hotel tax when the "long-range" plans for the city were discussed.

Pensol asked the mayor, "Whatever happened to the suggestion of extending the city limits?" and got very little informed, late response.

The possibility of annexing the areas has never been fully explored, the mayor told Pensol.

"But I think we should see what the public thinks about it," the mayor said.

The area extends from the north city limits near Red Top Restaurant to the bridge over Renfro Creek. The other area, less defined, would likely extend beyond the Burr interchange.

City Attorney Carl Clontz said the council would have to have a description of the area to be annexed, pass an ordinance to that effect, send a written notice to the property owners involved; probably wait 30 days; give the ordinance a second reading; and wait. At that point, if legal action is taken by property owners to halt the process, it will likely come at that time.

Clontz said he would have to research the question before definitely advising the council.

The council also agreed to ask the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources about use of a concrete cutting compound at the site of the KY 461 bypass work on the old Broadhead Road.

Water Superintendent Junior Powell told the council the compound is turning Lake Linville water yellow and was fouling the filters and the water plants.

Powell said the company had agreed to try to prevent the overflow. One councilman suggested a settling basin.

## Senator Rogers sued over Bank of Mt. Vernon debt

An affidavit on behalf of the Bank of Mt. Vernon has been filed in Pulaski Circuit Court garnishing the legislative salary of state Sen. John D. Rogers for non-payment of three promissory notes totaling \$89,023.97.

Rogers' senatorial district includes Rockcastle County. The bank, which filed the affidavit Friday, had brought suit against the Somerset Republican on Sept. 17, 1985.

Bank President Jerry Blerd of Somerset said the bank would be willing to drop the suit if the debt is repaid. He added that he is not angry with Rogers' failure to repay the debt.

"We're still friends," he said. He then referred all questions to Attorney Carl Clontz, bank attorney, who declined to say whether the suit and garnishment would be dropped.

Rogers said he used the money to refinance an original campaign loan made in 1980 when he ran unsuccessfully for the 5th District congressional seat. He said he borrowed on the notes in the fall of 1983.

## Tobacco support program is getting mixed reviews

Some like the changes in the nation's tobacco price support program and some don't.

U. S. Sen. Mitchell McConnell calls the changes in the program one of "long-term stability."

It changes the way prices are set, reducing them to bring them in line with international competition, and gives cigarette companies a major voice in how much tobacco will be grown each year in the nation.

Those opposing the plan complain that selling off surpluses to the companies at rates they approve will cost the government over a billion dollars in lost loan money in the next five years.

It makes large cuts in the fees tobacco farmers pay to finance their price support system. But there are many questions, including how much the assessments on burley and flue-cured tobacco will be this year, how much growers' production quotas will shrink and how tobacco farmers will receive the new program.

"I think they're still waiting to see. They so far have reluctantly accepted it," said Vernon Grise, an Agriculture Department economist who closely follows tobacco issues.

Grise said while farmers may see their tobacco incomes fall slightly as a result of lower quotas and price-support levels, those losses will be partly offset by lower assessments and the net effect will be a general stability in economic conditions over the next several years.

During that time, the industry's amassed surplus including the more than 1.5 billion pounds of leaf absorbed by the price support cooperatives will be gradually whittled down through discount sales to cigarette companies.

For this year, flue-cured price support levels will be \$1.44 per pound, down from a previous level of \$1.70. Burley tobacco will be supported at \$1.49, down from the \$1.79 that had been in effect before a legislative reduction in the support rate last year.

Future price-support levels will be set using a complicated formula tied to both market prices and farmers' costs of production.

Marketing quotas will be set after cigarette companies make confidential buying estimates each season. The Agriculture Department will add to those figures amounts needed for reserves and for exports, and will establish the quotas.

Assessments for pay for the program will for the first time be shared by the manufacturers. After climbing to 32 cents per pound for flue-cured tobacco, assessments are expected to fall below 5 cents a pound this year.

The purpose of the contest is to encourage greater awareness of mathematics in the classroom and throughout the community. Faculty members from the high schools are urged to attend and discuss new developments in the mathematics field.

Seventeen high schools from Southeastern Kentucky will participate in the contest. Eight students from each high school have been selected to compete in four categories, two students per category.

The categories for competition are Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, and Advanced Math. The student who wins first place in the Advanced Math category will be offered a full tuition scholarship toward a degree in math or engineering at Cumberland College. Plaques will be awarded to first, second, and third place winners in each category. Certificates of merit will be awarded to fourth and fifth place winners.

## McConnell calls dairy buy-out "Resounding success"

U. S. Sen. Mitch McConnell said Sunday the buyout program, under the leadership of Agriculture Richard Lyng that the department's dairy buyout is "a resounding success," but urged the secretary to go one step further and help suffering beef producers.

Under the buyout program, the federal government is paying 14,000 farmers to go out of business by buying out their herds and sending the cows to slaughter. This will relieve the current surplus of dairy products on the market, which is costing taxpayers more than \$2 billion annually.

However, in a letter to the secretary, McConnell said, "Cattle prices at the livestock market have plummeted since announcement of the number of cattle designated for slaughter. Futures prices have also dropped dramatically, even in the face of well-documented data which shows that slaughter cattle numbers will increase only slightly because of the buyout."

The Food Security Act requires that the USDA shall purchase 400 million pounds of red meat during the period of the buyout," McConnell said. "Although you have already correctly announced that such purchases will take place, I urge you to go one step further. The statutes do mandate what type of red meat should be purchased and I urge

you to require that all purchases for purposes of the buyout be that of beef.

"The situation is indeed critical," McConnell said. "By any standards, the whole herd dairy buyout mandated by the Food Security Act was a resounding success," McConnell said. "The number of cows to be slaughtered as a result of the program indicates that dairy farmers are moving toward a resolution of the overproduction predicament which is strangling the dairy industry."

"However, the American cattleman is an unwitting and helpless victim of the failed dairy policies of the past, which caused the dairy surplus in the first place," McConnell said.

"Cattle farmers are being driven to bankruptcy by a dairy program," McConnell said. "These farmers need your help."

"In my judgment, an announcement that the USDA is purchasing 400 million pounds of beef would send a clear signal to cattle buyers that the Department of Agriculture is committed to fulfilling its mandate of minimum cattle market disruption."

Realizing the very difficult situation cattlemen are facing, I look forward to any action which you can take to minimize the market disruption," McConnell said.

## ASCS office announces sign-up for 1986 conservation research program

The Rockcastle County ASCS office will have a second sign-up for the 1986 Conservation Reserve Program, beginning May 5 and continuing through May 23.

This sign-up period will be for both the 1986 and the 1987 Conservation Reserve Program. The Conservation Reserve Program is designed to take highly erodible cropland out of production. In order to qualify for the program, the land must have been cropped at least 2 years during 1981-1985 and be highly erodible. Highly erodible land is considered to be that in Land Capability Class VI or higher or land in Class II through V that is eroding in excess of twice the tolerable rate of erosion, as determined by SCS. There are approximately 1.8 million acres eligible in Kentucky.

Land that enters the program must be placed in a permanent vegetative practice (selected by the landowner) that reduces the soil erosion loss to an acceptable limit.

The practice alternatives are: 1) Introduced grasses and legumes; 2) Native grass and legumes; 3) Trees and shrubs; 4) Wildlife habitat; 5) Field wind breaks; 6) Combinations of two or more of the above.

The committed land will be devoted to conservation, consequently harvesting, grazing or other commercial use or storage is NOT allowed. However, hunting rights can be leased. Maintenance measure, such as weed control.

Through crosses between the resistant and susceptible files, the resistant file's advantage will be decreased.

Payments and Land Diversion payments, producers must sign up.

Program provisions include a 20 percent acreage reduction requirement for Feed Grains and a 25 percent for Wheat.

Payment rates for the 2 1/2 percent paid Land Diversion for Wheat and Grain producers are \$1.10 per bushel for wheat and 73 cents for corn. The 10 percent additional paid diversion option for winter wheat producers is \$2 per bushel.

By participating in the 1986 Acreage Reduction Programs, farmers can help control surplus commodities that tend to lower market prices. The sign-up period ends April 25.

### Insecticide Impregnated Ear Tags And Horn Fly Resistance

Horn flies become resistant to the synthetic pyrethroid insecticides used in insecticide impregnated ear tags if these tags are used year after year. To try to prevent this from happening on your farm, incorporate the following recommendations into your cattle management program.

If you have used insecticide impregnated ear tags for two or more years, then switch to a different class of insecticide and

an alternate application method for at least one year. Alternatives include: forced-use dustbags, application of regular sprays, backrubbers or backrollers and feed-thru insecticides. Combinations of these methods often work best.

Non-synthetic pyrethroid insecticides should be used and include chlorinated hydrocarbons such as methoxychlor and organophosphates such as coumaphos malathion, phosmet, diazinon, diazinon, fenitrothion, and/or tetra-methrinophos. ENT-11 and ENT-12 are available at the Extension office.

If you plan to use insecticide impregnated ear tags for horn fly and face fly control, consider the following recommendations: Use two tags per animal; this gives the best face fly control. Apply tags late in May or in early June to insure the availability of adequate insecticide during the late summer when fly pressure is highest. Remove tags in the fall to allow the susceptible portion of the horn fly population to express itself.

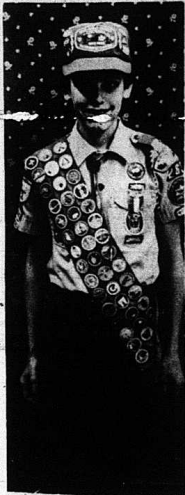
# Robbie Palmer honored with Eagle Court of Honor

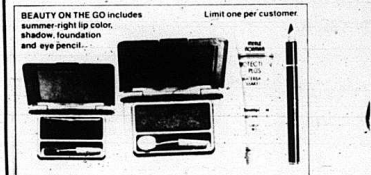

## The Lord's Church is Different

Frequently we discuss various characteristics of the church about which one reads in the New Testament. We have shown that the church is the body of Christ (Eph. 1:22-23), and that it includes all the saved (Acts 2:47; Eph. 5:23).

Sometimes, however, it is well to approach a subject from a negative viewpoint. Such is our purpose in this article. Here are a few items which the Lord's church did NOT have.

It did not have a DENOMINATIONAL NAME (I Cor. 1:12-15; Col. 3:17; Acts 4:12). Inasmuch as salvation is in "no other name," and since the church is the bride of Christ (Eph. 5:22-23), it was no divisive denominational names (Rom. 16:16).

It did not have a DENOMINATIONAL CREED. In the New Testament church, Christ was all authority (Matt. 28:18-20; Col. 1:18; 3:17). Its members were under the law of Christ (Gal. 6:2), being encouraged to "walk by the same rule" (Phil. 3:16).

It did not have a DENOMINATIONAL ORGANIZATION. The only church organization known was that of the local church (congregation). It consisted of saints, bishops (or elders), and deacons (Phil. 1:1; Acts 14:23; Titus 1:5). They had no complex ecclesiastical arrangement. The organization was local and simple.

It did not have a CORRUPTED WORSHIP. The worship was in "spirit," consisting of singing (with heart being accompanied by the musical instruments), praying at the Lord's supper, teaching

the word of God, and laying by in store upon the first day of the week (Col. 3:16; Eph. 5:19; Acts 2:42; 20:7; I Cor. 16:1-2).

It did not have DENOMINATIONAL REQUIREMENTS FOR MEMBERSHIP. Those who became members of the church in the first century were those who simply obeyed the Lord's plan. Through hearing the word preached, they became believers in God and Christ, repented of their sins, confessed their faith, and were baptized into Christ for the remission of sins (Mark 16:15-16; Acts 2:38-41; Acts 8:35-39). Upon their obedience to the gospel of Christ, the Lord added them to His church (Acts 2:47).

It did not have a CORRUPTED WORK. Its work consisted of "sounding out the word of the Lord" (I Thess. 1:8; I Tim. 3:15), edifying the saints (Eph. 4:11-16; Matt. 28:20), and engaging in works of benevolence among indigent saints (Acts 4:32-36; 6:1-7; 11:27-30). Each congregation was an independent functional unit, and did its own work under the oversight of its own elders (Phil. 1:1; Acts 14:23; Acts 20:28; 1 Pet. 5:2).

In conclusion, what the Lord's church did not have in the first century, it must not have in the 20th century. Otherwise, it becomes an apostate body; not the Lord's church! Let us be satisfied with what the Lord authorized—nothing more or less. If this article characterizes you, you need to ponder this subject further. Come, visit us during our gospel meeting April 20-25 and see New Testament Christianity in action.

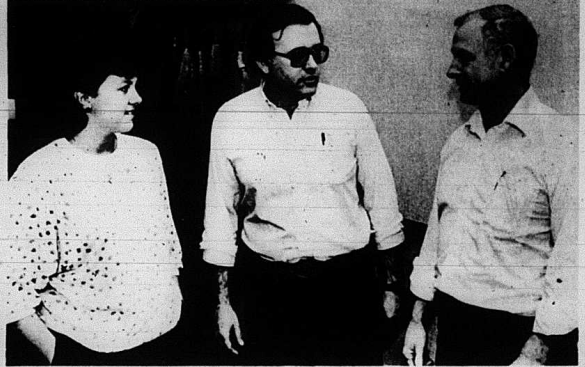

# Your Child's Health

All babies cry a lot and have a great need for sucking. Certainly there is no great news in this statement. However, what gets stuck in their mouths to make them suck and stop crying can be important. There has been a recent death of a three week infant reported from sucking part of a homemade pacifier down the baby's windpipe.

Infant in question by coming apart and allowing the rubber nipple to be inhaled. Parents may learn this trick for making an inexpensive pacifier from the newborn nursery. Many hospital nurseries use such devices to help keep the noise level down in busy nurseries. However, such a practice should obviously be abandoned. Any device which the baby uses to suck on should be made in ONE PIECE so that it cannot possibly come apart. There are pacifiers made in this manner, and that is the only kind which should be used.

It is unfortunate that the use of ordinary nipples stuffed with cotton is so common. Hospitals should abandon the use of them too. Pacifiers should not be tied around the infant's neck with heavy string or chain. This could strangle the infant. It should be fastened only with a thread which can easily break if the baby gets tangled up in it. Such simple things as nipples and strings can easily cause tragedy in a young infant.

These are people who suffer allergic reactions to stings and bites that can cause dizziness, chest congestion, and even shock. There are a few preventative measures you can take to avoid stings and bites. Stagnant water is a common breeding ground for mosquitoes, so get rid of old tires containing rain water, etc. Avoid

hairsprays and perfumes since they are attractive to insects. Food also attracts insects, so if you have severe allergic reactions to insect bites, you may have to avoid eating outdoors. Here are some tips if treating specific bites or stings: **Ticks:** Apply alcohol, ether, or nail polish remover to the tick to relax its grip. In about 10 minutes it can slowly be pulled off with tweezers. Wash the area after the removal. **Mosquitoes:** Calamine lotion and products containing benzocaine or alcohol can reduce itching. Keep the area clean to avoid infection. **Flies and gnats:** Stop the itching with antihistamines, steroid creams, alcohol, or calamine lotion. Keep the area clean. **Bees, hornets, etc.:** These are usually the culprits in severe allergic reactions requiring emergency measures. Otherwise, antihistamines are good for reduction of the itching and hives. If you have any questions about insect stings or bites, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

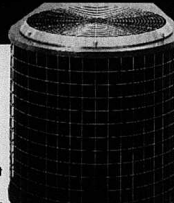

"Over time there have been some 'garnishment' orders, said Charles Wickliffe, general counsel for the Department of Finance and Administration. "It's certainly not something that's without precedence."

Rogers said he had hoped to receive financial help from political action committees, friends and from both the Democratic and Republican parties.

No debts remain from Rogers' 1983 state Senate campaign, according to reports filed with the Kentucky Election Finance Registry, which show total expenditures of \$22,935.17.

Rogers paid a leftover \$421.52 debt not covered by his election account out of his own pocket, according to the report, which is filed by the candidates themselves.

Most persons questioned on the street in Mt. Vernon did not even know Senator Rogers. Answers ranged from U. S. Senator from Kentucky, to 5th District Congressman, to the owner of the Cincinnati Reds baseball team.

Said one man: "I think he is our state senator, but I've never seen him around Mt. Vernon. Where's his home? When told, he replied, "I guess he did get over here long enough to borrow all that money."
