Fishing Report

Another cooling trend, heavy rain showers and windy conditions made surface water temperatures up at most of the state's lakes.

Although some good catches of crappie, rockfish, largemouth bass, bluegill, muskie and rockfish white bass hybrids were

reported during the April 20 period covered by this report. The lake-by-lake rundown is as follows:

WEST: Heavy, crappie fishing activity was reported at Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley. Good catches were being made on tubings and minnows over stumps and brush along secondary/creek channels and fallen trees. Bass were being caught on crankbaits and plastic worms cast across rocky points and rip rap. At Lake Barkley, anglers should be on the lookout for floating debris since major lake is on the rise.

KENTUCKY: Clear to murky, rising. 3 feet below summer pool. 62 degrees.

BARKLEY: Clear to murky, rising. 2 feet below summer pool. 63 degrees.

CENTRAL: At Taylorsville Lake, bass were being taken on spinnerbaits, crankbaits and plastic worms over shallow banks and wooded inlets in about 5 feet of water. At Herrington Lake, rockfish white bass hybrids were being caught by trolling crankbait and spinner at jig combinations in the lower lake. Bass by casting crankbaits over rocky points. At Green River Lake, bass were being taken on crankbaits fished across stump rows in 3-8 feet of water with several big fish taken including an 8-pound, 10-ounce lunker. Crappie are being taken on minnows and jigs over stump beds in 3-14 feet of water. At Lake Cumberland, bass were being caught by casting topwater lures at the heads of bays, rockfish on dolly flus cast across points or gravel banks or crankbait/jig combinations trolled over hump bars along submerged channels.

DALE HOLLOW: Clear to D. Dale Hollow Lake, bass were hitting minnows and medium-running crankbaits over rocky points, and crappie on minnows over flooded flats in 4 to 8 feet of water.

TAYLORSVILLE: Clear to murky, stable at summer pool. 59 degrees.

HERRINGTON: Clear to murky, stable. 10 feet below summer pool. 60 degrees.

GREEN RIVER: Clear, rising slowly. 4 feet below summer pool. 62 degrees.

CUMBERLAND: Clear, falling slowly. 10 feet below summer pool. 56 degrees.

DALE HOLLOW: Clear, falling slowly. 3 1/2 feet below summer pool. 61 degrees.

EAST: At Cave Run Lake, muskie and bass were being caught on crankbaits off deep

rocky points, and in the tailwaters; trout on spinner, corn and cheese.

At Paintsville Lake, bluegill were red worms still fished over points in 5 feet of water, crappie on minnows over brushpiles in 5

feet of water. Good catches of crappie were being taken on spinner and corn in the tailwaters. At Laurel River Lake, bluegill were being taken by still fishing worms

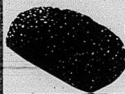

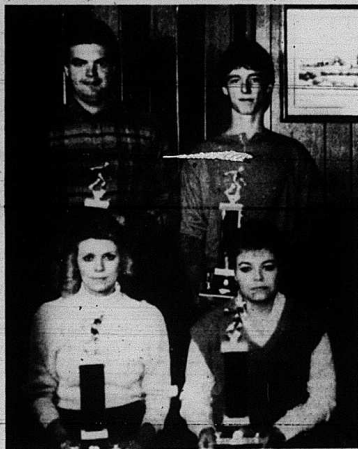

and crickets over brush piles in 6 feet of water, and largemouth bass on crankbaits from 4 feet to the surface over deadfalls and brush piles. At Buckhorn Lake, crappie and white bass were being taken in the headwater tributaries of the lake by casting jigs and still fishing with minnows. At Grayson Lake, crappie were being caught on crankbaits off stump rows and rocky points in 2.5 feet of water, and crappie by still fishing minnows over brush piles in 6-12 feet of water. At Dewey Lake, crappie were being taken on minnows

fished over stumps and brush, muskie on crankbaits, bluegill on worms in the timber, catfish on cut bait and bass by jigging night-crawlers in the upper lake. At Fishtrap Lake, crappie were being taken on minnows and jigs over brush piles in 10-14 feet of water and bass on crankbaits and plastic worms off rocky points. A new crappie were also being taken in the tailwaters.

Draft of garbage plan expected to go to fiscal court next week

A "friendly" reminder that a garbage plan for Rockcastle County is nearly a month overdue was sent this week to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court by the Department of Water Management (DWM) in Frankfort.

J. Alex Barber, director of the DWM, reminded the court that the state statute on solid waste management "does not contain a provision for a further extension."

The court has had one six-month extension on a plan from Dec. 31 to July 1, so it appears doubtful a second extension would be forthcoming.

Barber said "considering the various steps required for final approval, it appears Rockcastle County will have difficulty in meeting the June 30 deadline."

Although Schwendeman, division specialist for the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), which has a contract

with the county to devise a plan, said a draft plan will be submitted to the court probably at a called meeting next week to reassure the court the plan approved by the court in January is similar to the draft plan that will go to the state.

Schwendeman added that due to the long process, the state requires before finally approving a plan, the final date of June 30 will not be met, but he believes the state will "not be too hard on the county" since the draft plan is in the hands of the DWM.

In his letter, Barber said there has to be adequate time for a draft plan review, a draft revision, preliminary approval, a 30-day public comment period, adoption of the final plan by the fiscal court, and final approval by the state, all of which will take between two and three months.

Although details of a county plan has not been revealed to date, the plan is expected to call for voluntary participation; that the garbage be franchised to a private contractor; a charge be made for each participating household; a coordinator to run the program, and participation in the state's Clean Community Education Program.

CAP on Pulaski County "hit list" for unpaid taxes

Following the lead of Rockcastle and Jessamine counties, Pulaski County has joined in the attempt to collect taxes owed by all delinquent taxpayers. CAP "is going to be a primary target, basically because they owe a substantial amount of taxes," he said.

Although CAP is on his "hit list," Neikirk said he first must be sure the organization does not qualify for tax-exempt status.

"Unless they can show they're some type of tax-exempt organization, I'm not singling them out," he said.

CAP was established in 1963 by Father Ralph Betting. The organization branched out to Pul-

aski County in 1981, bringing such programs as Bethany House, a spouse-abuse center; CAPrice Industry, which trains parents with handicaps; The Attic, a used clothing store; Children's Discovery Center, a pre-school; and St. Luke's Free Clinic, which provides medical service.

"As a charity organization, we do things that takes the burden off local governments," said Glen Taul, public relations coordinator for the agency.

CAP programs served 41,700 people in more than 40 counties last year, including 5,823 Pulaski Counties, which is 13 percent of the county's population, according to Taul.

"We're a nonprofit, religious organization," he said by telephone from his Lancaster office. "Right now we feel the law exempts us from property taxes."

Taul admitted there are legal questions involved. "We don't choose to pay, but we will pay

Farmers Market on agenda

Do you have extra vegetables or fruits from your garden or food crops each year? Would you like to make a little extra money from these surplus items?

This might be possible if a plan being considered by the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau is implemented. The local organization is wanting to form a Farmers Market Cooperative, which would provide home gardeners or farmers with an outlet for their surplus produce to buyers at wholesale market prices.

But, before this can be accomplished, the Farm Bureau wants to be sure there is adequate interest locally in the program by both buyers and sellers. They are running an advertisement in the

next few weeks. Signal which contains a coupon asking people to indicate whether or not they would be interested in participating as a buyer or seller and which two days a week they would most like to see the market open. If you're too busy to sit down and fill the coupon out, then two phone numbers are also provided and you may indicate your interest and preference for days by calling either number.

If sufficient interest is shown, the market should be open in time for strawberry season, so it is very important that if you are interested in participating that you fill out the coupon and return it to the Farm Bureau or call either of the

Lack of rain during April mixed blessing for farmers

There's not been a lot of rain this month, but recent weather has been a mixed blessing for Rockcastle farmers and others in central Kentucky, so says a report from the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The report stated there has been a rapid advance in field work, so it is well ahead of schedule. On the other hand, most of the state is suffering from a soil moisture shortage.

In Rockcastle, in the first 22 days of April, a total of 1.48 inches of rain fell, according to the weather station at Cox Funeral Home. That compares to 2.53 inches in March, 4.74 inches in February and 1.16 inches in January, for a near four-month total of 9.91 inches, several inches below the average for the period.

Although it seemed to be a lower time between showers in April, actually there was seven days on which minor amounts fell. The most was Apr. 21 when .70 of an inch fell.

"April is usually one of the wettest months of the year, but most areas are well below normal this year," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Statewide, soil moisture is rated 90 percent short and only 10 percent adequate.

Rain is badly needed right now to foster growth of tobacco plants, hay and pastures, and to allow germination in newly planted fields," Boswell said.

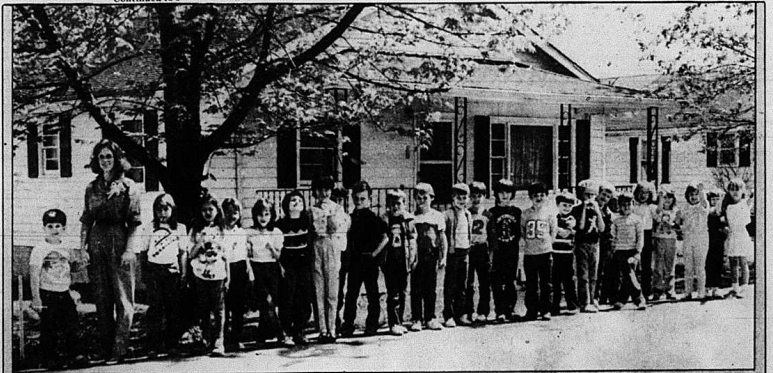
Tobacco bed planting is virtually completed, compared to 95 percent at this time last year. Plants are up in 38 percent of the

beds, slightly behind the 39 percent at this time last year. The lack of rain is slowing growth, and many growers are watering the beds.

The recent frosts, however, do not appear to have done any significant damage.

Crop progress this year is rivaled only by the very early season of 1976. Statewide, planting is 20 percent complete.

Supporting the President against Libyan terrorism

Ever since President Reagan came to office in 1981, he has stood by his constant philosophy—peace through strength. He knows, as do all of us, that weakness only invites more violence and encourages our adversaries.

This past week, with our decisive action against Libyan terrorism, the President once again stood up for the rights of free nations to defend themselves from radical terrorists, who all too often have been getting off scot-free. The time had come to drive home America's unwillingness to stand idle against terrorism, and I fully supported Mr. Reagan's actions.

The recent bombing of the West Berlin disco, which killed one American soldier and injured dozens of innocent victims, was merely the latest chapter in the continuing war by Libyan and other Arab terrorists. Despite all our attempts to reason with these fanatics, their litany of bombings,

murders, and international lawlessness has continued unabated. Our European allies, for whom we provide nearly all their security, have done little to assist us in our effort to reduce this rash of violence. In point of fact, their attempts to appease the terrorists, I think, has only encouraged more of these incidents.

The nighttime bombing of several terrorist-related targets in Libya by American jets was an appropriate response to these attempts to intimidate us. Unfortunately, there were some civilian casualties. But no one saw any Libyan tears shed when its agents threw their bomb in the German disco, or when others exploded a bomb aboard a TWA jet flying between Rome and Athens, killing four people, including three Americans (two were children).

The only way we can ever deal effectively with Libya and his henchmen is to let them feel in no uncertain terms, that we will

respond militarily when we can trace these incidents to him. He must know that he will pay a price—a high price—if he continues this attack on Americans and others throughout the world.

Of this nation's greatest traditions and responsibilities is the defense of freedom around the world. That same principle holds true in dealing with fanatical terrorists. President Reagan's strong action in response to Libyan terrorism may not end these incidents, but it is the only alternative we have at this point in dealing with Khadafi and his thugs. I will continue to support the President and he asserts the right of free people anywhere to live without fear of terrorist violence because that is the ONLY policy we can ever pursue.

Boat registrations expire April 30

The Kentucky Water Patrol, a division of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet, reminds boaters that 1985 boat registrations expire April 30.

Col. Joe Kelly, director of the Kentucky Water Patrol, advises that water patrol officers will be citing boaters failing to renew their registrations after April 30.

Again this year, boaters renewing their boat registrations will receive two registration decals, instead of one. According to Kelly, the issuance of two decals will enable water patrol officers to confirm current year validation from either side of a boat, thus reducing the number of boats stopped solely for spot checks on current year registration. Kelly asks boaters to display their registration decals in live and six inches toward the rear of the boat from the registration number (see illustration).

The United States Coast Guard and most states issue two decals when registering boats.

centuries. So far as we know, D.N. Williams made the first improvements on the spring, which at that time was located on his property. The stream was harnessed to the extent of walling and boxing it in, and a three-inch-iron-pipe was arranged for an outlet.

That pipe was a fascinating thing and the temptation to plug it up was almost irresistible. Mr. Williams offered a five dollar reward for the arrest and conviction of anyone stopping up or tampering with his spring. That made it a sporting event worthy of almost anyone's time and effort.

One doesn't have to be very old to remember when the Spout Spring was the rallying point and almost the principal place of interest for out-of-town visitors. These visitors (no tourists) were county people who came to town on business or pleasure. Most of them came horseback or in wagons, and almost the first chore was to visit the spring and water the stock. There was a big watering trough for that purpose, and ample parking space around the spring and up the street for wagons and horses.

Teams were always taken out of the harness if the owner expected to be in town for any length of time, and there were plenty of hitching posts and racks. County people usually brought their lunch along and ate it somewhere in the vicinity of the spring. It was also a favorite spot in which to drink other things besides water, and the ladies coming down for a bucket of fresh drinking water were often embarrassed by surprising parties of men taking a swig. The immediate vicinity of the spring was constantly thronged on Saturdays, court days and special occasions.

Until a pumping station was installed for the courthouse and jail about 1915, there was probably not more than one or two homes in Mt. Vernon, if any, that had running water.

For many years no one questioned the purity of the water. True, it became muddy when heavy rains came and there were signs of stables and outhouses for a few hours, but it was said to be sparkling and clear again very soon.

Someone finally did question Spout Spring. After all, it was obvious by its location it was an underground run-off from sections of Mt. Vernon. The Department of Health finally paid a visit and took samples of water.

Griffin wrote, "The Health Board report showed the waters of old Spout Spring contained enough animal life to make an excellent soup, by the addition of a little salt and pepper, but that was unfit for human consumption unless boiled." The report added, however, "if a person had been drinking that water for as much as 10 years and was still alive, it was all right for him to continue the custom for he was immortal."

(taxes)" if the law mandates it, he said.

Rockcastle and Jessamine counties recently have questioned CAP's tax-exempt status. The charge is that the organization operates some businesses and therefore its claim to tax-exempt status is unwarranted.

Taul said this is not true. "All of it's charitable work. None of it is money making," he said of CAP's programs.

A four-year-old unresolved case in Jessamine County is attempting to decide whether CAP should be liable for property taxes, Taul said.

And recently, the Rockcastle County sheriff apparently became nervous when he noticed the amount owed by the local CAP and asked his county's fiscal court what should be done about the situation.

Taul said CAP has an agreement with Garrard County to pay taxes on all property except its Lancaster headquarters building. He added that he believes the organization may try to strike a deal with each county that seeks back taxes from CAP.

According to records in the Pulaski County clerk's office, CAP owes the county a five-year total of \$6,909.43, not counting interest and penalties.

The Kentucky constitution exempts church buildings, parsonages and up to one-half acre of land in cities and two acres outside cities from property taxes.

And state law provides "much broader" exemptions to charitable organizations, said Scott Akers, a state Revenue Cabinet spokesman.

compared with 10 percent last year at this time and only 4 percent on the five-year average.

Corn planting is most advanced in the western and south central parts of the state. Farmers in a few of these counties are nearing completion.

"Again, dry field conditions have slowed germination. But even so, some of the earlier corn fields have emerged," Boswell said.

Wheat and barley are generally growing well in spite of the silt soil moisture. The average wheat height now stands at 11 inches, up from seven inches last week, and about the same as at this time last year.

However, many growers are applying nitrogen, and they need rain to activate the fertilizer and boost growth.

Pastures and hay fields are also badly in need of rain. The first hay cutting is expected to be short if conditions don't change soon. Dry conditions are also hindering germination in newly seeded fields and pastures.

"Pasture growth has been sufficient to allow some grazing, but many producers are still feeding hay," Boswell said. "Fortunately, hay supplies are adequate to surplus in most areas."

The freezing temperatures may have caused some damage to fruit crops, but the extent is not evident yet. Overall, winter freeze damage to apples and peaches has been reported as none to light.

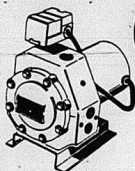

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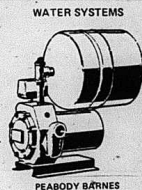

Farmland values decline across nation

Kentucky farmland values, following a national trend, have declined 4 percent from 1985, according to figures from the Kentucky Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This decline also puts Kentucky farmland values 18 percent below the 1980 peak.

Agriculture Commissioner David E. Bassett said that in Kentucky, the average farmland value on Feb. 1, 1986 was \$870 an acre as compared to \$906 on April 1, 1985.

Farmland values across the nation have declined for the fourth consecutive year. Average farmland value for the nation on Feb. 1, 1986 was \$590 per acre, down 12 percent from April 1, 1985 and 28 percent below the peak of \$823 in 1982.

Land values are down from a year ago in all regions, but the northeast. Prices have risen again as great a fluctuation in the Appalachian region as in the Corn Belt, the Great Lakes states or the Central Plains.

SOLAR ENERGY DRIES YOUR LAUNDRY

Some of the best things in life are still free and that includes sunshine and fresh air for drying your clothes.

The old-fashioned clothes line can make conservationists of us all.

Save wash days for sunny weather and getting some extra exercise in the bargain as you carry those loaded baskets to the yard and hang out the laundry.

Adding fabric softener to the rinse water helps make things dry without ironing. Folding them up carefully and smoothing them flat as you take them off the line also helps keep them neat.

The way you hang things on the line makes a difference. Here are suggestions for avoiding

crease lines, as well as doing away with the stretching and straining that can weaken fabric or get them out of shape.

Good hang-ups

Hang clothes on the straight of the goods, by waistbands or by the heaviest, firmest part.

Hang towels, tablecloths, pillow cases (closed end) and similar things about one-fourth over the line. This avoids dog-eared corners. Hang handkerchiefs and napkins the same way, never by one corner.

Hang sheets and large tablecloths double with hems together, and lapped about 8 or 12 inches over the clothes line.

Hang inside-out any brightly colored tablecloths, bedspreads and clothing that might sun-fade. Bring them in off the line just as soon as they're dry.

Empty Dryer's Line Trap After Each Load

Even if you're using solar energy to dry most of your laundry, there will always be those rainy days and hurry-up times that press your gas or electric dryer back into service. Be sure to clean out the lint trap after drying each load. Otherwise, it takes things longer to dry and you make an energy hog out of your appliance. A build-up of lint can also be a fire hazard.

It's surprising how many people forget this little chore, so check the trap before running a load to make sure it was cleaned out the last time around.

A good feature to use on the automatic dryer is a cycle that actually senses when the clothes are dry and cuts off. This conserves energy by preventing overdrying, which is also hard on some fabrics and finishes. When using this cycle, try not to mix lightweight and heavy, dense fabrics in the same load.

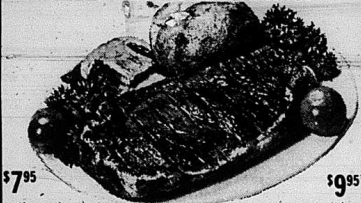

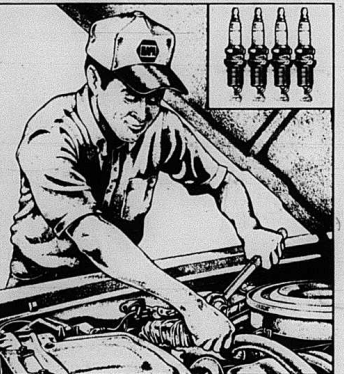
