Briefly . . .

The smell of gasoline

Some water sources south of the Burr Interchange have the taste and smell of gasoline, and are being closely monitored by the Environmental Protection Agency and by Deputy State Fire Marshall Bob Hammons, who says there appears to be no immediate danger, but water in the area and particularly in a nearby cave are being continually tested.

Cleanup time

It's cleanup time in Mt. Vernon, and the Mt. Vernon City Council has set the week of May 19-23 for Cleanup Week. The city will have garbage collection throughout the city. Persons with trash to be picked up on the two days should call city hall and leave their names. All trash must be in bags.

Your income

Per capita income for 1983 has been reported by the State Data Center of Kentucky. It shows Rockcastle per capita income at \$5,189 a year. That compares to \$6,183 in Laurel County, \$6,546 in Pulaski and \$6,741 in Madison. The state per capita income in 1983 was \$7,724.

Recreation grant

A grant, small as it is, has been approved for the Mt. Vernon summer recreation program. It totals \$386, about the same as last year.

Television franchise

A public hearing on ordinance advertising a television franchise for the City of Broadhead was held by the city council Monday night. A public hearing for the franchise will be held June 2 at the Broadhead City Council meeting. This is a renewal franchise.

Two teachers

Two teachers for special projects have been recommended by the Kentucky Department of Education for county education projects, both with \$5,000 funding. The projects are Community Based Education for Trainable Mentally Handicapped Students and Computer Literacy in Appalachia. The committee recommended the monthly handicapped project for two-year funding.

Held to grand jury

James Lee "Jimmy" Sandusky, 19 of Calloway, was held to the May 23 grand jury, during his court appearance Monday. Sandusky is charged with murder in the slaying of his brother in law, Billy Hellard, 31, of Fairground Hill, Mt. Vernon, during a family dispute May 5.

His \$75,000 cash bond was reduced to \$10,000 cash or property. He posted a property bond. His attorney is James Cox, Somerset attorney, an appointed public defender.

RCHS commencement

Commencement exercises for the graduating class at Rockcastle County High School will be held at 7:30 p.m. May 20 at the school gymnasium.

A total of 192 seniors of the Class of 1986 will receive diplomas.

Principal speaker will be WKYT-TV newscaster John Landrum of Lexington.

Drought conditions persist; county crops below normal agricultural officials report

Rain continued to bypass Rockcastle this week causing near drought conditions and leaving crops, grasslands and forests thirsty and farmers scanning the sky in hope that some relief might be in sight.

"A rainfall Wednesday morning brought a little relief, but the dry conditions were expected to return by weeks end."

Conditions in the state, with the exception of Northern Kentucky, are now facing a drought. Overall, and on a long range basis, Kentucky is 11 inches behind the normal rainfall, officials say.

Thirty-two cities in Kentucky are facing a water shortage, and outdoor burning in counties in Eastern Kentucky has once again been banned.

"If we don't get rain in the next two months in an appreciable amount, the agricultural outlook will be bleak," said Harold Ballinger, director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service at Mt. Vernon, this week.

With little rain, he predicted there will be poor field crops this year. The hay crop will be short, and farmers will gradually run out of pasture.

He described the first cutting of hay to be only 40 percent of normal, and pasture no more than 50 percent of normal.

"There is no doubt the water supply around here is in the

critical stage," Ballinger continued. "We do not have a problem in areas supplied by the Mt. Vernon Water Works lake, but persons who have their own wells and water sources may see a shortage soon. In fact, some people are already hauling water."

He reported that tobacco bed plants are "spotty and rather scarce, farmers say, and the transplanting season could be from four to six weeks later than normal."

Poor germination because of a lack of water has been the culprit, he continued, and some tobacco plants have had to be replanted. That's also the case with gardens, although gardens are not far enough along that they can't be replanted, he added.

A lack of water will also begin to affect livestock as ponds and other water sources dry up.

"There is also a problem now in preparing fields for seeding," Ballinger related. "Some plowing is late and some farmers have given up. When they do plow, the soil is cloddy and you can't do a lot with it."

The late, heavy frosts this spring also affected some gardens and fruit. Ballinger said 75 to 85 percent of the apples were killed, almost all the peach crop, and 50 percent of the strawberry crop. If tomato plants were in the ground, they'll probably have to be replanted, along with some of the other crops.

Highway blast shakes area; house damaged

A dynamite blast that went astray showered houses, broke windows and punched holes in one roof Tuesday afternoon at the Ky. 461 construction site on Old Broadhead Road.

One workman was hit in the leg by a flying rock as he fled the scene.

"It sounded like an atom bomb," said David McCauley who lives nearby. "His house escaped damage."

Contractor Elmo Greer was not at the site. McCauley said when he contacted Calvin Scott at the Rockcastle State Highway garage he was told that Wallace Roy, a state highway supervisor from Somerset, did not have time to go to the site.

McCauley also tried to contact District Engineer Leroy Brown but he was in Frankfort and unavailable.

"They're trying to make a million dollars overnight," McCauley said. "They have a contract to get the road finished and the shots they are setting off are too big."

A house belonging to Nancy Helton and rented by the Daug Estes family, took the brunt of the explosion. The house was nearest the blast site. Estes' stepson was in an upstairs bedroom when a large rock crashed through the ceiling. He was not injured.

Windows in the Helton house were broken and holes were punched in the sides by the flying rocks.

One rock was found about 500 yards from the blast. Another rock landed in the road. A car belonging to Estes' brother-in-law was hit five times. Paul Calhoun, standing in the McCauley driveway, ran for cover when he saw the rocks blown high in the air.

Another resident said the

City councilmen postpone annexation plan discussion

Only two persons came to the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night to voice an opinion on moving the city limits to the Burr and Renfro Valley interchanges, and they were divided on the issue.

Larry Sittles, representing Drublers, liked the idea of extending the city limits. The other, motel owner David Gregory, was opposed. Both said they had talked with other residents and found they favored their points of view.

The council listened, then voted unanimously to proceed to talk with residents involved in the annexation along both corridors and reach some consensus by the June 9 meeting of the council. The council also urged residents who would be involved to come to the meeting and express an opinion.

"I think we need to discuss the issue at length before taking action," said Mayor Roland Mil-

lins. "We should also hear from more residents."

"Although the council voted to proceed, it was apparent that any vote that would have been taken Monday night would have found a split council."

"I think we should annex property only if the residents want in the city," Councilman Jackie Renner stated, and his thoughts were echoed by Councilman Les Harris.

The two councilmen then joined with the other councilmen and the mayor to continue to pursue the matter, so everyone could be heard.

"The council voted to write a letter to the Department of Natural Resources asking for permission to sell 1 1/2 acres of land on Old Broadhead Road opposite the Ed Hunt Property to the Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) for a new VFW post."

Picture taking worries parents

Parents in the county are very concerned about several incidents recently reported to law officers involving small children being questioned and photographed by strangers.

Mt. Vernon City Police Chief Joe Howard said Monday that there had been 12 such incidents reported to him and that this is going on.

Howard said that, to his knowledge, none of the incidents actually involved an adult seeing a child being photographed, but rather the children themselves reporting this to an adult. Howard stressed that there was no basis to the rumor circulating Monday that a child had been kidnapped.

However, there was a man, in a car which fit the description given by one of the children, questioned Monday. The man, who was from out-of-state, had photographic equipment in his car. He was not detained because the one witness readily available to the police could not positively identify him and a check with the man's home town showed him to be a pretty longstanding citizen. Howard said.

Rockcastle County Sheriff Clarence Hasty said Tuesday that school grounds, where most of the incidents have reportedly occurred (and two at a local restaurant), are being closely watched. He

Death claims R. H. Hamm

R. H. Hamm, 66, of Ottawa, a well known Rockcastle businessman, died May 12, 1986 at St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington. He had been ill for over a year.

He was the owner of R.H. Hamm Oil Co. in Mt. Vernon for 32 years and an early distributor for Sinclair Oil in the county. He was a former vice president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon; past presi-

dent of the Rockcastle County Development Association; past president of the Board of Directors of the Rockcastle County Baptist Hospital and served on the Rockcastle Draft Board for 26 years.

He was a Navy veteran of World War II where he served in the South Pacific. He was a member of the Broadhead Masonic Lodge 566-FRAM; a member of the Ottawa Baptist Church where he served as a deacon, a trustee, and a Sunday School teacher for 37 years.

Those who knew him called him a fine gentleman and a credit to his community.

Born in Rockcastle County Dec. 31, 1919, the son of the late Mode and Alba Albright Hamm, he is survived by his wife, Audrey Wright Hamm, a brother, Everett Hamm of Sharonville, Ohio, and two sisters, Mrs. Clarice Dillingham of Mt. Vernon and Mrs. Jewel Albright of Broadhead.

Services were conducted May 14 at the Ottawa Baptist Church with Bro. J.B. Allen officiating. Burial was in Ottavawood at the Watson Funeral Home which was in charge of arrangements.

Annual questionnaire results helpful

During each of my six years in Congress, I have worked hard at staying in touch with the residents of the Fifth District. I hold an annual series of meetings in each county of the district each summer. In addition, my offices in both Somerset and Washington send most of their time answers and helping constituents with problems, and receiving your letters and phone calls on key issues facing our nation.

But one of the other key ways we communicate is through my annual Fifth District Opinion Poll. This questionnaire, which is mailed to each household in the district, gives people a chance to respond specifically to me on particular issues I face as your congressman.

This year, I received thousands of responses again. The results are revealing, I think, and show that our people have strong feelings on a number of key issues.

For example, over 55 percent of those who responded said they support the recently formed "Southern Kentucky Economic Development Council." This group is now actively working to reroute new jobs and industry for our region. Only 18 percent thought it was a bad idea, nearly a 3-to-1 vote of support for this idea. I am hopeful that this project will yield us good results in the coming years.

On another issue, 68 percent said they agreed with me that we should place a moratorium on oil and refined products. This idea, which I have co-sponsored, would help continue conservation, help raise money to reduce the deficit, and curb further imports. It is good to know that by a 2-to-1 margin, those who responded feel this idea ought to be tried.

With the recent acts of terrorism in mind, the survey asked people to pick out which response they thought would help most in fighting terrorism. By far, the biggest response was to "militarize airports," nearly 48 percent. The fact that the survey was done prior to the recent Libyan events would seem to indicate

strong support for the president's handling of the situation. Another 26 percent urged tighter security for Americans and American installations overseas.

On other subjects, a majority of constituents said they thought the best way to reduce the deficit was to cut social programs (38 percent). Close behind, however, were those who felt budget cuts AND a tax increase was the best approach (26 percent).

As for our trade deficit,

restricting imports was judged the most effective approach by 47 percent, while 36 percent wanted the U.S. to cut the prices we charge for our exports by becoming more efficient. Clearly, both approaches need to be pursued.

An overwhelming 93.5 percent agreed that Social Security should be exempt from any across-the-board cuts, a policy which I also support. And on the subject of tax reform, nearly 80

Legislative report

The efforts of the 1985 legislature will now fall upon the vote accurate judgments of time and historical perspective.

There were 1,743 bills and resolutions introduced during the 1985 session, and 516 were passed by the General Assembly.

After eight years of neglect and staid, the legislature approved and funded a comprehensive juvenile code for the state. The new code, aimed at the plight of troubled youth, applies to juveniles who committed crimes, who are abused or neglected, or whose parents' legal rights have been terminated.

A bill to increase benefits for small business was passed to raise the minimum annual allowance of \$88 (which is multiplied by years of service to a \$140 minimum starting July 1 and to \$170 the following year).

A measure was approved to require health insurers to offer coverage for long-term care, such as that provided by nursing homes.

Also, the legislature passed a bill to establish nursing homes for Kentucky veterans.

Two controversial election law bills were approved during the session.

First, a Senate bill was passed to make Kentucky the first of four states to sign in this year for a southern regional presidential primary to be held for the first time on March 8, 1988.

Secondly, the legislature approved a bill to put a proposed constitutional amendment on the ballot to appoint rather than elect the state superintendent of public instruction.

In another important area, a

measure was approved to finance a \$500 million medium security prison to address the overcrowding problem in the state.

A resolution was passed petitioning the governor to establish a 14-member task force to review and recommend improvements in the state's workers compensation program.

Also, we passed a bill to raise the state minimum wage from \$2.60 an hour to the federal level of \$3.35 an hour.

Once again, there are many other actions taken by the recently adjourned legislature that I hope to touch upon in the coming weeks. Meanwhile, if you have any questions, opinions or suggestions about state government, please write or call at any time.

Three Links resident Darlene Martin chosen as Master Farm Homemaker

What sort of woman is selected Kentucky Master Farm Homemaker? This year one of the two women chosen is an active member of the Three Links Homemakers. She is creative. She finds being a homemaker a challenge that offers an outlet for her creative energies.

Darlene Martin of the Three Links area has been chosen Master Farm Homemaker, the second Jackson County homemaker to be so honored in the 50 years that master homemakers have been named by the University of Kentucky Extension Service. In 1970 Audrey Morris of Tyner was picked.

Mary Hinson, Jackson County extension agent for home economics, said that being named master farm homemaker is a great honor, that she is proud of Darlene because she is an exemplary homemaker who has somehow managed to remain in her selection. Darlene has commented, "I'm not any different from other homemakers. We all have talents. It's been exciting to be chosen, but I do what I do because I love it and not because I was trying for any recognition."

Darlene and her husband Jack have a 465 acre dairy farm and grow about four acres of tobacco. Darlene remembers that they started out with one cow, "Clara," and grew from there. Their farm is located in both Rockcastle and Jackson Counties and is Jack's homeplace. Jack's family had been beef farmers, so both he and Darlene had to learn the business from the bottom up and they have had to struggle to make a living at it as all farmers have to struggle, but 100 percent of their income comes from their farm.

Their dairy is a family operation that involves working together with their two sons, Grant, 16, and Andrew, 12. Darlene says she works outside less now that their sons are older and can help their father and she has more time to devote to cooking, sewing and arts and crafts projects. Darlene views her kitchen as a place to be creative.

She says she and her family are spoiled and don't enjoy any of the available "instant" boxed products and so her meals are all prepared "from scratch." Her family has only found one of the new recipes she is constantly

trying, distasteful and that was "cantaloupe sorbet" which Darlene admits was pretty awful.

To help keep costs down, Darlene makes most of her own clothes and also makes bedspreads and has even tried making satin bed sheets. Besides doing all the activities that are considered part of being a homemaker, Darlene is an accomplished artist.

In 1968, Toile painting Toile is a French word meaning tin and originally toile painters painted on tin pieces, but toile painting today includes using wood and other surfaces.

Darlene got very excited about her painting, realizing that she was getting back to an interest that was very important to her when she was young. As a student, drawing was a part of all scholastic projects that she turned into her teachers.

Darlene uses acrylic and oil paints and has begun what she calls "homestead" painting, which is painting one of her brothers-in-law asked her if she could paint a picture of his old home place. She took on the challenge and it was so successful that she has continued this kind of work whenever she gets a chance.

In the winter, Darlene is able to spend more time in her "play room" than at other times of the year when the duties of the farm are more demanding. But she schedules at least one day a week when she can paint because she has found it's a great way to relieve any stress that has built up. It's an activity in which she can totally immerse herself, forgetting anything that may be troubling her.

Darlene and her husband Jack are in the middle of a five year plan for remodeling the old farm house where they live. All the work that has been done on the house has been done by the family except for the drywalling and brick laying. They have added rooms onto both ends of the house and all that remains now to meet their estimated completion date of 1987 is carpeting, landscaping, a deck and woodwork. The Martins have worked on the remodeling as they have been able financially to do it and of course they have had very little labor expenses.

Before Darlene was selected as state master homemaker, she had to be chosen as Wilderness Trail Area Homemaker and she had to submit a booklet of her accomplishments and goals that

entailed about 20 typewritten answers to complicated questions and a scrap book of the work the Martins have done on their home. An area team of judges visited her home to inspect her work and interview her and after she won the area competition, another team from the state level found their way out to Three Links and she was interviewed again. Darlene said that the judges didn't make her nervous because "I am who I am and I had done all I could—I enjoyed their visit."

Darlene became active in homemakers as soon as she and Jack moved back from Lexington 17 years ago. She feels that she has learned more from homemaker meetings than she learned in the 70 college hours she had at the University of Kentucky. Jackson County should be proud to have such a warm, talented woman representing the county as a model of the homemaking excellence that goes on here.

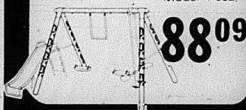

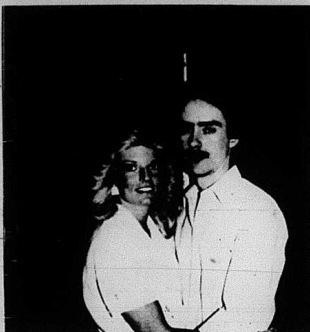

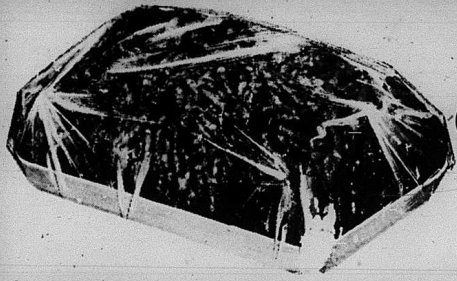

VA expenditures rise to \$441.6 million

Expenditures by the Veterans Administration in Kentucky totaled approximately \$441.6 million during fiscal year 1985, an increase of nearly \$15 million over the previous year and the highest in state history.

In Rockcastle the total was \$1,627,897 with \$1,536,044 for compensation and pension, \$32,545 for readjustment and rehabilitation, and \$59,308 for insurance and indemnities.

Craig N. Stover, acting director of the VA Regional Office in Louisville, reported recently on the federal agency's spending for various services and benefits. The largest portion, \$266 million, represented disability compensation and pension checks to veterans, their dependents and survivors.

Approximately \$131 million went toward medical services and administrative costs, and \$22.6 million provided for GI Bill educational and vocational rehabilitation programs for Kentucky veterans, he said.

The remainder was spent for GI insurance and indemnities (\$18.6 million) and construction and related costs (\$3 million).

Construction funds authorized for roadway markers

Construction funds have been authorized for installation of pavement markers on 1,453 miles of selected roadway sections throughout the state, including Rockcastle, according to Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

"This safety improvement project will enhance motorists' visibility and distinguish lane separations on roads, especially at night and during adverse weather conditions," said Collins. "These markers have proven to be more effective than painted lines that often fade."

The project includes installation of metal snopposable pavement markers on 2.3 miles of roads in Rockcastle County. The markers will be installed on Kentucky 461 from milemarker 5.59 to milemarker 32.5.

The Transportation Cabinet authorized a total of \$3.9 million for the project, which is being financed with funds from the federal Interstate 40 Program.

Plans call for \$8 million for weatherization

The Cabinet for Human Resources plans to spend more than \$8 million during the next fiscal year to make weatherization improvements to homes of low-income families, with priority given to residences of elderly and disabled Kentuckians, including a combined total of \$403,690 for Rockcastle, Clay, Laurel and Jackson.

The \$8,025,276 will be distributed to the state's 23 community action agencies, which serve 119 counties, and the City of Ashland, which also serves Boyd County. "Allocations are based upon the need of the area each serves compared to statewide need," said Employment Services Commissioner James Daniels, whose department administers the programs.

"We expect to serve about 14,250 people in 5,700 homes," he said. Work that may be performed on a home includes caulking, weatherstripping windows and doors, reglazing windows, repairing walls, insulating ceilings, pipes, ducts, walls and under floors, wrapping water heaters and placing skirting around foundations.

"The type and amount of work performed is based on the condition of the home," Daniels said. "Improvements an agency makes to any home are limited to an average of \$1,600, but at least we are able to make these homes more comfortable and reduce energy costs."

U.S. Department of Energy funds make up almost \$3.2 million of this year's allocations, while Home Energy Assistance Program dollars account for almost \$4.1 million. The department expects to receive another \$569,000 from the Low Income Energy Assistance Fund created when the state received a court-ordered rebate from Exxon Corporation. State lawmakers directed that the money be invested, with interest on the account to be used for weatherization programs.

the tender corn plants that were up when the frost came.

If there is one fruit that appears to be in abundance, it is blackberries. One resident said, "We'll have blackberries running out our ears if things go like they are. I'd say there'll be a lot of blackberry canning this year." It was the opposite last year when a late frost killed off most of the blackberries.

A check of rainfall records at Cox Funeral Home shows that only 25 of an inch of rain has fallen during the first 12 days of May, one of the major reasons crops are so dry. During the same 12 days last year there had been 1.08 inches. Incidentally, during May 1984, there was a whopping 7.50 inches of rain.

Since Jan. 1, 1986, there has been 10.55 inches of rain in Mt. Vernon. That compares to 12.17 inches in the same time frame in 1985. However, as noted, the

small amount of rain, especially during the latter part of April and the 12 days of May, has been a major cause of the problem. Windy weather has also been a factor because of its drying effect.

Forest fires still remain a danger in Kentucky despite the greening of the woodlands.

"There's still a lot of dry leaves around and they can always cause a fire," Ballinger reminded residents. "People should be extra careful about outdoor burning until the dry conditions end."

Since the property was condemned for public use in 1969 to develop Lake Linville, permission must be obtained before a sale can be made.

The council agreed if a Farmers Market is to be developed and run by the Farm Bureau, the bureau must purchase a privilege license from the city.

In a report to the council,

James Rickles, who is on the Parks and Recreation Committee, reported to the council the commission suggests new signs be erected at entrances to the city, namely at the Burr and Renfro Valley and at the U.S. 150/Ky. 461 entrances, and add some ground in front of the signs for flowers, shrubs, crossies and lights.

The committee also asked the council to find about two acres for a T-ball court, and to move adult softball games to the ballpark at Lake Linville.

The council voted to write a letter to Postmaster James Smith inquiring about house numbering throughout the county. The council earlier had heard that numbering was to begin soon.

Mayor Mullins told the council the 1987 Municipal Aid Fund from the state will total \$25,586. And the Economic Development Fund \$6,676. The mayor asked the council and the public for suggestions on which streets should be repaired with the money.

The council planned to discuss a recent report made by the Police Commission, but delayed it until the June meeting.

The council asked City Attorney Carl Clontz to draw up an ordinance prohibiting parking on Main Street between Richmond Street and the east side of the courthouse between 2 a.m. and 4 a.m. so the street can be swept.

HARVEST ALFALFA FOR QUALITY AND CONTROL

The end of April and early part of May will provide an opportunity for alfalfa producers to do themselves a big favor in terms of harvesting a quality crop and initiating season-long weevil control.

For an established alfalfa field, the 30 percent bud stage is an ideal indicator of when to take that first cutting. At that point, which is likely to arrive in much of the state near the end of this month, the alfalfa is at its most palatable and nutrient rich stage. And it is at this time, frequently, that the alfalfa weevil situation reaches a point where something must be done to control them. Cutting the alfalfa is an effective way of dealing with them without the cost of pesticides, the fuel needed to drive across the fields to apply them, or the damage to the plants caused by driving over them.

Another beneficial factor to be considered is that a fungus deadly to alfalfa weevils develops in alfalfa windrows.

Harvest at the 30 percent bud stage and you get the best quality forage and the most efficient control of one of alfalfa's most serious pests, all for free...no loss in yield and no cost for pesticides.

In addition to those benefits, alfalfa regrowth will be quicker and with less strain on the plants if it is harvested at the 30 percent bud stage than if it is allowed to reach maximum height.

By the time alfalfa blooms, it has already begun to produce shoots for secondary growth. It also has lost a good deal of its quality. Digestibility drops—by three-tenths to one-half percent per day beyond the 30 percent bud stage.

Leaf diseases are another good reason to take the first cutting early. As the plants become more mature the bottom leaves fall off the plant and act as a bed for the development of leaf diseases and

the continual reinfestation of new alfalfa shoots following each cutting throughout the season.

You'll get the highest ratio of quality to quantity, as well as good weevil and leaf disease control, by harvesting established stands at the 30 percent bud stage. Subsequent harvests should be made when new crown shoots begin growth or when plants show some bloom.

Dairy members allocated share

Members of the Manufacturing Producer Division of Dairy Inc. were allocated on May 1 their share of \$17.2 million in equity for the 16-state regional milk marketing cooperative.

This allocation brings to more than \$192 million the total amount of equity distributed to members during the cooperative's 17-year history.

The Manufacturing Producer Division serves 635 producer-members in Kentucky, Indiana, Tennessee and West Virginia.

Equity is the net retained margins (patronage dividends) and capital retains invested in the cooperative by the members, and is returned to the members after it has performed the important function of providing the necessary capital to finance the cooperative.

Checks totaling over \$2.1 million accompanied the notices mailed this week to Dairy Inc.'s total membership of approximately 7,000 dairy farmers. This check represents that portion paid in cash at this time. The remaining portion will be returned under the cooperative's revolving equity program.

Dairy Inc. has historically invested its members' equity retirement on a five-year cycle. This is one of the shortest retirement periods among dairy cooperatives.

"We are proud of our membership equity program," said Division President Obie VanCleave, Auburn. "We are also quite pleased to be in a financial position that has allowed us to resolve this amount within just five years. This is a sound program which has the strong support of our membership."

This equity allocation to members was made at the rate of 29.7 cents per hundredweight (100 pounds) of milk marketed through Dairy Inc. during fiscal year 1985.

CONSERVATION QUESTIONS From the Rockcastle County Soil Conservation District

Conservation planning on your land requires a careful review of your land capabilities and potential uses. The specific land use whether for crop land, pasture, hayland or woodland should be determined by a variety of factors, such as land slope, soil type, field size, and rotations, etc.

Following is a list of questions to ask yourself about your land concerning soil conservation.

- 1) Are all the steep or eroding areas on your property protected by grass or trees?
- 2) Does the surface water flow at safe speeds without making a gully or cutting banks?
- 3) Are cropping systems sufficient to reduce erosion within limits?
- 4) Are the fewest trips made over the land for planting the crop?

5) Are enough residues left on the soil to stop or control erosion?

6) Are animal wastes returned to the soil in proper amounts and during the proper times?

7) Are fields soil tested to determine the proper kind and amounts of nutrients needed?

8) Are the ditches and tile mains checked for flow problems and repairs made?

9) Are wildlife needs planned for and carried out on property?

10) Are the woodlots managed for long term yields and thinned as needed?

If your answer to the majority of these questions was yes, congratulations. If your answer was no to most questions and you wish to obtain more information or assistance, please contact the district office at the courthouse or call 256-2541.

Dairy Inc. markets approximately 70 percent of its members' milk to processors of milk and dairy products in the East and Southwest United States. The remaining 30 percent is marketed through the cooperative's 20 bottling and manufacturing facilities under the brand name products, Flav-O-Rich and Farm Best.

A P.P.O., or Preferred Provider Organization, is one in which the doctor is paid on a discounted fee for service arrangement. He must refer you to certain approved hospitals and specialists if needed. He has incentives to keep costs down, too, to remain "preferred" by the insurance company involved, but the guidelines would not be as stringent as with the H.M.O. This form of care will cost you somewhat more than H.M.O. rates probably, but will allow you more freedom to choose doctors in most cases and will give the doctor more flexibility in providing care.

The other common form of payment is called traditional insurance. You pay a fee and after meeting your deductible the insurance company picks up most or all of the rest of the charges for hospitalization and maybe outpatient labs and x-ray. This form of payment is still the most common, but will become less so as the new types of payment become more popular. It usually does not pay for office calls.

Whatever form of payment is important to have some form of hospital insurance. Having an emergency admission with no insurance can be a great burden for you and your family.

lotions. They must be reapplied after swimming or heavy sweating.

Most products today are marked with an SPF number. This is the "sun protection factor." It represents the ratio of time for sunburning unprotected skin as opposed to protected skin. For example, if you usually burn in one hour of sun exposure, theoretically, you can remain in the sun for 6 hours before you will burn if you use a product with an SPF of 6. Keep in mind that this is theoretical. Some products vary in the accuracy of their SPF numbers. These numbers run on a scale of 2 to 17. It's best to exercise caution and choose a higher SPF than needed instead of a lower SPF than needed.

If you have any questions about picking a sunscreen, check with your pharmacist or doctor.

Your Child's Health

H.M.O.'s, P.P.O.'s, D.R.G.'s, X.V.Z.'s, etc. You may have noticed that talking about health care is more and more alphabet soup. Many of you will soon be offered new options for your health insurance which will provide protection for you and your children. What the plan offers varies greatly and you should know what you are paying for, and what is not covered.

In an H.M.O., or Health Maintenance Organization, the doctor is paid a set fee each month for each patient signed up with him. He gets this amount whether or not you have an office visit. He does not get paid any more if you are sick or hospitalized. A certain portion of his pay is held back to cover lab and x-ray charges and he gets this at the end of the year if he didn't order a lot of tests on you. His incentives are basically to keep you out of the office and especially out of the emergency room, x-ray department and hospital. The aim is to cut costs. Such a plan will often cost you less than other insurance, but you should realize that it will be in the interest of the doctor to do the least expensive thing to get you taken care of, including avoiding referrals to specialists where possible. To make such a system work, you will need to try to avoid using medical services for minor problems.

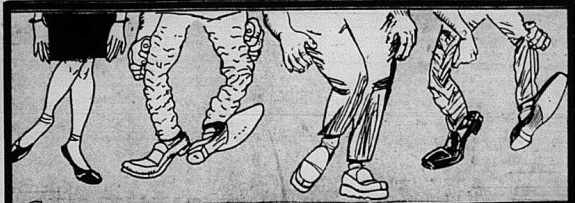

An estimated 378,000 veterans live in Kentucky. The VA has medical centers at Lexington and Louisville, and a regional office in Louisville. Vet Centers to assist Vietnam-era veterans are in Lexington and Louisville and seven national cemeteries are in the state.

In Jefferson County, disbursements totaled nearly \$97 million with \$53.4 million for medical services and administration at the Louisville medical center and \$792,000 for construction and related costs. Compensation and pension payments amounted to \$33.7 million. Another \$4.7 million was spent for GI Bill educational and vocational rehabilitation programs and \$4 million for insurance and indemnities, Stover said.

In Fayette County, the VA spent nearly \$87 million, with \$77.4 million for medical services and administration at the Lexington medical center and \$2.2 million for construction and related costs. Compensation and pension payments amounted to \$5.4 million and \$1.2 million was spent for insurance and indemnities.
