Teachers to participate in 1986 teacher institute

Three teachers from Rockcastle County have been chosen to participate in the 1986 Commonwealth Teachers Institute. Melissa Hicks and Debbie Buga, both special education teachers from Mt. Vernon Elementary, and Lisa Reams, a special education teacher from Roundstone Elementary, will be based at the Berea College campus for the week of July 13-19 for the institute.

Each teacher submitted an essay about education and letters of recommendation supporting the nominees were submitted by John Hale, principal of Mt. Vernon Elementary School, and Superintendent Charles Parsons. Danny McKinney, president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, wrote a letter of support for the team and expressed the bank's interest in supporting education in Rock-

castle County.

The goal of the team is to develop a plan of action that will incorporate support businesses into the Rockcastle County Schools to better the quality of education for students. Two follow-up weekends are planned for Oct. 17-19, 1986 and March 27-29, 1987 in which the team will participate.

Hicks gets grant to expand program

solicited grant proposals written by teachers, principals and school districts which offered innovative solutions to educational problems. The grants were submitted to a state committee that screened the grants and decided which grants would be funded for the 1986-87 school year.

Melissa Hicks, a special education teacher of the Trainable Mentally Handicapped at Mt. Vernon Elementary, was one of two teachers in Rockcastle County whose grant was accepted for funding. Hicks plans to expand her present program to include a

A Community Based Education Program concentrates on helping the Trainable Mentally Handicapped student to acquire the life survival skills they will need to live independently after graduation. Part of the fund will also be used to supplement student salaries as they train in real work situations with Mt. Vernon businesses. The project will begin with the 1986-87 school year.

Week" is sponsored by Operation C.A.R.E. (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) and is similar to the American Cancer Society's "Great American Smoke-Out." Makin participates in astronaut training

Jerry Makin of Mt. Vernon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Makin, went through astronaut training activities this week, leading to a simulated mission in space at U.S. Space Camp at the Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville, Ala.

The simulated mission on Friday used an orbiter mockup and mission control simulator built especially for Space Camp. During the mission, trainees performed experiments similar to experiments done by astronauts and scientists in space. They also used a micro-gravity simulator in the shuttle's cargo bay for another "in space" activity. The outcome of the shuttle mission depended on how well the team members learned and worked as a team.

The simulated mission climaxed a week of scientific learning and adventure for the trainees. During the week they tried on space suits, learned the principles that make a rocket work and studied the history of the manned

Woodland Park is located at the corner of Kentucky Avenue and East Street (two blocks south of High Main Street). Arts Place is located on Mill and Church Streets.

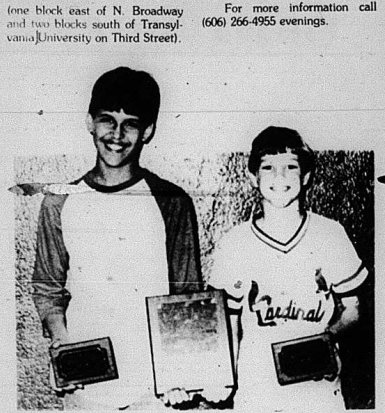

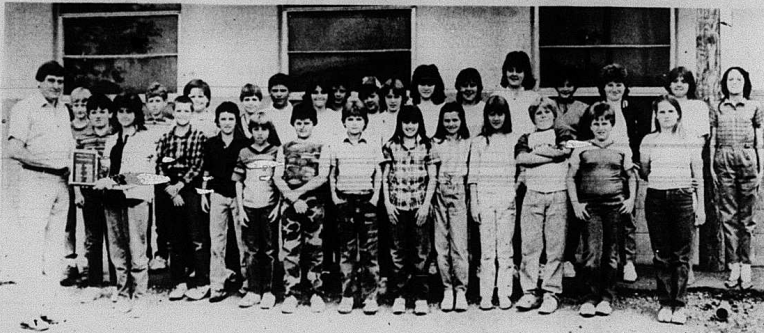

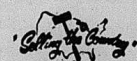

Check up on your prayers

Acceptable prayer is not something that comes naturally, but God's people must be taught to pray (1k. 11:1). Prayer is man's way of communicating with God; think of prayer as an open line to heaven. It is a personal approach to God, the creature seeking the creator. Prayer is for all Christians, not merely a "stock in trade" of preachers, elders and deacons.

Listed below are ten questions that will help you evaluate your prayer life. Your answers will give an accurate picture of your intimate communion with the Lord. Ask yourself:

1. Is praying more of a duty to me than a privilege? Consider the song: "What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer."
2. Am I conscious of the presence of God when I pray? (James 4:8).
3. Do supplications with thanksgiving have a prominent place in my prayer? (Phil. 4:6).
4. Have my prayers been hindered by laziness, inconsistency, vagueness, haste, or a wrong attitude? (Luke 18:9-14; 1 John 3:22).
5. Are my prayers powerless because of disobedience or a lack of Bible study? (Matt. 7:21-23; 1 Peter 3:12). Remember: God does not answer the prayers of sinners. (John 9:31)

6. Do I pray only at certain times of the day, or do I also raise brief, silent petitions at any opportune moment? (1 Thess. 5:17).
 7. Do I maintain the right attitude at all times when I pray? (James 4:3; Matt. 6:14-15).
 8. Have I cultivated the habit of using a written or mental prayer list, specifically remembering those who have asked me to uphold them before the throne of grace? (1 Tim. 2:12).
 9. Do I study the Scriptures so that I can be assured of praying according to the will of God? (1 John 5:14-15).
 10. Have I had any recent answers to prayers? Did I give God the glory for lovingly meeting my needs?
- We could add more questions to this test, but we trust that these are enough to make you cry out, "Lord, teach us to pray!" (Luke 11:1). We should resolve immediately to pray regularly and exercise this God-given privilege.

Gasoline leak watched closely by experts

Calling the investigation "a process of elimination," Deputy Fire Marshal Bob Hammons is continuing his search for the cause of a gasoline odor and taste in water in the Burr area.

Complaints have been made by some residents south of the I-75 interchange that their water tastes and smells like gasoline. Also, a cave in the area has strong gas vapors.

"There's no doubt there is gas, or something that smells like gas, in the water," Hammons reported. "We're not sure yet where it is coming from. There is apparently a leak in a gasoline tank somewhere in the drainage pattern. I also visited the cave and there is a strong gasoline smell."

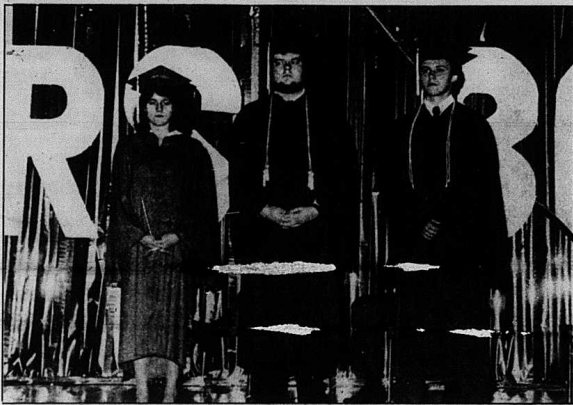
A representative of the Kentucky Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has been in the area in an effort to determine the cause. Two professors, one from the University of Cincinnati and the other from Eastern Kentucky University, have also been in the area. Both are hydrologists.

"We can't definitely say there is no danger," Hammons continued. "It could be a real problem if it gets into the underground water. We doubt there could be an explosion, but that can't be completely ruled out. We don't believe there is an immediate danger."

Hammond said samples of water are being taken and records of service stations in the area will be checked to see if they show a loss of gas. Tanks will also be tested.

"It's possible the gasoline

Venters denies courts have triggered crisis in medical insurance

Circuit Judge Dan Venters has defended the court system against charges that large damage awards by juries have triggered a national liability insurance crisis and are creating a medical catastrophe in Somerset.

Judge Venters, speaking during a luncheon meeting of the Somerset-Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce, took issue with statements made at a chamber luncheon three weeks ago by Drs. Stephen B. Kalley, Hossain Fall-atzah and James D. Crase that attorneys are generating litigation and juries are making exorbitant awards. The end result, according to the physicians, is doctors abandoning practice in this community.

The judge's talk was reported by Bill Mardis in the Somerset Commonwealth Journal.

The physicians, complaining of rapidly rising liability insurance

costs, called the situation "a headlong rush into catastrophe." They lambasted attorneys for taking cases on commission; advocated a cap on damage awards; and contended a jury of their peers, not a panel of ordinary citizens, is qualified to try cases involving alleged medical liability.

Venters agrees there is an "element of fault" but "hoped" some insurance companies may be making excessive profits.

"The dramatic increase in liability insurance costs to doctors, lawyers, CPAs, businesses and governments is outrageous," said the circuit judge.

"I sympathize with pleas we heard in this chamber, but I know as a judge we must act with reason, not sympathy."

Venters, who said he was responding to a finger pointed at

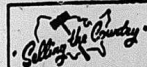

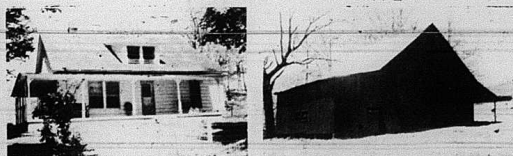

were one on Negro Town Hill and another on Dailey Street. However, within the city limits at the time there was only one on Richmond Street.

Gordon Graham supplied us with a handwritten account of Mt. Vernon people and businesses in 1886 written by William T. Davis who was editor and publisher of the Signal from 1927 until May 1938. The booklet contained the names of black families who lived in Mt. Vernon in 1886 at about the time Walker Newcomb set aside the land on Richmond Street for a cemetery. His list is reproduced below. The spelling of names is his and in some cases may differ from today's spelling.

Walker Newcomb (probably Newcomb) and wife, merchant; Fount Modeler, wife and children; George Mullins, wife and children; John (Monk) Taylor, daughter and son; Aunt Jane Newcomb and son Bill; Uncle Louis Hiatt and Aunt Dilse, wife and children; John, Will and Mace and one girl; Dick Thomas, a hunchback; Liz Joplin and children; Uncle Sam Smith and Aunt Mollie; Saunders Smith, Hattie and children; Uncle Harve Owens, Aunt Julia and child; Uncle Gus Jarber, wife and children; Uncle Dan Lackey and three boys; John Lurie, wife and children; George Adams and wife Julia.

Uncle Alfred Red and wife, Aunt Sarah; Alvira Hiatt and children; Sallie Stigall; Rev. James Nelson, wife and son, James; Aunt Tylvia, a hunchback; Joe Newcomb, and Scott Fish, watch repairer.

Editor Davis also noted that the Negro school and church house at the time were on Buckeye Road and "these old colored folks were as good citizens as we had."

It should also be noted that in early times slaves, and the families of slaves, often took the names of their owners. Those names continued through subsequent generations.

the courts by the insurance industry. insisted facts should be heard before abolishing a jury system of taxing citizens it has functioned for the last 90 years.

The judge produced a chart on which he said were results of jury verdicts in Pulaski Circuit Court for the past 5 1/2 years and in Rockcastle Circuit Court for the past 3 1/2 years.

"The figures speak for themselves. You can see that in 11 of 19 cases, juries awarded the sum of zero. Others, only a modest amount was recovered by the injured party."

According to Venters' chart, the largest award in eight cases where the jury agreed the plaintiff was damaged was \$39,945. The smallest awarded was \$500.

"Do you believe professionals are fleeing from this community because of these jury verdicts?" Venters asked. "Do you believe this is a record of wacky verdicts by confused juries inflicting such damage upon insurance companies that we should abolish the system?"

Local doctors contended in their speeches to the chamber of commerce that high liability insurance premiums which they attributed to excessive damage awards by juries have caused some physicians to leave this community and said others are planning to leave.

Said the judge: "Although these verdicts (used by him as examples) are local, you will find the experience across the nation is generally the same."

The doctors cited figures to emphasize their liability insurance burden.

Kelley said current minimum premium cost for a Somerset physician engaged in family practice is between \$8,000 and \$10,000 annually. Falalazah said insurance cost for the practice of obstetrics and gynecology is "...almost \$20,000." He predicted premiums in Somerset in a couple of years would skyrocket to between \$100,000 and \$150,000 annually.

Said Venters: "If crazy jury verdicts are the cause of this crisis, I simply ask someone to show them to us. Where are they (excessive verdicts)? I've shown (on displayed chart) all of them in this county."

"If they exist everywhere, it's a simple matter of proving it. Show us the numbers from each case. Name the cases. Let someone bring forth the facts to support the claim that jury verdicts have caused this crisis."

"It is said defendants in lawsuits are forced to pay huge sums to settle... because they are afraid of what a confused jury might award a greedy person."

"There have been what I would consider large settlements in this community... some up to \$200,000 or \$300,000."

"But those cases are not settled for large sums because of a fear of a confused jury," contended Venters.

Reasoned the judge: "If someone settles a case for hundreds of thousands of dollars, you can bet there was substantial evidence of liability and substantial damage to the injured person."

"Cases are not settled for large sums because of fear of a confused jury, but just the opposite - the existence of a severe injury, strong evidence of liability and a well-founded fear a jury will see it."

Venters charged insurance companies through an association called Insurance Information Institute spread information about "wild cases" with excessive awards "...to suggest that getting injured and going to court is like winning a lottery."

Said Venters: "They've even

got Dr. Crase repeating it. He said before this chamber: 'It's like winning the lottery in Ohio.'

Referring again to the chart of past jury awards in Pulaski and Rockcastle counties, the circuit judge remarked: "If you were a defendant, would you be afraid of a jury given this record of verdicts?"

Venters cited several examples of news accounts of excessive jury awards, cautioning the chamber audience that "...you are rarely given the whole truth."

The "rest of the story," he said, is that the jury verdict, is extenuating circumstances of which the public is not informed in many of these cases.

Venters said doctors are not the only ones experiencing unfair increases in the cost of liability insurance.

"Law firms in Somerset have experienced rate increases from \$1,200 last year to \$7,500 this year, an increase of more than 500 percent."

"Why?"

"Is it because, as insurance companies say, high jury awards and lawsuits?"

"According to Home Insurance Co., one of two legal malpractice insurers, during a two-year period between May 1983 and April 1985, four claims per year were made under legal malpractice insurance policies."

"The average cost paid on each claim, including the claim itself and the cost of investigating and defending the claim, was \$17,741."

"The total amount collected has not been disclosed, but far more has been paid in premiums than has been paid out in claims."

"Why these rates have increased dramatically remains a mystery, but clearly litigation has not been the reason," said Venters.

He took issue with four proposals made by local physicians in their call for court reform:

"Eliminate the jury in medical malpractice cases."

"Put limits or caps on awards that can be awarded to individuals for pain and suffering or punitive damages."

"Outlaw contingent fees of attorneys (cases in which attorneys work for commission-zero if they lose and a percentage of the amount recovered, if they win)."

Said Venters: "It is not my place to defend the contingent fee system. I have no interest in it, and I'll leave that for the bar association."

"But he does say this from the viewpoint of a judge: The attorney working on a contingent fee basis is the most efficient legal practitioner there is. He does not prolong or unduly complicate a case. He gets paid only if he is right and he is therefore not likely to file frivolous or meritless cases."

"He also enables poor and middle-income people to present their cases in court because he works for no advance payment."

"Your speakers (physicians) previously suggested we abolish this system and use legal-aid attorneys, paid for by the government to provide services for such people."

"But do you really want taxpayers to take over that cost when members of the bar association do it for free? Can the county, state or federal government afford this additional expense in these days of record deficits and budget reductions?" said Venters.

About local doctors' advocacy to limit amounts of damages a jury can award, Venters remarked:

"... Is it fair to arbitrarily... limit damages? If someone negligently or intentionally runs over a surgeon, rendering him paralyzed from the neck down for life, why should he and his family not be compensated for all their losses?"

Again, referring to more statistics on a prepared chart, Venters said it illustrates insurance premiums have continued to

rise where governments have placed a cap on jury awards.

And concerning a jury of doctors to try doctors, Venters made these observations:

"... It has been suggested to you that we abolish these confused juries, whose only qualification is the fact they are voting citizens, and create some kind of board of doctors, to decide suits against other doctors."

"Do you really believe that is fair?"

"If someone in our family is injured negligently by a doctor, do you think it is fair to have the medical association decide if you should be paid for your loss?"

"Likewise, flying a jet airplane is a highly specialized and complicated profession. If you were injured in an airplane crash caused by pilot error, do you think the American Association of Airline Pilots to decide your case? Is that fair?"

"Or, for that matter, operation of a tractor-trailer within regulations and the Interstate Commerce Commission is beyond knowledge of an ordinary citizen."

"Do you want a jury made up of Teamsters to decide your case? Is that fair?"

"We all agree the increase in insurance premiums is a crisis. But reason alone cautions us to avoid jumping to conclusions, ignorant of facts."

"To make responsible decisions, you need more information. You must ask questions."

"If insurance companies are being forced to astronomically raise premiums to offset losses caused by litigation, why did USA Today report on Jan. 14, 1986, that profits from property and casualty insurers increased 881 percent? Why are their stocks increasing dramatically?"

"Is that a sign of an ailing industry which is actually increasing its prices to offset losses caused by litigation?"

"If it is necessary to put limits on the amount injured people can recover, why do premiums continue to rise in states which have imposed limits?"

Venters said three insurance companies writing malpractice insurance policies in West Virginia said they would withhold insurance from physicians if the West Virginia legislature in imposing a cap on damage awards, removed a requirement that the companies report the amount collected in premiums and the amount paid out in claims.

"If insurance companies are in trouble and need help at your expense, why don't they want to give you the facts?" Venters asked.

The circuit judge quoted the Government Accounting Office in a recent report as saying massive increases in liability insurance premiums are totally unjustified and not necessary to cover litigation losses.

And, concluding with an emotional defense of the court and jury system, Venters said:

"Nearly 200 years ago, your forefathers wrote into our Constitution: 'The ancient mode of trial by jury shall be held sacred, and the right thereof remain inviolate.'"

"Nowhere did they advise us to hold sacred the right to vote, or to bear arms, or to free speech or anything else only the ancient mode of trial by jury, which has served us for some 900 years."

"Before there was a right to vote, there was a right to have a jury trial. It is the surest defense against abuse and corruption that has ever been devised."

"By using these words, our forefathers have warned this is not a right to take lightly or trifle with."

"Let us not abandon the faith of our fathers by whitening away the greatest system free men have ever devised for protecting our freedom."

"Heed the constitution! They have handed that to us and hold sacred that right to us."

Memorial Day week end traditional time to set Burley

Transplanting the 1986 burley tobacco crop from beds to fields is expected to shift into "high gear" this weekend, according to agriculture officials. They said about five to seven percent of the crop was set during the first two weeks of May, according to the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association.

Memorial Day weekend is the traditional time most Kentucky and adjoining state farmers begin in earnest to transfer their plants from beds to fields. The process is usually over by the latter part of June, as many producers adhere to an old saying that "if tobacco isn't set by July 4, you might as well wait until next year to put out any more."

A number of farmers, however, may be setting closer to the end of the optimum period because of the unseasonable dry weather during plant bed growth, burley officials said. Even though most producers have either been irrigating or "tank" watering their beds since the first of April, plants

have been slow to mature without Mother Nature's help. Natural rainfall up to three inches or 50 percent below average since beds were sown, somehow benefits tobacco plants much more than water by artificial means, according to burley officials. Average rainfall is more than nine inches short in some communities since the first of the year.

Many beds also have about 20 percent left plants than normal, according to reports. Anticipated plant shortages are reported in many Cumberland, Bluegrass, Northern and Eastern Kentucky counties. The only bright spot is that about 20 percent less acreage is expected to be planted this year, officials said. Burley quotas were cut six percent, the amount producers are allowed to sell over 100 percent quota has been cut seven percent, from 110 percent to 103 percent, and most producers "caught up" last year on poundage they lost during the 1983 drought.

Although some beds were

reseeded after the dry spell and the April 23 freeze, farmers who are short of plants are being cautioned by burley officials to be very careful where additional plants are borrowed or purchased. Diseases, such as black shank, can be transmitted to farms that have before virtually been disease-free. Even resistant varieties can transmit black shank to fields that have never had the disease, officials said.
