Perpetual Care for Elmwood, who has given many an hour to cemetery business. "We try not to get involved with families who place the ashes. We leave it up to them to take care of the actual gravesite. If they give us permission, then we trim them, but only then."

Cox, along with Irene Bales and Henry Coffey, were at the cemetery Sunday to take tribunations for upkeep. Nell Wanda Travis helped on Monday.

"We did very well this weekend," Cox reported. "We took in about \$1,200, but we need all we can get. Our biggest costs in the future are going to be blacktopping the driveways, re-setting stones and trimming and removing trees."

The Elmwood Perpetual Care committee was formed as a tax exempt organization in 1980. To date, the cemetery fund totals \$75,000, mostly in certificates of deposit.

Cox said the group wants to get up a trust fund in order to get a better deal in interest, but the cemetery fund will have to total \$100,000 to set up the trust.

"We're hopeful we'll reach our goal before too many years," he related.

Up until a few years ago, Bill Cox took care of the cemetery. Following his death, the committee was established and considerable work was done at the cemetery, including a stone wall around the front. Now, only a few jobs are available and they are in an acre belonging to Clarence Carter.

No one is sure when the land was first set aside for Elmwood Cemetery. But a reasonable guess is between 1790 and 1800.

The earliest burial date is Joseph Carson (1777-1815), and Mare N. Carson (1813-1863).

Other early dates include General William Smith (1773-1849), who was the grandfather of James Maret; and Major Alfred Smith (1808-1870). Graves of early Mt. Vernon residents are on the south side of the cemetery.

For the record, the perpetual care committee includes, in addition to Cox, president Sammy Ford; secretary-treasurer Paula Mink; and committeemen Jim Cox, Ralph Sigmon, Bud Cox, Billy Dwell, Bill Lanum, Lewis Nieceley, Danny Ford and Herbert Coffey.

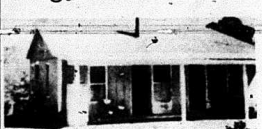

The Farmers Home Administration office in McKee will begin immediately to participate in "Operation Assist" for the counties of Jackson and Rockcastle. Robert W. Hornsby, County Supervisor, announced recently.

"Operation Assist" is a new program for farmers who obtain guaranteed operating loans. County Supervisors will take completed farm credit applications to local banks or other lenders, along with the farmer wishing to apply for a guaranteed loan.

"We will handle the applications and personally introduce the applicants to our local lenders," said Hornsby. "We will present a complete loan package, including cash flows, financial statements, and appraisals. It

necessary, we will make a commitment to work with the lender to do an interest buydown. We will do everything we can to help the lender, and the borrower, by committing to guarantee the loan at our maximum 90 percent.

While direct operating loan funds are used up in some areas, there is still nearly \$800 million available for the guarantee program. County FmHA officials hope other lenders will make operating credit available under the guarantee, with most of the

paperwork done beforehand by FmHA.

Briefly ...

Fire destroys home

A fire destroyed the mobile home of Brenda Baker Ambrose at Green Hill Saturday night. Mt. Vernon firemen reported the home, which had an addition and was bricked, was in flames when they arrived. Nothing was saved. State Police are investigating the fire.

Water costs more

City water customers in Livingston have a higher water rate that became effective May 20. The base water rate is now \$7.30 a thousand gallons, up 30 cents from the old rate of \$7. The increase was passed by the city council at a called meeting, according to Mayor Billy Medley.

Big crowd

An estimated 300,000 persons visited the Lake Cumberland Area over the Memorial Day weekend, with most of them apparently passing through Mt. Vernon on the way. Monday afternoon traffic was often at a standstill in Mt. Vernon as they made their way home, most of them to Ohio.

Tourism important

The importance of tourism to Rockcastle County is underscored by a report by the state which shows tourism in Kentucky in 1985 was a \$3.2 billion industry. A breakdown of the figures shows Rockcastle received \$8,148,258 from tourists, with 333 persons employed in tourist related businesses.

Police group votes to disband

A frustrated Mt. Vernon Police Commission voted to disband at a meeting Tuesday night at city hall.

Commission members who attended, claimed little has been done by the city council to implement recommendations made by the commission at previous meetings.

Only five of the 12 members of the commission were present, including Carl Baker, Robert Robinson, Oscar Fain, Jim Cox and Ralph Sigmon.

"Of the original proposals made to the council only three minor ones have seen council action," Robinson said. "There is no money available so most of the recommendations can't be carried out. I see no reason why we should continue the commission. We may as well disband."

Jerry Pensol, the only city councilman to attend, asked the members of the commission to continue its work and to send a representative to the city council to discuss the situation, but his suggestion fell on deaf ears.

"We're wasting our time," one member said. "You can't do a lot or make many changes if there is no money and it looks like there won't be any soon."

The commission then adjourned.

Police report

A total of 1,746 motorists were cited during April, according to records at the Kentucky State Police Post at London.

In Rockcastle, 164 were cited for traffic violations. Also included are 23 for driving under the influence of intoxicants; 55 courtesy notices; assisted 60 motorists with breakdowns.

Fire destroys Signal apartments

A fire believed to have started by an electrical short circuit raced through two top floor apartments in the Signal Building early Tuesday night.

The rear section of the Main Street floor, containing Signal offices, was heavily damaged by water.

The rear section of the basement area also sustained damage when water from the two floors above poured through.

No one was injured although 11 persons living in the apartments on the two floors were at home or in the area at the time.

Mrs. Ollie Mink, living in the top floor apartment facing Richmond Street, told firemen her son was playing a record player when it shorted and began burning.

She alerted another resident, Jane Poynter, who ran downstairs

to alert Rick and Paige Anderkin who were at work. Rick ran to the apartment area to make sure all residents left the building. Some were in their night clothes.

The alarm was sounded at the Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department about 7:45 p.m. When firemen arrived, flames were shooting out the windows of the Mink apartment. It took firemen about an hour to bring the fire under control. The Mink apartment was charred and about four inches of water was on the floor.

About 200 persons soon gathered in the area and many helped carry heavy equipment, supplies and documents out of the Signal offices. None of the equipment was destroyed.

Records of persons who subscribe to the Signal were carried out of the building soon after the fire alarm sounded.

"We can't thank enough the many who helped get our machines and other things out of the building," Mrs. Anderkin said. "We feel badly that those living in the apartments are inconvenienced at the same time we're happy that no one was hurt."

Living in the building, in addition to Mrs. Mink and Jane Poynter, were Alva Ponder, Lee Lambdin, Mr. and Mrs. Sam Kite, Linda Martin and son, Lynchie Witt and Shirley Rowe.

Lambert wins primary; faces Luker in November

Mt. Vernon Attorney Joseph E. Lambert won a primary victory for a seat on the Kentucky Supreme Court in Tuesday's election that observers said was the "lightest" vote in memory.

Lambert will face Charles R. Luker of London in the November General Election.

Although the election is non-partisan, both finalists are Republicans.

The unofficial total showed Lambert with 13,744 votes, Luker with 11,680, Morris R. Butler with 10,379 and Norma Adams of Somerset with 8,687.

Butler was the only Democrat on the ticket in the predominantly Republican 28-county Third District.

In the Republican race for the right to face incumbent Democrat U.S. Senator Wendell Ford in November, Jackson Andrews appeared to be the winner over three other opponents.

Unofficial totals in that race showed Andrews with 15,127 votes, Carl Brown with 9,061, Tommy Klein with 8,301, and Thurman Hamlin with 6,708.

In Rockcastle, in the Supreme Court race, Lambert received a lopsided 1,062 votes. Luker had 90 votes, Butler 56, and Adams 52. In the Senate race in Rockcastle, Andrews got 202, Brown, 99, Hamlin, 70, and Klein, 69.

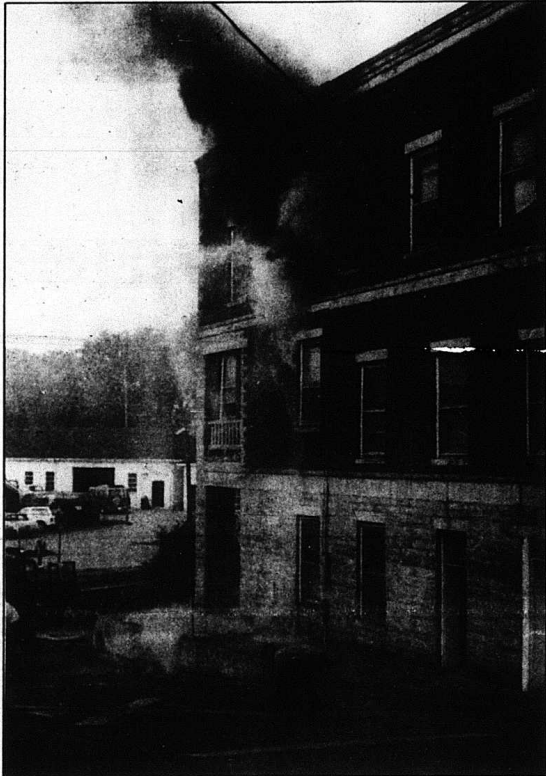

FmHA interest rate buydown program

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) in Kentucky is presently encouraging farm lenders to participate in its Guaranteed Loan Programs, according to Kenneth L. Seaton, State Director. One of the newest incentives is the Interest Rate Buydown Program which is designed to be used in conjunction with FmHA's Guaranteed Loan Program. All legally organized lending institutions making family farm loans may participate in the program.

The program is effective through Sept. 30, 1988. Total funding for the program is \$200,000,000.

The purpose of the Interest Rate Buydown Program is to: 1) Encourage commercial banks and other lending institutions to make family farm loans; 2) Help the family farm borrower who needs a loan but who cannot show enough net-worth income to qualify unless the interest rate on the loan is reduced.

This is how it works: 1. The participating lending institution will contract with the Farmers Home Administration to reduce the interest rate on the loan. The lender will reduce the interest rate in increments of one quarter of one percent until the borrower can show a positive cash flow using the reduced rate.

2. FmHA will make annual payments to the lender of 50 percent of the lender's interest rate reduction, up to a maximum of two percentage points, at the

end of each year of the interest rate reduction contract. The borrower can pay a reduced interest rate of as much as four percent.

3. The lender's interest rate is fixed for the term of the agreement, but may increase to "average farm customer rates" after the contract expires. Borrowers with existing FmHA guaranteed loans and applicants for new loans are eligible for the program. The lender will receive up to a 90 percent guarantee on the loan, as well as one-half of the reduced rate of interest, from FmHA.

To qualify, the borrower must meet the following eligibility criteria:

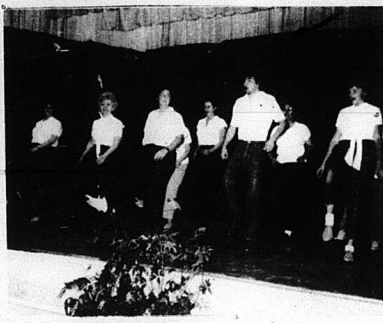
1. Must be unable to get a loan elsewhere at reasonable rates and terms.

2. Must be unable to make the loan payments in a timely manner unless the interest rate is reduced.

3. Must be able to show a positive cash flow during the term of the reduced interest rate agreement and loan.

The buy-down contract between the lender and FmHA may not exceed three years.

RES students present play

As the conclusion of its total language arts program, the students in the first and second grade transition room at Roundstone presented a play entitled "The Traveling Musician." The play was presented three times, near the last of school-first to the kindergarten classes, and then to the students' parents and friends.

All of the students were actively involved in planning, scheduling, auditioning, gathering of props and the construction of costumes and set. The two weeks of preparation time utilized all long-term objectives that had been determined at the beginning of the school year based on the combined needs of the students.

The classroom used such basic skills necessary for school success such as: listening, following directions, speaking, reading, planning, scheduling, classifying, writing, memorizing, mathematical skills, such as telling time, counting, measuring, spatial relationships, and the most fun items for the children, art and drama.

The class was responsible as a whole for completing individual assignments such as writing his/her own invitation to a special person or group; planning and participating either a costume or a prop; preparing actively, either as a cast member, "stage" hand, or audience.

Throughout the school year, the students had been guided toward individual achievement and self-government of their classroom. They were given daily responsibilities such as clogging, ice cream mopsy, making up the list and seeing that the list was filled and delivered; leading and monitoring the class in the hallway and lunchroom; and numerous duties in the classroom itself. The child's ability to successfully complete his daily "job" dictated whether or not he would be assigned the duty again.

Each student was encouraged to use their own talents and abilities and not to think that another person was "smarter, or dumber." The students learned that it was their responsibility to put forth necessary effort in order to learn, and to provide help to their classmates whenever they could. In working to become a better individual, the group became stronger as a whole.

The Transition Room concept was made possible through the special legislative session last year and has completed its first year across the state. This is an attempt to have smaller classrooms at the primary level for those students who demonstrate deficits in the essential skills as measured by the Kentucky Essential Skills Test.

Mrs. Norma Eversole was the teacher/instructor for this program at Roundstone.

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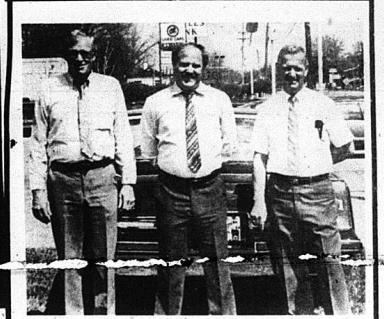

SPINACH SALAD

1/2 small onion, quartered
3/4 cup cooking oil

1/2 cup vinegar
1/4 cup catsup
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
8 slices bacon
1 lb. fresh spinach; washed and trimmed
1 cup (3 oz.) sliced fresh mushrooms
Combine onion, oil, sugar, vinegar, catsup, salt and Worcestershire sauce in food processor or blender; cover. Process about 2

minutes or until smooth. Arrange bacon on microwave-safe meat rack; cover with paper towel. Microwave (high) 7 to 8 minutes or until bacon is crisp; rotating rack once. When cool, break into pieces. Tear spinach into bite-size pieces. Layer spinach, bacon pieces, and mushrooms in serving bowl. Add desired amount of dressing and toss lightly. Refrigerate any remaining dressing.
