A salute to the dairy farm families of Rockcastle

Father and son team up to operate modern dairy

Cardinal Hill Dairy Farm located near Brodhead is owned and operated by the Hunt family. Lew and Alice, along with their son, Hal, have been building their dairy herd for 36 years.

Lew recalls the early years when hand milking was the way of life. Twenty cows were hand milked twice a day, seven days a week. Cream was separated and sold to local creameries. The remaining milk was used to grow feeder pigs which were later sold to local farmers.

Considerable change is evident as you visit the farm today. A modern double 3 herringbone milking parlor makes it possible for Hal to milk an average of 60 cows. The tank room houses a 1,000 gallon tank which stores and cools milk awaiting pick up by Southern Belle Dairies.

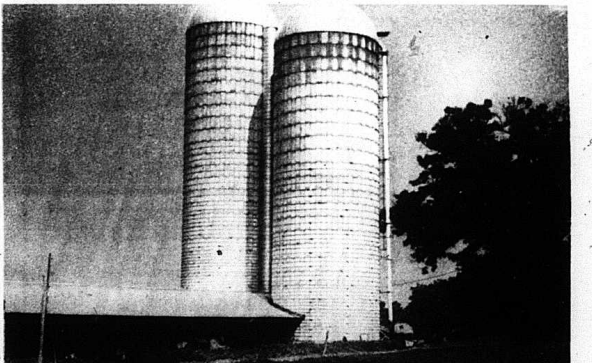

Two concrete silos and feeding bunks help in feeding the 130 head of cows, replacement heifers and calves. The Hunts note that having a second but smaller silo has been a great help in diversifying their feeding program.

Forty-five acres of corn is cut for silage each fall and normally fills both silos. The smaller silo is emptied by spring and filled with 45 acres of wheat silage which is double cropped following corn. Some years when hay making weather isn't available, alfalfa haylage is placed on the wheat silage.

No till farming has been a big help in cropping the 260 acres. Each year for the past 15 years, no till corn has played a big part in making double cropped wheat possible. Other crops include 38 acres of alfalfa hay and 1 1/2 acres of tobacco.

Building the herd through the use of artificial insemination has been practiced for over 20 years. At first, local vets and AI technicians were needed, however for the past four years, Hal has been handling this himself. The Hunts note that up until this year, all replacement heifers have come from their herd. The 21 year record was broken when five registered cows were purchased. Registered offspring are anticipated to be used as 4-H project animals.

The Hunt farm is an example of the modern dairy industry. Through adopting new and improved methods, dairymen have increased their production. During the month of June, we pause to take note of our local dairy industry. Forty-two dairies produce approximately 3 million dollars in farm income. Running very close to the total income from beef, dairy ranks second only to tobacco.



Each week during June, we plan to focus on farm families so others may see their way of life and the importance to our community.

Election footnote

Attorney Joseph E. Lambert carried 13 counties in the 28 county Third Supreme Court District in the May 27 primary. He was second in 11 counties and third in four. He'll face C.R. Luker of London in November. Luker was first in three counties, second in four, third in six, and last in 15 Lambert carried Bell, Casey, Clinton, Estill, Garrard, Jackson, Leslie, Lincoln, Nelson, Russell, Wayne, Whitley, and of course, Rockcastle.

Plant to close

Cowden manufacturing plant in Stanford is expected to close when work runs out next month with 200 employees going home until the company can make provision to reopen the plant. The closing was due to loss of a contract with Levi Strauss, maker of jeans, and competition from foreign makers.

New district boss

Dr. Stephen B. Kelley of Somerset has been elected chairman of the Fifth District Republican Party. He told supporters the party will now gear up for the November 1987 election. He said he hopes to unite Republicans in the 27-county district and called for a "crusade" to enlist new voters for the GOP.

Nine indicted by grand jury

Nine indictments have been returned by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury. The names of six of those indicted have been released. The names of the other three indicted are sealed, pending their appearance before the court.

Two of the indictments returned were in connection with the May 19 break-in at McBee Department Store. Charged with burglary in the degree are Willard William Graves, 22, of Mt. Vernon and Billy Joe Previtt, 26, also of Mt. Vernon. Both men were released on \$2,500 property bond.

James Lee Sandusky, 19, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted for the May 5, 1986 murder of William Ray Hilliard. He is free on bond.

Gary Randolph, who escaped from the Rockcastle County Jail on May 22, 1986, was indicted for second degree escape and is back in jail under \$20,000 cash or property bond.

Fred Alcorn, 26, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on wanton endangerment in connection with a May 10 incident when he allegedly shot a firearm at Ronald Wilson. Alcorn is free on bond.

Indicted on three counts of theft by deception (one over \$100 and two under \$100) was Patricia Falls of Mt. Vernon. The indictment stems from checks given Continental Telephone. Mrs. Falls was released on her own recognizance.

All are scheduled for arraignment on June 27, except Randolph who will be arraigned June 26.

Farmers Market to open; rules, regulations reported

Rockcastle County Farm Bureau Farmers Market will begin June 7 and will continue each Saturday and Tuesday until the end of the growing season. All sellers must grow their own produce and reside within Rockcastle County. All sellers must be a member of the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau Farmers Market Association. An exception will be made if a seller lives outside Rockcastle County, he may sell if he has been a member with Rockcastle County Farm Bureau for over one year.

A membership fee of \$5 will be charged for the admission to the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau's Grower Association. A fee of \$1 will be charged to each producer per vehicle per day.

On Saturday, growers cannot set up or sell goods before 7:30 a.m. Spaces will be given on a first come first serve basis. Selling will begin at 7:30 a.m. On Tuesday, growers may set up and sell goods at 1 p.m. No spaces will be reserved.

All growers must check with designated Market Manager before leaving. Each area must be clean of litter and debris.

Growers will determine their own price for produce. However, they are encouraged not to go below wholesale prices. Wholesale prices as determined by the U.S.D.A. Louisville Produce Terminal and local prices will be used as guidelines. The Market Manager will have information.

Report circulates local railroad line may be at an end

Dwindling revenue may have prompted the Seaboard Railroad to abandon the rail line between Sinks and Lebanon.

A report circulated at a meeting of the Brodhead City Council Monday night that crewmen are already removing "train signals" along the route that runs through Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Crab Orchard, Stanford, Danville and Lebanon.

The railroad has not notified any city along the route that it plans to abandon the section of track, but as reported at the council meeting, the section would be closed to rail traffic by the "end of the year" and the tracks removed within 18 months.

Crossing signals are not being removed.

The only thing that could save the rail link would be a sale by Seaboard to another railroad, which they will likely try to do, the council was told.

A spokesman for the railroad reportedly told Jack Touratsis, president of Mt. Vernon Plastics, that "no active study" to discontinue the line is under way at this time, and no decision of any kind has been made that he knew of.

That answer, however, does not rule out the fact that there may be "smoke" in the report.

The railroad spokesman said another study would have been conducted before any kind of a decision is made.

The Seaboard had planned to abandon the line, which is a connector between two major rail lines, over two years ago. The notice spurred a determined effort by cities along the route to keep it in operation.

At that time, railroad officials agreed to try to maintain the line if it could improve its business, but increased business has apparently not materialized. Reportedly, usage is down a third from what it was when the

Fiscal Court listens to county jail needs

If the county is going to stay in the jail business, there will have to be some changes made and the changes will be expensive.

So reported Richard Stevens of the Kentucky Corrections Cabinet when he and Brad Black, also of the Cabinet, met with the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

"You have to make a decision," Stevens said. "Do you want to stay in the jail business or out of it?"

He predicted within two years state regulations will catch up with the Rockcastle County Jail, the jail capacity will be cut by about half, and that won't meet state standards.

Three alternatives remain, Stevens said. Build a new jail; remodel and expand the present jail; or make arrangements to send prisoners to another jail, if one is available.

Stevens advised the court not to decide until a survey is made.

"I'd advise the court not to go into this expensive project in a haphazard way," he related. "Lay

out a long term plan and work toward it. If you just add on to the present facility from time to time, when you're finished, you'll just have to start all over again."

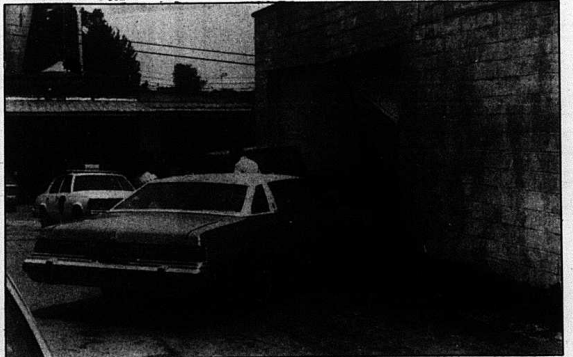
He reported the local jail does not come up to standards set by the Kentucky legislature, reporting the Rockcastle jail does not have an approved detoxification area, approved visitation area, a secure booking area, no holding cell, no recreation area, no multi-purpose room, no conference room, no approved juvenile facility and no outdoor recreation area.

He said with a vacated first floor of the courthouse, the jail could be expanded, since there was more than enough space. However, he added, "We have not been happy with renovated jails, since they usually cost more than is anticipated."

He estimated a new jail in another location in the county would cost \$112 a square foot. He noted renovation would be cheaper, but a new jail could be a better deal in the long run.

He promised the court his

90-Day sale on homes planned by Farmers Home

"The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will offer 80 single-family homes for sale from June 1 to Aug. 29 in Kentucky," Kendall L. Seaton, State Director, said recently.

"These are homes that have come into our possession through loan liquidations and have been determined unsuitable for FmHA's Section 502 housing program. These homes are being offered on attractive terms," Seaton said. "They are priced below market value and the normally required downpayments are being waived or reduced during the 90-day sale period."

The U.S. Department of Agriculture Agency acquires residences from time to time from borrowers who are unable to continue payments and voluntarily turn the property over, and through foreclosure.

Persons interested in buying a house either for a residence or for investment purposes can obtain information on locations, descriptions, sale terms and prices from FmHA County Offices. The government listing section of the local telephone directories under "United States Department of Agriculture, Farmers Home Administration" will give the location of the nearest county office.

"With inflation largely diminished and interest rates lower than in several years, this should be an opportune time for many people to buy," Seaton said. "We invite everyone's interest."

This is an Equal Housing Opportunity Program.

State plans to crack-down on billboard regulations

Faced with the threatened loss of millions of dollars in federal highway money, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet is taking renewed steps to enforce the state's billboard law and regulations.

Transportation Secretary C. Leslie Dawson said the state is obligated by its agreement with the Federal Highway Administration, which the state entered into in 1967 and is still binding, to clear the interstates of primary and secondary roads of illegal signs. Failure to do so could result in the loss of \$20 million a year in federal road funds to Kentucky.

The Secretary has directed the Cabinet's 12 District Highway offices to begin an immediate inventory of illegal advertising devices on interstate and federal aid primary routes.

These devices located on the right of way are to be removed immediately, Dawson said, while the owners of illegal devices located off the right of way will be sent notices to remove the signs within 30 days. Failure to comply will result in legal action for removal.

Following the initial inventory and removal efforts, Dawson said, periodic checks will continue statewide to ensure future compliance. For information regarding the billboard law and regulations, contact your District Highway Office.

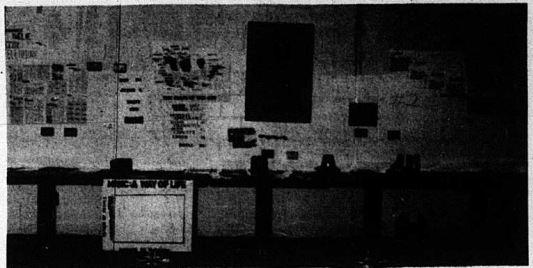

Disagrees with farm report

Dear Editor,

"Record High Net Farm Income For 1985" - This statement appeared once again in a USDA report as stated in the June 1986 issue of Progressive Farmer - "one time too many to sit silently by without speaking out. What I want to know is: What are these statements based on?"

Since 1982 our tobacco allotments have been cut 31 percent (two 10 percent cuts, one 5 percent, and one 6 percent cut), and the average support price for tobacco has been dropped from \$178.10 to \$148.80 per hundred. In addition to this, in 1985 we had an extra 4 cents per pound taken out of the "no-net-cost" program concerning the grading of tobacco. How would this affect the farmer? A farmer having a 13,000 pound tobacco allotment in 1982 received \$23,153 for his tobacco; in 1986 the 13,000 pound allotment has been reduced to 8,970 pounds and the farmer could expect to receive approximately \$12,988. This results in a \$10,164 direct drop in income.

In 1982 I sold milk for an average of \$13.98 per hundred. In April 1986 base milk sold for \$11.94 per hundred, and the surplus milk sold for \$10.83 per hundred. An additional 50 cents per hundred is taken out to help fund the dairy buyout program. This results in a \$2.96 per hundred decrease in milk prices. If a farmer was milking 40 cows and averaging 15,000 pounds per cow, this would mean a \$17,840 cents decrease in income. Based on my actual farm records, our farm expenses have increased 13.5 percent over this time period, 1981 to 1985.

With facts like these crimped with the few dry cows, it is easy to see why farmers are experiencing difficult times.

I'm not familiar with the beef, grain, hog and poultry businesses, but from what I have heard, these farmers are in about the same situation.

Farmers are being dealt with by agricultural leaders who have the attitude that farmers have brought too much high priced farmland on credit, that a big percent of our farmers are bad managers and are too deeply in debt, and that by 1987 they will be waded out through bankruptcy and foreclosure, thus creating a better situation for surviving farmers.

I firmly disagree with this approach to the farm crisis. How about the group of southern farmers that appeared on TV recently? When the farm crisis began, many of them had their land paid for, owing no one. When they appeared on TV, they were in debt from \$350,000 to \$500,000 each and facing foreclosure.

Farmers are inclined to not give-up easily. They have been borrowing money to cover loss of income to try to hang on until the farm economy makes a change for the better.

I realize we had a surplus of

milk and tobacco and something needed to be done to curb this. It hurts me when I hear farmers being criticized unnecessarily for lack of management ability to run their farm.

It would be really encouraging for me to get these facts together and to realize that as we farmers aren't doing too bad a job after all, considering what we have to deal with at the present time. Once we understand fully why farmers are facing a crisis, it is easier for us to start a plan of action such as: cutting expenses, looking for extra off-farm income and re-evaluating our priorities that we may overcome the present farm crisis.

ACP sign-up deadline is July 15th

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second 1986 ACP sign-up period is being June 1 through July 15, according to Benton Bullock, chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Committee.

Bullock stated that practices available to the farmers of this county include seedlings, water conservation, and forestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices available for this period is available in the county office.

Seeding practices, both new seedlings and renovations must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharing.

Bullock further stated that since Rockcastle County is under new variable cost-sharing method, all requests will be evaluated at the end of the sign-up period and only those practices which obtain the most conservation such as the saving of soil will be as high as 75 percent of the actual cost of the practice under this new variable cost-sharing method.

All requests must be filed and approved by the ASCS Committee prior to the start of work pertaining to the practice.

Participants receiving approvals of ACP 245's are urged to carefully read the ACP 245 request form and to do the work contained therein. Special attention should be given to the extent approved block of the approved ACP-245 as this could differ from the extent requested.

Bullock urges Rockcastle County farmers interested in applying for ACP cost-sharing practices to bring their soil samples to the county agent's office as soon as possible. A soil sample must be turned in to the county agent's office before signing up for a cost-share practice.

Stage Coach Stop - A Part of the Past Still in the Future

The Historical Society presented three awards to students in the Challenge class for essays on Rockcastle County history.

The top three place essays were by: Jennifer Clark, first; Cindy Gregory, second, and Mike Linville, third.

The first place essay is reprinted below:

Stage coach travel is a subject that is seldom mentioned or even thought about anymore, with our modern ways of transportation, but back in the 1700's and early 1800's, stage coaches provided the best transportation for passengers and mail between American cities. One of the main stage coach routes (and probably the first) in Kentucky went through the edge of what is now called Rockcastle County.

The "Old State Road," which was part of the first major road through Kentucky, doesn't seem very important anymore; as a matter of fact, it's considered a secondary road, but back in the 1700's and 1800's it was part of the main route for travel from north to south. This road began north in Cincinnati, Ohio and ran south to Cumberland Gap, Tennessee. It came through Big Hill in Jackson County, through the southeastern edge of Rockcastle County and crossed the Rockcastle River at Cross's Ferry. The road goes through Lone Oak, and runs directly in front of the house that was once a stage coach stop. The property was originally owned by Stevens and Gilbert. According to Mr. Wally Phillips, who is present owner, they may have owned as much as 6,000 acres of land. They later sold (or maybe traded) the land to a man called "Devil" Bill Adams. He owned around seventy-five slaves to help him work the land. These slaves lived in a place called "Sugar Camp," which was on "Devil" Bill's property. He sold or traded some of these slaves, even the children. It sounds like his name fit him well! Later on, Jim Tom (J.T.) Ballard gained ownership by making an expensive purchase or a fine trade on "Devil" Bill's part for I'm sure a man of Adam's kind wouldn't settle for anything ordinary.

J.T., as he was commonly called, made and sold whiskey about every two weeks. This route ran between the old Seventh Street Coach House in Indianapolis, Indiana and Cumberland Gap, Tennessee. In Indianapolis, Indiana, there is an old stage coach on display that is said to have traveled this route.

Mr. Phillips hopes that someday his home in Lone Oak will be designated as a historical landmark, and it should be, since it is one of the very few stage coach stops in the world today, that is still intact.

This is part of my interview with Mr. Phillips:

Jennifer: About what year was it built?
Mr. Phillips: Oh, I'd say it was built around 1805. It's about 180 years old. It's the oldest house in existence in Rockcastle County.

Jennifer: How many rooms were in the original structure?
Mr. Phillips: Seven.

Jennifer: Tell me a little bit about the original structure.
Mr. Phillips: It had very long fireplaces; about 8 feet long. One of the chimneys was the date 1808 on it. The house was built out of

tornated materials, in what was then Virginia.

Jennifer: Who were some of the previous owners?
Mr. Phillips: The original owners were Stevens and Gilbert. They later sold or traded it to "Devil" Bill Adams. This man owned about seventy-five slaves, Jim (J.T.) Ballard was the next owner. He is the one that the Phillips' bought it from. We bought it about sixty years ago.

Jennifer: How much were the passengers charged for spending the night, including care for the animals?
Mr. Phillips: Oh... just about \$1.00. You know tax bills back then were just around \$18.00.

Jennifer: Could you tell me some stories that have been passed down to you about the house and property?
Mr. Phillips: Well, once at a ballroom dance a lady and a man were dancing in the back room by themselves. The lady's boyfriend saw them through one of the windows from outside and got real mad. He came inside and started a fight. One of the men was killed in the kitchen.

here (legally). Since women and children were often guests at the tavern, alcoholic drinks were not sold there, but across the road in a saloon, which was built of logs. This structure was later moved to the Saltpetre Cave area for display by the late John Lair, a very prominent person in Rockcastle County. Regrettably, it was destroyed by a fire few years ago.

The Phillips' bought part of the property about sixty-seven years ago, including the log structure that was used for a stage coach stop. The log structure has been covered with more modern materials, but according to Mr. Phillips, there was a large open space going through the middle part of the house, through which the stage coach pulled to load and unload passengers on either side. Above this sheltered drive were guest rooms for the passengers. The huge logs that the original house was constructed of can only be seen up the stairwells; the rest of them have been covered with paneling on the inside and prime siding on the outside. The long beams going across the ceiling, which are hand sewn, came from Virginia. The house had (and still does) have two very large fireplaces with chimneys constructed out of sand stone; one at each end of the house. One of the fireplaces has the date 1808 carved in it. The log stage coach stop was actually built in Virginia. That area didn't become part of Kentucky until 1810.

A cedar bugle hung by one of the front doors to announce that the stage was approaching or that the meals were being served.

Stage coach passengers weren't the only guests; many people riding through on horseback also took lodging and meals here. There were facilities on the property for repairing wheels, horse shoeing, etc. Even men taking their herds of cattle through to market, would sometimes stop for a night's rest. There were facilities on the property for feeding and caring for the animals.

One very famous person stopped here for a rest on one of his travels during the Civil War. It was Ulysses S. Grant. Mr. Phillips' grandfather, John Rose, fed and watered his horse during the stop.

A stage coach came through

Fishing report

Fishing activity fell to the moderate level across Kentucky, with summertime angling conditions beginning to prevail as temperatures rose into the high 70s and low 80s. The lake-by-lake roundup, as reported by creel clerks and conservation officers at each lake:

WEST: Watch for white bass in the jumps and black bass along shoreline cover. Flippin' in the buck brush at Barkley has produced some good catches of largemouth bass. Catfish are spawning off rocky banks and rip-rap.
KENTUCKY: Clear to murky, rising slowly, almost at summer pool and 79 degrees.

BARKLEY: Clear, stable, at

summer pool, 74 degrees.

WEST CENTRAL: Large-mouth bass and bluegill were the top two fish, with a few crappie reported from Rough River Lake. Plastic worms and crankbaits were producing bass, while bluegill were being taken on worms fished off the steeper banks and points.

BARREN: Clear to murky, rising, two feet below summer pool, 83 degrees.
NOLIN: Clear, stable at one foot above summer pool and 78 degrees.

Your Child's Health

Mothers through the ages have encouraged their young'uns to eat their vegetables. Special urging has always been required to get them to eat spinach, broccoli and other leafy things. Now, a study has been reported from England which implies that eating vegetables may help prevent appendicitis.

Various areas of the country were studied for rates of appendicitis and the same areas were studied for amounts of non-potato vegetables consumed. It was

found that the areas where the largest amounts of veggies were consumed had the lowest rates of appendicitis.

Since appendicitis is a diagnosis that is only confirmed at surgery and there is usually little doubt about who has it or doesn't have it, and since attack rates varied in different parts of England by threefold, the findings seem fairly convincing. Of course, other factors could have come into play, but generally it seems that eating lots of green vegetables and other high fiber items may indeed help protect against appendicitis.

Of course, high fiber diets are suggested for the possible prevention of colon cancer and other illnesses as well. Therefore, it does seem like a good idea to try and eat more fiber. This is much easier in the summertime when we have all sorts of leafy things from the garden. Now, if you could just get Junior to agree to try some...he might like it!

evdrops only to find the drops on your nose and cheeks but not in your eyes? Quinine drops and ointments can be tricky to use, but with a few tips, getting their full benefit can be made much easier.

1. Wash hands thoroughly.
2. Pull down lower eyelid.
3. Hold the container just above the nose end of the eye while looking up, and squeeze gently so that the drop falls inside the lower lid. If you flinch, try laying the neck of the dropper bottle across the bridge of the nose so that the tip of the dropper is just above the eye and the drop cannot be seen as it falls in.

After application release the lower lid and try to keep the eye open for at least 30 seconds. This allows greater distribution of the drug.

If using an ointment, look up and squeeze one-fourth to one-half inch inside the lower lid. After application gently close eye and roll the eyeball in all directions. Don't squeeze the eye shut too tightly. You may have blurred vision momentarily, but it should clear up.

4. Keep the tip of the dropper or the tube from touching any surface and replace the cap as soon as possible.

5. Check the expiration date on the container regularly and do not use discolored drops or ointments with precipitate present.

If you have any questions about using eye preparations, ask your doctor or pharmacist.

Is It Enough Just To Be Religious?

Is it possible to be religious, but still be wrong? With some people, religion seems to be nothing more than a way to save their consciences. Try to convince them there is something lacking in their life and they will tell you, "I'm a member of a church. Why don't you convert a sinner?" But is it possible to be religious and still be a sinner?

The Bible is filled with accounts of religious people who were not pleasing to God. The Athenians were very religious, but their religion consisted of worshipping idols. Paul taught them to respect and worship the true God (Acts 17:22-23, 30). Was their religion good enough?

Jews of the first century had a zeal for God, but not according to knowledge. As a result, Paul said they needed to submit to God's will and they needed to be saved (Rom. 10:1-3). In fact Paul himself, before his conversion, was a very zealous Jew doing what he sincerely thought he ought to do (Acts 26: 9, 21). But he was persecuting Jesus. He later said he had been the "chief of sinners" (I Tim. 1:15). Was his

religion good enough? Cornelius and Apollas are other good examples. Cornelius was a good moral man who prayed to God and helped the needy (Acts 10 1-2). Acts 18:24 says that Apollas was an eloquent preacher. But neither of these men knew God's will and in particular they did not understand true baptism. So they needed to hear words whereby they might be saved (Acts 11:14; 18:25-26). Surely their religion was not good enough!

Yes, all men need to be religious. But much that is called religion today is FALSE religion. You need more than just religion; you need the TRUTH in religion! Jesus said, "and ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free" (John 8:32). Our attitude should be to want the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth. "Buy the truth and sell it not" (Prov. 23:23).

Types of produce to be sold include all fruits and vegetables; honey, cider and sorghum (labels required with them; when, who, and where produced); bedding, potted plants and cut flowers, all subject to five percent sales tax which will be the responsibility of the seller.

There will be no live animals, fresh meat, fish, poultry, eggs, milk, milk products or canned goods sold.

No loud or electronic outcry-ing devices will be allowed.

Remember quality and freshness are the two major benefits of a Farmers Market, officials said. All produce must be kept off the ground. It is advisable to display grades of goods.

Growers are encouraged to sell items by bunch, e.g. dozen, bushels or peck. If selling weight, scales must be furnished by the growers and be in compliance with the Kentucky Department of Agriculture Weight and Measure Division. No bathroom, kitchen, or fishing scales can be used.

Sacks or appropriate containers must be supplied by the grower for consumer goods. Any seller not in compliance with regulations will be given: first a warning; second, a \$5 fine, and third, asked to vacate the premises. The Market Manager will have the final authority.

office would be available for advice and direction whatever the court decides. He estimated a study would cost between \$4,000 and \$5,000.

Prior to Stevens discussion, State Rep. Danny Ford told the council the county needs to improve its jail facilities.

"A jail is important to us," Ford said. "We ought to see what needs to be done, if money is available, and determine what meets our needs best. Then we can proceed to meet the standards set by the state. If we do the job right, it can be profitable. If not, it could be detrimental to us." During the following discussion, the Cabinet representative said no grant money is available for construction, but there was some low interest money (5 percent) available.

The court listened but did not act on the jail suggestions, leaving it to a future meeting. Several bids were opened and accepted by the court. Mt. Vernon Products will sell the county culverts - DeBorde Oil Co. will furnish gasoline. Vulcan of Chattanooga, Tenn. was the only bidder for asphalt, and Kentucky Stone Co. will furnish rock for county roads.

The court accepted a bid of \$22,900 from Kay and Kay Contractors, London, to build a new 12-circuit bridge. Money, \$22,000, comes from the emergency fund of the County Aid Cooperative Agreement and the remainder from the county.

The county has a new dog warden. He is Glyn Bullock of Orlando, who replaces Danny Bullock who resigned "due to other interests."

The court hired John L. Levers as a truck driver at \$4 an hour and agreed to allow Sheriff Clarence Hasty to obtain surplus property from Frankfort.

company agreed to continue the rail line two years ago.

Trains now make only two runs a day along the route and can only use it for boxcar freight and coal cars, and coal sales are down.

Piggyback cars cannot be used on the railroad because of tunnels.

The only use for the railroad in this county is by Mt. Vernon Plastics in the Rockcastle Industrial Park.

Approval to abandon the line would take at least three months because of legal requirements such as advertising.

There could be some disappointment if the railroad announces its intention to abandon the line.

Mt. Vernon recently purchased property on east Main Street for a new fire station because of the possibility a fire on the south side of the railroad could prevent fire trucks from crossing, if a train were on the track.

Also, an expensive rail spur was completed about two years ago to service Mt. Vernon Plastics. If there is to be no railroad, no bridge would have to be constructed on the Ky. 461 bypass near the U.S. 150 intersection. The space could be filled.

At the council meeting, the council was told a suit against the city and city policeman Bill Lawrence has been refiled by Attorney Roger M. Oliver of Berea on behalf of Gary Shepherd of Brindle Ridge who was arrested Aug. 10, 1985 at the Broadhead Fairgrounds on a drunk and public charge. A jury later found Shepherd not guilty.

Shepherd claimed he was

arrested "wrongfully...unlawfully and without probable cause" and asks for "in excess of \$2,500."

The same suit was dismissed earlier because it was filed before the drunk charge was resolved in court.

The council turned further legal action over to City Attorney Jerry Cox.

The council voted to hire Glen Ellison to re-roof the city hall building at a cost of \$1,290.

It accepted a \$500 bid from Wilport Television for a franchise to operate cable television in Broadhead.

The council decided to seek advice from the Commonwealth Attorney before deciding whether to prosecute a local man for turning in a false fire alarm that sent Broadhead firemen to Mareburg.

A telephone tap was approved by the court, then Continental Telephone traced the call to the man's telephone.
