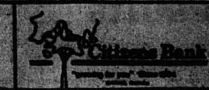

Approximately ten days later, the farmer receives a computer print-out showing how his herd is doing in several areas. One of the first things farmers look at is how much did each cow produce and the computer's projection for her total lactation. Is this production up or down from last month. Has she peaked out and, if so, how high. The second most looked at section may be the somatic cell count which is an indication that mastitis may exist. When individuals show high cell counts, this information may help the producer decide on treatment or culling. By monitoring this from month to month, he can see how his management is successful in lowering somatic cell counts.

Other information relates to the reproductive status of the herd. For instance, what percent of cows do not return to heat after breeding. How many days are cows open before breeding. How many services were required to settle each specific cow. When will each cow calve, number of cows to freshen each month, and when should each cow be dried off.

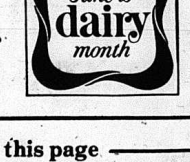

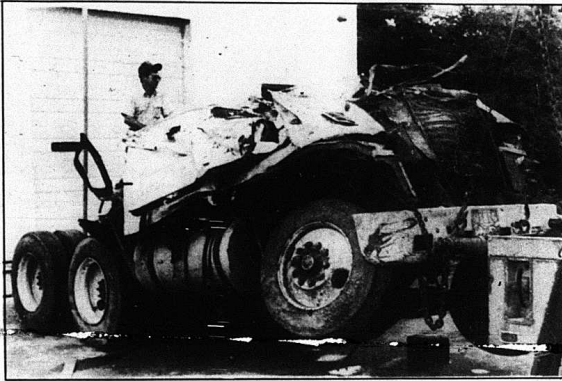
Briefly . . .

We're not alone

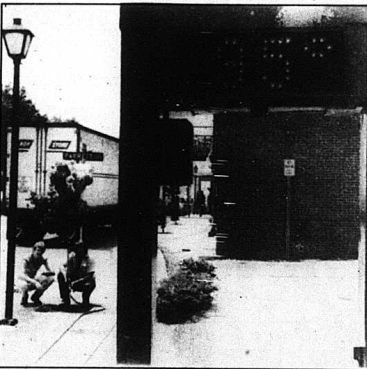

County garbage plan ready by next week, local officials hope

County residents should know by the end of the month what to expect from a countywide garbage plan now being reviewed by the Kentucky Department of Waste Management.

Tim Schwendeman, division specialist for the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), said Monday the state has indicated it "hopes" to have the plan tentatively available for review by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and the public.

The public has 30 days to examine the plan before final approval by the court. If a large number of residents present complaints about the proposed plan, a public hearing will be held. That decision would be up to the state.

Following final approval, the court will have the primary responsibility to put the plan into effect.

First, the county will hire a garbage coordinator who will have the job of overseeing the program, a job that is mandated by the state.

The court will then advertise for bids for operating the collection system which includes individual household pick-up and subsequent disposal of garbage at a landfill probably outside the county.

Only a few details of the program have been reported, other than it is volunteer participation by the public at least for a trial period of perhaps one or two years. If during that time, the

Former Rockcastle lawyer, Edwin R. Denney, 82, dies

Edwin R. Denney of Lexington, a former Rockcastle Circuit Judge, state representative and United States Attorney, died unexpectedly Sunday of a heart attack. He was 82.

Friends said Attorney Denney walked to his office over a mile away and was returning home when he was stricken. He died a short time later in St. Joseph Hospital.

In recent years, Denney was affiliated with the Lexington law firm of Denney, Morgan and Rafter, and made frequent trips to Mt. Vernon - one trip only a few days ago.

Denney came to Mt. Vernon in 1932 after he graduated from the University of Kentucky Law School where he became associated with Attorney Casper Williams.

A native of Wayne County where his mother was superintendent of schools, he attended Cumberland College and Eastern Kentucky University. He taught school and was principal for a time in Letcher and Ohio counties.

He served as state representative from Rockcastle County in the 1940s, where he was chosen House Minority leader. He was

later appointed Circuit Judge of the 28th Judicial District of Rockcastle, Pulaski, Clinton and Wayne counties succeeding John Sherman Cooper who was elected to the U.S. Senate.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower appointed Denney U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Kentucky in 1953 and Denney moved to Lexington with his family. He resigned in 1955 to run for governor against former Gov. Albert B. "Hoppy" Chandler who won in a landslide, at that time, the largest majority ever received

Looking for a salamander-

Local painter stresses wildlife

John Agnew is hoping it will rain soon. Not to save his crop. Not to revive his brown lawn. And not even to cool the temperature. He is hoping to see a salamander, the subject of a series he is currently painting in his hillside studio near Lamer.

One painting, that of the vivid orange salamander and fossils, moss and pine needles lies finished and propped against a studio wall while another painting, similar in natural background, stands at Agnew's work place waiting for a rain and a salamander.

Not many people in Rockcastle County have ever heard of John Agnew, but people in "far away" places know him and respect his talent. His name is equal to a "household word" in places like the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History where 17 of

Agnew's murals are on display, the Cincinnati Zoo where he was commissioned to paint a series of murals for the new Cat House, there and to do a poster for the zoo, and the Philadelphia Academy of Natural Sciences for which he recently painted dinosaur murals.

At 34 years of age, artist/naturalist Agnew is able, not only to merit coveted commissions to do specific art work, but his acrylic canvases sell for an average price of \$2,500. His most recent sale was for \$4,000. Sales are generated from shows in galleries and museums and, as he says, by "word of mouth." Several collectors of his art live in Cincinnati.

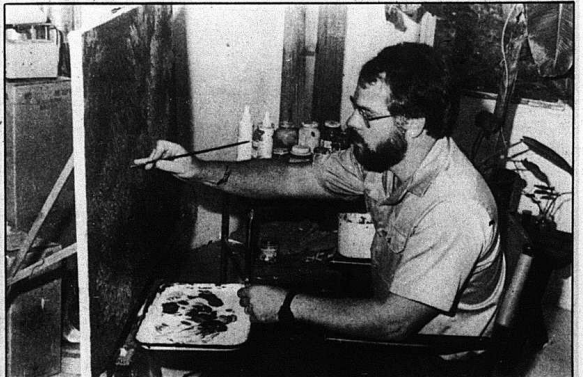
Neighbor, friend, and noted artist in her own right, Sandy Speagle says that Agnew's zoo and museum murals have set a standard of excellence among artists-naturalists. According to her, Agnew's and one other

artist's works are now sent as examples of the best to museum and zoo boards around the country.

A native of Dayton, Ohio Agnew was born into a family of artists. His father is a professional photographer and his mother (who helped him work on the Cat House project at the zoo) is an artist. It seems important to point this out because the best way to describe Agnew's paintings is to say they look like photographs.

He pays close attention to detail and his representations are literal. As he puts it, they are "scientifically accurate." When he did the dinosaur murals, for example, he studied closely the skeletal structure of the dinosaur and consulted paleontologists. Science and art merge.

Some of his canvases look at a glance as if they might be a picture

I would like to write a letter in response to Sonya Bullock's historical essay about the community of Quail that appeared in the May 1, 1986 edition of the Mt. Vernon Signal. Though the essay shows fine research and effort, some of the information in the article is not accurate. I am eighty-one (81) years old and I grew up in Quail.

The grist mill that was described in the article could not have been originally located at Charlie Hasty's farm as there was no stream there to power the mill. However, my uncle, Ben Albright, owned a grist mill in Quail for a time. It sat approximately where Rt. 70 passes through near the house and school. He was badly burned in an accident at the mill and I do not believe it was operated after that.

The store and post office were owned and run by John and Emma Proctor. They were located on the corner opposite the house that I believe is owned today by the Whitaker family. The next owners of the store were Dallas and Marie Dillingham. They later built a new store across the road from the house. I am not sure who the "Giffrets" family mentioned in the article points out that the Providence Church was built in 1924. Though I do not know when it was actually built, I do know it was there long before 1924. My mother died in November, 1910, and her funeral was held at the Providence Church.

Our teachers during the time I was in school were Dave Gearty, Fred Adams, Somerset, Pearl Mink, Exie Eastham, Burdette Owens and Clude Watson. They may have been others that I have forgotten over the years.

Before moving out of the state in 1923, I had taken many pictures of Quail. After reading the essay about Quail, I got out my picture album. There are many stories about Quail, and it is nice to look at these pictures that positively prove its history!

relieve part of this burden for some Kentucky companies through lightning coverage requirements, but this is only a band-aid approach. It is going to take some strong-minded Federal controls to slow down and make the American insurance industry more service-conscious.

Also, the Kentucky homeowner is finding it more and more impossible to afford the most modest coverage against damage, injury and illness.

Much is said these days about the need to attack unemployment through the development of new jobs and the protection of those which now exist. However, business in America will soon be unable to expand, perhaps even survive, should insurance continue its disappearing act, or grow too expensive, while liability judgments roll up unchecked.

This nation's farmers, already burdened by the agricultural crisis, cannot stand the added burden of growing liability costs as part of the price they must pay to stay on their land.

I urge you to use your good offices to work to identify the causes of our national liability insurance crisis and bring about remedies in all possible haste.

Area pork producers urged to participate in national elections

Rockcastle County's pork producers have the opportunity to participate in a U.S. Department of Agriculture sponsored statewide election, July 7-11, to help select individuals for appointment to an industry-wide body that will administer a promotion, research and consumer information order for pork.

All pork producers in Kentucky are encouraged to vote in the elections. Candidates receiving the highest number of votes in each state will be eligible for appointment by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to the state's allotted positions on the National Pork Producers Delegate Body.

The Delegate Body, consisting of approximately 165 producers, including two or more members representing each of the 50 states and four importers, will be responsible for administering all aspects of the pork order.

Voting will take place at the Extension Office (new location - on Richmond Street). The office will be open for voting each day from 8:12 and 1-4:30. Pork producers can vote in any county in their home state after signing a voter registration list certifying that they are pork producers in that state. Pork producers are urged to vote in person at the county extension office. If that is not possible, an absentee voting packet, containing a ballot and registration form may be obtained from Jim Epstein, National Pork Producers Election, P.O. Box 23762, Washington, D.C. 20026-3762; telephone (202) 475-5407. Absentee ballots must be postmarked by July 11 and received at the above address no later than July 18.

Votes will be tallied at 9 a.m. on July 15 at the local county office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The public is invited to be present at this official counting and the results will be forwarded to the secretary for consideration.

Drying is Good Alternative for Preserving Garden Produce

Canning and freezing are the most popular food preservation methods, but don't overlook drying.

Drying, one of the oldest preservation methods, is a convenient way to preserve foods. Dehydration methods include using either the sun, an oven or an electric dehydrator. If you are drying herbs you can use a microwave oven.

Using the sun is the cheapest method, but the high humidity in Kentucky hinders the drying process. If you're drying outside, dry in quantities that can be covered well and taken inside at night.

Just about any vegetable can be dried either in the oven or in a dehydrator. Select high-quality vegetables for best results. Wash the vegetables, then blanch or dip them in boiling water to stop enzyme activity. Most vegetables require three to five hours drying time.

When drying fruits, select those that are newly ripened for better quality when dried. Do not use underripe produce. Just as for freezing and canning, the fruits need to be at their best for eating.

Prepare only as much as you can dry at one time. Wash fruit in cold running water to remove dirt and insects. Trim away bruises or soft spots. Remove stems, cores and pits. Remove inedible skins such as those on bananas and pineapples since the skin on these fruits becomes tough or brittle when dried.

Slice fruits uniformly, about one-fourth to one-half inch thick for even drying. Leave grapes, berries and plums whole.

After several hours, vegetables and fruits should be leathery or brittle. Leathery ones will be pliable and will spring back if

folded. Edges will be sharp. Brittle ones will shatter when hit. If you are preparing a large amount of fruit that browns, apples and bananas for example, place in a holding solution of one

tablespoon crystalline ascorbic acid to one quart water, or use a commercial antioxidant such as Fruit Fresh or ACM. Do not leave the fruit in the solution longer than one hour.

Some people put sulfur or sulfite on fruits before drying to prevent the browning process. Both have disadvantages.

Sulfur treatments are expensive and produce irritating fumes. Sulfite dips eliminate browning but result in greater nutrient loss. They also adversely affect certain asthmatics. For more information call the County Extension Office at 256-2403 for HE 3-504 Home Drying of Fruits and Vegetables.

Final reporting date for crops

The final reporting date for Corn, Soybeans and Grain Sorghum is July 15, 1986.

ASCS encourages all produc-

ers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a time crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a zero report of acreage in order to have an established history file.

Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties.

In 1987 the farm program is expected to be a farm acreage

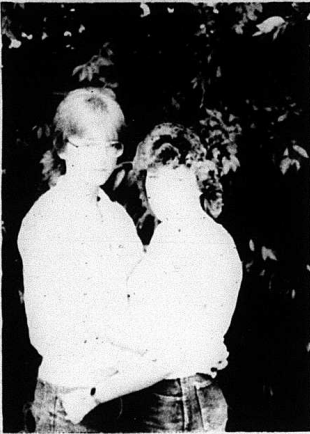

History of Rockcastle County

Rockcastle County: Then and Now

Rockcastle County was the only county in the Commonwealth of Kentucky that is in the Congressional District. The slogan, "At the edge of the Bluegrass and at the foothills of the Cumberland" gives a descriptive location for the county, which is the southeastern part of Kentucky.

Rockcastle was settled in 1810. It had a population of 1,721 people. In three years the population had grown to 3,300. The first

white man ever to see Rockcastle was Dr. Thomas Walker, in 1750. The county was named after the river and the river was named by a man with the party of Dr. Thomas Walker. The story says that he was drifting down the river one cold winter morning, and he saw the rock in all its beauty. It is reported that he said it looked like a castle made of rock, therefore naming it the name "Rockcastle."

Brown's Trail or Brown's Lane (better known as the Wilderness Trail) came through Rockcastle on the "Buffalo Blazed Trail" up to Ohio. Daniel Boone and his party followed the trail along the Rockcastle River up to a point. Those Brown's group split into two parties. One party went toward the area which is now Brodhead, the other party went toward the area which is now Liberty. This group went on to found Kentucky's first settlement at Brownsville in Madison County.

Lanford Station was the first settlement in Rockcastle. Lanford Station was a stopover for stagecoaches and travelers. Today, most people could probably locate Lanford Station as Mt. Vernon, but Mr. Vernon has had many different names, such as "Spout Springs" for the two springs which spouted out water practically around and "White Rock" for the limestone that used to make up its streets. Mr. Vernon has also been called "The Mount" after a great "mount" which used to stand in the middle of town and "Mt. Vernon" (one month after the home of the first president of the United States, upon its present calling of Mount Vernon).

A Lanford family owned and operated Lanford Station for many years until 1797. There is a story saying that the lower part of Lanford Station (the place where they kept and transported slaves - the collar is still intact but filled in. It is supposedly somewhere near the present day courthouse. But that is not a story of which there is thus far no proof.

Mount Vernon was established in 1818 and contained a population of about 200 residents. Mr. Vernon's growth was insured when it was named the county seat. It used to have a skating rink with a wooden floor on which people would skate under lantern light. In the late 1800's and early 1900's, there was a girl's school operated by a church located on what is now Richmond Street, near the center of town.

Most of the early settlements of Rockcastle had interesting names or ways in which they received their names. For example, Wabed Community was named after a Mister W.A.B. Davis for reasons, most people don't know. Brodhead was named for a man named Brodhead working for a railroad that went through that part of the county. Saltpetre Cave used to be called the "Big Cave." It was found to have large deposits of saltpetre which were used during the Civil War. At one time some sixty to seventy people worked in the cave.

Another early important settlement of Rockcastle was Livingston. Livingston was a railroad town which grew and prospered with the railroads. In about 1870, Livingston was one of the largest settlements in Rockcastle, having six hotels. But as with a railroad town, Livingston's downfall was one with the railroads. When the railroad business decreased, Livingston stopped growing. Today, its population is smaller than it

was in earlier days. Livingston still has a large limestone deposit and business. Coal mining is another industry in Livingston. In the late 1800's and early 1900's, many young men as young as seven or eight, work in "dog hole" (very small high digging coal for long hours and little pay).

Most of the land in Rockcastle County is referenced as "being on the waters of..." The county has many creeks with "Negro" Creek being the headwaters of the Dix, River and Roundstone Creek joining the Rockcastle River at Livingston. The Rockcastle River flows by Laurel County on to Pulaski County and ultimately into Lake Cumberland. Skaggs Creek empties into the Rockcastle River. Brush Creek flows near Saltpetre Cave. Brush Creek is another large creek like Roundstone Creek that gives its name to the nearby community. In addition, there are Eagle Creek, Crooked Creek, Clear Creek and others.

the mayor and city council form of government. Mt. Vernon is the county seat, and this is where the county's official records are housed. Each of these areas contains one of the four county grade schools. Mt. Vernon also has the one high school, Rockcastle County High School. There have been changes in the educational system of early years. At one time there were numerous one-room school houses throughout the county. Mt. Vernon had its own independent school district. Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston, each had its high school. The competition, particularly in basketball, was quite intense among the schools. Now, the schools are in one district with large, centralized schools and the one county-wide high school. In addition, an area vocational school has been built near the high school.

There are numerous communities throughout the county, such as White, Brush Creek, Dispansana Scaffold Lane, Lamer. Each may have its own post office and a general store. Community reporters keep informed as to what has happened in the area and supply the information to the one local newspaper, "The Mount Vernon Signal."

Today's Rockcastle

Rockcastle, presently has four major population areas: Mt. Vernon, Brodhead, Livingston, and Roundstone with Mt. Vernon being the largest. All but Roundstone are incorporated towns with

tural time. However, new industries have recently come to the county with the development of its industrial park, including a seed factory and a plastics factory. That 1970 report stated the per capita income for 1968 in the county totaled \$1,126.00 which was far below the statewide average. Rockcastle has several good available resources for growth. The industrial resources study conducted in 1970, stated that some of the reasons Rockcastle County has such good potential are: good transportation in the area with railroads serving the area, trucking lines, two major highways running through airports in nearby cities, bus services, an taxi cab services; tourism; good electronic service with Kentucky Utilities and the Jackson County RECC, and a tremendous availability to water. Rockcastle County is in two hours' driving time from major population areas such as Louisville, Cincinnati, and Knoxville. With U.S. Interstate 75 running through its center, Rockcastle County is on the direct route between Detroit and Atlanta. However, some people feel that Rockcastle's accessibility to other areas such as London, Somerset, Berea, Richmond, and Lexington, actually hurt county growth. These larger areas draw from the county without returning as much as they have taken. The majority of the tourism money in Rockcastle County comes from Ohio, Indiana, Michigan and Canada. A few years ago, there was a committee selected to make a "Recreation potential appraisal" which was, unfortunately, undated. The committee was composed of county residents interested in the conservation and well-being of the county. The appraisal listed several items as important factors in the recreational growth of the county. The general favorable climate of the area was stressed. In addition, it mentioned the scenic areas of the county, historic areas, good soil and water, pointing out that these features were still basically untouched by modernization. There were twelve types of picnic and field sports areas, fishing waters, golf courses, hunting areas, natural scenic-historical sites, riding stables, shooting preserves, vacation farms, water sports, and winter sports. One of the extras that came with the appraisal was an inventory of the natural, scenic and historical places in the county with an explanation of each. The appraisal listed sixty of these areas known to be in Rockcastle. Studies such as the recreational and industrial surveys are important as they help for future planning. Mr. Vernon has recently had a study on how to upgrade its business district on Main Street, utilizing grant money. The new street lights and improved sidewalks are a part of the improvements resulting from such a study.

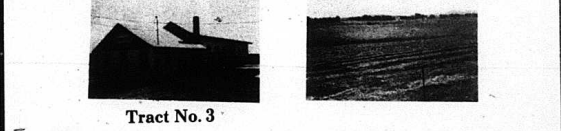

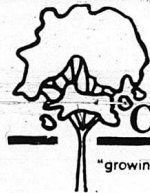

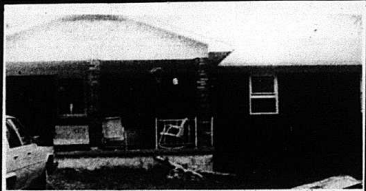

Your Child's Health

With the coming of summer and walks in the woods comes the problem of what to do about tick bites.

Everyone seems to have heard about Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, a serious tick borne illness which actually occurs more often in the Southeastern part of the country than in the Rockies. Fortunately, it is uncommon and the risk of getting it is fairly small. However, if your child should get really sick, with high fever and weakness etc. a few days after a tick bite you should see a doctor.

The sooner a tick can be removed the less likely it will cause disease if it is infected. Finally someone has done a study of the best way to remove ticks. They compared the common methods of removal: Petroleum jelly, fingernail polish remover, alcohol, heat, and removal by fingernails or tweezers.

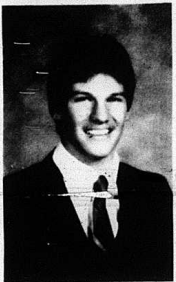
The best method by far turned out to be removal by tweezers or fingers protected with plastic or a handkerchief. The tick should be pulled straight out by grasping the tick as close to the skin as possible and applying steady pressure. Disinfect the wound before and after removal. Do not delay removal in the field if you don't have disinfectant. Other methods may actually be harmful. Heating may cause the tick to "throw up" more infected material into the wound and may cause burns to the patient. Fingernail polish may coat the tick so it can't move and release its grip.

There are two types of ticks, hard and soft. The hard ones (scorpions) are more important. They are harder to remove and more often encountered and carry disease more often. Ticks are second only to mosquitoes on a world wide scale as arthropod carriers of disease. Fortunately most of the serious illnesses do not occur around here except Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, which is not common. Always check your children and yourself after a trip in the woods of fields.

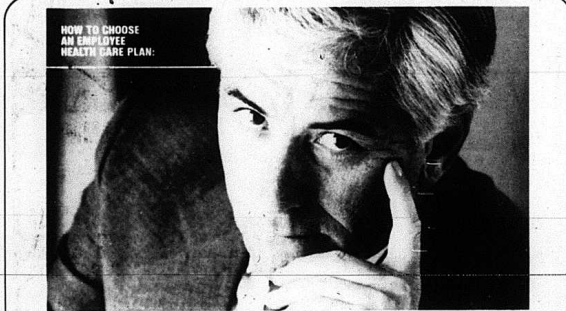

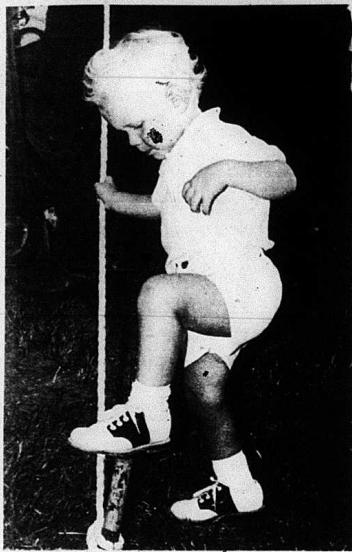

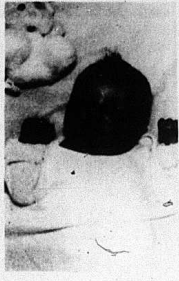

of a subject of nature close at hand, yet taken with a telephoto lens. Others look like a photograph-perfect landscape. One of the paintings in his home which attracts immediate attention is that of the Rockcastle River. The beauty and realistic quality of the painting is remarkable.

Agnew hopes that he will be able to have time to do some more scenes of Rockcastle County. So far during the three years he and his wife, Pat have lived in their rented house near Louisville, he has been busy with the Cincinnati Zoo project and a similar project at the St. Louis Zoo.

The first project the Agnews had to complete here after arriving and purchasing 35 acres from Sandy Speagle and her husband

Jerry, was to build his studio, a woods-secluded, snake-looking habitat well suited to a naturalist who has a box constrictor as a pet.

The modest, soft-spoken artist believes in living in complete harmony with nature and with one's surroundings and even though he said he has a "healthy respect" for venomous snakes, he couldn't see himself ever killing one. Reptiles are one of Agnew's favorite subjects for study and canvas.

The studio sits among shading trees and bushes up a winding path over which all supplies for building had to be carried. None of the businessmen here, but there is an abundance of birds in this natural setting. The building was designed for a maximum of natural light inside and a minimum of obtrusiveness outside. The rough pebbled siding is stained a natural wood color and decorating the side-deck are interesting

rocks picked up in the area. The artist admits most people would have built their house first, but for the Agnews, the house will come later.

John Agnew met his wife, Pat, while they were both working in a museum in Cincinnati. She has a degree in the sciences from Thomas More College in Covington. Pat is currently employed by Christian Appalachian Project helping adults get GED certificates.

Before coming to Rockcastle County, Agnew graduated from the University of Cincinnati with a degree in the fine arts and a major in painting and sculpture in the sciences. He had intended to do museum work. For a while he worked for three years in West Palm Beach, Florida at the Exhibits Science Museum as curator before retiring to paint.

Agnew was familiar with this area of Kentucky where he had

done some spelunking in caves in this and surrounding counties. Another connection with Rockcastle was his friendship with Jerry Nichols and Sandy. The attraction, however, was the peaceful atmosphere and the abundance of natural beauty. "When I have to go to the city now, I can't sleep. The noise bothers me."

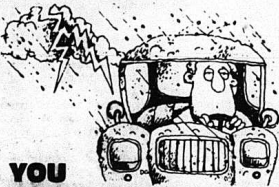

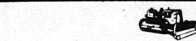
