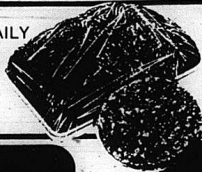

Band director Bob Pybas upset with state salary cut

At least one employee of the Rockcastle County school system is not happy about the fact that his pay has been cut from a year ago.

Local county band director Bob Pybas told board members and Superintendent Charles B. Parsons that he was tired of giving an extra month's time to the school board and not getting paid for it. He said that he was not going to sit idly by while his salary decreased as it had for the past three years.

Pybas presented his case to the board during their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Pybas, who has been teaching band in the Rockcastle County system for more than 20 years told board members that all he wanted was to be treated fairly by the board. "Did you know that I am one of the oldest band directors in the state of Kentucky?" Pybas asked the board. He said that the average turn-out of band directors was 42 and that he was only one of about 10 in the state older than that.

The band director passed out a list to the board members and the Superintendent which showed the time that he spent working with the band, other than the eight

hours a day that he is paid for. According to the log the extra time Pybas put in was 29.3 eight hour days.

Pybas is paid for 17 days extended employment, but he told the board that the 29 days were extra time spent working.

"For more than twenty years now I have given the most productive teaching years of my career to the kids in band, the school system and this county in an effort to build a respectable band program of which we could all be proud of," Pybas said.

The band director said that during most of the twenty years, his classes at the elementary schools have been taught in physical conditions and situations that were adverse to say the least and he said that he never complained.

Pybas continued, "For years now, since consolidation, I have literally raced between the schools daily in order to meet '6' classes of band.

"I've never had a regularly scheduled free period that most teachers expect and have, and I have never complained about that because I had a job to do," he said.

Road fund may be added

Using gasoline tax money for other uses than on county roads could result in a close look by the State Auditor.

Such was indicated this week by Buel Guy, an aide to Kentucky House Speaker Donald Blandford. The speaker has criticized officials of 40 Kentucky counties for budgeting part of their county road funds for salaries and administrative purposes.

A tax increase that raised the tax on gasoline by five cents July 1 increased considerable road funds in all 120 counties.

In Rockcastle, the road fund

jumped from \$286,480 in 1985-86 to an estimated \$423,000 in 1986-87.

In turn, the county budgeted \$74,374 for salaries claiming the officials (County Judge/Executive, Administrative Assistant and treasurer) all do work for the county road department.

"Guy said the counties' plans to use the money differently - disclosed in the budgets of 40 counties - were unexpected and disappointing. If lawmakers had been aware of that possibility when drafting the legislation, Guy

Education grant approved

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said the Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC) has approved a grant of \$50,000 to develop an 18-month education development project to strengthen education and decrease the high school dropout rate in the 5th District.

"This is the second major part of our effort to improve the economy and educational standards of our district," said Rogers.

"The first major element is already successfully in operation - the Southern Kentucky Economic Development Council - which is seeking new and expanded indus-

try on a regional basis. In the future, we will be adding two other parts to our effort, a regional economic tourism, and a leadership training project to develop the new leaders of tomorrow for our region."

Rogers said the ARC funding, which will go to the Mountain Association for Community Economic Development, will help develop such projects as education forums around the district, summer-job promotion, teacher grants, internships, and parental involvement in the schools. The education effort is a direct follow-

Sandy Speagle to paint governor

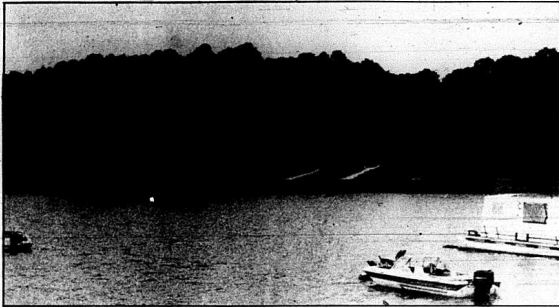
The portrait commissions were initiated by the Office of Historic Properties and the Historic Properties Advisory Com-

mission, a group of private citizens and state officials who oversee state historic sites. A portrait panel made preliminary selections from the 45 painters who entered the competition, then each chief executive made a final choice.

Commissioner Crit Luallen, whose Department of the Arts coordinated the portrait competition, participated in the panel's review of 200 or more color slides, color photographs or paintings submitted by the artists.

Irwin Pickett, visual arts program director, also a selection panel member, said each of the artists will receive a \$4,000 commission through the Finance Cabinet for the portraits. Harriet Fowler, curator of the University of Kentucky Art Museum and a member of the historic properties

Electric line controversy settled

City Council approves line after hassle

Where to put an electric line to serve two houses, and future houses, adjacent to Lake Linville was finally settled by the Mt. Vernon City Council at a called meeting Monday night.

It was the second vote on a solution of the issue that had threatened to split the council and had brought angry retorts at the unofficial council "get together" Friday night.

At one time Monday night the issue nearly spilled over into an open controversy again, so Mayor Roland Mullins called an executive

session, "excluded" the public and press from the discussion.

At issue was whether to erect an electric line along a section of the lake shoreline on the west side of Lake Linville to serve a house

recently constructed by Ima Jean Hogg of Berea, and one next door under construction by Greg Hurley.

One route for the line would run from near property owned by Doug Brock, across the lake road, along the lake shore some 500 or more feet, then re-cross the road to the two houses. That route would call for an easement from the city to Jackson County RECC to set about four poles and erect the line.

The other route for the line would begin in the vicinity of a mobile home belonging to Virgil Abney on the north side of the lake, cross a small section of city property, and on to the two houses, a distance estimated at 2,000 feet. That proposed line would remain away from the shoreline, west of the lake road, and could call for several easements to be obtained.

In April, the council discussed both routes, but postponed a decision until a committee could study the proposition.

In May, the council voted to allow the line to run along the lake shoreline from the Brock property.

That route would be less costly for the electric cooperative and was recommended by the RECC engineers. Either route would not cost the city.

That motion in May for the shorter route along the lake was made by Tom Welch, seconded by Jerry Pensol, with Jackie Renner

Magistrates raise their expense accounts

In a move rumored for weeks, Rockcastle County's magistrates gave themselves a \$200 a month raise on their monthly expense account at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Wednesday.

The magistrates had been receiving \$100 a month for expenses, but the state informed the court magistrates could increase their expense account by \$200 to a

total of \$300 a month. It was the first time in memory expenses for magistrates had been increased.

All magistrates voted "yes" to the motion, as well as County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker.

Also receiving \$50 a month salary raises at the meeting were Treasurer, Floyd Owens, court-house maintenance man, Billy E. Livesay, and administrative assi-

stant to Judge Thacker, Anna Rose Mullins.

Total salary for Owens is \$10,020 for Livesay, \$12,600 and Mrs. Mullins, \$13,800. Magistrates receive a \$500 monthly salary plus the expense account.

It was the first time in four years that Mrs. Mullins and Owens had received increases.

Other items included in the court's session Wednesday included painting polling places at Conoway, Bullock, Brown and E. Mt. Vernon, accepting a road into the county road program that connects Tanyard Road with Big Sandy in the Scaffold Cane area, and agreed to cooperate with the state in resurfacing and widening of the Mareburg-Wald Road, and gave the Senior Citizen's Association \$1,500 to purchase a new van.

Two indictments from grand jury

Two indictments for first degree wanton endangerment were returned by the Grand Jury this week.

Indicted were Frank Thacker, Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon and Kenny Barnett of Mt. Vernon.

Thacker was charged as a result of a June 9th incident in which he allegedly shot toward a vehicle driven by Marvin Rigby. According to the complaint, the bullet traveled under Rigby's vehicle and struck a fencepost on the other side of the car.

The indictment against Barnett stems from a shooting on June 1st in which he allegedly shot a 22 rifle in the direction of Vonda Miller while she sat in her car in the Mt. Vernon Dairy Freeze parking lot.

Both men remained free on their original \$5,000 property bond.

The 1986-87 Rockcastle County budget totaling \$1,033,861 was given final approval by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting last Thursday.

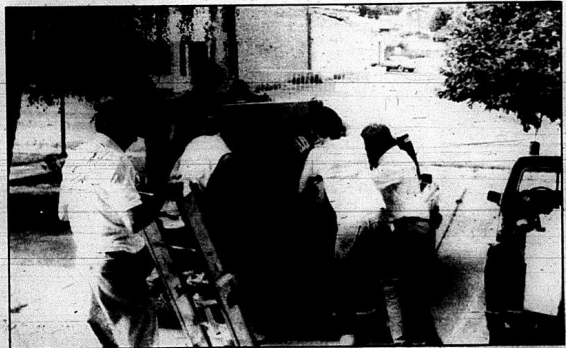
Prior to the meeting, a public hearing was held to hear complaints or approval of the budget, but no one attended.

Independence -- For US, For Our Hemisphere

Cong. Harold Rogers

The U.S. House of Representatives took a historic step this past week when we gave our support to President Reagan's request for \$100 million in aid to the freedom fighters in Nicaragua. I was proud to support the President in his effort, because I agree with him that we must try and prevent the career of communism from spreading throughout Central America, endangering our own nation as well.

Over 200 years ago, 13 fledgling colonies wanted to fight for their freedom against Britain. They found an ally, France, and with France's help and mostly their own determination, they built a new nation—America. Today, the freedom fighters of Nicaragua, the "Contras," want to take back their country which the Sandanista communists seized

several years ago. They will do their own fighting, but they need help from us if they are to reinstall democracy in their nation. This is exactly what our military and humanitarian aid will hopefully accomplish.

Those who oppose this aid say we should push for negotiations with the Nicaraguan government. The fact is we have tried and tried to negotiate; and we have tried to support the attempts by other Latin American countries to negotiate a peaceful solution to the conflict. But Nicaragua refuses to deal with us or with these other nations in any true-faith bargaining. In the meantime, Russia has armed them to the teeth. As with most other communist governments, force is the only language they understand.

Others have said that this aid will lead to the use of American troops to fight in the region. I believe that just the opposite will occur—that by giving the Contras the means to fight their own battle, we will be able to keep our troops out of the conflict, that unless the aid is given, we will one

day face the decision of having to send out troops to contain communism on our doorstep.

No one wants American soldiers fighting a war in Central America, so the way to prevent that is to support the Contras as they work to free their own country of Marxism.

This aid is particularly important now. Nicaragua's neighbors are increasingly becoming unstable in the wake of the communist influence in the region. Mexico especially faces severe financial problems; and an unchecked Nicaraguan revolution could spawn similar unrest in a country which shares a 2,000 mile long border with the United States. The thought of a communist Mexico is a very frightening prospect.

This coming week, as we celebrate the 210th anniversary of our independence, it seems fitting that we should be offering our support to freedom fighters who seek only their own independence. This aid, which must now also be approved by the Senate, is the best way for us to lend that helping hand.

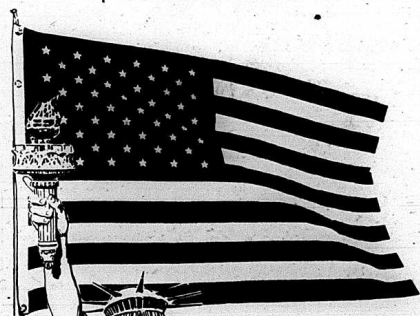

Last year's reunion was held in Charleston, S.C. The 1984 reunion was held at Hollersburg, Miss., birthplace of the division at which time a monument honoring the division was dedicated on the parade grounds of the camp.

During World War II after joining the Patton Army, the 65th Division made the deepest penetration into Eastern Europe of any U.S. contingent.

The division landed at LaHarve, France, Jan. 21, 1945 and later moved forward to relieve the 26th Infantry Division. First elements entered the line on March 5, and the division as a whole took over aggressive defense of the sector along the Saar River between Orscholz to Wadsassen on March 19, crossing the river at Dilligen, where it captured Saar-lauren as the Siegfried Line defenses cracked.

The division traveled 850 miles from LaHarve to the Enns River in Austria by the time the war ended on May 9, 1945.

Elmo Anderkin of Mt. Vernon served with the division for 18 months. He left the division on March 7, 1945 when he was wounded at Struth, Germany, but was able to return to the unit that went up to meet up with the Russian Army at Linz, Austria.

Police destroy marijuana crop

Kentucky State Police destroyed 78 marijuana plants found growing just off Ky. 1355 approximately 6 miles north of Livingston early Tuesday morning, according to Detective Ernie Boggs.

Boggs said he does not know for sure at this point to whom the property on which the plants were growing belongs, but that the information about the plants came from an informant.

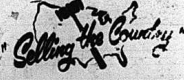

Multiflora rose control

Multiflora roses would definitely rank in listing as one of the top two weeds facing Rockcastle County farmers. I would rate it the second worst weed only when compared to Johnsongrass. Johnsongrass deserves the privilege in being number one only because of the large number of seeds produced and short time required to overtake cultivated fields. However, some farmers may disagree and cite instances where multifloras are taking over fields as they creep out from fence rows. But if you look back over time one would find that multiflora was left uncontrolled for many years.

Controlling multiflora seems to be a big problem. When cut by grubbing, bush hogging, or mowing machine, they come back. The key is in killing the root system. Chemicals are now available to control this problem with little danger of affecting other crops.

During June and July is an ideal time to control multifloras. Applying treatment before Japanese beetles have time to remove the leaves is the problem. Chemicals like Round Up and Cross Bow when applied to the

leaves will translocate to the root system killing the whole plant. Approximately 10-14 days later the results of treatment can be seen.

For large areas, farm sprayers are fine. Mixing 2 1/2 ozs of Round Up per gallon of water then applying complete coverage on the foliage along with 4-6 hours without rain is all that's needed.

Why jars don't seal

If you use sound canning jars, good quality canning lids, up-to-date methods, and the proper processing time, you shouldn't have trouble with jars not sealing. When a jar doesn't seal, it is probably for one of these reasons: you used off-standard jars such as

one-trip jars from the food store; you used "maverick" jar lids (some of the new off-brand brands have not yet passed rigid performance tests); old lids, used lids, or rusted and dented screw bands; you used a jar with a nicked or cracked sealing edge; you didn't wipe the sealing edge clean; you didn't screw the band tight enough against the sealing edge before processing; you didn't process the jars of food for the recommended time.

You can take care of the problem and reprocess the jar of food right away, or you can reprocess it and eat it within a few days.

Canning Cabbage

Don't can cabbage, broccoli or Brussels sprouts. Safe canning calls for using a pressure canner, and in the process they get mushy, and the flavor gets stranger than you might like. Most canning manuals don't even give processing times for these vegetables. Freeze them instead.

Cabbage, however, is good

made into sauerkraut or used in pickle recipes, and can then be safely processing in a boiling-water-bath canner.

Freezing Corn-On-The-Cob

Freezing corn on the cob is a great idea for a special treat next winter. Choose the best ears you can find, with plump tender kernels and thin sweet milk. Husk, remove silk, wash, and sort ears according to size. Heat them in boiling water 7 minutes for small ears, 9 minutes for medium ears, and 11 minutes for large ears.

Cool the ears of corn promptly and very thoroughly in cold water and then drain. Pack into freezer containers-freezer bags are especially handy for ears of corn. Seal and freeze immediately.

Freezing Peaches

These varieties of peaches are good for freezing: Comanche, Globeview, Golden Jubilee, Redhaven, Sunhaven, and Elberta. Buy peaches from a market where they don't know the variety for sure. They are probably tell you if it's a freestone or clingstone variety. Or cut one open and find out for yourself. Freestone peaches usually make a better frozen peach.

To keep peaches from darkening, freeze them in a light sugar syrup to which you have added 1/2 teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid for each quart. If you are freezing them "dry" with or without sugar, add ascorbic acid crystals or powder according to the directions on the package.

State plans continued tests for brucellosis disease

Kentucky has made huge strides in controlling brucellosis over the past ten years, according to those who work closely with the program.

"Ten years ago there was little testing of herds adjacent to infected herds, few animals were traced that had been sold from infected herds and few animals were traced back to the possible source herds," said Dr. J.L. Augspurger, brucellosis epidemiologist for Kentucky.

Now, Augspurger says, extensive testing is being carried out in all those areas, giving much greater control to those concerned with controlling the disease.

Brucellosis, also called Bangs, may cause abortions in cattle, a lower conception rate and weak or unthrifty calves.

"It is in my opinion that the work and cooperation of all the interested groups that we have been able to move the disease control program forward," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

Those who are involved include the Kentucky and U.S. Departments of Agriculture, veterinarians across the state, the stockyards and farmers.

Relatively recent attention to brucellosis in states surrounding Kentucky and accompanying import restrictions with regard to disease control measures are making Kentucky livestock producers increasingly aware of the economic significance of Kentucky attaining brucellosis-free status.

"The marketability of their animals is dependent upon a successful status such as Kentucky has put together," says Commissioner Boswell.

Testing cattle is a prime factor of the disease control program. Total testing of all eligible animals at Kentucky stockyards was implemented in the late 1970s. Kentucky now has excellent surveillance on cattle going to slaughter.

"Our latest report shows that more than 95 percent of Kentucky cattle going on to slaughter are being tested, which, when compared to other states, is a superior performance," Augspurger said.

"Kentucky also has a mandatory vaccination law," said Commissioner Boswell. "All aspects of the industry agreed on it and saw its implementation."

The law requires that any cattle coming into Kentucky or changing ownership, either privately or at the stockyards, must be vaccinated.

Kentucky also carries out other testing in an effort to track down brucellosis. Between 1978 and 1981, all herds in more than 40 counties were tested. That amounted to nearly 28,000 herds and 570,000 cattle.

"Although this testing was expensive, it helped us find the infected herds and thus helped reduce the possibility of the disease spreading," Boswell said.

Two other major achievements in controlling brucellosis were made in the late 1970s. A policy was implemented to require testing of herds immediately adjacent to infected herds, and a system was gradually developed to improve Kentucky's ability to locate cattle which had been sold from infected herds so that they could be tested.

"Again, the industry worked together to improve the record keeping and other factors which made it possible to improve the entire system," Boswell said.

"Right now, as many as 70 to 80 percent of replacement cattle in Kentucky are coming out of the stockyards, and many of these cattle aren't being retested," Boswell said.

"Farmers need to remember that during the incubation period for brucellosis, a cow will test negative, but later it could infect the entire herd," Boswell said.

The safest thing for a cattleman to do is to isolate new cattle for 60-90 days and then retest them prior to adding them to the herd.

The incubation period can be very long, one negative test simply isn't enough," Boswell said. "Even buying vaccinated animals isn't a guarantee, because the animals could have been vaccinated as unvaccinated."

Vaccination is helpful and provides some safety, but retesting after isolation is even better.

"Overall, I'm very pleased with our efforts against brucellosis. We've made a great deal of headway in the last couple of years. We are seeing a lot of progress, and we're seeing it because the entire industry is putting a lot of effort into brucellosis control," Boswell said.

FOREST FIRES

Kentucky Division of Forestry officials have released the Forest Fire figures for the Spring, 1986 fire season. The 10-county Southeast District, which includes Rockcastle County, reported 570 fires which burned

over 21,000 acres. Nearly 7/8 of these fires were caused by careless debris burning or by people deliberately setting arson fires. A total of 69 persons were prosecuted for fire law violations.

YOUR CHILD'S HEALTH

Bruises normal in most children

By Dr. John Payne

"Billy bruises so easily; I'm sure he has leukemia or something."

Such concerns seem to be voiced more frequently in the summertime, probably because there is more bruising due to more active play, and because bruises are more easily seen with short clothing.

It is normal for children to get lots of bruises over their lower legs. There is no muscle tissue over the shin bone. Only skin and a little fat overlie this bone, so any

minor injury is likely to produce bleeding under the skin, which is just what a bruise is. The same thing is true for the skin over the forehead, spine or kneecap.

It is normal for bruises to turn from blue to greenish to yellow as the pigment in the blood is changed by normal bodily processes.

If the bruises should be accompanied by lots of nosebleeds, weakness, or obvious illness, then a doctor should be consulted. Usually, however, bruises are just a sign of the normal wear and tear of good active play.

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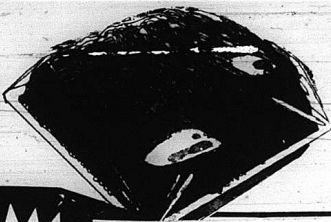

Armstrong recognizes that fireworks displays are a major event for July 4th celebrations; however, he adds that only those persons obtaining a permit from the chief of the fire department or a similar official shall be allowed to discharge fireworks except for ground and hand-held sparking devices Armstrong says.

Fireworks present a very serious safety hazard, particularly for children. Because of the severe accidents from the use of fireworks, the federal government,

under the Federal Hazardous Substance Act, prohibited the sale to consumers of the most dangerous types of fireworks, Armstrong says. These included cherry bombs; aerial bombs, M-80 Salutes and larger firecrackers containing more than 2 grains of

powder. Also banned were mail-order kits designed to build these fireworks.

Due to more regulation, the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission lowered the permissible charge in firecrackers to no more than 50 milligrams of

In addition, fireworks intended for consumers use, for those states allowing such, must carry a warning label describing necessary safety precautions.

To help use fireworks (sparkling devices) more safely in Kentucky, Attorney General Armstrong offers the following recommendations: Do not allow children to play with fireworks under any circumstances. The sparkler, considered by many to be a "safe" firework for the young, burns at very high temperatures and can easily ignite clothing. If you permit older children to use sparklers, be sure they use them only under close adult supervision. Do not allow any running or

horseplay while they are being used. Before using any sparking device, read and follow all warning instructions. Light the sparking devices outdoors in a clear area away from houses and flammable materials. Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies.

Beware of Fake Healers!

"God's miracles now -- come expecting a miracle," and other like claims are made by so-called "miracle workers" today.

False claims to miracle-working power are nothing new. Simon the sorcerer [Acts 8] deceived many people until his sorcery was placed in contrast with real miracles after which he himself was convinced of God's truth. The seven sons of Sceva [Acts 19:13-16] tried to cast out a demon with disastrous results. False prophets were foretold by the Lord and His apostles, and Paul warned that "power and signs and lying wonders" would accompany the apostasy [See 2 Thess. 2:12].

Since Bible times, many men and women have claimed to be inspired, to have had revelations from God, or in some other way to be miracle workers and they have led millions of credulous people in delusion and superstition to hopeless death. As long as time continues, there will likely be some people looking for and ready to believe in supposed modern-day miracles. They read of those performed by Christ and His apostles in the first century and assume such will continue today. Many honest and sincere people are being deceived by fakes and religious racketeers, who claim that they - by the power of God - are able to perform miracles. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are taken from honest people who are seeking relief or cure from their ailments by these fake healers.

Any physician will tell you that patients can be "cured" if one makes them believe the treatment given will bring about the cure, and our nation is filled with hypochondriacs who present both physicians and faith healers with an ever-present reserve of "patients." Faith healers are making a fortune off these people who "think they are sick." Obviously one does not have to have much "power" to "heal" one who only thinks he is sick. This is sometimes referred to as the "Placebo Effect." A placebo is an unmedicated preparation given to a patient to humor him or to be used as a control in an experiment. Thus, a placebo effect is a cure effected by causing one to BELIEVE HE IS BEING CURED.

The purpose of miracles in the first century was for the production of faith [John 20:30-31]; there being no New Testament at that time. They served as confirmation of the spoken word [Mk. 16:17-20]. Since the faith has "OMGCE" for all time, been delivered to the saints [Jude 3, and the Scriptures furnish completely unto every good work [2 Tim. 3:16-17], miracles are no longer needed today. All Christians believe in prayer and in God's power to heal, but He answers prayer through the use of NATURAL MEANS and not by working miracles which offset natural laws.

Certain miraculous gifts were bestowed by the laying on of the apostles' hands [Acts 8:18]. These gifts were temporary in the church and were to cease when the New Testament was completed [See 1 Cor. 13:8ff].

Let us never allow any so-called "miracle worker" to lead us astray. Let's refuse to be swayed just because something APPEARS spectacular. A man's life, message and practice must all stand up under the scrutiny of God's Holy Word. Remember, those who claim to work miracles may in reality be those who "work iniquity" [Matt. 7:21-23].

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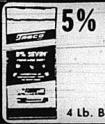
