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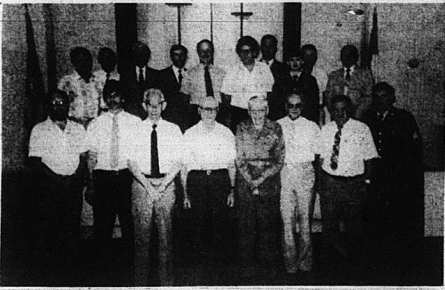


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Wildie church holds special service

State gets more local roads

Several county maintained roads, or sections of roads, in Rockcastle County were approved Monday at a called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court for inclusion in the Secondary System, if they are also approved by the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

The county suggests a first priority road, but if it is not approved because it fails to meet state requirements, a second priority road is suggested. A limit is

also set on the number of miles allowed.

Recommendations from each magistrate were:

District One - Broadhead-Chestnut Ridge Road off Ky. 1506, beginning at Ky. 1505 and ending at the bridge, a distance of 4.2 miles. Second priority, Oak Hill Road to Renton Valley off Ky. 1505 extending 3.8 miles.

District Two - Chestnut Ridge Road beginning at U.S. 25 and ending at Well Hope School, 4.5

miles. Second priority, Marlow Hollow Road, beginning at Ky. 1249, loops and ends at Ky. 1249, for 3.5 miles.

District Three - Negro Creek Road from U.S. 150 to county line, 3.9 miles.

District Four - Brindle Ridge Church Road, beginning at U.S. 25 to Brindle Ridge Church 6 of a mile, cross Interstate-75 to Ky. 1505, for 2.4 miles. Fairview Road off U.S. 25 across from Lambert Road, up Little Clear Creek, 1.5 miles to Eugene Alderman's house.

Second priority, Sweet Water Road off Ky. 1505 for one mile.

District Five - Cove Branch Road beginning at Ky. 1004 toward Orlando for 1.7 miles; Flat Rock Road off Ky. 1004 to Andrew Johnson property, 1.3 miles. Old Burr Road from Ky. 1004 to Pine Hill, two miles.

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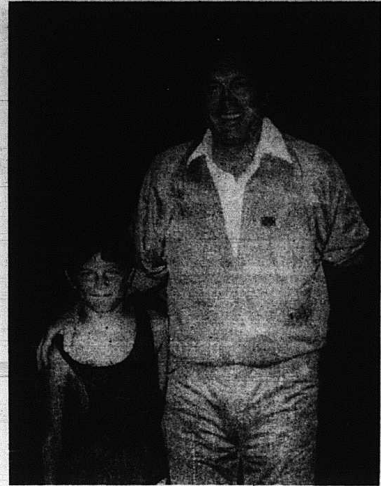

People often use over-the-counter products to relieve eye discomforts and diseases. Since the eye is very delicate, even minor symptoms may signal a more serious problem. Therefore there are very few eye disorders that can be properly self-diagnosed and self-treated.

One such disorder is tear-deficiency. Eye tissues require water and without it can become irritated. This can be extremely painful. Artificial tear products (Ex. Hypotears) are available which absorb onto the cornea. Periodic moist compresses may also be helpful. There are some causes of tear-deficiency which require supervision, but they still usually involve OTC treatments.

Minor irritation and inflammation of the eye caused by the presence of loose, easily removed foreign particles, air born pollutants, and chlorinated water in swimming pools often cause burning, itching, tearing and redness. These symptoms can be alleviated by OTC eyewashes (Ex. Collyrium) or decongestant products (Ex. Visine).

Patients with eye infections should see a doctor because antibiotic therapy may be necessary. There are no anti-infective ophthalmic products available without a prescription that are considered safe and effective. Some products are available and widely used, such as boric acid, but are not safe for OTC use. An adult toxic dose of 5 gm of boric acid has been reported. This

means that a 4 oz. bottle of saturated boric acid solution is potentially toxic for an adult and much less can be toxic to a child. Its effectiveness is also questionable since self-treatable infections probably go away with time anyway.

If you are using an over-the-counter product and your condition does not respond within a few days, it is best to contact a physician.

If you have any questions about ophthalmic products, ask your pharmacist or doctor.

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NEWS OF EDUCATION

SAVING CHILDREN

Education is perhaps the most important gift we can provide the children of this country. Our youth provide us with hope for the future, and education provides them with the tools to realize that hope.

For many years the federal government provided funds to our education system through the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. This program funded specific education programs rather than giving single block grants to states and municipalities. This manner of doling out federal education funds resulted in inefficiency and high overhead.

In 1980, more federal funds were being spent on education than ever before, but Scholastic Achievement Test scores were the lowest they had been since the SAT system was established in 1930.

Republicans in the Senate had long recognized the inefficiency of this type of funding, and tried repeatedly to improve the system. Their efforts, however, were thwarted by the Democratic-controlled Senate.

In 1981, the Republicans became the majority party in the Senate, and were able to pass the system. That year, the Senate passed the Education Consolidation and Improvement Act. This bill returned control of educational funds to states and municipalities, allowing them to set their own priorities.

The act also consolidated approximately 30 educational programs



into one block grant, and eliminated more than 300 pages of regulations that governed these funds. While this program may have eliminated inefficiency and costly administrative overhead, it did not result in the federal government spending less on education. In 1985, the federal government spent \$18.4 billion on education programs, compared to \$14.8 billion in 1981.

The changes in the way the federal government funds education programs can be seen in a more important place—America's schools. In 1985, SAT scores rose nine points, the highest annual gain since 1963. In one inner-city high school in Washington, D.C., 50 percent of the class of 1986 will attend college. This school is in an area where 40 percent of the residents are high school dropouts.

It is examples like this that prove without a doubt that block grants work, and keep the hope for our children's future alive.

SUN SENSE

by Dr. Robert M. Sayre, Director Plough Solar Research Center
Dr. Robert Sayre is director of the Plough Solar Research Center in Memphis. Each year he answers hundreds of questions on the subject of the sun's effects.

Summertime often means more tanning time; in this column, Dr. Sayre answers some of the most frequently asked questions on sunscreen and skin protection.

Can you advise me on how to determine the correct sun protection factor?

Your skin type determines the Sun Protection Factor (SPF) that will give your skin the best protection. Use the following as a general guideline:

For ultra-sensitive skin that

never tans and always burns, I recommend SPF 15; for skin that burns easily and tans slowly, 8 or 6; for skin that tans gradually

but usually burns first, 6 or 4; for skin that tans easily but sometimes burns, 4 or 2; for skin that tans easily and rarely burns, 2.

How long does a sunscreen's protection last in the water?

This depends on the product. Those labeled "waterproof" maintain their (SPF) rating for up to 80 minutes. This is twice the duration of products labeled "water-resistant."

How do I know how much exposure to the sun is too much?



Your "limit" for sun exposure depends on your individual skin type and the degree of sunscreen protection you use. Once you know your skin type (i.e., Type 1 never tans, always burns; Type V tans easily, rarely burns), select a product with a suitable SPF for your skin. This tells you how long you may be safely exposed to the sun using that product. For example, if your skin usually begins to burn after 10 minutes without using any sunscreen at all, a product like Coppertone SPF 8 Sunscreen Lotion allows exposure for approximately one hour and 10 minutes before you would begin to burn. If you used an SPF 2 product, your "limit" would be 20 minutes.

We keep hearing warnings about the sun; what positive effects does the sun have besides being the source of a good tan?

Studies show that the sun offers both psychological and physiological benefits. It provides one of the body's major sources of vitamin D, which is produced in the body when skin is exposed to the sun's ultraviolet rays.

Research indicates that many people feel being outdoors in the sun promotes a feeling of health and well being. The majority of those questioned said that having a tan made them "feel good."

I've heard that the best thing to do for a sunburn is to "ignore it" and avoid using any tanning on the skin; do you agree?

Definitely not. Sunburn is an inflammatory skin reaction and should not be ignored any more than you would ignore a burn. Use cooling compresses or try a cooling shower. First aid treatments, such as Solarcaine, spray of lotion can also help relieve discomfort as the skin heals.

To prevent further overexposure, be sure to use a high SPF sunscreen to protect sunburned areas when you go out in the sun.

1. Persons with mental illness are unpredictable.
2. You can't talk to someone who has been mentally ill.
3. If a former mental patient has a really bad history there isn't much hope.
4. A former mental patient is bound to make a second-rate employee.
5. There's not much that can be done to make things easier for recovered mental patients.

Answers: All of the above statements are false. Let's see why:

Some people with mental illness are impulsive and their actions unpredictable when they are actively ill. Once they have recovered, however, most are consistent in their behavior.

Most recovered mental patients are rational and intelligent, and it is certainly possible to talk with them. Even individuals who are actively mentally ill are likely to be rational in many ways. They may suffer from certain delusions or act disturbed at times, but in their calmer moments they will probably be able to discuss many things reasonably and sensibly.

A person's history is important in predicting his or her chances for recovery. Some people may be ill for many years, however, before they finally receive effective treatment or their condition improves for other reasons. Once the turnaround occurs, these individuals may remain well for the rest of their lives.

and completed his degree.

While Riddle was in the Navy he was struck with some bad luck. During a volleyball game on base, Billy lost his left eye. However, that did not deter him from seeking the coaching and teaching career he had always wanted.

After he was hired in 1958, Riddle said that he still had to work with his dad in the summer time on contract jobs to make ends meet. Coaching and teaching just didn't pay that well.

During Riddle's 22 year coaching career he had 17 winning seasons and 5 losing seasons but that netted over 300 victories. His most successful time was the 14 years that he spent at Brodhead High School. At Brodhead, Bill had only two losing seasons and numerous trips to the regional basketball tournament.

But, when the county high schools consolidated Riddle was not for it. He explained, before the schools all came together, 36 of the varsity teams. After we went together that number was cut to 12.

"I never was an advocate of just playing to win at all costs. I tried to make the young that I coached better citizens," Riddle said.

Probably his greatest coaching feat came in 1972 when he took the Brodhead Tigers to the Sweet 16 tournament in Louisville for the first time in history. Brodhead's starting line-up that year consisted of Ronnie Brown, Clayton Cash, Terry Burton, Dennis Harris and Tommy Mullins.

"These kids played basketball all the time, even when the season was not going on," he stated. They really had a lot of heart, but I'd be afraid to say that, they were my best team. I had a lot of good teams especially the 1973 Rockcastle Rockets. I remember that year that we were ranked first and second all year long in the region. Clay County was the other team that was ranked right there with us. We drew Clay County in the first round of the district, which was played at Jackson County. The gym was so full that people were sitting in chairs on the stage and in the aisle. We had a one point lead with four seconds to go and we committed a foul. Gene Gregory stepped to the line and hit both free throws. We lost by one point after a shot by Ronnie Brown from around mid court barely missed," he said.

"I guess the person who sacrificed most throughout the years was my wife, Carol," Riddle said. She probably put up with more than anybody. Carol and Billy Riddle have three children: Vicki Riddle Scott, Cheryl Riddle Brown and David Riddle. David played for his father on the 1980 edition of the Rockcastle County Rockets. It was Billy's last year to coach. The team was runner-up in the district and advanced to the regional tournament.

Many of Billy Riddle's players, speak well of him, but one in particular had nothing but praise for him when he looked back on the years that he played basketball at Brodhead High School.

"There are a lot of nice things you could say about Billy Riddle," Randall Stevens said Tuesday. 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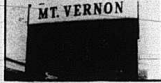

Brodhead budget lower this year

An operating budget of \$72,285 was approved by the Brodhead City Council at a meeting Monday night. Last year's budget was \$85,530.

Since the city will begin the 1986-87 fiscal year with a balance carried over of \$37,696 it appears the city is "well off" financially, since its total resources available are \$105,927.

The city expects to end the 1986-87 fiscal year with about \$33,742, if the figures hold.

The most income this year will come from city property tax, estimated at \$30,000, and from \$11,000 in franchise fees.

Appropriations in the general fund include, police salary, \$10,200; police gas and maintenance, \$2,400; utilities, \$6,000; FICA, \$5,700; telephone service, \$1,700; clerk, \$2,550; general expense such as office supplies, mailings, insurance, \$10,000;

Senator visits with homefolks

Hot or cold, politicians move around, shake many hands, ask many questions and make many observations.

For U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell who came to Mt. Vernon Tuesday for a town meeting, he found Mt. Vernon very hot.

Moved around, renewing old acquaintances. Asked questions about the concerns of his constituents.

And made several observations. There was, for example, the question of tobacco and its decreasing popularity in the nation, a question dear to the hearts of many county farmers.

"I think you tobacco growers have a chance—not a great one—but a chance," the first term Republican from Louisville, said. "The future of tobacco lies in foreign markets, and I am making every effort I can to expand those markets."

"If the tobacco reform bill works, we have a chance," he concluded.

He reported on a trip to Korea where it is against the law to have an American cigarette in your possession.

"I was promised there would be a change in that law by the president of Korea, but to date the change has not been made," he said. "Perhaps they will make the change in September, as they now indicate. If the market for tobacco is opened abroad, then quotes on tobacco for you here in Rockcastle could be raised."

The senator noted Rockcastle is 49th in tobacco production in Kentucky even with its small population. He said 150,000 farmers, and farm workers in Kentucky make at least part of their living through the growing of tobacco.

Drug distributing charges filed against area residents

A Livingston woman was released of \$500,000 recognition bond Wednesday afternoon on a charge of conspiracy to distribute cocaine.

Sandy Clark, 26, of Rt. 2, Box 283 was arrested by FBI agents about 11 a.m. at her home charged in a warrant issued July 8 in Indiana with violation of the Federal Narcotics Statutes, according to Joel A. Carlson, special agent in charge of the Kentucky FBI.

Clark appeared before U.S. Magistrate Coleman D. Moberly in London where she was released on the recognition bond.

Also arrested July 7 in Indiana in connection with the case was George "Jack" Murdock, also known as Jack Morgan,

of High Street in Mt. Vernon, who reportedly has lived at that address for over a year. He was charged with conspiracy to distribute cocaine.

Both arrests are part of a round-up of suspected drug dealers in the area. The suspects have been under surveillance since last December.

Agents of the FBI at London, Mt. Vernon City Police and Kentucky State Police surrounded the Morgan home in Mt. Vernon late Tuesday.

The FBI did not report on that raid, but it is believed officers were looking for evidence related to the case.

If convicted, Clark could be sentenced to a maximum of 15 years in prison and/or fined \$25,000.

street sweeping, \$1,500; tax commission, \$1,500; gas for Fire Department, \$400; legal services, \$660; dispatch service, \$300, and park care, \$375.

Appropriations in other accounts include \$12,500 from the Revenue Sharing Account for matching funds for the new Fire Department Building; \$2,500 in the rent account for coal and apartment upkeep; \$12,000 for streets, gravel and repair, and \$2,000 for gravel and street repairs from the coal and mineral severance aid account.

The Brodhead Water Works has budgeted about \$220,569 for the fiscal year. It has available income of about \$260,000.

The department's largest bills will be for the purchase of water estimated at \$29,000, and \$18,030 for interest on the sewer systems. During the Monday meeting, the council voted to lay a four-inch water line to Frith Subdivision to replace a three-quarter-inch line.

The council put two other water requests on hold—on Mrs. Bernice Cummins—until "something could be worked out.

The council then went into closed session to discuss the pending suit against the city and Policeman Bill Lawrence, filed by Gary Shepherd of Brindle Ridge, who claims he was wrongfully arrested on a drunk charge at the Brodhead Fair in 1985 by Lawrence. He asks for in excess of \$2,500. He was later found not guilty of the charge in District Court.

City Attorney Jerry Cox has filed a reply to Shepherd's suit, asking it be dismissed and citing several reasons. No hearing date has been set in Circuit Court.

The Fire Department has applied for a \$12,000 grant and \$15,000 in low interest funds for the fiscal year of 1987-88 to help pay for the new fire department building now under construction, estimated to cost about \$38,000.

State Supreme Court overturns Lisa Jones murder conviction

The Supreme Court of Kentucky has reversed the murder conviction of Lisa Jones and has ordered a new trial.

Mrs. Jones was convicted in Rockcastle Circuit Court to 20 years for the murder of Johnny Falin, who was shot Jan. 30, 1984 on Brush Creek Road.

It will be the third time Mrs. Jones has been tried for Falin's murder. The first trial ended in a hung jury. The second trial resulted in the 20 year sentence.

In appealing the verdict to the high court, Attorney Larry C. Allen of London, said the trial court erred in allowing Falin's former wife, Peggy Falin, to testify to a conversation she had with the deceased three days prior to his death. The high court

Coach Bill "Doc" Riddle, a man who for 22 years guided young men on the basketball court and was only one of two coaches in Rockcastle County history to take a

team to the boy's state tournament, is retiring.

At last Tuesday night's local school board meeting his retirement was announced.

Although he won't be in the classroom as a full-time teacher this fall, Riddle said that he plans to return to Brodhead Elementary School and coach the seventh and eighth grade boys at least one

more year.

Well liked by students and ballplayers alike, Riddle said that he never had a student or ballplayer that he couldn't get along with.

"I truly enjoyed working with every student I had during the 28 years that I taught and the 22 years that I coached," Riddle said.

An excellent basketball player in his own right, Riddle graduated from Brodhead High School in 1949 and went to Eastern Kentucky University on a basketball scholarship. He played four years at Brodhead as forward utility coach Jack Wright.

After playing basketball for one year at Eastern and realized that he was about to be drafted into the Army, Riddle joined the Navy for a four year stint in the armed services.

In 1958 Riddle graduated from Eastern with a degree in Health and Physical Education and that same year he began what was to be a 14 year coaching career at Brodhead High School.

"I had hoped to play basketball at Union College after getting out of the Navy but they changed coaches and the new guy didn't want to keep any players that were older than freshman," Riddle said, so he transferred to Eastern

Your child's health

"They'll let her bleed to death without a permission slip." Well, not quite, but it may almost seem that way if you appear at an Emergency Room with a child that isn't your own and no note giving permission for treatment from the parent or guardian. If you are leaving your minor children in the care of a babysitter, grandmother, uncle or anyone else, you should ALWAYS leave a note giving permission for emergency medical treatment. It should state the child's name, any drug allergies, or unusual medical problems, and the dates for which the permission is valid. We keep one on the refrigerator door for our children with a "valid until cancelled" date and tell the babysitter where it is if the need should arise. With all the legal hassles, malpractice crises, and over the regulation besetting the medical community nowadays, such permissions are ever more important.
Usually a doctor will not require such a slip for an established relationship in his or her office, but the Emergency Room is a different story. Phone permissions can be changed, but you may not be near a phone at all times, so a note is much better. Maybe if you keep a note handy it will never need to be used.

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
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Road fund audit still news

For those counties that have not had their budget approved by the state, there could be an auditing delay.

Rockcastle's budget has already been approved.

House Speaker Don Blandford asked for the delay this week while his office investigators reports some counties, including Rockcastle, plan to use Road Fund money for salaries and other expenses.

Nearly one-third of Kentucky's 120 counties plan, to use some of the extra revenue from a nickel-a-gallon increase in the state gasoline tax to replace money lost to federal revenue-sharing cuts and rising insurance costs.

It is not clear what effect Blandford's action might have. The budgets of all but 13 counties have been approved. Robert Putdom, the state's local finance officer, said yesterday.

Purdum said 106 counties' budgets had been approved, five have been received but have not been processed, and eight have not been received. Fayette County does not submit its budget for approval because it is an urban

county government.

The gasoline tax increase, which took effect July 1, is expected to add \$20 million to the fund that counties use to finance road repair and construction.

In 1980, then-Attorney General Steven Beshear ruled that the Road Fund could be used to pay county officials for the part of their time spent administering county road programs.

In a letter he mailed Tuesday to Richard Cole, the commissioner of the Local Finance Office, Blandford acknowledged that the planned use of Road Fund money was legal, but he said it "disturbs me."

Buel Guy, an aide to Blandford, said the speaker's staff was examining state laws to try to find a way to deal with the situation.

Al Howell, a supervisor of the Local Finance Office, said county officials must prove to state auditors that they spent as much time as they claimed on Road Fund work. But, if a county's budget complies with state laws and revenues exceed expenditures, it must be approved, he said.

testimony was "inadmissible and highly prejudicial."

That testimony showed Fain intended to reconcile with Peggy Fain suggesting a motive for the crime.

The justices said though "far from overwhelming, the evidence produced by the Commonwealth was sufficient to submit to a jury."

Three witnesses heard gunshots on the night of the killing and soon after observed the area

None of them saw a pickup truck anywhere near the Jones car. Another witness drove past Jones and the victim and testified that Jones made no attempt to request help. An investigating officer said there were no other tire tracks in the snow at the scene of the crime other than the Jones car and the police car. Gunpowder tests of Jones' hands showed no residue but there was sufficient testimony to show that many guns do not emit gunpowder, when fired and there was also evidence that Jones cleaned her hands before the test was administered." the justices wrote.

The high court, citing another case, noted a ruling that "if under the evidence as a whole it would not be clearly unreasonable for a jury to find the defendant guilty, he is not entitled to a directed verdict of acquittal."

The court said the evidence is to be considered in light most favorable to, in this case, the prosecution. It noted, "matters of credibility of witnesses and the weight to be given to the evidence are for the jury to decide."

The court concluded that the prosecution met its burden of proof and a directed verdict of acquittal was not required in the Jones case. The high court then unanimously reversed earlier and ordered a new trial.

It is not the pictures of missing children, circulated on milk cartons and broadcast on television, that frighten children—these have actually helped in returning children to their homes. Hornworms Today Aphids Tomorrow

By: Tom Mills

The "whether" report for tobacco farmers for the first week only shows tobacco hornworms with scattered aphids quite low. Whether to spray for the aphids depends on numbers.

Twinsend Extension office in the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture, tobacco hornworm population is high in some fields the part of June and that part was necessary. Most size larvae, 12 inches long, found in Fayette County last week June 30. It is when they reach this size that most damage occurs. Growers encouraged to continue to spray their fields for feeding in the bud area.

The late and early July signal an increase in the population. Recent data may show them up a bit and said. Growers should spray for aphids on the underside, and consider treatment numbers reach 50 or more per acre on tobacco less than 1000.

Sherbet or Sorbet? VIVE LA DIFFERENCE

If hot muggy weather makes you wish for something cool and smooth, sorbet is the perfect solution.

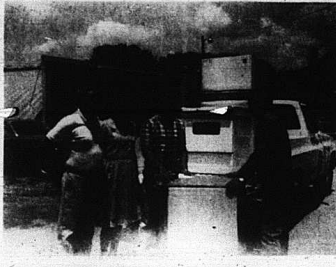
Sorbet, French for water ice, is a frozen sherbet-like dessert made of fruit juice or puree, sugar and water. Unlike sherbet, however, it does not contain milk products.

Sorbets have fewer calories than sherbets, are not as sweet, and contain more fruit or fruit juice.

Sorbets are easy to prepare and don't require special equipment. Taste the sorbet mixture before freezing. The mixture should be slightly sweeter than you want since flavors will be less intense after freezing.

If you don't have an ice cream machine or just don't want to churn you can still freeze your sorbet in the freezer compartment of your refrigerator. To still freeze, pour the prepared liquid mixture into a shallow pan. Place the pan in the freezer until a hard top of ice forms around the edge. This may take up to three hours. Stir the mixture several times during freezing.

Transfer the nearly solid ice to a large chilled bowl. Break it into pieces with a fork. Use an electric mixer to whip the ice until it is fluffy. Put the beaten ice back into the pan, cover with foil and refrigerate. Repeat the whipping process when the ice is partially frozen for a smoother consistency, whip another time.

While strawberries are still available, try this sorbet treat:

Strawberry Sorbet

- 2 pint fresh strawberries
- 2 C. Sugar
- 1 1/2 C. fresh orange juice
- 1/4 C. fresh lemon juice

Wash and hull strawberries. Gently blend in a bowl, wash and sprinkle with 1/4 cup sugar. Allow the berries to sit at room temperature at least one-half hour. Toss frequently.

Heat remaining sugar with orange and lemon juice in a heavy-bottomed saucepan, stir

until the sugar dissolves. Remove from heat and cool.

Puree berries in a blender or food processor. Be sure the sugar that sinks to the bottom is mixed in the pureed berries.

Combine berries with sweetened juices. Follow the still-freeze method for this recipe.

July 15th is final date for reporting crops

The final reporting date for corn, soybeans, and grain sorghum is July 15.

ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a timely crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a zero report of

acreage in order to have an established history file.

Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties.

In 1987 the farm program is expected to be a farm acreage base and this makes it extremely important for all producers to file crop reports. All cropland acreage will be taken into consideration, providing a timely report was filed, which the farm acreage base is established.

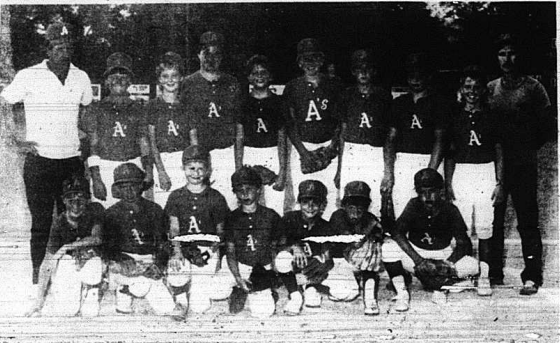

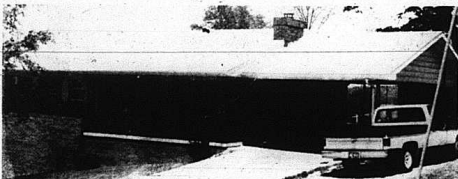

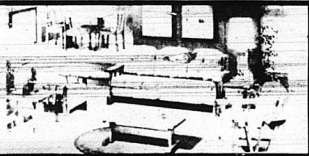
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65th Division Seeks Local Former Division Men for Reunion
