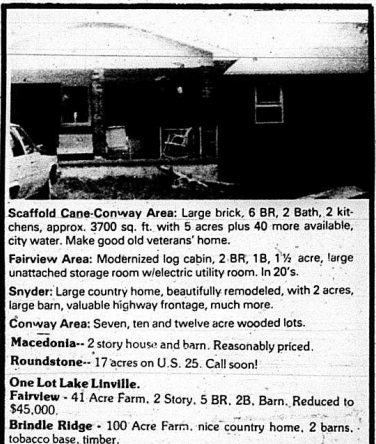

Council begins annexation to both I-75 interchanges

By Ray McCleure

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted to begin the process of extending the city limits to the two I-75 interchanges at a meeting of the council Monday night.

The vote was 5-0. The motion was made by Tom Welch and seconded by Joe Martin. Councilman Larry Bardette did not attend the meeting.

Even given a smooth sailing, it would probably be January 1987

before the areas would become a part of the city.

The areas to be annexed have not finally been determined, pending a survey to establish definite boundaries.

The council's motion was "to

the I-75 interchanges. It will be left to a committee of councilmen to determine what areas should be surveyed. Most likely it will be beyond both interchanges. Committee members are Joe Martin, Jerry Pense and Les Harris.

When the street is finally completed, the council will then vote on the proposal. The boundaries will then be published as a legal notice 60 days before final action. During the 60 days residents within the area may make

complaints. If less than 70 percent of those who are notified of the boundaries complain, then the areas will become part of the city.

If more than 70 percent complain, then the proposal will go to a vote in November. City property owners within the area to be annexed could sue. Even then 70 percent of the voters must vote to adopt the proposal to prevent annexation.

The councilman reported to Mayor Robert Mullins that property owners contacted appear to want to be annexed, explaining that many might get the installation of fire hydrants would result in a decrease in their insurance rate offset by the added city taxes.

This is just a beginning process," Councilman Pense told the several persons who attended the meeting. "It will probably be December before a legal decision is made."

Pense stressed that residents to be annexed, because of the cost, should not expect sewer service in the near future since the city is already involved in expensive water and sewer projects.

During the meeting, councilman presented a zoning ordinance proposal for rezoning property at Lake Linville, setting a \$25 fine for the first offense and \$50 for the second. Excluded are mineral and gas rights.

The city agreed to repair streets before winter, including Paul Field, Poplar and Locust, and to patch holes in various streets.

The street committee will check with the Rockcastle Fiscal Court about help in repairing and widening of Lake Linville Road.

The council accepted a low bid of \$2,450 from Douglas Griffin CPA to audit the city books.

The council referred to a committee a request of several residents in the Brush Creek area for city water. The group presented a petition to the council bearing at least 20 names of persons who would take water.

Also discussed at the meeting were the ongoing sewer and water projects, and a report from the Parks and Recreation Committee.

Deadline passes

If Kentucky motorists have a license plate holder covering any lettering or numbers, they could get a ticket that could bring a \$20 fine plus court costs of \$47.50. The last session of the legislature passed the measure and it went into effect Tuesday.

Roadside signs on state highways right-of-way in Rockcastle County are coming down in compliance with the state billboard law. Signs can be exchanged for state right-of-way. Garage in Mt. Vernon for a fee reportedly of \$14. So far, most affected are realtors who advertise property for sale.

And sometime later

It is reported that state has agreed to return road signs belonging to Ezed Realty and Raines Properties without charge, since the law indicates owners must be contacted personally before signs are removed. The state suggests signs not be put up until right-of-way is checked.

Policeman let go

Brodhead policeman Bill Lawrence has been let go by the Brodhead City Council, the result of problems arising from a past arrest that resulted in a suit being filed against the city and Lawrence. No one has been hired to fill the position.

A total of 2.33 inches of rain has fallen in Mt. Vernon since last Wednesday at the weather station at Cox Funeral Home. Repeatedly, more has fallen in the Brodhead area.

County garbage plan put on hold by state

Sixteen points described as "deficiencies" has prompted the Kentucky Division of Water Management (DWM) to put a temporary hold on a garbage plan for "basic."

In a letter to County Judge-Executive Hubert Thacker, the state said the deficiencies must be corrected, which will apparently delay final approval of the program.

After the changes are made, the plan must be re-submitted to the DWM where it will be reviewed, then returned to the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and applicable city governments for adoption.

The state urged the county to take action on the revision as quickly as possible. The DWM said it would attempt to expedite its final review.

The plan was drawn up by the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) and its representative Frank Groschelle, which has a contract with the county for \$10,000 to formulate a plan. That plan is now six months overdue from its original cut-off date of Dec. 31, 1985.

The CVADD has reportedly told the county the revision should be completed in two days.

In its report, the state pointed out its 16 points which are mostly clarifications of points. One example:

"The plan does not contain a budget for Rockcastle County. The plan should contain a budget with a minimum of the following items: Minnies for fuel clean-up, salary and fringe benefits for a solid waste coordinator and clerical personnel, and funds to join the Clean Community Program."

In a final note that may be an indication of things to come

some time in the future, the report stated:

"Voluntary collection systems has planned by Rockcastle County as a waste collection program. Strong enforcement and education programs the system may be successful."

Apparently it was not successful in Bell County.

Garbage collection there has gone from a voluntary system to a mandatory system with house-to-house pickup at a cost of \$8 a month.

To date, the Rockcastle plan in its entirety has not been made available to the public. However, reportedly, a copy, which contains 120 pages, is available from the state for \$21.

Report break-ins at businesses

A Brodhead man has been charged with burglarizing a business in Mt. Vernon and receiving stolen property taken from another burglary.

Earl Overbay, 21, is charged with burglary in the third degree and receiving stolen property.

He is accused of breaking into Franklin's last Thursday and taking knives and a video cassette recorder, and having employees identified as stolen in a burglary at Brown's Food Market near Brodhead. Entrance to both stores was made through the roof.

Making the arrest was State Detective Ernie Boggs, Mt. Vernon Policeman J.E. Durham and State Trooper Allen Lewis.

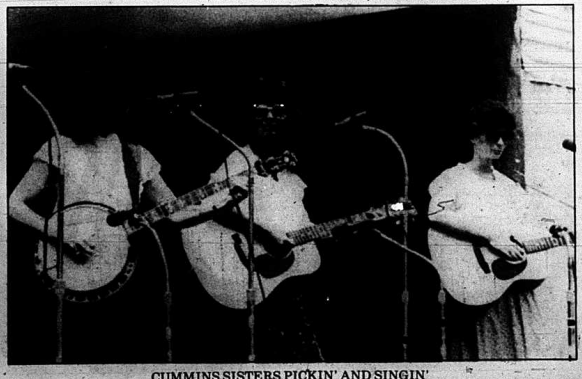

Your child's health

By Dr. John Payne

Almost every mother knows that the doctor will tell them to

give their baby "clear liquids," that is those you can see through when they have diarrhea or vomiting. The tummy needs a rest from the formula or milk. But, what about the baby who is being breast fed? It is a hassle for mother to stop nursing and pump her breasts and what about all the good antibodies in the breast milk? A large study done in Africa demonstrated no prolongation of diarrhea in babies continued on breast feeding compared with those who were not. Of course, the conditions in Africa are different than here, and safe and convenient alternatives to the breast

may not be readily available. Still, the message would seem to be that in infants who do not appear to be very sick that continuation of the breast feeding is probably a good idea. If the infant continued with diarrhea for more than two or three days, or seems to be getting worse, then stopping the breast feeding and consulting with your doctor may be in order. This should not be used as an excuse to stop the breast feeding. It should be resumed as soon as things are getting back to normal. Just remember, a baby with fussiness or diarrhea may well have an ear infection or some other illness.

Derrick Singleton, of Mt. Vernon, a recent graduate of Eastern Kentucky University, has been accepted into the University of Kentucky College of Dentistry. This year 40 EKVU graduates were accepted into the state's medical and dental schools, said Dr. John L. Meisenheimer, advisor for EKVU's pre-med students and a professor in the EKVU Department of Chemistry.

But Meisenheimer also had words of warning for undergraduates who plan careers in medical fields.

How to dry foods in your oven

Extra produce need not go to waste this summer. You can dry fruits for snacks, and vegetables to add to soups, steaks and casseroles.

Campers and hikers especially may find dried foods appealing since the foods are lightweight and easy to prepare.

Foods can be dried in an oven or dehydrator. Here are some tips for drying foods in your oven.

If your oven can maintain a temperature of 150 degrees or less, it is suitable for drying foods.

Test with a thermometer. If the lowest temperature is higher than 150 degrees, it is suggested to use another method.

Place food on drying trays made of screen or wood slats attached to a frame and covered with clean cheesecloth. Don't use cookie trays or cake pans because air cannot circulate through the food, and it will take an extremely long time to dry.

Preheat oven to 150 degrees. Place trays in the oven and drop oven door at least four inches. Allow at least 2 1/2 inches between trays and three inches of space at the top of the oven for good air circulation. Place a fan outside the oven door to aid air circulation. Move it from side to side occasionally.

Maintain the temperature at 150 degrees. Watch the temperature more carefully toward the end of the drying process. Examine the foods often and turn trays frequently. Remove foods as they dry.

To cool the food, then place it in a large, nonporous container. Cover the container and store it in a warm, dry place. Shake the container once a day for 10 to 14 days. This process helps ensure that the food has absolutely no moisture.

Dried food can be stored in glass jars, plastic containers or plastic bags. Store containers of dried foods in a cool, dark, dry area such as a basement or cellar. If you have space available in the

freezer, dried foods can be frozen. Exposure to humidity, light or air decreases the shelf life of foods. Foods stored at temperature under 60 degrees will keep about one year.

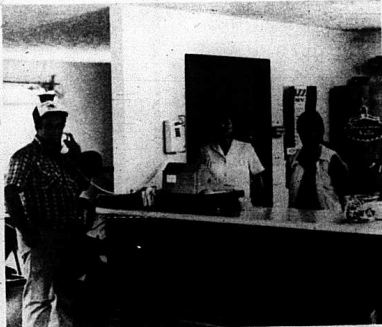

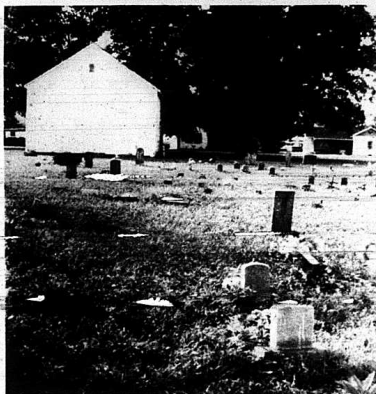

The Claims of Jesus

No one ever made the claims for himself as did Jesus of Nazareth. He is either what He claimed to be or He is the most vicious liar and imposter ever to live.

It is one thing to make claims and still another to substantiate them. Jesus is what He claimed to be because He proved every claim. Upon these claims, Christians base their faith. Let's examine some of these:

1. He claimed to be the Messiah (John 4:25-26). Jesus fulfilled every Messianic prophecy and possessed all the Messianic credentials.
2. He claimed to be a king (John 18:37). He lived, suffered and died claimed to be a king (John 19:14). He established a kingdom and reigns as King (Matt. 16:18-19; 1 Tim. 6:15).
3. He claimed to be the Son of God (Mk. 14:61-62). His birth, life, death and resurrection declare divine Sonship (Rom. 1:4). Intellectual honesty must compel all to admit, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matt. 16:16).
4. He claimed to be sinless (John 8:46). Pilate, Pilate's wife, Judas and the dying thief on the cross all testified that He was sinless. The Hebrew apostle said that He "was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin" (Heb. 4:15).
5. He claimed power to forgive sins (Mk. 2:10). The New Testament is abundant with testimony of those who found forgiveness in Him. John tells us that His atoning blood was shed to forgive sins (1 John 1:7).
6. He claimed to be coming again (John 14:3). When the trumpet sounds and the shout is heard, the Son of God will come in the clouds to resurrect the dead, change the bodies of the living from mortal to immortal and to judge all people according to their works (John 5:28-29; 1 Thess. 4:13-17; 2 Cor. 5:10).

So conclusive is the evidence that Jesus is the Christ that unclean spirits said, "Thou art the son of God" (Mk. 3:11). James said, "The devils believe and tremble" (Jas. 2:19). Even the centurion at the cross said, "Truly this was the Son of God" (Matt. 27:54).

Since Jesus is indeed all He claimed to be, what will you do with Him? You cannot laugh Him out of existence; infidels have tried that but Jesus went marching on. You cannot reason Him out of the world because logic is on His side. You cannot persecute Him out of the world; that was tried through years of torture, but He still lives.

Jesus is all He claimed to be. As the Messiah, He represents the loving God. As King He deserves homage. As the Son of God He reveals the Father. As the sinless One He presents the ideal life. As the forgiving One He is the Saviour. As the Judge He will hand down the final verdict for your soul.

What you do with Jesus in this life will determine what He will do with you in the life to come.

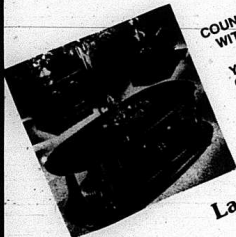
