

Almost every mother knows that the doctor will tell them to

that is those you can see through, when they have diarrhea or vomiting. The tummy needs a rest from the formula or milk. But. what about the baby who is being breast fed? It is a hassle for mother to stop nursing and pump her breasts and what about all the good antibodies in the breast

A large study done in Africa demonstrated no prolongation of diarrhea in babies continued on breast feeding compared with those who were not. Of course, the conditions in Africa are different than here, and safe and con-venient alternatives to the breast

may not be readily available. Still, the message would seem to be that in infants who do not appear to be very sick that continuation of the breast feeding is probably a good idea. If the infant continued with idea. If the infant continued with diarrhea for more than two or three days, or seems to be getting worse, then stopping the breast feeding and consulting with your dector may be in order. This should not be used as an excuse to step the breast feeding. It should be returned as coon as this result when the second of the se be resumed as soon as things are getting back to normal. Just remember, a baby with fussiness or diarrhea may well have an ear infection or some other illness





• Look for peaches that are well-shaped with a creamy or golden background or undertone. The red blush of peaches is an indicator of its variety; not its ripeness.

 Do select peaches that are firm to the touch, not hard. Avoid peaches that have a reen undertone; these won't ripen

rundertone; these won't ripen roperly. Also avoid any hard, dull, ruised or wrinkled fruit.

To ripen at the result of the resul To ripen, store peacles at room temperature away from sun-light in a bowl or in a closed paper bag. A well-defined crease and "peachy" aroma indicate ripeness.

Ripe peaches are ready to eat out-of-hand, include in any meals, or store immediately in the re-rigerator for later use. Peaches can usually be refrigerated for up to two

weeks.
