TITLE

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF THE COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, KENTUCKY, INDUSTRIAL BUILDING REVENUE BONDS (MT. VERNON PLASTICS CORPORATION PROJECT), SERIES A AND B, 1986, THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$4,500,000

II. SUMMARY

Pursuant to KRS 67.077, Notice is hereby given that an Ordinance, the title of which is the foregoing, will be given second reading and considered for passage at a meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court in the Courthouse, in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, on August 21, 1986, at 1:00 p.m., local time. At such time; a public hearing will be held concerning the proposed issuance of the Bonds authorized by the Bond Ordinance and the approval of the Project financed thereby as described in the below summary. Interested persons who wish to express their opinions on the proposed financing, either verbally or in writing, will be given an opportunity at the stated time and place.

A summary of said Ordinance is as follows:

A. The Ordinance authorizes and approves the County of Rockcastle, Kentucky, Industrial Building Revenue Bonds (Mt. Vernon Plastics Corporation Project), Series A and B, 1986, in the aggregate principal amount of Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000), for the purpose of financing the costs of the acquisition of the real property and improvements and related items of machinery and equipment located in the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park, to be owned and operated by Mt. Vernon Plastics Corporation, a Kentucky corporation (the "Borrower") and used in the operation of the Borrower as a facility involving molding presses, thermo forming equipment, plastic extruders and plastic processing and packaging equipment related thereto (the "Project"), pursuant to a Loan, Mortgage and Security Agreement (the "Loan Agreement") between the County and the Borrower.

B. The Ordinance authorizes and approves the execution of (1) the Loan Agreement, whereby the Bonds will be retired from

the proceeds of loan payments to be received from the Borrower as authorized by RRS 103.200 through 103.285, as amended, inclusive, (2) a Trust Indenture between the County, and First National Bank of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, as Trustee (the "Bank"), which sets forth the terms and conditions upon which the Bond is to be issued and outstanding, and (3) a Bond Purchase Agreement setting forth the terms of the sale of the Bond to the purchaser thereof (the "Bondholder").

C. The Ordinance designates the Bank as Trustee for the Bondholder, and authorizes the Trustee to make procedures for the disbursement of the proceeds of the Bond.

D. The Ordinance provides that the Bond shall not constitute an indebtedness of the County within the meaning of the Constitution but shall be payable only as set forth therein.

E. The Ordinance authorizes the County Judge/Executi and other County officials to take any other necessary actions, including executing the appropriate arbitrage certifications, to effect the issuance and delivery of the Bond.

The full text of the Bond Ordinance will be on file in the office of the undersigned County Clerk beginning August 5, 1986, between the hours of 9100 a.m. and 4130 p.m., Monday through Friday. In the Courthouse, Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, where i is available for public inspection. 
Burdette died from a single shot to the lower abdomen which caused extensive bleeding. He was pronounced dead at the scene by the County Coroner Billy Dowell.



As with the proposals to ban smoking in federal buildings and in the millitary, the real intent of this advertising ban is to pull us one step closes to a prohibition on robacco. Since those who oppose tobaccod not have the courage to try and outlaw the use of tobacco upright, they are reduced to using these back dowr methods of harassing induces companies and smokers.

I fold the subcommittee which held the hearing that any such ban would be a direct violation of the First Amendment, which prohibits laws which limit free speech. Opening the door of censorship to ban cigarette and tobacco ads could lead to even pore limits on what and how products could be advertised. 





If we penalize countries that exploit U.S. markets unfairly or set up barriers to importing our products, we risk losing those countries entirely as buyers of our farm products. A trade bill now before Congress presents this risk and some countries have already said they will retailate against U.S. exports if the bill, as it now reads, becomes law.

Obviously, with agricultural exports in a downturn at present, we can ill afford to lose foreign markets. A more aggressive tradestrategy can strengthen our farm sales abroad, even with domestic problems such as the strong dollar and the selling price of some farm products. And, I believe we have the tools available to us to be more aggressive without starting a trade war.

We offer the largest marketplace in the world. This is a tremendous incentive for countries whose economies depend heavily on the American market to consider our trade measurements. Take, for example, South Korea. At the Agricultural Export Conference, the South Korean Ambassador to the U.S. went to great lengths to emphasize how important the U.S. and Korea act to each other and how the trade relationship between the two countries must be developed. He pointed to the opening of the Korean market to U.S. is cigarettes as an example.

Simply put, without the b.S. market the South Korean conomy would not be booming the way it is now. But even with this dependency, it took vocal threats of removing Korea's trade preferences suffer. So 12-St og et actions.

Dry, hot weather in state continues to stress crops and increase chance of insect disease damage

The dry, hot weather Ken-tucky continues to experience is stressing crops and increasing

chances of insect and disease damage to the plants. "Nearly all crops are beginning to show stress from the high temperatures and the lack of adequate rain." said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. "Black shank continues to be a problem in many tobacco fields, and insects like grasshops; worms, aphids, and Japaness Beetles are becoming problems in corn, tobacco and seybean acreage."

As of August 1, soil moisture across the Commonwealth was rated 44 percent very short, 46 percent short and 10 percent adequate by reporters for the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics

Service.

The 1986 burley crop is blooming and maturing earlier than normal, but continues behind growth at this time last year.

About 35 percent of the crop has About 35 percent of the crop has been topped this year. Taht compares with 55 percent at this time lass year and 22 percent for the five-year average.

More than 50 percent of the dark-type tobacco has been top-

ped.

Though cutting began in some central Kentucky counties last week the average date for cutting to begin should be around August 5

I The funds will be available through September 30 to help finance single-family or multi-family housing units for low-income, families in rural areas, according to Kendall L Seaton, state director of the Farmers Home Administration in Kentucky.
