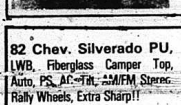

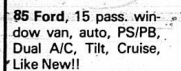

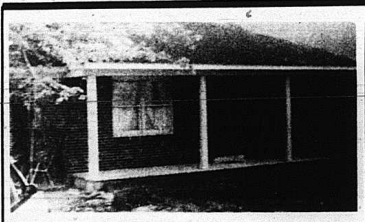

Third applicant for FM station

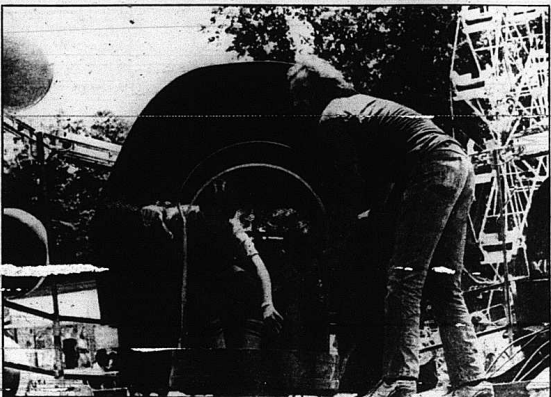
A third application for an FM radio station in Mt. Vernon has been made to the Federal Communications Commission by William S. Daugherty III of Alvatron, in western Kentucky.

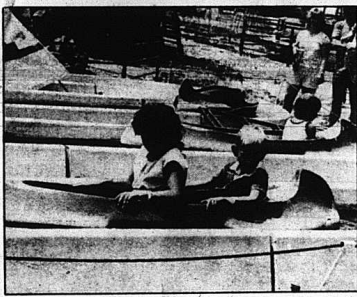

"Miss Ruth" McFerron dies at home

Ruth Mullins McFerron, musician, teacher and "friendly adviser" to hundreds of young people over the years, died unexpectedly Aug. 4, 1986 at her home of a heart attack. She was 90.

For years she was a familiar figure at the piano at the First Christian Church in Mt. Vernon where she had been a member for 76 years. She played the piano at Sunday evening services at the church. In 1977, the church honored her with a "Miss Ruth Day."

She was also heard by thousands of radio listeners playing the organ on the Sunday Morning Gatherns at Renfro Valley between 1939 and 1964.

But to local people "Miss Ruth" was a favorite English teacher at Mt. Vernon Grade and High School, as well as librarian until her marriage to John D. McFerron, a Rockcastle native an Florida hotel owner in 1954. He died in 1978.

When asked at her last birthday dinner given by a few friends if she still enjoyed birthdays, she said "Always, although I have to admit there has been an awful lot of them." She also said she especially enjoyed seeing her old students doing well in life.

Clyde Linville, who was superintendent at Mt. Vernon for 15 years, remembered that "she could take a little, bashful country boy and in just three weeks he seemed like he was from the city. I learned as much from Miss Ruth as I did from my education."

Virginia Sutton Meece, who was on the Gatherns when Miss Ruth was there, said, "She had that elegant way about her and she always stood out in a crowd. She was a very willing worker."

She was born in Livingston, Jan. 8, 1896, the daughter of Terry D. and Lucy Mullins. The family moved to Mt. Vernon in 1903. Her father, grandfather and great grandfather were all ministers.

She attended Brown Memorial, a private school in Mt. Vernon that later became Mt. Vernon Grade and High School. She was one of two students graduating in her class and the first girl to graduate from Mt. Vernon school after it became independent.

After graduation in 1916, she taught in the grades at Mt. Vernon and later in high school. She also taught at Augusta, Horse Cave and Dry Ridge. She was in charge of the golf club and coached many plays. She was librarian the last 14 years of her teaching career.

She was educated at Eastern Kentucky University and the University of Kentucky where she received her degree. She studied voice at the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music.

She was a member of the Mt. Vernon Chapter of Eastern Star, a charter member and past president of the Mt. Vernon Woman's Club, a member for life of the U of

K Alumni Association, and a member of the Kentucky Historical Society. She wrote complete histories of the Woman's Club and the Sunshine Class of her church.

She is survived by a sister, Mrs. Grace Riddle of Mt. Vernon and several nieces and nephews. In addition to her parents, she was preceded in death by six brothers.

County tax rate remains at previous year's level; garbage plan again delayed

Nov. 30

The real-estate tax rate for the county in the 1986-87 fiscal year was set at 8.4 cents per \$100 of assessed property value at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday. The same rate as last year.

The rate was allowed to remain the same since an increase in the total assessed real estate value of the county grew by \$817,747, from \$152,945,747 in 1985-86 to \$153,763,299.

Only a four percent increase is allowed each year without a public hearing. The new rate is within those guidelines.

The personal property tax rate was set at 2.2 cents per \$100 bank shares at 21.57 cents; Health Department at 3.2 cents; Library at 2.4 cents and three cents an acre on forest land for fire fighting.

Still to be reported are the rates for schools, soil conservation and extension services. The county assessment shows real estate at \$130,312,085; tangible property such as cars and boats at \$7,528,215; public service franchise (telephone, electric) \$2,664,995; public service franchise intangible (trucks, service vehicles) \$13,257,994; and bank shares, \$5,377,070.

The state tax rate on real estate is 21.6 cents per \$100; tangible 45 cents, and intangible, 25 cents per \$100.

In other action the court approved a final settlement for 1985-86 taxes with former Sheriff William Taylor figured at \$5,689 and a half-year with Sheriff Clarence Hasty for \$28,417.02 with an overpayment of \$80.81.

In other action, the court approved "hiring the firm of Chrisman, Miller, Woodford, Inc., of Lexington, engineers and architects, to draw up plans to remodel the county jail to meet some changes prescribed by law at a cost not to exceed \$2,500.

The county has a \$30,000 grant to do the work which calls for a deadline use of the money by

The court took under advisement changes in the county's proposed garbage collection plan presented by the Cumberland Valley Area Development District. The state had asked for clarification of 16 items which the CVADD had made under state direction.

The court decided to examine the changes in the lengthy document before approving them, and set 1 p.m. Aug 14 to take up the changes at a called meeting.

Sheriff Clarence Hasty asked the court to consider incurring the county jail personnel/jailer and the sheriff and personnel for liability. The cost of the police is

Greenboxes are an aggravation

Those nasty greenboxes still bother the Rockcastle Fiscal Court, so at a meeting Tuesday the court took steps to remedy the problem of unauthorized trash that accumulates around them.

The court voted to hire Tom Denney to keep the area around the boxes clean at a salary of \$600 a month. All magistrates voted "yes."

The court also amended its garbage ordinance to include a \$20 fine and \$47.50 court costs for dumping items other than plastic-bagged household garbage. It also prohibited persons from climbing into the dumpsters and opening bags.

The court agreed tree limbs, brush and other large items were taking up space that is reserved for household bags.

All magistrates voted "yes" on the fine except Donald Bullock, who abstained.

To make matters worse, the court was informed the garbage collection rates from Laurel Garbage is increasing from \$87 a load to \$105 a load, because of what the company said was a 300 percent increase in insurance costs, the court approved the increase.

large surplus of tobacco which had driven up our growers' no-net-cost fees, and will put the tobacco price-support system back on sound financial footing. Another sale is expected later this year, with all of the old tobacco to be sold off within five years.

Meanwhile, we continued to be active in tending off the attacks of the anti-tobacco forces in Congress. This past week I

insisted at the congressional hearing on legislation which would ban all advertising and promotion of tobacco products.

The issue of the advertising ban is simply another "smoke screen" for those who want to nullify tobacco. Not only is this legislation unconstitutional, it is yet another infringement into the private decisions of millions of adult Americans.

As with the proposals to ban smoking in federal buildings and in the military, the real intent of this advertising ban is to pull us one step closer to a prohibition on tobacco. Since those who oppose tobacco do not have the courage to try and outlaw the use of tobacco upright, they are reduced to using these back-door methods of harassing tobacco companies and smokers.

I told the subcommittee which held the hearing that any such ban would be a direct violation of the First Amendment, which prohibits laws which limit free speech. Opening the door of censorship to ban cigarette and tobacco ads could lead to even more limits on what and how products could be advertised. The fact is that there is no evidence anywhere to even suggest that such ads cause smoking. In fact, it is generally agreed, even by the Surgeon General himself, that tobacco ads only promote specific brands of tobacco for people who already smoke.

I also told the subcommittee that smoking is a decision which adults make for themselves. We do not need or want the federal government forcing itself even further on individual rights, and

Sue Bennett announces JTPA for three counties

Sue Bennett College has been funded through the JTPA to provide Basic Job Skills training to low-income residents of Whitley, Rockcastle and Laurel Counties.

The purpose is to give participants the necessary skills so that they may be employed in a wide variety of jobs in this area. "Area business leaders and personnel managers have identified the areas of competency needed: communication skills, typing skills, simple math skills used in everyday life and personal development skills. Thus, the Sue Bennett College JTPA concentrates on training participants in these areas.

In addition to giving participants training, the program concentrates on placing them in jobs. One of the major concerns is to help those finishing the course to find jobs.

The JTPA project will conduct a twelve-week training program for twenty participants beginning in September and for twenty more beginning in February. Each session will be held five days a week for an eight hour day - just as if they were a regular job.

Participants will attend classes in basic typing, math, record-keeping, business communications, computer literacy, personal development and communication skills. These classes will be individualized to allow each person time to progress at his or her own pace. Ample time will be set aside for study periods and extra

instructions will be.

In order to be eligible, a participant must meet income guidelines and be a resident of Whitley, Rockcastle, or Laurel County. Anyone who meets these requirements, regardless of race, sex, age, religion, or national origin, is invited to apply.

All materials (books, pencils, paper, etc.) will be furnished by the JTPA. The only cost to the participant will be transportation.

While we continue to fight off the opponents of tobacco, our growers got some good news this past week.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that 70 million pounds of the drought-damaged 1983 burley crop, now in storage, has now been sold off to several cigarette companies, raising some \$44 million. The sale was part of the new burley system which we in Congress worked out this year. This sale will help alleviate the

Missing Children

The Kentucky State Police will participate in a pilot project that is designed to test an innovative computer system involving missing children. The program, called "Lifenet," consists of a micro-computer system, a television camera and

monitor. Lifenet is designed to record the photo image of a missing child and transmit this image along with descriptive data to other states and Canada.

The Kentucky Missing Child Information Center, located in the Kentucky State Police Intelligence Section, has already received the equipment necessary to set up the system. Lt. David VanMeter, of the intelligence section, says Lifenet is a progressive step in the area of missing children. "This system will be able to transmit data and a picture of the child in a matter of minutes, instead of days." The center acts as the clearinghouse for information on missing children in Kentucky.

Six other states, two agencies and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police are also involved in this pilot project, along with Kentucky. The six states are Illinois, New York, New Jersey, North Carolina, Colorado and Texas. Two agencies based in Washington D.C., the National Crime Information Center and the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, are also participating. Equipment for the program was provided by a federal, state and private cooperative effort. The National Center for Missing and Exploited Children sponsors the program.

Lt. VanMeter says the system will begin operation in late August.

and an bad would clearly be further harassment of smokers. While I am hopeful this legislation will not be given serious consideration this year, it is still important that those of us in tobacco country speak out against these attempted intrusions into private decisions. Tobacco will continue to be an important part of Kentucky's agricultural economy for many years to come. It is a legal and legitimate product which helps support 40,000 tobacco growers and their families in the Fifth District alone.

I will continue to stand up for our tobacco growers whenever they are threatened by those who want to put those families out of business and on our welfare rolls.

Your Child's Health

By Dr. John Payne

Patients frequently wonder if they or their child are "allergic" to certain foods. Allergy means different things to patients and to doctors. Recently saw a series of definitions in an allergy handout which seem helpful. The following may help you to complain to your doctor more knowledgeably or at least with bigger words.

1. Adverse reaction or sensitivity to a food is a general term. I use to describe any kind of trouble, whether allergic or non-allergic.

2. Food allergy or hypersensitivity, often an overused term, means the body's immune system responds in an abnormal way

to the food or additive, even after a small amount is eaten. Often this is on a genetic basis. Wheezing after drinking milk is an example. Breaking out in hives from eating strawberries is another example.

3. Food intolerance means an abnormal response to a food that is not on an allergic basis. Diarrhea and cramping after drinking milk due to absence of the enzyme to break down lactose or milk sugar is the best example. This is genetic but not allergic in nature.

4. Food anaphylaxis means a severe allergic reaction, often fatal. "Did you hear that Aunt Mary ate a shrimp at the beach and fell over dead?" Fortunately these reactions are rare. Usually

one would know from prior experience that they were having problems with a food before such a reaction.

5. Food poisoning means getting sick from toxins produced by bacteria or other organisms in food that has spoiled. Dairy products, eggs and cereased pastries can often harbor such organisms if the food is not properly refrigerated after preparation. You will not get sick next time you eat such food if it is not spoiled.

6. Pharmacologic food reaction means an adverse reaction from some chemical in the food. "The caffeine in that coffee gave me the 'jitters' is a common example.

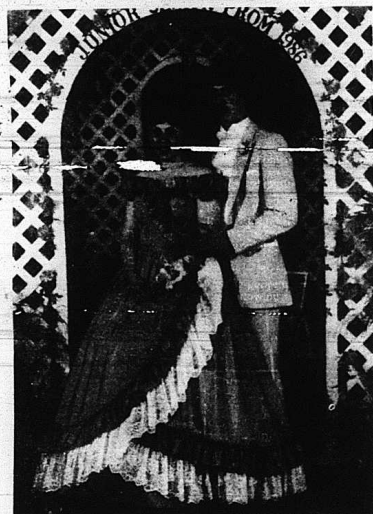

grown so far this year for the commercial market by central Kentucky farmers. (That's about \$5.5 million peppers.)

Bell peppers are the most popular and well known variety on the market. Bell peppers, generally are marketed when dark green, the immature stage, although the bright red, mature peppers are more popular.

A medium-sized green pepper contains about 15 calories, per about 20 calories. Both are good sources of vitamins A and C, with the red pepper containing a slightly higher amount.

When you buy fresh peppers, select those with firm, thick flesh, free from rot or blemishes. Avoid those that are soft, limp, shriveled or pliable. Sweet green peppers are available every month of the year, with the heaviest supplies from May to October.

Store peppers in the refrigerator to keep them crisp. Fresh sweet peppers are perishable so don't store them too long. For extended storage, freeze chopped or sliced peppers in freezer bags. With peppers and onions there is no need to pretreat or blanch the vegetables before freezing. Wash and completely dry the peppers before storage or use.

Peppers can be used in many ways such as stuffed, sautéed, in salads, casseroles or salsas, or as a garnish. Some recipes suggest you peel the skin, except those you intend to stuff, to release a more distinctive flavor.

To peel, put the pepper under the broiler and broil, turning the pepper frequently, until the skin turns black. Let the pepper cool slightly then pinch and pull the skin away with your fingers. (Use the point of a knife on stubborn spots.) To make peeling easier, place the pepper in a paper bag or wrap in a damp paper towel before peeling. The steam given off helps to loosen the skin. Remove the stem and seeds before using.

Vegetable Stuffed Green Peppers

5 large green peppers

- 1/4 C. thinly sliced green onions
- 1/4 C. thinly sliced celery
- 2 Tbsp. melted butter or margarine
- 2 C. fresh corn
- 1/2 C. cooked rice
- 1 med. tomato, peeled and chopped
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. pepper
- 1/4 C. shredded Cheddar cheese, divided
- 1 (15 oz.) can tomato sauce, divided

Cut off top of each green pepper; remove seeds. Cook peppers in boiling salted water to tender 5 minutes; drain. Set aside. Sauté green onions and celery in butter until tender. Stir in corn, rice, tomato, chili powder, salt and pepper. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until thoroughly heated. Remove from heat, and stir in 1/4

cup cheese and 1/2 cup tomato sauce.

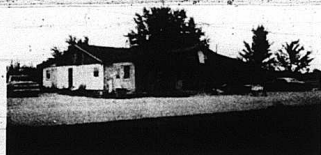

ORDINANCE NO. 349

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MOUNT VERNON, KENTUCKY, PROHIBITING PARKING ON DESIGNATED STREETS DURING CERTAIN HOURS.

Whereas, it is necessary that certain streets be kept free from parked vehicles for a period of time sufficient to permit the sweeping of said streets, now therefore:

Be it ordained by the City Council of Mount Vernon, Kentucky as follows:

Section 1: It shall be unlawful for any person to cause a motor vehicle to be parked between the hours of 2:00 a.m. to 4:00 a.m. daily on the following streets:

Main Street from the intersection of First Street west to the railroad crossing

Richmond Street from the railroad crossing to Main Street

First Street from U.S. 25 to Main Street

Church Street from U.S. 25 to Main Street

Section 2: Any person who violates Section 1 of this Ordinance shall be fined a sum not to exceed \$10.00 for the first offense and a sum not to exceed \$20.00 for the second and each subsequent offense.

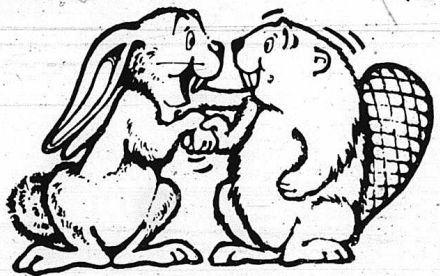

Grant Petrey again hired as Brodhead policeman

A familiar face is back on the streets of Brodhead.

Grant Petrey, former city policeman, was hired in his old job at a meeting of the Brodhead City Council Monday night.

Petrey began work Tuesday in time to help police the fairgrounds. He replaces Bill Lawrence.

Petrey was a policeman at Brodhead beginning in 1949 and remained in that position for over 16 years. He will retire in a month from a security job, at the Bluegrass Army Depot. He has been in police work for most of his adult life, including Corbin and Williamsburg.

As a policeman he will receive \$850 a month.

In other action Monday night, the council voted to furnish water to eight homes on Chestnut Ridge Road. The residents will pay for the materials and the city will install the water lines. It was the end of a long effort by Bernice Cummins who had visited the council on several occasions to ask for city water service.

The council also voted to take bids on blacktop for two streets. One street leads to the residence of Martha Owens; the other, a one-way street between Billy Riddle's residence and Main Street.

Jimmy Cass was approved as administrator for the city to handle its affairs pertaining to an Urban Development Grant for Mt. Vernon Plastics located in the Rockcastle Industrial Park. The grant, as reported earlier, is for \$433,125 and goes toward expansion at the plant.

Prior to the meeting, mem-

bers of the city council walked through the new fire station under construction next door to the city hall. The impressive building was designed and built by Lawson Whitt and helpers.

City Councilman D.A. Robbins said the building looks substantial, but it is larger than he expected.

Cost of the building that will also house the new county fire truck is about \$38,000. The city hopes for a grant of about \$15,000 to help with construction costs.

"Third Applicant" From Front from Cochran-Smith Broadcasting of Goodlettsville, Tenn., near Nashville, owned by J. Hal Smith who is also owner of WRVW-AM in Mt. Vernon, and by George L. (Leo) Hunt and Pauline C. Hunt, his wife, of Mt. Vernon.

No word has come from the FCC when a permit for construction will be approved. The tower and transmitter for the Daugherty station would be located off Ky. 70, a half-mile south of Quail. Like the other applicants, it would be channel 25A.

The application states the programs will consist of local news, weather and public affairs and country music, and will "address the problems, needs and interests of Mt. Vernon."

"Mt. Vernon faces a number of local problems, many of which relate to its rural location," the applications reads. "The station will address these problems through regular public affairs programming and a local news-reporting service specifically aimed at Mt. Vernon. The station will have portable news-gathering facilities."

Agricultural Exports: More Aggressive Trade Policies Needed

The major theme voiced at the Kentucky Agricultural Export Conference held recently was that upcoming decisions on trade policy could have a significant impact on the strength of our farm sales abroad.

The participants in the conference, which included the Deputy U.S. Trade Representative, all agreed that we must pursue farm product sales abroad more aggressively. The question is how? If we penalize countries that exploit U.S. markets unfairly or set up barriers to importing our products, we risk losing those countries entirely as buyers of our farm products. A trade bill now before Congress presents this risk and some countries have already said they will retaliate against U.S. exports if the bill, as it now reads, becomes law.

Obviously, with agricultural exports in a downturn at present, we can ill afford to lose foreign markets. A more aggressive trade strategy can strengthen our farm sales abroad, even with domestic problems such as the strong dollar and the selling price of some farm products. And, I believe we have the tools available to us to be more aggressive without starting a trade war.

We offer the largest marketplace in the world. This is a tremendous incentive for countries whose economies depend heavily on the American market to consider our trade terms.

Take, for example, South Korea. At the Agricultural Export Conference, the South Korean Ambassador to the U.S. went to great lengths to emphasize how important the U.S. and Korea are to each other and how the trade relationship between the two countries must be developed. He pointed to the opening of the Korean market to U.S. cigarettes as an example.

Simply put, without the U.S. market the South Korean economy would not be booming the way it is now. But even with this dependency, it took vocal threats of removing Korea's trade preferences with the U.S. to get action.

I believe the threat of action, as part of our trade negotiations, is a way to help boost exports without necessarily erecting trade barriers. Recommendations from the National Commission on Agricultural Trade and Export Policy, which were discussed at the conference, support this approach while also arguing that trade embargoes need not be used for political reasons.

We still have not regained grain sales lost from the Soviet grain embargo in the 1970s. And we can expect further farm export losses if protectionist trade measures are passed. As the Deputy U.S. Trade Representative stated at the conference, retaliation may be necessary to address the unfair trade practices of some countries toward our agricultural products. For my part, I think pressuring a specific country to open their trade doors (as I did with Korea) is a very efficient approach and one I intend to employ in the future.

Dry, hot weather in state continues to stress crops and increase chance of insect disease damage

The dry, hot weather Kentucky continues to experience is stressing crops—and increasing

chances of insect and disease damage to the plants.

"Nearly all crops are beginning to show stress from the high temperatures and the lack of adequate rain," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

"Black shank continues to be a problem in many tobacco fields, and insects like grasshoppers, worms, aphids, and Japanese Beetles are becoming problems in corn, tobacco and soybean acreage."

As of August 1, soil moisture across the Commonwealth was rated 44 percent very short, 46 percent short and 10 percent adequate by reporters for the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service.

The 1986 barley crop is blooming and maturing earlier than normal, but continues behind growth at this time last year. About 35 percent of the crop has been topped this year. Taht compares with 55 percent at this time last year and 22 percent for the five-year average.

More than 50 percent of the dark-type tobacco has been topped. Though cutting began in some central Kentucky counties last week, the average date for cutting to begin should be around August 5.

Condition of tobacco is reported at 1 percent very poor, 14 percent poor, 68 percent fair to

percent good and 1 percent excellent.

Early-planted corn continues to do well despite the lack of rain and the extremes in heat. The crop is rated at 9 percent poor, 54 percent fair, 31 percent good and 6 percent excellent.

The crop is 50 percent in the dough or beyond stage of maturity. This compares with 38 percent at this stage last year and 16 percent for the five-year average. Approximately 7 percent of the corn is still in the pre-silking stage of production.

Later-planted corn is suffering from the hot and dry conditions. Some fields have heavy infestations of grasshoppers and worms, despite increasing problems with aphids and Japanese Beetles, the soybean crop is rated at 7 percent poor, 67 percent fair, 21 percent good and 5 percent excellent.

About 64 percent of the crop is at blooming or beyond stage. This compares with 52 percent at this stage last year and 48 percent for the five-year average.

The hay crop continues to decline with the hot, dry weather. The statistics service reports rate the crop at 12 percent very poor, 37 percent poor, 44 percent fair, 6 percent good and 1 percent excellent.

Rains are needed soon to produce a good fall for hay.

Pasture conditions are rated mostly poor to fair. Some livestock producers have begun feeding hay.

The sorghum crop is rated in fair condition by the statistics service.

Housing loans for low-income

Low-income families in rural areas may find some help with home financing after the recent reinstatement of \$700 million in previously deferred housing loan funds, said State Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. I The funds will be available through September 30 to help finance single-family or multi-family housing units for low-income families in rural areas, according to Kendall L. Seaton, state director of the Farmers Home Administration in Kentucky.

FMHA field offices will begin processing housing applications immediately, Seaton said. "Since the processing of farm loans is now complete, we can give additional attention to rural housing loans," Seaton said. "Special emphasis will be placed on servicing those eligible persons in greatest need."

FMHA has made loans totaling \$1,835 billion for housing in fiscal year 1986. About \$42.6 million has been loaned for housing in Kentucky.
