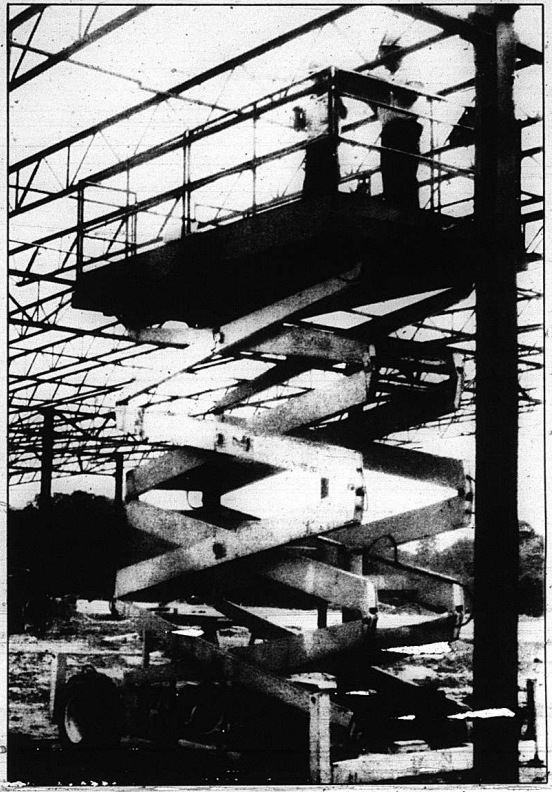

**I. NOTICE**

Pursuant to KRS 67.077 and 103.210, Notice is hereby given that an Ordinance, the title of which is set forth below, was introduced and given first reading by the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, at a duly held meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court in the Courthouse, in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, on August 5, 1986, and was given second reading and passed after a public hearing at a duly held meeting in the Courthouse, in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, on August 21, 1986, at 1:00 p.m., local time.

**II. TITLE**

AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF THE COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, KENTUCKY, INDUSTRIAL BUILDING REVENUE BONDS (MT. VERNON PLASTICS CORPORATION PROJECT), SERIES A AND B, 1986, IN THE AGGREGATE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$4,500,000.

**SUMMARY**

A summary of said ordinance is as follows:

A. The Ordinance authorizes and approves the County of Rockcastle, Kentucky, Industrial Building Revenue Bonds (Mt. Vernon Plastics Corporation Project), Series A and B, 1986, in the aggregate principal amount of Four Million Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$4,500,000), for the purpose of financing the costs of the acquisition of the real property and improvements and related items of machinery and equipment located in the Rockcastle Multi-County Industrial Park, to be owned and operated by Mt. Vernon Plastics Corporation, a Kentucky corporation (the "Borrower") and used in the operation of the Borrower as a facility involving molding presses, thermo forming equipment, plastic extruders and plastic processing and packaging equipment related thereto (the "Project"), Series A Bonds to be in the amount of \$900,000 for the acquisition of real property and the construction of improvements thereon and Series B Bonds to be in the amount of \$3,600,000 for the acquisition of machinery and equipment, pursuant to a Loan, Mortgage and Security Agreement (the "Loan Agreement") between the County and the Borrower.

B. The Ordinance authorizes and approves the execution of (1) the Loan Agreement, whereby the Bonds will be retired from the proceeds of loan payments to be received from the Borrower as authorized by KRS 103.200 through 103.285, as amended, inclusive, (2) a Trust Indenture between the County and First National Bank of Louisville, Louisville, Kentucky, as Trustee (the "Bank"), which sets forth the terms and conditions upon which the Bonds are to be issued and outstanding, and (3) a Bond Purchase Agreement setting forth the terms of the sale of the Bonds to the purchaser thereof (the "Bondholder").

C. The Ordinance designates the Bank as Trustee for the Bondholder, and authorizes the Trustee to make procedures for the disbursement of the proceeds of the Bonds.

D. The Ordinance provides that the Bonds shall not constitute an indebtedness of the County within the meaning of the Constitution but shall be payable only as set forth therein.

E. The Ordinance authorizes the County Judge/Executive and other County officials to take any other necessary actions, including executing the appropriate arbitrage certifications, to effect the issuance and delivery of the Bonds.

The full text of the Bond Ordinance is on file in the office of the undersigned County Clerk between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and 4:00 P.M., Monday through Friday, in the Courthouse in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, where it is available for public inspection. (Signed) Hubert Packer, County Judge/Executive.

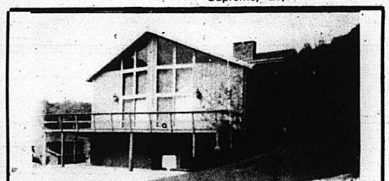

**Rogers to visit**  
Fifth District U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Somerset, will hold a town meeting at 10 a.m. Wednesday, Aug. 27 at the Rockcastle County Courthouse. Everyone is invited to attend and ask questions that might be of interest to them.

**For those who asked**  
There have been several sightings of unidentified objects (UFOs) in Rockcastle County over the years, but none have been reported for over five years that we know of. We'll try to locate a report of them in the Signal, if possible. Last week a mysterious boom and light was heard and seen around Winchester that had everyone in an uproar, which probably prompted inquiries past sightings here.

**Watch those skunks**  
Residents have been warned by the Kentucky Health Department to steer clear of skunks, especially since they are carriers of rabies and the incidence of the dread disease is up this summer. Also, residence should watch their dogs, cats and other meat-eating animals closely for changes. There have been 57 cases found in skunks in 28 Kentucky counties.

**Personal plates**  
For those who want personalized license plates, an application must be submitted to the Kentucky Department of Transportation at Frankfort by Sept. 1, according to County Clerk Norma Houk, who has the applications in her office. Personal plates cost a total of \$38.50.

## Garbage plan goes back to Frankfort

A garbage plan for Rockcastle County with no noticeable changes from the original plan, passed the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a called meeting last Thursday afternoon.

The plan now goes or has already gone, to the state for approval.

After a lively session in which the magistrates closely questioned authors of the plan, the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), Magistrate Jack Bradley made a motion to approve the plan, seconded by Doug Bishop. All magistrates voted "yes." County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker abstained.

The motion was passed with the stipulation that the county has the authority to plan and implement the plan.

The court also stipulated that the plan be on a voluntary basis:

- that it be countywide;
- that it take effect immediately after approval;
- that it cover 100 percent of the people;
- that it be privately financed; and finally, that the county participate in the state-mandated Clean Community Program.

Some of the magistrates reported they had had many telephone calls from the rate Mt. Vernon residents who oppose making garbage collection in Mt. Vernon mandatory.

At Mt. Vernon, the city has a garbage collection contract with William K. Bullen that will be in effect until 1988, at which time, according to the State Attorney General, the county has the option to incorporate the city into the county system.

The contract originally was a joint one between Bullen and Sheriff Clarence Hasty. When

## County joins with Laurel, Jackson on river project

A three-county agreement that could eventually lead to the issuance of \$150 million in revenue bonds to construct a dam on the headwaters of the Rockcastle River as part of an industrial authority was approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a called meeting last week.

The cooperative agreement between Laurel, Rockcastle and Jackson counties designates Laurel County the issuer of the bonds and gives that county the authority to act on behalf of the three counties.

According to John Bruner, executive director of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), which is spearheading the project, Rockcastle County will not be financially responsible concerning the matter. That statement was included in the minutes of the court meeting.

A motion by Magistrate Amos Burdette, seconded by Glen Ellison, to authorize County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker to sign the resolution on behalf of the court All voted "yes" including Judge Thacker.

The resolution gives the CVADD authority to begin a feasibility study of the project named the Parker's Branch Lake Industrial Authority, to determine if the project would be profitable.

The dam is planned to be hydro-electric with sale of the electricity to any utility company that would use it which including the Jackson County Co-op and Kentucky Utilities.

The project would have to be approved on the national level and

a permit issued prior to construction.

The estimated 7,000-acre lake would also furnish much-needed water to McKee and Jackson County, and be used for recreation. It could add jobs through industrial development.

Flood control on the Rockcastle River probably would not be a major factor, at least it was not a major factor in 1962 when the Army Corps of Engineers planned to construct a dam at the Narrows of the Rockcastle River to harness a controlled water supply for Lake Cumberland. The river empties into Lake Cumberland.

In the final analysis, the dam might not be hydro-electric, but a water source for McKee and for recreation. CVADD officials said.

There has been no word from the Corps of Engineers on their attitude toward the project.

As visualized by CVADD, the dam would be located at a point between the Ky. 490 bridge and Horse Lick bridge, just barely inside Rockcastle County. Water behind the dam would back within three or four miles of McKee and about the same distance from East Bernstadt. Any direct benefits to Rockcastle County would be with the exception of furnishing water to the Reel Hill section of the county. What effect it would have on the level of water in the Rockcastle River from Lamer to Lake Cumberland would have to

## More money needed for jail

Ending itself between a rock and a hard place, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court had no alternative but to add about \$500 to the fees charged by a Lexington engineering and consulting firm that will plan changes at the county jail.

The court met in a called session Tuesday to discuss the additional money and to finally approve it.

Jim Woodrum, a representative of the firm Christian, Miller and Woodford, Inc., who had estimated the cost of the plans at \$2,500, told the court he had failed to include "reimbursable expenses" in the deal.

Placed with a Nov. 30 deadline to spend \$30,000 left from a previous Corrections Cabinet grant made to Rockcastle, the court approved the money.

Woodrum also had more bad news for the court. Instead of the \$30,000 thought needed to make the renovation to meet state standards, the project will cost about \$18,000.

The added \$18,000 resulted when tests at the jail showed 25 percent of the walls and ceiling had asbestos. State law limits asbestos in a public building to two percent. It will all have to be

removed before the changes are made calling for the estimated additional \$18,000.

The county, as has many counties in the state, has been warned by the Corrections Cabinet to make changes in the jail or close it. Estimates are it would cost considerably more to transport prisoners to another jail than to upgrade the jail, if other facilities were available.

The new changes call for a drunk tank, a holding tank, a visiting area, one six-bed dormitory and a four bed dormitory

## Drug epidemic invading our society

No other social ill has caused more crime, more devastation of families and individuals, and more problems for society in general as has the drug epidemic.

Estimates indicate that as many as 5 million people are currently cocaine users, with 1.2 million of those addicted to this lethal drug. In addition, there are an estimated 25 million people who are considered regular users of marijuana. These drugs are sapping our nation's strength by breaking down our families and schools, causing death and injuries, and leading to much of our nation's crime problem.

But as Congress and the President are now waging a major assault on this drug problem on a number of fronts, And my House Appropriations Committee has already allocated new resources in our fight to stop the flow of illegal drugs coming into the United States.

For example, dramatic increases in funds for the U.S. Coast Guard, the Customs Service and the Drug Enforcement Admini-

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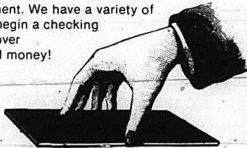

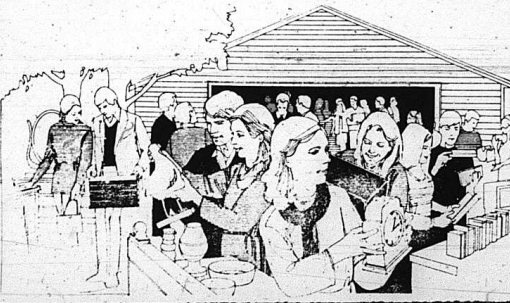

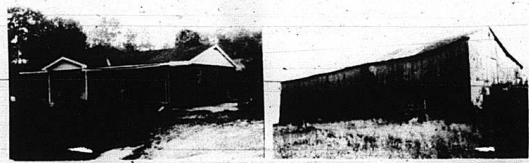

I have supported these efforts to increase funding for drug enforcement and to mobilize government and business in this renewed war on drugs. Only by attacking this problem across the board can we truly move our nation toward a drug-free society.

## Rising liability insurance rates will be topic of Governor's conference

Rising liability insurance rates for local governments is among the topics to be addressed at the 1986 Governor's Local Issues Conference, Gov. Collins announced. The conference will be held Aug. 20-22 at Louisville's Galt House East hotel.

"In recent years, liability insurance rates for local governments have increased to such an extent as to be prohibitive to local budgets," Gov. Collins said. "At the 1986 Local Issues Conference, we will hear from both sides of this crucial issue—trial attorneys and representatives of the insurance industry. New studies, comparative analysis and other vital data will be offered as well as options and alternative sources of assistance."

Among the conference highlights will be a keynote address by David Broder, syndicated Washington Post columnist. Workshops scheduled for the conference will address topics such as the role of local governments in economic

strategy have already been approved by the House. We have increased next year's budget for the Coast Guard by \$154 million, the Customs Service by \$76 million and the D.E.A. by \$48 million. We have also allocated more funding for the Federal Reserve System, so that we can house more people convicted of drug-related crimes.

But enforcement of the law is only one aspect of solving our drug problem. We also need to do more to reduce the demand for drugs. And here, President Reagan, Mrs. Reagan are taking the lead. The President's recent speech on drugs "laid out six areas, that we need to move on in order to reduce drug addiction. Those six initiatives include:

- a) working for a drug-free workplace for all Americans
- b) drug-free schools
- c) development of treatment for drug addiction
- d) international cooperation
- e) strengthening law enforcement

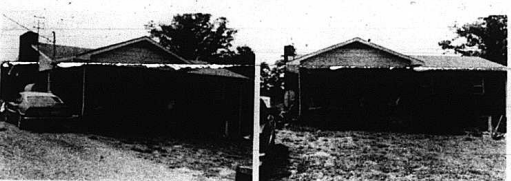

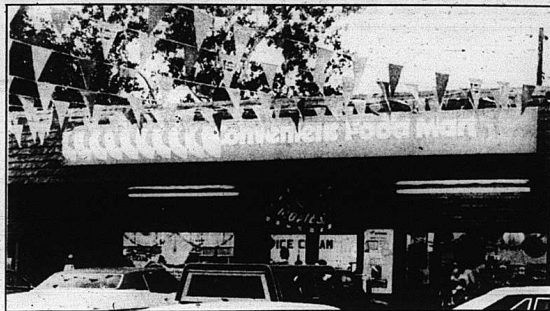

After a somewhat dismal season last year, head coach Tom Larkey is looking for a better year, as his 1986 edition of the Rockcastle County Rockets football team prepares for their season opener against Everts on August 29th.

"If we can't stay healthy we should be able to have better than a five hundred season," Larkey said Tuesday, "but injuries have already started to hit the team and right now we have two seniors out," he said.

Senior guard Greg Rowe and senior tight end Johnny Kirby are both presently unable to take part in the contact part of the Rocket's practices. Kirby has a shoulder problem, which is yet to be diagnosed and Rose is out with an ankle injury. The two are part of

only six seniors that Larkey says will play a lot for his ball club this season.

Larkey says that he is looking for a big year out of Cox and Hamilton. Both play on the Rockets front line as well as on defense. Speaking of defense Mike Whitehead is another player Larkey thinks must have a good year for the Rockets to be successful. Whitehead, a senior will play defensive end.

Coach Larkey is optimistic that his young backfield can provide the offensive punch this season. "Our biggest threat is sophomore tailback Rodney Kirby," Larkey said. Kirby is presently taking somewhat easier than usual because of the fact that he had surgery on his shoulder

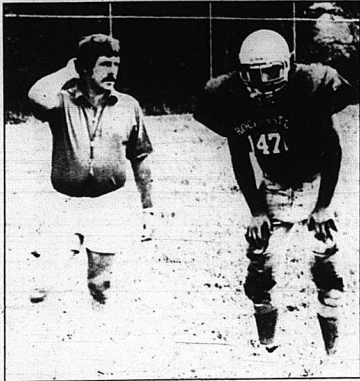
only six weeks ago and he has not completely healed. But, Larkey says that Kirby will be ready come Aug. 29.

Unlike other legislation introduced to protect the Social Security and Medicare Trust Funds, the Safeguard Act explicitly directs the Treasury to make payroll taxes and other appropriations immediately available to the Trust Funds, exclusively to pay benefits and administrative costs. The legislation assures beneficiaries Social Security will be able to pay benefits on time. Our government promised American workers 50 years ago payroll taxes would only be used to pay for Social Security benefits. By passing this legislation, we can protect the financial security of older Americans and help restore the confidence of working Americans in Social Security and Medicare. ## Strong storm hits Brodhead

The weather bureau said there was the chance of a thunderstorm. They were right in Brodhead and western Rockcastle counties Wednesday morning.

A severe wind, rain and hail storm swept across a narrow path about 11 p.m. Tuesday night downing trees, flattening tobacco and knocking out electricity for about two hours.

Reports of as much as two inches of rain fell during the storm, but that was unofficial. By contrast, at Mt. Vernon only .20 of an inch of rain fell at the weather station at Cox Funeral Home.

A torrent of water poured into the business section of Brodhead and ran into some businesses. Rocks had to be cleared from the streets Wednesday morning.

Out in the county, reports were that at least three small wooden bridges were washed out. Water reportedly picked one bridge up and set it across the road.

Almost every tobacco patch in the path of the storm was flattened and some cases damaged by hail. Some can be salvaged, one farmer reported.

## County men sentenced

Three Rockcastle County men were sentenced last week in Circuit Court for crimes they committed in Rockcastle County on guilty pleas.

Earl Overby of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary by Circuit Judge Dan Venters after he pleaded guilty to the December 3, 1986 theft of a pick-up belonging to Robert Bryant. The pick-up was later recovered by police.

Gary Hastly, also of Mt. Vernon, was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for the September 1986 robbery of the Freddie Noe residence in Mt. Vernon.

Hasty was sentenced to five years in the penitentiary for 2nd degree burglary. He was also ordered to pay Noe \$3,500 in restitution for the guns that were stolen.

Gary Randolph, of Crab Orchard, was sentenced to 3 years in the penitentiary on three different charges.

Venters sentenced Randolph to one year each after he pleaded guilty to two counts of criminal possession of a forged instrument. He also pleaded guilty to a May 22 escape from the Rockcastle County jail, in which he got 1 year.

All three men are presently lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

## Burnside doctor pleads guilty in case involving lawyer Lester Burns

Former Rockcastle County Commonwealth Attorney Lester H. Burns could be in big trouble. The kind of trouble that even the flamboyant Somerset attorney can't escape.

Burns, who was appointed by former Kentucky Gov. John Y. Brown, to fill the unexpired term of now Congressman Harold Rogers, served Rockcastle and Pulaski counties as Commonwealth attorney in 1980 and '81.

Burns was one of 16 people who was named in a Federal indictment in March after a three-year probe of allegations of corruption in Eastern Kentucky.

Monday a Burnside doctor, Bill David pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court in London, to conspiring with Burns to commit mail fraud as part of a scheme to defraud two insurance companies of \$1.1 million.

In a plea agreement with the U.S. attorney's office, David agreed to cooperate with the government in its prosecution of

Burns. The indictments against Burns alleged that he set up a phony traffic accident in 1985 involving Robert W. Comer, a felon from Virginia who was working with police, and Houston McNeal, an undercover Virginia state trooper.

Burns then filed suit on behalf of McNeal against Comer in an attempt to collect \$1 million from an Arizona company and \$100,000 from an Oklahoma company with which Comer had insurance.

Davis, who at the time operated a Burnside Clinic, examined McNeal and certified that he sustained a neck injury in the fake accident, the indictment said.

During a rearrignment Monday in U.S. District Court, Davis told Judge Eugene Siler he knew about the scheme.

The only overt act Davis admitted committing to further the insurance scam was prescribing a cervical collar for McNeal to wear.

Siler accepted Davis' guilty plea, for which he could receive a sentence of five years in prison, a \$100,000 fine, or both.

## Another \$16 million for 461

Approval of \$16 million dollars to help toward rebuilding of Ky. 461 in Rockcastle and Pulaski counties has been approved by the U.S. House of Representatives, according to an announcement by Fifth District Rep. Harold Rogers, R-Somerset.

The inclusion of the project came as part of the Surface Transportation Act which the House approved Friday night by a vote of 354-34.

"This old highway is a major bottleneck," Rogers said, "to and from southern Kentucky

and is of major importance to the development of Lake Cumberland and National Park," Rogers said.

"This \$16 million allocation will allow us to rebuild this road so that we can finally realize the potential of the entire area," Rogers said.

The Congressman noted that while the House includes the \$16 million for Ky. 461, there is no mention of the project in the Senate's version of the new legislation.

"Obviously, the battle," Rogers stated, "I will now be pushing for our side to keep the House funding for the highway in the final version of the bill."

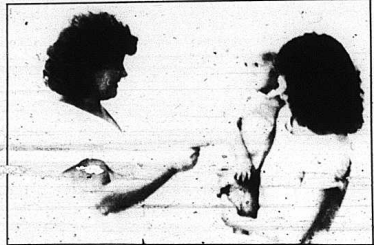

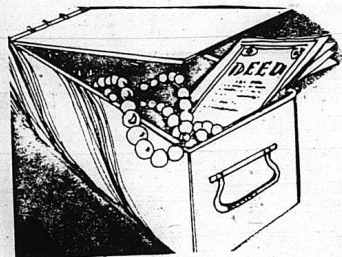

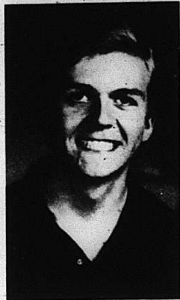

# YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

**By Social Security Manager**

In an effort to help Medicare patients understand their rights to quality care in the Nation's hospitals, a nationwide effort is being made to provide them with more information about hospital discharges and their right to appeal discharge decisions. The greater awareness is expected to reduce instances of so called "quicker and sicker" discharges and the public perception of declining quality of hospital care for Medicare patients.

Under the plan, a message explaining patients' rights and appeal procedures will be provided to all of the more than 9 million Medicare patients admitted each year to hospitals which are reimbursed under Medicare's prospective payment system.

This new system has resulted in the need for greater patient awareness of appeal rights under the Medicare program. Under the prospective payment system, which went into effect in October 1983, hospital services for Medicare patients are reimbursed according to pre-set rates, which vary according to diagnosis. The rates reflect average costs of treating specific conditions.

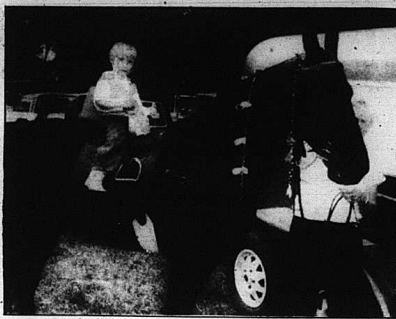
As the "message from Medicare" explains, hospitals must inform Medicare patients 48 hours in advance of a hospital-initiated discharge.

If patients feel they are being asked to leave the hospital prematurely, they or their authorized representative should file an appeal by telephone or in writing with the peer review organization (PRO), a physician organization under contract with Medicare


to review the hospital treatment of Medicare patients. The PRO will review the case in question and decide within 3 working days after receiving the appeal. If the decision supports the need for continued hospitalization, the patient can remain in the hospital under Medicare payment until the next discharge decision point is reached.

If the PRO decides that Medicare payment is no longer appropriate, the patient becomes liable for all hospital costs starting the third day after receiving the written discharge notice. The name, address, and telephone number of the PRO servicing that hospital will be listed on the written message.

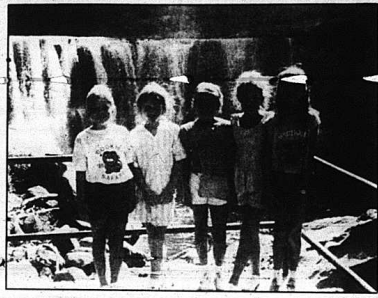
