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## Rainfall improves fishing in state

Fishing activity during the weekend of August 23-24 increased across the state, as several lakes and their surrounding areas received some rainfall over the weekend, which improved fishing.

The lake-by-lake rundown, reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake:

**Kentucky:** Black bass were hitting plastic worms and jigs over brush piles in 5-7 feet of water.

Crappie were taking minnows and large jigs around brush piles and ledges 14-18 feet deep; musky falling slowly; 2-1/2 feet below summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Barkley:** Black bass were

taking plastic worms and crank baits over drop-offs in 5-12 foot of water; catfish were hitting cut bait and minnows still fished over river banks 5-35 feet deep; clear, stable at two feet below summer pool and 84 degrees.

**Barren:** Crappie were hitting minnows fished 12-18 feet deep over brush piles; bluegill were hitting crickets and worms off steep banks 6-12 feet deep; in the tailwaters, crappie were taking minnows, and some hybrid rockfish were hitting topwater lures during early morning hours; clear, stable at summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Nolin:** Black bass were hitting plastic worms at night off steep points and drop-offs in 8-12 foot of water; crappie were taking minnows around stick-ups and over submerged cover; some walleye were being taken by trolling deep runners; clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Rough River:** Crappie were taking minnows still in fished over submerged cover about 15 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits and plastic worms off rocky points in 5-20 feet of water; clear, stable at summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Taylorville:** Black bass were taking crank baits and plastic worms over drop-offs; bluegill were biting worms or crickets near shallow banks; murky, one-half foot below summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Herrington:** Catfish were taking cut baits over river channels; bass were hitting plastic worms off rocky points at night; clear to muddy, falling, 18 feet below summer pool.

**Green River:** Crappie were hitting minnows around drop-offs and submerged free tops in 18-20 feet of water; muskie were being taken on spinners and deep runners over the river beds; clear, falling slowly; one-half foot below summer pool and 81 degrees.

**Cumberland:** Bluegill were hitting crickets and meal worms over submerged cover about 15 feet of water; black bass were being taken on crank baits off deep rocky points in 10-20 feet of water; clear, falling, 21 feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

**Dale Hollow:** Black bass were taking plastic worms off deep banks; bluegill were biting worms and crickets still fished off drop banks and over submerged cover; clear, stable at one foot below summer pool and 86 degrees.

**Laurel:** Trout were taking corn and cheese along steep, rocky cliffs in 20-25 feet of water; bluegill were hitting worms and crickets over brush piles 6-12 feet deep; clear, stable, eight feet below summer pool and 82 degrees.

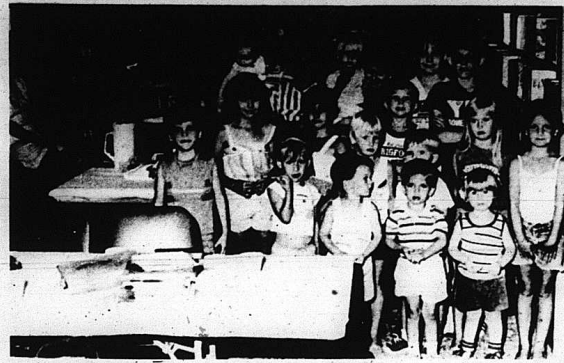

## Rockcastle River area couple struggles with abandoned strip mine

Going to the store, the doctor, the dentist, or even to the mailbox can be a depressing experience for Leonard and Ethel Gabbard.

Their rutted, steep "drive-way" lies beside an unclaimed strip mining site on the Rockcastle River that has been "abandoned since 1979, and there appears little hope for a remedy in the near future."

Located beside the river near old Fort Sequoyah, most people agree the site is unsightly and probably contaminating the river, a real eyesore in the area.

"We've tried everything we can to get something done at the site over the years, but there does

not seem to be much hope," said Mrs. Gabbard, who is 80. "They just up and left the mine when the flood came in December 1978."

"They" is Aubrey Watkins, who owns the site and who mined it until 1980 when the Federal inspectors ordered him to close it.

In recent days, U.S. District Judge Eugene Siler granted a permanent injunction and held Watkins responsible for reclaiming the site estimated to cost about \$517,000.

"We sold the court he did not have that much money. In fact, he is broke. He said his only income is \$5,000 a year from Social Security. So, most likely the site will remain unclaimed until Watkins has the money, or some

government agency steps in to do the job.

To the Gabbards, it's just another legal step that won't help their cause very much.

"We came up here in 1966 and built our home hoping for peace and quiet," Mrs. Gabbard related. "Of course, it was our choice, but there was no mine then. Then came the mine, and you could say, the rest is history."

The Gabbard's believe they have done everything they can to site reclaimed.

"We had no cooperation from anyone," she stated. "We even tried suing and that didn't turn out. The only thing we accomplished in court was to get the county to acquire a deed for

the right-of-way for our road, and a lot of promises."

"The trouble," she continued, "is that politicians don't care about people. They gouge and dig out the black gold and ignore the results. Now they are on a Toyota kick in Frankfort and the rest of us can take the back seat. They don't think of us. They even let them dig up cemeteries and throw the bones away."

She said in earlier days she went to Frankfort often to try for a remedy.

"I really made a nuisance of myself in those days," she recalled. "Every time I would see then Gov. Julian Carroll in passing his face would get as red as a beet."

The mining project started in

1974 when Watkins got Martin Coal Company to strip mine the site. He couldn't get a mining permit because the site was on the river flood plain.

Apparently, to avoid the permit, Watkins set up the Black and White Land Development Company and planned a subdivision on the site, along with a partner, Peyton Smith. Plans were made and subdivision roads were to be conveniently built over coal seams.

The company claimed that they were developing land and not strip mining, but of course would have to do some strip mining to clear the roads in the subdivision. That would not require a mining permit.

According to government Attorney David Parks, that kind of operation was a "common scam" in the 1970's that allowed strip mining under the cloak of land development. It remained common practice until 1980 when the law was changed.

Soon after the mine was shut down, Smith disappeared and Watkins was left "holding the bag."

Watkins was held responsible for reclaiming the mine in 1982. Judge Siler last week granted permanent injunction, that requires Watkins to submit an annual report to the Office of Surface Mining.

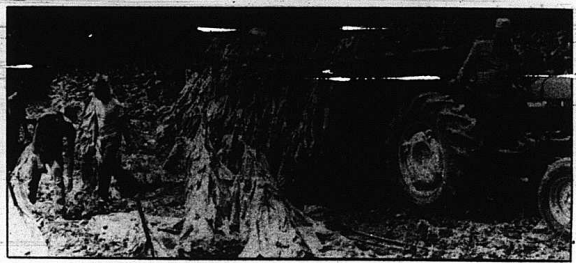

## City, county must resolve ownership

Who is responsible for Oak Hill Road that leads from I-75 at Renfro Valley around Lake Linville is a question that will have to be resolved by the county and the City of Mt. Vernon.

This was the observation made this week by Leroy Brown, chief engineer for the State Highway Department district at Somerset.

The road, well used by visiting boaters as well as residents, is deteriorating and needs repaired and widened, county officials have claimed, but who will do the work remains a big

question. County Magistrate Glen Ellison, First District, put 3.8 miles of the road on his list that goes to the State Highway Department, requesting the state take over for maintenance. The state rejected the request because of ownership of the road.

"The map of the county we have here in Frankfort shows the city limits on the upper side of the road, but who has the responsibility for maintaining the road, we have no idea," Brown related. "It sure isn't the state."

Mt. Vernon Mayor Roland Mullins is also sure it isn't the city.

"The road does not belong to the city and never has," the mayor said earlier. "Someone blacktopped the road up to the boat dock

## City's water project gets financial boost with federal money

A grant of \$150,000 to help finance improvements to the Mt. Vernon water and sewer system, has been approved by the Appalachian Regional Commission.

The grant is about half the amount of the project that is estimated to cost \$305,000 by Crawford and Crawford of Burnside, engineers for the project.

The city's share of the project will be financed through the sale of water revenue bonds.

The project includes such improvements as rebuilding a filter, installation of an additional chlorinator in the water treatment plant, construction of a 766,000 gallon water storage tank located on Ky. 1249, and new water lines. Also included in the water plant project is \$15,000 for a sewer pump station.

Improvements are already

under way at the sewer plant in Mt. Vernon, a project that will cost a total of \$1,621,745. Titus Construction Company of Dayton, Ohio, is the contractor on that project which is on schedule.

The improvements will also improve water service to the Rockcastle Industrial Park near Mt. Vernon. At the present time, Mt. Vernon Plastics has a multi-million dollar expansion project under way at the park. At least two other companies have shown an interest in locating in the park, but no official announcement has been made to date.

Mt. Vernon furnishes water for Brodhead, North Rockcastle Water District, and the Western Water Association. Announcement of the grant was made jointly by Sen. Mitch McConnell and Rep. Harold Rogers.



### Fire Station Construction

Work is continuing on a new fire station at Brodhead. The building, which will be completed in a few weeks, will also house the new county fire truck, as well as the city fire trucks. The \$38,000 building is being constructed by Lawson Whitte and others. Talking in front are magistrate Glen Ellison and Earl Owens.

## Report cards are in: Rockcastle is 122nd

If your child is a student in Rockcastle County Schools then he or she is getting the 122nd best education in Kentucky.

At least that is where Rockcastle ranked after test results were released last week by Kentucky's Superintendent of Public Instruction, Alice McDonald.

The ranking is up from 131 a year ago.

Students in the third, fifth, seventh and tenth grades were given the Kentucky Essential Skills Test or KEST, across the state last Spring. Anchorage Independent School District in Jefferson County ranked first and Menifee County ranked last.

Blige Towery, Jr., curriculum coordinator for local schools said Tuesday he was pleased with the figures.

"We are continuing to make progress in our educational program," he said. A major goal for improvement last year centered around better utilization of the testing data. We studied the identified weaker areas of our instructional program as identified by the previous years test and made efforts to address those concerns," Towery said. "We intend to take the same basic approach this year in our improvement efforts," he stated.

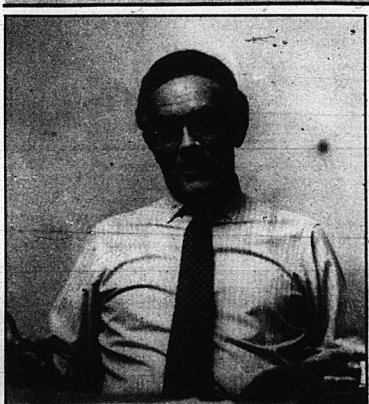
Students in Rockcastle showed a greater percentage of gain

## Your Child's Health

By: Dr. John Payne

A recent Newsweek Magazine story and other media has brought to our attention the problem of Radon gas contamination in the soil of some areas of the country. However, this article failed to list our area of Kentucky as an area of concern. Well, it is! Our area sits on the Devonian shale formation which covers much of the Appalachian mountains and which is fairly rich in radium ore which breaks down into the radioactive Radon gas which seeps into homes built over such shale. The gas is odorless, tasteless and colorless. It is weakly radioactive, but when breathed into our lungs it is accumulated over the years and causes a significant increase in lung cancer. It is the second leading cause of lung cancer after smoking. In fact, smoke particles help carry the radioactive gas into the lungs, so homes with a radon problem and a smoker carry risks higher than either problem alone.

The longer you live in a Radon contaminated home, the greater the risk of cancer. This is especially important for young children growing up in a contaminated home. Houses built on concrete slabs right on shale and

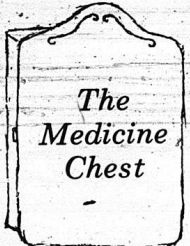
well insulated are at greater risk. If you have a well ventilated crawl space and poor insulation you are at least risk. Hoses can be decontaminated with expensive, but necessary blowers, air to air heat exchangers, and sometimes attempts to install duct work to cut down on Radon flow into the home.

To find out if you have a problem, the cheapest test available is from: University of Pittsburgh. Radon project, Physics Dept., 4200 Fifth Ave., Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15213-9972. The cost is \$12 per test. It is a little container you place in your living space during a time the house is closed up, as in the fall or winter, for one week, and then send it back for analysis. Other information may be obtained from: Kentucky Radiation Control Office in Frankfort. The number is: (502) 564-3700. Some homes have been tested in this area and do have significant contamination. Others may have been found to be "clean". Radon is a significant public health problem that we are just beginning to appreciate. It is well worth your while to check for it.

and it sure wasn't the city. It has been a county road since it's first built, and as long as I can remember."

Ed Winstead is also sure. He was the mayor and a councilman during the time 1-75 was built and when the road along the lake was first blacktopped.

"He said the county owns the road and had it blacktopped to the boat dock, but he isn't sure whether the state did the job for the county, or had it done through a private contractor.

"I'm sure the city had nothing to do with it," Winstead said, "even though the road is in the city limits."

The city does own to the high water mark which is above the road.

Winstead said Oak Hill Road was there long before 1-75 came along and the county had always maintained it.

"I am sure the state has responsibility of the road between U.S. 25 through the underpass because of the dam and 1-75 and the changes that had to be made when 1-75 was built."

He agreed the work on the remainder of the road to the boat dock could have been done by the state which in turn took the cost of the work from the state's road allocation to the county. That program was used for a number of years but is no longer in effect.

Winstead said he had looked at the road this week and agreed it needed work.

"If it goes until spring without work it will cost twice as much next year to fix it," Winstead declared. "I am sure it is the county's responsibility."

Most people who travel the road frequently agree it will be a big job.

"It needs several areas filled in, resurfaced and some widening, one resident said. "I don't know who is supposed to do it. I just hope somebody will before it falls in."

students and their obtained scores." Towery said. "In all grades our students obtained scores higher than their anticipated achievement levels. This is an important factor because the ability levels of classes do vary.

Towery said that as in the past the third grade students fared the best on the KEST. A score of 65.4 was realized by the county's third graders, while fifth graders scored 55.5, seventh graders 57.8 and tenth graders 57.5. Overall local schools had a score of 59.1.

The local curriculum director said that he thought more involvement and ownership of improvement efforts on behalf of teachers had a lot to do with the better test scores.

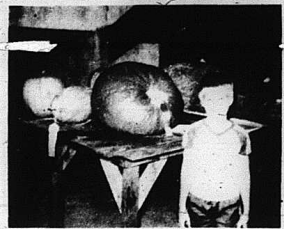
How did Rockcastle compare to neighboring school districts?

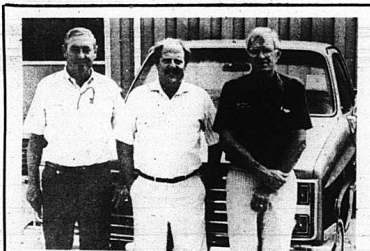

Figure Your Fat, Calorie Counters

Remember when counting calories was all you needed to do to make sure you weren't eating too much? Today, counting calories is not enough. If you are really serious about keeping your weight down to protect your heart and guard against other weight-related problems, you need to adjust your calorie intake for fat content.

Most of us are getting about 40 percent of our calories from fat. The U.S. Department of Agriculture recommends limiting fat to about 30-35 percent of total calories. How can you know when you have reached this percentage?

First, estimate your total calorie needs for a day. An average woman, age 23-50, needs about 2,000 calories a day to maintain weight. An average man of that same age needs about 2,700. Of course, calorie needs vary with age, activity levels and body size.

Once you know how many calories you need, make the following calculations to determine how much fat will provide 30 percent of those calories.

Step 1: Multiply your total daily calorie needs by 30 percent. For example, 2,000 multiplied by 30 equals 600 calories.

Step 2: Divide this number by nine, the number of calories in one gram of fat. In the above example, 600 divided by 9 equals 67 grams of fat. So, 67 grams of fat provides 30 percent of daily intake of 2,000 calories. There are 28 grams in one ounce of fat. Because fat is dispersed in foods in varying amounts, you will need to use a chart like the one below, which shows fat content in selected foods according to their method of preparation. Grams of fat follow food name.

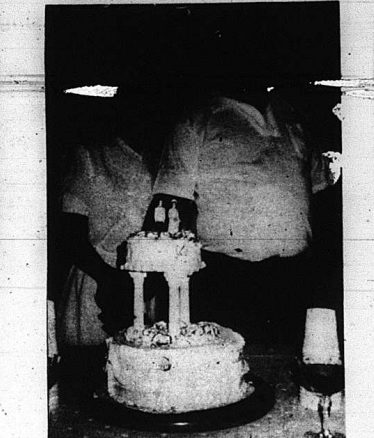

## State Police urge motorists to be safe this week end

The end of summer and the beginning of school come with the Labor Day weekend, and the Kentucky State Police urge motorists to drive carefully and watch for pedestrians.

With school back into full swing, children will be crossing the streets to catch their school bus or a ride. Kentucky State Police Commissioner Morgan T. Elkins says a heightened awareness of pedestrian safety this coming holiday and at all times can save lives. "In 1985, 72 pedestrians were killed and one-third of those injured were walking in the roadway," says Elkins.

There were five fatalities last Labor Day weekend, one of those fatalities was a pedestrian. A total of 20 pedestrians were injured during that holiday. There was a total of 1,085 motor vehicle accidents and 439 persons injured.

Drivers should realize that pedestrian accidents can be avoided just by being courteous and expecting the unexpected. Also, pedestrians have the right of way at crosswalks, at crossings with no lights, at lights when the pedestrian has a "walk" light or the signal is green in the direction he is crossing the street.

Drivers must be more aware as they use the roadways. A pedestrian should not create unnecessary hazards by jaywalking or moving slowly. The driver may have the right of way in certain circumstances, for instance, when the driver is turning on a signal or proceeding ahead on a green light. Those who are walking should always be willing to yield the right of way to avoid an accident, because the one most likely to be hurt is the pedestrian.

The Kentucky State Police remind holiday travelers that enforcement will be increased during the Labor Day weekend, which officially runs from 6 p.m. Friday through midnight, Monday, Sept. 1.

The state police will be looking for drunk drivers and encourage the use of a designated driver—one in your party who will not drink but will drive others who might.

The 55 MPH speed limit will be enforced and troopers will be using visual display radars, VASCAR and the high-speed pursuit vehicles. The visual display radars are set alongside major roadways and display the speed of the oncoming motorist, so he may reduce his speed if necessary. Troopers will be using state-of-the-art radar and VASCAR (visual average speed computer and recorder) to detect speeders. The high speed pursuit cars will also supplement the force.

Commissioner Elkins encourages drivers and passengers to buckle up their safety belts and place small children in child safety seats. Elkins adds that safety belts should be used on all trips, long and short.

### Arts application

It is a five-year program intended to enable new groups to compete successfully for other Arts Council operating support programs by the sixth year. ## Lack of rainfall hurts local tobacco; price probably lower this season

Only a fair tobacco crop for 1986, is the way that local ASCS Director Harold Ballinger summed up the condition of the burley tobacco in Rockcastle County.

"The fact that we have had 17 inches less rain than normal is why," Ballinger said Tuesday. "Some farmers that got their tobacco out early have some pretty good stuff, but those that didn't may be hurting," he said.

The local director said that he thinks Rockcastle County farmers have fallen burdened to a five to seven year cycle of somewhat dry weather. "It has actually been dry during our growing seasons in Rockcastle since 1979," he said.

Ballinger is afraid that when it comes time to market tobacco that Rockcastle farmers will be lumped in with other farmers in surrounding counties and their tobacco will be labeled as drought tobacco. "In western and northern Kentucky farmers have had a lot more rain this year than we have had in this area and I'm afraid that tobacco companies will pay a much better price for their tobacco and

let tobacco in this region go into the Government pool," he said.

Ballinger, who once raised a lot of tobacco himself said that the fact that tobacco in southern states such as South Carolina and Georgia was so bad this year might help the farmers in Kentucky. "The flue-cured tobacco is not good this year and that might help the price of our tobacco,"

he said. "This year's support price is the same as last with farmers getting around an average of \$1.49 per pound from the pool when their tobacco fails to receive a bid of one cent per pound over the support price. This support price is the same in Ky, Missouri, Ohio, West Virginia and Indiana."

## Kentucky soil moisture remains 82 percent short

Despite heavy rains in many parts of the Commonwealth last week, Kentucky soil moisture remains 82 percent short or very short, according to the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service.

"Three Kentucky weather reporting stations received two or more inches of rain," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell. "However, five stations reported a half inch or less rainfall. While weather has been perfect for topping and cutting tobacco and harvesting hay, we do need a good soaking rain in nearly every part of the Commonwealth."

As of August 17, 69 percent of the burley crop had been topped. This compares with 86 percent topped at this time last year and 58 percent for the five-year average. About 16 percent of the burley had been cut by last Sunday. This compares with 10 percent cut last year at this time and the five-year average of 2 percent.

Approximately 75 percent of the dark tobacco has been topped. About 17 percent of the dark tobacco has been cut.

There are no major problems yet with early housed tobacco, according to the statistics service.

The overall condition of tobacco in the Commonwealth is rated 4 percent very poor, 16 percent poor, 67 percent fair, 12 percent good and 1 percent excellent.

As of August 1, burley yields are expected to average 2,050 pounds per acre. Corn for grain yield per acre is expected to be down from last year. This year growers are expecting to get 88 bushels per acre, compared to 102 bushels yielded per acre last year.

The crop is rated 1 percent very poor, 16 percent poor, 41 percent fair, 40 percent good and 2 percent excellent by reporters for the statistics service. Development of the corn crop continues ahead of normal with 90 percent of the acreage in the dough or beyond stage.

With 23 percent of the corn mature or harvested, harvest activity will be picking up. This compares with 9 percent of the crop at this stage a year ago and 9 percent at this stage for the five-year average.

Soybeans continue to benefit from any rainfall. The condition of

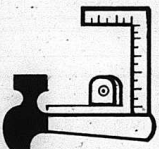

The crop was rated 1 percent very poor, 5 percent poor, 30 percent fair, 63 percent good, and 1 percent excellent.
