He confided that he hoped the local chapter would eventually have a building of its own from which to operate, and a larger membership.

"There are joiners and does in our society," Bussell observed. "There are those who join just to be joining and those who join with I hope in the future this chapter will concentrate on work and cognize its efforts to make history important to the citizens of the area."

The author of a pamphlet, "James Maret, the Boneaway Man," Bussell said the history of the nation shows that many Kentuckians played an important role. Among those, he enumerated Abraham Lincoln, Daniel Boone, Jefferson Davis, George Rogers Clark, John James Audubon, Henry Clay, Carrie Nation, Irvin S. Cobb and author Jesse Stuart.

He noted that Kentuckians have been found in almost every profession of our society such as Ephraim McDowell in surgery, and Col. Harlan Sanders in business.
 Bussell showed his audience several books on Kentucky history, most of them very expensive and most of them autographed. But he stressed that these books are very costly to purchase and very difficult to find, and warned that collectors should be wary when purchasing books.
 "I repeat, be sure that you know what you are doing if you decide to become a collector of first editions," he concluded.

"I've already met a lot of nice people and hope to meet a lot more very soon," McQueary said Tuesday.

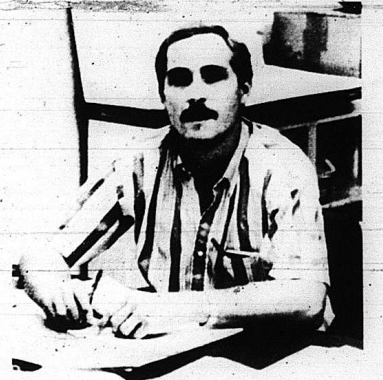

Evans V. Hilton calls it quits after 40 year career

Evans V. Hilton has announced his retirement from the Dept. of Highways after a career spanning more than 40 years.

At the time of his retirement, which became effective Aug. 1, he was associate assistant state highway engineer working and living in Frankfort.

Hilton began his career with the Department of Highways in Somerset on Nov. 1, 1945 as an instrumentman on a survey party, working on road location, construction supervision and as a draftsman.

From 1947 to 1954, he worked as a location engineer mostly in eastern and central Kentucky.

In 1954, Hilton was named assistant zone engineer, headquartered in London and later in Morehead. From 1955 to 1967, he served as principal assistant area engineer for planning, design and research in offices at Morehead, Lexington and Manchester.

He played a substantial role in the development of the interstate system and was in charge of the original route planning study for the interstate system which was developed in 1956 and 1957 and took approximately one year to complete.



Evans V. Hilton Retiring from Dept. of Highways

Between 1968 and 1982, Hilton was district engineer in Manchester, Somerset and Bowling Green. Also during this period, he was assistant director of construction in Frankfort for a year. Between 1976 and 1980, he served as project engineer on the Ky. 80 project from Hazard to Prestonsburg.

From late 1983 until retirement, Hilton was project engineer for design on the AA Highway (Alexandria near Newport to near Ashland), the Ky. 3 project from Prestonsburg to Iznaz and the U.S. 23 project from Prestonsburg to Paintsville.

In addition to the interstate, toll roads, parkways and primary roads, Hilton has also taken an active part in the development of the various rural road programs, including rural secondary and county roads in the areas and districts where he was assigned.

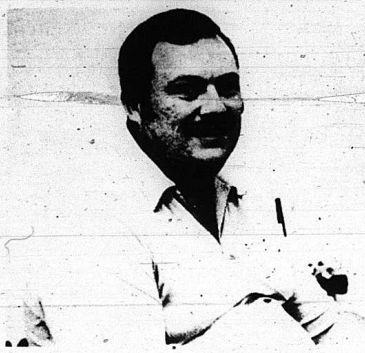
During Hilton's working years, which were continuous from 1945 to 1986, he worked for eleven governments, beginning with Governor Simeon Willis and ending with Governor Martha Layne Collins; 22 highway commissioners and all nine transportation cabinet secretaries.

Some of the major highway improvements in this area in which Hilton played a major role include design and construction of Interstate 75, which was dedicated in late 1969; design and construction of the Cumberland Parkway; design and construction of the Daniel Boone Parkway, the first public hearing to formulate plans to improve Ky. 461 from Somerset to Mt. Vernon was held by Hilton in 1972.

"The period of time from 1954 to 1986 was a very busy period in my life. I am proud to have been a part of it."

Hilton said he had no immediate plans for the future but was sure there would be plenty to do.

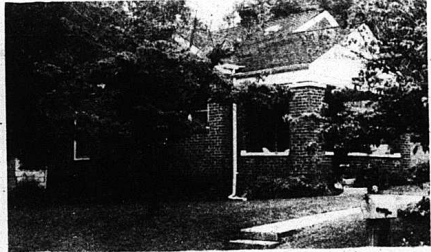

Jury returns indictments

Ten indictments for crimes ranging from murder to sexual abuse were handed down last week by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Bennett David Adams, 34, of 1115 Locust Street, Covington, was indicted on a murder charge stemming from the death of Thomas Burdette, 49, of Wildie.

According to the indictment the two men apparently got into an argument at the home of Lale Abney on Conway Hollow Road on July 27, when the shooting occurred. Burdette died from a single gun shot wound to the lower abdomen, according to local coroner Billy Dowell.

Adams is presently free on a \$50,000 property bond awaiting his arraignment.

Three local men were indicted on separate charges of first degree sexual abuse. In each case the victim was a child under the age of 12.

Thomas Alexander, Jr. of Rt. 3 Mt. Vernon, was charged with two counts of sexual abuse. He is presently free on a \$30,000 property bond.

Vernon Denney and George Denney, both of Rt. 4 Mt. Vernon, were also charged with the same crime. They too are out of jail on bond awaiting their arraignment.

A break in in July at Riby's Diner in Mt. Vernon also resulted in the indictment of a Mt. Vernon man.

Randy Graves was charged

with 3rd degree burglary and theft by unlawful taking in connection with the break-in in which over \$800 in cash and many other items including rings from the This-n-That Shop, a store which is adjacent to the Diner.

Graves is being held in the Rockcastle County jail in Lieu of \$50,000 bond.

The Grand Jury also handed down an indictment for first degree wanton and endangerment against a Livingston man.

Kim Boshears, of Rt. 2, Livingston, was charged with an August 16 shooting at the home of Robert and Helen Griffin on Rt. 2, Livingston.

According to the indictment, Boshears is charged with shooting into the Griffin home.

He is free on a \$10,000 property bond.

Earl Overbay of Broadhead, who is awaiting a transfer to the state penitentiary was also indicted for a break-in at Franklin's Variety Store in Mt. Vernon.

Overbay was charged with third degree burglary for the July 11 break-in in which a VCR, 43 knives, 24 packages of cigarettes and some watches were taken. Overbay was also charged with theft by unlawful taking over \$100. That charge was in connection with the theft of a 1979 Volkswagen that belonged to Teresa Burdine, of Rt. 1, Crab Orchard, on August 9.

All persons indicted will be arraigned on September 12 before Circuit Judge Daniel Venters.

School board settles garbage, raises taxes

William K. Bullen says he has a franchise to pick up the garbage in the city of Mt. Vernon. Therefore the Mt. Vernon Grade School and the Rockcastle County High School would fall under his franchise.

Local School Superintendent Charles Parsons told board members Tuesday night that Bullens had questioned their awarding of a garbage pick-up bid to Bee Garbage Transfer System of Mt. Vernon.

However, in a letter to the board concerning the matter, board attorney Carl Clontz disagreed.

Clontz said that in his opinion, Bullen's franchise probably covers the Mt. Vernon Elementary School and the High School, but in view of the fact that the contract was bid as a whole and that Bullen made no bid, he has not objected in the past, it was his opinion that the board could accept the low bid of Bee Garbage Transfer for the current year.

The board took Clontz's advice and did nothing to change the garbage contract with Bee.

If you thought property taxes were high, look again. A law passed by the 1985 Kentucky Legislature forced the local school board Tuesday night to raise the current school tax on property in Rockcastle from 15 cents per \$100 assessed value to 29.5 cents, effective July 1, 1986.

The new law says that a school district must collect the equivalent of 25 cents per \$100 assessed value. Rockcastle's collection rate last year was 92 percent. Therefore the state says the rate in Rockcastle will be 29.5 this year. This law applies to all public schools in the state.

A new Mt. Vernon school may actually finally become a reality. Tuesday night Superintendent Parsons told board members that the school was already listed in a state report and that he had received many requests from architects and construction management companies to help with the planning.

Parsons said that the state recommended hiring an architect soon so that planning for the school can begin early in 1987.

The board voted to interview an architect at the next three

Cost of garbage stuns fiscal court

A \$9,000 monthly bill to the county for hauling away garbage was enough to make the Rockcastle Fiscal Court squirm at its monthly meeting Tuesday.

Anna Rose Mullins, administrative assistant to County Judge/executive Hubert Thacker, warned the court that the county will soon be faced with making some kind of agreement to get the money to pay the bill if the proposed county garbage plan does not remedy the problem soon.

"We just won't be able to find the money," she said.

Magistrates agreed the county is "suffering" because the garbage plan is still not finally approved by the state.

"I think there's some foot dragging going on," said Magistrate Glen Ellison. "That's \$108,000 a year for garbage. It's money that could be used by the county for something else. We need to get this plan on the road as soon as possible."

To determine how soon the court asked County Attorney Charles H. Lambert to call state officials at Frankfort and inquire how soon the plan will be approved, and to explain the money problem.

The plan, developed by Cumberland Valley Area Development District at London, has been approved by the county, including clarifications of Mt. Vernon's role in the program.

City, county discuss lake road ownership; no agreement made

After an exchange of views county magistrates and Mt. Vernon Mayor Roland Mullins failed to resolve the question of ownership of Oak Hill Road around Lake Louisville during a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

In fact, the question of ownership remained as much in doubt after the meeting as it did before.

Mayor Mullins told the magistrates the same thing he has said often before. The city does not own the road and is not responsible for maintaining it. "It has been there many years and the city has never maintained it and it is not in the city limits," the mayor asserted.

The magistrates conceded they do not know who officially owns the road, but they believe the county does not own it. Then the city does. They point out the road is within the highwater mark of the lake.

Whoever gets the final nod from a yet undetermined source, it is going to cost a considerable amount of taxpayers' money to repair it. Estimates have ranged from \$10,000 to \$75,000. The mayor and the magistrates agree it is in poor shape and needs considerable work before winter begins.

Mayor Mullins stated that prior to the construction of the lake dam, Oak Hill Road was a county road and maintained by the county, and that only one small section was changed when the lake was filled.

First District Magistrate Glen Ellison included the 3.8 mile section of road from U.S. 25 at Rentfro Valley to Brindle Ridge on his list of roads to be turned over to the state for maintenance. The State Highway Department rejected the road, pointing out that no maps show the road is within the city limits and therefore the city is responsible for maintaining it. The mayor replied that the highway department is wrong, and again disclaimed ownership.

Magistrate Doug Bishop asked the mayor who owns the boat dock. The city loses it annually on docks.

"Well, if we own the road,

then we own the lake and boat dock," he retorted. "The city may not be the city, should be selling water to everyone and getting the rest on the boat dock," Bishop said.

Mayor Mullins and the magistrates agreed the question should be researched to find out who is getting the allocation of money from the state each year to maintain the road.

The magistrates asked County

Council records tell the story

A check by the Signal of the minutes of the meetings of the Mt. Vernon City Council in the early 1970s shows that both the city and the county have made a "hand-off" maintaining Oak Hill Road around Lake Louisville.

On Feb. 3, 1970 at a city council meeting, "A motion was made by Harvey Bush to not enough rock on Lakes Louisville road to make it passable and pay for it out of the Water Works Fund." The motion passed.

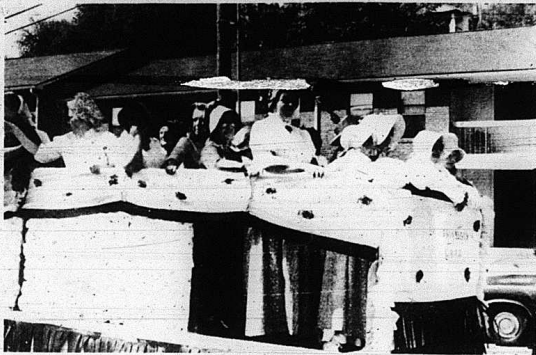
On Mar. 3, 1971 the council minutes read: "After much discussion concerning Lake Louisville road, a motion was made by James Robinson to request the highway department to make improvements, grade, drain and traffic barrier from the end of the state-maintained road near I-75 overpass to the junction of Green Hill and Oak Hill road." Motion passed.

"Continuing at the same session," Evans Hilton, district engineer told the council they should ask the county to make a similar motion since the county owns this road."

On April 22, 1974 at the council, "A motion was made by Chester Holland to contact Magistrate Chester Whitaker and ask if the county would pay for blacktop for patching breaks on the Lake Road. If the city would do the hauling and labor. The motion passed. Continuing," Mr. Whitaker was contacted and the county will pay \$100 on the blacktop."

Questions about shoes for infants are often asked of pediatricians. There seem to be as many different ideas about what, if anything, to put on baby's feet as a centipede has galoshes. When I was an infant, and for some years thereafter, most medical advice was to the effect that youngsters should wear stiff, high-top shoes until about age two or three. This was supposed to "protect" work shoes. However, today most authorities advise much differently. Before they are walking, infants are better off with only socks on their feet to keep them warm. As they begin to walk, socks are still fine, or going barefooted if the weather permits. A soft, moccasin type foot covering is good as well. The infant needs to be able to feel the floor to help gain his balance as he learns to walk. The idea of giving ankle support with stiff shoes is not possible for two reasons. First, the child has less sense of contact with the floor through shoes than with bare feet or moccasins. Secondly, normal ankles don't need support. The ankle and associated leg muscles probably will develop better if not

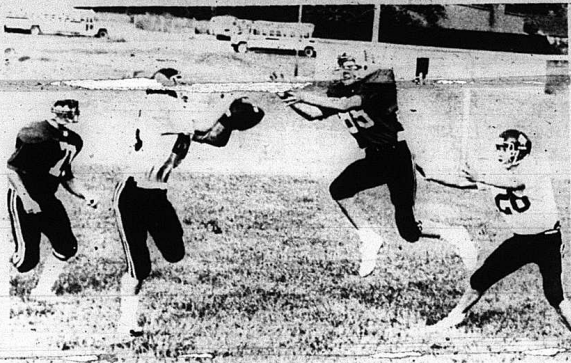

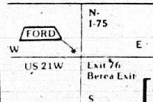

About a hundred persons were on hand to hear the Congressman discuss national and local issues and to help some of his constituents to solve personal problems.

He began the meeting saying he was "proud of the things going on in Rockcastle, including the Rockcastle Industrial Park, and the reconstruction of Ky. 461 between 1-75 at Mt. Vernon and Ky. 80 east of Somerset."

He said the new road is of major importance in increasing tourism in the area, especially for Lake Cumberland and the Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area in McCreary County and adjoining Tennessee.

"Mt. Vernon is the entrance-way, the jumping off place, for these areas, and Renfro Valley is a major reason that tourists stop in the area," he observed. "Once they stop at Renfro Valley, perhaps they will want to go on and visit other tourist areas nearby."

However, he said, "the name

of the game in this area is jobs."

"We need to hold our young people here after high school and not have to ship them off to Ypsilanti (Michigan) to make a living."

The Congressman emphasized the need for more industry and told his audience he would do all he could to help locate industry in the Fifth District.

"It's not easy to get factories, especially for a small city or county," he continued. "That is why I helped set up the Southern Kentucky Economic Council representing all 27 counties in the district. By banding together we can accomplish more than if each city and county were on its own."

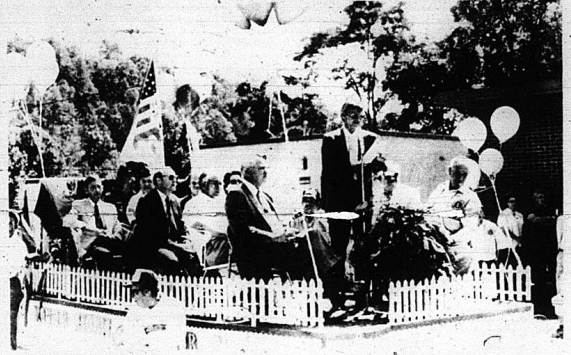
He said the group must work on the district's "educational shortcomings," promote tourism, encourage leadership training for young people and expose the area to other sections of the nation and the world.

"We must have a renewed vision," he added. "We may be dreaming, but if we do not have dreams nothing will happen." He answered questions from the audience, including the outlook for tobacco, a major county crop.

On the plus side, he said the crop looks good in spite of the dry

weather, and that the new tobacco program worked out by Congress is "a sound footing."



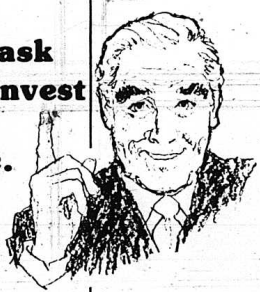

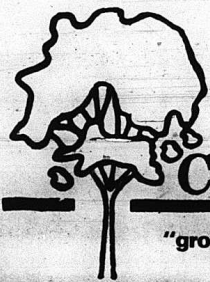

State's moisture in critical condition

Statewide soil moisture still remains a critical concern in Kentucky. Precipitation for the year is 52 percent very short and only 20 percent adequate, according to figures from the Kentucky Agricultural Statistics Service.

"Our crops are holding on almost better than expected, but we need a rain very soon if our good prospects are going to continue," said Agriculture Commissioner David E. Boswell.

"The dry weather has already hurt the tobacco," the Commissioner added.

The tobacco crop is highly variable with regard to maturity and potential yield. If it received water at the right time, it is in good shape, but if it didn't yields have been reduced.

As of Aug. 24, 29 percent of the state's burley acreage had been cut. This compares to 30 percent last year and 20 percent for the five-year average.

Dark tobacco is estimated to be 30 percent cut. This is up from 28 percent last year and 21 percent for the average.

"The two most common tobacco problems this year are black shank and aphids," Commissioner Boswell said. "But no curing problems have been reported to date."

Hay and pasture land in poor to fair condition.

The overall condition of the tobacco last week was 2 percent very poor, 9 percent poor, 69 percent fair, 19 percent good and 1 percent excellent.

Corn in Kentucky continues to be under development from last year. Corn is 98 percent in the dough stage or beyond, compared with 91 percent last year. More than three-quarters of the corn is in the dent stage or beyond.

The percent of the crop is mature or harvested. Some farmers have started to harvest corn for grain and about 5 percent had been harvested as of Aug. 24.

Silage choppage is very active in areas where there has been a great deal of drought stress.

The general condition of the corn crop is 2 percent very poor, 15 percent poor, 44 percent fair, 35 percent good and 4 percent excellent.

On Aug. 24, 90 percent of the

state's soybean acreage was in poor to fair condition. Soybean is 83 percent and the 84 percent average. Soybean conditions are rated as 7 percent poor, 31 percent fair and 62 percent good.

USDA extends comment period on land and wetland conservation

The closing date for comments on the proposed Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation provisions - commonly referred to as cross-compliance, sodbuster and swampbuster - of the Food Security Act of 1985 has been extended from August 25 to October 25 by the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced today.

These provisions are designed to reduce soil loss due to wind and water erosion; protect the nation's long-term capability to produce food and fiber; reduce sedimentation and improve water

quality. Assist in preserving the nation's wetlands and lessen the incentives to produce agricultural commodities on highly erodible farmland.

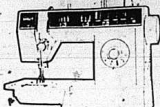
The comment period was extended because of the complex issues involved in implementation of the new provisions.

More now qualify for state's special WIC supplemental food program

Beginning July 1, more low-income Kentuckians will have qualified for the Special Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC), the Cabinet for Human Resources announced.

"The federal government is raising the income levels that define poverty," said Peggy Kidd of the Department for Health Services. "Because eligibility for WIC benefits is based on these figures, families with incomes barely over the present income maximums may have become eligible."

For example, the annual maximum income for a family of four has increased from \$19,703 to \$20,350. The average increase per family size is between four and five percent.

WIC provides nutrition edu-

cation and specific foods high in protein, iron and vitamins A and C to low-income pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children up to five years of age who have health problems that can be improved through better nutrition. The goal of WIC, which is funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is to improve the health of children through proper nutrition.

"Almost 65,000 Kentuckians have received WIC benefits monthly," said Kidd. In June 1985, approximately 61,000 Kentuckians received monthly WIC benefits.

She could not immediately determine how many additional people now qualify for WIC under the new guidelines or how many might have applied for the benefits.

For more information on WIC eligibility limits, interested persons may contact their local or district health department.
