

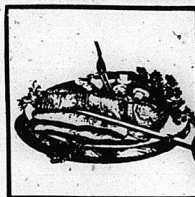

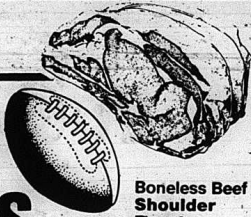

## Bullen seeks injunction to prevent garbage collection

A controversy over garbage collection in Mt. Vernon erupted this week when William K. Bullen asked Rockcastle Fiscal Court to issue a "temporary and permanent injunction" against Bee Garbage Service of Mt. Vernon from collecting garbage in the city limits.

The complaint is against Bee Garbage, Johnny Eaton, David Eaton, David Ballinger and the City of Mt. Vernon.

Because of "infringement on

the plaintiff's (Bullen) exclusive franchise by defendants... Bullen claims he has been damaged "in an amount exceeding the jurisdictional requirements of this court," meaning more than \$2,500.

Seeking an injunction did not come as a surprise. It had been rumored that Bullen, who has a franchise with the city until 1988, would take some action to prevent collection of commercial garbage in the city.

Bee Garbage has placed collection bins at several city business locations in recent days.

When contacted, Johnny Eaton stressed he is only collecting commercial garbage.

"Bullen has the residential franchise," Eaton said. "But I have not seen HSI's contract."

HSI is Helton Sanitation of Gray whom Bullen has had collection of the commercial garbage. In his complaint, Bullen also

brought the city into his injunction request. He said through his attorney, James T. Gilbert of Coy, Coy and Gilbert, Richmond, that "in the event that plaintiff's exclusive franchise and contract is determined to be invalid, then... the city" has breached its agreement in said city ordinance (343) and contract with this plaintiff and has been damaged in an amount exceeding the jurisdictional requirements of this court."

Circuit Judge Dan Ven- ters has not ruled to date on the

injunction, pending further study.

For the record, on Dec. 12, 1983, the Mt. Vernon City Council enacted Ordinance 343 giving Clarence Hasty Jr., and Bullen a franchise to operate a garbage collecting business in the city for five years, until December 1988.

On Dec 27, 1985, Hasty then elected sheriff, transferred his part of the franchise to Bullen. Bullen then allowed HSI to collect

commercial garbage in the city.

Bee then set up its operation.

At the next meeting of the city council, on the advice of City Attorney, Carl Chappell, the city approved issuing a franchise license to Bee to operate a business, but the council did not say that Bee could collect garbage in the city, beyond that to be done between Bullen, Bee and the city.

## Man dies in wreck at Brodhead

A Crab Orchard man was killed Sunday afternoon when the car, in which he was a passenger, swerved to miss two pedestrians and was struck broadside by a pick-up truck on U.S. 150 just over a mile west of Brodhead.

Pronounced dead at the scene by Deputy Coroner Roy Martin was Anthony Mullins, 29, of Route 3, Crab Orchard, the passenger in the auto.

Driver of the auto, Charles Hammock, 19, of Bowling Green, was taken to Rockcastle County Hospital where he was treated and released Monday.

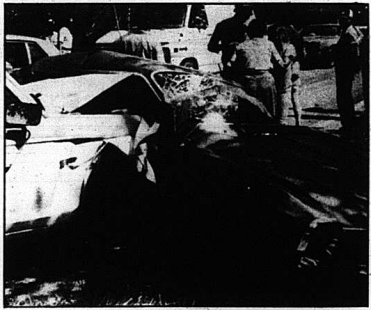
Also taken to Rockcastle County Hospital with multiple injuries and transferred to Berea Hospital was Charles Litter, 40, also of Bowling Green, who was struck by the Hammock car while reportedly fighting in the road with Roy Shaffer of Brodhead, Kentucky State Police reported.

Driver of the pick-up truck was Paul Sherman, 72, of Sellers, S. Carolina. He suffered a minor head injury but refused hospitalization.

State Police said a fight broke out between Litter and Roy Shaffer at a nearby residence. Hammock and Mullins jumped into Litter's auto and Hammock drove toward Brodhead, then turned around and returned to the site.

About a hundred feet from the house they saw Litter and Shaffer fighting in the road and as they approached, Litter ran into

## Woman run over by bus

Margaret S. Cardwell, 83, of El Paso Texas was killed about noon Friday when she was struck and run over by a Greyhound Bus.

The accident occurred at the Greyhound Bus Stop near Negro Town Road in Mt. Vernon.

According to the driver, Harold A. Slate, 61, of Knoxville, Tenn., Mrs. Cardwell had just left the bus and was met by William and Daisy Miller of Middleburg, Kentucky.

Slate said he was going north and was watching both lanes of traffic in order to pull back on the road and thought Mrs. Cardwell was out of the way.

When he pulled out on the road the back wheels of the bus struck Mrs. Cardwell, knocking her under the bus. She was crushed by the back wheels. Reportedly, Mrs. Miller tried

to pull her away from the bus but failed. Mrs. Cardwell was pronounced dead on arrival at Rockcastle County Hospital.

According to the Mt. Vernon City police report, all witnesses reported the incident in the same way.

## Burns trial

The mail-fraud trial of Attorney Lester Burns and former Pulaski District Judge James Noble has been postponed until November 17 by U.S. District Judge Eugene Siler, Jr.

Siler granted Burns request Monday for a continuance to allow his new attorney more time to prepare. His original attorney withdrew.

The two are charged with conspiring to commit mail fraud by filing a false \$16,000 insurance claim.

## Livingston says 'No' to county garbage plan

Several citizens from Livingston told the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting last week that the City of Livingston has its own mandatory garbage collection, likes it, and wants to keep it that way.

City Councilman Todd Mink, spokesman for the group, said the city does not want to be a part of a county-wide garbage plan.

The magistrates listened but did not respond to the request. The magistrates have made it clear in past weeks that they would want all areas of the county included in the plan.

Tim Schwendeman, a representative of Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) which devised the plan for the county and got preliminary state approval for the plan, told the delegation it was a little early for the court to make any specific plans and that they would have an opportunity to voice their objection when a public hearing is held by the court. A date for a hearing has not been set.

Livingston has had mandatory collection of garbage for several years, collected by Glen Parker, who has been on the job the past 11 years.

The charge is \$5 monthly for residential collection and \$8 for commercial. Parker collects house to house. The garbage fee is added to the city water bill.

Parker said he has had no problems with collection and hoped he wouldn't be out of a job if the county takes over.

"We're doing well with our collection," Mayor Billy Medley said. "But if the county won't let us keep it, then I guess we'll just have to take what comes. But our city is very clean and we would hope it stays that way. If we lose our garbage system, Glen would be out of a job. He does such a good job for us."

Livingston now finds itself with another problem.

The Kentucky Environmental Protection Cabinet has given Livingston 30 days to clean up a garbage dump located on U.S. 25 about a quarter-mile west of the city limits that has been there for

## Plastics firm to protest rates charged by RECC

Mt. Vernon Plastics, a factory based in the Rockcastle County Industrial Park, has filed a motion with the Public Service Commission against the East Kentucky Power Company and the Jackson County Rural Electric Cooperative.

Plastics President Jack Touratsos said Tuesday that his company wanted a better deal for the electricity they use.

"I think we are probably Jackson County RECC's largest user of electricity and we think we should get a break," he said.

According to the plant president, the electric bill at the factory averages between \$50,000 and \$64,000 a month. "We pay more for electricity than we pay our employees," he said.

Touratsos said he felt like the problem with RECC is that it is geared to serve rural communities and small farms and not the large industrial user.

"Most" of the other utility companies across the nation make

concessions for industry and their large use of electricity. RECC does not. They have always had just one rate," he said.

Mt. Vernon plastics operates 24-hours a day seven days a week.

"While we are using electricity during non-peak hours of 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. we think we should get a break," he said. "It is our understanding that RECC pass less for their electricity during those hours from East Kentucky Power and we think the savings should be passed on to us."

Touratsos said "It would take 2,000 homes to use as much electricity in one month as we do," he continued.

"RECC would have to send out 2,000 bills and keep up with 2,000 different accounts to generate as much revenue as they do from us, and we are only one customer."

"The who utilities are geared to serving industry, and the way RECC is geared is 180 degrees apart," he said.

Touratsos said that approximately a year and a half ago he talked with RECC President L.R. Row

## School budget over \$6 million

The Rockcastle County School System is the biggest employer in the county.

How big? Try over 6 million dollars for their 1986-87 school budget.

At this month's regular meeting of the board, Superintendent Charles Parsons presented the

general budget to board members.

The general budget for 1986-87 totals \$5,802,021. This does not include the food service budget,

which according to Parsons will be presented at a later meeting. However, local food service Director E.J. Smith said that the food service budget for next year would run somewhere between 600 and 700 thousand dollars.

Bringing the school systems budget to approximately 6.4 million dollars for next year.

Expenditures in the general budget include \$120,000 for administration costs. Included in the \$120,000 are the salaries of the superintendent, finance officer and secretary to the board.

# Log cabins and inhabitants

The structure of the cabin had to do with the incidents which allus happened! For instance: No one could fall downstairs in any cabin in which we lived, on the river, the river was Laurel. The river finally made a lake, but it took thirty years (more or less) after the lake was conceived until its completion.

No one could have wet down through the straw tick, in any of our cabins! This activity was for those who had the upstairs or the attic! This activity was for those who had the upstairs or the attic! Nona, before she died, told me of the young man's kidney problem, and how Aunt Hulda solved it (that is another story!). Mamaw's cabin had no ladder to go up to the loft room and for one year, we lived in Mamaw's cabin.

My first cousin, Henry Williams, said he could remember when their cabin was built. They killed and fried 22 chickens the day of the house raising. I don't even remember this, tho. Henry says I should be an year or two younger than Henry, this makes a

great difference in memory!

I've seen cabins built, tho, so I didn't really need to see Uncle Jim's cabin in its construction. The cabin had one huge log room, the loft room, which was reached by climbing a ladder nailed to the wall. It had a "side room." Kitchens were not always attached to the front rooms. Mamaw's cabin had two complete rooms, with a dog trot between. (Else where would papaw and his cronies set on rainy days to tell tall tales?)

Boards covered the cabins, and when I was a child, I thought all buildings were covered by felling large black oaks, and riving "ricks" of boards. These boards were numbered into the thousands. A board maker was paid not by the day, or the hour, but by the number of boards he could rive, riven.

The rains came gently on the woods. It took a monster of a storm to sound scary in one of these cabins. They were built hugging the land. They were set down as close as possible to the mountain. The level, or near level land was left for cross, and to keep the split rail fences from

falling over on steeper land.

There was no stock law in the "lower" side of Laurel County. When I was a child we were warned about the wild souss and boars. The cattle which were called wild, were really tame enough to scent the salt in our starched dresses, and in the boy's overalls and shirts; so sometimes they would chase us just to get to lick our shoulders to get a taste of salt!

Our dresses were gathered full, and their tails ruffled for two or more reasons! They were so pretty and Mammy and Aunt Hulda were both good seamstresses, from the time I can first remember. Mammy said she sewed for her daughters, just as if she were making doll dresses from any scraps which fell into her fingers.

Mammy said, "My own mother would never let me 'waste' scraps for doll clothes, so I practiced on you girls." Mammy had no machine of her own at this time but mamaw lent her her machine, in order for mammy to copy the fashions in the mail order catalog. Now, after the cabin was

finished, at Uncle Jim's, we were seldom allowed to climb up into the boys' bedroom, and Nona and I were put to bed in the room with Aunt Hulda, and Aunt Hulda slept down here with whichever one of her brood was a baby. Aunt Hulda went almost

## House continues to support disaster aid

Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers said House action on an appropriations bill will hopefully prevent any changes in the way the federal government provides disaster relief to Kentucky and other states.

## PREVIEW FALL/WINTER 1986

Fall is generally thought of as our biggest fashion season. Somehow the movement from light, airy garments of summer to fall and winter's multiple layers brings about an excitement unequal to any other period. Fall fashion excitement is just that! It's a time to think and plan for major adjustments in the wardrobe.

According to the Consumer Price Index, the price of clothing has increased at a higher percentage (4.4) than has the "all other products" category. This situation has not occurred since 1969. Leading the hike in prices is women's suits, separates and sportswear.

This trend toward increased clothing cost is expected to continue this fall. However, you don't have to have a big bank roll to become fashionably dressed for fall and winter 1986. 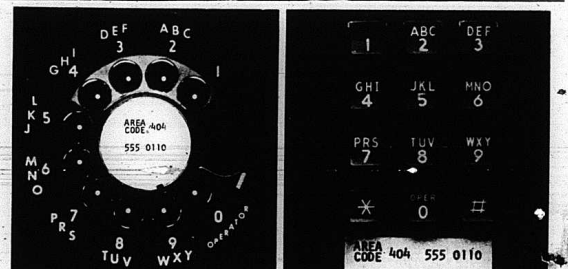

The largest portion of the new budget is that for instruction costs. Next year the local board plans to spend over \$3 million dollars on instruction in the local schools.

Such items included in this expenditure is salaries of principals, teachers, supervisors, substitutes, secretaries, library books and library supplies, teaching supplies and instructional travel.

The transporting of students to and from school will cost the local board an estimated \$550,000 during the next school year. Included in this figure is the salaries of the director of transportation, as well as the salaries of the bus drivers, mechanics, substitute bus drivers and other employees connected with transportation.

Other expenses included in the \$550,000 are those for gasoline, oil and tires.

\$39,500 is included in the budget for attendance services, which include the director of pupil personnel's salaries and other expenses related to his office.

\$380,000 has been set aside for the operation of the school buildings, which include salaries for custodians and expenditures for heat, fuel, water and sewage, telephone service and custodian supplies.

Other major expenses in the budget include \$110,000 for capital outlay, which includes payments on bonds such as were issued when the new high school was built.

Last year's general budget was just over \$2 million and the food service budget was approximately half million.

July 1 of next year the school board plans to have over \$400,000 on hand, in excess funds.

**Marijuana destroyed**

A total of 3,500 marijuana plants were located by helicopter and destroyed by Kentucky State Police Narcotics Section last Thursday.

The plants were on land in the Chestnut Ridge area of the county and were about 12 feet high. Police did not report any arrests.

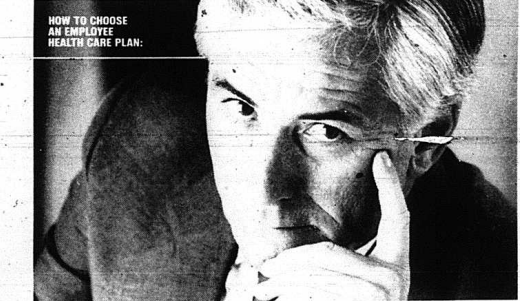
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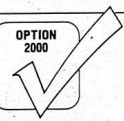
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# Berea falls in OT

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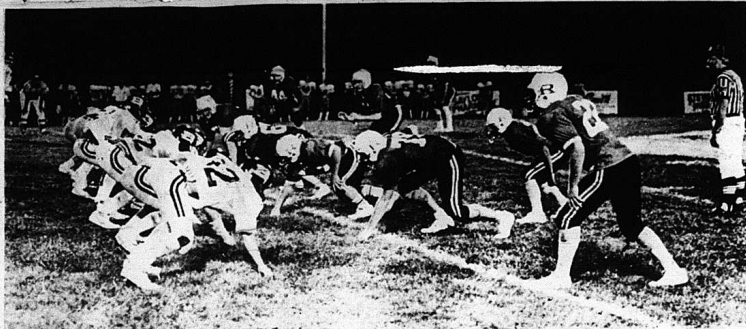

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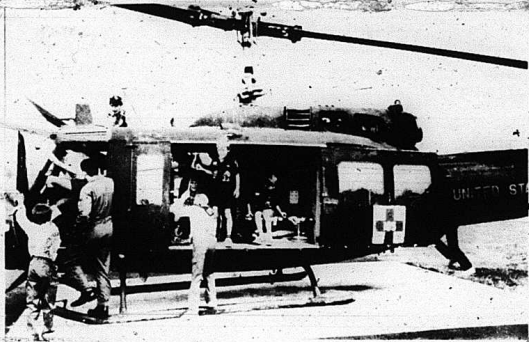

## Your Child's Health

A disease that has been in the news somewhat recently and which should be of interest to parents is Kawasaki Disease. This is not something you get from being run over by motorcycles of the same name. It is a condition first described in Japan which consists of prolonged high fevers, red eyes, sores in the mouth, with cracking of the lips, redness of the palms of the hands and soles of the feet, with subsequent peeling of the skin of fingers and toes, big lymph nodes and rashes. The

heart, joints and kidneys may also be affected. A small percent of cases may develop inflammation of the arteries of the heart with serious or fatal outcome.

Young children are affected more than old. It is more common in Japan than the U.S. but cases are being found more often here.

Recent studies suggest this may be due to some type of virus, though earlier studies suggested it was not. Effective treatment in the past has been high doses of aspirin, but recently high doses of

gamma globulin has been considered.

It is important to discuss the disease because it can often be missed by doctors and parents as well. It is not common, and so is often not thought of when the cause of a high and prolonged fever is not obvious. There are no specific laboratory tests to prove the diagnosis. The doctor must rely on his or her judgement.

Autumn is one of the most beautiful seasons of the year, but in Kentucky, often means discomfort for those who suffer from allergies. These people use many types of products for relief including nasal spray and drops. They promote drainage and relieve the stuffy feeling.

It is very important to follow the directions on the label when using these products. If a topical nasal decongestant is used over 3-4 days, there may be a pronounced rebound stuffiness. This means that after the effect of the drug subsides, the nasal mucous membranes become even more congested. This is a vicious cycle because it leads to more frequent use of the decongestant which is actually causing the congestion.

If you are using more and more nasal sprays or drops and getting with your doctor or pharmacist. They can recommend alternatives for your relief from the allergy season.

## Alcoholism/Drug addiction: a growing threat - Article XIV

Earlier we made mention of what is known as survival roles which each member of alcoholic-dependent families adopt as a means of communication and behavior, in order to disclose or cover up their needs from other family members. As the victims of these roles grow so do the behavior patterns, we carry them from the home environment into our social and work setting. Of the six roles which we will discuss here, only one is the addict him- or herself; the others fall into the co-dependency range or what more recently has become known as "Children of Alcoholics".

A friend in Minnesota who teaches and writes on this subject, Mr. Earnie Larson, suggests that alcoholics and drug addicts are co-dependents who have come to use alcohol and/or drugs. Other co-dependent children, usually women, grow up and marry them. (85% of women coming from alcoholic homes carry or re-marry alcoholics.) We will go into more detail in a future article.

The first role we want to consider is that of the dependent or addicted member because it is around this person that the other five roles orbit.

Secondly, each family member will adapt a system of beliefs through which they will interpret their psychological surroundings; how they interpret what is going on around them will affect how or what they feel at any given time. These feelings, in turn, will dictate how the person will act or behave. What is obvious to those around us is our conduct, behavior or characteristic acting out. What is not known by others is exactly what we feel. It is our feelings that we are most likely to keep hidden. A person feeling anger or hurt may present a smiling face or cool

aplomb. Others may laugh or giggle when confronted with or while experiencing personal problems-our behavior is very often designed to mask what we really feel.

Space does not allow us to present the first of these six roles in this article. We will however, attempt to cover them in some detail in the next six installments by dedicating one full article to each. Finally, although these roles may begin predominantly in alcoholic drug addicted homes, they will be found in other family systems as well.

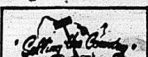

Cole about the possibility of some reduced rates.

The plastics factory has not, as yet, received the reduced rates. But Touratsos said Tuesday that Cole had submitted two electric schedules to his company, which, according to Cole, could save his firm up to \$10,000 a year. But Touratsos said neither would save his company money.

"When you get to reading the fine print it is going to actually cost us more money in the long run than it does now," Touratsos said.

Cole was unavailable for comment Tuesday, but Lewis Ray News of RECC said that the situation was complicated one. He did admit that Mt. Vernon Plastics was his company's largest user of electricity and that RECC would have a news release ready in a few days after they met with East Kentucky Power.

"We are not only doing this for our benefit, we are trying to set some standards set to locate other industries that want to locate in Jackson County, RECC's service area do not have the same problem, Norris related.

Touratsos said that his company is almost finished with an expansion project that would increase their electric bill once it is

completed.

"After the first of the year we anticipate our electric bill here at factory to be in the over \$100,000 a month," Touratsos said.

To represent them, the plastics firm has hired Richmond Attorney Robert Spurlin.

"Our state is often the victim of flooding and tornadoes," said Rogers. "Had we allowed FEMA to make these changes, state and local governments would have had to pay millions of additional dollars to help make repairs and clean up following such disasters. Our counties in Eastern Kentucky in particular simply do not have contingency funds for such an occurrence, and the result would have been to make the hardships on families and their communities even worse, at a time when they need all the help we can give them."

Rogers said estimates indicate that under the rules proposed by FEMA, only three of nine presidential disaster declarations in Kentucky since 1974 would have qualified for federal aid.

Rogers said the House legislation now goes to the Senate for its action, and said he hopes the Senate will write a similar provision into its bill.
