For illegal mines that never had any reclamation bond posted by operators. Others are sites that officials have lost track of because the state does not keep a list of all the sites.

"With the stroke of a pen, the state has consigned that land to the ash heap," FitzGerald said. Baldwin said the environmentalists' requests to "go back and unearth all the problems" was too expensive.

"I simply go through the files and bring out every violation that doesn't contribute anything," she said.

Instead, the state plans to concentrate on stricter controls on issuing two-acre permits, which have less stringent reclamation standards.

In addition, the state will seek more alternative enforcement actions, including revoking permits, civil penalties and criminal prosecution of operators who do not reclaim surface mines.

Marijuana crops found

Rockcastle Sheriff deputies and State Police destroyed five patches of marijuana during the past week.

Deputy Delno McClure found 18 plants about six to eight foot tall on Ky. 1249 near Sand Springs Baptist Church and pulled them up.

Thirty plants were pulled up in one patch and 30 in another patch on Sand Springs Road about three miles south of Mt. Vernon.

Twelve plants were found by Sheriff Clarence Hasty at Poplar Gap. The sheriff arrested Gary Davidson and charged him with producing marijuana.

The largest number of plants, 842, were removed by State Police on Ky. 1152 between Blue Springs and Ky. 461.

Davidson is the only person reported charged in the raids to date.

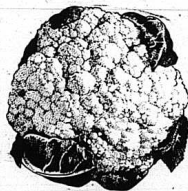

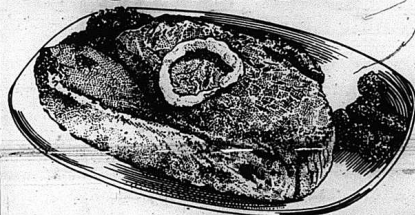

Circuit Court trials heard

A sentence of one year was recommended for a Rockcastle County man after he pleaded guilty to reckless homicide last week in circuit court.

Scott D. McQueen, 22, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon pleaded guilty to an amended charge of reckless homicide in connection with the shooting death of his father-in-law on August 3, 1985.

Harold Ballard, 43, was killed near Copper Creek on Sweetwater Road by two gunshots from a .22 caliber rifle.

Ballard was pronounced dead at the scene of a fatal coroner Bill Dowell after his body was found lying along the side of the roadway.

According to police reports the day of the shooting Ballard went to McQueen's home looking for Ballard's wife who was at the house.

Fosters sue county for rent money

A Pine Hill couple filed a complaint in Rockcastle Circuit Court Tuesday against Rockcastle County, claiming the county owes \$2,250 rental on land leased for a solid waste landfill at Pine Hill, a landfill that was never developed.

The complaint was served to County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker.

In the complaint, Ernest and Linda Foster sued through their attorney, Karen G. Chrisman of London, that on Feb. 18, 1983, the Fosters entered into a lease and purchase option agreement for the proposed landfill property, that provided payment of \$1,500 a year rent for 40 years.

The agreement was made during the administration of County Judge Executive Bob Jasper.

The lease continued in effect until Aug. 19, 1986 when the current Fiscal Court released the land, the complaint notes.

According to the complaint, the court paid the Fosters \$2,200 for rental from Feb. 18, 1985 until Aug. 19, 1986. Consequently, the court owes \$2,250, the complaint reads.

The Fosters asked for payment, a jury trial and expenses and court costs.

At the last session of the Fiscal Court, the court agreed to send the Fosters \$487.50. As of Wednesday, the check had not been cashed or returned to County Treasurer Floyd Owens.

Moore arrested on four charges

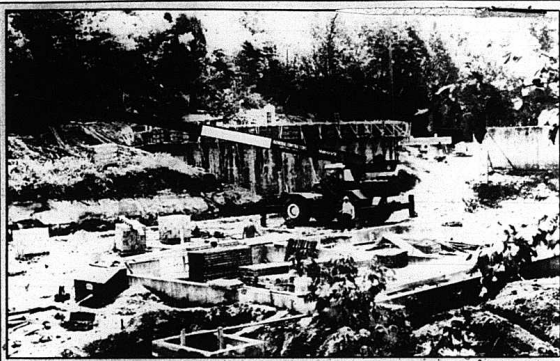

Police reported 38 marijuana plants with an average height from six to eight feet; prescription drugs; a gun stolen in Lexington were among items confiscated, including the truck.

Charges include producing marijuana, a felony; receiving stolen property, over \$100, a felony; carrying a concealed deadly weapon, and prescription drugs not in a proper container.

Moore posted \$10,000 bond for his appearance in court Friday.



Sewer plant work 40 percent complete

Work is progressing well on major renovation of the sewer plant at Mt. Vernon, the engineer for the project reported this week.

Workers were busy Tuesday on the nearly two million project which will increase sewage processing from 200,000 gallons a day to 600,000 gallons.

William R. Hardy, engineer for Schimpeler-Corradino Associates of Louisville, said the project is about 40 percent complete and should be completed by March, depending on weather conditions.

"If we have a bad winter then we would probably have to ask for an extension," Hardy said. But he does not anticipate a major delay.

He said the contractor, Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio, is a "little behind" on the project, but should easily catch up when additional equipment arrives.

"There are many projects like this going on now and there will be a normal equipment back-up by manufacturers, so they have a problem with meeting deadlines," he added.

The actual cost of the sewer plant project is \$1,924,407 with \$1,443,305 a grant from the federal government. The city's share of the project is \$481,102.

The city at last report has \$220,000 of its share of the project and will need additional money

that is expected to come from an increase in the water/sewer rate probably in January. Just how much the raise will be has not been determined by the city council.

The completion of the plant will meet the projected needs of the city for the next 20 years, Mayor Roland Mullins estimated earlier.

An additional sewer project totaling nearly \$500,000 is about complete by Karish Construction of Mt. Vernon.

That contract includes installation of sewer lines on Fairground Hill, a section of Owens Subdivision and Cox Lane.

Garbage injunction rejected

A request for a temporary injunction to prevent commercial garbage collection in the City of Mt. Vernon was rejected by Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters in an order Thursday.

William K. Bullen, who holds a franchise in the city to collect garbage until 1988, complained that Bee Garbage Transfer Systems of Mt. Vernon was infringing on his "exclusive franchise" and that he would "suffer irreparable injury" as a result of the Bee collection.

Defendants are owners of Bee—Johnny Eaton, David Eaton and David Ballinger. Also included in the complaint was the City of Mt. Vernon.

Bullen told the Signal Tuesday his attorney would file additional papers this week in connection with the case.

"This isn't over by a long shot," Bullen said. "We're not going to give up."

In related court action, City Attorney Carl Clontz has filed a motion for the court to dismiss the complaint against the city on the grounds the complaint fails to state a claim against the city. The judge has not ruled on that motion.

The rejection of the temporary injunction does not mean the legal action is over since the thrust of the ruling was on collection of garbage at Pleasantville County High School and Mt. Vernon Elementary School, and Bullen's loss of revenue.

In his order, Judge Venters pointed out that Bullen and Clarence Hasty, Jr., acquired Dec. 12, 1983 an exclusive franchise "to operate a garbage collection business in Mt. Vernon for a term of five years. Bullen later acquired the interest of Hasty and became the sole franchisee.

On Sept. 30, 1984, Multi-County Services, Inc. (Bullen) sold to Helton Sanitation, Inc. of Gray, a garbage truck, 114 dumpsters and a few other items for \$65,000.

That contract contained the provision that "in the event the first party (Multi-County Services, Inc.) should be unable to enforce any current franchise or contract," Multi-County Services, Inc. must re-purchase the truck and other items. Bullen signed the sales contract as president of Multi-County Services, Inc.

The defendant, Bee Garbage Transfer Systems, is according to Bullen's complaint, a partnership. Bee Garbage won a contract from the Rockcastle County School District to collect school garbage.

Bullen had submitted a bid for the school contract but lost out to Bee Garbage. In previous years, Bullen was the successful bidder

for the school contract. Bee Garbage has also begun collecting garbage for a fee from some businesses in the City of Mt. Vernon.

Fredricks trial held Wednesday

Fredricks, who is now in the United States Marine Corp, was charged with four separate counts, three for arson and one burglary charge.

The charges stemmed from an April 14 incident in which Fredricks is accused of burning a frame house and out-building belonging to Gregory and a car owned by Dennis Weaver of Mt. Vernon.

Fredricks was arrested approximately 30 minutes after the alleged crimes by state trooper Jimmy Silvers. According to court records Fredricks had singed eyebrows and hair.

Sandusky freed in Hellard murder

A Rockcastle County man has been acquitted of murder charges Tuesday in Rockcastle Circuit Court in connection with the shooting death of his brother in law.

James Lee Sandusky, 19, of Mt. Vernon had been charged with the May 5, 1986 death of William Ray "Billy" Hellard, 31, of Fairground Hill in Mt. Vernon.

The incident occurred at Sandusky's home in Calloway Hollow.

After over 200 hours of deliberation the 12 man jury brought in the not guilty verdict at 10 p.m.

By sending Sandusky to jail, Sandusky told public defender James Cox of Somerset that he "wasn't trying to defend himself with the family name" that he shot Billy Hellard.

"I had gotten threats upon me and my family before the shooting," Sandusky said during the trial.

He stressed that Sandusky felt more the threats stemmed from a family argument over property that Sandusky and his wife Beverly Hellard Sandusky had sold.

The property in question had apparently been given to the Sandusky by her parents.

But during cross examination by Commonwealth Attorney Bernie Ham, Sandusky admitted that the family dispute was never mentioned during the trial.

Sandusky said he did not see the shooting, Hellard, Hellard's brother, Donald Hellard, and Troy Kates came to his trailer in Calloway Hollow.

"Billy got out of the car and told me that he wanted to buy a

half case of beer on credit," Sandusky testified. He said that he refused to sell Hellard the beer and that he became very angry with him.

Sandusky testified that Billy Hellard told him that he was going to beat him to death. "I was scared of Bill and Donald and Troy Kates," Sandusky testified. "I know about their reputations and I could smell beer on Billy," Sandusky said.

According to Sandusky's testimony during the exchange with Billy Hellard Sandusky got a .22 caliber pistol from the dash of his car. The pistol had been vented into evidence earlier in the trial as the murder weapon.

Sandusky said that he told Billy Hellard that he didn't want to have to use the gun but that he would if he had to. He testified that Billy Hellard kept coming towards him waving his arms and that the gun he was holding did not scare him at all.

Sandusky said that Hellard was about two feet from the gun when he fired the deadly shot, and that just as he shot Hellard, he could see his father-in-law Leon Hellard running down the road towards his trailer with a shotgun in his hands.

Sandusky testified that he went into his trailer after the shooting and waited for police to arrive.

Although, Sandusky testified that he did not aim the gun when he shot Billy Hellard, prosecutor Ham questioned him on the fact that he was aiming the gun directly in the heart. But Sandusky maintained that he had the gun down in front of him and that he did not aim at Billy Hellard.

Hellard was pronounced dead at the Rockcastle County Hospital by Coroner Bill Dowell.

False arrest suit won by two state troopers

A Rockcastle County Circuit Court jury has ruled in favor of two Kentucky State Policemen in connection with a civil suit filed against them by a Livingston man.

Last July, Gary Griffin of Livingston filed a suit against Troopers Gary Lane, Joe Schenkfelder, Jimmy Phelps and Detective Ernie Boggs for two different occasions which Griffin said that he was falsely arrested and imprisoned.

However, the 12 person jury did not agree as last Thursday they returned with a 10 to 2 verdict in favor of two of the troopers, Lane and Schenkfelder. Boggs and Phelps will have their case heard at a later date.

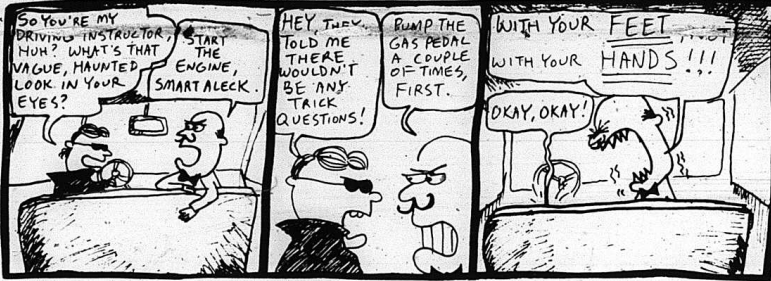
In his suit, Griffin alleged that on March 27, 1985, Lane and Schenkfelder arrested Griffin and caused him to be imprisoned in

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Your Child's Health

By: Dr. John Payne

Many states, including Kentucky, require infants and children under four years of age be restrained in car seats while riding. This is, of course, because riding unrestrained is the leading cause of death in this age group. However, one concern about these seats has recently been studied. Premature infants just out of the hospital, say at about 4 or 4 1/2

pounds, may have trouble breathing from being "scrunched" down in the car seats. No car seats have been designed for such small babies specifically. Those that have the shortest straps are best, and those with lap pads or shields are worse in this regard.

Scientists recently studied 20 premature and 10 full term infants in approved car seats with regard

to the amount of oxygen in their lungs and the number of periods of apnea or stopping breathing. Even in the best car seats the premature infants had had no problems. This does NOT mean that premies should not be given the protection of riding in car seats. The risks of holding them in your lap is much greater. What is done mean is that car seats for prematures should be carefully chosen for the features mentioned above. It also means they should be propped up with blanket rolls at their sides to help the straps fit more properly. They should be observed closely while riding and not taken on longer trips than necessary.

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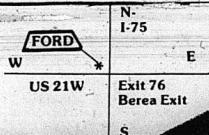

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

During the 1986 session of the Kentucky General Assembly, the attorney general's office was successful in getting some new consumer laws passed. The information provided below explains some of the new laws passed that will further help to protect Kentucky's consumers.

New Car "Lemon" Law

With the recent passage of the new car "lemon" law, Kentucky joins 40 other states that have a law to protect consumers who purchase new cars which cannot be repaired.

Kentucky's law provides that, if, after a reasonable number of attempts, the manufacturer of a new motor vehicle is unable to repair a defect which substantially impairs the vehicle's use, value or safety, the manufacturer must replace the vehicle or refund the full purchase price and any collateral fees to the consumer, less a mileage allowance for the consumer's use of the motor vehicle. The law specifies that a reasonable number of attempts must have been made by the manufacturer to repair such defects, if within the first 12,000 miles of operation or during the period of 12 months following the date of original delivery of new motor vehicle to the consumer, whichever occurs earlier.

The same defect has been subject to repair four or more times by the manufacturer or a franchise dealer of the manufacturer, but such a defect continues to exist; or

The vehicle is out of service by reason of repair of the same defect for a cumulative total of at least 30 calendar days.

The law specifies that manufacturers of new motor vehicles have defenses available:

The defect does not substantially impair the use, value or safety of the motor vehicle; or

The defect is the result of abuse, neglect or unauthorized

modification or alteration of the motor vehicle by the buyer.

Prior to the passage or this, Kentucky law did not effectively deal with the pyramid problem. Law enforcement personnel were required to wait until the claims made in a pyramid promotion were proven false or misleading before action could be taken. Unfortunately, the falsity of claims was not apparent until citizens had paid.

East Kentucky Power asks PSC for change in rate

East Kentucky Power Co-operative, Jackson Co. RECC's wholesale power supplier, has applied to the Kentucky Public Service Commission for a change in rate design that will assist the cooperative in its industrial development efforts.

"We've been stepping up our efforts to attract industry to our service area and bring more and better jobs to the region," noted Lee Roy Cole, president and general manager of Jackson County RECC. "This proposed rate is designed to lower power costs to large industrial users."

The new rate will apply only to large industrial users and will not affect the electric rates paid by the other 33,000 plus members on Jackson County RECC's lines.

"We feel the area we serve has a lot to offer industry," noted Cole. "We have land and other resources available at competitive prices. There's a pool of skilled and trainable workers, and East Kentucky has a plentiful supply of the electric power that's needed to fuel this area's growth."

A public hearing on the proposed rate is scheduled for Wednesday, Sept. 24 at the PSC offices in Frankfort. Mt. Vernon Electric has intervened in the hearing.

hundreds of dollars to the scheme promoters and had gotten nothing in return.

The new law will allow action to be taken prior to anyone becoming a victim as the recruitment activity itself is prohibited, an enforcement personnel can then prevent people from becoming victims.

Restitution law legislation amends the current statute which

presently authorizes the attorney general's office to seek restitution or refunds for citizens who are victimized by individuals who have violated the Consumer Protection Act.

Under the previous restitution statute, the attorney general's office could only recover for individual consumers their out-of-pocket losses, which had been acquired by the defendant by practices in violation of the Consumer Protection Act. Therefore, the law looked at what the defendant received and limited any refunds to that amount.

With the passage of this amendment to the existing law, the attorney general's office can seek not only that money which was paid to the defendant, but also can seek refunds from the defendant for monies that the consumer had to pay to third persons, as the result of the defendant's violation of the Consumer Protection Act.

This amendment favors the police of the Kentucky Consumer Protection Act by providing broad relief to victims of violations of the consumer protection laws and by permitting the possibility of full, instead of partial, refund for consumers. When the fraud is present, this amendment enables the attorney general's office to seek full recovery, which a private consumer may seek when bringing a private action. As a result, this amendment prevents a consumer from being adversely affected, as far as possible, when the action is brought by the attorney general's office instead of in a private suit.

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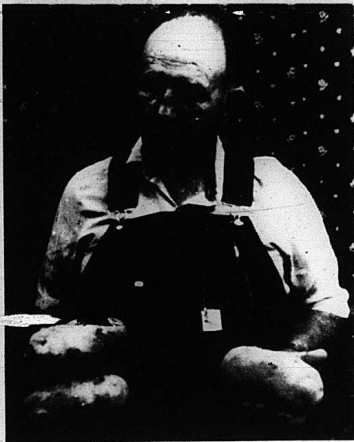

"INJUNCTION DENIED" [Cont. From Front]

Bullen argued that he would suffer irreparable injury unless an injunction was granted. Bullen testified that he transferred to Helton Sanitation, Inc. the rights under the franchise to collect garbage from businesses and retained the right to collect garbage of residential customers. Bullen said he feared that the defendants were not enjoined he would be forced to purchase the garbage truck and dumpsters from Helton Sanitation at previously agreed upon price which he is unable to pay. Bullen is a petitioner under Chapter 11 in Bankruptcy Court.

Judge Venter's decision is a matter of law that the motion for a temporary injunction be denied on the grounds that Bullen had not shown that he would suffer irreparable injury. Judge Venter noted that Bullen had not suffered the loss of revenue as a result of the defendant's competition because he apparently transferred the right to the commercial business.

"Because the plaintiff is not personally a party to the agreement to sell the truck and dumpsters, it does not appear to the court from the evidence that he could be forced to re-purchase them. That obligation, if enforceable against anyone, would be against the defendant," Judge Venter said. "It is stated that the plaintiff never considered the collection of school garbage as coming within the rights of his franchise because for years he submitted to the bidding procedure of the school board."

An indictment against Bill Stark of Berea was also dismissed after he agreed to restitution in the amount of \$4,000 to County Attorney James H. Lambert and his wife, Brenda.

Stark had been indicted in November of 1985 after he apparently accepted a \$3,500 check from Brenda Lambert and did not finish work on their home. Stark and the Lamberts also agreed that no other action would be taken by either party in the case.

One champion poster will be chosen in each grade level in the county-4th, 5th, 6th, 7th, 8th and high school level. The champion poster in each grade level will go on to the Area Competition. Posters are due by October 1st. The following rules must be followed or poster will be disqualified:

1. Posters may be made by any currently enrolled 4-H'er.
 2. All posters must be designed on regular poster board of 14" X 22" dimensions (one-half a standard poster size). Posters may be produced by any medium, i.e. charcoal, oils or collage. They cannot be three-dimensional.

3. 4-H is to be the topic for the poster. 4-H'ers can show what they think 4-H is, what they do in 4-H and what they think 4-H does for young people. Catchy slogans or titles may help tell the story.

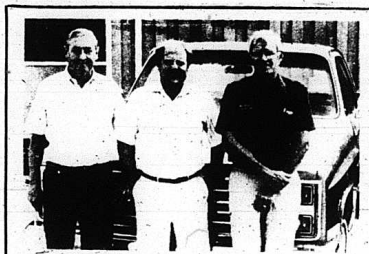
4. Lettering should be neat. Using stencils or cut out letters is suggested.

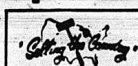

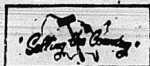

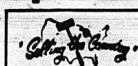

Mounting an assault on drugs

Life in prison without parole for drug pushers who sell their prison to school children... the death penalty for people who conspire to sell drugs to someone who later dies from drug usage... fewer restrictions on evidence for police who find drugs on a suspect... these are just some of the tough new measures included in a major new anti-drug bill which the House passed this week.

This legislation, which I co-sponsored and voted for, will bring several billion dollars in new resources to bear on this national drug crisis. The advent of crack and other new lethal forms of narcotics have forced us to mount a major assault on the drug problem. This legislation will attack the drug crisis in three ways: reducing demand, increasing penalties and enforcement, and expanding our efforts to stop drugs at the border.

REDUCING DEMAND: This new legislation will provide \$350 million in additional funds for federal, state and local drug-abuse education programs. It will also add another \$180 million for drug treatment and prevention. We cannot stop the drug problem merely by attacking the supply. We will only be successful if we can convince people to stop wanting drugs. Mrs. Reagan's campaign to "just say no" is the first step in this expanded anti-drug effort.

INCREASING PENALTIES AND ENFORCEMENT: This new bill includes a number of tough measures against drug dealers, including the establishment of mandatory sentences for major drug trafficking. The bill will also go after those who launder drug money and who use children to help manufacture or distribute drugs. Additional measures authorized by the new Drug Enforcement Agency and our federal justice system. Another \$1.2 billion will also be created to help build new prison space to house those who are convicted of drug-related crime.

EXPANDING DRUG INTERDICTION: Stopping drugs at the source is still vital to our anti-drug effort. This legislation increases spending for those efforts to \$65 million and directs the use of military funds to help fight drug smuggling along our coastline. The bill also directs the President to deny trade benefits to countries which do not cooperate with us in eradicating drugs.

On my recent Community Moving tour through the Fifth District, I spoke with many of you about the drug problem. All of us need to get involved in fighting

drugs and drug abuse. If you have information about drugs in your community, please contact your local police or sheriff's department first. But you can also get in touch with the nearest State Police Post. Check your phone book for the post in your area. And finally, information about illegal drug activity can also be reported to the Drug Enforcement Agency in Louisville (502-582-5008).

In each case your confidentiality will be protected. So I urge you to report any illegal drug activity to the proper authorities. My office cannot assist you in reporting drug information, but these agencies stand willing to help us stamp out our drug problem. Let them hear from you.

Shaking The Salt Habit

Iced Coffee Coolers To Beat The Summer Heat

Nearly a third of all coffee brewed in the United States is wasted. A refreshing new way to beat the heat is to use leftover brewed coffee in cool coffee and delicious coffee cooler recipes.

Nobody knows who first drank iced coffee, but most experts feel it must be an American innovation. According to Steven Gregg, of the Coffee Development Group, a good rule of thumb when brewing iced coffee is to use about three ounces of coffee to every 64 ounces (1-2 gallon) of hot water. Gregg recommends a rich premium roast or a flavored grind since the coffee flavor of these blends tend to stand up and taste fuller against the diluting effects of the ice. A rich, flavorful, premium roast such as Luzianne Coffee with Chicory is considered a good choice by many coffee connoisseurs.

Gregg cautions against using "stale" or old coffee that's been standing around on the stove for hours. He suggests taking any coffee that's still warm and fresh from the pot and storing it in a sealed jar in the refrigerator. Kept this way, coffee can be safely stored for up to a week.

For iced coffee, brew coffee in a coffee tray and freeze. It can be used with warmer coffee or as "ice cubes" to double the coffee flavor in any iced coffee drink.

Tobacco is in trouble, growers told

Kentucky tobacco growers are staring down the barrel of a 38, say Kentucky Farm Bureau officials, and without a timely response, some could find their burley markets shot out from under them this year.

The 38 is actually MQ-38, a form issued by the federal government requiring each tobacco allotment holders signature in order to obtain price supports on the crop and avoid selling the leaf at a severe price penalty.

The forms have just recently been mailed from county ASCS offices to farmers, says Kentucky Farm Bureau President Ray Mackey. But the deadline for signing

and returning them to those offices is September 30.

That deadline is established in new tobacco legislation, USDA says, and allows no administrative leeway for moving back the deadline.

Without the signature, these officials say, the law is clear. No signed form by September 30, no sale of tobacco without a penalty fee of \$1.20 a pound.

USDA says the grower's signature on the form has been required in previous years, but was usually signed at the time of sale. They say the big change this year is the fact that it must be signed in advance.

"This is a very serious matter," says Mackey. "The people from USDA have said they simply don't have the authority to alter this requirement. The September 30 deadline seems to be set in granite."

"I want to urge every tobacco allotment holder to give immediate attention to completing and returning this Form MQ-38 as soon as it arrives in the mail," Mackey said. "It would be a tragedy for even one Kentucky tobacco grower to shut out of this year's market with his crop simply because of a government form. But that seems to be a distinct possibility."







Rockets lose '26-19 at Lynn Camp Friday

"We were a better football team than they were, but when you make the kind of mistakes we made you can't win." Coach Tom Larkey said of the Rockets' loss at Lynn Camp Friday night.

The Rockets season record fell to 3 and 1 after the disappointing loss to the Wildcats in Lynn Camp Friday. The final score was 26 to 19.

"The mistakes Larkey spoke of all came on the special teams of the Rockets. A mishandled punt return, a bad snap on a punt, a mishandled field goal attempt and kick-off return" high ranked inside Rockets' coach said.

Rockcastle took an early six to nothing lead when they marched the length of the field and scored on a run by Chad Williams, but that is the only time that the rockets lead.

Lynn Camp school did not pick up a first down in the second half, scored a touchdown after they ran a mishandled field goal attempt but on a touchdown, recovered a fumbled punt snap on the one yard line and ran a kickoff back to inside the ten.

"I was pleased with our special teams," Larkey said. "We moved the football game on the Wildcats and our defense merged well."

However, Larkey was quite upset with the way head referee Richard Morgan and his crew handled the game.

According to high school rules if a player uses bad language in front of a referee, during the game it is an automatic 15 yard penalty. They verbally abused us all night long and nothing was ever called," Larkey said.

At the end of the game a fight broke out between some of Rockcastle's players and some of the Wildcats. Chris Larkey and Kevin Rowe were written up by Morgan and sent to the Kentucky High School's Commissioner, Tom Mills, for review.

But Larkey said Tuesday that both players are eligible for the Rockets game with Wayne County Saturday night.

The Rockets were led on offense by freshman Kevin Rowe who had 18 yards on 20 carries. Larkey had 51 yards on 11 carries and Chad Williams had 45 yards on 10 carries.

The Rockets were led on defense by Peter Harrison—12 tackles and blocks.

Of the Wayne County game Saturday night, Larkey said that he was worried about Wayne County's speed but that his team should be able to win. The game is set for Saturday night in Monticello.

BARREN: Crappie were hitting minnows and small jigs along stump rows 10-15 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits off rocky points 6-12 feet deep; clear, falling, 6-1 2 feet below summer pool and 77 degrees.

NOLIN: Black bass were hitting spinners and crank baits off rocky points and along stump rows 2-8 feet deep; crappie were taking minnows over submerged cover 8-10 feet deep; some walleye were taking deep running crank baits; clear to murky, falling, nine feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

ROUGH RIVER: Crappie were taking minnows still fished over submerged cover 6-12 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits and plastic worms off rocky points, rocky banks and stump rows 6-12 feet deep; clear, stable at one foot below summer pool and 78 degrees.

TAYLORSVILLE: Black bass were taking crank baits and plastic worms off deep points and banks in 10-20 feet of water; bluegill were hitting worms or crickets near trick-ups 3-6 feet deep; clear to murky, stable at 1-1/2 feet below summer pool and 76 degrees.

HERRINGTON: Bluegill were hitting crickets off banks 8-10 feet deep; black bass were hitting plastic worms at night off points 8-15 feet deep; due to the water level, some ramps are no longer suitable for launching; clear, falling 19 feet below summer pool and 76 degrees.

GREEN RIVER: Crappie were

hitting minnows around stump rows and submerged cover 5-10 feet deep; white bass were hitting small spoons in the jumps; catfish were taking nightcrawlers over deep channels; clear, rising slowly, one-half foot below summer pool and 79 degrees.

CUMBERLAND: Black bass were hitting crawfish over deep rocky bluffs and off points in 10-15 feet of water; striped bass (rockfish) were hitting jigs over submerged

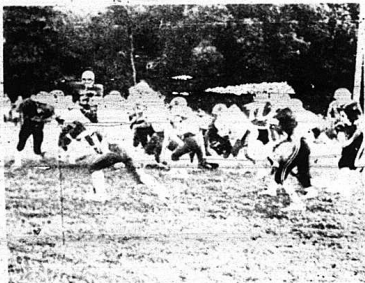

Attendance is major goal for schools this year

Improving student attendance is getting a lot of attention from county schools. Targeted as one of three major goals for county schools this year, several innovative plans are being implemented to tackle the problem of poor attendance.

The three member team representing Rockcastle County at the 1986 Commonwealth for Teachers (Melissa Hicks, Debbie Bugg, Lisa Reams) have written a partnership plan with the Bank of Mt. Vernon called Attendance Pays. Mt. Vernon Elementary School chose Mr. Cornelius's 7th grade class as the pilot class to participate in the program. The Bank of Mt. Vernon will pay each student in the pilot class to come to school.

The program details follow: Each attendance period the student has perfect attendance, the Bank of Mt. Vernon will deposit \$10.00 into the student's personal savings account the first attendance period and \$5.00 each attendance period thereafter. Anytime the student has two or less perfect attendance periods, the student may withdraw 50% of their account balance. Any student in the pilot class who has perfect attendance for the year will receive a \$50 savings bond, compliments of the Bank of Mt. Vernon. Each student will receive



a computerized print-out of their account monthly.

Attendance Pays began September 3 with the pilot class touring the Bank of Mt. Vernon. Danny McKinney, president of the Bank of Mt. Vernon, took the students through the bank, explaining the bank's processes.

Environmentalist say new surface mining agreement is not strong enough

The newest agreement to strengthen Kentucky's enforcement of federal surface mining laws has been signed by federal and state officials, but it does not go far enough, environmentalists say.

To be hired by the state are 16 more employees to uncover violations, including illegal use of several two-acre permits by one coal operator.

The federal office of Surface Mining will help fund some of the added enforcements.

Despite the states increased personnel, environmentalists who are suing the Natural Resources Cabinet continued to be critical of the plan.

The agreement "is so fuzzy in its focus and so insufficient in its

scope, that you could hire 1,000 people and still not get the job done," said Tom Fitzgerald, attorney for the Kentucky Resources Council.

The resources council, along with the National Wildlife Federation, filed suit Monday in U.S. Court against Baldwin and the cabinet, alleging that the state had ignored its role as primary enforcer of federal surface mining laws.

Fitzgerald said the agreement "dances around" the problem of field inspectors ignoring violations. In addition, the agreement "simply writes off" outstanding violations on at least 1,000 unclaimed sites, he said.

According to Detective Boggs, the still had been in operation for several weeks. An arrest is expected in the case.

of which I write) lots of the preachers, even the circuit riders could not read, and in giving them their call, God gave them a child, or some kith and kin who could read, kind of like calling Aaron to speak for Moses, or vice versa!

My neighbor was called aunt, as a matter of respect. Most of our elders yearned for an education for their offspring, this was in the

days of the three trustees for each school. Here were the seeds of so many feuds. The feuds were not always violent, more of a 'throat cutting thing' in which reputations were slashed, and characters vilified, by tongue instead of loaded guns used.

The Pine Hill church, the church which overlooked the Muddy Gut valley in Laurel county had been burned. Most folks believed the church was burned because of the hiring of a particular teacher, rather than its being burned by the wrath of God!

No accusations were spoken at the time, nor have I ever heard any since, as to who lit the spark which destroyed the church, or whose hand held the lantern!

Almost without exception when things got muddled, and stirred up my friend would laugh and say,

"Well! I'm just gonna 'letter up' to the governor. . . I aim to gif this settled!" Perhaps the tax was high on the farm, or the tax which was facked onto the tobacco was hard to understand.

When the church house burned, the light spread all over the valley. The law was soon abandoned, (about the three trustees.)

what with the schools being so much scarcer than teachers. And the teachers more numerous than preachers, some one needed to take matters in hand!

It would be hard to count the college graduates which had their 'roots' in this valley, with the 'light' of education getting brighter, sometimes, tho, when our Kentucky news is dismal, I think on the lighter side, and vow to 'letter up' to the governor!

My father-in-law, Willie Martin, was a notary public, he was also an unpaid counselor. Our neighbor would come, usually barefoot, with a paper in hand, and say, "Willie! Will you help me? I want to 'letter up' to the governor!"


"What do you wish me to say? Aunt?"

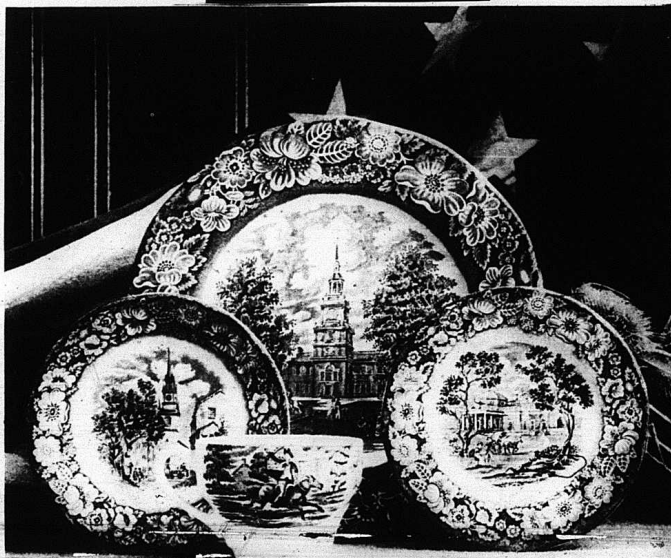

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EKU to offer special courses

University will offer more than 50 special interest courses this semester for students and members of the public.

A special emphasis this semester is on Japanese language and culture. University officials said.

Most courses, however, are of general interest and are intended for enjoyment and personal enrichment.

The not-for-college credit courses range from "Fundamental Computing," to "Low Impact Aerobics."

"We're offering our intensive Japanese language weekends again this semester," said Janina Hamon of the EKV Division of Special Programs.

Participants spend two weeks immersed in the sound and structure of the Japanese language while developing business vocabulary and cultural awareness.

Other courses offered in the general area of Japanese studies include "Basic Japanese Cooking," and for persons who are not completely at home in an English-speaking culture, "Practical English as a Second Language & Introduction to American Culture."

"We're also offering 'Spanish Conversation for Kids,'" Ms. Hamon said. This course is for children with little or no previous experience in Spanish who want to learn basic conversational skills.

Ms. Hamon said. With the exception of the intensive Japanese weekend, fees for most courses range from \$18 to around \$50, she said. Some courses include "special fees" to cover materials used in class.

What would your attitude be if a preacher came to Rockcastle County, secured the barn at Renfro Valley, and preached eight nights on the following subjects: [1] Baptism Is Essential to Salvation, [2] Baptism is Not Essential to Salvation, [3] A Child of God can Fall From Grace, [4] It is Impossible for a Child of God to Fall From Grace, [5] It is Necessary to Take the Lord's Supper Every Sunday, [6] It is Not Necessary to Take the Lord's Supper Every Sunday, [7] The Only Music Authorized in Worship is Singing, and [8] Churches May Scripturally Use Instruments of Music in Their Worship Services. Now, I ask you, what would you think about this preacher? I feel sure that most of you would say that this man is guilty of hypocrisy, and void of true conviction. I would fully agree.

Now, let's change the picture a little.
