



move to a two-year budget. That way, we could devote more of our time to making government work better and at less cost. The President also needs to have the ability to veto specific programs line-by-line, such as many of our

line-by-line, such as many of our governors can.

There is a lot of waste in that \$600 billion budget. But with this budget system we have now, we will have no chance to cut that waste. We need major budget reform in Congress and we need it soon; for your sake and for our country's sake.





An application for a permit to build the dam had been advertised for several days that could have resulted in funding a feasibility study by CVADD that was estimated to cost over \$4 million and






