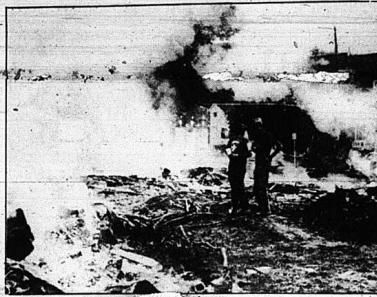

Joe Lambert busy on campaign trail

When the voter registration books closed last Monday, Mt. Vernon attorney Joe Lambert was getting his campaign into high gear.

Lambert, 38, is one of two candidates for the Kentucky Supreme Court seat from District 3. He is facing Laurel Circuit Judge Charles Luker.

In the May primary election, Lambert defeated Luker as well as Norma Adams of Somerset and Morris Butler of Greensburg.

Luker finished second, giving him the right to face Lambert this fall.

In the primary, Lambert defeated Luker in 25 of 28 counties across the district. Lambert got 14,115 to Luker's 11,655 while Butler, who has strong ties to Governor Martha Layne Collins and who is also chairman of the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals, finished third with 10,383 votes.

Lambert attributed his primary victory to a district-wide strategy he mapped out with a former administrative assistant to

Bee Garbage asks dismissal Claims Bullen franchise questionable

Bee Garbage is owned by Johnny Eaton. (David Eaton and David Ballinger.

In a "separate answer and cross-claim," attorney for Bee, David Howard of the law offices of F. Preston Farmer of London, wrote while Bullen did attach a copy of a city ordinance granting Bullen an exclusive franchise to collect garbage in the city, his clients (Bee) "are without knowledge of information sufficient to form a belief as to whether or not these documents are true and genuine and in fact whether a valid franchise was granted."

Bee also claims Bullen does not have a valid franchise under the Kentucky Constitution. Secondly, that Bullen fails to state a cause of action upon which relief is sought or granted. Thirdly, that Bullen has lost his franchise in that he failed to comply with the terms of the franchise, as does Helton Sanitation Inc. of Gray, assistant of Bullen.

In its cross-claim, Bee declares it acted in good faith and without knowledge of the exist-

ence of any franchise between Bullen and the city whereby Bee would be prevented from picking up garbage in the city.

However, Bee said, if an exclusive franchise did exist, and there is a judgment award to Bullen, then the city must "completely indemnify" Bee for any

Police find dope

Police were unable to pinpoint the exact locations in the county where the plants were found. When they found a patch they landed and destroyed them.

Plots were found in 21 counties, including three in Laurel and two in Jackson.

Largest plot was in Hickman where up to 15,000 plants were growing with sugar cane.

No river dam Bond money unavailable

Nothing ventured, nothing gained, so goes the old adage. And so it appears that is about all that can be said for a dam at the headwaters of the Rockcastle River.

The joint Rockcastle, Laurel, Jackson project now appears to be a dead issue.

Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD), at London proposed the idea of a dam, at Parlier's Branch to be known as the Parker's Branch Industrial Authority. It was to be constructed just inside the Rockcastle County line and would furnish water to McKee, and be used for irrigation. But unless the new law is changed to exempt taxes on the type of bonds that were to be used to finance the project, the dam is in the "nothing gained" category.

A last ditch effort to save the project was made by CVADD and other officials to state legislators, but reportedly the proposal was met with lukewarm reception.

There is apparently no market for the \$150 million in bonds needed for the project because of the new tax laws.

McKee and East Bernstadt. It would have had a 22,000 kilowatt electrical generator, provided flood protection for Livingston and needed water for Jackson County.

A dam on the river has always been in the doubtful category. When originally conceived by the Army Corps of Engineers in the early 1960s, the dam was proposed at the Narrows of the river and would have backed water nearly into Livingston. An alternate dam was suggested northeast of Livingston that would have backed water 14 feet deep under the Ky 490 bridge at the Laurel County line. In the Corps' view, the water would have been used to feed Lake Coopers Lake, a "dinosaur" lake.

The Corps at that time did also use flood control as an incentive for the dam, but the Corps found in its study that they could not justify the project.

The Corps had not committed to the project proper. However, if it had reached the study stage the Corps certainly would have had something to say about it since the Corps controls the

Fiscal court approves two financial plans

A \$500,000 federal Community Development Block Grant was accepted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at its monthly meeting Tuesday.

The grant money will be loaned to Mt. Vernon Plastics to help the company finance an \$8-million expansion and development program now under way at the company's plant in the Rockcastle Industrial Park.

The four percent interest paid by the company on the loan will go to the county. The county will hold a mortgage on some of the equipment. There is no financial responsibility for the county.

Broadhead approved a similar grant of \$433,215 at a meeting Monday night. It will loan the factory \$421,025 of the grant money.

The interest money returned

to the county cannot be used for salaries, repair work at the courthouse or road maintenance.

The court also agreed to participate along with 100 other counties in a state revenue bond program that could see the county receiving about an eighth of \$3.5 million to use for low interest housing loans. The state has \$45 million to allocate.

The county will be liable for any of the money. It will be allocated through the Cumberland Valley Area Development District at London.

Maximum loans on new homes will be about \$80,000, and \$73,000 on older homes with an eight percent interest rate on a 25 year loan.

U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers of Somerset.

Doris Petercheff, Roger's former aide, was hired by Lambert before the primary and according to Lambert, is working with his campaign through the November general election. Petercheff resigned from Roger's staff in April.

Lambert said Tuesday that he hired Petercheff because "she is a recognized expert on campaign organization with political ties throughout the 5th Congressional District."

With few exceptions, the Supreme Court District corresponds with the 27-county, predominantly Republican 5th District.

Lambert and Luker will face each other for the right to replace Justice John D. White of Manchester, a former Kentucky Court of Appeals Justice who was appointed to fill Calvin Aker's seat when he resigned last March to

join a London law firm.

When Aker was elected to the high court in 1978, he was then district judge for Rockcastle and Pulaski counties. His term would have expired this year.

Lambert, who took time out from a busy schedule Monday for an interview as all good politicians will do, said that he thinks it would be very helpful to have a younger member of the Supreme Court -- somebody who has an understanding of what people face in the process of buying a home, paying taxes and educating children. "I think it's a recognized fact that times and circumstances change," he said.

"A seat on the Kentucky Supreme Court is a very important position which requires a lot of work, he added. It shouldn't be given to someone at retirement age like a gold watch."

During the primary, Lambert showed strength throughout the

district. He won 13 counties outright, ranging from Bell on the east to Russell, near the center, and Nelson on the west.

Lambert piled up large margins in, of course, Rockcastle County and Jackson County, where he worked election day, and Bell county, where his wife, Debra Hembree Lambert, campaigned on election day. Debra is a native of Bell County and Joe said Tuesday that fact was a big help in the primary.

Although Lambert did not fare as well in the western part of the district as he would have liked, he thinks that an opponent in the primary may help to change that situation.

Morris Butler, who ran third to Lambert in the primary, is openly endorsing Lambert this fall. Butler lives and practices law in Green County and ran strong in Taylor and Metcalf counties in the primary.

"Of course, Mrs. Adams is supporting Judge Luker," Lambert said Tuesday. Mrs. Adams ran

supposed to help us hold down deficits. Another way to take power away from committee chairman by breaking each committee up into many smaller subcommittees. Both of these changes sound like good ideas; unfortunately, they have only created more problems.

This year's budget process is a perfect example. The House Budget Committee received the President's budget requests in early January. But instead of immediately beginning work on that budget, the committee leadership decided to hold field hearings all around the country. Those hearings got a lot of media attention, but did little to help shape the budget. Meantime, the other committees were required to sit and wait for Budget Committee action. By the time that happened, all the other committees were almost hopelessly delayed.

The final budget outline was supposed to be finished by April 15th. It was not agreed upon, however, until June 26th—some two months later.

This delay then forced further delays in action on the 13 appropriations bills which Congress must pass each year. I sit on the Appropriations panel and I tried to push us to act quickly. Our committee and the full House passed 11 of these bills. However, the Senate has yet to pass more than six.

So now we find ourselves having to pass a "Continuing Resolution" which wraps all the appropriations bills into our bill. That means, one vote on nearly everything through next year's budget—\$600 billion, yea or nay. It is an insane way to operate. With that one vote, we will have no opportunity to weed out the bad programs or to cut wasteful spending. It is all or nothing—take it or leave it.

The solution? We should first of all abolish the Budget Committee. Let the Appropriations Committee (which spends the money) and the Ways and Means

Committee (which raises revenue) work out a budget as they did before the reforms of the '70's.

We should also try to consolidate the number of subcommittees in Congress generally. It seems that nearly half of the 435 congressmen are "chairman" of one subcommittee or another. No one has enough power to make the tough decisions needed to bring down the huge federal deficit. Key leaders ought to be able to resolve differences without involving everyone in the process.

I would also like to see us

move to a two-year budget. That way, we could devote more of our time to making government work better and at less cost. The President also needs to have the ability to veto specific programs line-by-line, such as many of our governors can.

There is a lot of waste in that \$600 billion budget. But with this budget system we have now, we will have no chance to cut that waste. We need major budget reform in Congress and we need it soon—for your sake and for our country's sake.

On or about October 26, 1986, the above named City will request the Appalachian Regional Commission to release Federal funds under the Commission's "Jobs and Private Investment Program" for the following project:

Mt. Vernon Water and Sewer Extension Project Water Treatment Plant Improvements
 Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County, Kentucky

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and, accordingly, the above named City has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare such Statement are as follows:

(a) Only temporary and minimal adverse effects will occur as a result of the project activities, such as noise and dust during construction.

(b) Activities involve the upgrading of existing systems and the long term environmental conditions are not adversely affected by the short term adverse effects listed above. The positive benefits include the increase of water treatment capacity and supply needs for the entire City of Mt. Vernon and other water users in the County.

An Environmental Review Record respecting the within project has been made by the above named City which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why such Statement is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying, upon request, between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m.

No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of Federal funds.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City to the office of the undersigned. Such written comments should be received at the address specified on or before October 27, 1986. All such comments so received will be considered and the City will not request the release of Federal funds or take any administrative action on the within project prior to the date specified on the preceding sentence.

The City of Mt. Vernon will undertake the project described above with Appalachian Regional Commission funds from the Kentucky Department of Local Government. The City of Mt. Vernon is certifying to the State that Mt. Vernon and Roland Mullins, in his official capacity as Mayor, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Mt. Vernon may use the ARC funds and State and ARC will have satisfied their responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The State will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following basis:

- (a) The certification was not in fact executed by the City's Certifying Officer.
 - (b) The City has failed to make one of the two findings pursuant to SS 58.47 or 58.48 or to make the determination decision required by SS 58.47, 58.53 or 58.64 for the project, as applicable.
 - (c) The City has omitted one or more of the steps set forth at Subparts F and G for the preparation and completion of an Environmental Assessment.
 - (d) No opportunity was given to the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation or its Executive Director to review the effect of the project on a property listed on the National Register of Historic Places, or found to be eligible for such listing by the Secretary of the Interior, in accordance with 36 CFR Part 800.
 - (e) Objections have been made by a Federal Agency.
- Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58) and may be addressed to the Kentucky Department of Local Government, Capital Plaza Tower, 2nd Floor, Frankfort, Kentucky 40601.
- Objections to the release of funds on basis other than those stated above will not be considered by the State. No objections received after November 13, 1986, will be considered by the State.

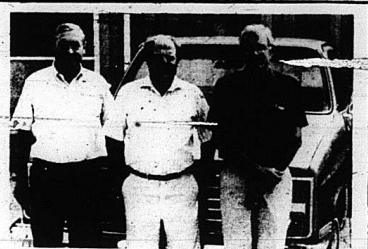

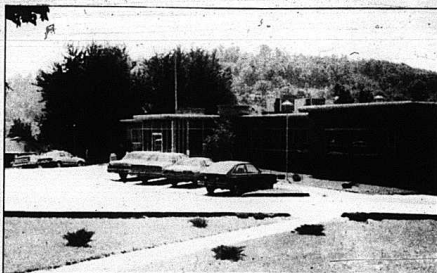

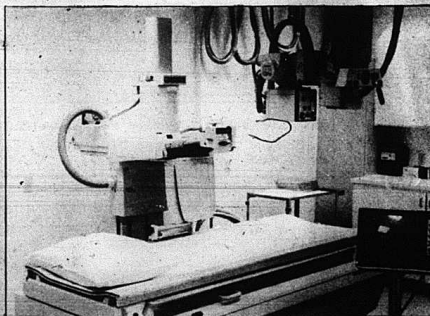
Rockcastle County Hospital celebrates 30 years of service

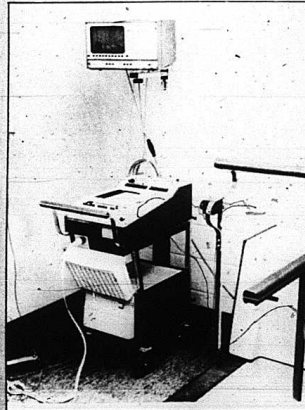

"Rockcastle River Dam" Cont. from Front

An application for a permit to build the dam had been advertised for several days that could have resulted in funding a feasibility study by CVADD that was estimated to cost over \$4 million and take three years.

The project would have provided a 7,500-acre-plus lake that would have backed water to nation's waterways.

Also, it is not clear how Somerset people would have reacted. They could have claimed with some justification that the water would be used for electricity production, leaving little for Lake Cumberland. Somerset was very outspoken about the earlier dam proposals.

John Bruner, executive director for CVADD, confirmed the project is dead unless some other financial source is found, but he did not hold out much hope.

Some Rockcastle residents had already condemned the dam, believing it would greatly affect the river in years to come. As one said: "The river will be just a dry hollow if that dam goes in."

Actually, the dam would not have benefited the county a great deal since about 75 percent would be in Nelson and 25 percent in Rockcastle counties. A possible exception would be that McKee would be better able to furnish water to the Red Hill area of the county.

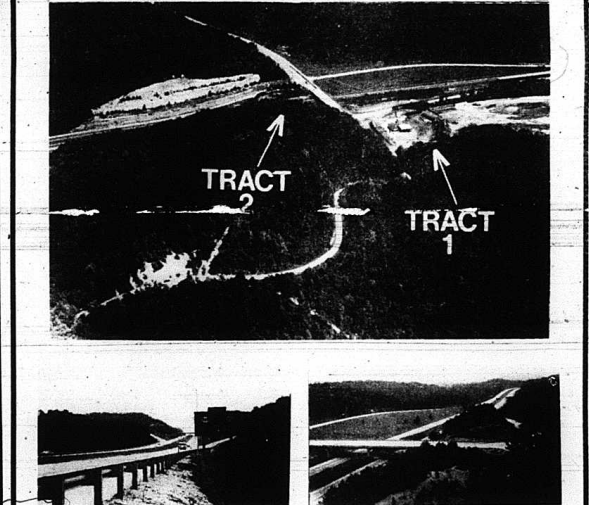

If Lambert is elected he will be the youngest member of the Supreme Court at 38. Justice Charles M. Leibson, 56, is now the youngest member of court while White, in his early 70's, is the oldest. Calvin Akers was 39 when he was elected in 1978.

Lambert explained Tuesday that although he is just 38, if he is elected and serves a full eight-year term he would be 46.

At the present time, Debra Lambert is in the University of Kentucky College of Law and is not able to help with Lambert's campaign, except on weekends. But of his wife, Lambert said she is a big help.

Last weekend I had already committed myself to a political rally in Clinton County and two different rallies had been scheduled in Taylor county the same night," he said. 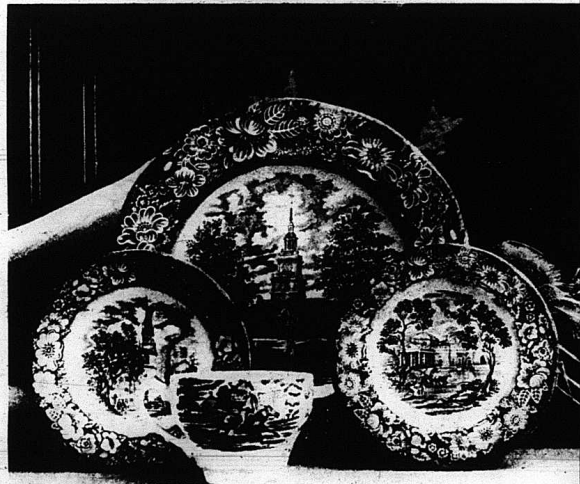

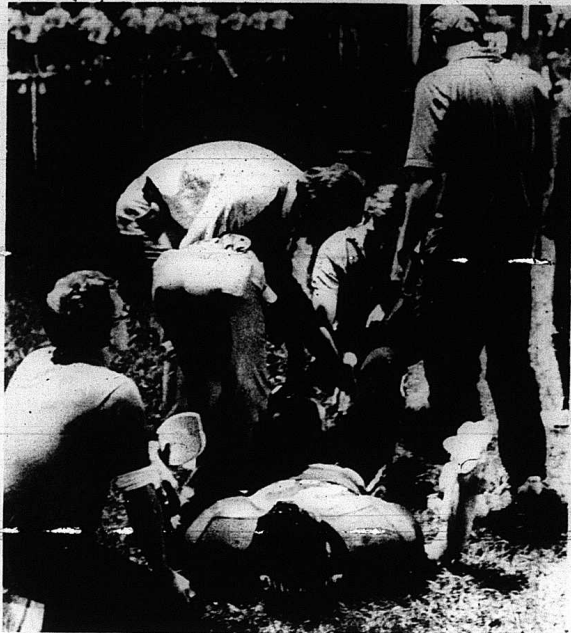
With only a few seconds remaining on the clock Bell kicked a 30 yard field goal to up their lead to 11-0.

Fishing activity for the October 4-5 weekend was reported light to moderate statewide. Angler success was reported up slightly as a result of rainfall and generally cooler temperatures statewide during the past few days.

Success by lake was reported by conservation officers or creel clerks at each lake.

Kentucky: Crappie were hitting jig and minnow combinations over submerged cover 10-17 feet deep; catfish were taking chicken livers over the main river channels 2-40 feet deep; murky, falling, 3 1/2 feet below summer pool and 28 degrees.

Barkley: Black bass were hitting crank baits cast off spina-grav points 3-10 feet deep; crappie were hitting minnows and jigs over brush piles and tree tops at the same depths; clear, falling, 3 1/2 feet below summer pool and 28 degrees.

Barren: Crappie continued to take minnows and jigs along stump rows 8-12 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits off rocky points 6-12 feet deep; heavy discharge prevented tailwater activity; clear, falling, 17 feet below summer pool and 78 degrees.

Barkley: Black bass were hitting buzz baits and crank baits off points and long stump rows 2-6 feet deep; crappie were taking minnows over submerged cover 5-10 feet deep; heavy discharge hampered activity in the tailwaters; clear to murky, falling, 17 feet below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Rough River: Crappie were taking minnows still fished over submerged cover 5-10 feet deep; black bass were hitting crank baits along stump rows and off rocky points and banks 5-10 feet deep; clear, stable at one foot below summer pool and 79 degrees.

Taylorsville: Black bass were taking deep runners over submerged cover in 6-12 feet of water; bluegill were biting crickets and worms also over submerged cover about six feet deep; clear to murky, stable at 1 1/2 feet below

summer pool and 78 degrees.

Herrington: Black bass were hitting plastic worms and crank baits off rocky points and banks 10-12 feet deep; blue gill were biting wax worms and crickets off rocky banks 6-8 feet deep; clear, stable at 16 feet below summer pool and 77 degrees.

Green River: Crappie were hitting minnows and crickets around stick-ups and submerged cover 10-15 feet deep; muskie were active on large spinners in deep channels; white bass were

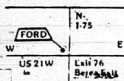

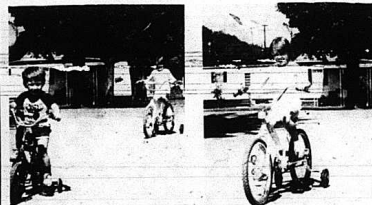
