"We had the largest crowd that we've had at this festival," Mrs. King stated. "It seems to get larger every year."

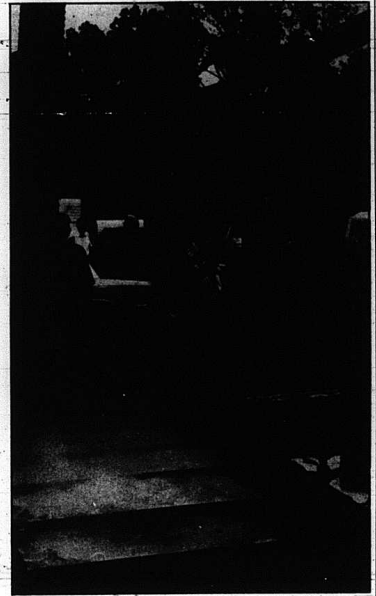
It must have been the largest crowd. There was not a motel room available between Richmond and Corbin. There was standing room only for five bandstand shows.

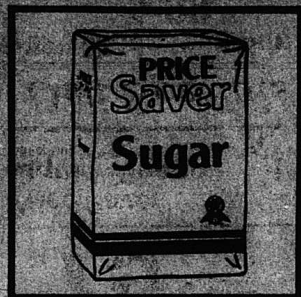

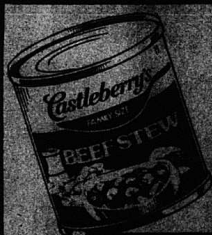

## Sewer service agreement reached by city and King

A smoldering disagreement over a sewer line that could have involved the City of Mt. Vernon in legal action was apparently settled Tuesday at a called meeting of the city council.

The council and developer, David King, reached an agreement that will bring sewer service to his developing Chestnut Hills Subdivision in south Mt. Vernon.

The disagreement had been simmering for weeks after the city eliminated the sewer line leading to four residences and the King subdivision because of a lack of money in the Owens Subdivision sewer construction program.

In the agreement that was approved unanimously by the councilmen present, the city will lay 1,000 feet of forced main and 300 feet of service line at an estimated cost of about \$2,500.

King Developments will purchase and install a new \$35,000 absorption station at that point where a split between the city and King. The city will reimburse King \$18,200 as its share of the pump station. The money will come from the city Water Sewer

Fund

King will pay the \$3,150 cost for inspection of the pump station. King will be responsible for laying his own sewer lines throughout the subdivision.

The city will file another application for a \$30,000 grant to help develop the recreation area at Lake Linville.

The city agreed to apply for the grant during its regular meeting of the council Monday night.

Among things to be done with the money, if it is forthcoming, will be to install lights at the ballfield.

The grant would come from the Land and Water Conservation Fund, according to a representative of the Cumberland Falls Area Development District which will handle the details.

During the discussion of the Lake Linville project, Councilman Tom Welch complained about the poor condition of restrooms in the area. The council will look into the matter.

The council was told by city employee James Rickels that new

## Indiana couple arraigned here on sex abuse charges

A former Rockcastle County man and an Indiana woman have been placed under a \$35,000 bond and lodged in the Rockcastle County jail, after they were indicted by a Grand Jury last month.

George Jack Mudrich, alias Jack Morgan, 55, and Katherine Torok, 27, were arraigned Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court on charges of rape, and 3rd degree sodomy.

The two were transferred by plane Thursday night to Rockcastle by Indiana authorities. Both are facing similar charges in Indiana as well as charges of conspiracy to distribute cocaine.

According to the local indictments the charges here stem from sexual acts that the two committed in Mt. Vernon from November of

1985 to April of 1986.

The indictment reads that Jack Mudrich or Jack Morgan, who now goes an Indianapolis, Ind. address, "committed rape and sodomy by engaging in sexual intercourse with a girl less than 16 years of age in Rockcastle County."

Katherine Torok was also charged with 3rd degree sodomy because she "engaged in deviate sexual intercourse" with the same girl, between November and April.

Public defender Jim Cox has been appointed as both defendants counsel and on Oct. 24 pre-trial conference has been set.

Mudrich had been renting a house on High Street in Mt. Vernon since April of last year when F.B.I. agents arrested him in July of this year in Indiana.

## Burned bodies identified as local couple

Two Rockcastle County residents were shot several times and then burned almost beyond recognition last week in the back seat of a station wagon.

Rockcastle County coroner Billy Dowell said that Jackie McHargue, 25, of Mt. Vernon and Emma Ingraffia, 40, also of Mt. Vernon were found in the back seat of a 1974 Datsun Station Wagon which had completely burned.

According to police, the car was found near the Sinks community on the Mullins Station road by a local resident who asked not to be identified.

The badly burned bodies were found about 3:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon. McHargue and Ingraffia had been reported missing for almost a week when the car was found.

The bodies were burned so badly that it took the state forensic pathologist two days to identify Ingraffia and three days to get a positive identification of McHargue, Dowell said.

Both victims died from multiple gun shot wounds before their bodies were burned, the coroner said.

It appeared that old tires had been laid on top of the bodies and then set on fire, Dowell commented.

According to police, several people saw the car setting by the roadside but that no one thought anything about it until the car man finally looked inside the car.

Dowell said that he thought the car had been there since probably last Sunday or Monday.

Kentucky State Police Detective Herbert Adams is conducting the investigation.

Both bodies were taken to the Dowell and Martin Funeral Home. Arrangements are incomplete on McHargue, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Claude McHargue of Pine Hill.

The third murder in as many days in Rockcastle County occurred Monday afternoon on the Popular Grove road near the Pulaski County in the Willalla community. Larry Randall Laswell, 22, of Mt. Vernon, died from two .38 calibre gunshot wounds to the chest about 1:30 p.m., according to Rockcastle County Deputy Coroner Roy Martin, who pronounced Laswell dead at the scene.

## Burns' attorney loses motion

Adams said that Laswell's wife, Laboma, and his daughter were in his car with him at the time of the shooting.

Laswell's slaying brings the

number of murders in Rockcastle this year to six.

## Judge dismisses garbage motions

Motions, relating to a dispute over a garbage franchise in the City of Mt. Vernon, were dismissed by Circuit Judge Daniel J. Venters Tuesday.

The judge dismissed a cross-claim by Bee Garbage Transfer Systems against the city, also dismissed a complaint by William K. Bullen that could have held the city responsible for any financial loss by Bullen because of the operations of Bee in the city.

The judge will now hear the franchise case between Bullen and Bee Garbage. Bullen claims Bee is operating in the city limits in violation of his exclusive franchise.

Judge Venters is expected to set a date for a hearing (trial) on the validity of the franchise.

If the judge finds for Bee, then the firm can continue to collect garbage in the city. If he finds Bullen has a valid exclusive franchise, Bee will have to cease operating in the city.

At Mt. Vernon, 311 Brodhead children boarded along with about 80 others for the ride to Brodhead. Some of the others went on to Stanford.

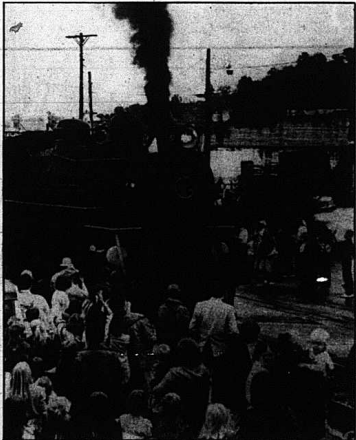
At Brodhead, about 30 parents and children boarded to ride to Stanford.

10.08% is now average home mortgage rate

According to the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Corporation, lenders are now offering conventional fixed-rate mortgages at an average of 10.08%. J. Timothy Howard, chief economist of the Federal National Mortgage Association, expects rates to rise one quarter of one percent by the end of 1986. During 1987, rates are expected to climb to around 11%.

Although interest rates charged by conventional lending institutions are expected to accelerate, Kentucky Housing Corporation (KHC) still offers a 9 3/8% fixed-rate interest since December, 1985. 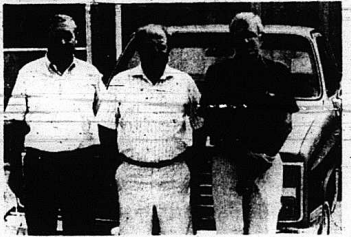

## Revolutionary soldier's grave finally gets marker

DAR members, historians, neighbors, and descendants met in the brisk October wind, Sunday afternoon, October 5 to dedicate a military marker to the memory of Revolutionary War soldier, James Dysart. It had been a joint effort of interested individuals that had spanned more than a decade.

In May 1974, John Lair had written in his "Rockcastle Recollections" column of the Mt. Vernon Signal this short sketch: Colonel James Dysart: Born in Donegal, Ireland, 1744. At age 18, was given passage money by grandfather and came to America. Traveled down the Valley of Virginia and became a frontiersman, going with a party of Long Hunters, headed by Skaggs and Drake, in 1770. Was Captain at Battle of Kings Mountain, after which he was promoted to Major and later Colonel. Built mill and distillery and lost all signing notes for friends. Came to Kentucky in his old age, taking up 1500 acres of land. Lived in Rockcastle with wife and six children. Died May 26, 1818, age 74. One of the most unusual men Rockcastle County has known.

Shortly after this appeared in the Signal, Chester Whitaker took Mr. Lair to the middle of a cow pasture where a cluster of trees and underbrush covered an old cemetery scattered with stones that had once been several low, stone walls surrounding some of the graves. Mr. Whitaker had remembered hearing stories of the "old Dysarts" when he was a

young boy, and knew the location of the old graveyard on Skaggs Creek. Together Whitaker and Lair hunted through the worn markers and field stones until they found a rounded marker with the faint etchings, "J.D. d 1818."

Mr. Lair published an account of their findings and asked if any descendants were in his reading area. Reportedly, a retired military officer made contact with Mr. Lair and talked of having the grave officially marked, but nothing more was done.

About three years ago, a group who later formed the present Rockcastle Historical Society, began to canvass and record all the cemeteries in the County. Once again, Chester Whitaker led the way to the old cemetery which was even more overgrown and cattledriven. This time, the Rock-

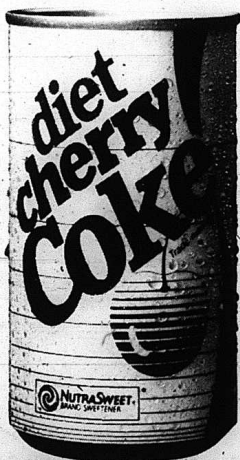

castle Chapter, DAR, was asked to try to obtain a marker for this old soldier. After two and a-half years, two applications to Washington, D.C. and countless letters and telephone calls, the government marker arrived at McNew Monuments in Rockcastle County. During this time, both Mr. Whitaker and Mr. Lair had died.

Dysart descendants all over the United States had been notified through a genealogical newsletter that the old ancestor's grave was to be officially marked, and many came, some flying from Florida, others driving from Colorado, Iowa, Indiana and Owensboro, Kentucky. Whitaker family and neighbors came from the surrounding area, remembering Chester and the part he had played. Approximately sixty people gathered in the fall sunshine as a great great-great great grandson, Charles Griffith, gave a short history of the patriot, then Rockcastle Chapter members conducted a dedication ceremony. As the red and white stripes of Old Glory stirred silently, and the sound of "Taps" echoed across the field, the small grandson of Chester Whitaker unveiled the marble stone James Dysart, Capt., Continental Line, Revolutionary War. 1744 1818

# No river dam Bond money unavailable

Nothing ventured, nothing gained, so goes the old adage. And so it appears that is about all that can be said for a dam at the headwaters of the Rockcastle River.

The soon Rockcastle Laurel-Jackson project now appears to be a dead issue.

Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) at London proposed the idea of a dam of Parker Branch to be known as the Parker Branch Industrial Authority. It was to be constructed just inside the Rockcastle County

line and would furnish water to McKee, and be used for recreation. But unless the new tax law is changed to exempt taxes on the type of bonds that were to be used to finance the project, the dam is in the "nothing gained" category.

A last ditch effort to save the project was made by CVADD and other officials to state legislators, but reportedly the proposal was met with a luke warm reception.

There is apparently no market for the \$150 million in bonds needed for the project because of the new tax laws.

An application for a permit to build the dam had been advertised for several days that could have resulted in funding a feasibility

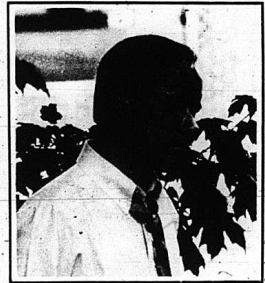
### Opal Hopkins is master quilter

Some Rockcastle residents had already condemned the dam, believing it would greatly affect the river in years to come. As one said: "The river will be just a dry hollow if that dam goes in."

Actually, the dam would not have benefited the county a great deal since about all of the water would be in Jackson and Laurel counties. A possible exception would be that McKee would be better able to furnish water to the Red Hill area of the county.

## KHEA sets Nov. 15 deadline for loan defaulters

The Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority plans to notify 5,137 student loan defaulters this week that they have until Nov. 15 to pay up or the U.S. Department of Education will take their 1986 federal income tax refunds to help repay their defaulted loans.

The 5,137 defaulters, who are now scattered across the U.S., but whose loans originated in Kentucky, owe the federal government an average of \$2,768 and a combined total of approximately \$14.2 million in principal and interest. These defaulted loans were insured through KHEAA by the federal government.

KHEAA transferred these defaulted loans to the U.S. Department of Education which has authorized the state agency to accept payment on its behalf prior to referring the claims to the Internal Revenue Service for action. The IRS, upon notification from the Department of Education, will deduct the amount of the defaulted loan plus a servicing fee from any federal income tax refund for 1986.

If the 1986 federal tax return is insufficient to cover the debt, or if no federal refund is due, the student can expect to see a legal action by KHEAA or to have their every year until the defaulted loan is repaid in full.

KHEAA has been claiming state income tax refunds to help offset defaulted loans since the 1984 tax year and has claimed a total of \$101,000 in tax refunds in the last two years.

vided a 7,500-acre-plus lake that would have backed water to McKee and East Bernstadt. It would have had a 22,000 kilowatt electrical generator, provided flood protection for Livingston and needed water for Jackson County.

A dam on the river has always been in the doubtful category. When originally conceived by the Army Corps of Engineers in the early 1940s, the dam was proposed at the Narrows of the river and would have backed water into Livingston. An alternate dam was suggested northeast of Livingston that would have backed water 14 feet deep under the Ky. 490 bridge at the Laurel County line.

In the Corps' view, the water would have been used to feed Lake Cumberland in dry years by "pulling the plug" on the dam.

The Corps at that time had

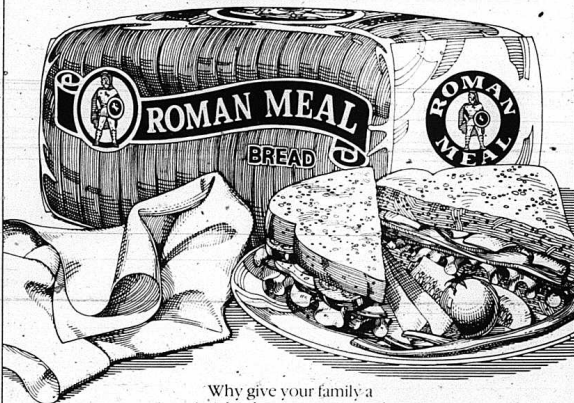
also used flood control as an incentive for the dam, but the Corps found in its study that they could not justify that promise.

The Corps had not commented on the recent project. However, if it had reached the study stage, the Corps certainly would have had something to say about it, since the Corps controls the nation's waterways.

Also, it is not clear how Somerset people would have reacted. They could have abandoned their water rights, but they would be used for electricity production, leaving little for Lake Cumberland. Somerset was very outspoken about the earlier dam proposals.

John Bruner, executive director for CVADD, confirmed the project is dead unless some other financial source is found, but he did not hold out much hope.

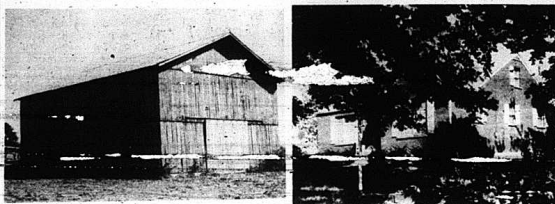

during the five-day excursion which began at Louisville, traveled to Richmond, Berea, London, Corbin, Harlan, Appalachia, Va., Jellico, Tenn., Sinks and on through Rockcastle to Lebanon and Louisville.

She said some of the children were awed by the ride and sat still, while others were "hard to keep contained since there were so many things to see on and off the train."

"But they all enjoyed it, I'm sure," she said. "I don't think we had anyone get sick. We had first aid available."

She related the only accident she knew of occurred when a woman was an "excess" man "while getting off the train. He was not severely hurt."

Mrs. McHargue said the train picked up more people in Rockcastle County than any other area during the entire trip. The train was sold out between Livingston and Brodhead.

At the rear of the 11-car train was a private car owned by John Madden, wealthy Cincinnati resident and railroad buff, who takes his car along of several excursions around the nation.

welcome signs at the city limits would be completed soon. He said work had been delayed because it had been difficult to find volunteers to help.

FBI agents then raided the house on High Street where he was living on July 8 looking for evidence against Mudrich, whose only known occupation is that of musician.

Mudrich and Torok were two of twelve that were indicted by the local grand jury.

In other court action, after the Kentucky Court of Appeals threw out a conviction of Lisa Jones for the murder of Johnny Falin of Mt. Vernon last year, Circuit Judge Dan Venters set a new trial for Nov. 18.

In overturning the conviction, the high court ruled that Judge Venters should not have allowed Falin's ex-wife to testify in the trial.

This will be the third time that Jones has been tried for the murder. The first time no verdict could be reached by the jury.

Acker's 23-year-old daughter, Tammy, was stabbed to death during the robbery.

Benny Hodge, who is Mrs. Hodge's husband, and Roger Dale Epperson, Mrs. Epperson's husband, were convicted of the

murder and robbery in June and sentenced to death.

Burns represented Epperson and federal authorities allege that his fees in the case were paid with money stolen from Acker and that Burns knew the money was stolen.

Burns has said he received a fee for defending Epperson, but he did not know the source of the money.

Lexington attorney Robert Willmot, who represents Mrs. Hodge, asked Siler yesterday to set bail for her. She was earlier denied bail.

Siler "referred" the request, along with a motion that the trials for Burns and Mrs. Hodge be severed, to a federal magistrate.

The stolen money case is one of several allegations facing Burns.

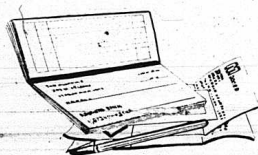

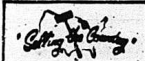

**SELECT AND STORE BEST FALL PRODUCE**  
By Cheryl White  
County Extension Agent  
for Home Economics

If you have fall produce you plan to store from your own garden, or that from a farmer's market, pay particular attention to the vegetables you select and how you handle and store them.

Sweet potatoes, pumpkins and squash can be stored for several weeks if handled and stored properly. If you are buying your produce, select winter squash and pumpkins that are heavy for their size, have a hard skin and are free of blemishes and soft spots. Select sweet potatoes that are unblemished and firm, not shriveled.

Store squash in the refrigerator or at room temperature and use within a few weeks. Pumpkins should be stored in a cool, dry place and used within a month. Store sweet potatoes for seven to 10 days in 80 to 85 degree temperatures, then place in 55 to 60 degree temperatures.

If you grow your own vegetables, be especially careful when harvesting them. Clip sweet potatoes before harvesting to prevent injury to the vegetables. Be careful not to cut into potatoes when using digging tools.

Remove the sweet potatoes from the field shortly after digging to prevent sunscald. If the temperature may fall below 55 degrees, avoid leaving dug roots in the field overnight.

Sort through the potatoes carefully. Do not store diseased potatoes. To help prevent post-harvest decay, "dip" the sweet potatoes in a mixture of Borax 50 (one pound Borax to five gallons of water). Do not rinse. To cure, store the potatoes for seven to 10 days at 80 to 85 degrees. Be sure they have good ventilation. After curing, store them at 55 to 60 degrees. Injury will occur to the potatoes if they are stored below a temperature of 55 degrees.

Pumpkins and winter squash only after they are fully mature. They should have their mature color and should not be scratched easily with your fingernail. Cut the fruit from the vine with an inch or two of stem attached.

Cure pumpkins and winter

squash for a week or two at 80 to 85 degrees before storing. To cure, place the vegetables in containers covered with paper or cloth and put them near a heat source to keep warm temperatures and high humidity. After they have cured, store pumpkins and winter squash at 50 to 60 degrees.

Spread in a single layer so air can circulate between them.

Commercial stored vegetables occasionally and discard any that show signs of rotting or shriveling.

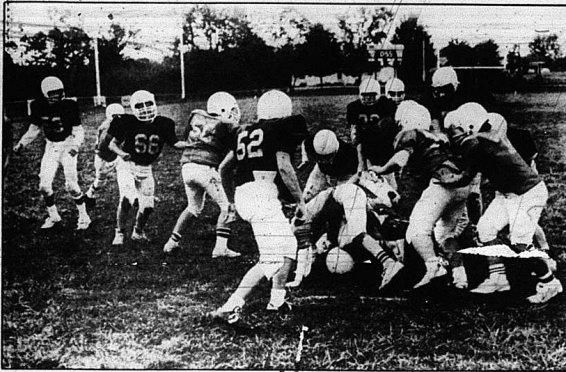

## HIGH TEMPERATURES-BUYOUT TIGHTEN MILK SUPPLIES

Milk supplies in the Southeast are 4 to 8 percent below customer needs, the combined result of recent high temperatures and a federal government program aimed at reducing the nation's milk surplus.

Dairymen Inc., the largest supplier of producer milk in the 16-state market, has been forced to ration available supplies to its customers and convert milk powder into products such as cottage cheese and buttermilk. Other milk suppliers in the Southeast are experiencing similar difficulties in obtaining sufficient milk.

"This is one of the tightest supply situations we've faced at this time of the year," said Dr. Al Ortego, economist and senior vice president for the Louisville-based cooperative. "We've resisted bringing milk in from the Upper Midwest" due to the extremely high prices they are demanding.

Supplies of milk began to tighten in the Southeast this summer as many dairy farmers began selling their herds in response to the Dairy Termination Program initiated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) to temper a national milk surplus. Although the surplus seldom applies to the Southeast, many farmers in the Southeast still committed to slaughter their herds under the federal program.

The Southeast is losing about 12.5 percent of its milk production over the span of the 18-month program. Ortego noted that local dairy farmers participated in the reduction program at a rate higher than the national average.

The buyout program has already realized a net drop in milk production of 3 to 5 percent from a year ago. "But on top of that, the unexpected high temperatures the first week of October resulted in production declines of up to 18 percent below the prior month's level in some of the hardest hit areas."

Some of these declines were partially offset by varying weather conditions in other production areas which enabled Dairymen to absorb much of these losses by moving milk within its marketing area.

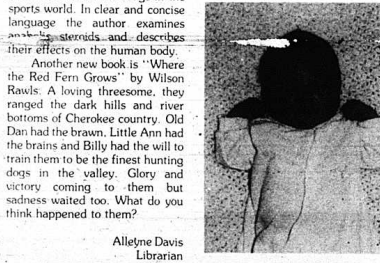

CORN VARIETY TEST RESULT

Steve Trebolo hosted local farmers and FFA students on October 7th as 15 corn varieties, from five major companies were harvested in the Corn Variety Plots.

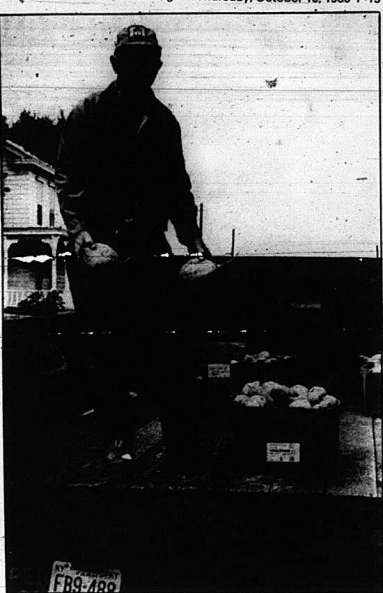
Steve's farm was selected due to a history of high corn yields. Past competition in the U.K. Contest ranged from 161 to 170 bushels per acre. The selected field received all phosphate and potash from hog manure and urea as nitrogen source.

Yields ranged from 146.6 bushels/acre to 97.5 bushels/acre with moisture ranging from 24.1 percent to 20.0 percent. A computer was used to compare each variety to a side-by-side check which helped eliminate field differences.

Yields and moisture percentages were:

- Variety: Pioneer XC 853 - Yield: 146.6 Bushel/acre - Moisture 21.5%
- DeKalb 656 - 132.6 bushel/acre - 19.5%
- Jaques 8350 - 127.0 bushel/acre - 21.0%
- Pioneer 3352 - 126.8 bushel/acre - 20.4%
- Pioneer 3378 - 126.4 bushel/acre - 20.1%
- Pioneer 3358 - 125.2 bushel/acre - 21.3%
- Funks RA 1502 - 121.4 bushel/acre - 22.5%
- Pioneer 3389 - 121.3 bushel/acre - 20.1%
- Southern States 811 - 118.4 bushel/acre - 23%
- DeKalb T1100 - 116.8 bushel/acre - 20.1%
- Jaques JX227 - 112.8 bushel/acre - 20.8%
- Jaques 7900 - 109.8 bushel/acre - 19.5%
- Funks G4522 - 105.2 bushel/acre - 20.0%
- Southern States 680 - 97.5 bushel/acre - 23.0%

iated with a cold. A tight, nonproductive cough is more likely to signal a wheezing spell or asthma attack. Often parents claim their baby was "born with asthma." Actually doctors can't tell who is going to be asthmatic until they are about two years of age. It's when you may sound wheezy with certain viral illnesses... but not be asthmatic when they are older. Such infants do not usually benefit from medicine for asthma. This is a complex issue but if your child is making funny noises with his breathing, that you haven't noticed before, he should see the doctor before it becomes an emergency or gets to be Saturday night, which is when most emergencies seem to occur.

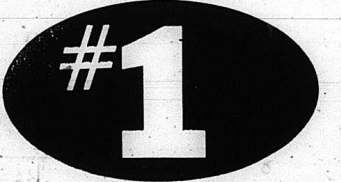
'Tis the season to be wheezy: Likely your asthma is the reason. In case you hadn't noticed, Fall is here and this is the time many children with a tendency to allergic problems may wheeze. "Wheezing" in a medical sense means that the tiny air tubes in the lungs are narrowed and the air has trouble getting through. The passage of air, especially on breathing out, through these narrowed passages make a high pitched, musical sound we call wheezing. This can be caused by allergies, colds, emotions, and weather changes. The first symptom often is a cough that lingers on for several days. Sometimes it progresses to labored breathing.

Parents of asthmatic children know that treatment should be started early with oral or inhaled medicines to dilate the bronchial tubes. Such lung noises need to be distinguished from "rattling" or a moist sounding cough often associated with a cold.
