## UK Medical Center says county owes \$71,000 bill

The county has found itself with another problem to add to all its other woes.

This time, it's a \$71,000 hospital bill that was incurred by a local man who was jailed then hospitalized in 1982 on sexual misconduct charges.

Treated at the University of Kentucky Medical Center was Vincent L. Pittman of Mt. Vernon for to date, an undisclosed number of weeks.

The medical center wants to collect the bill from the county and has indicated they will file suit unless the bill is paid.

Pittman was sentenced in Rockcastle Circuit Court on April 9, 1982, after a guilty jury verdict to a year in the county jail on "sexual misconduct through aiding and abetting in the first degree." The trial stemmed from a rape charge that Pittman supposedly committed against a Somersville girl.

Pittman was taken to the county jail where he later became ill and was taken to Rockcastle County Hospital. He was sent on to the medical center where doctors found he was suffering from leukemia. He died on June 12, 1983 at the medical center.

Since he was sentenced to serve his time in the county jail on a misdemeanor charge, reduced from a felony charge, the county is apparently responsible for the bill. Unless the state comes to the county's aid, the court sets it aside on some technicality, or there are extenuating circumstances, the county will have to pay the bill.

Representatives of the county went to Frankfort last Thursday to ask the state for help with the bill, "due to the county's limited finances."

According to County Attorney James H. Lambert, the state Department of Local Government said the department would work with the county in any way it could, and would study and consider the matter. The department did not promise any money would be forthcoming.

"We're hopeful something can be done," Attorney Lambert said. "But they gave no definite answer."

### GARBAGE TRIAL

Circuit Judge Dan Venters has set November 20 as the date he will hear the case of William K. Bullen and Helton Sanitation vs. Bee Garbage Transfer Systems. Bullens and Helton are asking Venters to stop Bee from collecting garbage in Mt. Vernon.

### RE-TRIAL SET

The re-trial of Lisa Jones for the 1984 murder of Johnny Falin of Mt. Vernon has been set for November 18 in Rockcastle Circuit Court. Jones was convicted of the murder earlier this year but a higher court ruled that Falin's ex-wife should not have been allowed to testify during the trial.

### CANDIDATE QUESTIONS BOARD MEMBER'S LEGALITY

Earl Cummins, who is running for the local board of education seat from Division 1 against incumbent board chairman Dr. Rudolph Burdette is questioning the fact that Burdette is a member of the local board of health as well as a school board member. Cummins said that according to Ky.'s Constitution, positions on the health board and school board are incompatible in that Burdette should not be on both boards.

### FUNDS FOR HEATING CUT

The U.S. Congress cut more than \$3 billion in federal funding from Kentucky's Home Energy Assistance Program, giving the state \$16.8 million. Payments ranging from \$75 to \$135, will be about \$25 less than expected for the 160,000 families in the state that will receive help. Monday began the first phase of sign-up locally.

### SEX-DISCRIMINATION TRIAL POSTPONED

The federal trial between the local board of education and guidance counselor Sue Hamm has been postponed until March 11 in London. Hamm claims that the board, and Supt. Charles Parsons, discriminated against her in their hiring for administrative jobs.

### HOME BURNS IN LIVINGSTON

A fire of an undetermined origin completely destroyed the home of Gary Griffin in Livingston Monday night. Livingston Fire Chief Jerry Mink said that the fire broke out at approximately 6:45 p.m.

### LITTLE DAMAGE TO BARRON HOUSE

The home of Russell Barron on the Sand Springs road sustained very little damage Monday morning after a fire started around the flu according to Gary Hansel of the Mt. Vernon fire department, who said that two men who saw the fire had it almost out when firemen arrived.

## County asks for Foster suit to be dismissed

Rockcastle Circuit Court has been asked to dismiss a suit against the county that claims the county owes rental money to two county residents, the result of cancelling a lease on a garbage landfill near Pine Hill.

Eugene and Linda Foster own \$2,250 they say is due them in rental fees for the land on which the landfill was to be operated.

The Fosters say the county "neglected and refused" to pay

the rentals due and continues to do so.

They ask for the money, a trial by jury and all their costs.

In his answer to the suit, County Attorney James H. Lambert said the complaint failed to state a claim upon which relief can be granted, and that the county denies each and every other allegation in the complaint.

Attorney Lambert concluded that the lease was voided on Dec.

4, 1984 when the Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted unanimously to withdraw its application to the Kentucky Department of Natural Resources.

Attorney Lambert wrote that the court "has voted only after a public hearing and various votes concerning the matter."

He noted that court "withdrew its application to the state agency because the site had proved to be unsuitable for a landfill in that

impurities were shown to seep into river and creek systems nearby and pollute the water supply of the

county.

## High speed chase ends in death

A report of a suspected D.U.I. in Rockcastle County last Thursday ended in a fatality in Madison County.

According to Gilbert Accardo Jr., public affairs officer for Kentucky State Police at London, a call was received at the Post just after midnight Thursday night. The caller said that there a possible drunk driver near the Burr Exit in Rockcastle County.

Sgt. Ronald Sears of the London Post located the 1978 Jeep at approximately 1:12 a.m. at the 59 mile marker and attempted to stop the vehicle, according to Accardo.

Accardo said that the Jeep was speeding when Sears activated his lights on his cruiser but that the Jeep did not respond and attempted to elude Sears.

Speeds during the chase reached up to 105 mph according to Accardo, who said that the Berea City police department and the Richmond State Police Post were called on for assistance, as the chase continued north on I-75.

Berea police officers Richard Bates and Edmond Todd responded to Sears' call for help and attempted to set up a moving road block in front of the Jeep.

Accardo said that the Jeep did not have any headlights on, during the chase the Jeep, driven by Perry Wilhoite, 49, Rt. 1, Walland Tn, struck Bates' cruiser in the rear near the Berea exit.

After the Jeep hit Bates, it left the roadway, struck a tree and fence before turning over on it's side.

According to Accardo, the vehicle traveled a total of 326 feet after impact with Bates' cruiser.

Wilhoite was partially ejected from the Jeep and was pronounced dead at the scene by Madison County deputy coroner Charles Stiles. Wilhoite was wearing a seat belt.

## Court adopts garbage resolution

A resolution adopting Rockcastle County as a Solid Waste Management Area (garbage) was adopted by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a called meeting Friday.

All that is left before the county begins implementing the plan, is for the Department of Natural Resources to acknowledge the resolution. At that time, the county can begin the lengthy process of putting the countwide

solid waste plan into operation.

Tim Schwendeman of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District, which contracted with the county to devise a plan, said a work session will be held by the court probably within the next two weeks at which time the court will begin the process of bringing the plan into operation.

He said there are no changes in the plan as was approved earlier by the court. It will be a voluntary plan as it pertains to householders

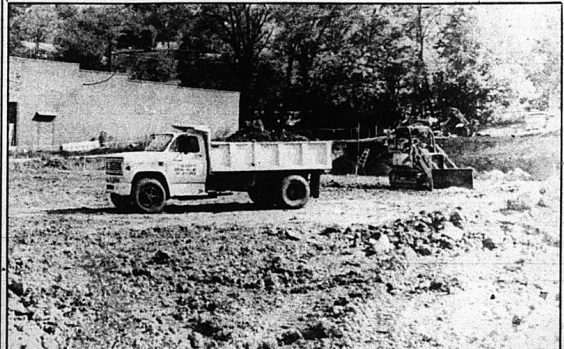
and commercial users.

### FUTURE BRIGHT FOR KENTUCKY TOBACCO SALES IN JAPAN

The recent announcement by the Japanese to eliminate trade barriers for American cigarettes is yet another example of how the U.S. can succeed in boosting sales abroad by threatening retaliation and the loss of sales in the United States.

As part of an ongoing effort to increase sales of Kentucky tobacco abroad, about a month ago I sent letters to Treasury Secretary James Baker, Japanese Finance Minister Kichi Miyazawa, and other cabinet level officials regarding the American cigarettes being traded fairly in the Japanese market. The letters, timed to coincide with U.S. Japanese trade talks, noted that Japan's practice of double taxing American cigarettes and freezing them out of their distribution network had already been found illegal under international trade rules and it was high time the Japanese either traded fair or be penalized.

The success of this "fish or cut bait" strategy shows that the U.S. holds the trump card in trade debates, particularly when we practice a little patience and concentrate on one country at a time. It worked well in opening the Korean market to American cigarettes and has worked again with Japan, the most sophisticated of Asian countries in its practice of trade protection.

With Japan providing the largest share of our trade deficit, they will have the most to lose. But it is only with the quiet, "get tough" attitude of our negotiators that we have convinced our trading partners that we mean business.

For Kentucky, the benefits of this strategy should be gratifying. As a result of the Japanese ending its tariff on American cigarettes beginning next April, American cigarettes could account for 10 percent of the Japanese market within five years. That would bring a \$160 million growth in annual sales of U.S. burley, much of it Kentucky grown.

But as is the case with Korea, a trade concession made does not mean an improved market make. Market growth in both Korea and Japan requires follow through to ensure they meet their fair trade agreements. And it also involves shrewd marketing on the part of American businesses in taking advantage of the opportunity.

## Your Child's Health

Being a parent is one of the toughest jobs in the world. Nobody seems to appreciate the value of a mother's time when they say "Are you just a housewife, or do you work?"

Someone has composed a "Parent Stress Test". If you answer yes to two or more of the questions below you might be at greater than average risk of abusing your children.

1. I have less than an hour a day to myself.
2. My child is overly active or a discipline problem.

3. Someone in my family criticizes the way I raise my children.
4. I am a single parent.
5. My child has special problems.
6. Sometimes I hit my child when I am furious or don't know what to do.

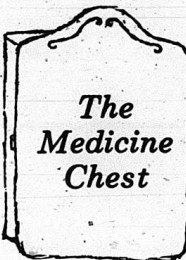
7. I feel tired most of the time.

8. My child is a whiner or a constant complainer.
9. I have more than two children under the age of seven.
10. I was either physically or verbally abused or emotionally

neglected as a child. This set of questions was developed by a group called Parent's Anonymous. This group was founded in California in 1970 and now has over a thousand chapters, including twenty-two in Kentucky. If you feel you may be about to lose your cool sometimes, or if you have actually abused your child and are looking for help you should contact this organization. They have confidential meetings where parents share their troubles and are not the only ones with problems.

A common problem experienced during the bedtime hours is muscle cramps in the legs. These usually occur after a period of strenuous activity. The thigh or calf muscles tighten or cramp, followed by restlessness and movement of the legs.

The pain and tension can often be relieved by massaging and stretching these muscles. Hot baths and other progressive physical medicines have been helpful in some individuals.

One such medicine is quinine sulfate which has been used for many years. It works directly on the muscle fibers to relax them and cramp relief. The dose for leg cramps (200-300 mg. before bedtime) is usually safe in most

people. However quinine sulfate can be dangerous in patients with irregular heartbeats. It should also be avoided during pregnancy, as it can cause fetal malformations.

If you suffer from leg cramps, check with your doctor or pharmacist. There may be relief in store for you.

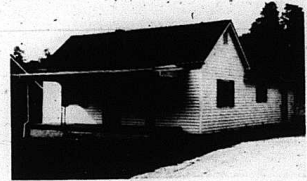

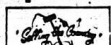

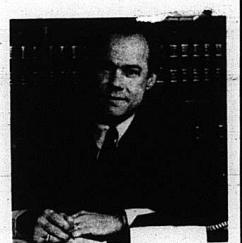

### Burning law now in effect

Many people know of Kentucky's burning law, but they don't always know the reason for the law.

According to Steve Bullen, Rockcastle County Forest Ranger, it is obviously intended to help prevent forest fires.

The law prohibits burning before 4:30 p.m. within 150 feet of

woodland or brushland during the official fire hazard season in spring and fall.

Bullen said the degree of fire danger varies according to the time of day, with early to mid-afternoon normally being the most dangerous time.

As evening approaches, the temperature normally drops which results in an increase in humidity, and the wind speed also tends to drop toward evening. This results

in a decrease in fire danger which makes a fire less likely to escape.

Ranger Bullen pointed out that fire danger is only reduced after 4:30. It is not eliminated. Waiting until after sunset to do burning is even safer, and during very dry weather when it is windy, it may not be safe to burn at any time of the day.

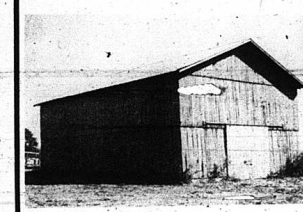

areas with the county divided along and on either side of I-75. There could be only one franchise, but no more than two, since it would not likely be profitable for several franchisees.

The franchise will be bid with the court accepting the "best" and "most profitable" bid for the county. A bid package will be presented to the court for publication during the work session.

After the details are worked out, the county will hire a solid waste coordinator to direct the program, along with clerical help. It will be the job of the coordinator to see that the program is run according to state standards and requirements.

The work session is not an official court meeting. All official business as pertaining to the program will be presented at a regular or called meeting of the court.

A copy of the complete solid waste plan is now in the office of the County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker and is available to persons interested in the program, or the general public, to examine.

The attorney pointed out that the lease "shall terminate at the end of the period of the reasonable useful life of the landfill on the premises even though there is time remaining on the term."

In a "fifth defense," Lambert said the county is "not amenable to suit under the doctrine of sovereign immunity as set forth in the Constitution or the commonwealth of Kentucky," and asked for a dismissal of the complaint, the trial by jury, and all relief to which the defendant appears entitled.

The Fosters said in their suit the county failed to pay rental between Feb. 18, 1985 and Aug. 19, 1985, therefore the county owes accrued rental payments of \$2,829.

Judge Daniel J. Winters will set a date for a hearing in the case.

Recently, bills have not been as frequent as they were in past years, according to court records.



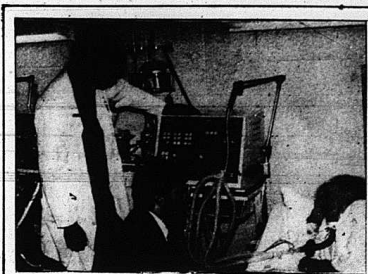

## 82-year-old finds

# It's never too late to continue education

Have you ever heard an old saying, "It's never too late to learn?"

At 82 years young, Berea College freshman Gladys Hays Peters believes that it's never too late to get an education. After a 63-year absence from the halls of academe\* the Jackson County, Kentucky native has decided to pursue the college education that she interrupted 63 years ago by family illness.

Mrs. Peters was enrolled as a first term Berea student in 1923, but returned to her home in Illinois to care for a large family during her mother's illness.

Gladys Peters' family has had close ties with Berea College practically since the institution's establishment. Her grandfather worked with College President William Goodell Frost, recruiting students from the Appalachian area. Mrs. Peters' grandmother taught early Berea students to weave in a small log cabin adjacent to the family home and many members of her family, including her mother, numerous aunts and uncles, and at the present time, her granddaughter, have been educated at Berea.

When asked why she decided to return to college, Mrs. Peters is quick to answer that she was part of the Appalachian culture and that she has always had a strong interest in the Appalachian area and its issues.

"Also, most of my family are college graduates, my daughters are, my grandchildren are on their way, and I can't let them get ahead of me."

Mrs. Peters' present curriculum includes Religion, Philosophy, and Appalachian Culture classes. All Berea students are required to take part in the on-campus College Labor Program and Mrs. Peters did not want to be an exception to the rule. She is employed by the College weaving industry.

What are her feelings on being a college freshman at the age of 82?

"I don't know if I'll be able to do it, I'm in my 80's. This is an experiment for me."

But I'm concerned about older people who don't have a good basic education and don't even try to get one. Maybe, if they, others will try."

The "Name" Jesus

Jesus has a "name" that is above every other name [Phil. 2:9] but that "name" is not just an arrangement of letters to spell that word. J-E-S-U-S is not just His name; it is much more than a title or designation.

In Scripture, "name" is often equivalent to "revelation" [or authority]; what is revealed by or known about some one or some thing. In Prov. 22:1, the "good name" is not that "Mary" is better than "Sue," but that Mary and Sue have good character. Their reputation is their "name."

Thus the "name" of Jesus is what is known about or revealed by Him. Phil. 2:9 and Eph. 1:21 are affirming that what is known about Jesus -- what He reveals Himself to be -- is far above anything known or revealed by any other individual.

An action "in" this name is one that is done by the authority behind it. A policeman might say, "Stop, in the name of the law!" We do things "in the name of Christ when those actions are based upon and in harmony with that which He has made known or revealed.

All men are called upon to BELIEVE in the Christ [I John 5:13; John 1:12]. This is done when we accept ALL that Jesus claims to be [John 8:24] and all that He revealed [John 8:31; Luke 6:46]. Simply believing that Jesus was a good man is not believing in Him. His name reveals many other things about Himself that must be accepted also.

CALLING upon the name of Jesus will result in salvation [Acts 2:21; 22:16; Rom. 10:12-14]. This is not an audible "Lord, save me," or pronouncing the name "Jesus," but an APPEAL to Him because of what He reveals Himself to be. So our appeal is made to Christ, only Jesus reveals Himself to be the one who can effectively forgive our sins. This "appeal" involves a proper response to His word, "... why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" asked Jesus [Luke 6:46].

BAPTISM is to be obeyed "in the name" of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit [Matt. 28:19; Acts 2:38]. The thought is not that the "right words" Jesus reveals are need to be said; but that the action be done out of regard for what our Lord has commanded. One might have the "right words" said over him as someone sprinkled water on his head, but this would not make the action "in the name" of Christ for Christ has said nothing about such an action. Likewise, the "right words" spoken as one is immersed for reasons other than the remission of sins is not an "in the name of" action for Christ said nothing about either purposes.

Actually ALL THAT WE DO in word or deed [Col. 3:16] is to be done "in the name" of Jesus; every action and each uttered thought is to be done out of a regard for and based upon who He is and what He has said. This is an appeal to His word which will judge us in that last great day [John 12:44-50].

"Take the name of Jesus with you... take it, then, where'er you go."

The Rockcastle Beef Association is currently sponsoring a Beef

Preconditioning Derby for spring born steers. Twenty-nine steers with an average weight of 454 pounds have been placed in the certified preconditioning herd program.

CPH requires calves be weaned 30 days, broke to water from a trough and feed from a bunk, be wormed, degrubbed, vaccinated for Black Leg, IBR, PI3 and BVD. All the CPH requirements were met as cattle were worked on October 8th by local Vet. Joe Korn and Association Directors. Calves are receiving Free Choice Purina Chew Conditioning Ration for 28 days.

Whether weaning calves or preparing them for backgrounding, the preconditioning program helps calves overcome the stress

of change. Research has shown that death losses are less time is required to regain post weight and getting calves started on a new feeding program is easier.

On November 4th, calves will be weighed off for Derby results. Awards will be given to first and second place for calves that gain the most weight and first place based on the percentage of body weight gained.

Calves are being fed at Keith Smith's farm and the public is welcome to attend the weighing off on November 4th.

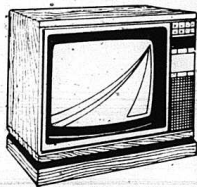
