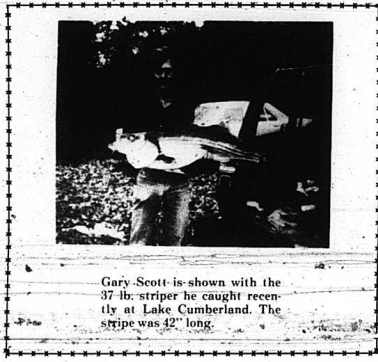

Is Salvation By Faith Only?

POINTING THE WAY TO HEAVEN

Many sincere people have read passages that teach salvation by faith and then conclude that one is saved by faith only. [See John 3:16; 1:12; Acts 16:31, et al]. In reaching this conclusion one misses a very important point; namely, not one of these passages says what is alleged! Not one scripture in the Bible says salvation is by faith only. That one is saved by faith, no serious Bible student would deny. But there is a vast difference between saying one is saved by faith, and saying he is saved by "faith only." One is Bible doctrine; the other is a doctrine of men [See Matt. 15:9].

Not only do these passages not say one is saved by faith only, but if they did, the Bible would most assuredly contradict itself. Notice what James 2:24 says, "Ye see then, how that by WORKS a man is justified and NOT BY FAITH ONLY."

If the passages cited [John 3:16; 1:12; Acts 16:31] teach salvation by "faith only," then one is obligated to harmonize them with James 2:24, or frankly admit that James and John and Luke contradict one another; in which case the Bible would be useless and worthless! How could we determine which [if any] of these inspired writers we should believe. Of course there is no contradiction!

These passages do indeed predicate salvation upon the condition of FAITH. But let us enquire, WHAT KIND OF FAITH? DEAD faith or LIVING faith? I am certain most would answer, "Living faith, of course." But then, that deals a fatal blow to the doctrine of salvation by faith only, because LIVING faith is WORKING faith. Notice: "But wilt thou know, O vain man, that faith WITHOUT WORKS is DEAD." [James 2:20]. James 2:19 says that devils believe, and tremble. Are devils saved by faith alone? To ask is but to answer.

Just as surely as man must have a LIVING FAITH to be saved, he is NOT saved by "FAITH ONLY." Living faith is faith that works. [Lk. 1:35; Acts 7:20]. One is required to confess Christ to be saved [Mat. 10:32; Rom. 10:10]. The scriptures also teach that one must be baptized to be saved [Mark 16:16; Acts 2:38; 1 Pet. 3:21]. If salvation is by faith only, then we must hang a "non-essential" tag on these other commands. We should be reminded that the same God who requires faith requires these other works as well.

The doctrine of salvation by FAITH ONLY is not found in God's Word, but in the creed books of men. It is deceitful and soul-demanding. Beware, dear friend. Obey God in everything He has commanded and He has promised salvation. Christ "became the author of eternal salvation unto all them that obey him" [Heb. 5:9].

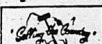

Briefly ...

House burns

The home of Mrs. Betty Kidwell McFerron was destroyed by fire last Wednesday. Located near the Kentucky Utilities substation east of Pine Hill, the wooden house was engulfed in flames when Mt. Vernon firemen arrived, assisted by the Livingston Fire Department. Very few household items were saved.

Wilkinson here

Wallace Wilkinson, Democratic candidate for Governor of Kentucky in next year's primary election, will visit Rockcastle County on Tuesday. He will arrive on a 17-county tour of central and south central Kentucky. He'll stop at the courthouse. The Rockcastle County High School chorus will sing.

Last harvest?

About 140 structures were destroyed by fire last week, according to a report. The plants were found on property located on U.S. 150 about a mile east of Brodhead. No arrests were made. Troopers Jack Lawless, Ronnie Sears and Allen Lewis destroyed the plants.

Trailer lost

A Michigan woman was not injured, but her 29-foot trailer was heavily damaged when it turned over on I-75 south of Mt. Vernon Monday morning. Ardis Card of Flint, Mich., told Trooper Jack Lawless that wind from a passing truck caused the trailer to sway and overturn.

Water watch

The statewide Water Shortage Watch that has been in effect for three months has finally been lifted by the Environmental Protection Cabinet. September and October rainfall helped relieve the problem.

Goodies x-rayed

Over 100 youngsters had their candy and other items x-rayed at the Rockcastle County Hospital after trick-or-treat was over on Halloween night. Nothing injurious was found, except maybe a rock or two. A check of several residents indicated the number of trick-or-treaters were down this year for the third straight year.

Marine patrol

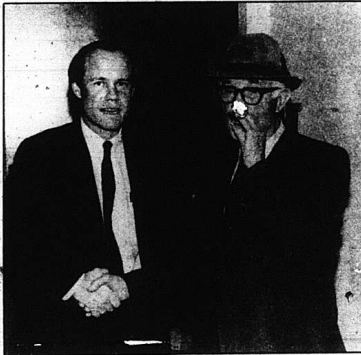
The city has purchased a boat to patrol Lake Linville. The council voted to purchase the boat and motor from Dr. Orson Arvin for \$1,050. The patrol will catch for speeding, boats and dumping trash into the lake, something that has been common practice for years.

The report that a 12-gauge shotgun was used in a death in local youth, James Kirby, was not correct as reported by the Fayette County coroner's office. The gun was a .25-caliber automatic.

Lambert, Burdette, Ford winners

Local attorney scores big victory



Joe Lambert talks politics in Jackson County Tuesday with resident George Felty. Lambert carried Jackson County by 165 votes.

"I'm overcome!" said Attorney Joseph E. Lambert late Tuesday as votes piled up for him over his opponent in his race for Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court in the 3rd District.

The unofficial count in the 28-county district had Lambert defeating Judge Charles R. Luker of London by 11,332 votes, or about 60-40 percent.

Lambert had 37,662 and Luker, 26,330. In fact, Judge Luker carried only four counties in the district: Clay, Knox and Laurel and his home county, and Owsley, one more than he won in the primary.

In Rockcastle, Lambert received 2,086 votes. Luker got 430.

"I feel very fortunate," the Mt. Vernon attorney said. "The feeling I have is one of humility."

However, it was in the other counties that gave Lambert his big majority, such as Lincoln, Garrard, Wayne, Leslie, Russell and Taylor, and the others'.

In the race for Rockcastle's Third District School Board seat, Dr. Rudolph Burdette squeaked by Earl Cummins by only 25 votes to win re-election.

Dr. Burdette carried one of the district's three precincts, North Mt. Vernon by 204-146 votes. He also won the absenteees 12-1.

Cummins carried Bullock 68 to 43 and West Mt. Vernon, 130-471.

In the other school board race, District 1, George M. Poyner was unopposed. He received 176 votes.

In surprise, incumbent Democrat Senator Wendell Ford carried Rockcastle 1165 votes to 932 for Republican Jackson M. Andrews. Ford carried 7 of

Rockcastle's 14 precincts, including East Mt. Vernon, West Mt. Vernon, North Mt. Vernon, Orlando, Brown, West Brodhead and North Brodhead.

Statewide, Ford had an easy election over the little-known Andrews. Ford won by about 75 percent of the vote. The latest total was 448,585 to Andrews' 155,258.

Both Constitution amendments lost in Rockcastle as expected. Amendment 1, changing the office of State School Superintendent from elective to appointive, lost 1183 to 429. The amendment also lost statewide by near 100,000 votes.

Amendment 2, allowing mayors of first and second class cities to succeed themselves, lost in Rockcastle 790-623. But statewide it was approved.

Two other contests found candidates unopposed. State Rep. Danny Ford won re-election to the House. He got 1288 votes. U.S. Rep. Harold Rogers received 1593 votes.

Attorney Lambert said, as it appeared he was a sure winner.

Moving day at Brodhead

Moving day is scheduled Thursday (today) at the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department, the Brodhead City Council was told at a meeting of the council Monday night.

The department is moving to a new building next door to the present fire station. Only miscellaneous work needs to be done to complete construction of the building that will house both the city and county trucks.

Fire Chief Bryan Bussell said an open house would be held at a later date when all the work on the building is finished.

The city constructed the fire station at a cost of about \$38,000 with help from the firemen.

Councilman complimented Lawson Whitf for his work on the building. He was the contractor.

The council discussed drainage in the city. The main drain that runs from the housing project into the downtown area, (under the old telephone exchange) is not large enough to take all the water, causing it to back up into some yards during heavy rains.

The council agreed the entire drain should be worked on, but left it until spring when an effort will be made to find grant money and other financing to do the work, admittedly an expensive project. "I think it needs a lot of work, and it should be done right when we do it," Councilman Ronnie Cash said. "We'll need to get something started in the spring."

Girl shoots self at school

A Rockcastle County teenager is listed in satisfactory condition at the University of Kentucky Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, in Lexington after she shot herself in the chest last Friday.

The shooting occurred in the girls' restroom at the Rockcastle County High School, minutes before classes were to have taken

up for the day, according to Ronnie Cash assistant principal.

"It is my understanding that she got the gun from her father's truck and carried it to school with her," Cash said. "Of course her father did not know the gun was missing until the shooting."

School officials and State Police Detective Ernie Boggs, who is investigating the incident, are withholding the girl's name because she is a juvenile.

The girl, who is a junior, apparently got off the school bus in front of the school and went straight into the restroom and into a stall. "There were several other students in the restroom but none of them saw the shooting, but they did hear it," Cash said.

Earlier reports indicated that two shots were fired by the girl but Cash said Monday that neither he nor Boggs could find any evidence in the stall that would substantiate that.

Cash said that the student told him after the shooting that she had been depressed. He attributed that to the fact that she was having trouble keeping up in school. The girl is classified as educationally mentally handicapped, or a slow learner.

However, she had been attending regular classes this year and she excelled in the chorus program.

One teacher at the local high school, who asked not to be identified, said that she felt some of the students picked on the girl.

At high school

Parents question discipline

Disciplinary problems at the Rockcastle County High School surfaced at Tuesday night's regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

Nine parents went to the board meeting and before it was over they had made it perfectly clear that they were upset with the way things were being handled by administrators at the local school.

Joann Smith and her husband, Buddy, asked the board what they were going to do about an incident that occurred at the local high school in September.

Apparently the incident involved Mrs. Smith's son William and Chris Mason, whose mother Gail was also at Tuesday's meeting. Both students are seniors at RCHS this year.

Often in tears, Mrs. Smith said, "My Saylor, (Cleston Saylor, principal at the high school

doesn't want my problem and I'm looking to you all for help. Don't I have a friend up there?" referring to board members and Superintendent Charles Parsons.

Mrs. Smith explained to the board that her son and Chris Mason were involved in a fight on school grounds in late September, and her son received a broken leg. She said that he was in the hospital for eight days and that he was still unable to do anything because of the pin that doctors had inserted in his leg.

"My son is not going to be able to graduate because of this and I want to know what you all are going to do about it," Mrs. Smith said.

"I regret that this happened. It is a terrible thing, but we can't do anything until Mr. Saylor decides the punishment in this matter," said board chairman Rudolph Burdette.

Chris Mason's mother said that she did not want her son

expelled because he had never missed a day of school since he started in the first grade.

Mrs. Mason said that her son had circulated a petition requesting that he not be expelled, and that it had over 300 names. But Mrs. Smith, in one slightly heated exchange, said that she got a hold of the petition and that it did not have over 300 names. She also questioned the validity of some of the signatures.

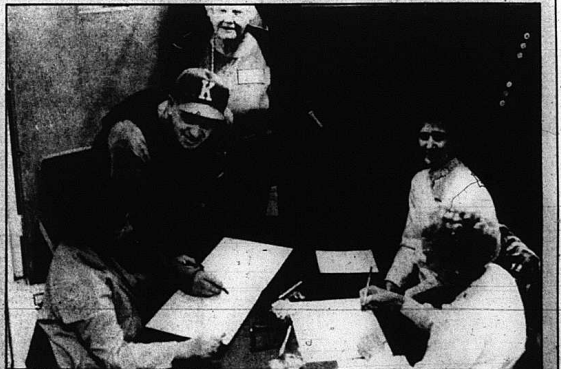
Mrs. Smith told board members that in her opinion what happened at the high school was an assault on her son by Chris Mason. She said that her son was struck from the back and that he has been caused undue pain and suffering because of the incident.

"My son will probably never walk the same again and he will not graduate this year," Mrs. Smith said.

While Mrs. Mason did not defend her son, she did say that

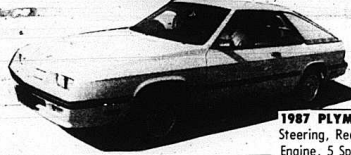

she felt her son should not be punished any more than William Smith. She added that she wanted a different form of punishment, other than expulsion.

Hasty, who at the time told police he was under 18, was charged with driving under the influence, attempted to elude an officer, reckless driving, no operators license and theft by unlawful taking. Police later learned that Hasty turned 18 a couple of months ago. He is presently free on bond. He is scheduled to appear in district court on Nov. 10.

The 16-year-old juvenile was charged with D.U.I., attempting to elude an officer and reckless driving. According to police the two, apparently switched places during the chase. That is why both have been charged with D.U.I.

The juvenile was released into the custody of his parents, and his case has been turned over to juvenile court.

Board member George Poynter said as did Dr. Burdette that they were not aware of the 20-day suspension and that they would look into it.

"Shouldn't you all have been notified?" asked Mrs. Smith.

Donald and Brenda Chappell were also present at the meeting wanting to know why their son, a senior at RCHS, had been kicked out of school for an entire year because of a drinking incident.

The concerned father said that Mr. Saylor kicked his son out for the whole year because according to Chappell, his son had taken one drink of whiskey "fore going to school."

He said that he and his wife had tried to get school officials to show them their son's record but that they were told that there was no reason to look at it because it did not have anything on it.

"The Chappells further stated that their son had been harassed when he was a junior and accused of using and selling drugs by principals at the high school.

Donald Chappell said that his son had never been caught with or using drugs and that he couldn't understand what the problem was at the high school.

Brenda Chappell told the board that their son was so distraught that he began the school year in Jackson County so that he would not have to go to school at Rockcastle, but that he missed his family and friends and decided to go back to school at RCHS.

Superintendent Parsons told the Chappell that drinking whiskey before school was not accepted in the Rockcastle school system, but he also agreed to set up a meeting between the Chappells' son, Dr. Burdette, Parsons and Saylor. The Chappells' son

asked if they could have an attorney present.

Just as it seemed that things might quieten down a bit, another concerned parent spoke up. Glenda Kirby told board members that she was concerned about the lack of supervision at the high school between classes, at lunch time, before, and after school.

Board Chairman Burdette told Mrs. Kirby that her request would definitely be investigated.

Highlands Investment Corp., at London, which is one of the major stockholders in Mt. Vernon Plastics, thanked the council for its recent vote to help the company obtain financial aid with the company's \$8.8 million expansion program now under way.

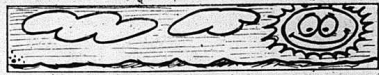
Judge Luker won Laurel, 4846-905; Clay, 2096-665; Knox 2337-841 and Owsley, 377-307.

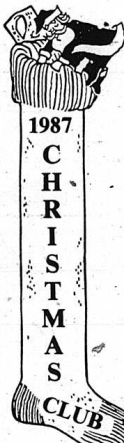

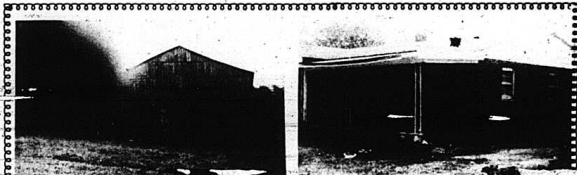

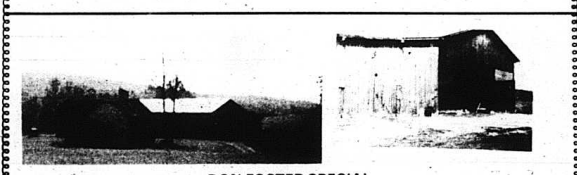

Storing Apples, Winter Pears

A root cellar is the ideal keeping place for tart fall cooking apples and hard winter pears. Root-cellar temperatures here in Kentucky range from about 40 to 50 F and the humidity usually stays a high 90 to 95 percent.

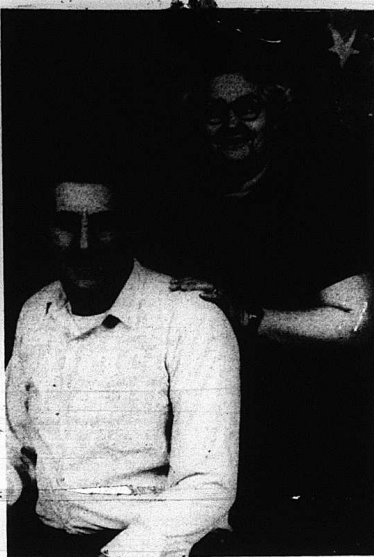
But don't store fruits and

vegetables close together. Partly, cut off a little section from the rest of the root cellar for storing apples and pears.

Wrap each apple or pear individually in newspaper and put them gently in ventilated wooden boxes, lugs, crates, or shallow-cardboard cartons.

Sound, hard, "mature" late-variety apples will keep from four to six months. Freshly-picked pears that are mature, but still green and hard, will keep from 2 to 7 months.

Check fruits every few weeks and remove any that might be starting to spoil. Don't forget about them!

Ripening Stored Fruits

Once you remove them from cold storage, apples can be used right away for cooking or eating. The pears will probably need ripening. Several days at room temperature, and out of the direct sunlight, will probably do the trick.

Basement Storage

If you don't have a root cellar, shelves along the outside wall of an unheated, basement should make good storage space for apples and pears. Another possibility would be an extra refrigerator.

If you'll watch the temperature, you can often pick up a used refrigerator for very little money.

A refrigerator is the modern-day replacement for a root cellar, offering about the same temperature range for keeping foods fresh and safe. But refrigerator air is much drier, so use perforated plastic bags to help hold in natural moisture, and check the fruit more often than you would in a root cellar.

Freeze Christmas Rolls & Cookies

Give yourself a Christmas present of extra time by mixing up rolls and cookies now to thaw and serve - or thaw, bake and serve - during the holidays.

It's good management, too, to put the vacant freezer space to

work for you. A full freezer is more economical to run than one that's half empty.

Be sure to label, date and keep a good inventory of those Christmas goodies. That way, you'll be sure to use them up while they're still at their best.

Yeast rolls - already baked ones are best for freezing - will keep their high quality from 4 to 6 weeks.

Baked cookies will keep 2 or 3 months. Unbaked dough will keep about the same length of time - the advantage is that they'll be fresh-baked.

Yeast Rolls

Bake, then cool them quickly. Wrap in heavyweight aluminum foil, label and freeze immediately. Before serving, reheat them in the foil packaging for 15 to 20 minutes at 250 to 300 degrees F.

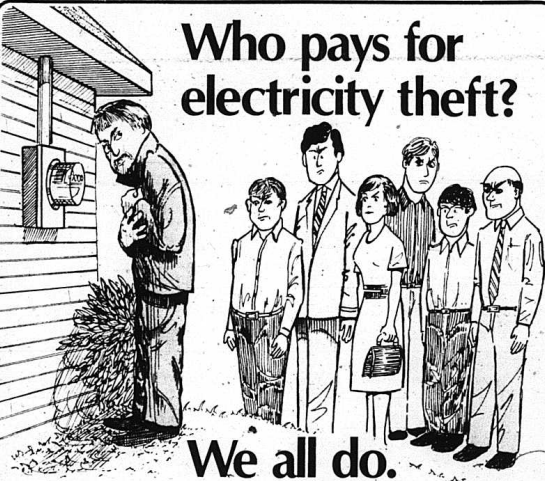

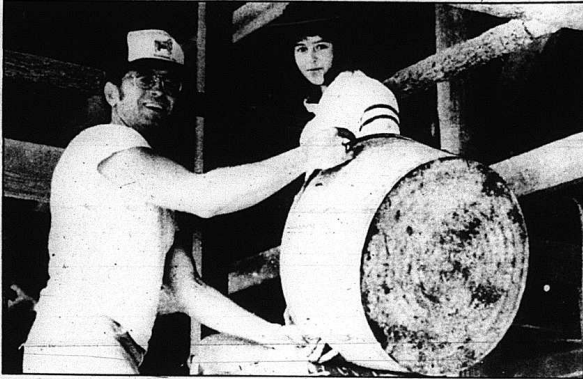

Sheep shearing in Rockcastle?

Sheep shearing time in Rockcastle County?

That's right. That's what was going on at the Roy Beasley farm last Sunday.

Only one of two major sheep farmers in Rockcastle County, Roy and his wife Bernice and her two daughters Phyllis and Donna enjoy every minute they spend with their flock.

At the present time the Beasleys have 98 ewes and 3 rams and their hopes are for a consistent flock of 200.

Supplau, Herb Debok of Iowa sheared the Beasley's 98 ewes with a total of 391 pounds of wool taken.

Although Roy says that the price of wool is not bad at around a \$1.75 a pound, he has his sheep sheared in the fall so that they will be cold and come into the barn for warmth when it is time to lamb. "That makes it a lot easier than chasing them all over the farm," Roy said.

"Another big reason we shear in the fall is so that after the sheep lamb the new lambs can get to their mothers easier for the milk," he said.

"When the tobacco market began to decline a couple of years ago the Beasleys looked for an alternative income for their 77 acre farm, which is located just off the

Brindle Ridge road. Sheep was the answer. In their first year of sheep farming Roy said that his family was able to pay for his sheep, and other bills related to their well-being and came out \$2,000 to the

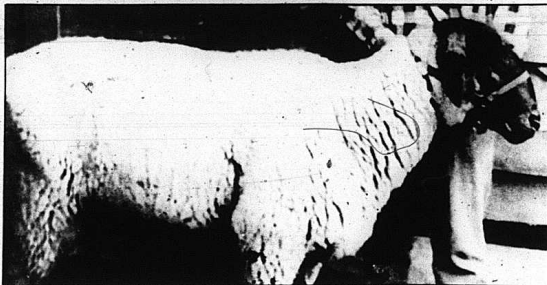

The average market price of a lamb is \$70 to \$90 Roy said and if 200 ewe can be bred each year you would end up with approximately 300 lambs or around \$21,000.

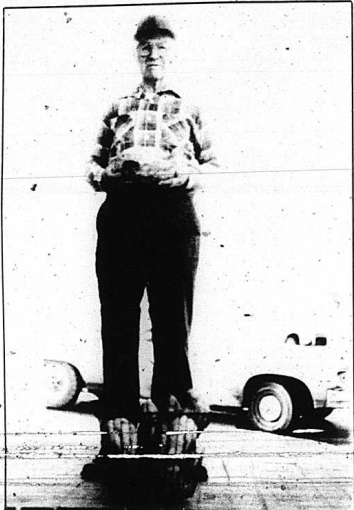

Debok who sells insurance in the summer and shears sheep in the spring and fall, traveled to Jackson County Monday to shear some sheep there.
