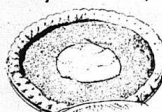

McGuire dismisses D.U.I. cases

District Judge Walter Mc Guire, Tuesday dismissed seven cases and amended one of 22 that had been set for trial in his court.

The judge noted on his calendar a lack of a speedy trial and the failure of the prosecutor to proceed.

Local County Attorney James H. Lambert, who was not present during the proceedings had submitted a doctor's excuse which confined him to home for a week because of sickness. Lambert is responsible for prosecuting cases in district court.

According to court records, there has been only one trial in district court in almost a year and that occurred two weeks ago when Conley Minko, of Pulaski County was tried for driving under the influence of alcohol. He was found not guilty.

Some of the cases disposed of Tuesday had been continued as many as 11 times, according to court records, which also showed that one man, Dennis S. Paynter of Paducah, pleaded not guilty to D.U.I. had made six different trips to Mt. Vernon to be tried. His case was dismissed.

One case dismissed by McGuire had been on the docket for over 2 years and has never been tried. The case involved a local man who pleaded not guilty to D.U.I., no operators license, and resisting arrest.

A similar case that was dismissed had also been on the docket for over a year and involved a local man who had been charged with going 71 miles an hour in a 55 miles per hour zone.

Of the eight cases disposed of, five were charged with D.U.I., two with criminal mischief, and one for speeding.

The other 16 cases were set down for trial at a later date.

In other action, this time in Rockcastle Circuit Court, three local men pleaded guilty to different charges.

Thomas L. Alexander, of Rt. 3, Berea, in the Flat Gap area, pleaded guilty to two counts of second degree sexual abuse. He will be formerly sentenced Dec. 14, but a sentence of 12 months in the county jail on each count has been recommended. He is presently free on a \$5,000 bond.

Alexander's indictment and eventual guilty plea resulted from more than one incident involving two girls under 12 years old, according to court records.

Earl Overbey Jr., of Brodhead, pleaded guilty to two counts

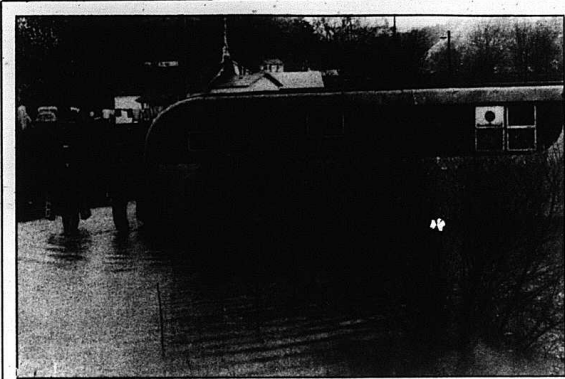

Burns pleads guilty to 2 federal charges

Former Commonwealth Attorney Lester Burns Jr. pleaded guilty to two felony conspiracy charges Monday in U.S. District Court.

Burns, 55, admitted his guilt in an insurance fraud case, and in another case involving interstate transportation of stolen money. Sentencing was set for March. Burns could be sentenced to 10 years in prison or fined \$20,000 on each of the two charges. He could also be fined \$250,000 for criminals who have profited from a crime.

Burns expressed his remorse for his actions and apologized to the court and "the whole world," he said, "because I am guilty." "I am disgusted with myself, your honor," he told Judge

Heavy rain sends creeks rampaging

There was water, water everywhere this past weekend, and it helped ease the water shortage that has plagued the county this year.

But the heavy, continual rain stranded deerhunters, washed out a few bridges and roads, and overturned vehicles.

A total of 3.87 inches fell Saturday and early Sunday. Another 1.43 inches fell Wednesday and Thursday that brought the

total rainfall in four days to 5.30 inches, and that was enough to send rivers and streams out of their banks.

The Weather Service issued a flash flood warning about noon Saturday when it appeared the rain would continue to be heavy through most of the day and night.

Among those stranded was Mark Jones of Mt. Vernon, who reportedly was deerhunting in the Skeggs Creek area of the county.

While he was reported missing. Several trucks in the Skeggs Creek area also were flooded.

At Conway, where water gets high quickly, several homes were surrounded by water. Also near Conway, cattle was seen swimming for high ground.

The Rockcastle River crested at Livingston last Sunday, but the river was several feet under the

Renfro Valley barndance shows back under one owner

A change of ownership that had been expected for weeks materialized Friday when Renfro Valley Folks Inc., purchased stock owned by Gary Smith.

For the first time since 1968 the Lair family once again controls the Renfro Valley Barndance and Jamboree.

Smith, owner of Renfro Valley Lodge and Restaurant, said he wanted to pursue other interests. "It's time I spent more time with my children and do some of the things we have planned for a long time," Smith said. "So I'm out of the entertainment business."

Ann Henderson who will now direct the fortunes of the valley, will likely become president, of Renfro Folks Inc., succeeding Smith. However, no meeting of the board of directors, whom are her

three sisters, has been scheduled.

Mrs. Henderson said no immediate changes have been planned for the valley which has been an important tourist attraction here since 1939 when her father, John Lair, founded the valley where, he said, "time stands still."

Smith stressed that Mrs. Henderson had been very good to work with since she had been active in the valley.

"We had a very good working relationship," he noted.

Smith also has his motel and restaurant for sale. He recently

opened an antique shop on North Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Mrs. Henderson's sisters are Mrs. Virginia Lee King of Port St. Lucie, Fla.; Mrs. Nancy Griffin of Annandale, Va.; and Mrs. Barbara Burke Smith of Warrenton, Va.

Mrs. King said recently that she and her other sisters would "look in" on Renfro when time would allow, but that Mrs. Henderson would manage the valley since she lives in the area.

For those who do not know, there are four regular shows at Renfro during the summer -

Magistrates amazed by the high cost of jail renovation work

An apparent low bid of \$83,910 for renovation of the Rockcastle County Jail to meet state standards was made by Newland Construction Co. of Brodhead at a called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Monday.

Only other bid was from McKnight and Associates of London for \$88,900.

Added to the amount is \$10,250 for removal of asbestos in the jail. That bid was awarded earlier by the court to London Associates of Greenville.

The court delayed officially awarding the bid until it can be checked by engineer/consultants Chrisman, Miller and Woodford of Lexington who are doing the planning for the jail for \$3,000.

Total cost of the project, if the figures stand, will be \$97,160. The Lexington firm had ear-

lier estimated the renovation costs at about \$48,000.

The court has about \$30,064 remaining from a grant for the jail made earlier by the Corrections Cabinet, so the county will have to come up with about \$67,000 more.

Magistrates agreed, that much money will not be easy to find since the county is already strapped for funds because of, among other things, the high cost of garbage collection.

At the regular meeting of the court last Wednesday, State Department of Transportation officials from Somerset told the court the state will backstop four county roads from the \$447,893 that will be available to Rockcastle for rural and secondary roads during the 1987-88 fiscal year.

New survey could lead to upgrading of city homes

Need a new house? Need an old house fixed up? If so, and you live in the Horseshoe Bend Negro Town Hill area of Mt. Vernon, there may be good news in the offing.

A Berea consulting firm will survey residents in those areas to determine if they, or some of them, would be interested in a program to correct problems of substandard housing either by rehabilitation or new construction.

Jennifer Bush, a representative of Will Linder and Associates of Berea, consultants for the City of Mt. Vernon, told the council at its Monday meeting that her firm would like to make a survey of the residents the week of Dec. 6-12 and report its findings to the council.

If 75 percent of the residents are interested in participating, a public meeting will be held for those residents to discuss details and answer questions.

Not all the residents who might be interested in the program are in the city limits, the

council was told. However, those could elect to come into the city by annexation in order to qualify.

The council gave Will Linder the green light to make the survey.

Someone said it would be a movie to remember. Actually, to the viewers, it was more like a movie to forget.

It all began when someone whispered there was going to be a movie shown at Red Top Restaurant Tuesday night and [but-tut] it wouldn't show Rockcastle County in its best Sunday suit. It didn't.

The movie turned out to be a downer, a series of two-minute television spots about Appalachia sponsored by the Christian Appalachian Project, CAP to most of us who are familiar with the Family Life Center on Green Fish Hill and the now-defunct Attila.

The TV spots are being shown, or will be shown, in cities of over 250,000 population in the U.S. They beg for money. That is, they solicit the public to help the downtrodden in Appalachia which includes Eastern Kentucky and several states.

Things are not good in Appalachia, according to the TV spots. Apparently, things never were. There's poor housing, lonely old folks, not enough food and clothing, unemployment and illiteracy, to name a few. It's bad all over, CAP says, but CAP is helping, and so can you, by calling an 800 number [it's free] and placing a contribution or sponsoring a family for \$20 a month.

Lulled by background

hymns we all love, when the spot is over you want to rush to the phone to call that toll-free number and place a big contribution, the bigger the better.

Non-profit, religious, charitable organizations have been soliciting funds one way or another since "the beginning," and they'll probably be doing it in "the end." So, they're not picking on Rockcastle, per se, they say. The family life center happens to be here and CAP just used some of our good citizens to help tell the story to those fat cat TV watchers in Atlanta, Miami, New York, San Francisco and so on.

Some of those 30 locals that turned out for the movie/TV show at the request of the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce, brought a crowd to pick, and did.

They wanted to know just how CAP helps Rockcastle County.

CAP was primed to re-cap CAP's IRS audited figures.

Edward F. Ellis, manager of television appeals, and William A. Bagley, vice president of development for CAP, handed out a two-sided sheet with figures like: 51 employees from Rockcastle County annual county payroll [1986] \$398,572; grants to local organizations, \$9,096; annual cost of 11 county-based programs, \$738,068, and so on.

Farm Programs Revised in Congress' Last Days

Before Congress adjourned for the year, the 99th Congress revised several agricultural programs in a variety of ways, many of which mean good news for Kentucky farmers.

Legislation was enacted which will allow the Farm Credit System to lower its interest rates to farmers who borrow from the Farm Credit System. This was made possible through a new two step process. First, local FCS Banks are now allowed to set interest rates for their farmers without prior approval from the Farm Credit System in Washington. Second, Farm Credit System accounting procedures were revised so that losses within the system can be spread out over a 10 year period, thus strengthening individual farm loan portfolios.

Congress adopted an amendment I proposed to provide farmers with more marketing information as a means of improving their profitability. My amendment directs the Agriculture Department to provide futures and options educational programming to farmers, including information on innovative marketing techniques. My bill also calls for the General Accounting Office to conduct a study to determine the extent that Farmers Home Administration borrowers are utilizing advance marketing techniques in their farming operations.

Congress approved drought and flood relief for qualified farmers.

Another change allows eroding land used to grow alfalfa, grasses and legumes to be considered part of the soil conservation reserve. In this change, land growing grass-type crops were not eligible to be considered part of the conservation reserve and therefore removable from production for at least 10 years. Grasses, legumes and alfalfa crops receive no federal supports.

Congress adopted a provision which will enable wheat farmers to collect a portion of their subsidy checks now instead of next year. This change could put more than \$3 billion in the hands of cashed-strapped farmers to help them get through the winter months.

An amendment was accepted which will allow certain farmers and operating partners to qualify for more than one \$50,000 payment on farms previously limited to one such payment.

US response to foreign buyers' complaints about the quality of U.S. grain exports, stiller grain inspection standards were attached to the Commodity Futures Trading Commission reauthorization.

USDA will now spend at least \$5 billion on short-term export credit guarantees to promote farm exports and at least \$500 million on another export promotion program.

Many of these agricultural revisions are very specific, but taken as a whole, the new laws should most greatly help our farmers who are hurting the worst.

expenditures with county supplies, \$109,805.



Your Child's Health

All of us have heard about the health hazards of asbestos. Many schools are faced with the expense of removing the hazardous insulation. Many other public buildings have been found to have the problem as well. Now it has been found that many children's sandboxes are full of the stuff as well.

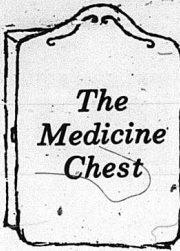
A study at The New Jersey Medical School found that playground sand as sold as Kiddies Fun Sand, distributed by the Quikrete Company, contained 2% tremolite asbestos. It was pointed out that the product could not be used in New Jersey for spray insulation, but there was no ordinance against selling it for use by children. Furthermore, it was pointed out that children often stir up large clouds of dust while playing, making inhalation of fibers very likely. Clothing, skin, and the household environment may be contaminated as well.

Prompted by this study, the Massachusetts Dept. of Public

Health surveyed play sands and found asbestos in another product, Premium Play Sand sold by Child World Stores.

I am sure neither manufacturer knew there was asbestos in their products. I am not certain what prompted the study on play sand in the first place, but it is important that this problem has been brought to public attention. Hopefully, Kentucky's Dept. of Public Health will come out with a survey of its own. Meanwhile, it seems reasonable to assume that all commercial sand is suspect, and if your child wants a sandbox you probably should go out to the river and dig your own sand, sift out the broken beer bottles and wash it with a garden hose and tell them to ENJOY while we find something else wrong with having fun.

insulin. At one time, insulin had to be refrigerated. But newer preparations allow insulin to be stored at room temperature for 2 years. It is preferable, however, to keep the insulin currently in use at room temperature and store any remaining unused vials in the refrigerator.

If insulin is not kept in the refrigerator it should be protected from extreme temperatures and direct sunlight such as the glove compartment of a hot car or on a window sill. If insulin is accidentally frozen, it should be thrown away since it may not disperse evenly when thawed.

If you have any questions about insulin storage, check with your pharmacist.

Marijuana found

There's been more growing in the Daniel Boone National Forest this year than trees and flowers.

A record number of marijuana plants were discovered and destroyed there this year, according to Charlie Crail, public affairs officer for the forest.

Crail said more marijuana plants were destroyed in the Daniel Boone Forest this year than in any of the nation's 156 national forests. The amount of marijuana

found in the forest, which stretches from south central to northeastern Kentucky, was "more than three times as much this year as the previous year."

Crail said 1,005 plots of marijuana were grown in the forest this year, containing almost 98,000 plants valued at \$2,000 to \$2,500 apiece. Of those plots, 725

were destroyed by law enforcement agencies and the forest service, while the remainder was successfully harvested.

In 1985, there were 337 plots, 135 of which were destroyed.

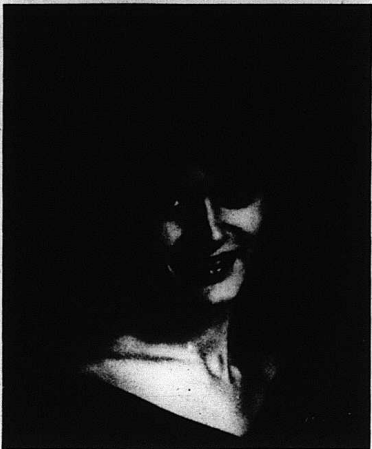

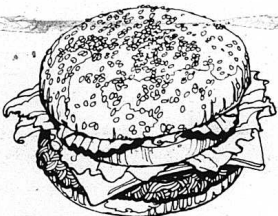

colon; or a family history of breast cancer—mother, sister, aunts, and grandmother. It is at higher risk. Also women who are over age 30, started menstruation early plus menopause late, and have a diet high in animal fat have a greater chance of developing breast cancer sometimes in their lives.

If you or your doctor find a lump or other indication that you may have breast cancer, the doctor will probably do further testing. A thorough breast examination is the first step. If the lump appears to be caused by monthly breast changes, your doctor may recommend that you be reexamined at another time of the month, such as just after your next menstrual period.

Mammography, a type of x-ray of the breast tissues, can often detect breast tumors up to 2 years before a lump can be felt. The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists recommends that a woman who is not considered high risk for breast cancer have a "baseline" mammogram around age 35 (as a guideline of what the breast looks like normally) and then periodic screening after age 50.

If a woman has breast cancer, her treatment will depend of the type of tumor, how far the disease has progressed, her medical history, and her choice of treatment. Breast cancer can be treated by surgery, radiation, drugs, hormones, or a combination of these methods.

- 1 package (6 oz) diced dried fruit
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 2 teaspoons poultry seasoning

TIPS: Chicken bouillon can be substituted for broth. Use 1/3 teaspoon instant bouillon and 1/2 cup hot water. Add additional bouillon as necessary to reach desired moistness.

This stuffing is also good cooked inside a 12 to 16 pound turkey. Decrease broth to 1/4 to 1/2 cup. Stuff and cook turkey as usual.

- Holiday Twice Bakes
- 5 medium-to-large potatoes (about 8 ozs. each)
 - 3 slices bacon
 - 1/4 cup butter or margarine
 - 1/2 cup milk
 - 1/2 cup (2 ozs.) shredded Cheddar cheese
 - 1 jar (2 p2) diced pimiento, drained
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - pepper
 - Snipped fresh parsley

- 1. Scrub potatoes; pierce skins with fork. Place potatoes spoke-fashion on paper toweling in microwave oven.
- 2. Microwave (high), uncovered, 14 to 16 minutes or until just about tender, turning and rearranging once. Let stand in oven 5 minutes.
- 3. Place bacon between paper toweling on paper plate.
- 4. Microwave (high) 2-1/2 to 3 minutes or until crisp. Set aside.
- 5. Cut each potato in half lengthwise. Scoop out centers into mixing bowl, leaving 1/4 inch thick shell. Beat in butter and milk until smooth and creamy. Stir in cheese, pimiento, salt, pepper and crumbled bacon. Spoon mixture into shells; place on microwave-serving plate.

- 6. Microwave (high), uncovered, 6 to 8 minutes or until hot, rotating plate once. Garnish with parsley. About 10 servings/135 calories each

TIPS: A little of the pimiento can be reserved to garnish tops of potatoes.

To make ahead, prepare through step 5, cool, wrap tightly, and freeze (Can be made ahead up to 3 months). To serve, microwave (high) 10 to 12 minutes, rotating plate and/or rearranging once or twice. Note: Potatoes retain freshness made quality better when made ahead and frozen rather than stored in refrigerator.

For 5 potatoes, decrease reheat time to 4 to 5 minutes, rotating plate once.

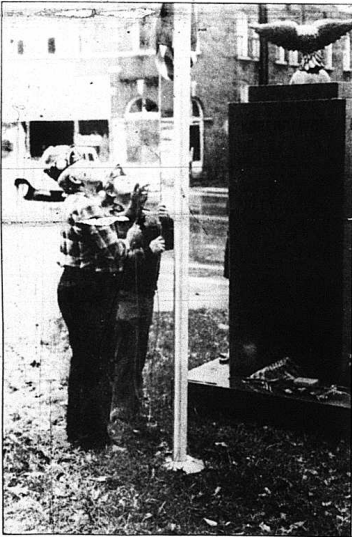
Three firemen injured at fire

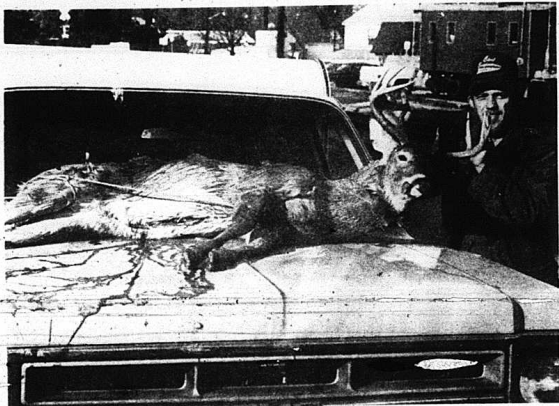

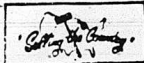

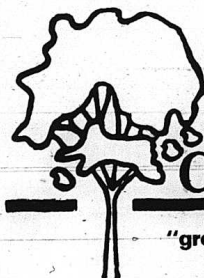

Schools set guidelines for inclement weather

As the winter season approaches, the local school system has made plans concerning inclement weather.

As has always been the case in any decision relating to inclement weather the safety of all students is the primary concern. Therefore, weather and road conditions over all the county will be evaluated before any decision is made.

If weather conditions exist that make it necessary to begin the school day later than the regular time or to close school for the entire day later than the regular time or to close school for the entire day this information will be given to the radio stations to broadcast as soon after 6 a.m. as is possible. The radio stations contacted to broadcast this information are as follows and WRVK (AM1460) in Renfro Valley, WHAS (AM540) in Louisville, and WVLK (FM 93) in Lexington. If school is cancelled the night before Lexington television station WKYT (Channel 27) will be notified in addition to the radio

stations. Also if weather conditions appear to be getting bad while buses are making runs or while school is in session students may be sent home early. If this situation does occur parents not at home during the day are advised to have some alternatives available in receiving and caring for your child.

During any event that could possibly cause altering the regular school schedule parents and students should not call radio stations, schools, or school staff members at home. These calls will tie up telephone lines and delay important broadcast information that everyone should know. Please listen to the radio for announcements!

NOTICE

K.R.S. Chapter 211, Section 1 states: No person, firm, or corporation shall construct, install, alter or cause to be constructed, installed, or altered, any on-site sewage disposal system subject to regulation by the department without having first obtained an on-site sewage disposal permit from the department. Such construction, installation, or alteration shall be performed in accordance with KRS 318.010 and KRS 318.030.

No person, firm, or corporation shall use or continue to use or permit the use or continued use of any on-site sewage disposal system that is constructed, installed, or altered under an on-site sewage disposal permit where the department through a duly authorized inspector, employee or agent finds that the system was not constructed, installed, or altered in confor-

mance with such permit and regulations issued by the department.

All applications for on-site sewage disposal permits shall be accompanied by plans and specifications for the proposed system, results of an approved percolation test in the area where the proposed system is to be located and additional soils and other information as directed by the department by regulation.

Failure to abide by this law and regulation may result in legal proceedings and a potential for fines not to exceed \$100 per day - each day is a separate offense. This will be enforced.

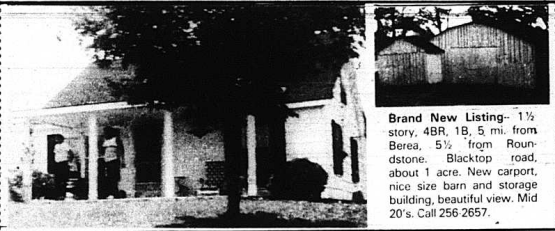
