### EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

ROAST TURKEY

County Extension Agent  
for Home Economics

To thaw, leave turkey in the

original plastic wrap and use one of the following methods:

1. Place on tray in the refrigerator for 3 to 4 days (about 24 hours for each 5 pounds of turkey).

2. For a faster method, cover with cold water and change the water frequently. Refrigerate and then cook turkey as soon as possible after thawing.

To prepare for roasting; remove plastic wrap, and then remove giblets and neck from the body and neck cavities. Rinse the turkey inside and out with cool water, and pat dry with a clean cloth or paper towel. If the turkey is not to be stuffed, rub cavity of turkey lightly with salt (optional). [Cont. to B9]

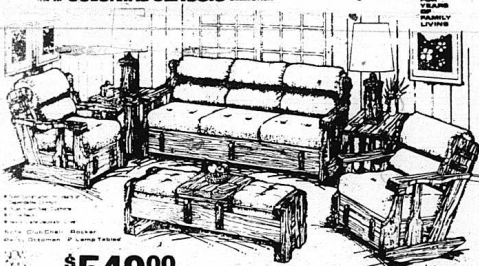

If stuffing is used, stuff just before roasting or cook the dressing in a separate dish just before serving. Tuck drumsticks under band of skin at tail or tie together. Fold wings across back of turkey. Skewer neck skin with round toothpick or poultry pin.

## Open Pan

Place turkey breast-side-up on rack in shallow roasting pan. Brush with oil or margarine. Insert meat thermometer in thickest part of inside thigh muscle. Make sure it doesn't touch bone. Do not add water. Do not cover. Roast in 325 F. oven. Follow the approximate time table, for total cooking time. When the turkey begins to brown, it may be necessary to cover loosely with aluminum foil to

prevent over-browning. Turkey is done when the thermometer placed in the thigh muscle reaches 185 F. If stuffed place the thermometer point in the center of the stuffing and it should register 165 F. when done. If thermometer is not used, test for doneness about 30 minutes before end of cooking time. Indications in the cooking table. Move drumstick up and down; if done the joint should give readily or break. The meat should be very soft when pressed between fingers.

Approximate roasting time in 325 F. Oven

Weight: 8-12 lbs., unstuffed, 3-4 hrs., stuffed, 4-5 hrs. 12-16 lbs., unstuffed, 3-1/2 - 5 hrs., stuffed, 4-1/2-6 hrs., 16-20 lbs., unstuffed, 5-1/2 - 7 hrs., stuffed, 5-1/2-6 1/2 hrs., 20-24 lbs., unstuffed, 6-1/2-7 1/2 hrs., stuffed, 6-1/2-7 1/2 hrs.

For easier carving, let turkey stand at room temperature for 15-20 minutes.

## Covered Pan

Place turkey breast-side-up on a rack in a deep roaster. Insert meat thermometer into center of thigh next to body but not touching bone. Cover with lid, but open all vents. Roast at 325 F. until thermometer reads 185 F. Remove the cover during the last half-hour of cooking for browning. Roasting in a covered pan decreases cooking time by about 30 minutes.

# Your Child's Health

Loose teeth cause middle ear infections? This is a question doctors are sometimes asked. The answer is no. It often seems to mothers that children are always sick when they are cutting teeth. Actually, much teething happens to come at the same time in a young child's life as when he is likely to be having a lot of ear infections. This is not coincidental. Teething causes infants to be irritable and cranky and to drool a lot. It does not cause high fevers, contrary to popular belief.

During the period from about six to 24 months of age babies are expected to get about 10 illnesses per year or about one every 5 weeks. This is the normal process by which they build up immunity to various viruses. Since many of these illnesses will be colds or respiratory infections, and it is the connection from these conditions is the prime age for ear trouble. It is also the time when many teeth are coming in for the first time.

In further complicated matters, sometimes the pain of an ear infection is partially referred to

teeth in the jaw so that it seems like a child has a toothache when he in fact has an ear infection. Pain can be referred the other direction as well.

If you are teething, just remember all the teething and crying will soon pass and before you know it your child will be happy and ready to smile. To soothe your child with mild teething tablets that soothe their teeth or do they have something else wrong with them. It has been so long since I held a baby I forget.

A common question heard this time of year is "Is this a cold?"

of the flu? Both are caused by viruses and they share some common symptoms. Runny and/or stuffy nose, sneezing, and sore throat may occur in both, but are usually more prominent in colds. Chest discomfort and coughing are common with the flu and can become severe. These symptoms may occur in colds, but are usually milder.

The flu and the cold also show some major differences. Fever, which is rare with the common cold, is characteristic of the flu (102-104 F). It hits suddenly and may last 3-4 days. Headaches are quite prominent in the sufferers, but rare in those with a cold. General aches, pain, fatigue or weakness may be severe or of long duration with the flu, but are usually mild or nonexistent with a cold.

There are no cures for either

of these infections, but they usually go away on their own. However, they can lead to secondary infections and other more serious problems, so it is important for high risk individuals to see a doctor when symptoms occur.

Over-the-counter products are available to relieve the symptoms of the cold and the flu. If you have any questions about these products, ask your pharmacist.

## One solid waste franchise area approved by fiscal court

The franchise boundary for the county's solid waste management plan was set by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a called meeting Friday.

The franchise area will include all Rockcastle County under one franchise, excluding Mt. Vernon which has two years left on its five-year franchise with William K. Bullen.

Both Broadhead and Livingston are included in the franchise area that will eventually be bid by interested persons.

Voting to set the boundary were magistrates Amos Burdette,

Glen Ellison and Doug Bishop. Abstaining were Donald Bullock and Jack Bradley, County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker also abstained as he has on all garbage votes. As noted, his son-in-law, Bullen, is in the garbage business in Mt. Vernon.

The vote on the boundary came after a lively discussion in which Magistrate Doug Bishop challenged the Livingston City Council which signed a two-year contract with trash collector Glen Parker in September.

Bishop said the Livingston council knew the county plan was being drawn up, but drew it up and signed it in an effort to keep

Livingston out of the county plan. He added that the action should be tested in court, if necessary.

"The mayor (Billy Medley) came to one meeting and told us Livingston would work with us, and now we find they've hurried to get a contract," Bishop declared. "If we're going to have a profitable and effective county system we have to have Livingston and Broadhead included."

It was pointed out that Livingston had not officially notified the county of its intention to draw up a contract, nor informed the county of its subsequent action.

The court vote came over the

suggestion by County Attorney James H. Lambert that an opinion should be sought from the Kentucky Attorney General on Livingston's decision before setting a franchise boundary.

"The Attorney General's opinion is one man's opinion," Bishop said. "So I don't know why we should wait any longer. We've had enough delays."

The court then agreed to ask for an opinion, but would not delay setting the boundary on the grounds that more time would be wasted while the county's monthly costs for garbage removal from dumpsters is about \$10,000 a month.

Tim Schwendeman, representing Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) which drew up the county's garbage plan at a cost of \$16,500, discussed the various problems confronting the court, but left all legal decisions up to County Attorney Lambert.

"He is your legal representative and he will have to give you legal advice on what you should do," Schwendeman told the magistrates.

Schwendeman did say according to State Statutes, if a city has a garbage plan in effect and the county wants to take over the city area, it requires a notice of one

year to the city, plus taking over any debts left including equipment, if any, and the possible loss of income for the remaining time on the contract.

The fiscal court approved the solid waste management plan on Aug. 14 Mt. Vernon's contract with Bullen is in effect until 1988. Livingston, as noted, signed a contract with Parker in September, according to Charlene Cole, Livingston clerk.

Livingston's garbage collection is mandatory. Homeowners pay \$5 a month which is added to the city water bill. The city pays Parker \$270 a month to pick up area.

## Road crews ready for snow

State Transportation road crews are ready for the 1986-87 winter maintenance program so that when snow begins to accumulate in Rockcastle County, the roads can be cleared quickly and efficiently.

"This year, as in years past, we want fast effective snow removal. Crews will be able to travel safely during the winter months," said Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

To help motorists plan their winter driving, the Transportation Cabinet has announced which roads will be cleared first.

The transportation crew will clear I-75, U.S. 25, U.S. 150, U.S. 421, Ky. 70, Ky. 461 and Ky. 1505 first. The next roads to be cleared will be priority B and then priority C.

The roads are cleared as soon as precipitation becomes significant. Crews set out with salt or plows to clear the top priority roads first. The priority system is based on the traffic carried by the road.

Priority A roads include interstates, parkways, urban expressways and other state roads with exceptionally large volumes of traffic. Priority B roads are state primary roads, bypasses and roads with slightly less traffic than Priority A roads. State secondary roads, rural secondary roads and other routes with equal traffic fall into Priority C category.

Remaining state roads are cleared after these categories have been treated.

Motorists can plan their trips more safely by using Priority A roads whenever possible during bad weather.

Rockcastle County recently received a check for \$737,05 from the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet. According to Natural Resources Secretary Charlotte E. Baldwin, Rockcastle County was one of 48 counties receiving checks.

The judge gave Bee 20 days, until Dec. 11 to file "appropriate" material facts to substantiate Bee's request for a dismissal of the suit.

Judge Venters will next set a date for a hearing on the Bullen suit that asks Bee to halt collections of garbage since Bullen has an exclusive franchise for garbage collection in the city of Mt. Vernon.

## Asbestos in courthouse causes employee concern; fiscal court plans removal

Employees and officials working in several areas of the Rockcastle County Courthouse are being exposed to high levels of asbestos, according to a report from the Judicial Department of Frankfort.

That wasn't good news for those employees who must live daily under the dangerous material.

Asbestos is a carcinogen, a cancer-causing substance.

Realizing the hazard, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court agreed at a called meeting Friday to have engineers/consultants Arisman, Miller and Woodford of Lexington to look at the areas where there is the most asbestos.

The firm now has a contract for work on the jail area.

The recent survey of the courthouse by Analytical Management Co. showed all sprayed-on ceiling materials sampled proved positive with percentages ranging from two percent to 15 percent chrysotile.

In a cover letter accompanying the report, Harry G. Hoffman II, facilities general manager for the Administrative Office of the Courts, asked County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker to notify him "if you plan to take any action."

The report noted that it is "evident that the threat of air-

borne asbestos fibers is there. It is our hope that, with the results of this survey in hand, the decisions concerning the asbestos material in the future will be expedient." Concern was evident among employees as the report circulated.

"I hope something can be done about it," one employee said. "I guess it could be expensive to remove all of it, but I'm not sure just how expensive."

Currently, asbestos is being removed in the jail area which will undergo remodeling soon. That removal is costing the county \$10,250.

The survey of the courthouse covered the basement, the basement mechanical room where most of the problem was found in and near the furnace and water heater and around pipes.

The samples were sent to McCoy & McCoy, Inc., laboratory in Lexington for analysis.

The samples were collected, their description logged on a data sheet along with the location in the building. Following laboratory analysis, the results were then recorded in a form showing the type of asbestos, if any, percentage and condition of each sample. A total of 30 samples were taken.

The report stated that "where the asbestos does occur, it is

## Sad day for some

## Tobacco sales open

The tobacco selling season opened across the state Monday, but for two county growers, they'll have less tobacco to sell this year than they planned.

Thieves backed a truck up to the barn door and stole about 45 bales and part of a few other bales of tobacco belonging to Clinton Brown and Wayne Todd at Ottawa.

Mrs. Brown said tire tracks led to their barn. The theft was discovered Sunday morning.

Based on 70 pounds to a bale, and Monday's average of about \$1.60 a pound, the loss would amount to over \$5,000.

There were no reports on any sales Monday by Rockcastle County farmers, although some probably did sell.

According to County Agent Tom Mills, poundage in Rockcastle is down about 30 percent. Last year's poundage was \$3 million. This year it is \$2.3 million.

Most growers in the state who did sell Monday, were unhappy about the support price that was cut just before the market opened by the Department of Agriculture by three cents a pound for grades of lugs and leaf which accounts for most of the market.

45 bales of tobacco stolen

This year's price support levels range from \$1.62 to 99 cents a pound, with a \$1.48 pound average for all grades.

Monday, the average price across the state was \$1.57, 49 a pound, or two cents below last year's opening day. Most of the tobacco sold for a penny above the support price from \$1.53 to \$1.59 a pound.

The volume of sales was 26.6 million pounds compared to 23.5 million last year.

In the area, London led Kentucky markets with an average price of \$1.59.50. One of the sellers, Stanley Robinson of Rt. 1, East Bernstadt, sold his 3300 pounds for \$1.58. He said it could have been worse.

Fifth District Rep. Harold Rogers was at Somerset for the opening sales. He asked tobacco companies to bring the price of tobacco up to where it needs to be.

He said failure to bring the price up would put companies in a bad light with the tobacco bloc in Congress.

Prices in the Somerset market ranged from three cents to 13 cents above the support price.

households must participate if a plan is to be effective. That's a lot of households when you're asked to volunteer a fee.

With Mt. Vernon and Livingston temporarily out of the plan because they have their own plan, we'd venture a guess there won't be 25 percent participating. The franchisee will be broke before he starts.

"Honest Abe" Lincoln was right. You can please some of the people some of the time, but not all the people all of the time.

Mt. Vernon has been "ho hum" in its attitude toward the plan showing little interest. Mayor Roland Mullins attended one fiscal court meeting to listen in on planning. Brothead's attitude has been "what will be, will be" and left it up to the county to haul its garbage.

Livingston is another matter. They like their mandatory garbage plan, want to keep it, and will put up a fight to keep it. They fought once before when the garbage landfill was brought up, and to a satisfactory conclusion, no landfill.

But in the final analysis, and no matter the opposition or the reasons, it will depend on how effective the voluntary plan turns out to be. If things don't go well, the EPA will tactfully remind the county that its garbage still stinks, so do something.

As happened in Bell County, the "do something" was to switch

from a voluntary plan that had a 40 percent collection rate to a mandatory plan in which all households were charged for collection whether they wanted it or not. Added, was an ordinance establishing a fine and/or, just maybe, community service work in lieu of a fine, say, cutting weeds or sweeping the streets. Incidentally, Bell County currently is in the 80 percent collection range.

We have sat through every fiscal court session where the solid waste management plan has been discussed, and we've watched the magistrates wrestle with all the problems, and there are a lot of them.

One thing seems apparent: Kentucky counties are locked into an economy and tax rate that makes it very difficult for the magistrates to meet the financial demands of the state and federally mandated programs such as garbage, jail renovation, and removing asbestos from public buildings.

At the moment the county has one thing going for it. The county solid waste plan will hopefully finance itself and give the county a little more income. But if it doesn't, the magistrates may have no alternative but to switch to a mandatory plan, or worse still, turn to the county taxpayers for help. Perhaps the thought, "By-the-way, have a bountiful Thanksgiving!"

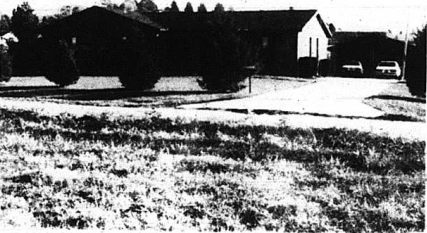

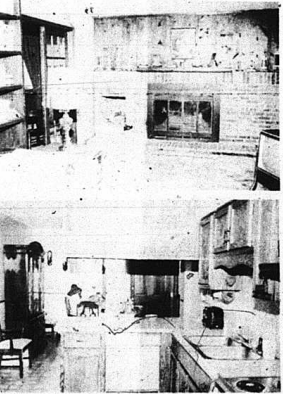

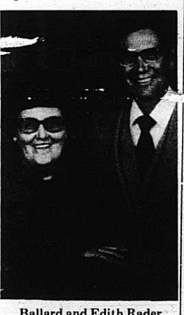

consistent throughout the entire building. In the basement mechanical room, the percentage of the samples which proved positive range from one percent to 55 percent chrysotile. Most of these samples were in the lower percentage range. All of the wall material, floor tile and ceiling tile samples proved to be negative.

The sheriff's office has the most on the first floor at 15 percent. The office of Judge Thacker has 10 percent. Other office areas and percentages are County clerk's 3, old 4H office, 8, old ASCS office, 7, and foyer Main Street entrance, 5 percent.

The second floor was tested. The Circuit Court Clerk's office was 2 percent. The circuit courtroom does not have asbestos ceilings. Asbestos in the offices of Cox & Clontz in the basement area was removed by the attorneys earlier.

**Fire Protection Money returned to County - from Front**

Those counties that received checks had paid in full their 1985 county forest fire protection assessment. According to Kentucky law, the Division of Forestry will collect through the county the cost of suppressing forest fires from persons responsible for starting the fires.

This same law instructs the division to return fire suppression reimbursements to the counties that have paid fully their annual county forest fire protection assessment. The money returned to the counties goes into a special forest fire protection fund to help pay the upcoming year's assessment.

## Nancy Williams receives forestry contest award

A Rockcastle County wood land owner was recently presented with a certificate of recognition from the Courier-Journal and Louisville Times "Tom Wallace Farm Forestry Contest", according to Kenneth Thompson of the Kentucky Division of Forestry. A certificate of recognition for having carried out woodland management programs with definite objectives and having protected and improved her woodland was presented to Nancy Williams by Kenneth Thompson at her home in Conway.

The Farm Forestry Contest, sponsored each year by the two Louisville newspapers, seeks to promote good forest management by recognizing those Kentucky and Southern Indiana woodland owners who are doing outstanding jobs in managing small woodland tracts. The contestants are nominated annually by foresters and compete for \$1,000.00 in prize money for the top three winners. Besides cash prizes, all county district winners receive specially designed plaques.

Items considered in judging nominations include carrying out specific management plans for protection against forest fire, grazing by livestock, and forest insects, and diseases. Also included is woodland management accomplishments such as timber stand improvement, tree planting, products harvested, erosion control, wildlife habitat enhancement, and recreational development.

Mrs. Williams began her woodland management in 1963 when she requested a forest management plan. Since that time, Nancy Williams has had this forest management plan revised and updated four times. Under the technical assistance of the Kentucky Division of Forestry, the land has been protected from destructive grazing with the construction of fencing around the woodland. Nancy Williams has taken precautions to prevent damaging wildlife by constructing a half-mile fire break and keeping a sharp watch over her woodland for the possibility of wildfire.

With the assistance of foresters from the Kentucky Division of Forestry, Nancy Williams has recently completed planting 6,000 shortleaf pine and preparing about 70 acres of ground to naturally regenerate itself after she had conducted a clearcut or complete harvest over an 80 acre area. This 80-acre area was established in 1981 and resulted in the sale of 200,000 board feet of timber.

Mrs. Williams has also been active in improving existing stands of timber as she has thinned and pruned several pine plantations, totaling some 70 acres. These timber stand improvements have been conducted along with other improvements such as constructing hiking trails and planting food and cover plants for wildlife.

Over the years, Nancy Williams' efforts have paid off in a healthier, better looking woodland, with some income from the property. Other benefits of her efforts include increased timber production, improved wildlife habitat, and game populations, and improved recreational opportunities. The successful completion of the practices outlined by her forest management plans has resulted in a woodland that benefits Rockcastle County as well as Nancy Williams. This award is presented with this Tom Wallace Farm Forestry Certificate of Recognition to recognize her outstanding forest management program.

This recognition is something Rockcastle County residents can be proud of, however, there is much more land in the county that needs to be properly managed if it is to continue to produce high quality timber, wildlife, and recreation. 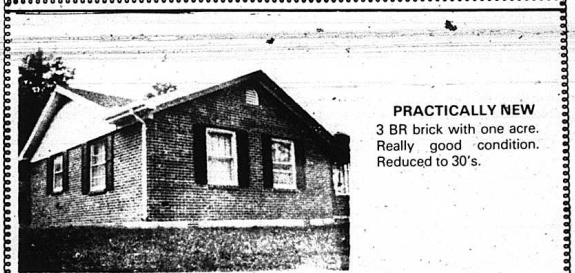

## Farmers who have crop damage may be eligible for loans

Farmers who live in Rockcastle County may be able to qualify for low-interest loans and other assistance if they have suffered crop damage because of this year's drought, according to Fifth District Rep. Harold Rogers.

Rogers said the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture has declared 25 counties in Kentucky disaster areas for agriculture. In addition,

in 21 neighboring counties, including Rockcastle County, farmers who suffered at least 30 percent crop damage may also qualify for disaster assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

Rogers said qualifying farmers can receive loans of up to \$100,000 at 5 percent interest, while loans of \$100,000 to \$500,000 carry an 8 percent interest rate. Other assistance may also be available.

"I am pleased that the Secretary has made these programs available to our drought-stricken farmers," said Rogers. "I urge any farmers who think they may qualify to contact their local Farmers Home Administration."

## \$9,096 released

## CAP reports Area grants

Five organizations in Rockcastle County received \$9,096 from the Christian Appalachian Project (CAP) in Lancaster, according to a report from CAP.

The grants or loans were included in \$266,703 distributed by the Christian Appalachian Project during its 1985-86 fiscal year to 81 organizations and individuals.

The report echoed another released two weeks ago.

The City of Mt. Vernon received a \$386 matching grant for salary of summer recreation supervisor at Mt. Vernon Elementary School; the Rockcastle County Extension Service received \$210 for scholarships to 4 HCamp; the Rockcastle River Chapter, Association of Couples for Marriage Enrichment received \$1,500 for scholarships for leadership training for persons leading Marriage Communication Workshops; The L. E. A. P. Livingston Economic Al-

ternative in progress (formally Rockcastle County Community Loan Trust) received \$4,000 for general support of salaries and sorghum cooperative and the Cleft Rock Retreat Center received a \$3,000 matching grant for a Marriage Enrichment Center.

CAP is a non-profit, Christian service organization which seeks to help the people of Appalachia improve their lives through education, economic opportunity, employment, and a sense of community.

The grants and loans are made by the Christian Appalachian Project to other organizations who also serve the people of Appalachia.

The grants and loans program principally supports church-related ministries that care for the immediate needs of people around them, but it also gives financial assistance to secular organizations that serve the Appalachian people.

garbage and \$20 a month for gas. Brodhead does not have franchised garbage collection. Bee Garbage of Mt. Vernon asked the Brodhead City Council earlier this year if Bee could have a franchise for collection in Brodhead. The council said no, citing the pending solid waste plan by the county.

By its vote, the fiscal court made it clear it plans to take Mt. Vernon into the franchise area at the first opportunity.

"Let's get these notifications in the mail to the cities as soon as possible," Bishop said. "There's no use waiting until the last minute."

The court made one other decision. If agreed to advertise for a county coordinator for garbage, who will implement the garbage plan. That advertisement is in this issue of the Signal.

For the record, the court did not initiate a garbage plan. The Kentucky Environmental Protection Agency and the Kentucky Legislature put all 120 counties on notice to clean up junk heaps and garbage dumps, and gave them until Dec. 31, 1985 to have a workable plan, that in turn, would meet the approval of the EPA.

Rockcastle got an extension to the deadline and hired CVADD to devise the plan, which now has state approval.

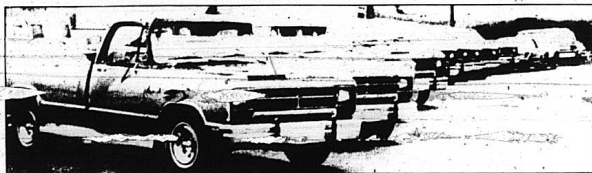

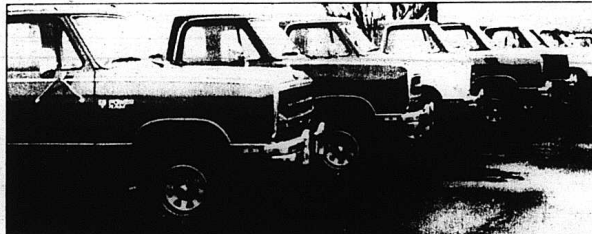
