The board agreed, subject to Clontz's advice in the matter.

"It's just starting. They have rubbed me the wrong way," David Mason said as he left the meeting. Mason said that he was so adamant about his son not being expelled mainly because his son has never missed a day of school and will graduate this spring.

After the Masons and those with him left the meeting, John Smith, mother of William Smith, asked the board if she, her son, William, and her attorney could be present at the hearing when David Mason gave his side of the story.

Superintendent Parsons said that he did not see any problem with them being present but that he would talk to Attorney Clontz and let them know.

Ora York, William's grandmother, said that she could not understand why the Masons could not accept the punishment. "I've known Mr. Saylor all my life and think he is a fair man," Mrs. York said. She also asked which one of the board members signed the petition but got no response to her question from the board.

"I think what is fair for one is

fair for another, and I don't think any child should be treated differently," she said.

Attorney Clontz said Wednesday morning that a hearing for Mason, in his opinion, would be

open to the public and anyone could attend.

In other business, the board re-elected Dr. Burdette, chairman, and Willie Taylor vice-chairman by a unanimous vote.

Joe Lambert sworn-in as Supreme Court Justice; is youngest justice ever

of Kentucky.

"I accept the trust placed in me," he said. "I accept the trust with humility; with a deep desire to do what is right; with no master but the law, and with love for all the

ceremony. Justice Lambert thanked those present who had helped and encouraged him during his election campaign and promised to serve his term on the court with fairness and according to the laws

"In the weeks and months ahead, it will surely happen that you will hear about a decision of the Supreme Court which appears to be totally wrong, and that Justice Lambert voted for that decision," he continued. "You will ask yourself, 'What on earth is wrong with Joe Lambert?' Let me answer now by saying that my decisions will be made only after the most careful study, research and thought."

He concluded with "The Constitution of the United States, the Constitution of Kentucky and the law of Kentucky will control my decisions and I shall never forget ours is a government of laws and not of men."

In the audience was Judge John White who took the seat Lambert now holds that was vacated by Justice Calvin Aker, who resigned. Judge Robbie Doche of the Kentucky Court of Appeals, Circuit Judge William T. Jennings of Madison County, and Judge Walter McGuire of Rockcastle District Court, Circuit Judge Daniel Venters did not attend due to a memorial service for Somerset Attorney Don Cooper, who died last week.

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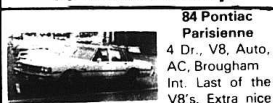


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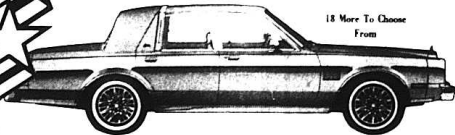
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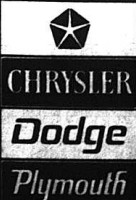

Joseph Lambert becomes youngest Kentucky Supreme Court justice

About 200 friends and relatives gathered at the Rockcastle Courthouse Monday to watch Attorney Joseph E. Lambert take the oath of justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court administered by Chief Justice Robert F. Stephens. It was a memorable day for the Lambert family whose members were on hand for the impressive ceremony.

Justice Lambert is the first Supreme Court justice to be

elected from Rockcastle County. At one time, Robert B. Bird served as chief justice of the then Kentucky Court of Appeals. He had been a Rockcastle County Attorney, but was living in Laurel County at the time of his service on the high court and was a Whitley County native.

Justice Lambert was elected in November to the 3rd District court seat by nearly 11,000 votes, and at 38, will be the youngest justice to serve on the high court.

He will serve an eight-year term that will begin next week. He will have offices in Frankfort and in the Rockcastle County Courthouse.

Justice Stephens told the audience the court looks forward to the service of Lambert on the court, commenting that Lambert will bring a more youthful look to the court. He added that the new justice could also look forward to a lot of work.

State official tells court not to spend more than budget

A state official reminded the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday that state and federal money sources are quickly drying up, and suggested the court not spend money that has not already been budgeted.

Al Howell, of the Kentucky Department of Finance, told the court it had hired new employees, and if these kinds of expenditures continue the court had "better know where the money is coming from to pay for them."

He told the magistrates they were doing very well a good job but the Rockcastle court, like other courts in the state will have to be watchful with finances or it would soon have "bad cash flow problems."

"If you have financial problems, the only remedy is new revenue sources, or a cut back of services," he stated.

Howell said only two ways exist to raise money through an increase in property taxes (only four percent annually) or an occupational tax. He said a special taxing district could set up with all the money going to the district, but he did not elaborate.

Magistrate Doug Bishop told those present the court had no intention of raising anyone's taxes, and that the magistrates had

not even discussed it. "Every time you hear that," Bishop said, "it is coming from someone else, not the fiscal court."

Bishop said once the garbage problem in the county is solved and its new plans are under way, the court would have more money.

Court suspends road foreman

Luster Bullock was appointed temporary county road foreman at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday. The vote was unanimous.

Road foreman Monroe Hansel was suspended pending a fiscal court hearing set for 1 p.m. Friday. The court did not elaborate on the reasons for his suspension, pending the hearing.

Bullock, a current road employee, will serve until a permanent foreman is hired. He will receive \$5.00 an hour for 8 1/2 hours a day, with 8 hours for bookkeeping. A lunch break is to be mandatory.

A review of other employees will also be made at the meeting.

Garbage plan letter goes to three cities

A letter signed by County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker has been forwarded to the three cities in the county informing them they will be a part of the countywide solid waste management area.

The court directed Judge Thacker to sign the letter. He had said earlier he did not know who was supposed to sign it.

The letter means for all practical purposes, a one year freeze on new garbage contracts. Only Livingston now has a garbage contract in effect.

The court also scheduled a meeting on garbage for 7 p.m.

Thursday, tonight at the court house at which time a representative of the Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CAVADA) will be on hand to answer questions. The public is invited.

During the discussion, Judge Thacker asked Mt. Vernon barber Donald Rowe a former magistrate if he had suggestions on garbage. He replied, "Get some goats."

A low bid of \$14,000 from C and L Construction of Mt. Vernon to do steel replacement work on Mullins Station Road bridge was approved by the court.

Board rejects petition; agrees to hearing

Once upon a time the Rockcastle County Board of Education met in Superintendent Charles B. Parson's office because only a handful of citizens attended. But since an altercation between Chris Mason and William Smith, two seniors at Rockcastle County High School last September, the board has had to meet in the more spacious hallway of the school administration building.

Tuesday night was not an exception. Approximately 15 interested persons turned out for the meeting, and after Chris Mason's father David presented the board with a petition with 527 names, including that of board member George Poynter, the board went into executive session.

The petition asked that the board administer some other kind of punishment against David Mason other than expulsion.

In the board's December meeting, Mason was given 10 days expulsion by high school principal Cleston Saylor for the fight he had with William Smith. Saylor explained in making his decision that he thought William Smith, who had missed 43 days of school at that time, and received a severely broken leg in the fight, had suffered enough. Smith still has not returned to school and Mason is still in school.

After almost 30 minutes in executive session the board emerged and Poynter made a motion that some other type of punishment be administered against Chris Mason. His motion got only silence from other board members and died for a lack of a second.

The board in their lack of action backed Saylor's decision.

But, David Mason's attorney Ms. Karen Chrisman of London, who was present at the meeting, informed the board that they could

not legally suspend David Mason without a hearing. She quoted from Kentucky Law, KRS 158-150, which states that any student expelled from school is entitled a hearing to tell his or her side of the incident.

Board Chairman, Dr. Rudolph Burdette, said that the board would agree to a hearing, if their

attorney Carl Clontz, approved it. It was agreed by the board and Chrisman that Clontz would have an answer for Mason by Wednesday afternoon.

Ms. Chrisman also asked the board that Mason's expulsion, which was to have started Jan. 12, be delayed until after the hearing.

Plastics plant evacuated after phone bomb threat

About 100 Mt. Vernon Plastics employees were evacuated from the plant about 4:45 p.m. Tuesday following a telephoned bomb threat to the company.

Employees were immediately sent out of the plant and State Police, Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire Department and rescue squad were called.

A search of the building failed to turn up any kind of explosive and employees returned to work about 8 p.m.

It was the first threat to the plant, according to Bob Kepler,

controller.

Kepler said the company is in the process of determining where the call originated. He reported the plant has a telephone monitoring system which records all telephone calls providing detailed information about where a call is made.

"It is the policy of Mt. Vernon Plastics to protect at all times any possible threat to the safety of our employees," Kepler said. "This includes day-to-day situations within the plant itself as well as outside threats."

Local man dies in crash

A Red Hill man became the first Rockcastle resident to die on local highways in 1987 when his Ford truck plunged over a cliff Tuesday morning, on Ky. 1009 and overturned.

Ambrise Ed Griffin, 45, of Red Hill was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle deputy coroner Roy Martin.

Martin said that Griffin apparently died from internal injuries but that Griffin's body was taken to Lexington for an autopsy which was performed Wednesday.

Preliminary results from the autopsy were not available at press time.

Olen McGuire, who lives near the accident scene, said that he and one of his sons noticed about 11 a.m. that a vehicle had apparently left the road in a curve at the top of a steep hill, near Hensley's Used Cars. The two men then saw a pickup truck lying on its top in the creek bed, according to police, McGuire immediately notified authorities.

HIGHWAY PROJECTS DELAYED NATIONWIDE

Failure of the 99th Congress to pass funding for the federal highway program is leaving Kentuckians without needed road improvements for which they have already paid.

This sad situation resulted from the inability of some in Congress to compromise on a few issues in the federal highway reauthorization for the sake of the entire bill. I intend to make this matter an early priority in the 100th Congress, which convenes in January. Meanwhile, construction on some 100 projects in Kentucky, worth \$152 million, will have been delayed, according to State Transportation Cabinet officials. About 70 other projects in pre-construction phases will also have been affected.

Reauthorization bills must be approved by committees in both House and Senate. Each house must vote on the bills, with a House-Senate conference committee working out differences between the two bills. Both houses must then approve the compromise and the President must sign the bill.

However, several key issues kept House and Senate conferees from reaching agreement on the legislation in the waning days of the 99th Congress. One major difference in the Senate and House versions of the bill was the 55 m.p.h. national maximum speed limit. The Senate version would have allowed states to raise the speed limit to 65 m.p.h. on rural interstates.

The federal-aid highway program is funded completely from user fees -- mostly from the 9-cents-per-gallon gasoline tax and the 15-cents-per-gallon diesel fuel tax. Motorists should be able to expect that these fees will -- without delay -- be used to construct, repair, and maintain the highways and bridges over which they drive.

Congress' failure to agree on the reauthorization bill left the highway program without new funds. As a result, Kentucky and most other states are running out of highway monies. This means no new projects can be authorized or construction and design contracts let for new projects, where federal aid funds have not yet been previously authorized. However, projects that are completely state funded, like some of the AA Highway, and federal-aid projects that have been previously authorized, can be let to contract.

The delay in putting federal highway funds to work means that motorists are not seeing their dollars used in an efficient manner; their fees are not being efficiently funneled into needed roadway projects. There is also an economic impact because those funds are not being put to work in Kentucky, with 10,000 jobs lost throughout the economy.

Since other states are equally affected, I believe Congress will be primed to pass this legislation shortly after we convene in January. America's motorists have a right to have their funds used as they were intended. It is my hope that we will not see this type of senseless delay again.

Voter lists are not up-to-date

It has come to our attention recently that there is a serious problem with the voter registration system in Rockcastle County -- one of illegal voting in local elections by non-residents of the county.

From information gathered, this is not a new problem but one that has existed here for several years. But, it is time it is stopped.

For one thing, it is illegal. State law requires that a person be a resident of the precinct in which they vote for 30 days prior to the election.

Secondly, it is morally wrong. If your residence is in another county, you have no right to have a say in electing local officials who govern the cities, the county and the school board.

Thirdly, we call upon the election officers and election commissioners to do their jobs and "clean up" the voter lists in this county. They may not heretofore have been aware of this situation but now it will behoove them to take care of it.

This practice probably favors more than one political faction so we are not pointing the finger at any one clique. However, there are some factions who have more expertise with these political maneuverings than others and they do doubt have an advantage in numbers. This makes it even more important that the election officials do their part to keep local elections as fair and above board as possible.

We are familiar with several of these instances and will be watching with interest over the next few months to see if the election commissioners bring our voter lists more up to date.

State eligible for clean-up funds

U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell (R-Ky.) announced today that the Commonwealth of Kentucky will receive an additional \$320 million in eligible abandoned land mine projects from the Office of Surface Mining to cleanup pre-1977 abandoned mine sites.

"I came to my attention in November that Kentucky would only be eligible for \$210 million in projects in Kentucky's updated AML inventory," McConnell said. "I felt that OSM was failing to recognize the magnitude of subsidence problems and agricultural damage caused by abandoned mines in Kentucky and I told them so. Obviously, they agreed and

more than doubled Kentucky's share of the federal reclamation funds—to approximately \$530 million."

The AML fund is financed by a per-ton assessment on coal production. Each state is entitled to 50 percent of the money producers pay into the fund and the remainder of the fund is disbursed on a discretionary basis by the Secretary of Interior. Allocations from the discretionary fund are based upon an updated version of each state's inventory of abandoned mine sites. The higher the dollar amount in a state's inventory, the more money that state is likely to receive.

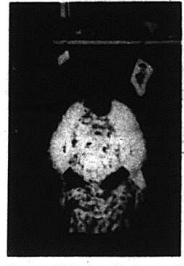

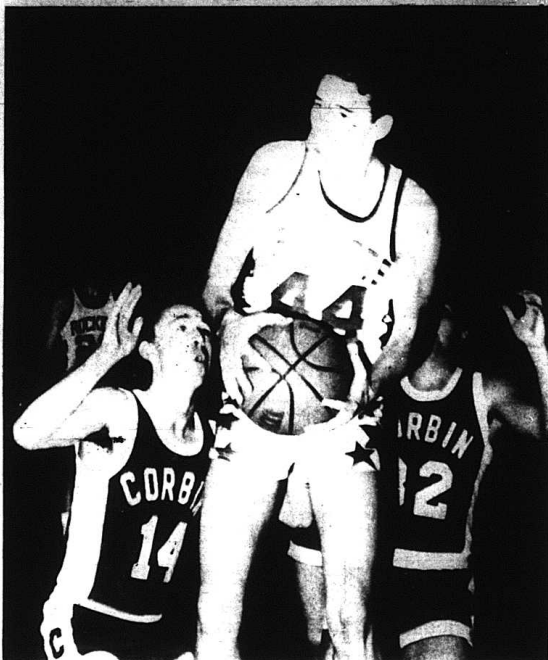

The Redhounds brought their "not so famous" basketball team to town and handed the Rockets their second loss in as many outings.

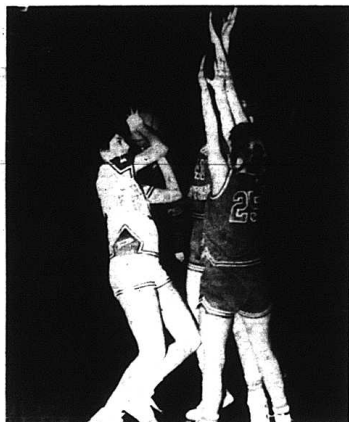
Corbin trailed only twice in the game, both times in the second period at 26-25 and 27-26 but that was the only time the Rockets were actually in the contest.

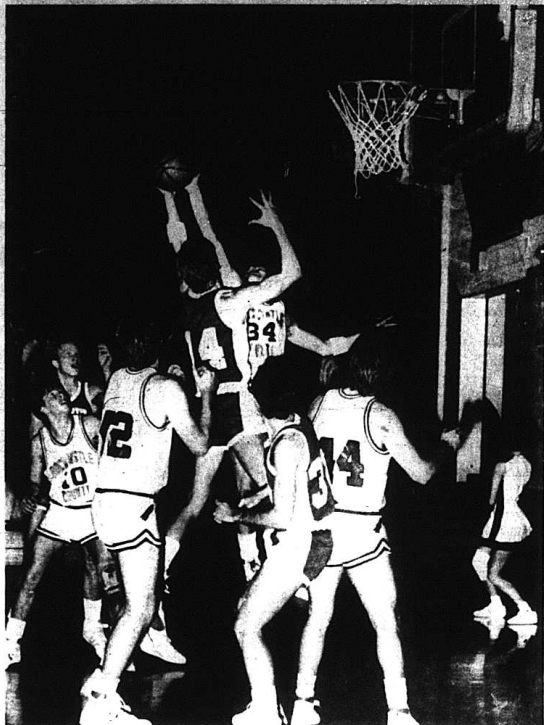
Junior forward Jon Bullens played well for the home team grabbing eight rebounds and scoring 18 points to lead all scorers.

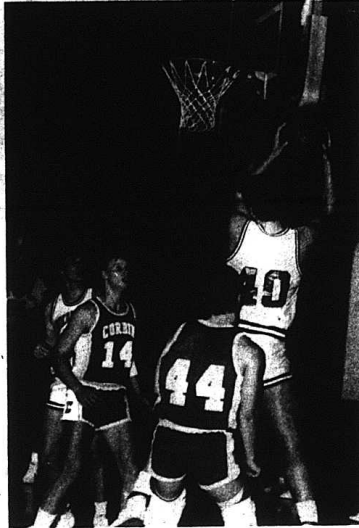
