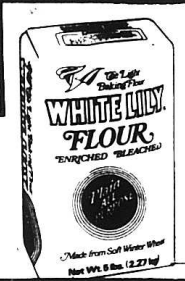

PAY RAISE FOR CONGRESS IS BAD IDEA

The Administration's new budget proposes a sizeable pay raise for members of Congress, as well as for the President's Cabinet and federal judges.

I believe the idea is a bad one.

The same budget suggests numerous funding reductions that will affect millions of Americans. For example, it proposes that 14.7 million school children should no longer be eligible for subsidized school lunches. And that senior citizens pay higher Medicare deductibles.

These budget reductions -- still to be debated by Congress -- were proposed to help the government meet its goal of balancing the federal budget by 1990.

Our yearly budget deficits add to the federal debt, a debt that grows each day with interest. It currently stands at nearly \$2.2 trillion. That is more than double the amount of debt owed by the federal government in 1980.

Economic experts warn that if we fail to bring our budgets under control soon, there could be disastrous consequences.

It is clear that bringing federal budgets down will require penny-pinching at all levels of government, as well as hardship for Americans affected by various cuts. So it would be dead wrong for Washington decision-makers, calling on everyone else to sacrifice, to enact a pay raise such as the one proposed.

The Reagan budget would raise the salaries of members of Congress by 16 percent and Cabinet officers by 13 percent. While the proposed raises are substantial, they are less than those recommended earlier by a presidential commission, which called for raises ranging from 37 percent to 80 percent.

Congressional raises are always a tender issue on Capitol Hill. It is expensive to live in Washington, largely because of the high housing costs. Most members also keep a home back in their state and must pay airfare to commute back and forth frequently. So there are many financial pressures which a pay raise would help members lessen.

However, across the nation taxpayers are readying their 1986 income tax returns. They all deserve to know that Congress is serious about deficit reduction, and that its members are willing to sacrifice personally.

This is no time for Congress to accept a pay raise. To do so would indicate that we are not serious about balancing the federal budget. It would also be insensitive to those who are being asked to sacrifice in this effort.

I intend to oppose this pay increase, as I have others in the past. Perhaps, if Congress balanced the budget, the American public might look more favorably upon a pay increase for its representatives in Washington. Until then a raise is simply not justified, and perhaps not deserved.

Continental Telephone has "wire-care plus" available

Contel of Kentucky announced this week its maintenance program for in-home telephone wiring under the name of "Wire Care Plus."

The move comes in the wake of a recent federal order that gave telephone customers full responsibility for maintaining the telephone wiring inside their homes as of January 1. As a result, a reduction in the charge for local service and equipment will be reflected on customers' monthly bills.

Contel's Wire Care Plus plan will safeguard telephone customers from ever having to repair or replace the telephone wires inside their homes. According to Billy Dezart, Superintendent of Wire Care Plus, a subscriber will be entitled to have a Contel technician come to your home and fix any inside wiring problem at no extra charge.

The "Wire Care Plus" plan includes provisions for having

Contel technicians provide a complete check for any telephone problem inside the home. In some cases, Dezart said, the company will also provide "loaner" phones.

The price for Contel's Wire Care Plus will be \$160 per month. The company's regular fee for repair work on in-home telephone wiring for non-subscribers of the maintenance plan will be \$34.10 per hour.

The introduction of Wire Care Plus coincides with the enactment of a recent government ruling concerning in-house telephone wiring. Earlier this year the Federal Communications Commission issued an order that it effect makes telephone subscribers responsible for repairs to the wiring starting January 1, 1987.

Contel customers will have the opportunity to make their choice of maintenance options in the near future.

Farmers seeking disaster loans must have insurance

Farmers seeking disaster emergency loans from the Farmers Administration (FmHA) for 1987 losses will need to have crop insurance if it is available. FmHA County Supervisor Robert W. Hornsby said today.

All family-size farmers should be aware that a newly effective provision of the 1985 farm bill prohibits our making emergency loans for crop losses that could have been insured under multiple-peril crop insurance programs sponsored by the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC), said Mr. Hornsby.

Therefore I urge every family-size farmer in Jackson and Rockcastle Counties to seriously take into account this new relationship between insurance coverage and emergency-loan eligibility.

Federally-subsidized multiple-peril crop insurance is now available for all wheat, corn, barley, grain sorghum, oats, upland cotton and rice, plus and additional 35 specialty crops in most growing areas. The government subsidy reduces the program costs by about 50 percent, according to Mr. Hornsby, making crop insurance a worthwhile option to consider regardless of the new-

ly required crop insurance.

If a farmer obtains the insurance required and if the value of his crop loss is still 30 percent or more after the insurance payment, the operator will be eligible for consideration for an emergency loan.

Effective in January, the new requirement will affect crop-planted in 1987 and thus will not affect winter wheat or other winter-seeded crops planted in 1986 and harvested in 1987. Insurance must be multiple-peril, covering most forms of disaster rather than hail only.

The closing date in Kentucky for insurance sales on spring-planted crops is April 15 and September 30 for fall-planted crops. Because of these dates and the fact that a pre-empted planting endorsement for eligible crops must be elected 45 days prior to sales closing, Mr. Hornsby urged farmers to contact their local insurance agents promptly.

Information is also available at FCIC field offices and through most county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

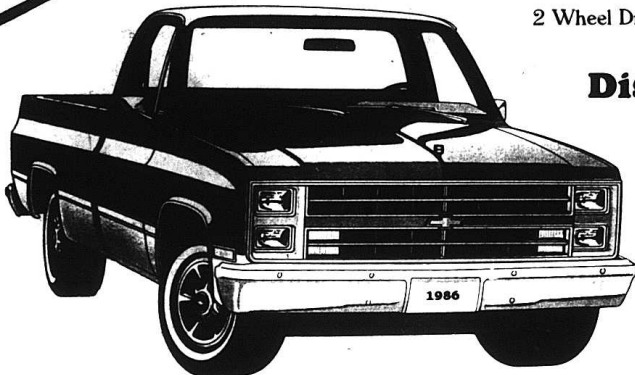

Hold put on jail loan by state

The Kentucky Department of Local Government has put a hold on the county's plan to borrow money to remodel the county jail until state officials can look more closely at the county's ability to repay the loan.

With the county strapped for money, mostly due to excessive garbage collection fees that are running over \$8,000 a month, the state wants to make sure the county will not find itself in even deeper financial trouble.

"I am recommending that the county hold off borrowing money at this time to remodel the jail," said Gene Stinchcomb, state local finance officer in the Finance Cabinet.

"This does not mean that I am denying the loan at this time," Stinchcomb said. "It means I want to look more closely at the details before I approve."

Those details include "how safely the debt can be repaid, and that the debt won't create a hardship for the county."

The county has asked the state if it could borrow on money the county expects to receive from Mt. Vernon Plastics which is to get a block grant through the county for expansion of the local plant.

In short, the county accepts grant money from the federal government, and in turn loans the money to the company which will repay the money to the county over a period of years. The county

Road employees heard by court

Five county highway employees, who were dismissed by letter by the Rockcastle Fiscal Courts, and then later had it changed to suspension were heard in person at a called meeting of the court Friday.

Following a closed session the court announced the suspension of road foreman Monroe Hansel would continue until an other hearing is held. Hansel was accompanied by his attorney, Carl Clontz.

Hansel, according to the January minutes of the court, was hired for two years, beginning January, 1986. The court considers the other employees to be hired on a one-year basis.

Everett Vanzant had his suspension lifted and was reinstated. Jesse Ambrose told the court he had another job. Daniel Carmack's employment expired Dec. 31, and Carl Pittman filed for unemployment, but may be reinstated at some future date, the court agreed.

Test scheduled for candidates

All candidates for circuit court clerk in Kentucky will be given a test Saturday to see if they qualify for the office.

Candidates must be 21, a state resident for two years, and have to score at least 70 percent on the test.

The test will be given in the gymnasium at Kentucky State University in Frankfort.

University of Kentucky professors are preparing the test and will include math, accounting procedures and Court of Justice policies.

Manuals are available for those who plan to take the test.

The test is a constitutional requirement. This is the first year for a uniform statewide test.

Incumbent clerks do not have to take it. They have already been tested.

Money problems face fiscal court

"I think we're in deep trouble and I don't see any silver linings ahead," a Rockcastle county official commented this week after the Local Government Department of the Kentucky Finance Cabinet warned the county not to overspend its budget.

In its records of the 120 counties, five counties have been listed by the department as on the brink of serious financial trouble. Rockcastle is one of the five. The other four are Estill, Morgan, Lee and Monroe.

Rockcastle magistrates agree the county has to make some drastic changes and soon, to

survive its financial dilemma.

Garbage is our biggest problem," Magistrate Doug Bishop told a public hearing on the subject last Thursday. "If we could get this garbage plant we have under way, we'd be in good shape. But a county our size can't spend \$8,000 a month or more and stay in the black. We'll be deep in red in July."

Although he has never openly commented at length on the county's garbage problem, County Judge Executive Herbert Thacker is well aware of the need to do something quick.

At the hearing the judge seemed at times to want to urge the magistrates to hurry along on the garbage plan. He nodded from time to time when the words "hurry" and "move along" were spoken, but he did not speak out.

Rockcastle's immediate finan-

cial problem is indeed garbage. The monthly bill is staggering for a small, rural county like Rockcastle, state officials say.

In the past, the county has had revenue sharing funds to help with the budget and emergency needs. Last year the county received \$182,000 in revenue sharing. This year it was cut by Washington to about \$43,000.

Insurance is another problem for the county. Last year the county's premium on buildings, vehicles and personnel totaled \$22,500. This year it is more than doubled to \$55,400. At that price the county had trouble finding an insurer.

Then there is the county jail problem. The Kentucky Correctional Cabinet has told the county to clean out the asbestos and remodel the jail or close it. The cost

PCA still active in county

If you stopped at your local PCA office in the past two weeks to pay on your loan you found there was no one there to pay.

PCA moved to London on Jan. 5 of this year, and PCA is not coming back, at least not to a permanent office.

According to Gary Allen, former branch manager, the move to consolidate the PCA's in the 4th district of which Kentucky is part, was made to improve the efficiency of Farm Credit Services. Farm Credit Services is made up of what was formerly PCA and Federal Land Bank.

Allen, who along with Jewell Hansel and Pat Baker were transferred to the London office, said Tuesday that he does not think the move will make that much difference to Rockcastle farmers, served by PCA.

"I will spend a lot of time making personal contacts in Rockcastle," Allen said. "After all, I live in Rockcastle and I kind of like getting out of the office," he said.

Allen said Tuesday that it was his understanding that the move was made as part of a two-year plan to respond to the crisis in the agricultural economy and to reduce operating costs. He also said that it should make interest rates lower.

School Board sued over suspension of Chris Mason

The Rockcastle County Board of Education was sued in Rock castle Circuit Court Wednesday morning by David Mason of Rt. 2 Mt. Vernon, because Mason feels his son has been treated unfairly by the board.

On the heels of the suit filed by the Masons, Circuit Judge Daniel Venters granted a restraining order that allowed Chris Mason to attend school until a decision can be made in Circuit Court.

Venters ruled on the Masons' motions at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, and Chris Mason went to school. "It is in the hands of the court now," David Mason said.

An altercation between Chris Mason and another senior, William Smith, at RCHS in September spurred the suit.

Rockcastle High School principal Cleo Ray suspended Mason for 10 days for the altercation with Smith. The Masons appealed to the board at the December meeting and at the regular January meeting.

A hearing was then held Monday night so that Chris Mason could tell his side of the story, about the fight in which William

Smith was hospitalized and received a broken leg.

In all three instances the board backed Saylor's decision with only board member George Poynter appealing to the other board members to reconsider the suspension.

Mason contended at all three meetings that he was not defending his son's actions, but that he wanted some other type of punishment other than expulsion because his son has never missed a day of school since he started first grade.

Mason's lawyer, Karen Christman of London, told board members Monday night that Chris was willing to take any type of punishment for his actions except expulsion. She explained that Chris was only an average student and that if days of expulsion would cause him to fail his senior year.

Chris Mason told board members that he did not intentionally break William Smith's leg and that it was a freak accident that he regretted.

The incident reportedly occurred after William Smith urinated in a can and gave it to a mentally handicapped child to drink at the

City Council includes Burr in its annexation plan

In a surprise turn of events, Mt. Vernon city councilmen unofficially agreed Monday night the Burr area beyond the 1.75 interchange should be included in the city's annexation plan.

Officially, the councilmen delayed approval of the publication notice of annexation in the Signal, until changes could be made in the ordinance, additional surveying done as well as changes noted on the official map that must designate the areas to be annexed.

Re-elected, Dr. Orson L. Anstutz was at the council meeting to ask the council to include a section of his land near Red Top Restaurant in the area to be annexed. The councilmen indicated they were receptive to his request.

The council set no new boundaries in the Burr area nor specified any property that would

be annexed at Burr, but a consensus was that the area would include all businesses south of the interchange, probably to, and including a Shell Service Station.

When polled by the Signal, immediately after the meeting adjourned, all councilmen indicated they favored annexation of the Burr area. One councilman said:

Yes, if property owners want it. At the previous meeting the council received a map from County Surveyor Charles A. Mullins indicating areas to be annexed. It did not include property beyond the 1.75 overpass at Burr.

To the west of the city, the map shows areas extending along U.S. 150 to the new Ky. 401 bypass and to the north along U.S. 25 to Barlow-Creek.

Any changes in the areas would mean a new survey of those areas, pinpointing exact locations.

A Weekly Report from Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers
100th Congress Faces Many Challenges
This past week, I was again honored to take the oath of office as Fifth District Congressman for Kentucky. The new 100th Congress marks the bicentennial of our U.S. Constitution, and we will face numerous legislative challenges ahead in the coming year.
Listed below are just some of the major questions which the new Congress will be working on:
REDUCING THE DEFICIT. By far, our number-one priority in government is to bring the horrendous federal deficit under control. Last year, we saw some progress on that issue with the passage of the Gramm-Rudman law, which required us to reduce the deficit by \$36 billion. However, this year's deficit target of \$108 billion will be extremely difficult to reach without huge cuts in spending and/or increases in revenue.
How we deal with the deficit will have a major impact on all other programs which Congress undertakes over the next two years.
TRADE. The leadership in both the House and Senate have listed America's trade deficit as another major item for consideration. Several pieces of legislation are likely to move forward in the new Congress, as we grapple with how best to increase exports and reduce foreign imports into our country. There may be another attempt to limit imports of textiles into the United States, a bill I supported last session and hope will come up again this year.
INSURANCE REFORM. All of us know how devastating the rapidly increasing cost of insurance has been for our businesses, our communities and our families. A number of bills will be introduced in this Congress to provide relief for those who buy insurance premiums, while protecting the rights of injured parties to seek compensation for their losses.
HIGHWAYS. The 99th Congress failed to finish work on legislation to stimulate many new highway projects around the country. In our state, this lack of a new highway bill has meant no federal funds for a variety of highway projects. Action on another highway bill could come later this month, and I am hopeful it will be acted upon favorably.
WELFARE REFORM. Efforts will be made to give states more authority to set up "workdays" and other kinds of changes in welfare, which will try to help people find jobs and leave the welfare rolls.
As always, I will be looking for your advice and opinion on these and other issues which we will be dealing with in the 100th Congress. I look forward to hearing from you.

nearly \$100,000.

"I'd say close it," one resident said. "We don't need a jail."

Closing the jail would mean if arrests were made in Rockcastle, the prisoners would have to be transported to another facility with the county footing all the bills. An estimate of that cost by the state is about one-third more than if the

county had its own facility. The county plans to borrow money to remodel the jail, if the state approves. Considering the county's financial condition, it may not.

Other residents fume about the increase in salaries made this year by the court, including the magistrates. Their salaries and that of the county judge/executives, and some others, were taken from state Road Fund money that is allocated annually to the county. That practice won't continue next year since the state considers it

ferred to the Somerset office at the request of the customers, and anyone wishing to have their loan serviced at Somerset can still do so.

"We're not folding our tent, we're just making some changes that are designed to help Farm Credit Services and the farmer," he explained.

Farm Credit Services is a nation-wide Farmer's Cooperative. As noted, Kentucky is part of the fourth district, which is made up of Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee.

Of the offices left empty in Mt. Vernon, Allen said that the building would be sold at a later date.

illegal to use Road Fund money for administrative purposes.

The Road Fund is the only bright picture for the county. Last year it received \$427,900 from the state. This year it will receive an estimated \$554,700, thanks to a five cent gasoline tax increase.

Magistrates agreed at the hearing on garbage that headway is being made on implementing the county plan, however invisible it may appear to the public.

Once a coordinator for garbage is chosen, rules and regulations and ordinances adopted, the county can advertise for bids from garbage collectors (franchisees). Magistrate Glen Ellison told those at the hearing the county is not trying to make money from the garbage plan. He said that once the county has a franchisee and coordinator the franchisee will be responsible for collections.

"We only want to meet the expenses of the coordinator and those helping," Ellison said. "We just want to get this garbage off our back."

No doubt the court will be looking to the coordinator to get things into high gear. And all agree, pity the poor coordinator who will have the biggest and messiest job in the county. It will be his, or her, duty to see that the county is cleaned up, including roadsides and all open dumps. The state demands it and the state will be watching.

However, many agree, a garbage plan won't work that allows the resident to choose whether or not to pay for garbage collection. And a guess from several officials is that voluntary will be mandatory within three months.

One local official, summed up the county's bleak picture by concluding that "There are a number of things these days that the state demands the counties and cities do, and they all cost money," he noted. "It's true of course we don't have a high tax rate here in Rockcastle to pay for services, and no one wants to talk about taxes because it is not politically rewarding. But surely, folks know the day of a free lunch is over, or so I have been told."

and updating the map and ordinances. Letters must go to each property owner. If 50 percent oppose the annexation, then it would be voted on by the property owners involved, not by the general voting population. A total of 70 percent would have to vote against the measure to kill it.

Rockcastle County magistrates attended the meeting to ask for city support in its effort to implement a garbage plan for the county.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker appointed councilmen Tom Welch, Larry Burdette and Joe Martin to be the city's representatives on a committee that will be formed to plan and come up with details in the county plan.

William K. Bullen, who has a garbage business in the city, and who, until recent court action, had an exclusive franchise to collect garbage in the city, asked the council to comment on a letter from his attorney to City Attorney Carl Clontz concerning his continuing collection in the city.

Bullen's attorney James T. Gilbert of Richmond, pointed out that although Bullen's "exclusive" franchise was voided he still has a "non-exclusive" franchise to continue his business.

The council took no action on the letter, apparently leaving Bullen to collect garbage as he has been doing.

In other action, the council restated its intent to use Cumberland Valley Area Development District to administer funding of the city's \$300,000 water expansion project for a cost of \$5,000.

The council hired Mr. Forsha Lear as a fulltime clerk to help City Clerk Kaye Rader. Mrs. Lear had

been working part time. The council voted to purchase a new flag for triangle park at Main and Richmond streets, but

rejected a request, at least temporarily, for a flag to replace one at the veteran's monument at the

courthouse. Councilman Tom Welch, angered by the rejection, said he would buy one himself.

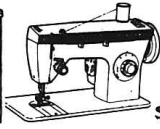

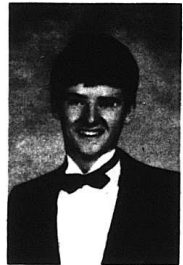
The New Year of 1987 has begun, therefore, according to KRS-132.220 (Tax Laws of Ky.) it shall be the duty of all persons owning or having any interest in any property taxable in this state to list or have listed such property with the Property Valuation Administrator of the county where it is located, between January 1 and March 1 in each year.

If you have made any improvements, built new house, etc., and most of all if you have purchased or sold a mobile home this should be reported to the Property Valuation Office.

Intangibles, consisting of stocks, bonds, mortgages, accounts receivable, and etc., or tangibles (business equipment, merchant's inventory, etc.) these must also be reported.

If you did not receive your 1986 tax bill you need to check with the Property Valuation Administrator's office to see if your address is correct.

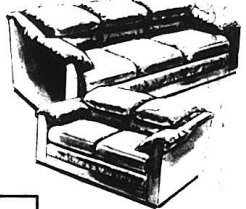

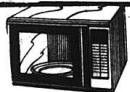

would borrow \$61,000 from a bank with the company's repayment money as security for the jail renovation loan.

The county has about \$20,000 left on an earlier Corrections Cabinet loan that is available. The jail renovation is figured to cost about \$79,000.

"I need to take a look at the county's overall financial situation," Stinchcomb said. "Some times counties and cities do not take into consideration the many expenses that are involved in

projects, such as possible additional staff, utilities, and the like, that can put a strain on a budget."

Stinchcomb said using the money from the company's repayment of the block grant is a good idea, but "before I approve I want to look at the documentation

of the terms of repayment. Is the county secure? I must explore the terms on which this loan is based to determine if it is secure."

Rockcastle will get \$1200 arts grant

Gov. Martha Layne Collins has announced that Rockcastle County will receive arts grant funds totaling \$1,200 from the Kentucky Arts Council, a division of the Kentucky Department of the Arts.

The Rockcastle Council for the Arts in Mt. Vernon has received Arts Development Grant, money that will help support the ongoing operation of the organization.

According to the Governor, "Kentucky arts identity is an increasingly important factor in the state's progress, and we in state government are proud to join with local sponsors in supporting the arts."

A total of approximately \$1,620,000 is state and federal funds is being disbursed to arts groups throughout the state in the most recent round of grants. Funds are distributed twice each year, in July and December, with a total of \$2,200,000 going to artists and arts groups during fiscal year 1986-87. This money includes the Kentucky Arts Council's share from the National Endowment for the Arts as well as new funds recently allocated by the Kentucky Legislature.

The Kentucky Arts Council is a 16-member citizen board, appointed by the Governor, that receives grant applications and disburses funds. These matching grants continue a 20-year tradition of support for the arts in Kentucky cities, neighborhoods and towns. A panel of arts professionals reviews and makes recommendations on each of the grants.

Relaxing God's Laws



In Mat. 5:19, the Revised Standard Version of the Bible tells us that anyone who "relaxes one of the least of these commandments shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven." This is a solemn warning, indeed. There have always been those who sought the path of least resistance. This is similar to the tennis player who exclaimed to his opponent, "I would do all right if someone would just remove the net!" The first time God gave a law, Satan attempted to "relax" it. Tragically, the devil was successful because man is exceedingly weak. The first murder was committed by a man who would not yield to Heaven's desires. Sodom was destroyed because its vast population enjoyed living on Easy Street. Even Abraham could not find ten men of genuine conviction there.

The Liberties of Jeremiah's day are epitomized in the now famous language: "The prophets prophesy falsely and the priests follow their example...and the people love to have it so!" A century earlier, Isaiah was heart sick when his fellows cried: "Speak to us smooth things, prophesy deceits" (Isa. 30:10).

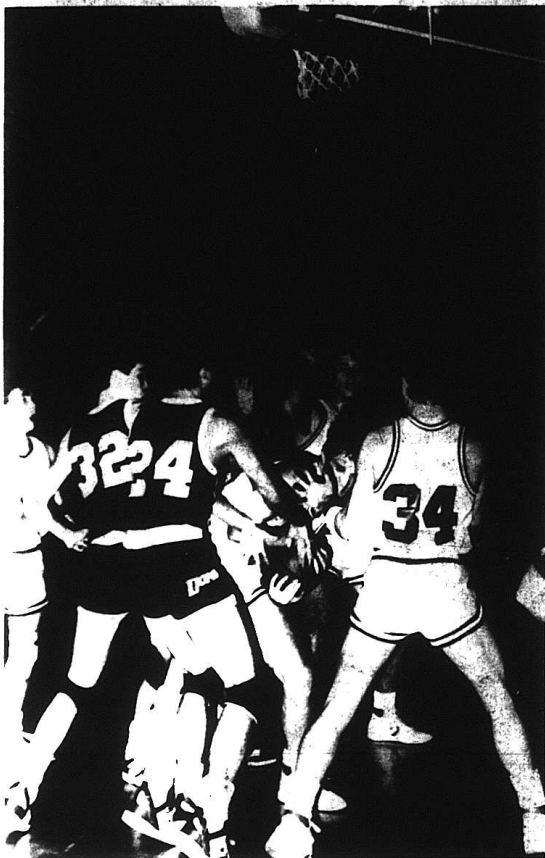
Today, in and out of the church, one can find fervent appeals for the soft, easy, ear-tickling sermon. This is one of the basic contributions to the decline of America and the decadence of the world today. Satan is shrewd and calculating in his devious schemes. He is a master craftsman of sham and pretense. Under the guise of humility, some are influenced by the devil say: "Preacher, don't expose error so strongly; go easy with our loved ones. They might get the impression that you think they haven't obeyed the truth." Satan influences some men, under the banners of "love" to say: "Preacher, don't stress the plan of salvation so often because after all just being a good moral person is all that is essential." Instead of RELAXING God's commandments, let us BOLSTER the truth by unshinching conviction and deep, abiding faith.

The Rockets then led 55 to 41 when Kirby hit two free throws with 1:45 left.

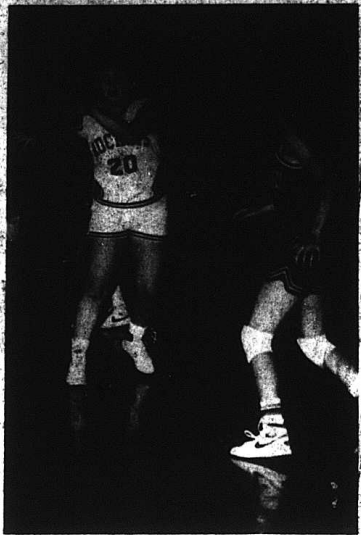
Junior Jason Coaguer hit two free throws with 0:06 on the clock to end the Rockets' scoring.

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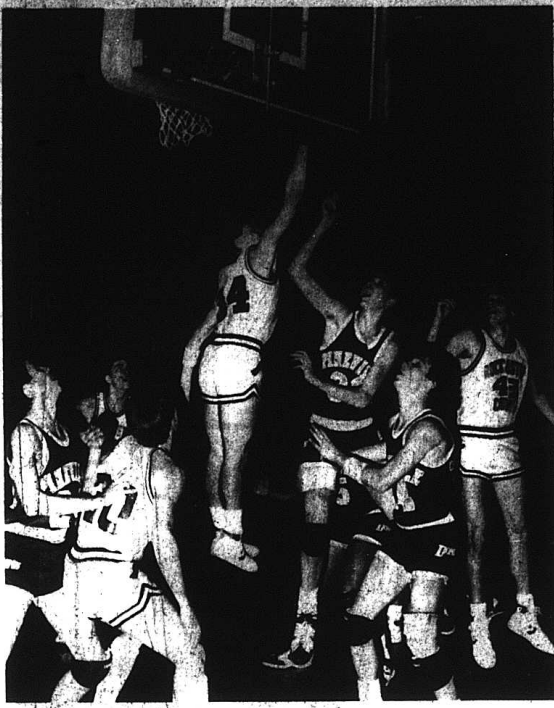
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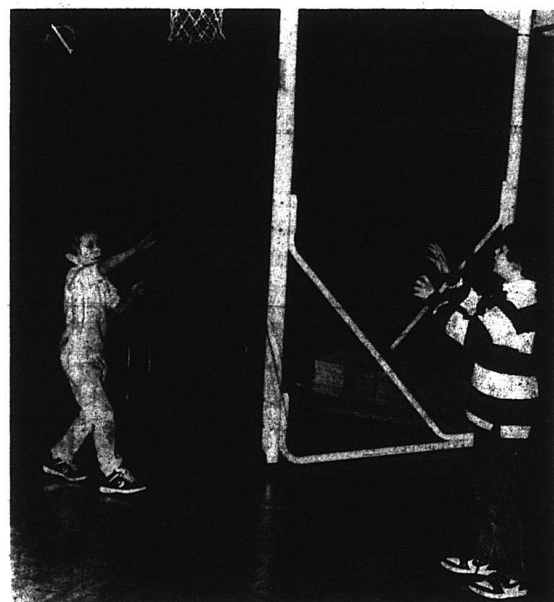

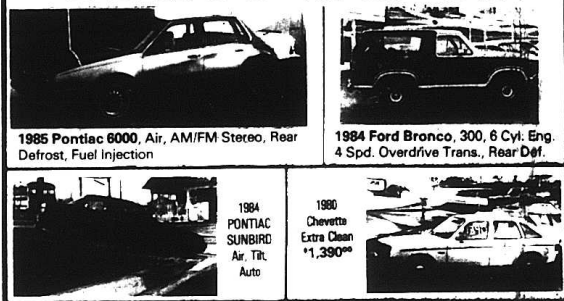

built with concrete blocks poses a special problem. If the walls are clean and in good condition, vinyl enamels used inside do a good job.

If moisture problems are severe and the current paint is crumbling, furring strips and a new interior wall board may be necessary. Low moisture poses other problems. It can cause floors to squeak and furniture to separate at glue joints. A well-adjusted furnace humidifier is recommended to control the dryness.

SPECIAL MEASURES HELP SOLVE MOISTURE PROBLEMS

If water is collecting on your windows, your home may have a moisture problem.

Excess moisture can be particularly irritating during the winter. It can cause clothing to mildew, ruin interior surfaces, reduce the insulating value of insulation, cause paint to peel and ruin a home's structural frame through fungus growth and rot.

If the inside moist air strikes a cold insulated wall with no vapor barrier, moisture will diffuse through the wall toward the outside. Condensation occurs usually in the insulation, causing it to become "moist" and to lose insulating value.

The best way to determine whether your home has excess moisture is to look at its windows. If condensation appears on a window that's a good sign your home may have moisture problems.

This test is accurate only if the window has a storm window. Single-pane windows will have condensation on them all winter.

Whether there is excess moisture or those that are especially tight, have more moisture problems than older homes. Water that is in new plaster, concrete and other building materials must evaporate before the house will be thoroughly dry.

Proper ventilation to remove excess moisture, and vapor barriers to prevent water vapor from entering walls and ceilings will help solve moisture problems.

Houseplants and steam from showers and cooking are sources of excess moisture. It's important to use kitchen and bathroom vents. If ventilation does not remove excess moisture, other measures should be taken.

Sheet plastic, aluminum foil or asphalt paper serve as good vapor barriers but must be placed inside the house frame on all exterior walls, the ceiling and the floor.

If your house is under construction, it's easy to install polyethylene or polyvinyl sheeting under the wall board and above the ceiling material. But in an existing home, it's almost impossible.

One solution is to add vinyl wallpaper on interior surfaces of outside walls. Water-base vinyl, semi-gloss enamel paint also can be used. In attic spaces, if the entire ceiling can be reached, lay a sheet of polyethylene between

each room before the insulation is installed.

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Workshops for graduates interested in medical career

Sixty-five high school seniors who live in certain Kentucky counties and who want to become physicians or dentists will get an early start toward their goal next summer at the University of Kentucky, the University of Louisville or Kentucky State University.

Students will be chosen to attend a five- or six-week college preparatory workshop at one of the universities from applicants who live in Kentucky counties or areas of some counties that have too few physicians or dentists.

Graduating high school seniors who live in Rockcastle County are among those eligible to apply. The workshops are part of the state's Professional Education Preparation Program, which was designed to help increase the number of students in medical or dental school from Kentucky counties experiencing a shortage of physicians or dentists.

Students attending the workshops will meet and work with medical and dental students and professionals and receive instruction in reading, writing, study-

skills, and problem solving.

They will also have classes in biology, chemistry, and other sciences to improve their chances of doing well in their premedical or pre-dental college studies.

Room and board and all workshop instruction will be provided without charge to the participant. Each student will also be given an expense allowance.

The workshops will be only the first in a series of activities that will be provided the participants. Additional programs and services designed to help them succeed in becoming doctors or dentists will be provided throughout their undergraduate and medical or dental school studies.

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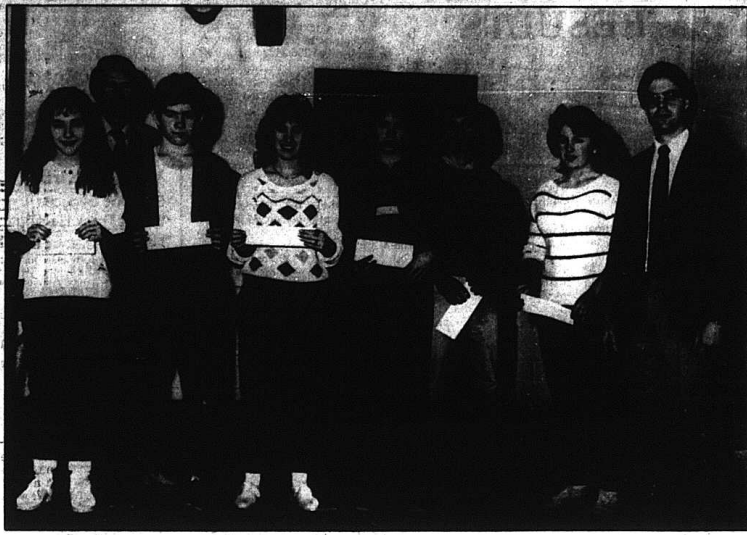

Mason testified that he was attempting to talk to William Smith about the incident when the fight broke out.

However, JoAnn Smith, mother of William, has contended that her son was assaulted by Chris Mason and she wanted the same punishment for him that her son got earlier in the year after a drinking incident at school that resulted in a suspension.

William Smith has not been able to return to school since the fight.

Mrs. Smith told board members at the December and January meetings that she had her doubts about the urine incident and that people had better be able to prove their accusations against her son.

During the same meeting, Carter and Emma Renner told the board that William had given their son Terry urine to drink and that it made him sick.

But JoAnn Smith said that she has been to the high school several times concerning the incident but that she had not been able to find out anything.

During Monday's hearing for Chris Mason, which was moderated by the board's attorney, Carl Clontz, Saylor said that while in the past on different occasions he has given students who have been involved in fights, a choice of licks or suspension, he felt that Chris Mason was not defending himself in this case and that it was a direct assault on Smith. He said that was the reason he would not give Mason a choice.

Saylor has said all along that he felt like both students would be able to graduate this year, and that was the most important thing.

But David Mason and his wife Gail and Chris do not agree.

At last week's regular board meeting the Masons presented the board with a petition with over 500 signatures on it requesting that the board give Chris Mason some other type of punishment.

Burns pays back \$175,000.00

Attorney Lester Burns, Jr., had reportedly repaid \$175,000 to Dr. Roscoe Acker, money that was stolen in a robbery and murder at the Letcher County doctor's home in 1985.

The money is the amount Carol Ann Epperson paid Burns to represent her husband, Roger Epperson in his murder, and robbery trial and was part of \$1.9 million taken from the Acker home.

Burns had admitted in December he knew the money from Mrs. Epperson was stolen from the Acker home. Aker's daughter was murdered during the robbery. Burns later resigned from the Kentucky Bar Association.
