





All of us in Southern Kentucky know the importance that education will ay in the economic development of our region.

pasy in the excussion correspondent or our region. I helped form a new organization, "Forward in the Fifth," which is now working to accomplish a wide range of educational improvements for our district. We are working to increase test stores, send more of our students to college and increase overall graduation rates. The early success of this effort can already be measured by the funds which have been donated from a number of public and privates sources, and by the entitudiation which this effort has generated among Fifth District residents so far.

This week, I had a chance to explain our work to William Bennett, the U.S. Secretary of Education, during his appearance before the House Budget Committee, on which I serve. Secretary Bennett side encouraging words about our work, and said it was a prime example of the need to get more people involved in our educational system.

As part of the 1988 budget, Socretary Bennett has proposed some sub-stantial cuts in federal aid to education. While I cannot support the cuts he has suggested, I do agree with Socretary Bennett that it takes more than money to solve our educational problems.

One of the keys to the future success of "Forward in the Fifth" will be our ability to involve thousands of parents, business and civic leaders and educations in the process. We must mobilize the resources which each cousty and city can bring to its own local schools. Volunteers will be needed in every school district to work hand-in-hand with school boards and teachers. The involvement of communities with their local schools has been proven to be a major factor in bringing about positive changes all around the country. That same principle will hold true for Southern Kentucky as well.

Education is ultimately linked with our simultaneous efforts to bring new industry and jobs to our region. We need as many well-oducated people as possible in order to appeal to potential industrial prospects. In addition, we want to be able to offer to those industries excellent schools in their new locations.

For years, the federal government has poured billions of dollars in our schools, while the real problems remained unsolved. We still nee to have federal⁴sid to schools and students, but we must also strengthe local and state efforts to make education better.

Secretary Bennett's enthusiastic response to "Forward in the Fifth" is yet nother encouraging sign that we are on the right course.

ROGERS CRITICIZES ACTION ON PAY RAISE

Congressman Harold Rogers has called House action on a proposed congressional pay raise "outrageous." Rogers said the House leader-ship Tuesday prevented members of Congress from voting to block the proposed increase in salary for congressmen and senators. Then, on Wednesday, a resolution opposing the increase was approved, but only after the pay increases went into effect automatically at Tuesday midnight.

"I supported the resolution to block the increase, because we should not be raising congressional pay at this time." said Rogers. With our heavy budget deficit and possible upcoming cuts in other programs, we simply cannot nother programs, we simply cannot more programs, we simply cannot from the programs, we simply cannot afford these increases.

The action by the House leadership on Tuesday in preventing us from rejecting the pay hikes before they took effect was wrong. We should have been given a chance to vote down these increases before they became effective."

Rogers said either a reso nogers said either a reso-lution retroactively rescinding the increases or some kind of court action will likely be needed to block the pay increases, and he said he would support either approach





Imagine this ... you're standing in line at a grocery counter and the sustement in some of you also the sustement in the counter. The cashier totals each bill, takes the money and says. "Next please": Then, suddenly the stranger in front of you there stranger in front of you the stranger in groceries, sticking you with his bill.

Needless to say, this would be unfair. Your reaction would be one of shock and then anger. After all, it's not your responsibility to pay this stranger's bill. Right? But if you think about it, that is what you're doing when someone steals electricity. You get stuck paying a stranger's power bill. And stealing electricity is a real are shoplifting and other crimes. And just as shoplifting affects your costs, so does power theft.

Recent surveys indicate elect-. .vou're stand

affects your costs, so does power theft.

Recent surveys indicate electrutilities lose anywhere from \$500 million to \$300 billion annually due to power theft. Future rate increases will undoubtedly provide even greater incentive for dishonest customers to right their utilities and their neighbors. This affects you just as personally as if that person came to you and said, here, you pay my electric bill.

Cooperatives make no profit in the sale of power and have to pay for every kilowatt of the power consumers use if some of that power is used dishonestly, they still have to pay the bill. The difference can result in even higher rafets to all consumers to cover losses.



Your Child's Health

"My baby will NEVER sleep through the night! I'm going crasy!" This is of course a common complaint of parents of young infants. There may be help, A recent review points out that 20 to 30% of infants have trouble sleeping and up to 33% of children up to 5 years of age do too, so yours is not afformal. However, statistics don't help you sleep, but the following suggestions may. the following suggestions may maybe will train your baby to keep it quiet for several hours.

By 4 months of age 95% of bottle fed bebies can go 8 hours without feeding, and breast fed ones do so about a month later. Frequent small feedings may make for frequest waking periods since the turminy isn't full for long. Feeding larger amounts less frequently can gradually train baby to go longer between feedings
