4-H NEWS

Demonstration contest

The Rockcastle County 4-H Demonstration and Illustrated Talk Contest will be held at Livingston Elementary on Tuesday, March 10th at 7 p.m. 4-H members will be able to "show and tell" about a subject or project area which interests them. Suggested topics and judge's score sheets will be distributed later to help 4-H'ers prepare demonstrations.

The categories 4-H'ers may choose to compete in are: bread making, dairy foods, egg preparation, other foods, clothing, creative crafts, electric, health, safety, small engines, photography, horticulture, home environment, home management, entomology, animal science, horse, agronomy, egg engineering and general.

4-H'ers will be able to earn extra points for their club and towards the outstanding 4-H'er award by giving a demonstration. Fifteen points will be awarded each 4-H'er who participates in the classroom contest and 15 points for the county contest.

Champions in each category at the county contest will compete in the Area Contest in London, Saturday, March 28th. Area winners go to state competition in

June. 4-H'ers planning to give a demonstration or illustrated talk in the county contest must register by calling the County Extension Office at 256-2403 by Friday, March 6th.

Rules and Regulations

1) The same rules apply to demonstrations and illustrated talks. Juniors (age 9-13) and Seniors (age 14-19) do not compete against one another. There may be a junior and senior in each category. (Age as of January 1, 1987).

2) Time limit is 15 minutes. (Exception breads - 20 minutes).

3) A maximum of two demonstrations in different categories may be given by each 4-H'er.

4) 4-H'er may have help in preparing and setting up demonstrations.

5) Team demonstrations are permitted. A team will consist of two 4-H'ers sharing equally the vocal responsibility of the presentation. A demonstration using others as props will not be considered a team.

6) A 4-H'er does not have to be enrolled in a project to give a demonstration.

7) Demonstrations must be entered in the correct category.

8) The decision of judges is final.

STALK THE SALT IN YOUR DIET

If high blood pressure is the silent killer, then sodium is its accomplice.

Sodium has a way of sneaking into our diets—mostly in the form of salt—through the foods we eat and the ways we prepare and serve them.

About one in four Americans has high blood pressure and yet many don't know it because the disease has no symptoms. High blood pressure leads to heart attack, stroke and kidney disease. If your family has a history of high blood pressure, if you are overweight, or if you eat a lot of salt and foods high in sodium, you are at risk.

Once high blood pressure exists, too much sodium in the diet can aggravate the disease. Thus limiting dietary sodium is often an important part of treatment, along with medication, exercise and weight reduction, when called for.

It's one of the great injustices of life that some people can eat high sodium diets without increased blood pressure while others cannot. The problem is, most of those people don't know who they are. Everyone should have their blood pressure checked regularly because the earlier hypertension is diagnosed, the better.

If you have high blood pressure or are at risk of developing it, it's wise to limit sodium in your diet.

Ask yourself the questions

here to stalk the salt in your diet. Give yourself an "A" if the answer is never or seldom, a "B" if the answer is one or two times a week, a "C" if it is three or four times a week, and a "D" if you practice the eating habit almost daily.

How often do you eat cured or processed meats such as ham, bacon, sausage, frankfurters and other luncheon meats?

How often do you eat canned vegetables or frozen vegetables with sauce?

How often do you use commercially prepared meals, main dishes, or canned or dehydrated soups?

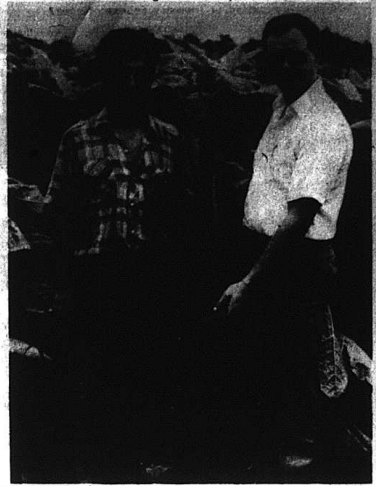
How often do you eat salted nuts, popcorn, pretzels, corn chips or potato chips?

How often do you add salt to cooking water for vegetables, rice or pasta?

How often do you add salt, seasoning mixes, salad dressings, or condiments such as soy sauce, steak sauce, catsup, and mustard to foods during preparation or at the table?

How often do you salt your food before tasting it?

If you had more A and B answers than C and D ones, go to the head of the class. If not, you probably need to go easier on the salt.

Deadlines set for filing for councils

Candidates planning to file for seats on the city councils in Mt. Vernon, Brodhead and Livingston, and for mayor at Mt. Vernon, must be prepared for some complicated changes in election laws.

Only one mayor will be up for election this year, and that is the seat now held by Elizabeth Baker at Mt. Vernon. Mrs. Baker was appointed by the council to replace Mayor Roland Mullins who resigned after one year of his four-year term. That election will be for the two years remaining on Mayor Mullins' term.

This year, because the city council did not pass a non-partisan election ordinance within 23 days of the filing deadline, as is now prescribed by law, (deadline, 4 p.m. Feb. 25) candidates for mayor will have to file under his or her registered party affiliation, or file as independent.

The mayoral candidates file nomination papers only and do not have to circulate a petition as in past years.

In the mayor's race, if more than one candidate files the same party affiliation files for mayor, they will be on the May 26 primary ballot.

Councilmen have until 4 p.m. Aug. 27 to file petitions which must contain 20 names of legally registered voters who live in the city in which the candidate plans to run.

County gets forest funds

Twenty-one eastern Kentucky counties containing Daniel Boone National Forest land including Rockcastle will receive funds amounting to \$463,494.11 from fiscal year 1986 receipts received by the Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to Forest Supervisor Rich and Wengert, Winchester.

This is an increase of \$33,188.14 over the payment for fiscal year 1985 which totaled \$430,302.97.

Rockcastle will receive \$8,410 for its 12,336 acres.

By law, 25 percent of total National Forest receipts are returned annually to the counties. The funds are to be used for roads and schools. Receipts represent revenues collected by the Forest Service from timber sales, recreation fees, minerals leases, grazing fees, and land use charges on the 679,814 acres of the Daniel

Hansel gets new hearing

After a formal objection from local attorney Carl Clontz, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court has continued a hearing on its proposed termination of employment of County Road Supervisor Monroe Hansel.

The court suspended Hansel recently for insubordination, not following fiscal court orders, and inability to manage the county road crew.

Clontz reminded the court that a public employee hired for a fixed term must receive a written notice of the charges with a summary of the evidence supporting the charges, and allow the employee time to explain or refute the charges.

After consulting with County Attorney James H. Lambert, the court compiled and indicated it would continue the suspension and compile the supporting evidence.

Garbage ordinance vote soon

First reading of an ordinance regulating solid waste management (garbage) in Rockcastle County will be held at 7 p.m. Feb. 20 at the courthouse.

A second reading will then be scheduled after which the ordinance becomes law.

The ordinance is an overview for the public in the office of County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker, between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Monday through Friday.

The ordinance "pertains to public health, safety and welfare, and regulates storage, collection, transportation, processing and disposal of solid waste, and provides for collection and disposal, penalties for violation, and repeals all ordinances in conflict.

The 14-page document takes up all phases of garbage collection and disposal and should be in effect before the month is out.

At a meeting Friday night,

the court discussed the ordinance page by page, one of several meetings of the court in recent days.

At the meeting because of the many legal questions that will have to be considered in the weeks ahead, the court agreed to obtain the services of a second attorney to help with the garbage management plan.

The court agreed with County Attorney James H. Lambert. that

If all goes according to plan, students at Mt. Vernon Elementary will go into a new building when school starts for the 1989-90 school year, according to Superintendent Charles B. Parsons.

State reports road monies

Approval of the 1987-1988 Rural Secondary Program for Rockcastle County has been announced by Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

"The program provides funds for both maintenance and improvement projects on state roads," said Gov. Collins. "This year Rockcastle County has been allocated \$348,700 for maintenance, of its 116.6 miles of state roads."

Collins said the state will also repave 4.6 miles of Kentucky 1152, the Level Green Hansford Road, and will place blacktop paving on 3,168 feet on County Road 5270, the John Cash Road, 3.1 miles of County Road 5254, the Wadby - Popular Grove Road, and 2.7 miles of County Road 5405, the Purr Rigby Road.

Burr annexation plan draws fire from three area property owners

Three property owners in the Burr area, Clarence Carter, James Noe and Delmer Vanzant, told the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night they are strongly opposed to the annexation of property along U.S. 25 south of Mt. Vernon, including part of the Burr area.

Carter, who was spokesman for the group, said they have not been able to determine what they would get from their tax money if their property is annexed.

The city has proposed three areas to be annexed, including along U.S. 25 south past the I-75 interchange, along U.S. 150 to the Ky. 463 bypass, and along U.S. 25 north to Renfro Valley, including Renfro's Red Barn and the Renfro Lodge.

Carter told the council he doubted the city would be able to furnish street lights, sewer lines, fire hydrants and other services in the near future. He said he doubted much would be saved in insurance rate reductions by being in the city.

Councilman Joe Martin said he had polled property owners in that area who would be involved in the annexation, including Burr, and had found 39 property owners favored annexation and 19 opposed, and that he said, included more than one vote for Carter and

Noe who have several pieces of property.

Councilman Tom Walsh said he believed most of the people involved wanted to be in the city and had so indicated. He said he was sure there would be considerable savings in insurance and water rates.

Under annexation law, people in an area to be annexed could vote for or against annexation in their specific areas. If the annexation came to a vote, that would mean three separate areas would vote for or against annexation in Mt. Vernon.

However to bring the proposal to a vote, 50 percent of the property owners involved would have to petition the council for a vote. When the vote is taken, 70 percent would have to turn it down to prohibit annexation.

At their request the group was given a list of names of property owners in the south area.

In other action the council held the first reading on an ordinance changing the time of council meetings from 7:30 p.m. to 7 p.m., but kept the second Monday of each month as its regular meeting.

The council voted to give \$60 to help with remodeling the railroad caboose now being done through the Rockcastle County.

Mason suit settled; board backs down

Chris Mason's parents, David and Gail had appealed to the board and Saylor on several different occasions to give their son punishment other than suspension. Each

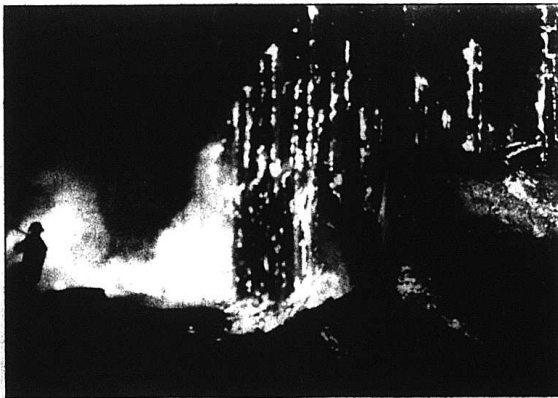
time the board backed Saylor's decision.

1986 Tax Filing Tips

It's tax return time once again. Check these often-overlooked deductions, credits, and tax breaks to be sure you do not miss any on your return.

"Choose the best filing year for your situation. Usually that means filing a joint return if you're married.

"If you have any circumstances, separate returns can save you money.

"Make your 1986 IRA contribution and take your deduction for it. The new law on IRAs don't require 1986 returns.

"Consider electing out of installment treatment on long-term capital gains sales. You may save money by paying taxes on all the gain under 1986 rules if the sale is the long-term capital gains deduction.

"If you had more than one job in 1986, watch for overpaid social security tax.

"Don't overlook income averaging if your income jumped in 1986. It's still available for your 1986 return.

"Get the most out of this final year for the sales tax deduction. If you made large purchases you can deduct the tax paid on these items in addition to the amount allowed in the IRS tables.

"You can exclude \$200 of dividend income on a joint return, \$100 on a single return.

"Both you and your spouse work, don't miss the marriage penalty deduction that allows you to take a deduction of 10% of the lower earning spouse's income up to a maximum deduction of \$3,000.

"Dig out the details on all 1986 charitable contributions. They're 100% deductible this year even if you don't itemize.

"Don't miss any credits. Some examples: political contributions, credit, dependent care credit, credit for the elderly.

"If you were an early filer and realize now that you've missed something on your return, remember that you can file an amended return for up to three years. You should consider doing so if the dollars involved warrant it.

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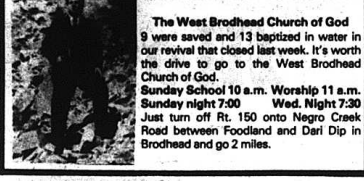

I.D. numbers needed for dependents

As a result of the Tax Reform Act of 1986, a taxpayer claiming a dependent who is at least 5 years old by December 31, 1987, must include that dependent's taxpayer identification number on his/her 1987 return. For most individuals, this I.D. number is the individual's social security number.

If a dependent needs a social security number, the taxpayer should contact a local Social Security Administration office and complete a Form SS-5. "Application for Social Security Number."

A Weekly Report from Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers



Education Requires More Than Money

All of us in Southern Kentucky know the importance that education will play in the economic development of our region.

I helped form a new organization, "Forward in the Fifth," which is now working to accomplish a wide range of educational improvements for our district. We are working to increase test scores, send more of our students to college and increase overall graduation rates. The early success of this effort can already be measured by the funds which have been donated from a number of public and private sources, and by the enthusiasm which this effort has generated among Fifth District residents so far.

This week, I had a chance to explain our work to William Bennett, the U.S. Secretary of Education, during his appearance before the House Budget Committee, on which I serve. Secretary Bennett said encouraging words about our work, and said it was a prime example of the need to get more people involved in our educational system.

As part of the 1988 budget, Secretary Bennett has proposed some substantial cuts in federal aid to education. While I cannot support the cuts he has suggested, I do agree with Secretary Bennett that it takes more than money to solve our educational problems.

One of the keys to the future success of "Forward in the Fifth" will be our ability to involve thousands of parents, business and civic leaders and educators in the process. We must mobilize the resources which each county and city can bring to its own local schools. Volunteers will be needed in every school district to work hand-in-hand with school boards and teachers. The involvement of communities with their local schools has been proven to be a major factor in bringing about positive changes all around the country. That same principle will hold true for Southern Kentucky as well.

Education is ultimately linked with our simultaneous efforts to bring new industry and jobs to our region. We need as many well-educated people as possible in order to appeal to potential industrial prospects. In addition, we want to be able to offer to those industries excellent schools in their new locations.

For years, the federal government has poured billions of dollars into our schools, while the real problems remained unsolved. We still need to have federal aid to schools and students, but we must also strengthen local and state efforts to make education better.

Secretary Bennett's enthusiastic response to "Forward in the Fifth" is yet another encouraging sign that we are on the right course.

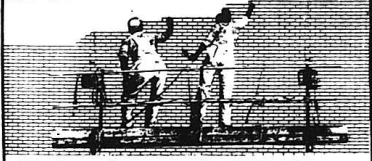

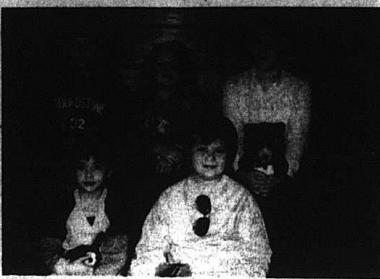

Boone National Forest. The amount each county receives is determined by the number of National Forest acres within the county and the total amount of receipts of the Forest. The total payment to the counties from fiscal year 1986 receipts averaged 68 cents per acre.

In 1937, when the Cumberland National Forest, now the Daniel Boone National Forest, was established, the total returned to fifteen Kentucky counties was \$383.99. During 50 years of management of the Forest \$4,841,319.41 has been returned to the counties for public benefit.

The payment to counties is not the most important benefit derived from the presence of the Daniel Boone National Forest in Kentucky. Additional important benefits include watershed protection, recreation developments and opportunities, attraction of tourists, Forest Service roads and trails, raw material for wood using industries, employment of local residents, fish and wildlife, wilderness areas, and fire protection on the federal lands indirectly protecting the adjacent private landowners.

imately 105,000 square foot facility will be a whopping 3.5 million dollars. The size of the new school will be comparable to that of the high school which cost only 2 million, when it was constructed in 1972, the superintendent said.

Parsons said that at the board's May meeting a fiscal agent would be hired. "A fiscal agent is a person that helps school systems with funding for such projects," Parsons said.

"Most of the money for the new facility will come from the state through the sale of revenue bonds and some local money will also be used," Parsons said.

Construction on the new building will start sometime after January 1, 1988, according to Parsons who said that construction cannot begin before that time because the money from the state won't be available.

The new school, which will house a gymnasium and cafeteria, will be located in what is used now as the playground area and will face Williams Street. The present building corners Richmond and School Street.

No part of the present structure will be used and the white concrete building and the trailers now in use, are on the way out also.

One minor problem faces the board in constructing the school but Parsons said Monday that he thinks it can be worked out with the state.

At the present time state guidelines prohibit the construction of an elementary school that houses over 750 students. However Parsons said that since an elementary school in Kentucky is classified as K-6, Mt. Vernon would be more of an elementary middle school combination since students attend there through the eighth grade.

"The only way that any part of the old building would be used is if we were not able to get all of the funding at once and the school had to be built in phases, but I don't foresee that happening," Parsons said.

Once the new building is completed, the old building will be torn down and the playground will be where it presently sits.

Garbage ordinance vote soon

County hires additional legal help for Lambert

he will need help because of district court cases he is required to attend, plus the necessary research needed by the court.

Monday night, the court met with its new attorney, He is David Howard of London. He will take care of all legal questions concerning garbage, and will be paid by the court.

The court also agreed to appoint a Solid Waste Advisory Committee made up of two members from Mt. Vernon, and one each from Brodhead and Livingston, and any other the court might appoint.

As announced previously, garbage collection will be voluntary on the part of residents, however, disposal of all garbage must be done at prescribed places, or transfer stations, that must comply with Kentucky Revised Statutes with payment by the person disposing of the garbage.

The ordinance does not set a fee for household collection, but it will most likely be \$5 a month, plus an added fee for a prescribed number of bags over a certain number. Commercial garbage will be negotiated by the solid waste coordinator.

Details of the costs will be included in the franchise agreement package that will be worked out by the court. The franchise will be bid and it will go to the highest and best bid.

The ordinance sets out penalties for violation - not less than \$25 and more than \$500 with each day a separate offense.

The ordinance allows the person charged and found guilty to

pick up or clean up garbage in the county in lieu of a fine.

According to the ordinance, it will be unlawful to:

Dump on someone else's property;

dump garbage on any property including your own;

use someone else's container to avoid payment;

fail to have solid waste collected;

interfere with collectors and transportation equipment;

burn solid waste unless in an approved incinerator;

dispose of dead animals in a container;

own or operate a dump;

dispose of an unauthorized location;

engage in the garbage business.

The ordinance specifically states garbage may not be deposited and remain on private property.

There are rules and regulations regarding bulky rubbish such as appliances, tree limbs and other large items.

Even the containers are prescribed. They cannot hold over 35 gallons and weigh more than 75 pounds.

Items that are unacceptable include ashes, fire causing materials, poisons, herbicides, chemicals, explosives, dead animals, gasoline, oils, motor vehicle parts, metal wire, animal wastes and other hazardous materials.

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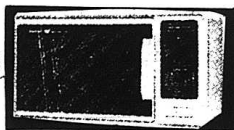

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Are you paying your neighbor's electric bill?

Imagine this... you're standing in line at a grocery counter and the customers in front of you slowly one by one, empty their array of items onto the counter. The cashier totals each bill, takes the money and says, "Next please!" Then, suddenly the stranger in front of you turns around and hands you his grocery bill, smirking. "Here, you pay this. I don't want it!" And off he goes with his groceries, sticking you with his bill.

Needless to say, this would be unfair. Your reaction would be one of shock and then anger. After all, it's not your responsibility to pay this stranger's bill. Right? But if you think about it, that is what you're doing when someone steals electricity. You get stuck paying a stranger's power bill. And stealing electricity is a real problem as serious as real as shoplifting and other crimes. And just as shoplifting affects your costs, so does power theft.

Recent surveys indicate electric utilities lose anywhere from \$500 million to \$300 billion annually due to power theft. Future rate increases will undoubtedly provide even greater incentive for dishonest customers to rip off their utilities and their neighbors. This affects you just as personally as if that person came to you and said, "here, you pay my electric bill!"

Cooperatives make no profit in the sale of power and have to pay for every kilowatt of the power consumers use. If some of that power is used dishonestly, they still have to pay the bill. The difference can result in even higher rates to all consumers to cover losses.

Just as stealing groceries adds to the cost of grocery items at the supermarket, power theft adds to the cost of your electric bill. Fortunately, there are ways to alleviate this problem. For example, if a neighbor sees a power thief in an area, he should report it to his local rural electric office. In addition to these "tips" from neighbors, cooperatives have several other means of detecting power thieves. Cooperative employees are trained to watch for suspicious decreases in power bills and servicemen watch for meters that have been tampered with by unauthorized personnel.

Besides being illegal, stealing electricity is extremely dangerous. A residential meter has the potential of giving a deadly jolt of 240 volts. While a serviceman is trained to be careful when handling electrical equipment, a power thief is not.

An untrained person breaking into a meter wiring system is playing with death. Consumers' meters are sealed to protect people from making the meter off limits. Only a trained and authorized serviceman from the cooperative is allowed to cut off the seal on the meter to remove it.

By reporting dishonest actions, you could prevent the death or injury of someone who is tampering with something they know little or nothing about.

Remember, it's not your responsibility to pay the grocery bill of the stranger in front of you at the supermarket, nor is it your responsibility to pay for other people's electricity. But you often do. So, if you know of anyone involved in meter tampering, notify your rural electric office at once. Besides saving yourself unnecessary expense you could also be saving someone's life.

Tax questions answered by IRS's teletax service

Teletax, a recorded telephone tax information service provided by the Internal Revenue Service, is available again this year to taxpayers who have tax questions.

Teletax offers about 150 information topics on tax subjects such as filing requirements, itemized deductions, tax credits, dependents, and adjustments to income, according to the Internal Revenue Service.

Specific instructions and telephone numbers for Teletax can be found in the IRS tax packages: Publication 1163, the Teletax brochure, or in IRS Publication 910, "Guide to Free Tax Services." The last two documents can be obtained by calling the IRS Forms number 1-800-424-3676.

Kentucky taxpayers who call the numbers shown below should follow the instructions in their tax packages, and the recorded telephone instructions on how to use available 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. Rotary dial contact is generally available only during normal working hours. The following number should be used by Ken-

tuckyans who want to use Teletax: 1-800-554-4477

Taxpayers can also use Teletax to find out the status of their refunds. Taxpayers who have not received refunds within 10 weeks of the date they filed their tax returns can call the Automated Refund Information System 1-800-554-4477 and check on the status of their refunds. Individuals using Automated Refund Information should have a copy of their tax return available since they will need to know the first social security number shown on the return, the filing status and the exact amount of the refund.

Instructions for using the Automated Refund Information System are also provided in the tax package, Publication 910 and the Teletax brochure. This system will be available after March 15.

"We've been working on (shooting) in practice," said Mink. "Here lately, everybody has been putting out in practice and it paid off."

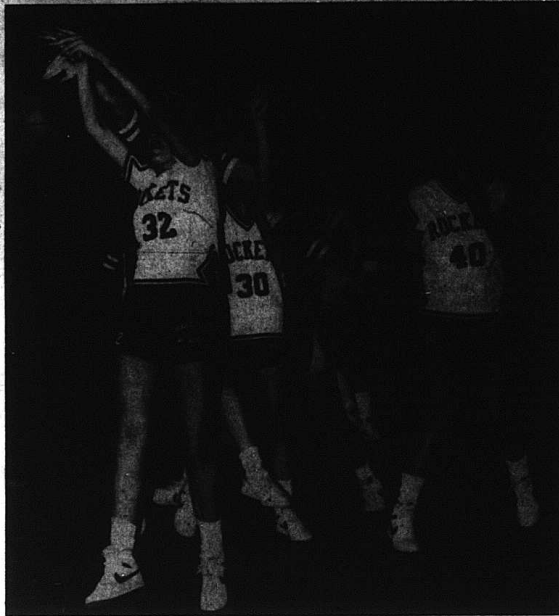
The Rockets shot 45 percent for the game.

For three quarters here Saturday night, the Rockcastle County Rockets played as if they were on a treadmill.

The same Berea team which lost by 34 to the Rockets in December, which has a 1-18 record, which features a scaled-down Charles Barkley in the middle, actually led 46-39 with 6:50 left in the game.

It was only when faced with the possibility of losing to arch-rival Berea that the Rockets came to life. Despite 8-of-23 free throw shooting in the second half and three starters fouling out down the stretch, the Rockets posted a lackluster 54-50 victory.

"It was a win," said senior Johnny Kirby, who scored 14 points before fouling out. "But it was nothing to write home about." The Rockets had led 30-26 at the half, but a deliberate Berea team went ahead 40-39 late in the third quarter and scored the first six points of the fourth.

Finally, behind the offensive rebounding of Bullens, the Rockets were revived. Bullens struck back two rebounds within two minutes to pull the Rockets to one, 47-46, before fouling out at 3:43. "It's getting to the point now where you either play or sit," Perkins said. "(Bullens) didn't start playing until he thought Berea was going to beat us."

No did most of the other Rockets. The Rockets regained the lead with 3:28 left when Burton scored a shot on the baseline. Lewis hit two free throws the next trip down to pad the lead to 50-47.

The Pirates scored only one point in more than six minutes, that coming when the Barkley-esque Daletric Parks hit a free throw with 6:05 left. They pulled to within one when sophomore Bobby Stewart canned a jumper from the wing.

The Rockets hit 4-of-6 free throws to salvage the win.

In the B-Team game, the Rockets were down 31-24 when sophomore Kris Ponder showed up. In the span of a minute, he hit a jumper from the wing, stole the in-bounds pass for a layup, scored again on a pass from Steve Clark and put back a rebound to put the Rockets up, 33-31.

The Rockets went on to win 41-37. Ponder finished with 16 points on 7-of-10 shooting. Adam Coleman had eight and Steve Clark had six.

Defending state champs roll past Rockets 59-35

There couldn't have been a more fitting epitaph for the Rockcastle County Rockets last Thursday night than the starting five's linescore:

When three starters combine for a point against the defending state champion Pulaski County Maroons, you either get super scoring from the other two starters, get strong bench play or get beat.

Predictably, the Rockets got the latter 59-35 for their fifth straight loss.

"When you have a team that gets one point out of three starters," said RCHS coach David Perkins, "you're not going to beat a lot of teams."

Certainly not Pulaski County, even though the Maroons hardly resemble a defending state champion this season. With three starters gone from last year's

"We felt we could beat them because they were over-confident and not very talented this year," Cox said.

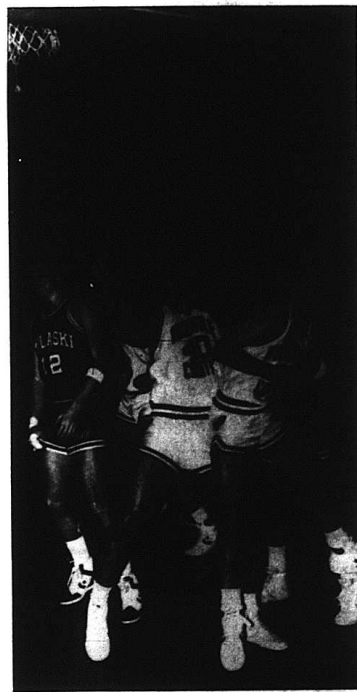
Perkins saw it a little differently. "We're going to have to quit backing down from a team that's got a name," he said.

Boys lose, girls win

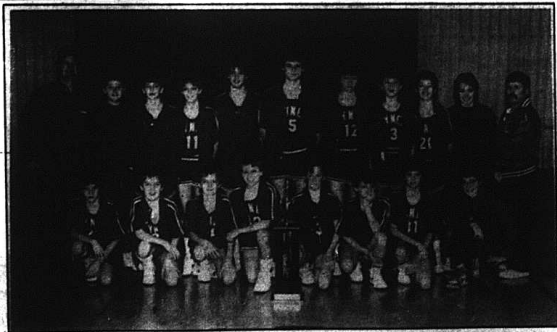

Brothead's David Sargent, Mt. Vernon's Mike Smith and Roundstone's Billy Todd represented county schools on that team.

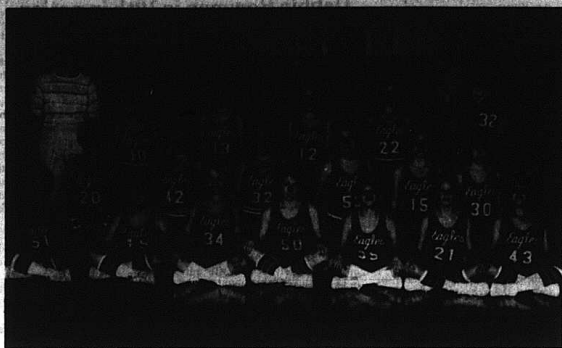
The other members included: Brad Gover (Science Hill); Ryan

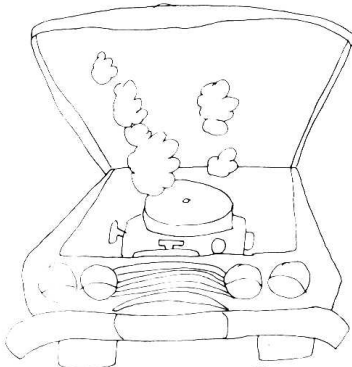

Sue Bennett will host Summer skills workshop

High school juniors and seniors will have a special opportunity to improve their academic skills this summer at Sue Bennett College.

According to Dr. John Patterson, Sue Bennett College President, a special workshop will be offered in June for high school juniors and seniors who want to begin to prepare themselves for college work. The workshop, which is entitled "Learning to Cope in the 80's: College Survival

Skills" will provide commuting students with a week of concentrated study in the areas of college reading skills, vocabulary improvement, and basic study skills.

"Sue Bennett is pleased to offer this program as part of our service approach to the community," Dr. Patterson said. "This is an opportunity for students to use their summer months to hone their academic skills, in order that they might be prepared to excel in high school and college, to meet the

demands of upper-level education."

According to Dr. Patterson, enrollment will be limited to a small number of students.

He indicated that the total cost for each student enrolled would be \$150, with a limited number of scholarships available to students.

Academic Dean Joan Stivers noted that the program will help to fill a gap for many students. "Unfortunately," she said, "Many students of real ability do not succeed in college because they lack sufficient study skills to perform effectively in an academic environment. We hope to provide those who complete this course with the necessary competencies to be successful in their chosen curriculum."

"However," she said, "It is not always the poor student who has problems in college."

"Too often," she noted, "It is the bright student who succeeds in high school without really trying—only to get to college and find that the necessary skills for survival are lacking. Then he gets discouraged and quits. Or, worse, he stops trying and flunks out," she said. "We hope to help students cope with college adjustments."

The workshop will be under the direction of Mrs. Virginia Baker, Director of the Learning Resource Center at Sue Bennett. Mrs. Baker received graduate degree in English, and also in reading, and has also done additional graduate work at Eastern Kentucky University and the University of Kentucky. She has taught English at Sue Bennett and Union College, and worked with reading and study skills classes at Sue Bennett.

Prior to her present position, Mrs. Baker also worked with Upward Bound students. A reading specialist, she has served at Sue Bennett as a reading consultant to local high schools, visiting students in the classroom and doing short-term workshops.

"We are confident that Mrs. Baker will have a program which will make a difference in the lives of young men and women in this area," said President Patterson. "We are continually seeking to expand Sue Bennett's offerings to the community and the summer skills program is part of our total service to the community."

According to Dr. Patterson, information on the workshop will be available shortly to high school principals and guidance counselors in the schools in this area.

Your Child's Health

"My baby will NEVER sleep through the night! I'm going crazy!" This is of course a common complaint of parents of young infants. There may be help. A recent review points out that 20 to 30% of infants have trouble sleeping and up to 33% of children up to 5 years of age do, too, so yours is not abnormal. However, statistics don't help you sleep, but the following suggestions may maybe will train your baby to keep it quiet for several hours.

By 4 months of age 95% of bottle fed babies can go 8 hours without feeding, and breast fed ones do so about a month later. Frequent small feedings make for frequent waking periods since the tummy isn't full for long. Feeding larger amounts less frequently can gradually train the baby to go longer between feedings.

Allowing the baby to go to sleep with a bottle or to fall asleep while nursing will let the infant associate falling asleep with eating, so that when they wake up they think they can't get back to sleep without feeding again. Try a pacifier to put them to sleep with rather than a bottle or nursing at the breast.

Many infants will awaken at

night for the attention they get when they cry. This pattern may develop after the extra attention they have received after an illness or other change in routine. The best advice is to let them cry it out or the pattern will quickly become deeply ingrained. This of course, after a quick inspection to see that they are all right. A brief reassurance is o.k. but don't pick them up for prolonged rocking etc. A night light may help too.

Tax Help for Small Businesses

New or recently established small business owners and self-employed taxpayers can learn about the tax law and how it relates to their businesses.

through a number of references and programs provided by the Internal Revenue Service.

Throughout the year local IRS offices sponsor free tax workshops in which participants learn about record-keeping and accounting practices, keeping track of expenses and income, filing employment tax returns, and depositing taxes using Form 8109, *Federal Tax Deposit Coupon*.

Instructors cover employer tax responsibilities extensively. IRS also offers free IRS Publications to aid the small business taxpayer. Publication 334, *Tax Guide for Small Business*, goes into detail on such subjects as setting up a tax record system, determination of net income, and tax credits and business assets. Publication 583, *Information for Business Taxpayers*, explains what a small business owner needs to know to meet tax obligations, such as how to obtain identification numbers and what records should be kept. Finally, Publication 15, *Circular E, Employer's Tax Guide*, explains employment tax and tax deposit requirements, and other areas employers need to know.

Taxpayers can obtain information on the above subjects by writing or calling the IRS.
