Family Life Child Development Center located on U.S. 25, is a school for children aged 3 to 5 years. The center has warm and caring teachers, who take time with the children's daily activities. As a group or one to one correspondence, the day is well planned. The center is not just a day care, but a learning experience about life around them.

There are educational units that deal with a specific topic. The holidays had a unit about Thanksgiving. The children learned first observed the children learned about the Mayflower, the Pilgrims and Indians. He paints the face or hands of the children with watercolors. He lets them choose between balloons or musical notes to be painted. His appearance makes the day for the children. Thank you Elbow.

On some occasions the children water movies. There is an indoor sand box. Rice that where the children learn about textures. Water play where children learn about floating and sinking. About on the water and underwater. Freeplay, the time

...of compliance is disregard of being charges against the violator.

On that matter, the ordinance is not strict. If the person is served, and he does not abate such a nuisance within five days, the county may proceed to abate such nuisance, keeping an account of the expense of the abatement. If such abatement shall be carried out and paid by such owner or tenant. Whenever a bill for such charges remain unpaid for 45 days after that has been rendered, the county may file a statement of lien against the property, or take other measures.

Violators of the regulations may be issued a citation by the county sheriff, Kentucky State Police, peace officers of the solid waste coordinating.

To date a franchise to take care of garbage in the county exists a franchise ordinance package that will be worked out by the court. The franchise will be bid with the franchise going to the person with the highest and best bid.

A garbage coordinator to represent the county on dealings with residents and the franchise has not been hired to date. The court has 30 applicants for the job but has not made a final decision.

Only Livingston currently has a house to house garbage collection. It is a mandatory system with the cost added to the customer's city water bill. Livingston is expected to be part of the county program within one year.



## Busy days

### York found guilty . . .

An eight-man four-women jury last week found Clara York, 44, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, guilty of reckless homicide, in connection with the shooting death of Charles E. Richmond last Sept. 6.

York and Richmond were living together at a residence on Conway Hollow Road when the shooting occurred, according to police. Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs and Trooper Gary Lane investigating the shooting in which they testified that York shot Richmond during an argument between the two.

York and her attorney, Nicholas Williams of Berea, contended during the trial last week that the shot gun went off after Richmond grabbed the gun barrel and that she did not intentionally murder him.

The original indictment against York was for murder, but because of the circumstances surrounding the case, Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham, tried York on a charge of wanton murder.

York will remain in the Rockcastle County jail until her sentencing before Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters on Friday.

### Robbery trial set . . .

Two North Carolina men who have been charged with the December 1985 armed robbery of the Mt. Vernon Drive-Through Pharmacy on Richmond Street, will be tried April 8 in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Paul Scott Justice, 25, and George Alexander Turner, Jr., 30, were apprehended by police in North Carolina a few weeks after they held Catina Hasty, owner of the pharmacy, and Carla Baker an employee at gun-point while they took over \$500 in cash, a .38 caliber pistol and all the Schedule 2 narcotics in the pharmacy.

The two men walked into the pharmacy about 5 p.m. on that

Friday night and locked the door behind them. Mrs. Hasty reported after the hold up. The two women were tied up with duct tape while Turner and Justice collected the drugs and cash.

A Rockcastle Grand Jury indicted the two men last February, but both men had been charged with crimes in North Carolina and could not be extradited until now.

Last week Turner filled a \$4,000 cash bond and was released until his trial date. Justice, who was serving a 14 year sentence in North Carolina, is presently in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting his trial.

### Moore sentencing soon . . .

Billy Ray Moore, 34, of Mt. Vernon, pleaded guilty in Rockcastle Circuit Court last week to cultivating over 25 marijuana plants for the purpose of resale.

Moore was arrested last Sept. 21, by Kentucky State Police after they noticed the plants protruding from the back of his pick-up truck as he drove down Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

At the time of his arrest Moore was also charged with receiving stolen property, carrying a concealed weapon and possession of a controlled substance. He was later indicted by a Rockcastle County Grand Jury on all four counts.

In exchange for Moore's guilty plea, Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham recommended

that the other three charges against Moore be dropped.

He also recommended that Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters sentence Moore to two years in the state penitentiary and fine him \$1,000.

Moore will remain on bond until his March 13 sentencing date.

Another local man, Bernard Nicely Jr., 39, of Rt. 5, Livingston, also pleaded guilty to cultivating marijuana for the purpose of resale. He was arrested for growing 562 marijuana plants near Livingston. For his efforts Nicely was sentenced by Venters to one year in the state reformatory.

He is presently being held in the Rockcastle County jail awaiting transfer.

### Cotton pleads to escape . . .

The last of three men who escaped from the Rockcastle County jail in February 1985 has pleaded guilty and been sentenced in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Gerald Cotton, who along with Jeff Prewitt and Bobby Ramsey, escaped from the Rockcastle County jail by overpowering deputy jailer Stanley Mullins, was sentenced last Feb. 19 to five years in the state penitentiary for the escape. Prewitt and Cotton escaped once before from the

facility. Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham said Tuesday that Cotton's five years in the penitentiary would run consecutively with any other time he has received.

Cotton, Prewitt and Ramsey, were charged with crimes in Greenup, Ky. and found guilty last year. Greenup is where they were apprehended.

Cotton is in the state reformatory at La Grange, along with Prewitt and Ramsey.

### Graves pleads guilty . . .

Randy Graves, 22, of Mt. Vernon, pleaded guilty to two counts of third degree burglary last week in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

His pleas stemmed from a July 17, 1986 incident in which he burglarized the This and That Shop and Ruby's Diner on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

Graves who was recently convicted on other charges in Rockcastle Circuit Court, was also charged with two counts of theft

by unlawful taking and also being a persistent felony offender.

Commonwealth Attorney Benny Ham recommended that Graves get a three year sentence for the two third degree burglary charges and that the sentence run consecutively with time he is already serving in LaGrange.

In other court action, Ernest Lee Smith and Jeff Brock, both of Livingston, pleaded guilty to fourth degree assault in connection with a beating of Fannie Taylor

## Baker, Renner for Mt. Vernon mayor

All council seats are up for grabs

Two candidates for Mayor of Mt. Vernon will be on the May 26 primary ballot to fill the last two years of former Mayor Roland Mullins' term.

Incumbent Mayor Elizabeth Baker filed Wednesday morning City Councilman Jackie Russell Renner filed his papers with County Clerk Norma Houk Satur day.

Mayor Mullins resigned last December when he moved out of the city. The council appointed Mrs. Baker to serve until the November election.

It will be Mrs. Baker's first venture into local politics. She is currently working rehabilitation instructor at the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center at Mt. Vernon.

Second term as a Mt. Vernon councilman and is an employee at Mt. Vernon Drive-Through Pharmacy.

Mrs. Baker, wife of Robert (Bob) Baker, was formerly assistant director of special education for the Kentucky Department of Education. She has been supervisor for a regional program managing personnel and budget. She was consultant for the Kentucky Department of Education a teacher, and coordinator of programs for the state's universities.

Renner is the son of Jesse and Ruth Renner of Mt. Vernon. He is a Rockcastle County High School graduate, a member of the First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon, the Young Republicans Club, and a member of the Mt. Vernon Urban Renewal and Community Development Agency.

Renner said he has worked with and for the public for over 10 years, and I believe you will find in me a young, energetic man qualified to be the next mayor.

"I am a working man and know the value of a dollar," he said. "I will serve the people if elected, in a fair, honest and efficient way, and treat all equally. I will be thankful for the public's support and vote."

Mrs. Baker said if elected she will strive to be the best possible job for all the people of Mt. Vernon knowing she will have a great responsibility.

"I pledge to serve the public in any way I can," she stated. "I have a great concern for Mt. Vernon, its citizens, and its future. In the months to come, important decisions that will affect us all will have to be made, and I feel that am qualified to help make these decisions."

Both Mrs. Baker and Renner are Republicans.

Renner won his last mayoral seat leading the ticket. He finished as well in his 1983 race for county judge executive, finishing fifth in a 10 way Republican race.

All council seats in Mt. Vernon, Broadhead and Livingston, will be up for election on May 26. Councilman candidates have until 4 p.m. Aug. 27 to file petitions with the county clerk. Candidates in the city include the incumbent, plans to run.

### Farmers to get crop funds

A total of 69 Rockcastle County farm crop producers will receive about \$58,000 in generic commodity certificates for crop losses sustained last year, according to Harold Ballinger county ASCS director.

The amount is part of \$2.7 million in certificates that will go to Kentucky farmers.

The exact amount each county farmer will receive has not been determined. 59 farms are involved.

A certificate bears a dollar

amount which can be presented at the local ASCS office for payment by check, or it can be taken to a government grain elevator to receive the appropriate amount of U.S. grain.

U.S. Sen. Max Baucus said the USDA is sending out \$1,928,636 to 1,610 farmers who produced program crops and \$820,777 to 534 farmers who produced other program crops at a loss in 1986 due to the severe drought.

According to McCannell, payments are being made in counties where Farmer's Home Administration emergency loans had been made to cover 1986 losses brought on by drought, excessive heat, excessive moisture, floods or hail.

"Last year a large number of our farmers were hurt badly, by the drought and are still struggling to bounce back," McCannell said. "These PIK certificates will reimburse farmers for some of the losses they would not have incurred had the crop year been a normal one."

### State approves 3.7 mile road contract

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract to resurface 3.7 miles of two roads in Rockcastle County.

The Allen Co. of Winchester received a \$94,863 contract to resurface 1.6 miles of County Road 529A, the Maresburg - Spiro Road from U.S. 150 extending south-west to Kentucky 1250; 2.1 miles of County Road 5386, the Bowling Ridge Road from the south city limits of Broadhead extending west.

The projects are part of the state's continued effort to improve Kentucky roads and highways.

### Garbage ordinance gets first reading

First reading of an ordinance regulating garbage disposal in Rockcastle County was heard and approved by the Rockcastle Fiscal Court at a meeting Friday.

A full courtroom of spectators were on hand to hear the reading. A second and final reading of the ordinance will be held at 7 p.m. March 6 in the District Courtroom.

A copy of the ordinance is on display in the office of County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker. There were a few changes and clarifications in the ordinance made at the meeting, and only a few questions were asked by visitors.

The first reading came on the heels of a decision by the court to remove all greenboxes because of the cost for transporting garbage to a Laurel landfill which costs between \$7,000 and \$9,000 a month.

Residents have been advised to take garbage to at least three areas in the county. One area is near Renfro Valley owned by William K. Bullen. Another is Bee Garbage at a location at Burr, and a third, owned by Larry Renner on Jones Creek Road in the Sand Springs area. All will charge a fee.

The present system will continue to operate only until the county's garbage plant goes into effect in about two months. Residents are warned not to purchase bag tickets for more than two months.

As reported, the county plan is voluntary, with reservations.

A resident may have his garbage picked up at his home on a regular schedule that will be worked out when the county approves a franchise, and at a fee

vet to be determined. One charge mentioned is \$5 a month.

If the resident declines to use the pick-up system, he may take his garbage to a designated collection station that will be approved by the solid waste committee and by the court, if necessary. A fee will be charged.

The ordinance leaves no way out for residents of the county. Residents must dispose of garbage as prescribed by the ordinance. It will be illegal to dump garbage on the residents own property, the property of others, and on roadways. Burning will also be prohibited unless in an approved incinerator.

Violation could bring a fine of between \$25 and \$500 with each day a separate violation.

Since the ordinance is approved by the state, the state

Nothing personal against Joe Clark, a former magistrate, but Judge Thacker admitted during a recent meeting of the court that Clark did nothing for the \$50 a month he is paid.

The court has had to ax the ambulance service, lay-off employees and virtually halt or delay other aspects of county business.

Granted most of the problems center around garbage collection and some other financial problems were caused by a lack of revenue sharing monies that previous courts have been able to spend.

But, every court needs a leader and it is my opinion that for over \$36,000 a year the county is getting something storchinged. The judge could also save the county another \$600 a year by giving Clark his walking papers.

Don't beat a dead horse, right? Wrong. The county has problems that are not going to be solved by a lack of action. I don't want to pick, but believe me when I say that we haven't nit-picked enough. Some of the business the court has conducted has been "lillegal", because they have either not given us 24-hour notice, as required by law, or as in one instance recently, they called a special meeting and did something other than what the meeting was called for. Of

course they are not the only government body in the county guilty of this.

Our county attorney, James H. Lambert has told the court that he has such a heavy case load in district court that he cannot fulfill all their legal needs in getting a garbage ordinance passed and put into place.

While this may be true, it seems to me that the county doesn't have enough money to pay for extra legal help when it is part of the county attorney's

job to advise and help the fiscal court whenever he is called upon.

The court agreed to pay David Howard, a London attorney, to help them with the garbage.

Who cares, right? Wrong. If you are a registered voter, a taxpayer, a citizen of Rockcastle County you should care. Nothing says that we have to elect people that will not do the best job for our county.

The way I see it, Magistrates Doug Bishop and Glen Ellison have had to take over in leading the court in the direction it needs to follow. These men, as the other three magistrates, are paid only \$9,600 a year and should only be responsible for the district from which they are elected.

\$36,000 is a lot of money in Rockcastle County. This amount is well above the average

income here. If we are going to pay someone that kind of money for leadership, then I think we ought to get more for our money than we are now.

## Boswell supports rejection of burley sales limits before Christmas break

It is expected that Kentucky burley farmers will bring nearly 300 million pounds of tobacco to the sales market which opens in the Commonwealth on Nov. 24.

Kentucky Commissioner of Agriculture David Boswell said that this year's expected Kentucky burley crop is down about 25 percent and that the Burley Marketing and Sales Committee which recently set the sales opening and schedule had no choice but to reject proposals to limit the volume of burley sold before the Christmas break.

Commissioner Boswell is a member of the Burley Sales and Marketing Committee, which established 15 days of sales before a Christmas pause which will begin on Dec. 19. Proposals to limit pre-Christmas auction poundage come from Southwestern Tobacco Co. of Lexington and from Phillip Morris and R.J. Reynolds.

Kentucky joins Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, Missouri, Indiana and Ohio in the eight state Burley Belt. Boswell pointed out that the effects of the dry summer and the reduction of farmers' quotas made for an unusually small crop of burley this year and that Kentucky farmers might well sell their tobacco before the Christmas break.

There was no way, that the Committee could take any action which would limit the volume of burley sold before the Christmas break.

chances to see," said Commissioner Boswell. "You know that in Kentucky, burley is our leading cash crop, grown by 150,000 farmers, but it drops into the profits from burley lost Kentucky farmers some \$200 million in net profits last year compared to 1982." Net income from Kentucky burley dropped from \$350 million in 1982 to \$150 million last year. "We're looking at net income this sales period about \$170 million, less any impact from Gfaham-Rudman," said Boswell.

"So Kentucky farmers don't need to have anything else, such as a sales volume limit before Christmas, imposed on the movement of their burley," he added.

USDA says that prices could hold near \$1.60 pound this year, and that the "no net cost" fee which the growers pay to help support the federal program might as be low as 1 cent per pound. Commissioner Boswell says that housed tobacco is rated as mostly good quality this year with weight somewhat higher than recent years. Stripping was 10 percent complete a week ago.

Meantime the sale which starts on Nov. 24 will be conducted for three and a half hours each day except on Fridays and Thanksgiving, Nov. 27. After the Christmas recess, sales are scheduled to pick up again on Jan. 5, 1987.

## Rockcastle bridges to get weight limit signs posted

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract to post weight limit signs on various bridges in 28 Kentucky counties including Rowan.

George B. Stone Co. of Sharrington received a \$63,820 contract to post bridge weight limit signs on the extended weight limit road system in the

counties. Current law allows an 80,000 pound maximum weight for trucks on designated "red" and "yellow" routes. Under new legislation passed by the 1986 General Assembly, that limit will be raised to 120,000 pounds for trucks that take a slow annual fee. The new law goes into effect this April.

## Rockets show signs of life

The same Rockcastle County Rockets given up for dead two weeks ago after humbling losses to Barbourville and Laurel County revealed a faint pulse last week.

The Rockets dropped a closer-than-it looks 55-45 game at Whitley County last Thursday and nearly avenged the earlier loss to the Barbourville Tigers, losing 60-52 at home.

"When you get beat by a team like Laurel County, you have to bounce back," Rocket coach David Perkins said. "It's hard to say you're encouraged by losing, but there were signs of life."

Despite 25 points from junior Jon Bullens, the Rockets' loss dropped them to 7-14 this season. Senior Johnny Kirby finished with eight points and Shannon Burton had five.

Barbourville, playing without its 26-points-per-game scorer, Bobby McWilliams, who has ankle trouble, improved its record to 17-5.

The Rockets' revival at least partially mirrors that of Bullens' 17-point 5 forward has been the Rockets' main offensive weapon in quarter, disappearing the next.

For the first time since scoring 24 points against Oneida on Jan. 24, Bullens tapped deep into his potential last week. He went for 14 points against Whitley despite foul trouble. He hit 10 of 15 shots and had nine rebounds in the Barbourville loss.

Perkins is still coming back from a 10-day absence. Bullens said Perkins is

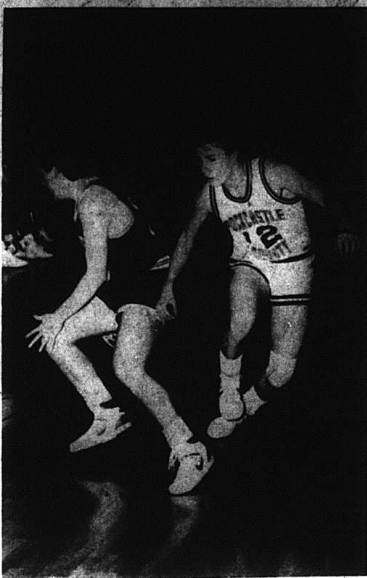
Kirby filled his absence, nailing two long jumpers going into the final quarter, Bullens, re-entering the lineup at the start of the fourth, took up where he left off in the third.

He canned a 17-footer from the wing, an 18-foot baseliner and an in-lane tip-in to pull the Rockets within four, 46-44, with 5:32 left.

"Playing at Whitley helped us," guard Pat Hansel said, who finished with two points. "We had a chance to win the game (Friday night) we cut about 30 points off of the last time we played them."

The Rockets pulled no closer, however. Their junk defenses — triangle-and-two and box-and-chase — left Barbourville holes along the baseline. The Tigers' Pat Allford found those holes, scoring eight of their last 10 points to clinch the win.

Sophomore guard Kris Ponder continued his B team domination. He scored 36 points in the Rockets' 66-59 overtime win. Chuck Shires finished with 15, and Darren Allen had five.

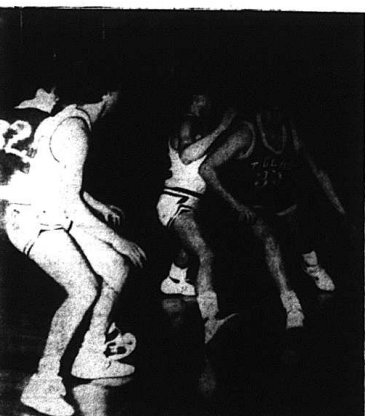

## EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

**FISH IN YOUR DIET**

Fish has become the latest health food craze since researchers found that the large amounts of fatty seafood (whale and seal meat, including blubber) that Eskimos in Greenland were accustomed to eating somehow protected them from heart disease. The beneficial properties of whale and seal have been attributed to the polyunsaturated fat in seafood, specifically omega-3 fatty acids, which are believed to lower blood cholesterol and triglyceride levels and prevent build-up of fatty plaques in blood vessels. Omega-3 fatty acids are found in fish but not in meat or poultry.

Ocean fish that contain the most omega-3 fatty acids are found in cold, deep water and include sardines, salmon, mackerel, tuna and herring. Fresh-water fish from cold water, such as rainbow trout, also are good sources. Leaner fish like catfish, perch, cod, flounder and haddock have less omega-3s than the fatty fishes from cold water.

Fish oil supplements in capsules are being advertised and have joined the vitamin and mineral supplements and weight-loss aids on drug store and supermarket shelves. Thank goodness the fish oils are contained in airtight capsules - it would be awfully fishy smelling otherwise!

Do these supplements prevent heart disease? Are they safe? Should people take fish oil supplements? The answer in each case is no, according to the American Heart Association and the American Medical Association. The long-term effectiveness and safety of supplements have not been established. However, both groups advise Americans to eat fish regularly because of its relatively low fat and cholesterol content, not to mention the omega-3 fatty acids.

How you prepare fish is important. If you dip it in batter and deep-fat fry it, it no longer will be low fat. Fish can be prepared in a number of low-fat ways -- broiled, baked, poached or steamed. Cooked or canned fish can be used in casseroles, salads and sandwiches. Experts now are recommending you include fish in your diet about once or twice each week.

### LEMON BAKED FISH

1 pound flounder or haddock

- fillets, fresh or frozen
  - 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, melted
  - 4 teaspoons lemon juice
  - 1 teaspoon lemon rind, grated
  - 1/8 teaspoon salt
  - dash of pepper
  - 1/8 teaspoon Rosemary
- Thaw frozen fish and preheat oven to 350° (moderate). Divide fish into 6 servings. Place in single layer in a baking pan. Mix fat, lemon juice, lemon rind, salt, pepper, and rosemary. Pour over fish. Bake for 25 minutes or until fish flakes easily when tested with a fork. (Makes 6 servings, about 130 calories each).

### FLOUNDER FLORENTINE

(Makes 4 servings, about 140 calories)

- 1 pound frozen skinless flounder fillets, thawed
  - 1-1/2 cups boiling water
  - 10-ounce package frozen chopped spinach
  - 1 tablespoon onion, finely chopped
  - 1/2 teaspoon marjoram
  - 2 tablespoons flour
  - 1 cup skim milk
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - dash of pepper
- Place fish fillets in 1 cup boiling water. Cook, uncovered, 2 minutes. Drain. Place spinach and onion in 1/2 cup boiling water. Separate spinach with fork. When water returns to boiling, cover and cook spinach 2 minutes. Drain well. Mix with marjoram. Put spinach in 8X8X2 inch glass baking dish. Arrange cooked fish on top of spinach. Mix flour thoroughly with 1/4 cup milk. Pour remaining milk in saucepan. Heat. Add flour mixture slowly to hot milk, stirring constantly. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Stir in salt and pepper. Pour sauce over fish. Sprinkle with Parmesan cheese. Bake at 400 F (hot oven) until top is lightly browned and mixture is bubbly, about 25 minutes.

### FISH IN TOMATO STEW

(Makes about 4 servings, 110 calories per serving)

- 1 pound cod fillets, fresh or frozen, without skin
- 1 4 cup onion, chopped
- 1 4 cup green pepper, chopped
- 2 teaspoons oil
- 8 ounce can tomatoes
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

On February 18 a meeting was held with 15 stockholders present representing approximately 98 percent of outstanding shares.

Mr. Jerry Ikerd, Chairman of the Board, reported a dividend of \$10.00 per share to be paid immediately. Also the condition of the Bank in respect to equity to assets is 11.5 percent which places The Bank of Mt. Vernon in the top 10 percent of the strongest banks in Kentucky. 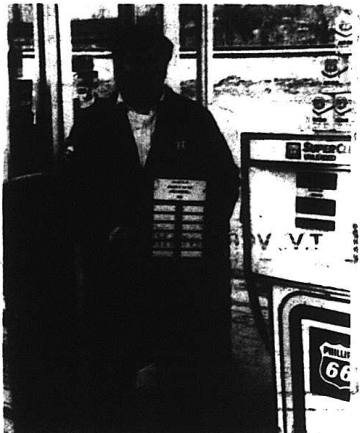

Thaw frozen fish. Grease 9X9X2" baking pan lightly with 1/2 teaspoon oil. Cut fish in 4 servings. Place in baking pan. Bake at 350 F. (Moderate Oven) until fish flakes easily, about 20 minutes. Drain cooking liquid from fish. While fish is baking, cook onion and green pepper in remaining oil until onion is clear. Cut up large pieces of tomatoes. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper to cooked onion and green pepper. Cook 20 minutes to blend flavors. Pour sauce over drained fish. Bake 10 minutes.
