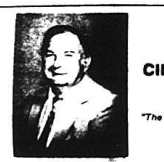

The solid waste ordinance defines the terms; regulates the storage of waste; prohibits littering; establishes a county solid waste agency; sets procedures for establishing fees and collecting such fees; prohibits unauthorized waste collection, transportation and disposal; establishes a franchise solid waste collection system; lists prohibited practices concerning waste storage and disposal; establishes penalties for violations of certain provisions of the ordinance; sets effective dates and repeals all other county solid waste ordinances existing prior to passage of this ordinance.

School superintendent Charles B. Parsons told Burdette that "It has been a joy working with you over the years, you are an excellent leader and have an excellent eye for detail in your museum. I hope to work with you in the future."

Board member George Poynter also expressed gratitude for Dr. Burdette's years of service and said, "This comes as a surprise to me."

Dr. Burdette, who was elected

last November to serve a fifth term, whom he defeated Earl Cummins, said that at the time of the election, he did not have any intentions of moving out of his district.

Sewer plant work keeps falling behind

Nearly four months behind completion of the city's expanded and upgraded sewer plant, the Mt. Vernon City Council began thinking in terms of liquidating damages at a called meeting Monday night.

Original date for completion of the \$1,924,407 project was March 19. It now appears it will be July, possibly later, before the plant is operational.

Engineers for the project, Schimpfeler, Corradino Associates, have advised the council that the contractor Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio has "consistently been behind schedule throughout the project and efforts to catch up have not been successful."

"Contractor has been late constantly on submittals," according to Richard Moore, vice president of the engineering firm "Sufficient manpower has not

been played on the job even though the contractor has been advised. Owner feels who is under administrative order of the Environmental Protection Agency, may be subject to a \$10,000 a day fine for not meeting the compliance schedule if the contractor is late in completing work.

Moore also noted that blasting by the contractor has damaged

existing facilities. Estimated damage has occurred. The contractor must take care of the damage at attention on the project.

If the contractor is not able to complete the project by the deadline, the contractor could cost the contractor a penalty of \$300 a day.

Vocational School to be honored

The Harry Sparks Vocational School has been chosen as one of the top six vocational schools in Kentucky, according to local Principal Lloyd Cain.

Cain said Monday that his school would be honored March 19, by state officials during a luncheon in Frankfort.

"There are 67 vocational schools in the state and only six will receive the 'Flag of Excellence,'" Cain said. "We are very proud that our school has been chosen."

But, things are not as good at the vocational school as they have been, since the institution opened in 1969.

Attendance at the vocational schools is down all across the state and Harry Sparks is no exception.

Local attendance has declined over the years from a high of 300 students to the present low of about 250.

"I know vocational school is

not for everyone but we offer training in areas that provide excellent income for individuals who really work hard in our program," Cain said.

Cain cited several examples of people that had jobs in which they made much higher salaries than many with college educations.

"College is not for everyone either, and I think we have an excellent alternative for those not interested in going to college," Cain said.

At the present time, the vocational school, offers training in welding, repairing of radios and televisions, electricity, auto mechanics, adult agriculture, and three classes of Business Education in which short hand, typing and other aspects of secretarial work are taught.

"We have just about everything to offer a student that doesn't want to go to college and we have an excellent program for adults, who have either finished or have not finished high school.

Cain explained that anyone having served in the Armed Forces is eligible for funding through the G. I. Bill. He said that tuition is charged to adult students but that financial aid is available to

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people but to generate good health habits and to keep our county clean.

Plan proposed: A garbage board will be appointed and will make recommendations to the Fiscal Court for approval or disapproval. The garbage board will consist of members from the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Mt. Vernon City Council and the Broodhead City Council.

Under the plan proposed thirty days after the franchise is awarded, the franchise holder can go back to the Garbage Board and ask them to recommend an increase in the price for picking up garbage.

In a meeting of the Fiscal Court in the past \$8 was recommended as price for door to door service per house per month. Later \$5 was recommended. What is the price be? Will it start at \$5 and in a month raise to \$8?

Each person in the county is represented by a magistrate and the County Judge. I think every person in the county should let their magistrates know how they feel about garbage and what is needed by the people. Some people thought the County garbage boxes for free service should have been removed months ago, so that road work, ambulance services, help for senior citizens, ect could continue in the county and I thought so too. But the boxes were not removed until Feb. 23, three days after Bee Garbage had their transfer station ready for business.

I went to a public hearing at the court house and the Fiscal Court hired another attorney to help with the ordinances the county is adopting concerning garbage. This attorney is the same lawyer that represented Bee Garbage at the hearing at Mt. Vernon Court House of William K. Bullen and H.S.I. Garbage Collection of Mt. Vernon.

There will be another reading of the Garbage Ordinances for the county on March 6th, 7 p.m. at the Rockcastle County Court House and all the people of this county that can attend should be present. The way the plan is adopted and approved will effect all the people and their children for years to come.

I will not bid on a garbage franchise for Rockcastle County, but I am interested in the way the laws and services will effect the people of our county. I will help in anyway possible to keep our county clean and give assistance when asked in needed.

The reason I am writing this letter is to let the people know what the Fiscal Court has done and is planning about garbage collection in Rockcastle. A lot of people are asking why?

Why? Revenue sharing has been drying up and is not available for free garbage service.

Ordinance Laws. Laws must be set up to govern the way garbage is handled. Without these laws, the rural streams, fields and roadways would be full of garbage. A man told me at the last hearing that no one was coming into his home to see if the lid was on his container. This is in reaction to part of an ordinance read that a lid must be on a container except when loading and emptying the container. I believe the intention of these laws is not to abuse

mentioned was unusual wet weather which delayed work.

The city's water system, soon to undergo a \$20,000 upgrading, could get the attention of the council which is finding it will likely not have enough money available to do, all the work suggested by engineers.

Jack Crawford of Burnside, engineer for the project, told the council his firm is in the process of determining cost estimates and should have details in about two weeks.

The city plans to remodel the water plant and add a water tank to increase the city's water storage capacity, now under strain. A particular problem exists at the city's tank that serves residents south along U.S. 25 to Burr.

Matt Powell Jr., city water superintendent, told the council that the tank stays empty and continued pumping is needed to supply water to that area. He said the pumps never stop.

He also warned the city that water storage news is available only about three hours if a breakdown occurs, instead of the required 48 hours.

The city supplies water to the western area of the county, City of Broodhead, and the northern area of the county with a total of 3,500 customers.

The city plans to erect a new water tank at a yet to be determined site, but most likely on Tom Hill where the present water tanks are located. The city would have to run a new line from near the city hall to the tank site on the hill meaning crossing the railroad and following Richmond Street up to and through U.S. 150.

Crawford told the council his figures show the present site to be about as economical as another proposed site in the vicinity of Red Top Restaurant owned by Clarence Carter.

The size of the tank is also posing a question. With finances limited, the council may have to acquire a smaller tank than the council had hoped.

Money for the water project comes from a 50 percent grant through the Appalachian Regional Commission that has already been approved. The city would furnish the other 50 percent.

McConnell's new bill combines three separate bills on comprehensive tort reform which he proposed during the 1986 session. Last week Congress adjourned for the session after the Senate moved to cut off debate without a vote on efforts by McConnell and other Senators to pass product liability and tort reform legislation.

Congress has discussed tort reform for nearly a decade, now it's time for action. I've talked with and listened to people on all sides of this issue. My constituents, local governments, law firms, professional groups and Congress. My new bill is an outgrowth of these debates and the new political realities here in Washington.

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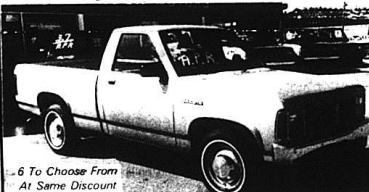


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Vocational School to receive award

others as well.

"Students that qualify can get money through the Paul Grant program as do college students and others," Cain said.

Presently approximately 40 adult students attend the local vocational school.

"This is a competitive world and we are in competition with just about everything. The state department of education requires students to have 20 credits to graduate from high school. Students in band, chorus, home economics and future farmers, just don't have time to do vocational school and also get the credits they need to graduate," Cain said.

Added to the school's already strong eight person staff, will be two more full time teachers to teach a class in respiratory therapy. The class will begin soon and will be open only to adult students. Cain said that approximately 40 students would be accepted in the program. The reason the course is only open to adults, is that much of the training will be on site at a ventilator care facilities such as the one at the local hospital.

According to the principal, his school is always trying to improve the quality of education of students attending.

Such as in the auto mechanics department, where a sun interrogator, which is a computer used to diagnose a car's problems, is used: The computer talks to the student as well as gives them a print out of problems in the car. The machine, which is the only one in the county, retails for

\$20,000. Any adult student or any high school age student interested in enrolling at the vocational school should contact Cain or phone 256-4346. The vocational school is located next to the Rockcastle County High School, within the city limits of Mt. Vernon.

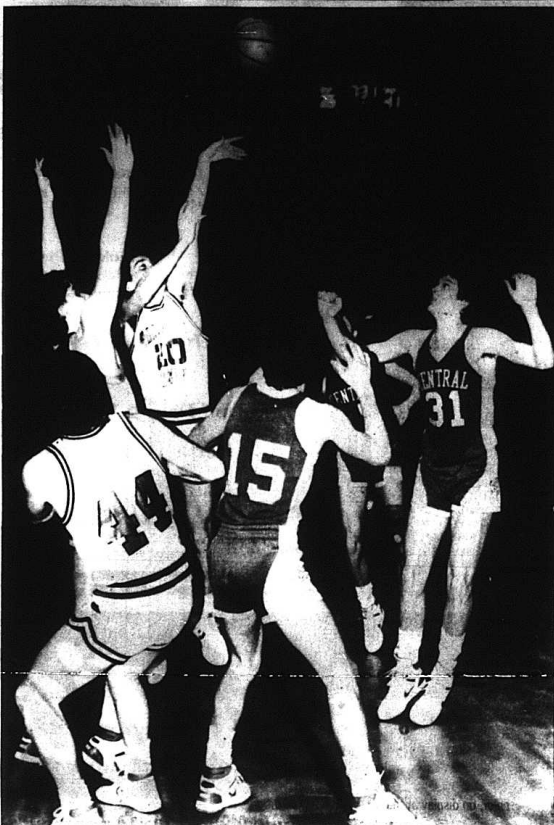

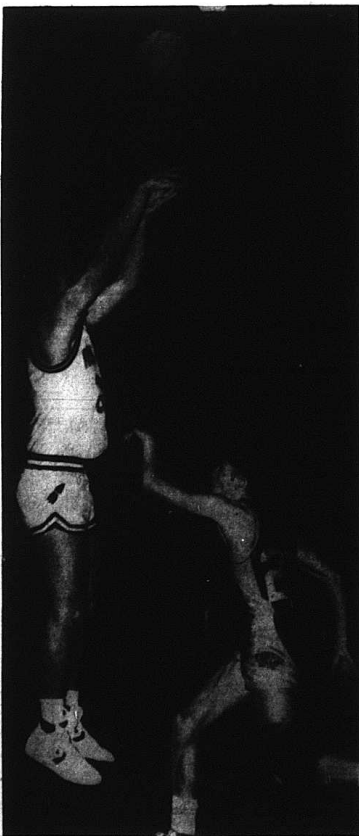
the winner of Wednesday night's game between Rockcastle County and Oneida.

"They just came out with a lot of intensity and good pressure defense and shook us up," said Knox Central coach Jeff Smithern, whose team is 15-12 this season.

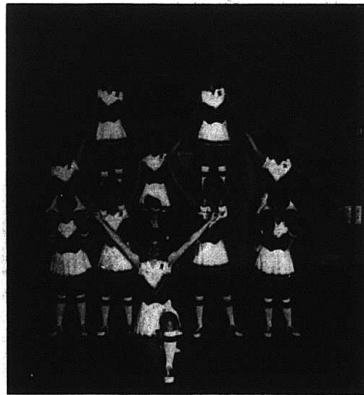

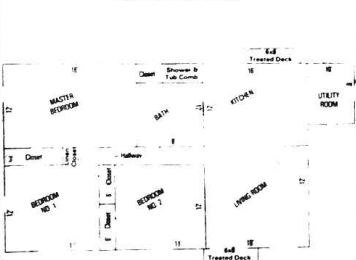

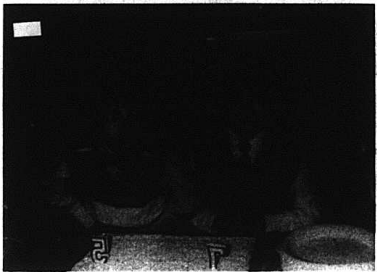

preparing for these meetings and court sessions.

"Therefore I appreciate your decision to hire an additional consultant who is experienced in solid waste matters to help our county with its garbage problem.

As you know, the consultant has been paid nothing by the county at this time. The practice of hiring someone to assist a county or county attorney with a specific and complicated legal matter is quite common. In fact, Pulaski County only recently hired a private law firm to assist it with a particular county problem. Certain other surrounding counties have done the same thing.

"However, we all know that our county, as well as many others throughout the state, has lost substantial federal revenue share funds and will have definite financial restrictions. Because of this, with the fiscal court's permission and with no cost to the county, I will personally bear the expense of having the consultant until the solid waste management plan is implemented by the county.

"Spring with the audience at the meeting was Al Blossell, from the state Local Finance Office who keeps and eye on county budgets in the state.

He briefly told the court considering the county's cash flow problems, it was doing "real well" and should be commended.

EXTENSION HOME ECONOMICS

SNACKS FOR CHILDREN
By: Karen Halcomb
Student Assistant
(under F&N Specialists' supervision)

What makes a good snack? A good snack should come from one or more of the four food groups: Milk, Fruit and Vegetable, Bread and Cereals, and the Meat Group. By choosing snacks from the four food groups you are providing the vitamins and minerals the child needs each day. If the snacks are easy to prepare, the child can do much of the actual work. Examples are cereal and milk, raw vegetables, baked potatoes, sandwiches, or sherbet. Limit the amount of cookies, cakes, soft drinks, and potato chips eaten as snacks because these foods are high in calories from sugar or fat and low in nutrients. The high sugar snacks promote dental cavities.

Plan to eat snacks at predetermined times each day, preferably 1 1/2 to 2 hours before a meal. This will prevent overeating at any one time. If the parents and child plan the snacks together, the child may accept the food better. This is especially true if the child is used to soft drinks and cookies and the snacks are being changed to more nutritious foods.

Some easy and nutritious snacks are included here.

FRENCH BREAD PIZZA

- 1/2 loaf of French bread sliced lengthwise
- 1/2 cup pizza sauce/sauce
- Toppings, as desired (tomatoes, mushrooms, peppers, etc.)
- 1/2 teaspoon oregano/slice
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder/slice
- 1/2 cup mozzarella cheese shredded

Top each half of French bread with pizza sauce. Add toppings as desired. Sprinkle with oregano, garlic powder, and mozzarella cheese. Place under a broiler until cheese melts. Freeze leftovers in snack size portions. 200 calories/slice.

ORANGE SMOOTHIE


- 6 oz. frozen orange juice concentrate, unsweetened
- 1 cup milk
- 1 cup water
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 10 ice cubes

Place all ingredients in a blender. Cover and blend until smooth. Serve immediately. Makes 6 1/2 cup servings. 115 calories. 1/4 cup.

POPCORN WITH CHEESE

- 1/2 cup popcorn, unpopped
- 2 tablespoons margarine melted

1/2 cup Parmesan cheese, grated
1/2 teaspoon salt, if desired
Preheat oven to 325 degrees F.
Pop the popcorn. Place popped corn in a shallow baking pan.
Drizzle with melted margarine. Mix well. Sprinkle with cheese. Add salt if desired. Mix well. Heat 8-10 minutes in oven, stirring.

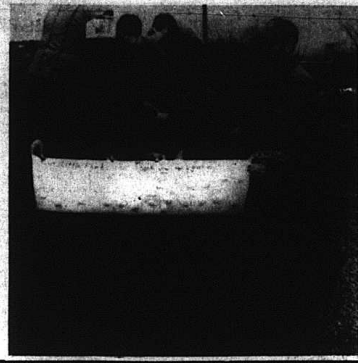

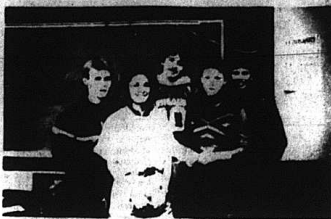

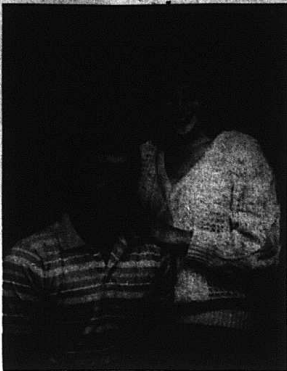
