Solid Waste Ordinance Adopted
The Second Reading and Final Adoption of Ordinance No. 1001, the Rockcastle County Solid Waste Ordinance was passed on March 6, 1987 by unanimous vote of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court.

Summary of Proposed Solid Waste Ordinance
The solid waste ordinance defines the terms; regulates the storage of waste; prohibits littering; establishes a county solid waste agency; sets procedures for establishing fees and collecting such fees; prohibits unauthorized waste collection, transportation and disposal; establishes a franchise solid waste collection system; lists prohibited practices concerning waste storage and disposal; establishes penalties for violations of certain provisions of the ordinance; set effective dates and repeals all other county solid waste ordinances existing prior to passage of this ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 335
An Ordinance of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky amending Ordinance Number 89, as amended, and prohibiting dogs running at large within the city.

The City Council of the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky does ordain as follows:

Section 1: It shall be unlawful for any person to permit any dog to run at large in the City of Mount Vernon, Kentucky.

Section 2: Any person who violates Section 1 of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars. Each day of violation constitutes a separate offense.

Section 3: Any dog permitted to run at large in violation of this ordinance shall be subject to capture, impoundment and destruction.

Section 4: This ordinance shall be effective upon publication.

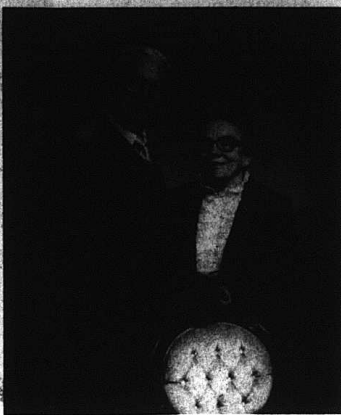
ars." Also, the club was encouraged to nominate someone from the Ninth District to be eligible to receive a scholarship.

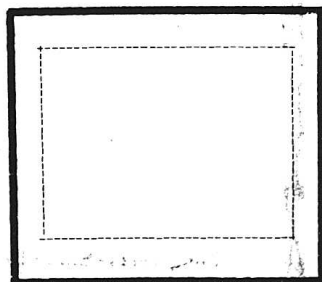

Second Reading of Garbage Ordinance approved by court

The Rockcastle County fiscal court approved the second and final reading of the county's solid waste management ordinance during a special called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court last Friday.

After the final notice is published in this week's Signal the ordinance which calls for a voluntary plan, will be legal. Under the voluntary plan, residents who want to participate will be able to pay for a set fee per month. \$5.00 has been mentioned for the door to door service. The ordinance is on file in the county Judge/Executives' office.

The next step for the court will be a franchise agreement with the county setting the time and date for opening bids on the franchise. The court will take the highest and best bid.

Another major step along the way to implementing the solid waste plan will be to hire a coordinator for the program. This

far, the court has not hired anyone from the ten applications they have received.

If a resident declines to use the voluntary door to door pick-up system, he or she must take their garbage to a designated collection station that will be approved by the solid waste coordinator, the solid waste committee, and by the court. A fee will also be charged.

The fiscal court recently voted to take all collection boxes from the county because of the enormous amount of money it was costing. Presently local residents can take their garbage to one of three sites in the county for disposal. Bee Garbage at Burr,

William K. Bullen's at Renfro Valley and Larry Renner's in the Sand Springs area. Of course all are charging a fee.

The court has said recently that they hope the new garbage plan will go into effect sometime in April.

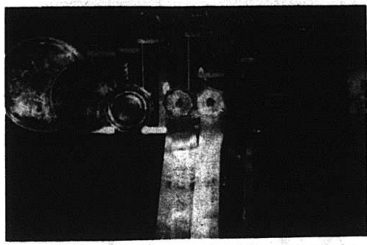

One man was burning debris in a field and had dug a line around his fire. He was 150 feet from the woods, but the wind was up and his fire jumped the line and got into a hay field. About 23 acres of the hay was burned and four acres of forest land, Bullen said.

"Another man in the Conway area was using gasoline to burn garbage in a barrel when the barrel exploded and the fire spread into the woods," he said.

People should be aware of the laws when it comes to burning. Burn at least 150 feet from the woods if you plan to burn anything before 4:30 p.m. After 4:30 you can burn off the undergrowth in the forest if you want to as long as you take necessary precautions so the fire can't get out. This applies to everyone, even people and their own land," Bullen said.

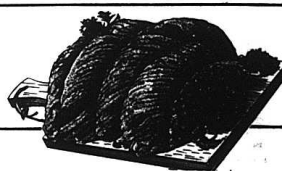

Committee talks rates

Obviously not wanting the general public to know how much more it is going to cost them for sewer service, the Mt. Vernon City Council's water and sewer committee went into executive session for almost an hour to discuss the user charge that customers will pay once the new sewer plant is completed.

Richard Moore, vice president of Schimpeler, Corradino Associates, engineers on the \$1,924,407 project, suggested to the committee, which met before the regularly scheduled council meeting Monday night, that they go into the closed session, although progress was made.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Elizabeth Baker said that no decision would be made during the session and the committee would discuss what was talked about in the closed session when they came out. But they did not. The only mention of the closed session was made after the regular council meeting began, when Moore recommended that the council pay an installment of over \$93,000 to Titus Construction Company of Dayton, Ohio. The contractor on the project.

No mention was made as to the four months that Titus is behind on the project, the damage done to existing facilities, by blasting or the \$10,000 a day fine the Environmental Protection Agency can levy against the city for Titus's delays.

The attorney general in Frankfort has been asked for an opinion concerning the committee's closed door session.

Ford brings traffic problems to city

Local realtor and State Representative Danny Ford met with the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night concerning traffic problems within the city limits.

Ford said that he had been approached by several people concerning the railroad crossing at the junction of Hwy. 150 and Williams Street, next to Thrifty Lumber Company and about the problem of runaway trucks on U.S. 25 south of Mt. Vernon, more commonly known as "the cut."

Council members agreed with Ford that signs should be posted on both sides of the track, prohibiting tractor and trailer trucks from traveling across the crossing. Ford explained that tractor trailer often hang up on the crossing because the grade is very steep.

Some people are afraid that a truck could get hung up there and a train come through at the same time and then you have a real problem," he said.

As far as the runaway truck problem, City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council that in his opinion it would be very difficult to force trucks to re-route from the Burr exit to the Renfro exit. But, in his words, "Good luck."

Council members told Ford that they would consider his suggestions and see what could be done. In the last year alone, three trucks have gone out of control on the hill, and one man was critically injured when his Pepsi Cola truck slammed into the roof of a Stewart Fertilizer storage building.

In other business, Mayor Elizabeth Baker recommended that the council renew the boat dock lease with Jimmy Hale, although they had voted in recent months not to do so.

Mayor Baker explained that Hale had agreed to give either an oral report or written report to the council concerning matters at the boat dock each month.

Baker said that Hale would pay \$1,400 a year for the lease and \$1.00 for each boat launched into the lake.

City water superintendent Matt Powell told the council that Henry Falin's daughter wanted water to be hooked up to her trailer, which was located on Falin's property on Cave Ridge Road. Powell said that when the line went through, Falin did not want water on his property and he did not pay for any of the costs of the line. He asked the council what should be charged Falin's daughter for hooking her trailer up to the main.

Powell explained that in the past, former Mayor Roland Mullins would not allow residents who had not paid to help get the line laid, to hook up for the regular fees. But, Clontz told the council that once the line was laid anyone wanting to hook on could do so for the regular fee. "I told Roland that he couldn't do that, but evidently he did," Clontz said.

The council voted to allow the line to be hooked up for the normal fee outside the city limits, which is \$150 and a \$25 deposit.

Mt. Vernon Fire Chief John Cox and Sergeant Kevin Fletcher approached the council concerning a new fire station, which would be built on the lot the city recently purchased from Billy Hiatt next to the Sears building on Main Street.

Cox and Fletcher said that they were under the impression that a \$100,000 loan from the Farmers Home Administration might be available to fund the construction of a new fire station.

The chief said that it was his department's hopes that they would be able to build a 60 x 100 building on the site with three bays for their trucks.

Mayor Baker said that she would look into the matter and try and find out where an application could be obtained for the loan. Apparently the interest rate on the loan would be no more than 1 to 1 1/2 percent over a forty year period.

Finally, the council held the second reading of ordinance 187, which will change the meeting time of the council to 7 p.m. each 2nd Monday of the month. Presently the council meets at 7:30 on the 2nd Monday.

Even before the Mt. Vernon City Council could get their regular monthly meeting under way Monday night sparks flew over the proposed annexation of the Burr interchange area south of Mt. Vernon.

Larry Dale Carter, manager of the Best Western Motel at Burr and city councilman Joe Martin strongly disagreed over a petition that Carter presented to the council after the meeting began.

Carter said that Martin had done a poll of his own before the last council meeting and that the poll was not accurate. "You just had some names on a piece of paper with names and no heads there," Carter said. "This is an authentic petition, with people's signatures and the dates when they signed it."

One who held a question to their head, Carter said, Martin's petition indicated 39 residents for annexation and 19 opposing.

Spring fire season well underway

The official Spring fire hazard season began March 1, in Kentucky, but it actually began a lot earlier for local Forest Ranger Steve Bullen.

Bullen said Monday that during the month of February eight fires broke out in Rockcastle County, burning many acres of private forest land. The biggest burned some 25 acres near the Salt Petre Cave area.

While the cause of most of the fires was purely unintentional, Bullen said that three of the fires, started near the cave area, were at the hands of an arsonist.

"People get drunk, strung out on dope or cocaine and they just want to see the forest burn, no matter how much damage it causes or how much money it takes to put one out," Bullen said.

The penalty for setting fires in the woods, if found guilty, is a one to five year stint in the state penitentiary or a \$10,000 fine or both, if the incident is severe enough, according to Bullen, who said that his department had a suspect in the burnings. "If we give them enough rope they'll hang themselves," Bullen said.

Last year alone over 1200 acres of forest land burned in Rockcastle and Bullen said that the Spring fire season, which ends April 15, is worse because of

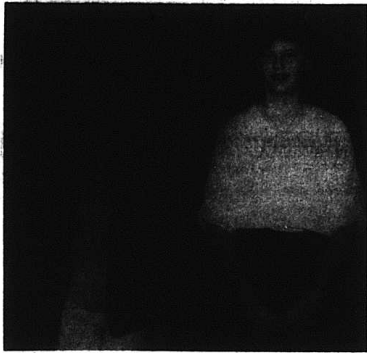

County this week to meet with members of the local literacy council. The meeting held at the local public library provided members of the council the opportunity to discuss some of their concerns and ideas for the future with Mrs. Beshear.

According to the 1980 Census Report, Rockcastle County has 53 percent of its citizens, 25 years of age and older, who do not have their high school credentials. Mrs. Beshear stated, "However, because of the commitment and hard work of many individuals, as of the first of this year, there were 14 students enrolled in the literacy program here."

Significant progress has been made in the battle against illiteracy in Kentucky over the past two years. The Kentucky Literacy Commission established the goal of having literacy programs and councils in all 120 of Kentucky's counties by January of 1988," said Mrs. Beshear. "I am proud to say that as of today, we have funded programs in 112 counties of which Rockcastle County is one."

Mrs. Beshear added that

because of the accomplishments that have been made, Kentucky is being looked at as a model by other states who are trying to attack the problem of illiteracy in their own states.

"However, we still have much more work to do to combat the devastating problem of under education in our state and make a positive impact on the lives of the citizens of our Commonwealth," Mrs. Beshear added.

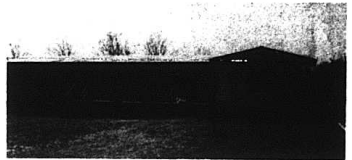

cess: Fearless leader. Ike Adams who manages the Teen Center got lost. He didn't just make one wrong turn. Before arriving at Memorial Coliseum after the game had started, Ike had turned around seventeen times.

"We drove by this one store so many times that I finally asked him to stop so I could go in and buy a jacket," said Sherri Lewis, a sophomore at Rockcastle County High. I told him he could stop and pick me up the next time he went by that store," she said jokingly.

He kept saying he knew where he was going," said Kevin Falin, a seventh grader from Mt. Vernon Elementary. "I kept telling him to shut up cause he knew where he was going," said Kevin. "He did finally stop and holler at someone on the sidewalk and come to find out, we'd already drove right by the gym once already."

Most of the group had never been to downtown Lexington though and many of them said they enjoyed the drive through town more than they did the ballgame. And everybody said

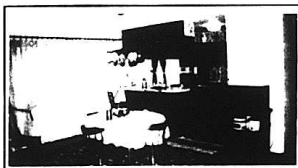

Rocket boys, girls knocked out of district

Boys lose to Oneida 79-74

The Rockets' game with Oneida last Wednesday night told their season's tale. Twenty-seven minutes of fundamental basketball. Five minutes of self destruction.

Leading the Mountaineers 55-51 early in the fourth quarter, the Rockets gave up two steals, missed an open layup and threw an interception for a three point play in only four minutes.

That translated into a 20-8 power run for Oneida, enough for the Mountaineers to avenge an earlier loss to the Rockets and remove them from the 49th District Tournament.

Oneida 79, Rocketville 74. Season over.

"We had three or four turnovers there in a row," said Rocket coach David Perkins about a similar slide in the third quarter.

"We broke down on offense. But overall, I thought we played a pretty good basketball game."

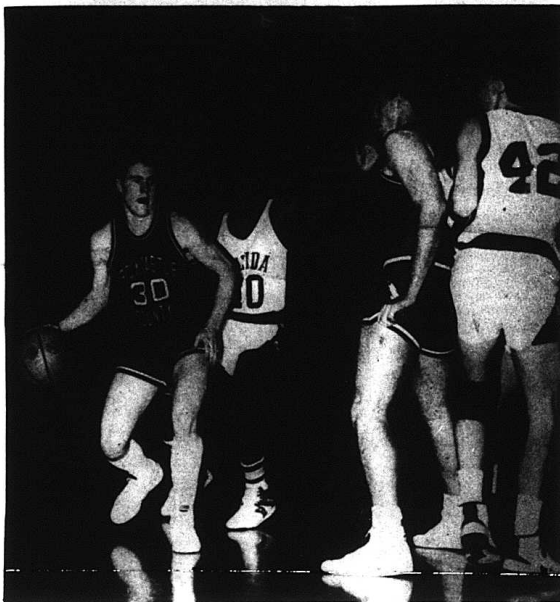
Sadly, the Rockets again snatched defeat from the jaws of victory. Ironically, that has been the story line on the Rockets since they beat Oneida in the "basket brawl" game on Jan. 16.

That victory improved the Rockets' record to 6-4, but they were never again that sharp, never that complete. They played superbly, at times, putting together strong quarters and halves, but never whole games.

Remove five minute dead spells from their games, stemming primarily from an inability to handle backcourt pressure, and the Rockets might have finished around 12-12 instead of 7-17.

"When we played them the first time we played a better defensive game," said junior Pat Hanson, who finished with 12 points. "Tonight we had a left guard. The first time we were down for both halves."

Senior Kris Ponder led the Rockets with 21 points on 8 of 10 shooting, 17 points coming in the second half. Ponder and senior Johnny Kirby, who finished with 16, were chosen to the 13-player All Tournament Team.

Juniors Shannon Burton and Jon Bullens each had seven and Bulls pulled down a game high 16 rebounds. Junior Anthony Lewis coming back from an ankle injury, added six points.

Oneida, playing without its leading scorer, Bill Gibson, because of school disciplinary reasons, got strong halves from Tim Finley and Eric Miller. Finley scored 17 first half points to finish with 25. Miller had eight points down the stretch, including the three-point play, to end up with 19.

"I think Oneida is a better team without Gibson," Perkins said. "They played a lot better without him."

Said Oneida coach Larry Grifton, "Everybody has done a little more of their job. The guy who really has come on late was Miller. He's playing like a senior now."

At least for Perkins, though, the night gave new meaning to the phrase "tournament" atmosphere. His wife Becky gave birth to Brittany Nicole at 6:28 p.m. at the Somerset Hospital. Perkins said he stayed in the hospital for three or four weeks, but is heading back to Rockcastle for the team's 4 p.m. tip-off.

Unfortunately, that was the only celebration. Perkins said he never had that night. The Rockets

trailing 36-32 at the half, but behind 11 points by Ponder, pulled down at 51 going into the fourth quarter.

But after the Rockets scored the first two baskets of the fourth quarter by Lewis and Ponder, Oneida guard Terry Sizemore stole the ball from Ponder for a layup, beginning the decisive scoring run.

Four minutes later, Miller missed off a pass, hit the layup and he was called for blocking. The foul now increased Oneida's lead to 57-43.

There were a couple of late plays in the game," Grifton said. "The three-point play by Miller was the breaker."

Change in defense nearly wins it for Lady Rockets

A simple adjustment in the Lady Rockets' zone defense last Wednesday night nearly toppled the state's 15th-ranked team.

The game film of the Feb. 12 loss to Jackson County revealed two things to Lady Rocket coach Preston Parrett and assistant Judy Bullock. The Lady Generals tend to pound the ball in the lane while shying away from the corner shots.

By pulling a player up high in the middle of the Rockets' 3-2 zone, they took away Jackson's inside game, forcing the ball to the baseline. The result? Jackson never led by more than nine points in escaping with a 47-44 win in the 49th District Tournament.

Of course the Rockets' 59 percent shooting (19-32) didn't hurt their upset bid. But take away 11 first-half turnovers and a couple of blown layups and the Lady Rockets might be playing in the 13th Region this week.

"I thought we had it all through the game," said a tearful Lori Mink, who led the Rockets with 14 points on 7 of 9 shooting. "Coming up here I told my mom, 'I feel good about it. I think we can do it.'"

The Rockets' optimism entering the game had nothing to do with their 55-point loss to the Generals on Jan. 25. Rather, the regular-season rematch here in February, when they trailed by only eight points late in the game, is what caused Jackson coaches to lose sleep.

"They were loose," said Parrett, who had just coached his last basketball game. "We had another factor in our favor. Jackson County had to travel a long distance over crooked roads to get here."

The loss ended the Rockets' season at 5-14. Mink and junior Rhonda Cobb, who finished with

The Lady Rockets hit 9 of 12 first-half shots, but turnovers limited their number of field goal attempts. The Generals' largest lead of the game came midway through the second quarter when senior Lisa Harris' basket put them up 20-11.

Meanwhile, the Rockets never allowed the Generals to pull away, trailing 26-19 at the half and 33-25 at the end of the third quarter. With just under six minutes left in the game and the Generals threatening to pull away, Fine and Mink hit back-to-back jumpers to pull the Rockets within three, 37-34.

"We were trying to be patient and it did pay off," Mink said. "It paid off real well."

Hunter hit both ends of a bonus to keep the Rockets within three with 3:39 left. Jackson's lead went back up to seven on a baseline turnaround by senior Sandy Kilburn, but the rockets scored six points in the last 30 seconds.

"Everytime you lose, it's very disappointing," Parrett said. "But the kids fought hard and I'm proud of that."

High men's series went to Henry Vanzant with a 592. Bill Reynolds had a 581 and Jim Cromer a 572.

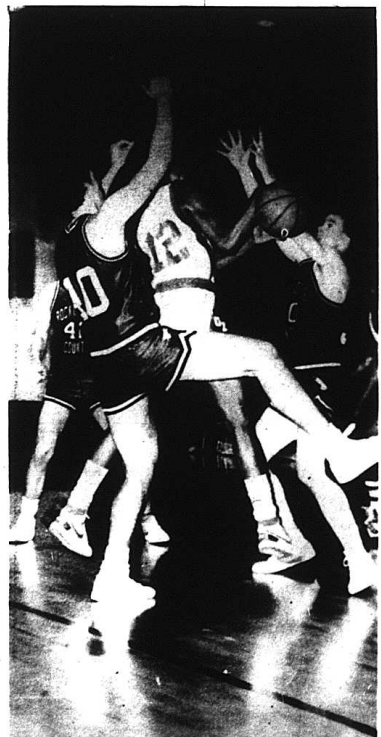

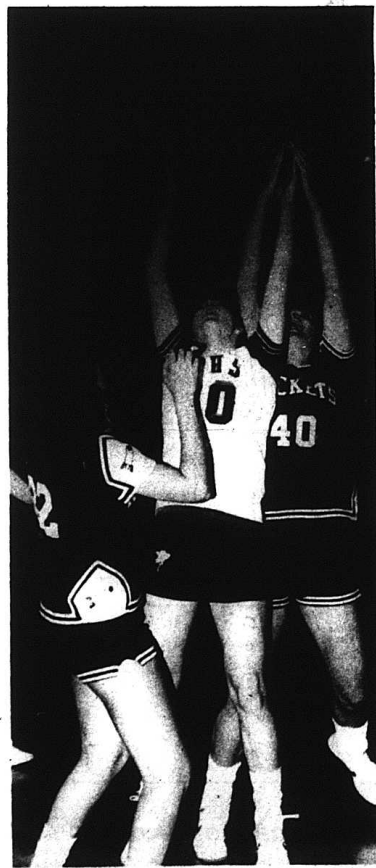

An Oneida player goes for a rebound between the Rockets' Doug Cox and Anthony Lewis last Wednesday.



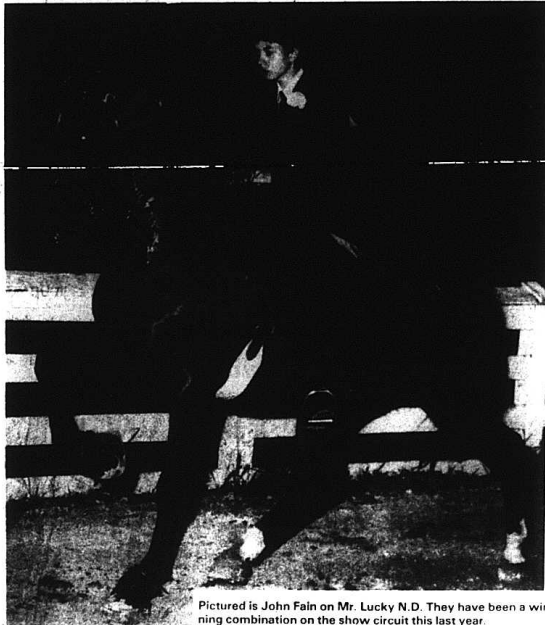
