DIET WITH CHARACTER HAS STARCH AND FIBER

You're probably tired of health experts telling you what you can't eat. If so, here's a recommendation you'll like from UK's College of Agriculture: Eat more foods with starch and fiber.

As a complex carbohydrate, starch provides energy for the body. Starchy foods provide essential vitamins and minerals as well as an important nonnutrient, dietary fiber. Fiber, Grandma called it "roughage"—furnishes bulk in the diet that helps the digestive system work properly.

Many people think that starchy foods such as bread and potatoes are fattening. In fact, most of the calories come from the company they keep—caloric-rich additives such as butter, margarine, sour cream, grape, jam and jelly. March is National Nutrition Month, and a good time to check your diet for starch and fiber.

How often do you eat the foods listed here, in the amounts specified?

- *Several servings of breads, cereals, pasta or rice

- *Starchy vegetables like potatoes, corn, peas or dishes made with dry beans or peas.

- *Whole-grain breads or cereals

- *Several servings of vegetables

- *Whole fruit with skins and seeds (berries, apples, pears, for example)

- *The best answer for all of the above is "almost daily"

Breads, cereals, and other grain products and fleshy vegetables provide starch. Whole grain products, fruits and vegetables, especially those with edible skins and seeds, are good sources of fiber.

Beans and other legumes are good sources of both starch and fiber, perhaps explaining a renewed interest in them. Plus, they play a dual role in a varied diet by providing protein as well. Try them in salads, dips and main dishes, as well as soup.

CAPITAL HILL BEAN SOUP
1 1/2 cups dry pea (navy) beans
3 cups boiling water
1 small ham hock
1 medium potato, pared
1 cup onion, chopped

- 1 cup celery stalks and leaves, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons parsley, chopped
- 1/2 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon pepper

Add beans to boiling water. Return to boil and boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and soak overnight in refrigerator. Add ham hock and potato. Bring to boil, and boil gently 1 hour. Remove potato, mash with a fork. Stir into beans with remaining ingredients. Cook 1 hour longer. Remove ham hock and separate meat from skin, fat and bone. Cut meat into small pieces and add to soup. Heat to serving temperature.

Makes 8 servings, about 1 cup each. 165 calories and 234 milligrams of sodium per serving.

RENOVATING GRASS FIELDS

Why renovate grass fields? There are several reasons why pasture and hay fields which have a good stand of grass should be renovated. The primary ground cover on most of Kentucky's acreage are cool season grasses, such as tall fescue, orchard grass, bluegrass and timothy. By adding legumes to grasses, there is an increase in the quality of feed produced, legumes increase the summer production and legumes take nitrogen from the air.

In Kentucky, productive alfalfa stands can fix 200 to 300 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year. Red clover can fix 100-200 pounds, ladino clover 100-150 pounds, vetch, Korean lespedeza and other annual forage legumes can fix 75-150 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year. This is possible because of bacteria on properly inoculated seed which infests the roots of legume plants, supply energy to their positive effect on palatability, intake, digestibility, protein and mineral content. A beneficial effect is also found on companion grasses which increase their yield by taking advantage of the nitrogen produced by legumes. We also find that most growth of cool season grasses occur during the first one-third of the growing

season. About 50 percent of the land untreated. This means a good grass stand will remain in the renovated field. Even with Paraquat (Gramoxone), grass growth should be controlled by a combination of grazing and clipping. Follow label instructions as to when grazing can be started after use of the chemical.

- Seeding rates, in pounds per acre, for renovating are: white clover, 1-3; red clover, 8-12; annual lespedeza, 20-25; alfalfa, 12-20; in combinations with clover, 1-2, and red clover, 4-6; alfalfa, 8-10; and ladina white clover, 1/2-1.

Girls Scouts celebrate 75th anniversary here

The first Girl Scout troop in Rockcastle County was organized about 1928 by Miss Helen Orth. Miss Orth came to Mt. Vernon from Washington, D.D. to work as a nurse at Langdon School. She became our first county health nurse.

Some members of this first Girl Scout troop were: Julia Floyd Taylor; Annie Faris, and her sister Elizabeth, Martha Griffith, Marguerite Brown, Ruby Riddle, Jennie Marr Hansel and Marguerite McDaniels.

This troop raised money to build a camp at Beach Bottom on the Rockcastle River. About 1935, Mrs. Dorothy Huff Landrum reorganized the Girl

Scouts and formed troop number 1. There were just two age groups at this time—Intermediate Scouts and Senior Scouts. Over a ten year period Mrs. Landrum enlisted the help of a number of adult assistants to name just a few, Mrs. Katie Phillips, Mrs. Amanda Maggard, Mrs. Mollie Bryant, Mrs. Johnny Rowe, Nina Cox and Mrs. Bernice Cox.

One of the highlights for a group of scouts during this period was a trip to Mammoth Cave. They traveled on a school bus and stopped in Bardston to visit My Old Kentucky Home, Mrs. Landrum has a Troop Log recording this event. Also a number of scouts traveled by train to a Girl Scout Camp called Camp O' Cumberland at Harlan.

The next period of Girl Scouting in Rockcastle might be called the "On Again," "Off

Again" period. During these ten years, several attempts were made to continue Girl Scout troops in our county. Most successful at this time was Mrs. Joyce Henderson assisted at various times by Mrs. Allene Davis, Miss Barbara Davis, Mrs. Joyce Baker and Mrs. Lovene Sowder.

Around 1965 the Girl Scout story in Rockcastle began another chapter. For the first time, troops were registered with the Wilderness Road Girl Scout Council in Lexington. The National Girl Scout program had been received and we now had four age levels: Brownie, Junior, Cadette and Senior. A lot of enthusiasm and a lot of work went into the formation of these new troops and a lot of fun was had by all.

A most recent review of Girl Scouting in Rockcastle County for 1987 is another new age level called the Daisies, which is for kindergarten to 5 year olds. There are troops at Roundstone, Livingston and Mt. Vernon. We would like to see one at Brookhead in the near future. There are 10 troops ranging from Daisy to Senior Scouts with a total of 109 girls and adults registered with Wilderness Road Council. In September 1986 Wilderness Road moved into their new council building which is very nice and very much needed. Among the leaders are Regina Hodge, Donna Brewer and Iris Parker at Livingston; Gaylan Settle and Mrs. Vernon, Kathy Geffrey and Anita Todd at Roundstone. We are very proud of all our Girl Scouts of Rockcastle County.

county can put matching money to obtain a grant.

"The county just doesn't have the money at this time to put up funds, so they decided to withdraw funds for this fiscal year," according to Brenda Robinson of the EMS in Frankfort.

She said the local ambulance service could probably receive the money after the start of the new fiscal year since there is the need in Rockcastle for another ambulance.

The service now has two primary and one back-up ambulance. The county should have three primary ambulance and one back-up.

The last ambulance purchased by the local service cost \$26,500 according to Vernon Sowder ambulance service director if meeting the EMS would furnish \$10,000 to the county, \$10,000 and the ambulance service the remainder or there could be some other financial arrangement.

father-in-law started building on a house at Brookhead. By the time Parrett and his wife were sent to court at Livingston the next year the basement was completed. They decided to stay there finishing the house when they saved enough money driving to Livingston every day.

"A lot of time you would go home and come back for a game," Parrett said. "And you have two games a week. That would be seven times a week and I practiced on Saturdays and on holidays. It's been an awful lot of trips."

In Parrett's first year at Livingston James Baker the principal, asked Parrett to help with the B-team. When the Blue Devils' coach departed the next season, Parrett stepped in, his next 18 years accounted for.

"I would take a group of people I didn't think was as talented as the rest of the county and produce a hard-fighting team," said Billy Riddle, who coached against Parrett at Brookhead and later with him at the high school. "He was a very devoted person to his school and his team."

Strangely, the games people recall most quickly when asked about Parrett are the ones most of keeping with his character. Riddle remembers the night at Onaida in the District Tournament when Parrett protested a call a little too heatedly and was ejected.

Riddle ran back and forth between the locker room and the court, keeping Parrett updated on the score. As unusual as it was for Parrett to be ejected, Riddle said it showed how willingly he "stuck up for his kids."

Parrett once broke a clipboard on the court at Gina Ruppert. Reynolds fouled out early in a game at Anville. "It scared us because he never acted like that before," said Reynolds, who was a sophomore in Parrett's first year at the high school.

"The players bought Parrett a new clipboard for Christmas," Reynolds said.

It was Parrett's devotion to his players and his open-door policy which earned him his nickname, "Dad," coined by the players. When Debbie Bowman was injured in a game several years ago, Parrett was the last one to leave the hospital; assistant coach Judy Bullock said.

"If we wanted to talk to him we knew we could," Reynolds said. "We knew where to go."

"I think he has really had good rapport with the kids," Bullock said. "We try to treat every kid as our own."

Parrett never rally thought of himself as intimidating, considering that he's an ex-Marine and all, but he said boys "never did argue with me much." He admits he has mellowed some from his early days at Livingston.

"You have got to have a heart

somewhere along the line," he said. "Maybe when I first started I didn't have much of a heart. You soften up as the years go along. Kids make mistakes and you have to overlook them."

When present, Parrett can't come up with a most memorable game. Best players? That's different. The father-daughter combination of Paul and Theresa Stungill quickly comes to mind. Paul Stungill scored more than 3,500 points for Parrett at Livingston, and Theresa holds the all-time scoring record at Rockcastle with 991 points.

A coach knows he has been in the game a while when he has seen a girl make the same shots her father did years ago.

Parrett plans to fill the void in his life left by basketball with some of his other hobbies. Instead of breaking down defenses, Parrett will dismantle lawn mower engines and put them back together. He also likes gardening and working around the house.

He especially enjoys spending time with his two grandsons, eight-year-old Devin Preston and seven-month-old De Jan, the children of his oldest daughter La Joy Graves. Parrett coached his youngest daughter, Tanya, at the high school this season.

"Basketball has sort of been my life," Parrett says.

Money, Taxes and Children
In the past, children have provided taxpayers with some very good tax sheltering opportunities. Investments in a child's name, setting up a short-term trust, or having the child work in the parent's business were common tax-cutting strategies. The 1986 Tax Reform Act makes significant changes in how children can be used to cut the total family tax bill.

To begin with, children will no longer get a double personal exemption as they have in the past. A child who can be claimed as a dependent on his parents' return may not take an exemption for himself on his own tax return.

Children are entitled to use the standard deduction which will allow them in 1987 to earn up to \$2,540 without paying tax. That increases to \$3,000 in 1988. However, unearned income of children under the age of 14 is subject to special rules. The first \$500 is tax-free, the next \$500 is taxed at the lowest tax rate, and any additional unearned income is taxed to the child as the parent's highest tax rate. Furthermore, the unearned investment income (RUBIC) reduces the standard deduction that can be applied against earned income.

Short-term Clifford trusts no longer work as income-splitting vehicles. Trusts set up after February 1986 will generally have the income taxed to the person who set up the trust. Even for trusts that were established before March 1, 1986, the under-18 earner income rules apply to any income distributions.

There are some alternatives parents should consider in trying to use children to cut the family tax bill. Tax-qualified investments might be shifted from income-producing to growth investments that could be sold when the child reaches fourteen. Tax-exempt municipal bonds, tax-deferred U.S. Series EE Savings Bonds, and life insurance products with tax-deferral features are other possibilities for a child's investments. If you're a business owner, having your children work for you is still a good way to shelter income.

City Council hires new policeman

Larry Thompson, 32, of Brookhead, was hired as a fulltime city policeman during a called meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday.

Thompson is currently an employee at the Rockcastle County jail and has been a military policeman.

His employment was effective Tuesday. He agreed to stay at least two years as a city policeman.

Thompson replaces Jeff Abney who resigned effective Tuesday.

During the meeting businessman Oscar Fain asked the council to question transient merchants who sell off trucks to make sure they are bonded with the county clerk before issuing them city privilege licenses.

Fain said transients do not pay taxes in the city as do local merchants. He said the consumer also suffers because transients leave the area and consumers cannot find it when the product they buy is flawed.

The council agreed to discuss the matter at the regular meeting of the council on April 13. The council will take repairs will be made to the pumphouse at the city sewer plant following an out-of-control blast in January that cracked the foundation, broke windows and damaged the roof.

Contractor Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio will make the repairs. Blasting was being done to install a clarifier at the new \$1.9 million plant when the blast occurred. The council will also have a first reading of the sewer usage ordinance at the April meeting.

An increase in sewer rates is expected that will take care of the bonds the city will issue for its share of the cost of the sewer plant renovation.

The city received a \$1,443,305 federal grant for the project. The city share is \$481,102.

Mayor Baker said final figures on rates have not been determined but would be before the April meeting.

Moore sentenced

Marijuana "factory" found in vacant house

While searching for a lost airplane, members of the Rockcastle County Rescue Squad were informed that a "Marijuana factory" was in the neighborhood.

However, State Police Sergeant Ron Sears said Tuesday that the state police had been notified by an informant of the so called factory. "I think the local sheriff's office had also been informed about the house," Sears said.

The house in question is

located adjacent to the Big Sandy Gun and Rifle Club's swimming pool, which is in the Scaffold Cane section of the county, according to Sears, who said that a search warrant was obtained before officers went into the house.

Once inside the house officers found about 80 styrofoam cups, some of which had plants in them and others that had only dirt and seeds.

"We have not run a test on

the plants to find out what they are for sure, but we think it is marijuana," the sergeant said.

Sears explained that this is the time of year when growers get their crops ready "just like a farmer, you might say."

The windows on the house were boarded up and the inside of the small frame structure was lined with black plastic. Sears said "Whoever was using the house did not want anyone to be

Sears said that Trooper Alan Lewis is heading the investigation and that no arrests have been made.

The only opposition Miller could have would have to be through a write in candidate. Mrs. Hink said.

With Cummins withdrawing only two local races will appear on the ballot in the primary. Incumbent Commisnoworth, Attorney Beorn, Han is opposed by Robert Gellan.

Mt. Vernon Mayor Elizabeth Baker is opposed by Jackie R. Reiner.

Coach Preston Parrett 'throws in the towel'

The drive between Preston Parrett's home in Brookhead and Livingston Elementary School has taken the retiring basketball coach 33 years to complete.

Since 1954 Parrett has driven the 32 miles across the county and back, once so deep in basketball thought that he made it all the way home before realizing he had lost his wife, Alene, at Livingston.

But for the 58-year-old Parrett, who announced his retirement early in February, the milestones he has passed aren't just the ones along U.S. 150 and U.S. 25. The ones he'll never forget are the games and players and seasons which have filled a lifetime of coaching.

The Lady Rocketts' 46-49 loss to Jackson County two weeks ago will go down as his last. No more bus trips, no more Saturday practices, no more knocking on

locker room doors to make sure all the girls are out.

"It's like giving up an arm and a leg," said Parrett last week, while checking in the last of his players' uniforms. "It's something I've done for 33 years and I'll surely miss it."

Parrett coached the boys' high school team at Livingston for 18 years before the four county schools consolidated in 1972. With the introduction of girls' basketball, Parrett took over Livingston's 7th and 8th grade team in 1974 and the high school team a year later.

Parrett has no idea what his lifetime high school record in the 33 years of games seem to me together after a while. But his grade school record, perhaps the

biggest tribute to Parrett's coaching, is a different story.

Parents and players have tossed around the 164-8 record, spanning 12 seasons, so much that Parrett couldn't forget it if he tried. That record also includes a string of 69 consecutive victories.

The trip actually began more than 45 years ago when a neighbor nailed one hoop to a pine tree and another to an oak for Parrett, then a grade schooler at Bond in Jackson County.

The neighbor was Jerry Hackey, later a coach at Anville High School and Parrett's basketball mentor. "He was always sort of a guiding light for me," Parrett said. "I sort of patterned after him."

Parrett, a self-described "good defensive man, good rebounder," played high school basketball at Tyrer, four years during his 1946-50 stint in the Marine Corps and two years at Sue Bennett College.

He weighed in at 159 pounds as a light-heavyweight boxer in the Marines' "smokers," three-round Friday night bouts which Parrett modestly says he won more than he lost. His prominent nose, however, isn't the result of a punch, but three elbows received during his basketball days.

He met Mrs. Parrett at Sue Bennett, and finished his education the next year at Union. He and Mrs. Parrett were married the summer before taking over the two-room school at Fairview. Parrett taught the upper grades. Mrs. Parrett the lower.

The board should choose someone that is qualified and interested enough to do a good job.

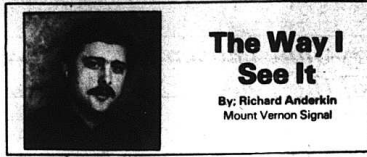
It seems to me that Earl Cummins would be the obvious choice. Earl, who is a former

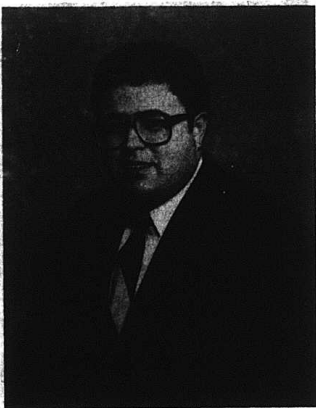

The maximum purchase prices are \$53,000 for a previously occupied residence, \$58,000 for a new house located in a designated county, including Rockcastle and \$56,000 for a newly constructed house in the remainder of the state.

All loans must be FHA-insured or VA-guaranteed. The loan term is 25 years. Monies for this program are allocated on an "open window" basis.

John said, "We love Him, because He first loved us" [1 John 4:19]. Love reciprocates itself; it is not passive! It is a sad truth, but most of mankind has never realized "true love." Bumper stickers declare, "Honk, if you love Jesus." Jesus answers, "If you love me, keep my commandments" [John 14:15]. Will we ever see a bumper sticker that reads: "Be baptized if you love Jesus?" [Mark 16:16].

True love is a devoted love. It causes men to act in demonstration of their love. "Let us not love in word, neither in tongue, but in deed and in truth" [1 John 3:18]. 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Go Boy's Country Jake selected as Kentucky Walking Horse of the Year

Cecil King and Go Boy's Country Jake are two names that people in the walking horse industry won't soon forget.

It was announced recently that Go Boy's Country Jake was selected the "Walking Horse of the Year" by the Kentucky Walking and Racking Association.

"This is a great honor when you consider that your peers are the ones that select the recipient of this award," Go Boy's owner King said last Saturday.

Go Boy's Country Jake is King's prize-winning 22-year-old Tennessee Walking Horse. The gelding is also a two-time world champion. In 1973 and again in 1979 he received that honor.

Besides Go Boy's Country Jake, King trains and shows four other horses of his own and also owns an interest in two other horses. All seven horses stand at his stable on U.S. 150 in Rockcastle County near the Lincoln County line.

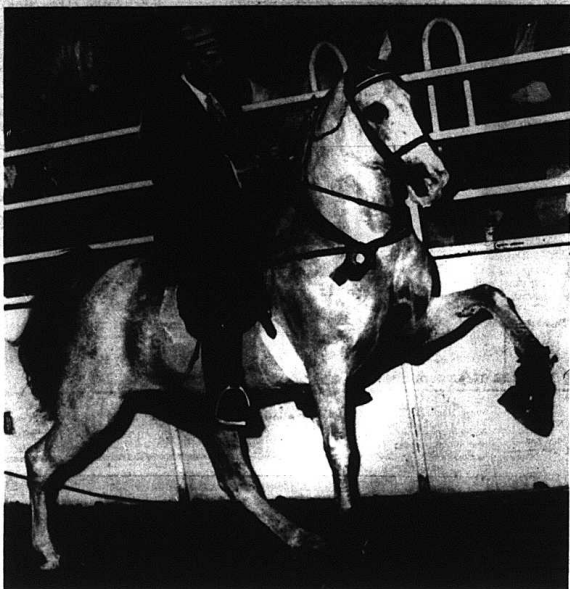
When King talks about Go Boy's Country Jake he can't help but smile. "Like all my horses but he's definitely my favorite," King said.

Go Boy's Country Jake is King's favorite for obvious reasons.

Besides being named Walking Horse of the Year, Go Boy's Country Jake also earned the High Points award from the Kentucky Walking Horse Owners Association and the National Walking Horse Owners Association.

The points were earned by King and his horse in the category of "Amateur owned and trained."

King explained that points are awarded based on how high a

horse finishes in the class at a horse show. Last year King showed Go Boy's Country Jake 23 times, and won 17 times with him. He also finished a second and third several times.

All together, King traveled to 31 horse shows across the state. In only two of those shows was Go Boy's Country Jake not present.

For the last two years King has shown Go Boy's Country Jake in the "amateur owned and trained category," and he plans to show him in that category again this year when he makes his 1987 debut at the Morehead Agriculture Show April 10 and 11.

"You get out of it what you put into it," King said. "We ride horses out here every night, even if there is a big show on."

He shows all of his own horses and feeds them twice a day. "Of course Carolyn (his wife) is a big help and Jeff (his son) also helps out when needed," he noted. He also has a daughter Vicki.

Showing horses is not an inexpensive hobby. King said that last year he averaged spending about \$100 a night when showing a horse. "You have to pay for gas, eats and entry fees, it can run into a lot of money," he said.

But, King explained that good horses like Go Boy's Country Jake can earn a lot of prize money. Last year his 22-year-old favorite captured over \$1,800 in greenbacks.

Eddie Carter, a former professional walking horse trainer and now a horse show judge, said that, "The amazing thing about Go Boy's Country Jake is the fact that he is 22 years old and he is a consistent winner on the show circuit. The horse has a lot of

heart." Carter, who is a former professional trainer, lives in Stanford. He said that King has shown Go Boy's Country Jake in the toughest show circuit in the country outside of middle Tennessee. "We live in a virtual hot bed of tough competition, you can go to as many as three shows on any given Saturday night during the summer show season," Carter said. "It is amazing that Go Boy's Country Jake still beats all of the younger competition the way he does. Most show horses are in their prime when they are 5 to 10 years old," Carter said.

Carter once trained Go Boy's Country Jake himself. "Cecil has been good for Go Boy's Country Jake. He had almost been forgotten about when Cecil bought him and began training himself," Carter said.

King admits that he is only an amateur trainer. But, Carter a man that should know, says, "Cecil is one of the top amateur trainers in the state."

Besides his five horses, King owns horses with Keith Smith and Larry Doyle of Broedhead. King says that the three of them plan to show their horses a lot this year and have high hopes. Smith breeds Tennessee Walkers on his farm between Mt. Vernon and Broedhead.

In other action the commission established two deer hunting zones for the state's upcoming deer gun season set to open the second Saturday in November (Nov. 14) in zones one through seven. Zone eight will open Nov. 19 and zone nine will open Nov. 21. The season will close Nov. 23 in all zones.

Kentucky Lake giving up crappie

Limits of 60 crappie have been reported taken by some anglers in a four-hour period. Large catches of "slab-sized" crappie are being harvested in water from 6-30 feet deep over submerged cover.

Facts about diabetes

What do you know about diabetes? Few know exactly what it is or how it is treated. Many think that having diabetes means a person can no longer enjoy eating, playing, or parting. For many, they think of going blind or having a leg amputated. These are complications of uncontrolled diabetes. Therefore, the discovery that one has diabetes is upsetting or depressing and often one may feel a loss of freedom.

You have diabetes when the body cannot use or make enough insulin. Insulin is a hormone made by the beta cells of the pancreas, a gland which sits behind the stomach. Insulin helps get blood sugar to the cells for energy. Some sugar also goes to the liver and muscles for storage and future use.

When you have diabetes, sugar builds up in the blood rather than going to the cells. When the kidneys can no longer handle this extra sugar, it spills into the urine and is lost. Since the cells are not getting the sugar they need, you may feel very thirsty, tired or dizzy, you may lose weight or

urinate frequently. These are the early signs of diabetes.

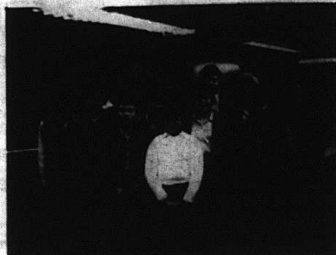
Diabetes is a hereditary disease. If both parents have diabetes, all their children, if they live long enough, will eventually develop the disease. If a person with diabetes marries one with no inherited tendency to the disease, none of the children will have diabetes although they will carry the recessive trait and in turn pass it on to their own children.

Diabetes is a public health problem. It occurs in 1 out of 55 persons and accounts for about 60 percent of patients in hospitals. The treatment can be expensive. It is very significant that diabetes is found before complications begin. An uncontrolled diabetic is more prone to have poor circulation, nerve damage, gum disease, blindness, strokes, heart attacks and kidney failure.

The Rockcastle County Health Center has a diabetic program. We do screening for diabetes by pricking the finger, getting a drop of blood and determining your blood glucose level by a machine called an acetohex. If your glucose

level is below or above 60 mg - 120 mg, it is repeated or you are referred to the doctor. Diabetics who are under medical supervision are maintained, counseled on the disease, diet, medicine, weight, exercise, and general hygiene at the health department. We are also in the process of making plans to do eye examinations for diabetics.

With diabetes, you manage your body's use of sugar.

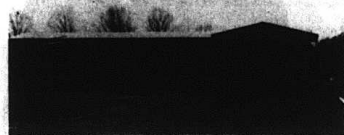

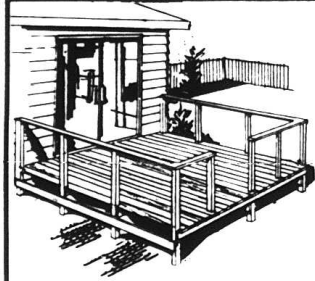

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
