(g) Any wastewater containing fats or oils of animal or plant origin, whether emulsified or not, in excess of three hundred (300) mg/l.

(h) Any garbage that has not been properly shredded.

(i) Any waters or wastes containing acid, from pickling wastes, or concentrated plating solutions whether neutralized or not.

(j) Any water or waste containing the following chemical constituents or similar objectionable or toxic substances that exceed the following limits:

Boron	1.0
Cadmium	0.01
Chromium (Hexavalent)	0.05
Copper	0.2
Cyanide (HCN)	0.1
Iron	5.0
Lead	0.1

(k) Any waters or wastes containing phenols or other objectionable substances, in such concentrations as to exceed limits necessary to meet the requirement of the state or federal agencies for discharge to the receiving waters.

(l) Any radioactive wastes or isotopes of such half life or concentration as may exceed limits established in compliance with applicable state or federal regulations.

(m) Materials which exert or cause:

(1) Unusual concentrations of inert suspended solids (such as, but not limited to, sodium chloride and sodium sulfate)

(2) Excessive discoloration (such as, but not limited to, dairy wastes, dye wastes, and vegetable tanning solution).

(3) Unusual BOD, COD, or chlorine demand in such quantities as to constitute a significant load on the wastewater treatment plant.

(4) Unusual volume of flow or concentration of wastes constituting slugs as defined herein.

(n) Waters or wastes containing substances which are not amenable to treatment or reduction by the wastewater treatment process employed, or are amenable to only such degree that the wastewater treatment plant effluent cannot meet the requirements of other agencies having jurisdiction over discharge to the receiving waters.

5.4 Grease, oil, and sand interceptors shall be provided when, in the opinion of the City, they are necessary for the proper handling of liquid wastes containing grease in excessive amounts, or any flammable wastes, sand, or other harmful ingredients except that such interceptors shall not be required for private living quarters or dwelling units. All interceptors shall be of a type and capacity approved by the City and shall be located so as to be readily and easily accessible for inspection. All interceptors shall be furnished, installed, and maintained by the Owner, at his expense, in continuously efficient operation at all times.

5.5 Wastes from garbage grinders shall not be discharged into a public sewer except properly shredded garbage from:

(a) Residential customers generated in the preparation of foods, and

(b) Other commercial, industrial or institutional customers which have received written permission from the City and who agree to abide by whatever requirements necessary to protect the system and to enable determination of equitable charges or fees based on waste characteristics.

Garbage grinders shall not be used for grinding paper products, plastics, yard and garden refuse, or other materials classified as solid wastes.

5.6 All measurements, tests, and analyses of the characteristics of waters and wastes to which reference is made in this Ordinance shall be determined in accordance with the latest edition of "Standard Methods," and shall be determined at the control manhole provided or on suitable samples taken at said control manhole. In the event that no special manhole has been required, the control manhole shall be considered to be the nearest downstream manhole in the public sewer to the point at which the building sewer is connected. Sampling shall be carried out by customarily accepted methods to reflect the effect of constituents on the sewage system and to determine the existence of hazards of life, limb, and property.

5.7 No statement contained in this article shall be construed as preventing any special agreement or arrangement between the City and any industrial concern whereby an industrial waste of unusual strength or character may be accepted by the City for treatment, subject to payment therefor, by the industrial concern, provided that the agreement or arrangement is not less stringent than any applicable federal pretreatment or categorical regulation promulgated pursuant to Section 307 of the Clean Water Act or any subsequent amendments or revisions.

6. REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRETREATMENT OF INCOMPATIBLE POLLUTANTS BY INDUSTRIAL USERS AND OTHER USERS

6.1 No person shall discharge or cause to be discharged directly or indirectly into sewage facilities owned by the City and industrial wastewater or water containing the substances or possessing the characteristics enumerated in Article 5, without first obtaining a City permit for industrial wastewater discharge.

The City of Mt. Vernon shall have the authority to ensure compliance of industrial users with federal pretreatment standards and any other applicable requirements promulgated by EPA in accordance with Section 307 of the Clean Water Act of any subsequent amendments or revisions.

The permit for industrial wastewater discharge may require pretreatment of industrial wastewaters before discharge, restriction of peak flow discharges, discharge of certain wastewaters only to specified sewers of the City, relocation of point of discharge, prohibition of discharge of certain wastewater components, restriction of discharge to certain hours of the day, payment of additional charges to defray increased costs to the City created by the wastewater discharge, and such other conditions as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this Ordinance.

No permit for industrial wastewater discharge is transferable without the prior written consent of the City.

No person shall discharge industrial wastewaters in excess of the quantity or quality limitations set by the permit for industrial wastewater discharge. Any person desiring to discharge wastewaters or use facilities which are not in conformance with the permit should apply to the City for an amended permit. Violations of this section shall be unlawful and shall constitute a public nuisance.

6.2 The City may change the restrictions or conditions of a permit for industrial wastewater discharge from time to time as circumstances may require. The City shall allow an industrial discharger a reasonable period of time to comply with any changes in the permit required by the City.

6.3 Industrial wastewater discharge permits shall be valid for a period not to exceed two (2) years from the date of issuance. Applications for renewal

of discharge permits must be submitted ninety (90) days in advance of the date the permit expires.

6.4 In the event the City reasonably determines that the sewage, water, or other liquid wastes being discharged into the municipal sewer facilities from any building or premises contains unduly high concentrations of any substances which add to the operating costs of the municipal sewer facilities, then special rates, rentals, or charges may be established, assessed, and collected as to such building or premises, or the Owner or other interested party may be required to specially treat such sewage, water, or other liquid wastes before it is discharged into the municipal sewer facilities.

6.5 Whenever it is determined by the City to be necessary to classify any commercial institutions or industries by reason of the unusual purpose for which water is used, or by reason of the character of the sewage, water, or other liquid wastes discharged therefrom, or whenever the established schedules of rates and charges for any reason are not applicable, then special rates or charges may be established by the governing body of the City, and any person, firm, or corporation begin dissatisfied with the established schedules or rates and charges by reason of peculiar or unusual use of occupancy of any premises, and consequently alleging peculiar or unusual uses of water, may file application with the governing body of the City or with any other board or body of said City which may be in charge and control of the municipal waterworks and sewer systems, for special classification rates and charges.

6.6 The City may classify discharges of industrial wastewater by industrial categories and recommend the establishment of an industrial wastewater treatment surcharge based on the average flow quality and flow quantity for the industrial category adjusted by some commonly recognized parameter that establishes the relative size of the industrial discharge being charged. Such classification shall be in accordance with the federal government's "Standard Industrial Classification Manual," latest edition.

6.7 All persons owning vacuum or "cesspool" pump trucks or other liquid waste transport trucks and desiring to discharge septic tank, seepage pit, interceptor or cesspool contents, industrial liquid wastes, or other liquid wastes to sewerage facilities of the City or to facilities that discharge directly or indirectly to sewerage facilities shall be classified as a Class 2 user and shall obtain a Discharge Permit from the City. This permit may include restrictions as to the specific location of discharge, and the wastewater constituents and characteristics. All applicants for a Discharge Permit shall pay the City a permit fee, receive a copy of the City's regulations governing discharge to sewers and liquid wastes from trucks, and shall agree, in writing, to abide by these regulations. Permit shall be valid for a period not to exceed two (2) years.

Discharge of septic tank, seepage pit, interceptor or cesspool contents, or other liquid wastes to sewerage facilities may be obtained by the holder of a Discharge Permit at manholes designated by the City for that purpose. Truck transported industrial wastes shall be discharged only at the locations specified by the City for the specific waste. The City may require payment for treatment and disposal costs or may refuse permission to discharge certain prohibited wastes.

Any person negligently or willfully violating the City's requirements for liquid waste discharges from trucks shall be in violation of this Ordinance and may have his permit revoked by the City.

7. REGULATIONS CONCERNING FEES AND CHARGES

7.1 All fees and charges shall be set by the User Charge Ordinance and shall be reviewed and revised by the City on an annual basis to reflect debt service charges, operation and maintenance expenses, equipment replacement costs, administrative costs and other miscellaneous costs of operating the system.

7.2 Bills and notices relating to the conduct of the business of the City will be mailed to the customer at the address listed on the application unless a change of address has been filed in writing with the City, and the City shall not be liable for the consequences of any bills or notices mailed to the customer be excused from the payment of any bill or any performance required in said notice.

7.3 Any customer desiring to discontinue sewer service to his premises for any reason must give notice to discontinue in writing to the City; otherwise, a customer shall remain liable for all sewer services rendered to such premises by the City.

7.4 For each connection to the public sewer a tap in fee shall be paid to the City with the application for a building sewer permit.

7.5 Class 2 discharges shall be assessed a discharge permit fee, which is payable with the original application and subsequent renewal applications.

7.6 All Class 1 users discharging wastewater into the sewerage system shall be charged for the use of such facilities. Said charges shall be assessed monthly on the basis of metered water consumption.

7.7 The City shall assess Class 2 user charges proportionate to the quantity and quality of the wastewater discharged. The quantity and quality of the discharge shall be monitored and analyzed in a manner and at a frequency acceptable to the City but not less often than every two years. Costs for monitoring and analysis shall be borne by the permittee. Separate rates of charge shall be established by the City for costs related to flow volume and BOD suspended solids, and other constituents in excess of base levels established by the City. Base levels shall correspond to typical domestic wastewater.

7.8 In the event that connections to the public sewer are made by users which discharge small quantities of toxic substances, appropriate fees and charges will be established by the City.

8. REGULATIONS CONCERNING DELINQUENT ACCOUNTS

8.1 Bills for water and sewer service are due and payable at the City Hall or to any designated agent, on their date of issue. The past due date shall be the tenth day after the date of issue. Bills will be dated and mailed on the first working day of each month.

8.2 All bills not paid on or before the past due date, as established in Section 8.1 above, shall be deemed delinquent and the City may serve a customer a written final notice delivered through the U.S. Mail of said delinquency and of the fact that such customer is entitled upon written request to a hearing on the question of termination of service. If a delinquent bill is not paid within ten days after the date of such final notice, and if no hearing is requested, or if a hearing is requested and timely held, and such customer's delinquency is thereby established, the water supply to the customer may be discontinued without further notice provided however, if prior to discontinuance of service, there is delivered to the City by its duly authorized representative a written certificate signed by a physician, a registered nurse, or a public health officer that, in the opinion of the certifier, discontinuance of service will aggravate an existing illness or infirmity on the affected premises, service shall not be discontinued until the affected resident can make other living arrangements or until ten (10) days elapse from the time of the City's receipt of said certification, whichever occurs first.

8.3 Where the water supply to the customer has been discontinued for delinquent bills for twenty (20) days, the City shall not be required for reconnection of water service, but the reconnection will not be made until after all delinquent bills and other charges, if any, owned by the customer to the City have been paid.

8.4 If any person, firm, or corporation is delinquent as described in this Article, but does not have a connection to the public water supply, this person's connection to the public sewer shall be severed. Any reconnection shall be done at the Owner's expense only after payment of the delinquent account.

8.5 All charges for water and sewer charges, other than connection charges, shall be the primary obligation of the occupant of the lot, property or building receiving the benefits of such use and service, but the City shall have a lien on the real property served to secure the payment of said charges. The satisfaction of the liability by any party shall be a discharge of the liability for which the payment is made.

9. REGULATION CONCERNING PROTECTION FROM DAMAGE

9.1 No person shall maliciously, willfully, or recklessly break, damage,

destroy, uncover, deface, or tamper with any structure, apparatus, or equipment which is a part of the sewerage system. Any person violating this section shall be guilty of criminal mischief in the third degree and shall be punished as provided in KRS 512.040.

10. PROVISION FOR POWER AND AUTHORITY OF INSPECTIONS

10.1 The Superintendent and other duly authorized representatives of the City, bearing proper credentials and identification, shall be permitted to enter all properties at all reasonable hours for the purpose of inspection, observation, measurement, sampling, and testing in accordance with the provisions of this Ordinance. The Superintendent or authorized representatives shall have no authority to inquire into any industrial processes beyond that point having a direct bearing on the kind and source of discharge to the sewers or waterways of facilities for waste treatment.

10.2 While performing the necessary work on private properties referred to in Section 10.1 above, the superintendent or duly authorized representatives of the City shall observe all safety rules applicable to the premises established by the company.

10.3 The Superintendent and other duly authorized employees of the City, bearing proper credentials and identification, shall be permitted to enter all private properties through which the City holds an easement for the purpose of, but not limited to, inspection, observation, measurement, sampling, repair, and maintenance of any portion of the sewerage work lying within said easement. All entry and subsequent work, if any, on said easement shall be done in full accordance with the terms of the easement.

11. REGULATIONS CONCERNING ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES

11.1 Any person found to be violating any provision of this Ordinance except Article 9 shall be served by the City with written notice stating the nature of the violation and providing a reasonable time limit for the satisfactory correction thereof. The offender shall, within the period of time stated in such notice, permanently cease all violations. Persons in violation of a valid permit for industrial waste discharge are subject to the provisions of Article 6 of this Ordinance.

11.2 Any person who shall continue any violation beyond the time limit provided for in Article 11, Section 11.1 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefor shall be fined in an amount not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each violation. Each day any such violation shall continue shall be deemed a separate offense.

11.3 Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be liable to the City for any expense, loss, or damage occasioned by such violation.

12. ADDITIONAL REGULATIONS, PROHIBITIONS, AND CONDITIONS

12.1 The City shall own all sewer lines, appurtenances, treatment facilities, and sewer equipment located on city streets or easements.

12.2 The City will construct extensions to its sewer lines to points within its service area, but the City is not required to make any such installation unless the customer pays to the City the entire cost of the installation.

Each customer shall grant or convey, or shall cause to be granted or conveyed to the City, a perpetual easement across any property owned or controlled by the customer, whenever said easement is necessary for the City to furnish service to the customer.

All line extensions shall be evidence by a contract signed by the City and the person advancing funds for said extension.

If refund of the advance is to be made, the following shall apply: such refund shall be in an amount equal to twenty percent of the total gross revenue of sewer sales per year for each service connected to the new extension prescribed in the agreement for a period not to exceed five years, provided that the aggregate payments do not exceed the total amount deposited.

No refund shall be made for any revenue received from any lines leading up to or beyond the particular line extension covered by contract.

All decisions regarding the manner of installation of any extension and maintenance thereof shall remain in the exclusive control of the City; such extension shall be the property of the City, and no other person shall have any right, title, or interest therein.

12.3 The City may refuse service to any person not currently a customer when in the opinion of the City, the capacity of the facilities will not permit such service.

12.4 The customer's service lines shall be installed and maintained by the customer at his own expense in a safe and efficient manner and in accordance with the City's rules and regulations and with the regulations of the Kentucky Gas and Electric Company, Department of Health.

12.5 All taps and connections to the sewer of the City shall be made by and under the direct care and supervision of the Superintendent.

12.6 The City shall make all reasonable efforts to eliminate interruption of service, and when such interruptions occur, will endeavor to re-establish service with the shortest possible delay. When the service is interrupted, all consumers affected by such interruption will be notified in advance, if possible.

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12.8 In no event shall the City be responsible for any claim made against it by reason of the breaking of any sewer mains or service pipes, or by reason of any other interruption caused by the failure or breakage of machinery or stoppage for necessary repairs or for other reasonable causes.

12.9 Water service may be discontinued by the Superintendent for any violation of any rule, regulation, or condition of service and especially for any of the following reasons:

- 1 Misrepresentation in the application or contract as to the property or fixtures to be supplied, or as to additional use of water or sewer service, or as to unusual or extraordinary use of sewer facilities.
- 2 Failure to report to the City additions to the property or fixtures to be supplied, or of additional use of water or sewer service.
- 3 Waste or misuse of water due to improper or imperfect service pipes or failure to keep same in suitable state of repair.
- 4 Tampering with meter, meter seal, service valves or permitting such tampering by others.
- 5 Nonpayment of bills.

12.9 Complaints may be made to the Superintendent of the system, whose decision may be appealed to the governing body of the City within ten days, otherwise, the manager's decision will be final.

12.10 If a deadline falls on a Sunday or legal holiday, such deadline shall be deemed to expire until the next succeeding secular day.

14. VALIDITY

14.1 All ordinances, resolutions, and orders, or parts thereof, in conflict herewith, to the extent of such conflict, are hereby repealed.

14.2 If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this Ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause, or

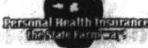

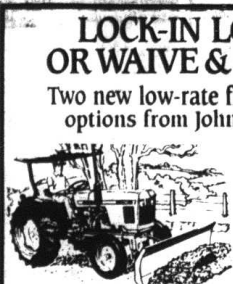

City council approves sweeping sewer rate increases

Sewer service in Mt. Vernon is going to cost more - a lot more. As expected, the city council raised the minimum residential sewer rate to \$8.98 for 2000 gallons. An additional cost of \$2.49 will be made for each additional 1000 gallons. The previous sewer rate was one-half the customer's water bill. Based on the present \$2.25 base rate (half the water bill) the new rate is nearly four times as much. The council has not set a commercial sewer rate.

The rate increase was made at a called meeting at the council Friday night. Voting for the new rates were Tom Welch, Jackie Renner, Larry Burdette and Jerry Pensol. Joe Martin did not attend the meeting. Les Harris, who resigned as of May 1, was unable to attend. City water rates remain as they are, at least for the time being. The base water rate is \$4.50 for 2000 gallons. The combined base water/sewer rate will be \$13.48 as compared to \$6.75 at the present time. The new rates are expected to go into effect in June for the city's

885 customers. Richard Moore, vice president of Schimpfer-Corradino Associates, engineers for the city, said the council used a lot of discretion in keeping water rates down. Mayor Elizabeth Baker, who does not vote on legislation except in a vote by the council, said she hoped the change in rates would not pose a hardship on anyone. According to the engineers, the sewer user charge system presented is designed to distribute equitably to all sewer users the operation, maintenance and debt

service costs of the wastewater collection, transportation and treatment and disposal system. The engineers also set up a proposed budget for operation and maintenance at the plant: debt service and depreciation. Annual operating expense for the new system totals \$188,983. That amount compares to the present \$108,557. Of the amount budgeted, salaries, wages, payroll taxes and insurance totals \$37,280, maintenance labor \$31,106, bond payments, \$77,675 and depreciation, \$18,557.

In 1972 Congress passed the Clean Water Act and warned cities that their sewer systems must comply with Environmental Protection Agency regulations, especially in treating the effluent that comes from the sewer systems. The effluent that comes from the Mt. Vernon plant, runs into Town Branch that, in turn runs into Renfro Creek and Roundstone Creek. In 1976, the city began planning to upgrade and expand the 20-year old plant with money from a grant of \$1,443,905. The

Man's body found in lake

The partially clothed body of a man found floating in Lake Linville Monday night was shot to death before being dumped into the lake, according to Rockcastle Coroner Billy Dowell. The identity of the man has not been determined. The body was found about 11 p.m. by two local fishermen, David Stewart and his son Boyd, when the man's clothing got caught in the propeller of their boat while fishing near the boat dock. Stewart and his son rowed their boat to the Barnett Road side of the lake and called police. Rockcastle County Deputy

Coroner Roy Martin said Tuesday that the man was probably in his 40s. "It usually takes bodies about six to eight weeks to surface when they have been submerged in warm water," Martin said. "I'd say the body had been in the lake that long at least." But, after the preliminary autopsy, which was performed Tuesday in Louisville, Coroner Billy Dowell said that the body could have been in Lake Linville for as long as six months. "It is hard to tell, but that is what Dr. Greg Baliko said Tuesday," Dowell said. Dr. Baliko

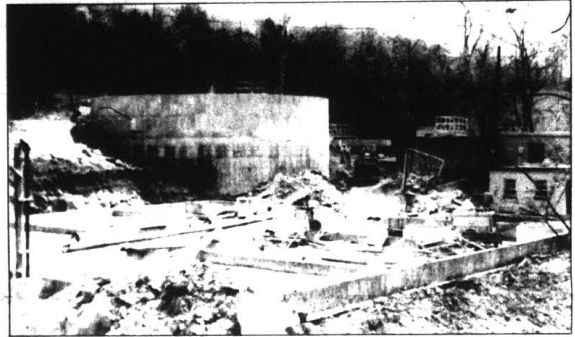
County budget hearing re-set by fiscal court

Council gives boat dock "once over"

After looking the place over Mt. Vernon city councilmen agreed during a called meeting Friday night that the city should be responsible for some work needed at the city boat dock at Lake Linville. Boat dock operator Jimmy Hale, earlier brought the council a long list of items needed done at the dock and campground. Tom Welch told the council that he found the place a mess. "We need to do some work down there and get him (Hale) on the right foot," Welch said. Welch said, "We need to get immediate work done on the dock and replace windows at the boat dock building, repair wiring at the campground; paint and repair door and inside wiring, check gas pumps and propane gas tanks and report to the state fire marshal's office.

Renner suggested a discussion on a new councilman to fill the seat vacated by Councilman Les Harris. Mayor Elizabeth Baker said she had not had time to discuss the question with anyone and asked that it be delayed. When Renner pressed for a discussion, the mayor repeated that she needed time to think about a new councilman. A decision on whether to use

Lambert hard worker

Reprinted from Somerset Commonwealth. The newest and at 38 the youngest justice in the history of the Kentucky Supreme Court said he is working hard, enjoying his job and learning. Joseph E. Lambert, speaking yesterday at a luncheon meeting of the Somerset Pulaski County Chamber of Commerce, said he has found during his first three months on the state's highest court there is nothing to rumors that Supreme Court justices have nothing to do. "I have more reading and writing than I can keep up with," said Lambert. He emphasized, however, he doesn't let himself get behind with his work. The Supreme Court, according to Lambert, is an appellate court and a vast majority of its cases are "...where we've granted

discretionary review. Discretionary in regard to cases reviewed by the state's highest court means reviews are done at the discretion of the court. Lambert said the Supreme Court must review all criminal cases where a person convicted in a state circuit court is sentenced to confinement of 20 years or more. Also death penalties are automatically reviewed by the high court. Lambert said he recently participated in reviews of two death penalties in Kentucky, calling it "the most sobering experience of my life." He noted that every citizen has the right for one appeal. Since most convictions for crimes are in circuit courts and appeals from these courts go to the state Court of Appeals that is their "matter of right appeal," according to Lambert. "It's surprising how much time we spend on criminal cases," said Lambert, estimating some 60 percent of the Supreme Court's appeals is going by criminal appeals. In civil cases, our court is not an error correcting court," said Lambert. He said a procedural error in a civil case doesn't make it mandatory that the case be reviewed by the Supreme Court. Lambert said the Supreme Court meets approximately one week out of every three and hears about nine cases involving oral arguments during these weeklong sessions. He said the justices decide some cases by reading briefs, but noted oral arguments in many cases add valuable information.

What Must I Do To Be Saved?

Perhaps a more important question than this will never be asked by any of us. The question indicates the desire of the person asking it, for such a question is asked only when information is sought. This was true of Saul [Acts 9:6] of the jailor [Acts 16:30] and of the multitude [Acts 2:37]. Only those who wanted to know would ask what MUST I do?

The word MUST is one of the strongest words in our language. It is not what can I do, or what may I do, but what MUST I do. Whatever the answer may be it is imperative: it is a MUST.

But if you, as a believer, have already repented of your sins, as was the case with Saul when he asked the question, then you must do exactly what he was told to do when Ananias came unto him and told him to "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins" [Acts 22:16].

Woman killed in I-75 accident

A Michigan woman was killed early Saturday in Rockcastle County after being thrown out of the pickup in which she was riding, state police in London reported.

Marjette Ferron, 52, of Rome, Mich., suffered head injuries and was dead at the scene of the accident, about six miles south of Mt. Vernon on Interstate 75, police related.

A medical center spokesman said Joseph Ferron was in serious, but stable condition, and Matthew Ferron was in satisfactory condition.

Police said none of the victims was wearing a seat belt.

The first step in development of a drug and alcohol prevention program will be to appoint an advisory council to help plan and administer the program.

Plans are to involve parents, teachers and students in the program. The program will be developed this summer for implementation in the 1987-88 school year.

mation that reflects in decisions.

Lambert called the Supreme Court a publishing court. Noting the high court decisions are binding on lower courts, he said it is policy of his court not to publish decisions unless "a particular opinion adds to the law of Kentucky."

Lambert from Mt. Vernon, praised the Somerset area for its progress.

ALL CALORIES NOT EQUAL: FAT IS MORE FATTENING.

Recent research indicates that calories from fat actually are more fattening than those from carbohydrates.

We've known for many years that gram for gram, fat is the most concentrated source of calories in the diet. But it was thought that all calories are equal. Now we know that just is not so.

The body must burn calories to convert food to body fat. This process is inefficient when it comes to carbohydrates such as sugars and starches. In fact, about one-fourth of the carbohydrate calories consumed are burned during the conversion process.

The body is fairly efficient at converting food to body fat, though. Only 3 percent of fat calories are lost when food fat is turned into body fat. So, while the number of calories eaten may be equal, fat is more fattening.

For example, suppose you eat 100 calories of a carbohydrate. You will have a net gain of 77 calories. Only 3 calories, however, are lost when 100 calories of fat are converted, leaving a full 97 calories as new body fat.

Apparently, the efficiency with which a person burns calories varies. It depends not only on how much is eaten, but also on what is eaten. This research shows the body can make fat out of fat more easily than out of sugar and starch.

The implications of this study have far-reaching effects for the over-weight. They may not be the sweet eaters we think they are. Perhaps a love of fatty foods, and not sweets, has been their undoing.

If you are counting calories, make sure no more than one-third comes from fat. And on days when you know you're going to exceed your daily calorie allotment, you'd be better off selecting a complex carbohydrate treat, such as a whole-grain muffin, rather than a high fat treat, such as a croissant.

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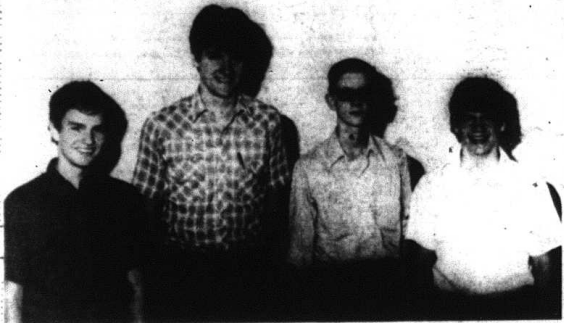

The final reporting date for wheat, barley and oats is May 15. ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a timely crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in

current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs. Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a "zero report" of acreage in order to have an established history file. Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties.

75-150 pounds of nitrogen per acre each year. This is possible because of bacteria on properly inoculated seed which infests the roots of legume plants, supply energy to change the form of nitrogen taken from the air to one which the legume plants can use. Legumes improve quality by their positive effect on palatability, intake, digestibility, protein and mineral content. A beneficial effect is also found on companion grasses which increase their yields by taking advantage of the nitrogen produced by legumes. We also find that most growth of cool season grasses occur during the first one-third of the growing season. Since legumes make more growth during the summer months, legume grass mixtures improve the seasonal distribution of pasture and hay crop production.

Why inoculate grass fields? There are several reasons why you should have fields which have a seed bed of grass should be inoculated. The primary ground cover in most of Kentucky's pastures are cool season grasses, timothy and orchard grass. By adding legumes to these grasses, there is an increase in the quality of feed and the quantity of feed produced. Legumes increase the nitrogen content of soil and legumes also fix nitrogen from the air. Kentucky's productive alfalfa produces 1,500 to 3000 pounds of dry matter each year. In comparison, 1000-2000 pounds of timothy, 1000-1500 pounds of bermuda, sorghum and other warm season legumes can fix

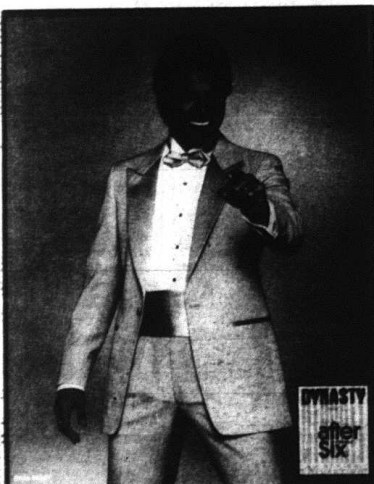

ROCKCASTLE COULD HAVE JAPANESE VISIT

Rockcastle County families are invited to share in a state-wide 4-H youth exchange program which has been ongoing with Japan and Kentucky. The exchange is jointly sponsored by 4-H and the LABO International Exchange Foundation for the promotion of international friendship and cultural exchange.

To be eligible to participate in the exchange, a family must be interested in sharing their home

over that of grass alone.

Moisture and temperature are two important factors in establishing legumes in old grass sods. In the long run, early spring clover seedings (mid-February through March) are more likely to be successful than late spring or late summer seedings. Some keys to a successful renovation are:

Grass or mow the grass close, prior to renovating. This will let tillage tools tear into the sod more easily. Don't plant legume seed into tall grass. The grass shades legume seedlings and reduces their growth.

Test the soil and apply needed lime, phosphate and potash.

Disturb 40 to 60 percent of the grass for sowing clover. 80 to 100 percent for alfalfa. This tillage helps control grass growth and opens the sod so that legumes will have a better chance to germinate and live.

Adish, field aeration or field tilling will do a good job. A once over renovation seeder can be used to eliminate the need for tillage which disturbs the seed. Broadcast seedings of lespedeza, white clover or red clover made on top of the ground will often result in good legume stands if seedings are made in late winter the grass is grazed extremely short, and proper fertility is supplied.

Sow certified seed of adapted legumes at the rates recommended for seeding along. Just before sowing, inoculate seed with the proper nitrogen fixing bacteria. Be sure that some inoculum is stuck to all seeds.

Renovated fields should be kept grazed short until the live stock begin biting off the young legumes. At that time remove the livestock and allow clover 4-5 weeks and alfalfa 8-10 weeks to become established. Thereafter, mow and/or graze the field to best suit the particular legume that was planted.

If a once over renovator is used to till, plant the legume seed, and press the seed into firm soil, special attention must be given to grass management. After planting legumes, the grass should be kept grazed or mowed very closely to control grass competition. When the animals begin grazing the legumes, remove them and permit the legumes to become established. If the newly seeded field cannot be properly grazed or clipped, Parquat (Gramoxone) may be used to aid in grass suppression. Apply Parquat (Gramoxone) at the rate of 0.5 lbs. of active ingredient per acre in bands over the seeded row, leaving about 50 percent of land surface untreated. This assures a good grass stand will remain in the renovated field. Even with Parquat (Gramoxone), grass growth should be controlled by a combination of grazing and clipping. Follow label instructions as to when grazing can be started after use of the chemical.

Seeding rates, in pounds per acre, for renovating are: white clover, 1-3; red clover, 8-12; annual lespedeza, 20-25; alfalfa, 12-20. In combinations with clover, 1-2; and red clover, 4-6; alfalfa, 8-10; and Ladina white clover, 1/2-1.

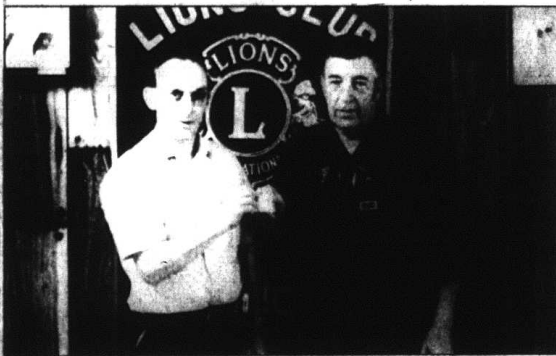

to be done includes construction of intersection at the old Brodhead Road and at U.S. 25 near Red Top Restaurant as well as other minor intersecting roads. Also to be done are guardrails and lining.

KSP will use new chopper to destroy marijuana crops

State police are preparing for the annual harvest of one of Kentucky's bumper crops—marijuana.

State police plan to lease a six-passenger helicopter to search out and destroy marijuana fields this summer, said Capt. Michael Duncan, commander of the narcotics section.

Authorities used a four-passenger helicopter last year to help destroy 1.2 million cultivated marijuana plants, one of the biggest hauls recorded in any state.

State police won't be the only ones watching for pot. The U.S. Forest Service also is beefing up its marijuana eradication efforts in Kentucky.

"We had a banner year last year," said Bill Dixon, special agent for law enforcement in the Daniel Boone National Forest in Eastern Kentucky.

Officers destroyed 75,000 cultivated marijuana plants in the Boone forest more than in any other national forest, Dixon said.

Gatwood Galbraith, a Lexington attorney who advocates legalization of marijuana, said the intensified eradication effort would be bad for Kentucky's farm economy.

"I estimate that the program cost the state about \$250 million in lost sales last year," said Galbraith, who ran for Kentucky agricultural commissioner in 1983.

Veterans Administration raises home loan interest rate to 9.5%

In response to mortgage market pressures, the Veterans Administration raised its maximum home loan interest rate from 8.5 percent to 9.5 percent, effective April 13.

The increase was made to bring the maximum VA approved rate closer in line with the mortgage market, which has moved up in recent weeks.

At 9.5 percent, the latest rate

is still low enough that little or no decline in the number of new and refinanced loans is expected, say VA home loan guaranty experts.

The number of home loan guaranties requested during the last six months is running at 40,000 a month.

VA loan counselors recommend veterans consider refinancing when the loan rate is two

Your Child's Health

Cromolyn is a drug available for several years which helps prevent allergic symptoms all the way from the eyes to the lungs. Trade names are Opticrom for the eyes, Nasal crom for the nose and Intal for the lungs.

This drug is administered as drops or an inhaler depending on where it is used. It works by coating the mast cells which line our respiratory tracts. Mast cells may be thought of as alarm cells which sound the alarm when pollens or other allergens invade the body. They release histamine

from themselves and this chemical is responsible for the well known allergy symptoms of itchy eyes, runny nose and wheezing. Cromolyn stabilizes the mast cells and helps prevent them from releasing histamine. The drug works only to PREVENT the allergy symptoms. Once the symptoms start, it is of limited use. Therefore, it must be started before the allergy season and continued until the offending allergen is gone. Ask your doctor if you think your child has enough symptoms to warrant this preventive treatment.

aged. Sometimes the damage in your eye can be very bad without you knowing it. Some symptoms of retinopathy may be sudden loss of vision, double vision, narrowed field of vision, and feeling pressure or pain in your eyes. Most people who have diabetes will suffer nothing more than minor eye disorder. The severity of the disease depends on the length of time you have had diabetes, your blood glucose levels, your blood pressure, and your genetic make-up.

The treatment goal is to stabilize the vision that is left and keep it from getting worse. Laser beam therapy and vitrectomy offer an excellent chance to preserve the eyesight of people with retinopathy. The laser beam gets rid of those "new" weak blood vessels and seals off leaks. About 20 percent of people with diabetes will be advised to have laser treatment in their lifetime. Laser treatment reduces the risk of hemorrhage by 50 percent. Treatment is most effective when applied before severe damage from the disease has occurred. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

What can you do to stop retinopathy? Keep blood sugars under 150. Keep blood pressure below 140/90. Avoid salt and foods high in salt. Avoid things that would raise your blood pressure like constipation or weight lifting. If your doctor orders blood pressure medicine, be sure to take your medicine every day exactly as ordered.

Diabetics need to be examined by ophthalmologist. It is being recommended that patients with diabetes should have their first complete eye examination after five years duration of diabetes if they are between 10 and 30 years of age, or at the time of diagnosis of diabetes if they are over 30 years of age or for a diabetic woman who becomes pregnant needs to have an eye examination in the first 3 months of pregnancy.

Retinopathy: Complication of Diabetes

Sight threatening eye disease is a common complication of diabetes mellitus and can often be present with good vision. It is the leading cause of new cases of blindness in the United States for adults under 75 years of age. People with diabetes are at increased risk for visual loss due to diabetic retinopathy, glaucoma, and cataracts. Early detection of eye problems and treatment of diabetic retinopathy can reduce severe visual loss by 60 percent. Diabetic retinopathy is damage to the blood vessels in the back of the eye in different ways. The part of the eye affected is the

retina. The retina records what we see and sends the information to the brain. The blood vessels on the retina may become clogged and be unable to feed the retina. The eye compensates by making "new" vessels which are often weaker. Sometimes they break leaking out protein and fat from the blood causing bleeding in the retina. The "new" vessels may cause scar tissue and pull the retina out of place. The "new" vessels are never successful in replacing the old damaged ones.

There is usually no pain or other warning signs when eye blood vessels first become dam-

Marymount gets cardiac catheterization laboratory

In what is a medical first for southeastern Kentucky, Marymount Hospital has been awarded a certificate of need to operate a cardiac catheterization laboratory. The decision was announced Wednesday by the state Commission for Health Economics Control.

The cardiac catheterization lab will be the only one in the surrounding 10-county area that includes Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, McCreary, Pulaski, Rockcastle and Whitley. The lab is expected to serve a population of 300,000.

Currently patients have to travel to Lexington or Knoxville to obtain the diagnostic procedure. A cardiac cath is used by doctors to

determine the extent of a patient's heart disease. The procedure is considered a definite test and is performed by using specialized X-ray equipment to examine the arteries of the heart.

Dr. Ronald Masden, a prominent cardiologist at Jewish Hospital in Louisville, will provide services to Marymount's cath lab along with other members of his practice. They have performed thousands of cardiac cath.

Now that Marymount has received the CON, the hospital will begin detailed plans to renovate the designated 1,200 square feet of space and order the equipment for the lab said Lowell Jones, Marymount's administrator.

The renovation and equip-

ment will cost \$1,065,750. The lab is expected to be in operation by January 1988 with an estimated 357 procedures performed in the.

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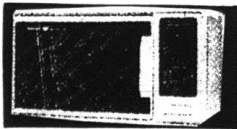
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SEWER USE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SEWERS AND DRAINS, PRIVATE WASTEWATER DISPOSAL, THE INSTALLATION AND CONNECTION OF BUILDING SEWERS, AND THE DISCHARGE OF WATERS AND WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEMS; AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF; IN THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, COMMONWEALTH OF KENTUCKY.

BE IT ORDAINED AND ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

1. DEFINITIONS

Unless the context specially indicates otherwise, the meaning of terms used in this ordinance shall be as follows:

- 1.1 "Ammonia Nitrogen" or "NH3-N" shall mean the measure of nitrogen as ammonia, as determined by the appropriate procedure in the latest edition of "Standard Methods."
- 1.2 "Biochemical Oxygen Demand" or "BOD" shall mean the measure of decomposable organic material in domestic or industrial wastewater as represented by the oxygen utilized over a period of five (5) days at twenty degrees centigrade, expressed in milligrams per liter, and as determined by the appropriate procedure in the latest edition of "Standard Methods."
- 1.3 "Building Drain" shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from waste, and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building, and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning five (5) feet outside the inner face of the building wall.
- 1.4 "Building Sewer" shall mean the extension from the building drain to the public sewer or other place of disposal, also called house connection.
- 1.5 "City" shall mean the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, acting by and through its City Council or by and through such other body as shall be the governing body of said City under the laws of Kentucky at any given time.
- 1.6 "Chemical Oxygen Demand" or "COD" shall mean a measure of the oxygen equivalent to that portion of the organic matter in a sample that is susceptible to oxidation by a strong chemical oxidant, as determined by the appropriate procedure in the latest edition of "Standard Methods."
- 1.7 "Combined Sewer" shall mean a sewer intended to receive both storm or surface water runoff and wastewater.
- 1.8 "County Health Department" shall mean the Rockcastle County Health Department.
- 1.9 "Customer" refers to a property owner or his agent who has agreed to purchase sewer service from the City.
- 1.10 "Discharger" shall mean any person who discharges or causes a discharge to a public sewer.
- 1.11 "Domestic Wastewater" shall mean the water carried wastes produced from non-commercial or non-industrial activities and which result from normal human living processes.
- 1.12 "Essesment" shall mean the liquid outflow of any facility designed to treat, convey, or retain wastewater.
- 1.14 "Effluent Sewer" shall mean a pipe or conduit for carrying only of fluent which has received at least primary treatment, such as by a septic tank.
- 1.15 "Garbage" shall mean animal and vegetable waste resulting from the handling, preparation, cooking and serving of food in home kit chens, stores, markets, restaurants, hotels, hotels, institutions, and other places where food is stored, prepared, or served. Specifically excluded are food processing wastes from canneries, slaughterhouses, packing plants and similar industries.
- 1.16 "Grab Sample" shall mean any individual sample of wastewater collected over a period of time not exceeding fifteen minutes.
- 1.17 "Industrial Wastewater" shall mean all water carried wastes and wastewater of the community excluding domestic wastewater and uncontaminated water, and shall include all wastewater from any producing, manufacturing, processing, institutional, commercial, agricultural or other operation where the wastewater discharge includes significant quantities of wastes of non-human origin.
- 1.18 "Natural Outlet" shall mean any outlet including storm sewers and combined sewer overflows, into a watercourse, pond, ditch, lake or other body of surface or groundwater.
- 1.19 "May" is permissive.
- 1.20 "Ordinance" shall mean unless otherwise specified this Ordinance.
- 1.21 "Person" shall mean any individual, partnership, committee, association, corporation, public agency, firm, company, and any other organization or group of persons, public or private.
- 1.22 "pH" shall mean the logarithm of the reciprocal of the hydrogen ion concentration. The concentration is the weight of hydrogen ions, in grams, per liter of solution.
- 1.23 "Property Shredded Garbage" shall mean the wastes from the preparation, cooking and disposing of food that have been shredded to such a degree that all particles will be carried freely under the flow conditions normally prevailing in public sewers, with no particle greater than one-half (1/2) inch in any dimension.
- 1.24 "Public Sewer" shall mean a sewer which carries domestic and/or industrial wastewater and to which storm surface and groundwaters are not intentionally admitted; this term may also include the meaning of "effluent sewer" where appropriate.
- 1.25 "Sanitary Sewer" shall mean a sewer that carries domestic and/or industrial wastewater and to which storm surface and groundwaters are not intentionally admitted; this term may also include the meaning of "effluent sewer" where appropriate.
- 1.26 "Sewage" shall mean wastewater.
- 1.27 "Sewerage" shall mean any and all facilities used for collecting, conveying, pumping, treating and disposing of wastewater.
- 1.29 "Shall" is mandatory.
- 1.30 "Slug" shall mean any discharge of water, domestic wastewater, or industrial wastewater which in concentration of any given constituent or in quantity of flow exceeds for any period of duration longer than fifteen (15) minutes more than five (5) times the average twenty-four (24) hour concentration of flows during normal operation.
- 1.31 "Standard Methods" shall mean the current edition of "Standard Methods for the Examination of Water and Wastewater" and as published by the American Public Health Association.
- 1.32 "Storm Drain" [sometimes termed "storm sewer"] shall mean a drain or sewer for conveying water, groundwater, subsurface water, storm and surface water runoff, or uncollected water from any source, but excludes domestic and industrial wastewaters.
- 1.33 "Superintendent" shall mean the superintendent, manager or other person duly employed and authorized by the City to supervise the operation of the system, or his authorized deputy, agent or representative.
- 1.34 "Suspended Solids" shall mean the incoagulable solid matter suspended in wastewater that is separable by laboratory filtration in accordance with the procedure described in the latest edition of "Standard Methods."
- 1.35 "System" refers to the combined and treated water and sewer system of the City, as now or hereafter constituted.
- 1.36 "Wastewater" shall mean the water-carried wastes of the community derived from human or industrial sources, including domestic wastewater and industrial wastewater. Rainwater, groundwater or drainage of uncontaminated water is not wastewater.

1.37 "Wastewater Treatment Plant" shall mean any arrangement of devices and structures used for treating wastewater.

1.37 "Wastewater Treatment Plant" shall mean any arrangement of devices and structures used for treating wastewater.

1.38 "Watercourse" shall mean a natural or man-made channel for the passage of water either continuously or intermittently.

2. REGULATIONS REQUIRING USE OF PUBLIC SEWERS

- 2.1 Each owner of a house, building, or property used for human occupancy, employment, recreation, or other purposes, situated within the City and to which sewer service is made available by the City, is hereby required at his expense to install suitable toilet facilities therein and to connect such facilities directly with any available public sewer in accordance with the requirements of this Ordinance within ninety (90) days from notice to do so. All connections to the sewer shall be made under the supervision of the superintendent of the sewer system or other duly authorized official of the City and under such regulations as the City may establish. Failure to effect such connection is hereby declared to be unlawful and shall constitute a nuisance.
- 2.2 All owners, tenants, and occupants of dwellings, apartments, hotels, mobile homes, house trailers, mobile home parks, trailer camps, manufacturing or commercial establishments, or any other building of any kind or nature situated within the City limits, through which any sewage collection line has been or is hereafter installed, or which abuts upon any street, alley, or easement within the City limits in which there is hereafter installed a sewage collection line, or to which property a sewage collection line is available to the property, shall be required to connect such sewage collection line directly with any available public sewer in accordance with the requirements of this Ordinance within ninety (90) days from notice to do so. All connections to the sewer shall be made under the supervision of the superintendent of the sewer system or other duly authorized official of the City and under such regulations as the City may establish. Failure to effect such connection is hereby declared unlawful and to constitute a nuisance.
- 2.3 Each owner, tenant, and occupant of similar property outside the City limits, who is connected to the City water system and receives water service from the City, shall, within ninety (90) days following the date on which the City sends written notice to such party that a City sewage collection line is available to the property, connect such property to such sewage collection line, in accordance with such rules and regulations as the City shall cut off the water supply to any such owner, tenant, or occupant failing to make such a connection.
- 2.4 All costs and expense incident to the installation and connection of a building sewer shall be borne by the owner. All connections shall be made under the supervision of the superintendent of the sewer system or other duly authorized official of the city and under such regulations as the City may establish.

3. REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRIVATE WASTEWATER DISPOSAL

- 3.1 Except as hereinafter provided, it shall be unlawful for any person to construct or maintain or permit to be constructed or maintained any outdoor toilet, privy, vault, cesspool, septic tank, or other similar contrivance for the reception of sewage on any lands owned by such person, or under his control, which abuts upon a sewage collection line available in any public street, alley, or other easement or through which a sewage collection line passes or to which a sewage collection line is hereafter available. All such outdoor toilets or privies shall be removed, and all such vaults, cesspools, septic tanks, or other similar contrivances for the reception of sewage shall be closed or filled or otherwise removed from the premises within ninety (90) days after such sewage collection line becomes available.
- All such privies, surface toilets, or other means of casting or depositing sewage into a container above or below the surface of the ground or upon or into the soil or into any running or percolating stream of water or into any cistern or well whereby the soil or any surface or subsurface waters is contaminated with such sewage are hereby declared to constitute a public nuisance and their use or maintenance for a period of more than ninety (90) days after such sewage collection line becomes available shall be hereby prohibited, declared to be unlawful, and to constitute a nuisance.
- 3.2 It shall be unlawful for any person to place, deposit, or permit to be deposited in any unsanitary manner on public or private property or to discharge to any natural outlet within the City or in any area under the jurisdiction of the City, any garbage or other objectionable waste, or to discharge to any natural outlet within the City, any sewage, human or animal excrement, garbage, industrial wastes, wastewater or other polluted waters, except where suitable treatment has been provided under the supervision of the superintendent or other duly authorized official of the City in accordance with subsequent provisions of this ordinance.
- 3.3 Where a public sanitary sewer is not available under the provisions of Article 2 an on-site treatment and disposal system may be installed, provided that all such devices and systems meet the applicable requirements of the Rockcastle County Health Department and comply with the provisions of this Ordinance.
- 3.4 Before commencement of construction of a private sewage disposal system, the owner shall first obtain a written permit signed by the Rockcastle County Health Department and the Mayor of the City following the approval of the City Council. The permit shall be obtained from the City of Mt. Vernon's City Council. The owner shall make application for a permit to the City. The permit application shall be supplemented by any plans, specifications and other information as are deemed necessary by the superintendent. A permit and inspection fee of \$35.00 dollars shall be paid to the City at the time the application is filed.
- 3.5 A permit for a private sewage disposal system shall not become effective until the installation is completed to the satisfaction of the superintendent of the City Health Department. They shall be allowed to inspect the work at any stage of construction, and in any event the applicant for the permit shall notify the City when the work is ready for final inspection and before any underground portions are covered. The inspection shall be made within forty-eight (48) hours of the receipt of notice by the City (Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays excepted).
- 3.6 At such times as a public sewer becomes available to a property served by a private sewage disposal system, as provided in Article 2, a direct connection shall be made to the public sewer in compliance with this Ordinance and any other applicable laws, and similar private sewage disposal facilities shall be abandoned and filled with suitable material.
- 3.7 The Owner shall operate and maintain the private sewage disposal facilities in a sanitary manner at all times, at no expense to the City.
- 3.9 No statement contained in this Article shall be construed to interfere with any additional requirements that may be imposed by the City of Mt. Vernon and the Rockcastle County Health Department.

4. REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE BUILDING OF SEWERS AND CONNECTIONS

- 4.1 No person, firm or corporation shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, use, alter, or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a permit from the City. The City will, upon application to the City and payment of any tapping or connection fee, issue a permit to the applicant to tap the City sewer and run a lateral to the property line of any applicant whose sewers are available, and any installations or attachments shall be made by the applicant under the direction and supervision of the City, provided that nothing herein shall be construed as requiring the City to furnish a sewer connection or sewer services to any premises where a City sewer is not available at the time that the application is made. Any permit received is not assignable by the customer.
- 4.2 There shall be two (2) classes of building sewer permits: Class 1 is for all residential customers and commercial customers whose wastewater does not differ significantly from domestic wastewater. Class 2 is for service to establishments producing industrial wastewater which differs significantly from domestic wastewater. Class 2 permits shall be for a

period not to exceed two (2) years. In either case, the Owner or his agency shall make application for a permit to the City. The permit application shall be supplemented by any plans, specifications, or other information considered pertinent in the judgement of the City as necessary before a permit can be issued. Characteristics of typical domestic wastewater shall be established by the City. A permit and inspection fee of \$35.00 dollars shall be required for a commercial building sewer permit and \$100.00 dollars for an industrial building sewer permit shall be paid to the City at the time the application is filed.

4.3 A separate and independent building sewer shall be provided for every building, except where one building stands at the rear of another on an interior lot and no private sewer is available or can be constructed to the rear building through an adjoining alley, court, yard, or driveway, the building sewer from the front building may be extended to the rear building and the whole considered as one building sewer.

4.4 Old building sewer service connections may be used for new buildings only when they are found, on examination and tests by the City or their duly authorized representative, to meet all requirements of this Ordinance.

4.5 Building sewers shall be four inch minimum inside diameter for residential customers. Minimum size for all other customers shall be individually considered. Sewer material shall be Vitrifed Clay Pipe meeting ASTM C-700 or PVC Pipe meeting ASTM 3034, SDR35. Building sewers shall be laid on a 1% pitch and true with tight joints. Minimum grade shall be one-quarter inch per foot for four inch sewers. Invert elevations of property sewer service connections at easement or property line shall be equal to or higher than crown of collector sewer at point of connection. Connection shall not be made, nor shall trench be backfilled before an inspection of the work has been made and an approval certificates signed by a duly authorized representative of the City. Such inspections shall be made within 48 hours of the receipt of notice by the City (Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays excepted).

4.6 The building sewer shall be connected into the public sewer at the main sewer line or curb line, where branch sewers enter from the main sewer to either the curb line or property line, or to the service branch on the public sewer where such public sewer exists within an easement on private property.

4.7 No person shall make connection of roof drains, exterior foundation drains, areaway drains, or other sources of surface water runoff or groundwater to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.

4.8 All excavations for building sewer installation that extend adjacent to public right-of-way shall be adequately guarded by the Owner with barricades and lights so as to protect the public from hazard. Streets, sidewalks, parkways, and other public property distributed in the course of the work shall be restored in a manner satisfactory to the City.

4.9 All architects, contractors, builders, or other persons, before commencing the erection of any building or other improvement capable of emitting liquid wastes or sewage, on any lot or parcel of land abutting on a street, alley or easement in which there is installed and maintained any such sewage collection line, or on any lot or parcel of land through which there may be hereafter installed a sewage collection line, or to which a sewage collection line is made available, shall before erecting or installing such building or improvement, exhibit to the City, or to such official as the City may designate, satisfactory evidence that a means has been provided or will be provided for connecting the sanitary sewage drain pipes from such building or other improvement with such sewer collection line.

4.10 In the event that a building or premises discharging sewage, water, or other wastes into the municipal sewer facilities uses water supplied on other lines or curb line, where branch sewers enter from the main sewer in such case the owner or occupant may be required to cause a water meter or other measuring device acceptable to the City to be installed.

4.11 In the event any building or premises uses water in excess of 10,000 gallons per month as shown by the water meter readings for two consecutive months and it can be shown that a substantial portion of the water as so measured does not and cannot enter the municipal sewer facilities, then the City may determine, in such manner as may be found practicable, the amount of water entering the sewers, in which event the sewer rate or charge shall be based thereon, or the City may require or cause installation of additional meters or measuring devices to determine the quantity of water or sewage actually entering the municipal sewer facilities, in which case the sewer rate or charge shall be based thereon.

5. REGULATIONS RELATING TO RATES OF DISCHARGE AND CHARACTER OF WATERS AND WASTES ADMISSIBLE TO PUBLIC SEWERS

5.1 No stormwater drain shall be or remain connected or be connected with any separate sanitary sewer or made a part of the sewer system of the City, nor shall any stormwater surface water, groundwater, roof runoff, or subsurface drainage be discharged or otherwise introduced into any such separate sanitary sewer.

Stormwater and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as specifically designated as combined sewers or storm drains, or to a natural outlet approved by the City. Uncontaminated industrial cooling water or unpolluted process water may be discharged, on approval of the City and the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet on its successor, to a storm drain, combined sewer, or natural outlet.

5.2 Disposal into the sewer system of any pollutant by any person is unlawful except when such disposal is in compliance with federal standards promulgated pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 (FWPCA) and any subsequent amendments, or any more stringent state and local standards.

5.3 Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any of the following designed wastes or wastes to any public sewer:

- (a) Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, fuel oil, or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid or gas.
- (b) Any waters or wastes containing toxic or poisonous solids, liquids, or gases in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction with other wastes, to injure or interfere with any wastewater treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, create a public nuisance, or create any hazard in the receiving waters of the wastewater treatment plant.
- (c) Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than 5.5, or higher than 9.0, or having any other corrosive propensity capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, and personnel of the sewerage system.
- (d) Solid or viscous substances in quantities of or such size capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers, or other interference with the proper operation of the sewerage system such as, but not limited to: ground paper products, ashes, bones, cinders, sand, mud, straw, sawdust, metal glass, bags, feathers, plastic, wood, plastic, wood, ground garbage, whole blood, paunch manure, hair and fleshings, entrails and paper containers.
- (e) Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than one hundred (100) degrees Fahrenheit or which causes the temperature of the receiving waters "influent" to exceed one hundred (100) degrees Fahrenheit.
- (f) Any water or waste containing wax, grease, or other oils/mineral origin, whether emulsified or not, in excess of one hundred (100) mg/l or containing substances which may solidify or become viscous at temperatures between thirty-two (32) and one hundred fifty (150) degrees Fahrenheit.
