The permit for industrial wastewater discharge may require pretreatment of industrial wastewaters before discharge, restriction of peak flow discharges, discharge decration wastewaters only to specified sewers of the City, relocation of point of discharge, prohibition of discharge of certain wastewater components, restriction of discharge to certain bours of whe day, payment of additional charges to defray increased costs to the City, created by the wastewater discharge, and such other conditions as may be required to effectuate the purpose of this Ordinance.

No permit for industrial wastewater discharge is transferable without the prior written consent of the City.

No person shall discharge industrial wastewaters in excess of the quantity or quality limitations set by the permit for industrial wastewater discharge. Any person destring to discharge wastewaters or use facilities which are not in conformance with the permit should apply to the City for an amended permit. Violations of this section shall be unlawful and shall be in conformance with ended permit. Violatio stitute a public nuisan

- 6.2 The City may change the restrictions or conditions of a permit for industrial wastewater discharge from time to time as circumstances may require. The City shall allow an industrial discharger a reasonable period of time to comply with any changes in the permit required by the City.

Recent research indicates that recent research indicates that calories from fat actually are more fattening than those from carbo hydrates.

We've known for many years
hat gram for gram, fat, is the
most concentrated source of calories in this diet, but it was thought
that all calories are equal. Now we
know that just is not so.
The body must burn calories
to convert food to body fat. This
process is 'inefficient when it
comes to carbohydrates such as
sugars and startches. In fact, about
one-fourth of the carbohydrate
calories consumed are burned
during the conversion process.
The body is fairly efficient at
converting food fat to body fat,
found, in the conversion product
turned into body fat. So, while the
number of calories are lost when
food fat is turned into body fat. So,
while the number of calories eate lost when
may be equal, fat is more
fattening.
For example, suppose you eat

The implications of this study have far-reaching effects for the over-weight. They may not be the sweet eaters we think they are. Perhaps a love of fatty foods, and not sweets, has been their underest



is grazed extremely short, and proper fertility is supplied. Sow certified seed of adapted legumes at the rates recommend ed for seeding along. Just before sowing, inoculate seed with the proper nitrogen-fixing bacteria.

Renowated fields should be kept grazed short until the lives stock begin bitting off the young legumes. At that three remove the livestock and allow clover 45 weeks and affalfa 8.10 weeks to become established. Thereter, mow and or graze the field to best suit the particular legume that was planted.

If a once over renovator is used to till, plant the legume seed, and press the seed into firm soil, special attention must be given to grass management. After planting legumes, the grass of the planting legumes, the grass should be kept to control grass competition. When he animals begin grazing the legumes, remove them and permit he legumes to become established. If the newly seeded field cannot be properly grazed or occupancy of the legumes, and the legumes to become established. If the newly seeded field cannot be properly grazed or clipped. Paraquat (Gramoxone) may be used to aid in grass suppression. Apply Paraquat (Gramoxone) at the rate of 0.5 lbs. of active ingredient per acre in lands over the seeded row. of active ingredient per acre in bands over the seeded row, leaving about 50 percent of land surface untreated. This assures a surface untreated. This assures a good grass stand will remain in the renovated field. Even with Paraquat (Gramoxone), grass growth should be controlled by a combination of grazing and clipping. Follow label instructions as to when grazing can be started after use of the chemical

use of the chemical Seeding rates, in pounds per care, for renovating are: white clover, 1-3, red clover, 8-12, annual lespedeza. 20-25, affafar. 12-20, in combinations with clover, 1-2, and red clover, 4-6, affafa, 8-10, and Ladina white clover, 1/2-1.

Cromolyn is a drug available for several years which helps prevent allergic symptoms all the way from the eyes to the lungs. Trade names are Opticrom for the eyes. Nasal crom for the nose and intal for the lungs.

This drug is administered as drops or an inhaler depending on where it is used. It works by coating the mast cells which low coating the mast cells which sound the alarm when pollens or other allergens invade the body. They release histamine

from themselves and this chemical is responsible for the well know allergy symptoms of itchy eyes. Tunny nose and wheezing.

Cromolyn stabalitizes the mast cells and helps prevent them from releasing histamine. The drug works only. to PREVENT the allergy symptoms. Once the symptoms start. it is of limited use. Therefore. It must be started before the allergy season and continued until the offending allergen is gone. Ask your doctor if you think your child has enough symptoms to warrant this preventive treatment.

Retinopathy: Complication of Diabetes

Sight-infrastening eye disease is a common complication of dabates mellitus and can often be present with good vision. AN ORDINANCE REQULATING THE USE OF PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SEWERS AND DRAINS, PRIVATE WASTEWATER IMPOSAL. THE INSTALLATION AND CONNECTION OF INLIBING SEWERS, AND THE DISCHARGE OF WASTERS AND WASTES INTO THE PUBLIC SEWER SYSTEMS! AND ROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS THEREOF: IN THE ZITY OF MT. VERNON, COUNTY OF ROCKCASTLE, COMBONWEALTH OF RETUCKY.

RDAINED AND ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE MT. VERNON, KENTUCKY, AS FOLLOWS:

1. DEFINITIONS

Unless the context specially indicates otherwise, the meaning of te used in this ordinance shall be as foolows:

- 1.3 "Building Drain" shall mean that part of the lowest horizontal piping of a drainage system which receives the discharge from waste, and other drainage pipes inside the walls of the building, and conveys it to the building sewer, beginning five I5I feet outside the inner face of the
- 1.4 "Building Sewer" shall mean the extension from the building dt to the public sewer or other place of disposal, also called house conn
- 1.5 "City" shall mean the City of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, acting by and through its City Council or by and through such other body as shall be the governing body of said City under the laws of Kentucky at any given
- 1.6 "Chemical Oxygen Demand" or "COD" shall mean a measure of the oxygen equivalent to that portion of the organic matter in a sample that is susceptible to oxidation by a strong chemical oxidant, as determined by the appropriate procedure in the latest edition of "Standard Methods."

- 1.10 "Discharger" shall mean any person who discharges or causes a discharge to a public sewer

3. REGULATIONS CONCERNING PRIVATE WASTEWATER DISPOSAL

3.1 Except as hereinafter provided. It shall be unlawful for any person to construct or maintain or permit to be constructed or maintained any outdoor toller, privy, wall, cesspool, septic tank, or other similar contrivance for the reception of sewage on any lands owned by such person, or under his control, which abut upon a sewage collection line available in any public street, alley, or other easement or through which a sewage collection line passes or to which a sewage collection line is hereafter available. All such outdoor tollets or privies shall be removed, and all such wulst, cesspools, septic tanks, or other similar contrivances for the reception of sawage shall be closed or filled or otherwise removed from the properties described above within intelly (90) days after such sewage collection service becomes available.

All such privies, surface toilets, or other means of casting or depositing sewage into a container above or below the surface of the ground or upon or into the soil or into any running or percolating steem of where or into any cistem or well whereby the soil or any surface or subsurface waters is containinated with such sewage are hereby declared to constitute a public nuisance and their use or maintenance for a period of more than ninety (90) days following the availability of a sewage collection line to the property is hereby prohibited, declared to be unlawful, and to constitute a nuisance.

 3.4 Before commencement of construction of a private sewage dispose system: the owner shall first obtain a written permit signed by the Rockastle County Health Department and the Mayor of the City following the approval for said permit at a duly called meeting of the City of Mt. Vernon's City Council. The owner shall make application for a permit the City. The permit application shall be supplemented by any plans specifications and other information as are deemed necessary by this open control of the City at the time the application is filled.

 3.5 A permit for a private sewage disposal system shall not become effective until the installation is completed to the satisfaction for the Rock-casels County Health Department and the City. They shall be allowed to inspect the work at any stage of construction, and in any event the applicant for the permit shall notify the City when the work is ready for final inspection and before any underground portions are covered. The inspection shall be made within forty-eight (48) hours of the receipt of notice by the City (Sarturdays, Sundays, and holidays excepted).
- 3.6 At such times as a public sewer becomes available to a property served by a private sewage disposal system, as provided in Article 2, a direct connection shall be made to the public sewer in compliance with this Ordinance, and any septic tanks, cesspools, and similar private sewage disposal facilities shall be abandoned and filled with suitable material.
- 3.7 The Owner shall operate and maintain the private sewage disp facilities in a sanitary manner at all times, at no expense to the City
- 3.9 No statement contained in this Article shall be construed to inter-with any additional requirements that may be imposed by the City of Vernon and the Rockcastle County Health Department.

4. REGULATIONS CONCERNING THE BUILDING OF SEWERS AND CONNECTIONS

- 4.1 No person, firm or corporation shall uncover, make any connections with or opening into, use, alter, or disturb any public sewer or appurtenance thereof without first obtaining a permit from the City. The City will, upon application to the City and payment of any tapping or connection fee, issue a permit to the applicant to tap the City sewer and run a lateral to the property line of any applicant where sewers are available, and any installations or attachments shall be made by the applicant under the direction and supervision of the City, provided that northing herein shall be construed as requiring the City to furnish a sever connection or sewer services to any premises where a City sewer is not assignable by the customers.
- 4.2 There shall be two (2) classes of building sewer permits: Class 1 is for all residential customers and commercial customers whose wastewater dokes not differ significantly from domestic wastewater. Class 2 is for service to establishments producing industrial wastewater which differs

Connection shall not be made, nor shall tranch be backfilled before an inspection of the work has been made and an approval certificates signed by a duly authorized representative of the City. Such inspections shall be made within 48 hours of the receipt of notice by the City (Saturdays. Sundays, and holidays excepted).

- 4.7 No person shall make connection of roof drains, exterior foundation drains, areaway drains, or other sources of surface water runoff or groundwater to a building sewer or building drain which in turn is connected directly or indirectly to a public sanitary sewer.
- 4.8 All excavations for building sewer installation that extend adjacent to public right-of-way shall be adequately guarded by the Owner with berricades and lights so as to protect the public from hazdrad. Streets: sidewalks, perkways, and other public property distributed in the course of the work shall be restored in a manner satisfactory to the City.

He amount of water entering the sewers, in which event the sewer rate or charge shall be based thereon, or the City may require or permit the installation of additional meters or measuring devices to determine the quantity of water or sewage actually entering the municipal sever facilities, in which case the sewer rate or charge shall be based

5. REGULATIONS RELATING TO RATE OF DISCHARGE AND CHARACTER OF WATERS AND WASTES ADMISSIBLE TO PUBLIC SEWERS

5.1 No stormwater drain shall be or remain connected or be connected with any seperate sanitary sewer or made a part of the sewer system of the City, nor shall any stormwater surface water. groundwater roof runoff, or subsurface drainage be discharged or otherwise introduced into any such separate sanitary sewer.

Stormwater and all other unpolluted drainage shall be discharged to such sewers as specifically designated as combined sewers or storm drains, or to a natural outlet approved by the City Uncontaminated industrial cooling water or unpolluted process water may be discharged, on approval of the City and the Kentucky Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Cabinet on its successor, to a storm drain, combined sewer, or natural

- 5.2 Disposal into the sewer system of any pollutant by any person is unlawful except when such disposal is in compliance with federal standards promulgated pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 [FWPCAA] and any subsequent amendments, or any more stringent state and local standards.
- 5.3 Except as hereinafter provided, no person shall discharge or cause to be discharged any of the following designed waters or wastes to any public

(a) Any gasoline, benzene, naphtha, fuel oil, or other flammable or explosive liquid, solid or gas.

(b) Any waters or wastes containing toxic or poisonous solids. Ilquids, or sees in sufficient quantity, either singly or by interaction with other wastes. To injure or interfere with any wastewater treatment process, constitute a hazard to humans or animals, create a public nuisance, or create any hazard in the receiving waters of the wastewater treatment

- (c) Any waters or wastes having a pH lower than 5.5, or higher than 9.0. or having any other corrosive propensity capable of causing damage or hazard to structures, equipment, and personnel of the sewage system.
- (d) Solid or viscous substances in quantities or of such size capable of causing obstruction to the flow in sewers, or other interference with the proper operation of the sewerage system such as, but not limited to ground paper products, ashes, bones, cinders, sand, mud. strawshavings, metal, glass; regs, feathers, tar, plastic, wood, unground garbage, whole blood, paunch manure, hair and fleshings, entrails and
- (e) Any liquid or vapor having a temperature higher than one hundred fifty (150) degrees Fahrenheir or which causes the temperature of the treatment work's influent to exceed one hundred (100) degrees
- (f) Any water or waste containing wax, grease, or oils of mineral origin, whether emulsified or not, in excess of one-hundred [100], mg/l or containing substances which may solidity, or become viscous at temperatures between thirty-two (32) and one hundred fifty (150) degrees
