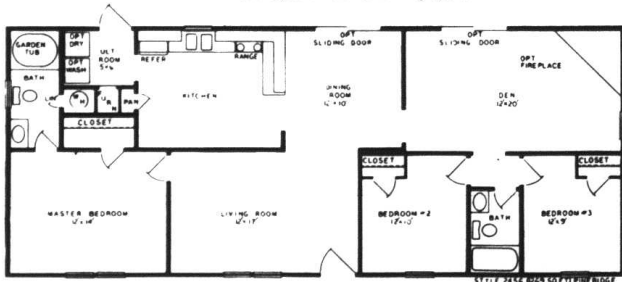

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

Local grand jury busy with seven indictments reported

Seven indictments ranging from kidnapping to receiving stolen property were handed down by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury Friday.

Kevin Holt, of 445 Angel Road-Berea, was indicted on one count of kidnapping for an April

18, incident in which he allegedly kidnapped, Janice Mink.

According to the indictment, Holt, forcibly detained Ms. Mink with intent to inflict bodily injury and terrorize her against her will.

Holt has been released on a \$10,000 bond pending his arraignment before Circuit Judge Dan Venters on May 8.

Richard Eugene Barnes, 40, of Sand Hill Road, Livingston was indicted on four charges stemming from two different confrontations with Kentucky State Police undercover narcotic agents.

According to the indictment on March 12 Barnes committed the offense of cultivating marijuana for the purpose of resale

over 25 plants when police found in his possession 27 marijuana plants at his residence on Sand Hill Road.

On February 21, Barnes committed the offense of trafficking in marijuana, over 8 ounces, by selling approximately one pound of the illegal weed to an undercover agent for \$900.

According to the indictment Barnes also sold a pound of marijuana to undercover police on March 12 for \$800.

Barnes is also charged with having 1 1/2 pounds to 2 pounds of marijuana in his possession for the purpose of resale on March 12.

His bond was set at \$12,000 cash or property. He is due back in court on May 8.

A Stearns man who drove his 1969 Chevrolet south in the North bound lane of I-75 on April 4, was indicted on four counts.

According to the indictment Noel Bryant, 25, drove his vehicle into the path of a vehicle driven by Amanda Delacruz about 11 p.m. (Cont. to A3)

Road boss named by fiscal court

Luster Bullock was appointed permanent county highway supervisor at a called meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Monday.

Bullock was named to the job temporarily after Monroe Hansel was relieved of duties with the road department.

Bullock will serve until the end of the court's present term on Dec. 31, 1989. Road supervisors are hired only for two or four-year terms. Bullock will receive \$506 an hour for a 4 1/2-hour week.

M.B. Kincaid was hired by the court as a county road worker/garbage clean up at \$4 an hour, a dual job.

In other action, the court voted to hold its May 5 regular meeting beginning at 3 p.m. instead of 10 a.m. in order that all magistrates could attend. The change in time is for the one meeting only.

The magistrates said some garbage collectors are selling residents garbage bag stickers good for six months, telling residents the garbage plan was voted for only a six month term. There is no time limit on the garbage plan.

The court said a garbage franchise is being drawn up and will be before the court as soon as it is completed by attorney for the county garbage plan, David Howard of London.

Trust fund needs more money

A concerted drive to reach a \$100,000 trust fund account for Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corp. is now under way with a special effort scheduled at the cemetery on Memorial Day.

According to Lewis D. Niceley, president of the cemetery corporation, the trust account now has \$80,000 but that does not mean the cemetery has all the money it needs.

The trust account is irrevocable and the interest income only can be used for maintenance of the cemetery.

"Basically, we're in good

financial shape at this time," Niceley related, "but we are not so well off as to stop contributions. The interest rate on our invested money which we use for expenses is down to about 5 percent, so if we had not had contributions last year we would have had a problem. So, contributions need to continue."

Niceley pointed out that even after a goal of \$100,000 is reached in the trust fund, "We'll probably spend most of our income and we'll still need the contributions."

Actually, contributions decrease from year to year as relatives die, and there are no more cemetery lots available for sale.

On Memorial Day 1986, there were 139 contributions \$2,211 per donor. On Memorial Day 1986, there were 119 contributions for \$2,190 averaging \$18.40 per contribution according to Henry Cox, vice president.

As of Feb. 21, the cemetery's now account balance was \$1,631 with some additional money collected to date.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge Dan Venters, who levied the fines and sentences against the two men, said Friday, "I know this seems like a stiff penalty, but people have to realize that when they are subpoenaed it is for a good purpose and they can't just disregard it. If I had let these men off, the next trial we have, two more witnesses might not show up."

Candidates set; 57 want an office

There will be 57 candidates on the May 26 primary ballot, but there are only four seeking local offices.

Incumbent 28th Judicial District Commonwealth Attorney, Benny Ham is opposed for a second term by Somerset Attorney Robert E. Gillum.

In the Mt. Vernon mayor's race for the two year term remaining on Mayor Roland Mullins' term are incumbent Mayor Eliza Beth Baker and Cousin Doug Baker. R. Renner, Mrs. Baker, was appointed mayor by the council when Mayor Roland Mullins moved outside the city limits.

There'll be about 700 less county voters in the primary. That many have been purged because of failure to vote during the past four years have moved or died.

Registration closed Monday.

A total of about 8,244 are legally registered to vote in Rockcastle compared to 8,800 before the purge. The final tally of the number of county voters comes from the state and about two weeks.

County Clerk Norma Hawk estimates that about 41 had registered since the last state report in February.

A breakdown of those February figures shows 6,194 Republicans, 1,697 Democrats and 42 with no preference. Of the 4,028 are female. A total of 8,394 are who voted one or other.

Among all these other candidates on the ballot there are some unusual names and nicknames.

such as Franklin D. Roosevelt Keese, Harry Gippo, Graham, James, Chum, Tackett Jimmy Casbe, Turner and Robert Mead CPA.

All remaining 53 candidates are for statewide office.

Probably the most discussed is the race for governor where there are 12 candidates eight Democrats and four Republicans.

Democrats are Steven L. Beshar, John Y. Brown, Julian M. Carroll, Grady Stumbo, Wallace Wilkinson, Anne Moore, Stanley Luttrell and Drowdiddle Lampton Jr.

Republican candidates are Leonard W. Beck, Beasley, Joseph E. Johnson III, John Harner and Thurman Jerome Hamble.

There are two Republicans for lieutenant governor, Tommy Klein and Lawrence R. Webster.

Democrats for lieutenant governor are Alan McDonald, David Russell, Paul Patton, Wilton Benge, Cupp, Dave Armstrong and Brandon Jones.

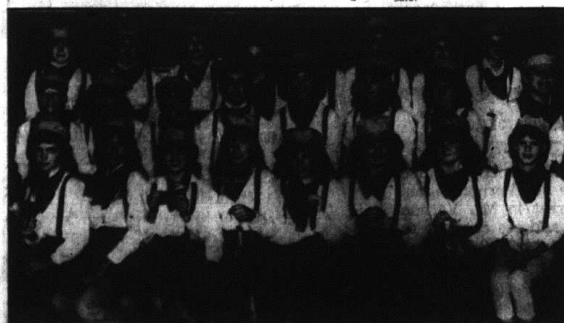

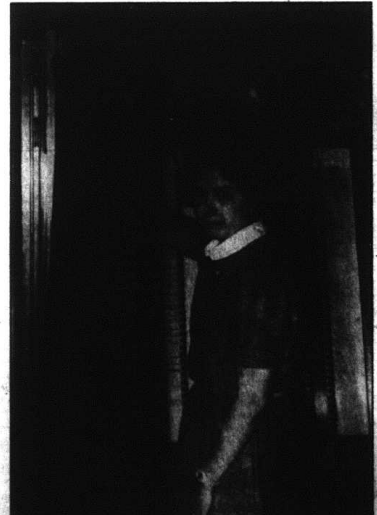

An articulate and outspoken proponent of drug and alcohol abuse education and prevention, Linkletter writes, speaks, and broadcasts from coast to coast in the fight against the drug epidemic threatening our nation.

Susan Newman, daughter of Paul Newman, has taken another approach.

As executive director of the Scott Newman Center and Foundation she will present two very special workshops: one on Thurs. day for parents/adults only and one on Friday for all conference participants on the influence of various media on the substance abuse of young people.

Tobacco: A Foundation for Growth

While some suggest that tobacco has passed its heyday, it remains Kentucky's leading cash crop and a mainstay of the state's economy.

Along with many other Kentuckians, I am convinced that tobacco still holds great promise for thousands of troubled but still hard-working and hopeful farm families.

My faith in this traditional crop is based in part on recent successes in our efforts to stabilize and improve world markets for U.S. leaf tobacco. But it is also based on a belief that we can begin to use our resilient tobacco culture - and tobacco always has been a way of life in many parts of our state - as a foundation for a more diversified kind of farming in Kentucky.

You know about most of the successes: the government and tobacco companies drawing down a burdensome pool of excess burley, Philip Morris and R. J. Reynolds curtailing burley imports, export markets being opened in Japan, and elsewhere.

The prospect of building on our tobacco enterprises - learning to apply our tobacco labor, know-how and equipment to complementary crops - is a less familiar subject to many Kentuckians.

But I am among those who can't help feeling that this is an idea whose time has come. As a result, I am sponsoring a bill ordering a detailed federal study of tobacco production. This study would identify a variety of crops and livestock that might fit into and complement our tobacco operations.

In my view, there are compelling arguments for this approach. I do think we are showing that tobacco farmers - more than 100,000 of them in Kentucky - can hold their own against critics who would drive them from the business. Yet we will need more than tobacco to withstand the ravages of a general farm recession that already has brought failure to uncounted Kentucky farms.

As vitally important as they are, price supports for tobacco and other crops will go only so far toward saving embattled farmers. Clearly, we must begin looking also to innovation and to agricultural specialties, seeking a wide range of alternatives to allow farmers to choose what is right for their own operations.

Vegetables and other so-called alternate crops already are being promoted as a partial cure for Kentucky's farm problems. But our best bet is to build on what we already have on almost every Kentucky farm - tobacco. And we need a plan to do that.

Under my bill, the U.S. Department of Agriculture would study every detail of tobacco production and marketing to find ways to more fully use the impressive resources already devoted to that process.

Just as important, the U.S. Commerce Department would be called upon to study potential markets for crops that might be produced in conjunction with tobacco.

This exhaustive, six-month study could be implemented by farmers working with government leaders, lenders, the Cooperative Extension Service and other support groups.

Farmers could benefit greatly from new enterprises making use of the seasonal labor employed in tobacco.

Tobacco transplanters can be used on vegetable and other crops. Farmers in the off season might use tobacco barns for sheltering cattle or during our famous Kentucky hams or specialty herbs and spices. I think that a farmer cooperative could use a tobacco redrying plant for sorting and packaging green peppers.

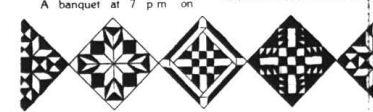
These are just a few tentative examples of what we might do. The real point is that tobacco is a crucially important crop that can and must be adapted to a painfully changing farm economy.

According to the indictment, Bryant used his vehicle as a dangerous instrument in causing serious physical injury.

Bryant is presently free on bond until his May 8 arraignment. Orville D. Hammock of Rt. 4, London, was indicted on one count of "trafficking marijuana over 8 ounces."

Hammock apparently sold eight ounces of marijuana to Richard Eugene Barnes on March 12 for an undisclosed amount, according to the indictment.

He is scheduled back in court on May 8. His bond was set at \$10,000.

Keith Hopkins, Ky. 70, Brodhead, was indicted on one count of receiving stolen property valued at over \$100, and one count of unlawful possession of alcoholic beverages.

IMPLANTS SPUR CALVES GROWTH RATE

Growth stimulating implants offer commercial beef cattle producers a speedy method of increasing growth rate of calves. But their use as profit boosters is often neglected by beef producers.

Using growth stimulating implants to increase rate of gain is economical and requires little skill, according to Extension beef feed specialists at the University of Kentucky.

Producers who use implants in calves can expect an increased gain of about six percent for suckling calves and 10 percent for growing calves. Calves getting good quality feed and gaining at a fast rate will have an even greater response to growth promoting implants.

Implants come in the form of pellets that are inserted in a calf's ear. They generally cost about one to two dollars per calf and bring returns many times greater than their cost. In trials conducted in 28 Kentucky counties, implanted suckling steer calves gained an average 27 pounds more than non-implanted calves. That one dollar spent for each implant yielded at least fifteen dollars worth of additional gain.

Effective and safe growth promoting products, like Synovex, CompuDose and Raigro, are currently available as implants. Synovex is a natural hormone implant which has been on the market for nearly 20 years. It is available in two forms: Synovex S for steers weighing 400-1,000 pounds and Synovex H for heifers weighing 400-800 pounds. The Synovex implant comes in cartridges composed of eight small pellets, deposited under the skin in the center of the back of the ear, about 1/3 the length of the ear away from

the base of the horn, just outside the cartilage rim of the ear.

CompuDose implants are available for steers and heifers and cost less. They are injected intramuscularly. The implants are effective for up to 180 days. After they are used, the calves should be treated with antibiotics to prevent infection. Application of the implants to other implants on the neck of the calf is not recommended.

Producers must take care to maintain proper nutrition. If calves are not properly fed, implants will be ineffective. If implants are used on calves with abnormal behavior, such as bulging, implant pellets can be inserted in the full length of the ear. In the implant, gain under the skin. Pull the needle out about half way as the process of expelling pellets is begun. If implanting is done correctly, the calves will feel like there is a pellet under the ear, but not under the skin.

Beef producers can use a variety of growth promoting products in calves during other routine practices, such as vaccinations, castration and deworming. Calves may be vaccinated every 60 to 90 days for additional gain, while calves within 60 days of slaughter must not be implanted. Some feeder managers prefer calves that have not been implanted because the extra gain takes away from the compensatory gain they normally get from thin calves. Beef producers occasionally may encounter some bawler resistance to implanted cattle, but the benefits of using implants far outweigh the disadvantages. The commercial cow/calf producers should be concerned primarily with achieving the most production in his own operation.

Producers should not use implants on bulls they intend to keep for breeding herd. Bull calves treated with growth stimulants have been shown to have small testes, decreased sex drive and decreased semen production compared to non-implanted bulls.

Reward being offered in suspected arson case

A reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons that burned down a 200 year old log house and a trailer at Calloway in March.

Glenn and Katherine Mullins said last week they knew who burned down Almira Mullins' home on March 6, but they can't find anyone who is willing to testify.

Almira Mullins is Glenn Mullins' mother. Because of the double arson on her property, she is having to live in Cincinnati with her son and daughter-in-law.

"Your county attorney told me it was a lack of money that was the problem with enforcing the laws in Rockcastle County," Glenn Mullins said. "The home destroyed was 200 years old and built by her grandparents from hand hewed logs, sweat and toil. These people pioneered this country and it is sad, that this kind of blatant destruction doesn't end here."

"The person or persons who destroyed part of our American history are running around free and you probably could take a survey and find out that 99.9 percent of the people surveyed know who the terrorists are," Mullins said.

Kentucky State Police Detective Ernie Boggs is investigating the alleged arson but as of yet has not made any arrest in the case. A few months ago, the Mullins had a problem with two men who stole a wagon from their property. A boarder in the trailer saw the two men taking the wagon and attempted to stop them. They threatened him with a gun and were eventually arrested over the incident. The case is still pending in district court.

But Glenn and Katherine Mullins think that particular incident had a lot to do with their property being destroyed, and they are advocating the formation of a group to assist in law enforcement.

"Anyone wishing to form a group to assist the law in cleaning out the terrorists in the county, so we can have peace brought back, so a man doesn't have to pack a gun, should write me," Mullins said. His address is Glenn Mullins 4265 Spring Grove Ave. Cincinnati, Ohio 45223.

As far as the lack of money, Mullins said that if enough people got interested in what is going on, the state might release more funds to this county. He said that he would personally go to Frankfort himself.

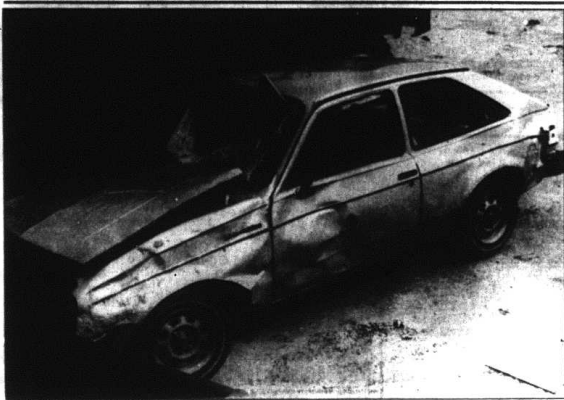

Appalachian poverty declining

The poverty rate in Appalachia has declined by more than half since the 1960s, when the federal government declared its war on poverty in the area. But it is still twice the national average, says a University of Kentucky study.

Anti-poverty programs have had more effect, according to the study released this week by UK's Appalachian Center, but in Appalachia the major battles (against poverty) remain to be fought.

The study, focused on the mountainous counties in Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee, counties either dominated by the

mining industry or with little local economy at all.

Today almost one person out of four in Central Appalachia is classified as poor, nearly one in three as either poor or near poor, the report says.

Both poverty and near poverty are so prevalent in this region that its cycle of poverty is

unlikely to be broken without continued external assistance.

Federal residents have benefited most from anti-poverty programs, which have served them as a minimum safety net, the study says.

But states and private people are expected to make more of their own effort, assistance takes them over difficult times, and, unfortunately, the local economy has not come through the many American years.

New jobs in the region are mostly in the service, retail and light manufacturing areas, with "low pay and obsolete equip-

KEST will be given May 7 and 21 locally

Between May 7 and May 21 the Kentucky Essential Skills Test (KEST) will be administered to all students in the Rockcastle County Schools. These dates are determined by law which states that the KEST must be administered between the 16th and 17th instructional school days.

All students in grades K-12 will be tested in the Basic Skills Areas of: (1) Reading (2) Mathematics (3) Spelling (4) Writing (5) Library Research Reference.

In addition students in grades 3-12 will take the Test of Cognitive Skills (TCS). The TCS is an aptitude type test which measures skills in: (1) Sequences (2) Analogies (3) Memory (4) Verbal Reasoning. The TCS assesses in estimating the potential ability of a student. That potential ability can then be compared to the actual achieved score.

Results from the KEST are used in monitoring the progress of individual students, individual classes and entire grade membership at both the school and district levels.

Parents can assist the testing effort by promoting the following recommendations:

(1) Recognize the importance of the testing program and support the effort.

(2) Promote attendance. Students will be required to make up the test if absent.

(3) Stress the importance of getting proper rest prior to test administration. Students need to get a good night's sleep and eat

breakfast on test administration days.

(4) Contact your school when the fall term begins and review the test results for your child. It is important that parent and school work together in designing appropriate educational programs.

For specific KEST scheduling arrangements please call the individual school.

Any parent or student who has a question regarding the testing program is encouraged to contact the school principal or guidance counselor or Big Towers district testing coordinator at 256-4144.
