**High blood pressure can be controlled, but not cured**

May is high blood pressure month. One of your best lines of defense against heart disease is drawing the line on blood pressure. Small measures that could lower your blood pressure and add up to a longer life are reducing your weight, exercising, cutting back on salt and following your doctor's advice about medication.

Approximately 58 million Americans have an increased risk of illness and early death due to high blood pressure. This represents more than one out of every four adult Americans.

High blood pressure is the major factor underlying the 500,000 strokes and 155,000 stroke deaths occurring annually in the United States. It is also a contributing factor in the 1,500,000 heart attacks and 567,000 heart attack deaths each year. Heart disease is the leading cause of death for American men and women of all races.

Hypertension can exist for years without symptoms and most cases arise for no known reason. The following are certain factors which increase your statistical risk.

**FAMILY HISTORY:** Children with one hypertensive parent have a higher risk than those with no high blood pressure in the family. When both parents have hypertension the odds are even greater.

**AGE:** High blood pressure often develops in the 30's and 40's but it becomes more prevalent with age. Many elderly people develop some degree of hypertension.

**RACE:** Hypertension is generally more common in blacks than in whites. The reason is unknown, speculation centers on the roles of diet and socioeconomic factors.

**SALT CONSUMPTION:** Some

people seem genetically susceptible to the effects of sodium in the blood vessels. Since it's difficult to screen for salt sensitivity, it makes sense for everyone to moderate salt intake.

**OBESITY:** Being overweight increases your risk of high blood pressure and several other diseases. To compound the problem,

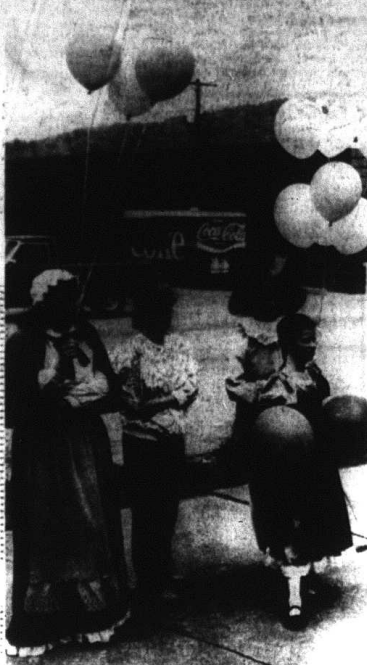
salt intake is often higher in obese people, due simply to eating more food.

**ALCOHOL:** Heavy drinking can elevate pressure in the arteries. People with hypertension should have no more than one or two drinks a day, at the very most.

**CIGARETTE SMOKING:** Smoking a cigarette temporarily elevates blood pressure; it also makes the heart work harder. While there's no direct link to

**Low cost Mammography available to women in May**

During the month of May, screening mammograms (low dose breast x-rays) are being offered for only \$48 at many medical facilities throughout Cumberland Valley, as part of a May Mammography Campaign.

This campaign is organized around a vital issue: early detection of breast cancer. Dr. Ross Buchanan, president of the Kentucky chapter of the American College of Radiology,

Approximately 1,900 new cases of breast cancer will be diagnosed in Kentucky during 1987, according to projected figures from the American Cancer Society. If found early, enough up to 90% of those cases have a good chance of being cured. The most effective way to find breast cancer early is through mammography, combined with a physical exam.

The goal for a campaign of this type is to raise awareness of mammography and to offer low cost screening mammograms has mobilized a significant coalition of health professionals and civic leaders in Kentucky. The American College of Radiology, American Cancer Society, McDowell Cancer Network, Kentucky Federation of Women's Clubs, Kentucky Medical Association and the Governor's Office, Governor Marvin Laxer Collins and her daughter, Maria, will be featured in a public service announcement encouraging women to participate as a Mother's Day (May 10) celebration of good health; other

co-sponsoring organizations will be distributing information and educational materials about mammography and the availability of resources.

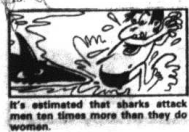

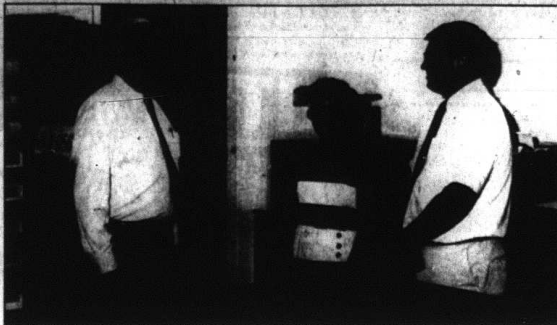

## Joe Johnson visits county, says job creation is cornerstone of campaign

Republican gubernatorial Candidate Joe Johnson, visiting Mt. Vernon last week, said that job creation was the cornerstone of his campaign.

"Jobs and education go hand in hand, and you can't have one without the other," said the Lexington attorney and business man.

Johnson noted that one out of 10 Kentuckians were unemployed and that 15 percent of Kentucky families were living in poverty. He called that "intolerable" and pledged an "enduring effort to turn this around."

He said that vocational training "has been stepchild of the school system for long enough." He would appoint a special, independent board to oversee

governors, whose only answer to the crisis in education has been to "throw some money at the problems. Having thus assured themselves of the K.E.A.'s enduring affection, that's that for education."

He thought it small wonder that business and industry "have been reluctant" to locate outside of the Golden Triangle - Lexington, Louisville, Cincinnati.

Generally substandard rural schools, plus an untrained and somewhat unstable work force, have plagued Kentucky for generations," Johnson said. "More money may help a little, but dedication effort and a willing ness to view our problems with open minds receptive to innovation and self-examination will help more."

Member of the Kentucky Extension Homemakers Association celebrate National Extension Homemakers Week, May 3-9. "Move to Improve," this year's statewide theme, also will be the theme for the Homemakers' state meeting in Lexington, May 13-15.

studies in Kentucky indicate these potential losses to be largely unpredictable and to range from 0 to 20 percent. Because of this unpredictability, we recommend use of the lowest cost source while pointing out the greater probability of fertilizer Nitrogen loss from surface application of urea or UAN solutions on no-till corn where the urea contact with the soil is likely to be delayed because of surface residues or plant cover. Recent work in Maryland has shown a 40 percent increase when using UAN solutions by surface banding (drilling) between the rows in no-till corn fields as compared to the usual practice of broadcast spraying over the entire surface. This practice presumably decreases surface volatilization losses from urea contained in the solution as well as immobilization of fertilizer Nitrogen by microbial activity in the surface residue layer.

It is nearly impossible to apply large amounts of fertilizer between the rows of the surface of a field. However, with the use of a no-till corn tractor, a smaller proportion is now being no-till into soil, and a larger proportion is now planted into firm cover crops or residue from the previous crop. In such conditions it is easier to make surface applications but usually requires modification of application equipment. No using a coulters in front of an application disk or a furrow opener. The coulters help to break the residue and help prevent residue buildup on wheels and in the injection slit.

Field experiments during recent years in Maryland, Indiana and Virginia have shown substantial increases in yields of no-till corn from subsurface application of fertilizer Nitrogen as compared to surface broadcast.

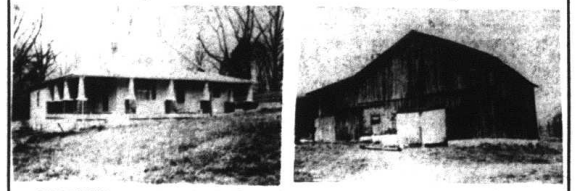

applications. Presumably, sub-surface application of fertilizer Nitrogen decreases volatilization and immobilization losses in the surface residue layer. Field studies on no-till corn in Kentucky during 1982 showed similar results.

**MANGANESE TOXICITY IN TOBACCO CAN BE PREVENTED BY USING LIME**

Each year Kentucky tobacco farmers lose between \$30 and \$50 million of their crop because of manganese toxicity, a syndrome caused by the improper balance of soil nutrients.

But manganese toxicity can be prevented by keeping the soil of the tobacco field at the right pH. Tobacco farmers use lots of nitrogen to increase yields. That can lead to increased acidity of the soil which may increase the incidence of manganese toxicity.

The common method to lower the soil's acidity is by using agricultural lime early in the growing season. However, some lime applied in large doses still doesn't bring the effective pH in line with the needs of tobacco.

The secret to adjusting the pH of the soil is to use high quality agricultural lime. At least two-thirds of the lime that is applied should dissolve in the soil within three years.

Applying lime well ahead of time is best, but where applying just ahead of this year's crop, plow down 1/2 to recommended amount and disk in the remaining lime.

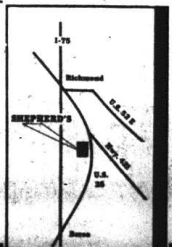

### Will Your Children Go To Heaven?

Elders all over the nation are concerned about the dropout rate of our young people. And well they ought to be. It is a tragic thing to see these precious girls and boys who are so thrilled with the Bible study as little people, grow cold and uninterested in the Lord's work as they grow older.

Lately, several congregations have made in-depth studies of all the factors available concerning all their young people with an eye to learning what might be done to help solve this problem. What do we need? More youth programs? More rallies? Special teachers?

From the material that has been published on these studies, it seems to me that one great central truth has begun to emerge. Faithfulness of the young person to Jesus Christ does not have anything to do with special programs or teachers. It is not dependent on whether they are members of a large congregation or a small one. The single most important value is their own immediate faith.

One congregation found that where both parents were faithful to the Lord, and that includes active interest in the local congregation's programs, 93% of the children remained faithful. On the other hand, if only one of the parents was faithful, that figure dropped to 73%. Where the parents were what we would call only reasonably active in the Lord's work, only 53% of the young people maintained their faith.

Now, here comes the shocker. In those cases where both parents attended only infrequently, the percentage of their children who remained faithful to the Lord dropped to 67%.

Do you want your children to go to heaven? Then make certain YOU are leading them. That is likely the only way they are going.

attaining Superior status are designated either "Unrated" which indicates that the service is in compliance with at least the minimum standards, or "Conditional" which means that this particular level of care in that facility is in non-compliance with the standards.

Woodrow Dunn, director of the Division of Licensing and Regulations, said, "It's important for the public to understand that each separate level of care is rated individually. Many facilities today offer two and sometimes three levels of residential care and each has its own rating."

Levels of care at long term care facilities include personal care, intermediate care, intermediate care/mental retardation, developmentally disabled, nursing home and skilled nursing care.

In order to achieve a "Superior" rating, a facility must meet two requirements for the level of care involved. First, it must be in compliance with the minimum standards for licensing in each of 11 areas, said Dunn. "Then the facility must exceed those mini-

mum standards in at least six of the 11 areas of its operation." Those 11 areas are administration, nursing services, dietary and nutritional services, life safety code, physical environment, physical and restorative therapy, social services and activities, drugs and biologicals, medical services, patients rights and record keeping.

Dunn said, "I believe this process provides a real incentive to the long-term care facilities in Kentucky to achieve the highest possible rating. Achievement of the "Superior" designation for an individual level of care should tell the public something about that facility just as the other ratings will serve as an indication of the track record as well."

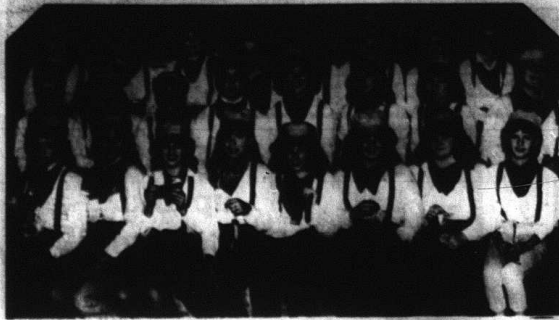

## S.S. number required for tax exemption

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 includes a provision that taxpayer identification numbers (usually individual social security numbers) be provided in most cases when a dependent is claimed on a tax return. The following questions and answers have been prepared to address this new requirement.

Q My wife and I claim our three children as dependents on our return. Must we do something different when we list them on our tax form for 1987?

A Yes, if they are at least 5 years old. Beginning with your 1987 return, you must include the taxpayer identification number of any dependent you claim on your return who is at least 5 years of age. Usually, this is your dependent's social security number.

Q I intend to claim my daughter as a dependent on my 1987 return. She does not turn five until the beginning of December. Must I still provide her social security number?

A Yes, if the dependent reaches the age of five by the end of the tax year, a number must be provided.

Q I claim my mother in law as a dependent on my return. Does this new law affect my return?

A Yes. The reporting requirement affects any dependent not just dependent children. If I need more information on this new law, what can I do?

A You can obtain a copy of the free IRS Publication 501, "Exemptions," by calling the IRS

toll free at 1-800-424-3676. If you need information on obtaining a social security number for your

 nationally for their work, and especially for their reasonable prices. On occasion, Germany planes from as far away as Bismarck and England have been seen on their customer's cars.  
 "I think hundreds of people in Eastern Kentucky especially are glad to see you because of the Hendersons," a Mt. Vernon businesswoman related. "They helped a lot of folks get teeth that otherwise would have had to gum it. They

were always helpful. . . . About 10 years ago the Hendersons gave up specialized denture work, meaning pulling teeth, filling and bridging, to make dentures exclusively.

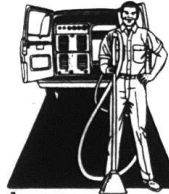

## State reports road work in county

The state Transportation Cabinet has awarded a contract for resurfacing and patching projects on 11 miles of roads in Rockcastle County.

The Allen Company, Inc., of Winchester received a \$109,465 contract to resurface 4.6 miles of Ky. 1152, the Level Green-Hanford Road from Ky. 461 extending east to Ky. 1249, bituminous patching on 3.1 miles of county road 5254 the Wabd Poplar Grove Road northeast and east to Ky. 1250, bituminous patching on 3.168 feet of county road 5270, John Cash Road from Ky. 328 northwest to county road 5272, Shirley Caldwell Road, and bituminous patching on 2.7 miles of county road 5405, Perry Rigby Road from Ky. 1126 extending north to Ky. 1506.

These projects are part of the state's continued effort to improve Kentucky roads and highways.

## Traffic report made by police

A total of 267 motorists were issued citations for traffic violations in Rockcastle County during March, according to a report by Kentucky State Police at the London Post.

There were 25 arrested for driving under the influence of intoxicants, 86 were issued citations for faulty equipment. There were 17 traffic accidents investigated with five persons injured. There were no fatalities.

Seventeen criminal investigations were made resulting in five arrests.

Within the London Post area there were 1487 traffic citations, 127 driving under the influence of intoxicants and four fatal accidents.

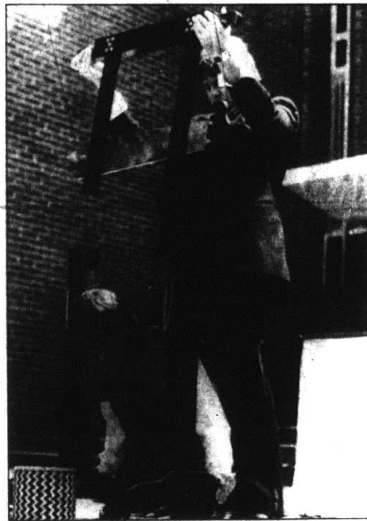

## County budget tops million dollars again

A budget of \$1,410,411 for Rockcastle County during the 1987-88 fiscal year had a first reading at a meeting of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court Tuesday.

The budget is on paper \$339,085 more than the 1986-87 budget of \$1,071,326.

The increase comes from \$387,085 which is to be loaned by the county to Mt. Vernon Plastics for the company's expansion program. That money which comes from a Community Development Block Grant must be listed in the budget and allocated off-ically.

The county will receive interest on the \$387,085 loan annually totaling about \$15,000. The \$15,000 is earmarked for Rockcastle Senior Citizens, \$7,000 debt service, \$3,000 and administration, \$5,000.

A further breakdown of the budget shows \$238,432 in the general fund, \$561,900 in the road fund, \$119,788 in the jail fund, \$85,706 in the local government economic assistance fund, and \$3,000 in the forestry fund.

Only the local government fund and the road fund showed increases over last year. Other funds showed decreases.

The local government fund increased but only about \$6,000. The road fund was up from last year's \$507,900 due to the increase in the state gasoline tax allocation to the county.

In other funds, the general fund was \$260,453 last year and the jail fund \$135,783.

Largest budgeted item as usual is for county roads at \$404,993.

One item is missing from the budget this year, Revenue Sharing, which was \$94,695 last year. Revenue Sharing is no longer allocated by the federal government.

In other action, the court agreed to allow whatever group using the concession stands at Brodhead Fairgrounds to keep the money it makes. The court set a \$700 deposit to the group for cleanup of the use facilities.

The court asked Crank, Village Road, Himes Road and Roland Hollow Road to be county road projects.

The court is going to save some money on garbage collection from officers at the courthouse.

The court has been pricing 116 bags of garbage. William K. Burdette, Magistrate, Arnis Burdette, and Robert Bee (garbage) and a \$1 unit a bag price. Billen then reduced his price to 40 cents.

This month the courthouse produced 116 bags of garbage. At the previous price of 75 cents, that would have been \$87. Under the new price the 116 bags will cost \$46.40 saving the county \$40.60.

The court did not discuss further planning for garbage collection, nor is a franchise agreement being drawn up for sale.

When asked about it, the magistrate said, "let us get our breath."

The court again set a new time for the June 2 meeting. The court will meet at 8 p.m. instead of 10 a.m.

## Shouting match highlights Brodhead Council meeting

A shouting match between a Brodhead city councilman and the city fire chief erupted Monday night at a Brodhead City Council meeting over responsibility for completing work on the second floor of the new city fire station.

Councilman D.A. Robbins and Fire Chief Bruce Bussell pulled no punches in their verbal exchange that ended when Chief Bussell left the council with a parting shot that "fire protection" in the city "is in your hands." He added that the council would receive his resignation.

Chief Bussell returned a short time later, issued a hand-written note on Mayor Billy Bussell's desk. The mayor folded it up and put it in his pocket without comment. The mayor made no comments during the heated exchange. The mayor is the chief's father.

The discussion began when Chief Bussell asked the council men what they were going to do about completing the upstairs of the new fire station and that the Regional Fire Fighters organization is planning to meet at

Brodhead if the building is completed by that time.

The second floor has been dry-walled, but not painted and furnished. Actually, the building cost about \$57,000 with the city financing about \$18,000 and the firm about \$20,000 plus considerable work on the building on their own time. The fire department is volunteer and considered a good one by other firemen in the area.

Incidentally, only Councilmen Robbins and Rennie Cash attended the meeting, along with Mayor Bussell. Absent were John Wilson and Eddie Cash.

Councilman Robbins told Chief Bussell he personally borrowed the money to complete the second floor could wait another year, preferring that available money be used to backstop some streets in Mountain View Estates on the city's west side where the city has 43 lots available for sale.

Chief Bussell said he respected the council's decision, but some interest in the fire station. Councilman Robbins quickly replied that putting up \$38,000 of city tax money was showing interest in the building.

## Dr. Jack Henderson retires

After 42 years of repeating "open wide" and "this won't hurt a bit," Dr. Jack Henderson has put his dental tools away.

The well-known Mt. Vernon dentist retired last Thursday from the dental firm that goes back to the 1890s when his father, John D. Henderson, began pulling and filling teeth.

Dr. Jack was the first son to carry on the family's dental tradition when he graduated from the University of Louisville in 1945 following pre-dental work at Berea College.

Shortly after graduation, he was called into the Navy where he remained for two years.

After Naval service, he came home to Mt. Vernon to join his father in the business of teeth. At that time, the office was over H & W Diner on Main Street.

As the years passed, Dr. Jack and his father was joined by Dr. Joseph Henderson, and later by brother, David, who has since left the firm. A sister, Frances Henderson and her husband, Dr. James Pennington, live in Winchester.

Dr. Jack, now 65, grew up in Mt. Vernon when there were still a familiar sight on city streets, and Mt. Vernon had just completed a new grade and high school. Young

Jack attended that school.

He reminisced about the early years in the dental business in Mt. Vernon when the "Hendersons were the only dentists."

"Although we got less for dental work in these early years, we were probably as well off or better than we are now at the present high prices," Dr. Jack

said.

In those days, the Hendersons charged 50 cents to pull a tooth, and a dollar for a filling. If the filling was a major job, they charged \$16 to extract all teeth and \$35 for uppers and lowers.

As the years went by, the Hendersons became known by

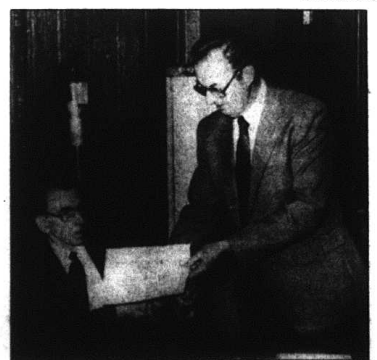
"If the same thing was to happen as did tonight it would give us time to come up with another option," Parsons said.

During a called meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court last month, some of the Magistrates, and especially Doug Bishop, criticized the Signal and reporter Raymond McClure for a story we carried three weeks ago concerning the county's awarding of the annual insurance contract. McClure was told that the Signal did a "poor" job of reporting the story.

But, when asked if any of the facts were wrong, the magistrate could not say yes. The facts were completely right in the story. We were at fault for not physically covering this meeting. A mix up in communications did result in no one from the Signal being present. But, this was our only mistake.

The way I see it, Magistrate Bishop was upset by the fact that we printed that his wife, Janet worked for one of the agencies that

It seems to me that a few weeks ago when Bishop was getting praised in this column, that everything was all right; but because the slightest possibly bad publicity comes his way, he gets upset and criticizes the newspaper and Ray.

Fact: Ray did not write the section mentioning Mrs. Bishop in the story, I did. Fact: if anyone

gets upset about what I write, the Signal office is located on Main Street in Mt. Vernon and I will be glad to talk to the disgruntled party about it.

Fact: nothing in the insurance story was wrong.

Fact: a possible conflict of interest neither exists with Magistrate Bishop making the motion to award the agency that his wife works for part of the county's insurance.

During this same meeting,

members of the fiscal court voted to adjourn the meeting and then decided to talk about county business. Ray waited around to see what was going on and he was told that the county attorney had advised the court that getting together would not be considered holding an illegal meeting even though discussing county business, with no one but the magistrates present.

Former Rockcastle resident Garland Vanhook is an architect with the Lexington-based firm.

Board members mainly based their decision on the fifty-plus employees that Johnson Romanowicz has compared to Shelton, who works alone.

The Superintendent told the board that while he did not want to say anything to influence them in the matter he felt Johnson Romanowicz could better supervise the 3.5 million \$ school project.

The board also hired Fred Dupree as the fiscal agent on the project. The fiscal agent is responsible for making sure that all of the financing on the project is in place.

While Johnson Romanowicz's fee will be approximately \$175,000 Dupree's will be \$25,000 for his work on the project. Dupree was also the fiscal agent that took care of the bond issue and finances on the Rockcastle County High School.

Board member George Poynter, who made the motion to hire Johnson Romanowicz, said that he felt that Shelton would have as hard a time getting the right people together on the high school as he would have drawing the

Governor Cash added that he felt the building was the best in Brodhead. Certainly, it is the newest.

Robbins said the council should wait until the entire council could be there to discuss the building. Bussell responded with, "How many times recently has all the board been at a meeting? And answered his question with, "not many. Robbins agreed it had been a pretty good while.

Bussell then said Robbins "there would be a called meeting of the council and they'd give it up."

Robbins said he did not appreciate anyone coming in and making demands of the board.

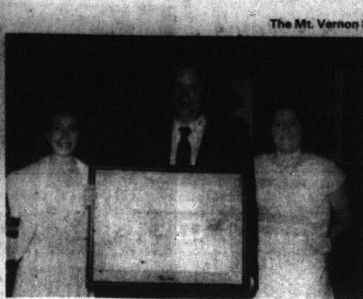

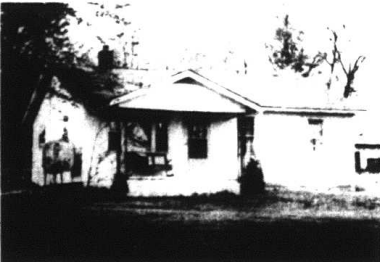
