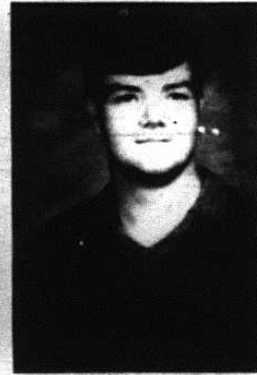

School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons retires

Cites newspaper's criticism

Citing criticism from the Signal, school Superintendent Charles B. Parsons retired Tuesday night during a called meeting of the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

He asked the board to release him from the last year of his contract, but added he would stay on the year if it put the school system in a bind.

Parsons last day as superintendent will be June 30.

The board agreed to let Parsons out of the last year of his contract, and voted to advertise for someone to fill the superintendent position.

In his announcement to the board, Parsons said that he was grateful to the board members for the past 19 years that he had served under them and that he was extremely proud of the Rockcastle County School system.

"Despite the critics, I think we have an excellent school system in Rockcastle County, one we can all be proud of," Parsons said.

After announcing his retirement, Parsons said that he did not feel like he had ever had any encouragement from the newspaper.

"Everything seemed to be very critical and that is one of the main reasons I am retiring," Parsons said. "I don't think I have ever gotten any support from the paper."

Parsons also said that he had been waiting for Federal Judge Stewart Newblatt to render a decision in the sex discrimination case brought against him and the board. "but I don't think he is in any hurry," Parsons said.

Parsons has worked in the school system for 43 years, first as a teacher for 11 years, a principal for 13 years and superintendent

for the past 19 years. Parsons was hired as superintendent in 1968 when Mrs. Neurel Miracle retired.

Each board member expressed their great satisfaction with the job Parsons has done over the years.

"I reluctantly accept your resignation. I think you have done an excellent job as superintendent and I hate to see you go," Vice Chairman Willie Taylor said.

"We sure are going to miss you Mr. Parsons," Edna Cameron said.

Newly elected board chairman George Poynter said that he too was sorry to see Parsons step down and that he wanted to make it perfectly clear that the board would rather have him stay on.

Poynter said that he did not want to pressure Parsons in to staying if he did not want to.

Kenneth Adams and newly appointed board member Dr. Billy George Griffith also expressed their appreciation for the job Parsons has done throughout the 19 years.

The Superintendent told the board that he would take a vacation after retiring and then go back to work. Parson's field of sales, maybe some real estate," Parsons said.

During Parsons's 19 years of the helm, several improvements were made in education in rockcastle County, but his biggest project was the construction of the Rockcastle County High School in 1972.

Local speculation is that Bigge Towers, Chapter I Coordinator and Curriculum Director will replace Parsons.

Board members agreed to hold a special called meeting on June 22 to accept applications for the job and set June 23 as a date to interview potential candidates.

Dr. George Griffith named local school board member

Dr. Billy George Griffith was appointed to the Rockcastle County Board of Education at a called meeting of the board Tuesday night. Griffith said he was a very good board member and he hopes to be able to contribute as much to the school system as he had.

Superintendent Charles B. Parsons told the board that he felt like they made a good choice in selecting Griffith because of his understanding of what it takes for a good education.

Tuesday is election day; Don't forget to vote

Voters will go to the polls Tuesday to choose candidates for state and local offices, but the local candidates are few.

In what many term the "quietest" race in many years locally, incumbent Mayor Elizabeth Baker is opposed by Councilman Jackie Russell Renner for the mayoral post to fill the unexpired two years remaining on the term of Roland Mullins who moved outside the city.

Since no Democrats filed in the mayoral election, the winner will be the next mayor for two years. Also, since both are Republicans, only Republicans are allowed to vote in the mayoral contest.

Most of Renner's campaigning has been hand shaking. He works daily at Mt. Vernon Drive-Thru Pharmacy in Mt. Vernon and must limit most of his campaign to after work.

Mrs. Baker is employed as rehabilitation instructor at the Cumberland River Comprehensive Care Center at Mt. Vernon, and can only campaign when her job will allow. Mrs. Baker's husband has been very ill and underwent surgery, also limiting her campaigning.

Mrs. Baker, wife of Robert (Bob) Baker was formerly assistant director of special education for the Kentucky Department of Education. She has been supervisor for a regional program managing personnel and budget. She was consultant for the Kentucky Department of Education, a

teacher, and coordinator of programs for the state universities.

Renner is the son of Jessie and Ruth Renner of Mt. Vernon. He is a graduate of Rockcastle County High School and a member of the First Baptist Church of Mt. Vernon, the Young Republicans Club and a member of the Mt. Vernon Urban Renewal and Community Development Agency.

Renner said earlier he has worked with the public for 10 years. "and I believe you will find me a young, energetic man, qualified to be the next mayor."

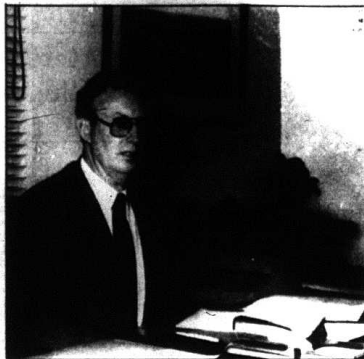
"I am a working man and know the value of a dollar," he said. "I will serve the people, if elected, in a fair, honest and efficient way and treat all equally."

Mrs. Baker said, if elected she will strive to do the best possible job for the people of Mt. Vernon knowing she will have a great responsibility.

"I pledge to serve the public in any way I can," she stated. "I have a great concern for Mt. Vernon, its citizens and its future. In the months to come, important decisions that will affect us all will have to be made, and I feel that I am qualified to help make those decisions."

Fiscal court borrows funds to begin jail renovation

Pressured by time to at least get started on remodeling the county jail to please the Kentucky Corrections Cabinet, the Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted at a called meeting Monday to borrow \$15,000 from one of the county banks to make the start.

With the \$15,000, plus \$30,000 in state grant money, the court will have \$45,000 to begin the remodeling, if some beginning

is not made soon, the state could cancel the grant and close the jail.

County Judge Executive Hubert Thacker made the motion to borrow the money, seconded by Magistrate Glen Ellison. Magistrates Donald Bullock and Doug Bishop voted yes. Magistrates Amos Burdette and Jack Bradley were unable to attend the meeting.

In other business the board voted to hire Larry Cook as a bus mechanic to replace Bill Barnett who took over for Jesse Bradley at the Rockcastle County High School last month.

remodel the jail or close it and transport prisoners to another county, a very costly expense for the county. Getting started possibly would be a show of good faith and pacify the Corrections Cabinet at least temporarily.

The decision to "piecemeal" the remodeling was the courts only choice since the court has been prohibited from borrowing enough money to do the entire project.

The Kentucky Finance Department has told the court it can only borrow an amount of money that the county can pay back within one year, so the court had to settle for the \$15,000.

The low bid for the entire project was \$79,910 from J.C. Newland Construction of Brodhead. The only other bid was from McKnight and Associates of London for \$88,990.

The court accepted the Newland bid several weeks ago, but failure to borrow the money delayed getting started on the project. Since that bid was made, Newland has informed the court there would be delays on materials and some materials have increased in cost. Now in his summer backlog projects, Newland has asked the county to cancel his bond on the project, seemingly to mean he will be unable to do the work on the jail.

"He bid the job because at the time it was to be a winter job and he had time to do it," one magistrate said. "But the delay in getting the money upset his timetable."

The magistrates agreed to contact Newland in an effort to get him to start the project. Re-bidding the project would mean several more weeks would be lost.

Jailer Billy Kirby said the project could be done as money becomes available, if that method is approved by the state and the work meets requirements.

The state wanted the county to construct a drunk tank and a visitors area first of all. If the present plan is approved, new jail cells would be first on the work docket.

USDA celebrates 125th birthday

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is celebrating its 125th birthday May 15, according to Mary Ann Baron, State Director of Farmers Home Administration.

The theme, "Serving Agriculture, Serving America," emphasizes the role USDA has played in providing a wide range of services throughout its 125-year history.

USDA was established May 15, 1862 when President Abraham Lincoln signed a law establishing "a Department of Agriculture, to acquire and to diffuse among the people of the United States useful information on subjects connected with agriculture in the most general and comprehensive sense of the word."

Lincoln also dubbed it "the People's Department."

When the USDA was established, most people were farmers, and USDA programs were primarily for farmers. Ms. Baron pointed out:

Now, farm families and workers represent a smaller share of America's population, but USDA still has a very wide range of responsibilities through which it serves the nation. These include protecting our soil, forests, and other natural resources; protecting public health by safeguarding our food supply; conducting domestic and international marketing programs; and providing income supports, food and nutrition programs, and research and education. These activities serve not

only American agriculture but all Americans, Ms. Baron said.

A unique aspect of the U.S. Department of Agriculture is the way it is localized in grass roots America. In about 3,000 counties in the 50 states there are USDA offices, offering the services of USDA "agencies" including the Farmers Home Administration, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the Soil

Conservation Service and Extension Service.

USDA has stayed in touch with the needs of Americans: Even though most Americans no longer live on farms, agriculture and its related industries still represent the largest sector of our economy and USDA continues to respond to President Lincoln's charge to be "the people's department," Ms. Baron said.

Remembering the Fallen Heroes of America

This coming weekend, as millions of Americans enjoy the Memorial Day holiday, all of us should pause for a moment to consider what our country would be like without the pain and sacrifice of those who gave their lives in the name of freedom.

Consider a nation without the freedom of speech, where citizens are jailed for expressing their opinions on issues, consider a country where elections involve only one choice, one party, one viewpoint, where political activities are watched by spies and secret police, consider a nation where religion is outlawed, where those who wish to worship their God are called criminals.

It does not take much imagination to think of a country being this way, because many nations in the world today are exactly as I have described above. From Russia and her Soviet-bloc puppet governments behind the Iron Curtain, from fanatical terrorist governments in Iran and Libya, to the brutal dictatorships of Vietnam and Nicaragua, freedom is a word without meaning for millions.

Here in America, we have all these freedoms the others lack. But they did not come easily nor cheaply. We have fought eight major wars and numerous other battles around the world for the cause of freedom and democracy. Thousands of American soldiers have died and millions more were wounded and maimed to uphold the ideal of liberty which we enjoy today. It was an expensive price to pay, but a necessary one. Without the ultimate sacrifices these brave men and women have made, America would be a much different place today, a place without the hope and promise which is offered to all those who reside here.

Memorial Day calls upon all Americans to look back with pride and remembrance at the heroic deeds of our fighting men. But it also calls us to look within ourselves and to re-affirm our resolve to keep these hard-fought freedoms for our children and grandchildren.

In World War I, Americans ventured across the Atlantic to save Europe from the Kaiser's stranglehold. In World War II, we saved mankind from the tyranny of Tojo and the hatred of Hitler. In Korea, American fighting men saved off the menace of China and communism. And in Vietnam, our boys fought gallantly, even in the face of criticism, to preserve freedom for people 10,000 miles away. America has always been ready to march to liberty's call, and we must not shy away from our responsibilities if we want to maintain our way of life.

Our veterans know all too well the sacrifices made for America. They know too many buddies who were killed on a battlefield far from home. They can attest to the bravery and resolve which those who have died for America have shown for over 200 years.

On this Memorial Day, let those of us living pledge to those who have gone before our continued support for America's principles and its freedoms. There can be no greater way to honor the dead than by our work to preserve the freedoms for which they have fought and died.

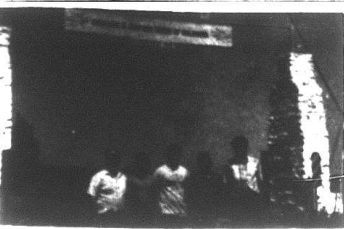

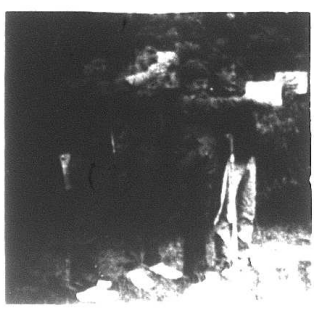

CHANGES IN ELECTION OF MAYOR FOR CITY OF MT. VERNON

KRS 83A 050 has made some changes in the manner of election of Mayors for the cities. Since Mt. Vernon is a fifth class city, the candidates for Mayor must file partisan or independent, but if the candidates file as independent, the candidate must change their party registration. However, if the city passes a nonpartisan ordinance, the candidate must file as nonpartisan only and do not have to change their party registration. This nonpartisan ordinance must become effective 23 days prior to candidate filing deadline. Since an ordinance must be prepared, have a first and second reading and be published, this did not give the City Council enough time to pass the ordinance.

Therefore, in this May Primary Election, only voters living in the city limits and registered as Republican can vote in the Mayor's race.

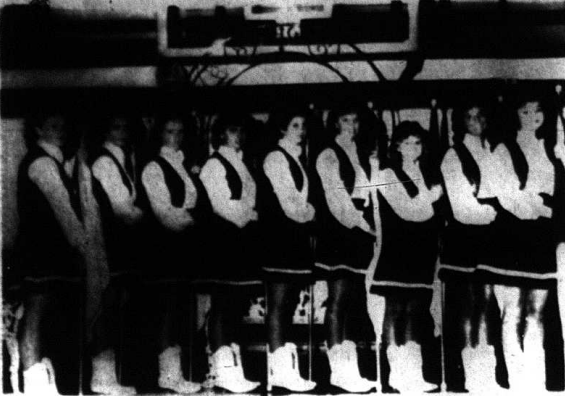

District Judges Cain and Maguire attend program on juvenile code

District Judges William Cain and Walter Maguire of the 29th Judicial District attended a program on the Unified Juvenile Code held at the Owensboro Executive Inn, May 12-15.

The Kentucky Unified Juvenile Code, passed by the 1986 General Assembly and applicable throughout the state, creates ten new chapters in the Kentucky Revised Statutes as well as amends reorganizations and repeals existing state law concerning juveniles referred to the court or to the Cabinet for Human Resources.

The Code, which becomes effective July 1, 1987 is designed to strengthen and encourage family life for the care and protection of children. Another goal is to assure each child a safe and nurturing home and to remove them from their homes only when less restrictive alternatives have failed or are not feasible. Additionally, the Code seeks treatment for children to improve their condition and requires judicial procedures which recognize the rights and interests of all parties including parents.

are also options under the Code in some circumstances.

The new Juvenile Code is a substantial and complex change in Kentucky's juvenile laws, thus 116 of the Commonwealth's 125 district judges attended the program to gain an in-depth understanding of new procedural matters, interstate compact, the role of court designated workers and the effects of termination of parental rights. The program also examined procedures involving the reporting, investigating and resolution of matters relating to child abuse, neglect and dependency. Appropriate judicial action in dealing with status offenders, public offenders, youthful offenders and mentally ill children were also studied.

The program was sponsored by the Administrative Office of the Courts with curriculum design and instruction provided by the District Judges Education Committee.

Crappie were taking summer pool and 78 degrees.

Barren River: Conservation Officer Ralph Shipley reports that black bass were hitting surface lures, early and plastic worms during the day over stump rows 1-10 feet deep. Crappie were taking minnows over brush piles 10-15 feet deep in the tailwaters. Trout were hitting worms and catfish were hitting nightcrawlers and minnows, clear, stable at summer pool and 80 degrees.

Nolin: Conservation Officer James Shipp reports that black bass were hitting surface lures, early and plastic worms and jigs during the day off rocky points 1-6 feet deep. Crappie were hitting minnows over cover 10-15 feet deep, clear, stable at summer pool and 74 degrees.

Innovation was given by Donald Thompson. Membership report was given. Memberships paid for 1987 are 2,139.

Audit for Nov. 1, 1985 thru Oct. 31, 1986 was discussed and a copy of the audit is available for inspection at the Farm Bureau Office.

Board approved Griffin & Greer and Company, P.S.C. to do the audit again for the next fiscal year.

The insurance agents were asked for report and given. Board expressed approval.

Safemark Dealer Bill McKinney announced safemark program has improved tremendously.

The prices are more competitive. Fieldman Lynn Parsons reported to the board.

Mr. Parsons advised board that mowing machine knives and guards will be handled by safemark dealers now.

A policy development meeting date has been tentatively set for July 20th in Jackson County.

The annual meeting was discussed by the board and the June monthly meeting was set for Tuesday, June 9 at 8 p.m. at the Rockcastle County Farm Bureau Office.

FARMLOT to match sellers and buyers

The finishing touches are currently being applied to a new computerized system that will match Kentucky farmers who have commodities to sell with individuals who want to buy those farm products — a Department of Agriculture function unlike any other in the nation.

"We long ago identified one of the major problems of Kentucky farmers as having a limited market for some of their products," said Agriculture Commissioner David Boswell, "and we approached the General Assembly with a plan that would open up their avenues of commerce."

The legislators agreed that the marketing computer was an excellent approach to beginning to solve the problem and now, finally, we are happy to be able to announce that the system will be operational very soon," Boswell continued.

The new Kentucky farm marketing program is called FARMLOT, an acronym which represents the 1,800 toll-free telephone number which users must call in order to activate the computer. The program will begin after May 1. The number is 1-800-327-6668.

Commissioner Boswell notes that there are actually three functions which FARMLOT will serve. It will allow sellers to billboard the commodities they have available. It will allow those with the need for farm goods, such as hay, to express their wants, and FARMLOT will provide those interested in current Kentucky farm market information with accurate regional, up-to-date prices.

The appropriation by the Kentucky Legislature through which the Department of Agriculture has put together FARMLOT also provides for the promotion of the program through radio, television and newspaper advertising. Those ads will appear during the

Local man jailed following shooting incident Monday

A Rockcastle County man is still in Rockcastle County jail after he allegedly fired two shotgun blasts into a Clark residence on Loman Hill Monday afternoon.

James Edward Dees, 42, of Rt. 3, Mt. Vernon, was arrested about an hour and a half after two shots were fired into the house where Gene Horn, 24, and some small children were inside. Horn and none of the children were injured.

According to police at the

Kentucky State Police Post at London, a shotgun was found at the Dees residence which police believe was used in the shooting. The gun had been reported stolen in a Lincoln County burglary in 1986.

Dees was charged with 2 counts of wanton endangerment

and one count of receiving stolen property. State police detective Ernie Boggs is investigating the case.

No two-acre operations permitted after June 5th

No two-acre mining operations can begin after June 5, 1987 according to provisions in an amendment to the federal Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977 which was signed by President Reagan on May 7.

Changes in the two-acre exemption provision in the federal act have the effect of cancelling the Kentucky two-acre mining permit.

If a two-acre permit has been granted by the Kentucky Department for Surface Mining operations must begin on the ground mining operations by June 5 and may continue until Nov. 7 of this year. If coal mining operations have not begun by June 5, the two-acre permit will become void.

The Department for Surface Mining can no longer under the new law accept applications for two-acre mining permits since there is insufficient time remaining for legal requirements to be met including the public comment period.

The department will make

every effort to finalize and issue all two-acre permit applications currently pending in the review process.

The amendments to the 1977 federal act supercede all state laws and regulations and as of Nov. 7, the exemption for existing two-acre operations will terminate nationwide. On that date, all two-acre mining operations must cease and reclamation must begin immediately.

H.R. 1963 also contains a provision which allows states to set aside in a special trust up to 10 percent of their annual allocation from the federal Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation Fund. This money may be used only to finance reclamation projects after the act expires in 1992. Prior to this amendment, if states did not allocate funds within three years the money reverted to the secretary of the interior. It is unlikely that this second provision of the bill will significantly affect abandoned mine land reclamation in the state of Kentucky.

Only .56 inches of rain fell during the first 19 days

Until Wednesday morning only .56 of an inch of rain had fallen as recorded at the Cox Funeral Home Weather Station.

But a deluge of .86 of an inch of rain in about an hour brought the monthly total to 1.42 inches about normal for the past three years for the first half of May.

May is a fickle month. It can rain a deluge in one area and none just a few hundred feet down the road — so to speak. But the only official figures are at the weather home.

In the first 19 days of May,

between 1980 and 1987, the most rainfall was 8.55 inches in May 1983 and 7.71 inches in May 1984. During those years, there were 2.28 inches in May 2, 1983 and 2.28 inches in May 16, 1983.

Complete figures for the first 19 days of May between 1980 and 1987 are: 1980, 1.55 inches; 1981, 4.53 inches; 1982, 3.58 inches; 1983, 8.55 inches; 1984, 7.71 inches; 1985, 1.89 inches; 1986, 1.64 inches; and 1987, 1.42 inches. There has been a gradual decline in rainfall during those days in the past three years.

Cox, a 17-year-old son of Vicki and Jerry J. Cox, will be getting college-prep instruction in reading, writing, study-skills improvement, and problem solving. He will also be attending classes in mathematics and science.

According to Larry Fowler of the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, the state agency that coordinates the PEP Program, all of the instruction is designed to improve the participating students' chances of doing well in their premedical or pre-dental college studies.

Cox says he plans to attend Centre College next fall.

Bussell, 18-year-old son of Mary and Deava Bussell Sr., will be getting college-prep instruction

in reading, writing, study-skills improvement and problem solving. He will also be attending classes in mathematics and science.

According to Larry Fowler of the Kentucky Council on Higher Education, the state agency that coordinates the PEP Program, all of the instruction is designed to improve the participating students' chances of doing well in their premedical or pre-dental college studies.

Bussell says he plans to attend the University of Kentucky this fall.

"We're anxious for the program and the students to succeed," said Fowler. "The students' success will show in their gaining a medical or dental degree, and the program's success will show in the students going back to practice in their home areas."

The program, which was established by the state legislature, is in its sixth year.

The freshman workshops are the first of three stages of activities the Council has planned for participating students. Additional programs and services designed to help them succeed in becoming doctors or dentists will be provided throughout their undergraduate and professional school studies.

High school seniors-to-be who are interested in participating next summer should contact their school counselor for information and application forms next January or February.

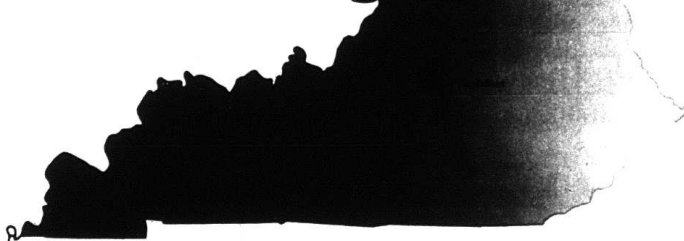
This is the January 1, 1987 assessment on which state, county, and city taxes for 1987 will be due about September 15, 1987.

R.E.A.P. of Rockcastle County distribute food according to the following guidelines:

1. The hours of operation for the pantry will be 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Mondays through Friday and on Saturday 10 a.m. to 12 noon.
 2. Use of the pantry will be restricted to Rockcastle County residents in genuine need.
 3. Social service agencies will make referrals to the food pantry. Referral cards will be distributed to social service agencies. If the client cannot bring the referral card to the pantry, the card can be completed at the food pantry, provided the referring agency has contacted the pantry to verify need. The staff of the pantry may also determine need.
 4. Food will only be given to those who come to the pantry in person. Individuals may not receive food for members of their extended family or for friends. Those who make such requests will be encouraged to have needy persons request services at the pantry in person.
 5. The pantry staff may determine the amount of food to be distributed to a family with no more than one (1) week supply to be given at one (1) time.
 6. The pantry staff will maintain list of the names and the number of times a client receives food from the pantry. Anyone using the pantry more than three (3) times within a six (6) month period should be referred to the appropriate agency for assistance with budgeting or the referring agency should verify continuing need.
- R.E.A.P. of Rockcastle County does not intend to be case-work oriented, yet does aim to

be sensitive and responsive to the needs of the hungry in Rockcastle County. The program is for families who need emergency food help and/or other assistance on a relief basis.

We meet on the 4th Thursday of every month at the library and everyone is welcome.

But Monday was Owens' day to shine. He hit a single which knocked in both runs and gave the

They played again Wednesday afternoon after the signal's deadline.
