

Burns pleaded guilty Nov. 10. 1986 to insurance fraud an interstate transportation of stolen money.

### Remembering the Fallen Heroes of America

This coming weekend, as millions of Americans enjoy the Memorial Day holiday, all of us should pause for a moment to consider what our country would be like without the pain and sacrifice of those who gave their lives in the name of freedom.

us use name of treedom.

Consider a nation without the freedom of speech, where citizens are jailed for expressing their opinions on issues, consider a country where elections involve only one choice, one party, one vicespoint, where political activities are witched by spies and secret police, consider a nation where religion is outlawed, where those who wish to worship their God are called criminals.

It does not take much imagination to think of a country being this way, because many nations in the world today are exactly as I have described above. From Russia and her Soviet-bloc pupper governments behind the Iron Curtain. From finantical terrorist governments in Iran and Libya. To the brutal dictatorships of Viennam and Nicaragua. Freedom is a word without meaning for millions.

without meaning for millions. Here in Amenca, we have all these freedoms the others lack. But they did not come easily nor cheaply. We have fought eight major wars and numerous other battles around the world for the cause of freedom and democracy. Thousands of American soldiers have died and millions more were wounded and mainted to uphold the ideal of liberty which we enjoy today. It was an expensive price to pay, but a necessary one. Without the ultimate sacrifices these brave men and women have made, Amerca would be a much different place today, a place without the hope and promise which is offered to all those who reside here.

# Notice To Voters!!

CHANGES IN ELECTION OF MAYOR FOR CITY OF MT. VERNON

KRS 83A 050 has made some changes in the manner of election of Mayors for the cities. Since Mt. Vernon is a fifth class city, the candidates for Mayor must file partisan or independent, but if the candidates file as independent, the candidate must change their party registration. However, if the city passes a nonpartisan ordinance the candidate must file as nonpartisan only and do not have to change their party registration. This nonpartisan ordinance must become effective 23 days prior to candidate filing deadline. Since an ordinance must be prepared, have a first and second reading and be published this did not give the City Council enough time to pass the ordinance

Therefore, in this May Primary Election, only voters living in the city limits and registered as Republican can vote in the Mayor's race.

If a two-acre permit has been granted by the Kentucky Department for Surface Mining, operators must begin on the ground mining operations by June 5 and may centinue until Nov. 7 of this word. If coal mining operations have not begun by June 5 the two-acre permit will become word. The Department of Surface Mining can no longer under the





### 1987 ACP sign-up period starts June 1 - ends July 15

The Rockcastle County ASCS Office has announced the second 1987 ACP sign-up period as being June 1 through July 15, according to Benton Bullock Chairman of the Rockcastle County ASCS Com-

Bullock stated that practices available to the farmers of the farmers of this county include seedings, water conservation and fivestry practices. A more detailed list of the practices wallable for this period is available in the county office. Seeding practices, both new seedings and renovations must first have a current soil sample in the County Extension Office before signing for Cost-Sharring. Bullock further stated that since Rockcastle County is under new variable cost-sharring method. Bullock stated that practices

all requests will be evaluated at the end of the sign-up period and only those practices which obtain the most conservation such as to the saving of soil will be as high as 75 percent of the actual cost of the practice suffer this new variable cost-sharing method.
