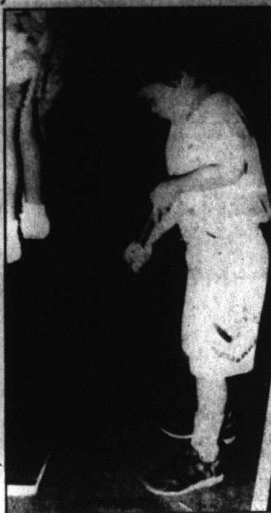

## Mayor Baker, Ham, Wilkinson win primary victories



### Election Day mishap . . . .

Rockcastle County Democratic Chairman Henry Brown of Quail escaped serious injury Tuesday morning after he dived his Oldsmobile 98 into the path of a Cumberland Fence truck from Science Hill on Ky. 70 at Bell's Grocery. Brown received three broken ribs in the accident. According to a family member, Brown was on his way to pick up a cousin and take him to vote at the Brown precinct.

### Nine indictments returned Friday

Nine indictments ranging from cultivating marijuana to wanton endangerment were handed down last Friday by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury.

Lewis Rowe, 55, was indicted for growing over 25 plants of marijuana at his residence in Mt. Vernon.

State and city police destroyed the marijuana on April 23. Rowe is presently free on bond.

Donnie Jones of Broadhead was indicted on four counts: wanton endangerment, criminal mischief, assault in the fourth degree and theft by unlawful taking.

The indictments stemmed from a May 4 incident in which Jones reportedly pointed a shotgun at Jennifer Denney's head and th-

reatened to kill her. According to the indictment, Jones also slashed all four tires on Denney's car, struck her in the County Grand Jury.

### State reports more blackout

The state will place initial blackout surfacing on one mile of County Road 5386, Bowling Ridge Road in Rockcastle County, Gov. Martha Layne Collins has announced.

"Periodic upgrading of our county roads strengthens the transportation network throughout the state," said Collins. "This project will make this section of

### John Harper GOP candidate

Casey County native Wallace Wilkinson scored a stunning upset victory over former Governor John Y. Brown Jr. in Tuesday's primary election, riding a wave of support for a state lottery.

At prestime, Wilkinson was leading Brown by nearly 60,000 votes. Steve Beshear was in third place, but nearly 114,000 votes behind Wilkinson and about 40,000 behind Brown.

Latest count showed Wilkinson with about 220,000 votes. Brown with 163,000 and Beshear 114,000. all votes unofficial.

In the Republican race for governor, State Rep. John Harper, a two-term legislator from Bullitt County, won over his nearest opponent, former Fayette County Judge Joseph E. Johnson III. Harper had about 37,000 votes and Johnson 24,000.

It was another story for Democrats in Rockcastle County. Here, Steve Beshear, as expected, had the most votes with 364, followed by Wilkinson with 199, Brown with 154, Grady Stumbo, 59, Julian Carroll with 25 and Anne Moore with 1. Drusiddie Lampton, Jr., had none.

Election day was a happy day in Rockcastle County for former County Judge/Executive Bob Jasper and Verla Scott. Both spent their time and money campaigning for Wilkinson. Although Wilkinson lost to Beshear in Rockcastle, the two had reason to celebrate.

In the Republican race for governor in Rockcastle, Leonard Besley led the ticket with 407 votes followed by Harper with 306, Johnson with 250 and Thurman Hamlin with 114.

In the Democratic Lieutenant governor's race, statewide, Breerton Jones defeated Dave Armstrong by about 188,000 to 148,000 votes. In Rockcastle, Democrats voted for Paul Patton. Patton had 211 votes, Jones 183 and David Boswell, 150.

In the lieutenant governor's race in the Republican column, Lawrence Webster, former Pikeville attorney, defeated Tommy Klein about 3,900 votes at latest count. In Rockcastle, Webster had 318 votes and Klein, 246.

In other state Democratic races, Fred Cowan defeated Todd Hollenback for attorney general by about 45,000 votes. In the race for superintendent of public instruction, John Brock apparently defeated Roger Noe, by about 9,000 votes, but his majority was small enough that Noe said he would ask

### River claims Laurel teenager

A 17-year-old Laurel County girl drowned Sunday in the Rockcastle River near the Laurel-Pulaski County line.

The body of Brenda Mae Branstetter of East Bernstadt was recovered by a diver for the Somerset-Pulaski County Rescue Squad about 1:30 p.m. Monday. Pulaski County Deputy Coroner Bruce Phelps said.

Miss Branstetter drowned about 5:30 p.m. Sunday near Johnson Place on the Rockcastle River in rural Pulaski County, where she had gone to swim with friends.

The girl apparently slipped into a current and panicked, Phelps said.

Two male companions tried but were unable to rescue her, the deputy coroner said. Her body was recovered within 15 feet of the point where she went under the water, he said.

Miss Branstetter, a junior at Laurel County High School, was the daughter of Curt and Alice Lambert Branstetter.

### First woman ever elected

Incumbent Mayor Elizabeth Baker became the first woman to be elected mayor of Mt. Vernon in Tuesday's primary election, defeating City Councilman Jackie R. Renner by 85 votes.

It was a remarkable win for the former teacher who campaigned very little.

Mrs. Baker received 243 votes. Councilman Renner got 158.

It was Mrs. Baker's first venture into politics. She was appointed by the city council to serve until the November election after Mayor Roland Mullins moved out of the city.

Mayor Mullins recommended that Mrs. Baker be appointed before he left office.

Since no Democrat is on the November ballot for mayor, Mrs. Baker's primary victory is tantamount to election.

She will serve the two remaining years on Mayor Mullins' term, which ends in 1989 when the seat will be filled for a four year term.

Mrs. Baker carried three of Mt. Vernon's four precincts. East Mt. Vernon, 56 to 19. South Mt. Vernon, 39 to 20 and North Mt. Vernon, 82 to 53. She lost West Mt. Vernon by only two votes, 62 to 60. She received six absentee votes. Renner received four.

In another local race, incumbent Commonwealth Attorney, Benny Ham, was re-elected to a second term by 531 votes, defeating Robert G. Gillum, 452 to 401.

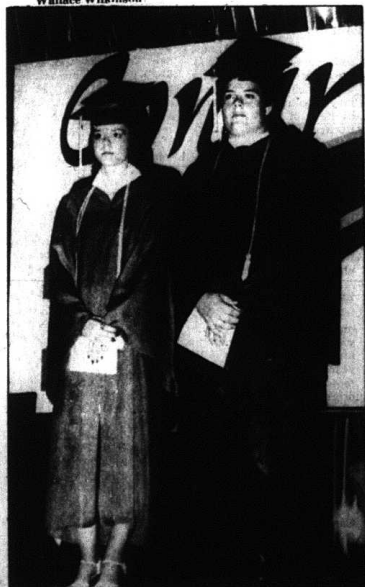
Although Ham lost Rockcastle County, 751 votes to 496, he carried Pulaski County, 4190 to Gillum's 3,265 to give him the win.

In Rockcastle, Gillum lost only two precincts. Orlando by 30 26 and Brown by 54 to 37 votes.

## Your Child's Health

I have again been asked by someone in the educational field to write about a touchy subject this time year. That is whether children should be held back a grade or be asked to repeat kindergarten if they don't seem ready to go on to first grade. Thank goodness for compulsory kindergarten. It was late coming to Kentucky as are many good ideas, but at least we now have it. Children get at least this much start on development before starting regular school. Most do fine. However, some, especially those with birthdays late in summer or early fall, and who are therefore almost a year younger than their oldest classmates, often don't do as well as their peers. They may do "OK" with academic things in kindergarten, but just don't seem to fit in as well socially. The kindergarten teacher may suggest they ought to repeat the year with her before going on to first grade. Often parents take offense at this and want little Billy to go on with his friends. In almost all cases the teacher will be right in this suggestion and may save Billy a lifetime of playing catchup. If this suggestion is made regarding your

child, for goodness sake, let him repeat the year. There is no stigma attached to this at this level, and he will make new friends in a short time next school term. We "Red-shirt" students to make them grow into bigger and better athletes. Why not do the same to make them more socially mature, better leaders, and better students?

My father-in-law tells that he was held back in the "Primer" for three years in his one room school in rural Indiana 65 years ago. He knew the work well, but the teacher was too lazy to promote him because he was the only one in his grade, and she was hoping another kid would come along so she could have two in the same grade and not have to prepare lessons for only one child in a grade.

His father threatened to burn the school house down to get him promoted, and he was passed on from Primer to third grade. We have come a long way since then. Listen to the advice of the kindergarten teacher! It may be the most important your child ever gets.

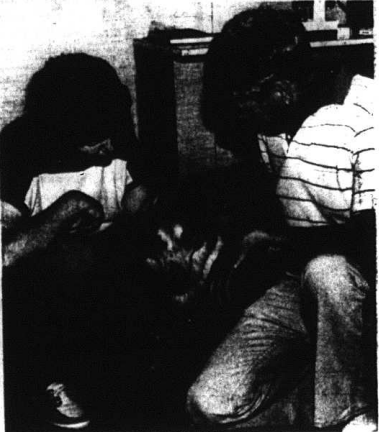

## She's a Lucky Lady

Her name is Lucky Lady, and it fits her to a T. She is lucky to be alive. She is lucky not to be crippled.

She is lucky to have a new home with people who love her. "She" is a collie-shepherd dog who was nearly crushed by an auto on I-75 three weeks ago, but who now lives in Hazel Park, Mich., with John and Betty Dyke. The Dykes were enroute

home from a vacation in Tenn. and South Carolina on April 24 when the dog ran into their path on I-75 near Mt. Vernon.

"It hit her on the driver's side," Dyke said, "and her yelps of pain were deafening. I looked in the rear-view mirror and saw that she could barely move. I knew I couldn't leave her."

It took Dyke 45 minutes and four round trips to the next exit before he found the dog. He even climbed to the top of the hill overlooking the interstate and searched through binoculars. He was driving slowly on Route 25 when he saw her lying in the interstate median.

"She was motionless and powerless to move," Dyke said.

He crossed the busy interstate and wrapped the injured dog in a tablecloth his wife had purchased at a flea market during their vacation.

"She seemed to sense that I was there to help her," Dyke said. "I kept calling her pretty pup and talking to her. She was in great pain, but she didn't snap at me."

Mrs. Dyke was concerned for her husband's safety as he carried the dog across the freeway and down a steep embankment to their car.

"I don't know how he did it," Betty Dyke said. "She is no small dog and he carried her a long way through heavy traffic."

Dyke estimated the distance at about 100 yards.

The Dykes took the dog to Mt. Vernon veterinarian Joseph Korn who gave her a shot because she was in shock. Dr. Korn was not equipped for major surgery required to save the dog, so he contacted Byron Dozier in Berea. It was about 7 p.m., but Dr. Dozier agreed to wait in his office until the Dykes arrived.

"The dog was in shock, had a crushed pelvis and punctured urinary canal," Dr. Dozier said. "After looking at the X rays I told them there were two options either put the dog to sleep or attempt some major operations and hope for the best."

Dykes chose the latter. "There was never any question," Dyke said.

His wife agreed.

"She was such a pretty baby we just couldn't put her to sleep." The couple named the dog Lucky Lady and said they would return to Berea for her when she was well enough to travel. The dog, estimated to be about 5 years old, came through the surgery well. They picked her up Monday.

Why would the couple spend so much money ("it was substantial") on a dog most people would have left to die?

"I am an animal lover," Dyke said. "We have two other dogs at home."

"John is the kind of man who stops to take bees out of the water so they won't drown," his wife said.

Dyke is a correspondent with The Daily Tribune in Royal Oak, Mich., and his story about Lucky Lady has made her a celebrity.

"Everyone is anxious to see her," Dyke said.

Yes, she really is a Lucky Lady.

## INSPECTION PERIOD

### FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 26 through June 8, 1987. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 1987 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 1987 will be due about September 15, 1987.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4 p.m.

Any person who wishes to appeal an assessment must file a written letter or petition with the county clerk within the above period of time. This letter or petition must state the reasons for appeal, identify the property in question, and state the taxpayer's estimate of actual fair cash value. [KRS 133.120].

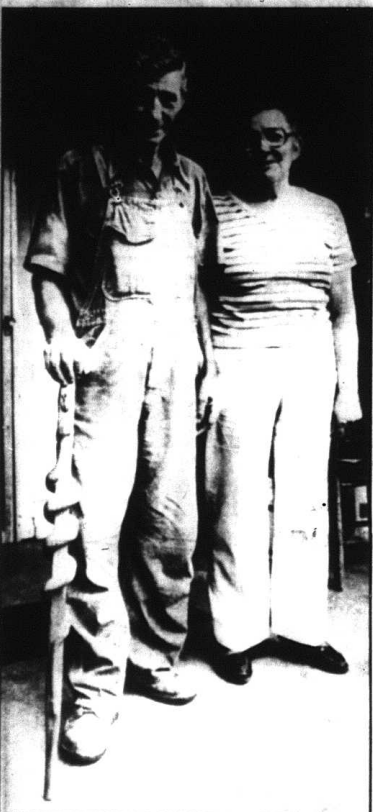
Florida, Louisiana, North Carolina and South Carolina.

## District gets another grant

A \$35,192 federal public transportation grant has been approved for the Cumberland Area Development District for administrative assistance from July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988, according to an announcement by Gov. Martha Layne Collins.

"Many Kentuckians rely on public transportation as their only means of getting to work, receiving medical attention and many other needed services," said Collins. "This grant will help provide continued service for this five county area."

The grant was approved by the United States Department of Transportation's Urban Mass Transportation Administration. It will be matched with \$8,798 in local funds, and will cover administrative costs incurred by the district's transportation services.

Three types of U.S. mass transit grants are available: operating, administrative and capital. Operating and administrative assistance both require local matching funds. Capital assistance grants require state and local matching funds.

## Legislation bill will be boost to Fifth

Legislation passed by the House of Representatives this week will be a major boost to education programs in Kentucky and his district, according to Fifth District Congressman Harold Rogers.

Rogers said the "School Improvement Act of 1987" continues many essential federal programs to provide extra help for low-income students, while also targeting funds on specific education problems.

"This legislation will keep these programs working for another six years," said Rogers. "In particular, the bill also attacks problems, like dropouts and illiteracy, head-on. These are problems we are already working on in our district, through our efforts in 'Forward in the Fifth,' our regional education organization. This additional federal help will assist us in those efforts and in all of our school districts."

Rogers said the legislation includes \$80 million for use by local school districts to develop promising new projects to help identify potential school dropouts and help them stay in school. The legislation also gives states more ability to use money to fight illiteracy among adults, while expanding programs to help school districts reach out to disadvantaged adults. In addition, Rogers said the bill continues to focus more resources on math and science education, which he said is "crucial" to American staying competitive with other nations.
