

Is there a party out there to support Harper?

Let us pause for a moment to ponder the peculiar situation of the Kentucky Republican Party.

The party controls three of the state's seven congressional seats, including the seat from the heavily Democratic 6th District. One of the state's two U.S. senators is a Republican. The state voted overwhelmingly Republican in 1980 and 1984, and has supported the Republican candidate in most presidential elections since 1960.

Yet it's generally agreed that the party comes out of this year's state primary with little chance of winning the governor's race in November. Why not?

True, the party's candidate, state Rep. John Harper of Shepherdsville, has some liabilities as a candidate. He's not very well

known; he doesn't come from a major population center or from a Republican stronghold; he isn't wealthy; and (so far as that) he doesn't seem exactly charismatic.

But the party's problems go far beyond Harper's candidacy. Consider what happened when Larry Forgy decided not to seek the party's nomination for governor.

Forgy was generally considered to be a strong candidate, but the fact is that he had never run for public office. When he decided not to run, the party had no one to turn to. Clearly, a party that puts all its hopes with someone who has never run for office is in trouble.

Ironically, part of that trouble stems from the party's most successful politicians. Over the years, it has

become commonplace to see the party's elected officials duck out when state elections roll around. Will Rep. Larry Hopkins be out raising money for Harper? Will Sen. Mitch McConnell be campaigning for him? Will Reps. Jim Eanning or Harold Rogers volunteer to chair his campaign? Don't bet the farm on it.

Part of the problem lies with the party's alleged faithful, too. How many wealthy Republicans will contribute \$4,000 to Harper's campaign? Probably not as many as contribute that amount to Democrat Wallace Wilkinson. When it comes to choosing between backing a likely winner and backing a member of their own party, most of the state's Republicans turn pragmatic. And part of the problem lies in sheer numbers. Democrats out-number Republicans by about 2-to-1 in Kentucky. That's a formidable obstacle to success in state politics for any GOP candidate.

If there were ever a time for the party to pull itself together, however, this is it. Because of the nature of the Democratic primary race, Wallace Wilkinson stands on the verge of election without ever having undergone rigorous scrutiny from an opponent. Wilkinson's ideas are untested, his assertions about taxes and a state lottery questionable. Harper seems willing to take the campaign to Wilkinson, but he won't be able to if his own

party fails to support him. John Harper is a long shot to be sure. But so what? If 500 Republicans can bring themselves to give him \$4,000 apiece and if the party's top elected officials can bring themselves to get out and

work for him, he might have a chance. Without that kind of support, he probably doesn't have a chance—and Kentucky doesn't have a chance of claiming even the remnants of a two-party system.

Final crop reporting date is July 15th

The final reporting date for corn, soybeans and grain sorghum is July 15, 1987.

ASCS encourages all producers growing crops who desire to be eligible for price support and other program benefits to file a timely crop acreage report. Farmers growing program crops but not participating in current programs should report crop acreages to insure the opportunity for participating in future programs.

Producers who have an established base but are not growing crops need to file a zero report of acreage in order to have an established history file.

Failure to report crop acreages when a producer is enrolled in the current program results in failure to fully comply and makes producers subject to penalties. Please contact the ASCS Office at the Agriculture Service Center to report your crop acreage.

In 1987 the farm program

is expected to be a farm acreage base and this makes it extremely important for all producers to file crop reports. All cropland acreage will be taken into consideration, providing a timely report was filed, when the farm acreage base is established.

Remember July 15, 1987 is the DEADLINE to report!

Garlan Cummins, the local system collected approximately \$300,000 in local tax money this year compared to approximately \$149,000 a year ago. This was because the board of education voted to raise the local school tax from 15 cents to 20.5 per hundred dollar assessed value. However, Cummins said that since the school system is still not participating in the school building fund they do not have to receive the extra tax money.

Cummins said that this year and probably next, most of the extra tax money would go toward paying teachers salaries.

"We were looking at laying off approximately 10 teachers this year had it not been for the extra \$160,000," Cummins said. In a nut shell, a new Mt. Vernon School all depends on the next session of the Legislative. Without state funds there will not be a new school.

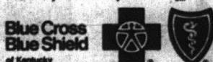

While on roads, Wayne Adams asked the court what it plans to do about repairing Oak Hill Road around Lake Linville. Adams told the court he was tired of getting front end alignments for his car.

After 47 years in the educational field Rockcastle County High School Principal Cleston Saylor is retiring.

Local Superintendent Charles Parson told board members Tuesday night during their regular monthly meeting that Saylor had told him earlier in the afternoon that June 30 would be his last day on the job.

Fifteen of Saylor's 47 years have been spent as the only principal Rockcastle County High School has had. He has served in that capacity since the school opened in 1972.

School board chairman George Poynter told the superintendent to tell Saylor that the board appreciated the fine job he had done over the years and that he would be sorely missed.

He has operated an excellent school and I certainly wish him well," Poynter said.

The board at the suggestion of Poynter and board member Dr. Billy George Griffith will advertise for a new principal.

The deadline to apply for what many observers say is the toughest job in the local school system is June 20. "I want to make it perfectly clear that this job is open to all comers, male and female," Poynter said. Applications for the job are to be sent to Superintendent Parsons office, but the recommendation for the hiring of the principal will be left up to the new superintendent who will take over for Parsons on July 1.

Although school was just dismissed for the summer, the board approved the school calendar for next fall. School will begin on August 17 for teachers and August 18 for students.

Brodhead Policeman Grant Petrey, III for the past several weeks, is back on the job following Monday night's meeting of the Brodhead City Council that discussed Petrey's status behind closed doors.

Petrey, who underwent surgery, was replaced by acting policeman Joe Bussell pending Petrey's return.

But is apparently wasn't as easy as expected for the council to reinstate Petrey. A petition asking that Bussell be retained was presented to the council by Mrs. Charles Pittman.

The council went into a closed session to discuss the matter that took nearly half an hour.

Petrey was hired by the city council in August, 1986, following his retirement from Bluegrass ordinance

Although Petrey is back on the job, the city does not have a new fire chief.

Firemen voted recently to recommend David Ott as new fire chief, but the council delayed a decision until the July meeting. Keith Riggsby will be acting fire chief until a permanent chief is chosen.

Councilman D.A. Robbins told the council that perhaps the city should rotate the chief's position with other firemen from time to time.

Ott is currently employed at Long Airdox Engineering Co. near Brodhead. In other action, the council voted to sell the old city jail at auction.

The jail has been closed for nearly 20 years and used by the city as a store-all, including the city's old parking meters which will also be sold.

The jail building is next door to S & T Store on Main Street (U.S. 150).

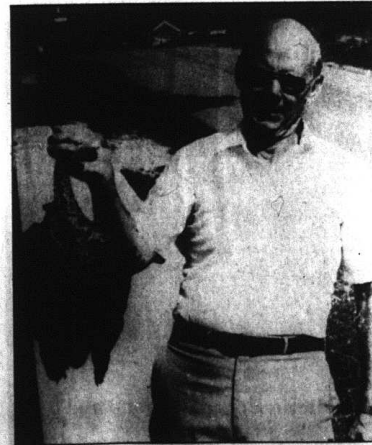
Apparently the city is going to finally get a new Boone Fork Bridge on the Brodhead-Conway road.

What happens in the state officers meet with County Judge/Executive, and/or the court, and ask what is being done to put the county plan into effect? Is the court abiding by its plan? Does it plan to make changes in the plan? What changes? Why has there been no action? Finally, they will ask for a written explanation in writing within 10 days.

The state officials will undoubtedly point out that Rockcastle is set and in a good position to implement its plan. The county has suggested franchise agreements with only the blanks to be filled in. They will also remind the court that the fine for failure to implement the plan is \$1,000 a day that would come from county taxpayers. Not only would the fine be assessed, the state would look with skepticism at any request the county would make for loans and grants in the future. That's

known as a black mark that actually could affect the county more than the fines.

In short, it's the calm before the storm, the official said and it could be a big storm-no little shower, but a real gullywasher.

The same official noted the county has time to begin its plan and can implement it without rushing the whole process. That seems a logical suggestion.

If all this sounds like local politics, some would say it is. The court, or at least one of the magistrates, has said this is a "cooling off" period, a "let everything quiet down" time.

Seems like the "cooling off" period and the "quiet time" has come and gone. If the county's finances are in as dire-straits as the magistrates and the judge have had us to believe then they certainly cannot afford to pay any fines.

Shall We Dance?



Is this act of men and women, boys and girls, having close bodily contact, and swaying their bodies to music sinful? Many people think it is not wrong. Schools, communities and even some churches support the modern dance. Schools have homecoming dances, senior proms and teach dancing in their physical education classes. But does this make it right?

I believe that if we look at what the Bible says about such things, we can see that dancing is a work of the flesh resulting in the loss of one's soul. Carefully consider the following reasons why:

1. Dancing is revelling. The Greek word used means, "feast and drinking parties that are protracted till late at night and indulge in revelry" [Thayers Greek Lexicon, p-367].

Dancing is lasciviousness. [Gal. 5:19]. Those who engage in such cannot be saved according to the Bible. The Greek word means, "indecent bodily movements, unchaste handling of males and females" [Thayer, p-70, 80]. Examples of this can be seen on TV quite often. The modern dance incites to lust. It is lascivious in nature. Only by putting it to music and calling it dancing can a man closely embrace the wife of another with impunity. Why?

3. The fruits of dancing are evil. Evil companions, obscene language, drinking, petting, and adultery are associated with it. Unless these fruits are good, the dance is evil. Jesus said, "Ye shall know them by their fruits" [Matt. 7:16-17].

Dancing destroys spirituality. Someone said, "a dancing foot and a praying knee do not grow on the same leg." Personally, I do not know a regular dancer who is active in prayer, Bible Study, personal work, church attendance and giving. Do you?

5. Dancing destroys the Christian's influence. Jesus said, "Let your light so shine before men that they may see you good works and glorify your Father which is in heaven" [Matt. 5:16]. Christians are not to be "conformed to this world" [Rom. 12:1-2]. They are to "keep themselves unspotted from the world" [James 1:27] and they are commanded to "abstain from all appearance of evil" [1 Thess. 5:22].

Nothing good can be said for dancing. It is the companion of the place of ill repute, of drinking, of divorce, of broken homes, and unwanted children. Many physicians, sociologists, psychiatrists and unwed mothers have testified to the destructive tendencies of the modern dance. We cannot ignore all of the surroundings of the dance, all of its evil fruits and all of its shame, sin, broken lives and heartache.

Shall we dance? No, thank you, I will sit this one out.

Committee formed to guide construction of new school

A committee has been appointed to guide construction of a new Mt. Vernon Elementary School, although no money has been allocated for the project.

Members of the committee are principal John Hale, teachers Sue Ford, Charles Carter and Edna Dawson; curriculum director Bige Towery, food service director E.J. Smith, former school board chairman, Dr. Rudolph Burdette, board member Dr. Billy George Griffith and parents Bill Dowell and Tony Hopkins.

According to School Superintendent Charles B. Parsons, the committee will be allowed to get more members and will work with architects in designing the new school as well as looking for a possible alternate site.

At the present time, preliminary plans for the new school call for it to be built on the present site of the old school. The new school

Money has not been funded.

will face Williams Street.

If all goes well, it will be after the first of the year before the money is forthcoming from the state for the new school.

During recent board meetings the board hired an architect and fiscal agent contingent on whether the local system gets the funding from the state for the \$3.5 million dollar project.

The action is like putting the cart before the horse. Gov. Martha Layne Collins' education package in 1985 had a construction plan in it which must be funded by the Kentucky Legislature each time it meets.

If the 1988 Legislature does not appropriate money for Collins' School Facilities Construction Fund there will be no new school in Mt. Vernon.

One thing the school board must do is use its own money first. The board's last audit showed the system with a

balance of about \$287,000 in the general fund. That money was after everything else had been paid.

But, since the school system did not get in on the first round of funding by the State Department of Education, it has not had to put a freeze on excess funds.

Superintendent Parsons told board members at a recent meeting that he was going to try to get all of the old buildings in the system in good shape before the school system had to commit all of its extra money to a new school.

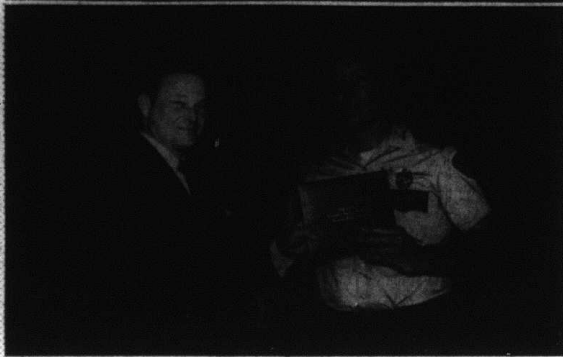
Besides the extra money the board also has to commit its capitol outlay money which is paid to them each year by the state.

Most of that money is still earmarked toward paying off the bonds sold to build the new high school. There are still a few more payments left to be made.

The last Legislature also passed a law that each school district in the state must collect the equivalent of 25 cents per hundred dollars assessed value. If this amount is not collected from property taxes then some state money would also be cut.

According to the school system finance officer

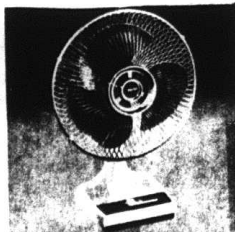

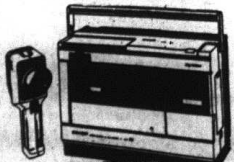

Sugar snap peas are crunch addition to summer meals

Sugar snap peas are the newest and most versatile variety of edible-podded peas. These and other peas cooked in the pod, such as Chinese peas, sugar peas, snow peas and salad peas add crunch to every meal.

Sugar snap peas may be eaten raw or cooked before the peas form, after the peas are full size or any time in between. They can be shelled and cooked, also. The pods are tender, bright green and sweet.

Sugar snap peas can be cooked in a small amount of

water, steamed, stir-fried, and combined with other foods in an Oriental dish or a favorite casserole. They may be served raw in salads or with other raw vegetables as an accompaniment for a dip.

Freeze extra sugar snap peas for later use. Wash the peas thoroughly in cold water, remove the stem end and strings if there are any. None of the varieties have many strings until they are more mature. The pods may be left whole, broken like green beans or cut on a

diagonal. Blanch for 1 1/2 to 2 minutes in boiling water, cool in ice water and thoroughly drain. The package them in freezer bags, remove as much air as possible from bag, and fasten and freeze. Allow the pods to thaw in the refrigerator before using them in combination dishes.

TO COOK IN WATER

Cook the peas over medium heat in 1 inch of boiling, salted water. Heat the pea pods to boiling, cover them and cook 5 to 8 minutes until the peas are tender but still crisp. Season with margarine, butter, bacon fat or salsa oil.

TO STEAM

Cook pods in a steamer over boiling water until tender-crisp, about five minutes. If a steamer is not available, use a strainer to hold vegetable above water. Season by tossing pea pods with one teaspoon margarine and one teaspoon soy sauce.

TO STIR-FRY

Cook in small amount of cooking oil, bacon fat or margarine until vegetable is tender, crisp and still has good color. The peas may be cooked in a skillet or a wok. Stir the peas constantly until ready. Podded peas may be left whole, sliced on the diagonal or snapped. Allow two teaspoons oil or fat for one pound of peas.

STIR-FRIED PEA PODS

3 slices bacon, crumbled
1/2 medium onion, chopped
2 pounds pea pods, tender salt and pepper to taste
Cook crumbled bacon in skillet until crisp, drain all of fat except one tablespoon. Cook onion with bacon, stirring constantly for about one minute. Add pea pods and keep stirring to coat with fat and cook until tender but still crisp, three to five minutes. Lightly season with salt, if

needed. The bacon may add enough salt. Serve at once. Yield: 4 servings. If peas are not tender, it may be

necessary to add 1/2 cup of water and continue to stir-fry.

Tree seedling sales are up

Over 12 million tree seedlings in 20 varieties were sold by the Kentucky Division of Forestry nurseries from April through fall 1986, up 2 million from 1985 and nearly 4 million from 1983. Many were sold to the Daniel Boone National Forest.

The division's two nurseries annually raise the seedlings for sale to Kentucky landowners in an effort to return idle and eroding land to forests. With the exception of white pine and Scotch pine, which are two years old when shipped, all other seedlings are one year old.

A breakdown of the tree seedling sales records show that 5.5 million were sold for mined land reclamation purposes, either for the reclamation of current operations or the restoration of sites under the abandoned mine land program. The planting of trees on these sites not only helps stabilize the soil, but also can provide a future source of revenue from harvested trees.

Individual private landowners purchased nearly 3.3 million seedlings, many of which will be used to plant old fields that are no longer usable or needed for farming operations. Many of these landowners received assistance from division foresters in selecting the right species for their sites.

The forestry industry purchased over 2.2 million seedlings either to reforest some of their own lands or to give to private landowners under

various company programs. Approximately 346,000 seedlings were sold to various federal agencies. Sales to other states and individuals outside Kentucky accounted for 949,000 seedlings.

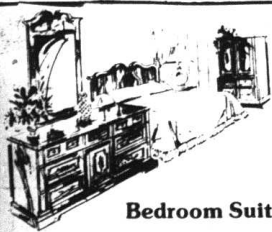
