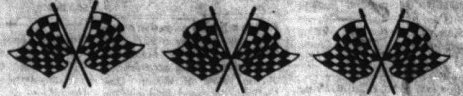

Lottery poll shows most agree with Wilkinson

Most Kentuckians think that state government needs more money, that a lottery is a good way to get it and that they would play at least once a month, according to a poll taken last week.

Less than one-fifth of the state's adults oppose a lottery, but their opposition is firm. Half of them disapprove on moral or religious grounds and nine out of 10 opponents said they would never play the game.

State Representative Danny Ford, Republican of Mt. Vernon, is one of those strongly opposed to the Lottery. Ford, who was very instrumental in killing the Lottery Bill in 1984, said Tuesday that he did not think that a state Lottery would generate the kind of revenue that many observers believe and he also said he was opposed to the lottery because of moral reasons.

In 1984 when the Lottery Bill got to the House of Representatives, Ford, Joel Ellington and Louis Johnson, two Democratic Legislators, were the main reason the Lottery Bill lost out in the House after it had passed in the Senate.

Rockcastle's State Senator John D. Rogers, Republican of Somerset, who most people in Rockcastle County would

not even know if they saw him because of his infrequent visits to the county, could not be reached for comment.

The special poll concerning the Lottery was conducted by the Louisville Courier-Journal June 1-3, one week after Wallace Wilkinson, promising a state lottery instead of higher taxes, won the Democratic primary for governor.

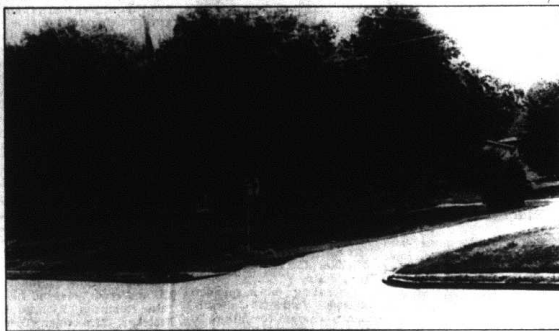
According to the poll, despite colossal odds against scoring a big jackpot, the chance to win money is what supporters like most about the game. That was followed by helping raise revenue for education and a belief that the lottery would keep the state from raising taxes.

The poll has a margin of error of 3.5 percentage points. That means that 19 out of 20 times the poll results would differ no more than 3.5 points above or below the results that would have been obtained by questioning every Kentucky adult with a telephone.

Representative Ford said that he did not know how his 80th District felt about the Lottery because he has not done a recent survey on any issues. He said that a survey or poll was not out of question for the future.

Henderson property post office site



Henderson property at the corner of Richmond and Lewis streets has been chosen for the site of a new Mt. Vernon Post Office. A date when work will begin has not been announced by the Postal Service.

A new and expanded Mt. Vernon Post Office will be constructed on the Henderson property at the intersection of Richmond and Lewis streets, it was announced at a meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night.

Notification through the city council was somewhat surprising. Postmaster James O. Smith had expected to make the announcement, but he was not notified. The letter, written by J. David Sutherland of Lane Consultants of Lexington, which handled the site search, said the Henderson property has now been selected for development for the proposed facility and will be purchased and owned by the U.S. Postal Service.

Cost of the property, owned jointly by David Henderson and Joe Young, will be \$47,000.

Sutherland asked the city council for comments within 30 days. The council did not offer any suggestions during the meeting.

Councilman Tom Welch said Tuesday morning he thought the site was the "wrong place for a post office."

Welch said other sites should have been considered, more closely before a final decision was made.

Council passes new budget; takes aim at lake activities

Budget down

A tentative general fund budget of \$179,535 for 1987-88 was approved by the Mt. Vernon City Council at its regular monthly meeting Monday night.

The new general fund budget is \$8,409 less than last year's budget that totaled \$187,944 and reflects a loss of Revenue Sharing funds.

Expenditures estimated for the coming year total the same as the budget, \$179,535 with \$109,580 for various salaries and \$69,955 for operations. Last year, those figures were \$85,986 for salaries and \$111,747 for operations.

Most of the expenditures for salaries in the coming year are in the Police Department plus a five percent increase in salaries for all employees that was approved Monday night.

Police salaries for the coming year are \$72,508 compared to \$52,760 last year.

As usual, the budget is in balance, but it possibly may not be by the end of the fiscal year. Last year the city over-spent its budget by \$10,211.

For the first time, water and sewer income and expenditures are separated in next year's budget.

Last year, when both accounts were together, the combined water/sewer

Poll shows support for state lottery

The poll shows that beyond any doubt, that Wilkinson put his lottery message across. Forty-one percent of all the people polled suggested, without prompting, that a lottery would be the best way for the state to raise money. And 80 percent identified Wilkinson as the candidate who ran on that issue.

It would take at least two years for the state to get a lottery, since three-fifths of the General Assembly would have to approve a constitutional amendment and put on the ballot, then -- if the voters approved -- write and pass legislation creating the lottery.

Current law allows recipients to be eligible for all or a portion of lifetime payments of 100 percent of the state's average weekly wage, currently about \$322. The proposal calls for payment of \$120 a week for four years to be paid directly by coal companies, rather than the Special Fund.

The plan also sets up five levels of payments based on the severity of the disease and to decrease of disability that results. Coal operators would be prohibited from refusing to hire miners if they had less-severe cases of black lung.

Black lung payments make up 85 percent of all workers' compensation payments in Kentucky. The \$1.6 billion unfunded liability is the amount of estimated payments for all workers' compensation claims that are not paid.

The Special Fund, which pays those claims, does not have sufficient funds to cover the commitment. The money comes from assessments on all employers in the state.

Currently, expenditures are outstanding receipts by \$2 million per week.

The panel will take up the deficit in the future meetings. The four-month industry and labor leaders, coal miners, mine operators and legislators.

The panel would drastically reduce payments to future black-lung benefit recipients if it becomes law without change.

The 15-member task force delayed discussion on how to handle the \$1.6 billion deficit the Special Fund is facing. But the plan does specify ways to reduce future costs.

Under the plan, future claims would be lowered from \$70 million annually to about \$22 million. The reduction would be accomplished by establishing time limitations on disability payments for miners who develop black lung from breathing coal

area of the lake are not in compliance. In other action, the council voted to make city elections non-partisan. In the recent city mayoral election only Republicans could vote because both candidates were Republican and the council had failed to pass a resolution calling the election non-partisan.

did not know if a public protest, given there would be some opposition, would result in a site change. The new post office building will be 4400 square feet. The number of employees at peak time, four. The entire site is 22,440 square feet which the consultant said would provide safe and adequate parking for customers and employees.

The Postal Service had 15 sites available to consider within a half-mile radius of the courthouse. That number was reduced to five when the committee toured the five sites. They were Henderson property, the Leach property, U.S. 360 immediately behind the courthouse, but considerable excavation was needed and expensive, the Zella Miller and Henry Cox properties near Elmwood

Cemetery, and the Mt. Vernon Hotel property on Main Street, but it too would need considerable site preparation that would have been costly.

It will be only the third time the post office has been moved in Mt. Vernon in at least the past 50 years. Prior to the present office that opened in October 1967, the office was located, first, in a wooden building on the site of what is now Young's Pharmacy. Later, it was moved across the street to the old Peoples Bank Building, now Something Special Body Boutique. The next move was to the present site.

Postmasters during those years were, first, Mrs. Matie Griffin followed by Mrs. Kate Mullins, and in turn acting postmistress, Mrs. Ethel Griffin. James Smith became postmaster in 1956.

New sewer rates passed at previous meeting are likely to go into effect with the July billing. The council set 2 p.m. Monday for a public hearing on municipal aid to get ideas from residents on what aid funds should be spent. There will also be a meeting of the council at 7 p.m. Monday to discuss and review sewer and water programs.

Byron Baker, representing the Northern Rockcastle Water District, came to the council to protest any increase in the rate for water sold to the district. The city sells water to Brodhead, Northern and the Western Rockcastle Water District for 84 cents per 1000 gallons. The city wants to increase the rate to \$1.20 per

1000 gallons. Baker told the council the Northern district is not "making ends meet," and that the district could not operate with the new rate unless district officials go to the Kentucky Public Service Commission and ask for a rate increase for customers. The district's 500 customers pay \$8.52 per 2000 gallons.

Baker said the district had borrowed a lot of money to bring water to the district and told the council the district is "overdue at the bank" because of the need to repair some of the water lines.

The council agreed to meet with district representatives at 7 p.m. Friday at the district headquarters near Roundstone.

budget totalled \$400,591. Separated for the coming year, the water income is expected to be \$327,730 and sewer income at \$200,600. If the income were figures together as it was last year, the total income would be \$528,330. The increase in income is mostly due to an increase in sewer rates brought on by money needed to pay the city's share of its \$1.9 million sewer plant renovation. The city has a \$300,000 water project soon to get under way, that will eventually call for an increase in water rates for the first time in many years.

Don't drink your milk, eat it!

If you don't like milk or if you don't drink enough daily, your body still needs this calcium-rich food. Not enough of it can increase the risk of osteoporosis.

One way to assure you get calcium into your diet is to cook with nonfat dry milk. Nonfat dry milk is simply one of many forms of processed milk. It is a low-calorie, nutritious substitute for other high-fat dairy products. Nonfat dry milk is convenient and inexpensive, too. It can be stored for several months. Most importantly, it can enrich mixes, cream soups, casseroles, puddings, sauces and gravies.

Some other ways to use nonfat dry milk:
Add the dry milk powder to water in which cereals are cooked.

Use one-fourth cup nonfat dry milk powder for every pound of ground meat before browning.

Add nonfat dry milk powder when making mashed potatoes, using one-third cup per four servings.

Add one-fourth cup nonfat dry milk to each cup of fluid milk when making biscuits, muffins, pancakes, yeast breads, cookies and cakes.

If powder milk is added to baked products, they will be firmer and will brown faster. Lower the baking

temperature of the amount of sugar to reduce the browning effect.

"CHEESE FOOD" IS GOOD PROTEIN BU

Say "cheese" and smile, because you're talking about high-quality protein-even when "cheese food" is on the package label. This description is used for pasteurized process cheese with added milk solids.

Ounce for ounce, cheese food contains just about the same amount of protein as natural or processed American or cheddar cheese.

Cheese food is milk in flavor, soft in texture, and melts easily. Less costly than most other cheeses, it is a good buy in protein. For a quick and nutritious snack or dessert, try serving cheese with fruit or crackers. And the following are tips for cooking with cheese:

One-half pound of cheese yields about 2 cups of shredded cheese.

To make cheese sauce, stir shredded cheese into cooked white sauce, then heat only enough to melt the cheese.

When preparing a cheese omelet, add the shredded cheese after the omelet is cooked, just before folding it over.

Bake casseroles containing cheese at low temperatures (around 300 F.) to prevent cheese from toughening.

Bids sought on rest of '83 burley

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation is now in the process of receiving bids on the remainder of the 1983 burley crop.

The government agency invited offers to bid on approximately 55 million pounds of leaf on May 13, with final considerations being accepted until 2 p.m. EDT on June 11.

The Commodity Credit Corporation acquired 212 million pounds of the '83 burley crop by calling price support loans as mandated by provisions of the Consolidated Omnibus Budget Reconciliation, or "Tobacco Act" of 1985, according to Joe McDaniel, president of the Burley Tobacco Growers Cooperative Association.

McDaniel said the 1983 burley crop was "drought-stressed," and considered

not as high a quality crop by the trade. The new tobacco law authorizes CCC to sell the surplus leaf at any price it chose.

Initially, the Burley Association in Lexington, held about 182 million pounds of the crop, and the Burley Stabilization Corporation in Knoxville, Tenn., held about 30 million pounds for a total of 212 million pounds of leaf taken under loan. The two associations had held the tobacco as collateral for loans from the CCC that were used to pay farmers at the time of sale. These loans are made when tobacco fails to receive a bid of one cent per pound over the support price from buyers.

Two previous bid offers resulted in CCC selling approximately 157 million pounds of it's 1983 holdings. The first round of bids in June 1986 resulted in some 71 million pounds of burley being sold for about \$44 million,

or at an average price of 62.4 cents a pound. Bids on that sale ranged from 41.5 cents a pound to \$1.85 a pound for strip quality leaf. Strips averaged 75 cents a pound and stems averaged 13 cents a pound.

The second bid offerings in March of 1987 grossed approximately \$50 million and averaged 59 cents a pound. Strip quality leaf bids ranged from 31.75 cents a pound to \$1.01 a pound, and averaged 75 cents a pound. Twenty million pounds of stems averaged 13 cents a pound, and approximately 1 million

pounds of scrap averaged 7 cents a pound.

Strips are the portions of leaves remaining after the stems have been removed. Stems are apportioned to buyers based on pounds of strips purchased.

Successful bidders will be notified July 1, according to Milton Hertz, CCC executive vice president. Hertz said the buyers must pay for their purchases in full by the close of business on Sept. 29.

McDaniel said he thought the remainder of the '83 crop would be purchased by the buyers. "I think there is quite a bit of interest at this time to purchase the remainder of the crop," he said. "It will be good for the industry to get the crop off our books and into the trade for a more stabilized tobacco program in the future."

FmHA changes

Federal agency ends MPS housing criteria

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has terminated the use of the so-called Minimum Property Standards (MPS) as its primary design and construction criteria for rural housing, according to Mary Ann Baron, Kentucky State Director.

The new standard for single family and multi-family units will be those contained in the Kentucky Building Code, third edition (1985).

The change complies with the Housing and Urban Recovery Act of 1983 and the recommendations of the President's Commission on Housing. The new standards will address health and safety issues, but not market oriented issues, such as ap-

pearance and livability.

The change will also eliminate the confusion and difficulties experienced in the past when a house or apartment building was required to comply with more than one set or level of minimum standards.

Ms. Baron says that FmHA regulations now require that final drawings and specifications for new construction be certified for compliance with the new stand by an architect or engineer currently registered in Kentucky.

Mrs. Helton first worked in Republican politics fifty-nine years ago at the age of twenty-one. She has served as a precinct captain,

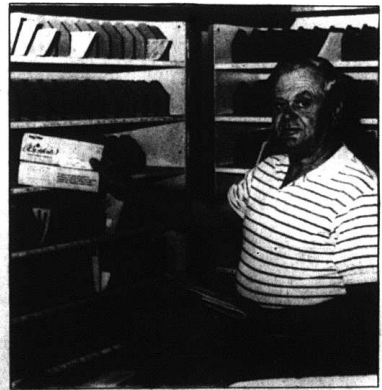
telephone worker and served at the polls. She has also served her club as president, secretary and treasurer.
