

## Martins have established successful dairy operation in Three Links area

Jack and Darlene Martin along with their sons Grant and Andy have established one of the counties larger dairies in an area away from the western Rockcastle County dairy section. One would probably not expect to see a dairy in the rolling hills of the Three Links section, but this full time farm family has established a successful operation.

Their herd consists mainly of Holstein cattle with an average of forty-eight cows in the milk line. Thirty-five replacement heifers, along with baby calves and Holstein steers bring the total herd size to just over a hundred head.

"Artificial insemination has been the best thing we ever did for our herd", Jack backs his belief up as he quotes the number of young replacements added, and the majority of the herd is less

than 4 years old. No bull will be found on the farm to upset the AI program.

To supply feed for his herd requires ninety acres of mixed grass and legume hay along with twenty-two acres of corn silage. With limited corn acreage and recent low corn prices, Jack has found it cheaper to purchase additional ear corn or shelled corn. An on farm grinder mixer along with purchased supplement allow the Martins to formulate all their rations.

Keeping expenses under control is a great management concern especially "during the down farm economy". Silage is stored above ground and fed with farm equipment. As the silage runs out in early summer, pastures interseeded with legumes and additional supplement, make up the feed supply.

But one of the most obvious management programs is the excellent condition farm equipment is kept in. Most of the equipment with any age at all has been sanded, painted, and reconditioned. Grant has been able to take advantage of agriculture mechanics class in the FFA department to use their equipment as projects.

Farming is a full time job, especially having a dairy farm with 4 1/2 acres of tobacco, but the family finds other off farm involvements. Grant has been active in Future Farmers of America, receiving honors in tractor driving and public speaking. Darlene is an excellent artist and craftsman. Jack serves on the Farm Credit Services Committee. Along with a very active church family, the family as a whole has been recognized through the Master Homemakers Award and FHA Master Farm Award.

As in the past, during June Dairy Month, we take a moment to recognize our dairy farm families and say thank you. 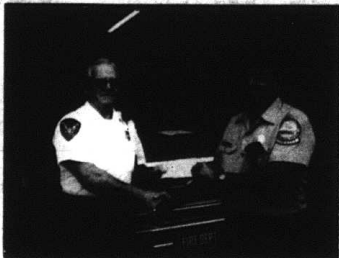

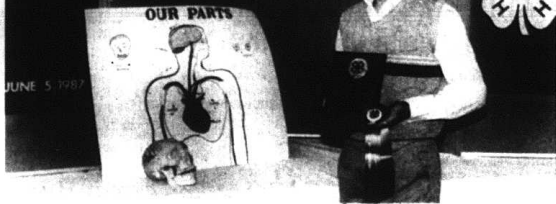

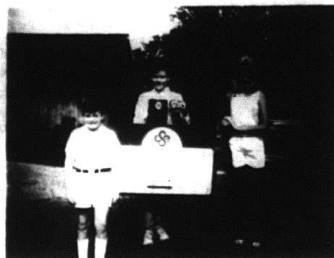

## Sewer rate increase Aug. 1

Sewer customer in Mt. Vernon will see the first increase in sewer rates when they get their Aug. 1 bill. The city council voted Monday night to begin the new charges on that month's billing.

The new sewer charges for residents will be \$9.98 minimum charge for the first 2,000 gallons of water used, with an additional cost of \$2.49 for each 1,000 additional gallons.

The water rate stays at \$4.50 for the first 2,000 gallons, but that charge may eventually change when the city's \$300,000 water project is completed. The new sewer rates were approved by the council in April.

While the council was on sewer and water business, councilmen voted to increase the bulk water rate for the Northern Rockcastle Water District from 84 cents for 1,000 gallons to 96 cents per 1,000 gallons. The rate established is for one year at which time the rate will be evaluated.

Engineers for the city had suggested \$1.20 for 1,000 gallons for the district but officials of the water district protested saying as of Jan. 1 they were \$5,000 in debt and increasing the water rate would cause a hardship. Councilman Joe Martin

Mayor Elizabeth Baker expressed the opinion that the word "disapprove" used by Welch might not be the right word since the city cannot disapprove the site, that only the post office can do that. The council agreed on the word "reconsider."

Last week, the Postal Service sent the city a letter which stated the Henderson property had been "selected for development of the proposed facility and will be purchased and owned by the U.S. Postal Service."

The Henderson property is located at the intersection of Richmond and Lewis streets and contains 22,440 square feet. It is owned by David Henderson and Joe Young, both of whom have committed to the sale.

In its letter, the Postal Service asked for comments from the city council within 30 days, but most officials agreed, if the Postal Service has chosen the site, it will likely purchase the site despite opposition.

Five sites were visited by a Postal Committee before a decision on the Henderson property was made. The hotel site was included in the five sites.

said the district may be in debt, but it plans to construct a new water line to serve additional customers. He wondered about the advisability of the project as long as the district is in debt.

Burton told the council water pressure on many weekends, especially in summer, is very low in some areas of the district and asked if the city's proposed water project would help.

The council referred the matter to Water Superintendent Matt Powell who told the group it would not help. He said the cause was the long distance the water must travel, small water lines and lots of customers using water in summer to water yards and gardens.

The group asked the council if it would object to the district adding a pump to increase pressure. The council gave the new pump its blessing since the cost would be borne by the district.

## Switch in grant funds helps with jail project

A switch in grant money from one proposed project to another has apparently helped get the renovation of the county jail under way.

The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted at a called meeting Monday to change a \$30,000 area development district grant that was earmarked for improvements at the Brodhead Fairgrounds to the county jail renovation.

The state has warned the county it will close the jail unless the remodeling is done.

Tim Schwendeman, development specialist for the Cumberland Valley Area Development District through which the grant was obtained, told the court he believed the switch could be made and approval obtained by next Wednesday.

The court already had a \$30,000 grant in effect from the Kentucky Corrections Cabinet for the work. The court recently voted to borrow \$15,000 to help with the project. With the new money, the court will have a total of \$75,000, plus about \$5,000 that

the county will receive from keeping prisoners from other jail facilities.

The only work planned for the fairgrounds was a cover for the grandstand.

The court also approved withdrawal of a bid from J.C. Newland Construction of Brodhead to do the jail work and voted to accept the next lowest bid on the project from McKnight and Associates of London.

Newland's bid was \$79,910. The McKnight bid was \$86,990. Newland said he was too busy to do the work.

A McKnight representative at the meeting told the court his firm would get to work on the project "right away." He estimated it would take at least three months to complete.

Work at the jail includes the addition of a drunk tank, visitors lounge and changes in cells.

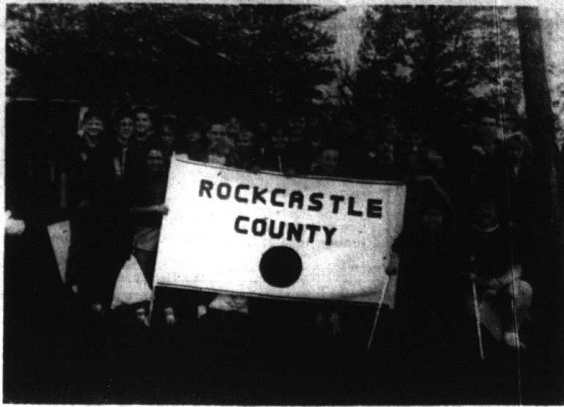

## Objections surface over new post office site

Downtown businessmen, time and money making angered by the choice of a site for the new post office on Main Street also be considered.

The council agreed to send a letter asking that the Main Street site be considered, but at the same time, pointing out advantages of both the Richmond and Main street sites.

The vote to send the letter was 4 to 1 with Councilman Jackie Renner voting "no". Councilman Jerry Penrod did not attend the meeting.

The Main Street property discussed by the council is the old Mt. Vernon Hotel, soon to be completely vacant when the Family Cafe closes, and the present vacant Norton Insurance Building adjoining the hotel.

Merchants Billy Hiatt, John Cox and Essie McBea appeared before the council along with Floyd Owens who is director of the Downtown Revitalization Program.

Hiatt told the council the city had spent considerable

time and money making angered by the choice of a site for the new post office on Main Street also be considered.

Hiatt said the post office on Main Street would better serve the city, and that the old hotel will soon become an eyesore.

Hiatt added the council would help downtown by restating its commitment to the downtown area's revitalization.

Councilman Tom Welch agreed with Hiatt. He said the Henderson property on Richmond Street would be an inconvenience to the elderly who would walk out to the post office for their checks and then have to walk back to the bank to cash them.

It was also pointed out during the discussion that the hotel site would call for cutting the sidewalk down to the street level, and that water and sewer lines would have to be changed at city expense.

## Larry Kirby dies of gunshot wound

A Mt. Vernon man was shot to death Monday night in the Livingston apartment of his ex-wife, State Police at the London Post reported.

Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell said that Larry Bruce Kirby, 36, of Town Hill in Mt. Vernon, died instantly from two .22 caliber gunshot wounds, one to the upper chest area and one to the head. Dowell pronounced Kirby dead at the scene about 8:30 p.m.

According to State Police they were called to the scene at about 8 p.m. after Kirby was shot by Allen Charles of Livingston, his former brother-in-law.

Charles told police he shot Kirby with a gun he had recently purchased at John's Discount in Mt. Vernon. Charles told police the shooting was in self-defense.

Charles said Kirby had threatened to kill him and Kirby's ex-wife, Donna, several times, and that Donna Kirby had gone as far as to obtain a warrant for her former husband. The warrant issued June 1 after Donna Kirby filed a complaint with authorities. However the warrant is still unserved in the Rockcastle sheriff's office.

A knife was found beside Kirby's body, and Charles told police that Kirby came to the apartment, argued, and then pulled the knife on his former wife and told her he was going to kill her. Charles said that he shot Kirby after he pulled the knife.

Mrs. Kirby and her three children were apparently living with Charles in the apartment.

## Freak accident kills woman

A Brodhead girl was killed and her two passengers slightly injured in a freak two vehicle accident on the old Brodhead-Mt. Vernon road Friday.

According to Kentucky State Trooper Mike Faulconer, the accident occurred two miles west of Mt. Vernon in a sharp curve near the residence of Marguerite Robinson.

Linda Bullock, 18, of Route 3, Brodhead was pronounced dead at the scene by Rockcastle County Coroner Bill Dowell. Dowell said that Miss Bullock died instantly from massive head injuries after she was struck by lumber that crashed through the driver's side window of her car.

According to police, the lumber was on a 1976 flat bed Ford truck driven by Joe

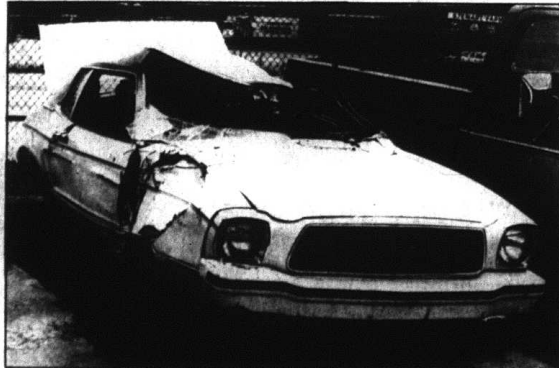
Cummins, 29, of Mt. Vernon. According to Faulconer's report, Cummins said when he met Bullock in the curve, her 1978 Mustang was partially on his side of the road. He told police that he swerved to miss Miss Bullock and when he did, the load shifted about 18 inches off the side and Miss Bullock hit the lumber with her car.

According to the police report, after hitting the lumber, the Bullock vehicle traveled over 300 feet down an embankment before coming to rest beside a tree.

A passenger in the Bullock vehicle told police when Miss Bullock first met Cummins, the load, 32, 2 by 8's was swaying on the back of Cummins truck. Police said the 2 by 8's were bound with a metal strip but were not tied to the truck.

## Council asked to keep lake open

A petition with 186 names asking that Lake Linnville continue to be used for recreation was presented to the Mt. Vernon City Council at a called meeting Monday night.

The petition was accompanied by a letter from William A. Randolph and Darrel R. Wilson which was presented to the council by Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hale, who lease the boat dock/beach from the city.

The letter asked the council not to close any part of the lake and to seek a solution from citizens who want to enjoy their favorite water sports. (The complete letter is printed in the Letter to the Editor Column, on page 2 of this issue of the Signal.)

Mrs. Hale told the council the lake is the only recreation in the county other than a skating rink, and that many people who come there from around the state, as well as locally, want the lake

to continue to be used. What does it take to prove to you people that the lake for recreation," she asked.

She told the council she and her husband could not patrol the entire lake and that some kind of law enforcement is needed. She said if there were patrolling many of the

problems at the lake would be remedied. Councilman Joe Martin informed the couple the lake would not be closed entirely, but that water skiing, wading and a limit on motor size would be prohibited by the council.

Swimming is prohibited in the lake other than in the beach area by the state. Martin said he did not think anyone wanted the lake closed but reported it was getting dirty from trash and litter.

Hale said the trash came from persons camping along the lake outside the designated camping area. The council promised that a policeman would be assigned for lake patrol. In the past, Policeman Wayne Denny has patrolled the lake, but

## Lisa Jones pleads guilty

After two circuit court trials and a Kentucky Court of Appeals ruling, Lisa Lopez Jones's murder case has finally come to an end.

Jones pleaded guilty Monday morning in Rockcastle Circuit Court to a lesser charge of reckless homicide. In return for the guilty plea Commonwealth attorney Benny Ham recommended that Ms. Jones receive a five year probation sentence. Jones, 24, had been charged with the January 30, 1984 shooting death of Johnny Falin, 34, of Mt. Vernon. She was tried for the crime in November, 1984. That trial ended in a hung jury.

Then in June, 1985, an eight-women, four-man jury found her guilty of murder and recommended a sentence of 20 years. But her attorney Larry C. Allen appealed conviction to the Kentucky Court of Appeals. On July 24, 1986, the court of appeals overturned Jones' conviction because of an error in

the trial. The court ruled that Circuit Judge Dan Venters erred when he allowed Falin's former wife, Peggy to testify. The court ruled that Falin's testimony was inadmissible and ordered a retrial.

The third trial of Ms. Jones was scheduled for Monday morning.

Jones, who was dating Falin at the time of his death, testified in both trials that Falin was shot by someone who had stopped behind their car on Ky. 1004 near Jean's Restaurant.

But, after an investigation by Kentucky State Police, Ms. Jones was arrested and charged with murder. Police contended that Ms. Jones shot Falin in the chest at close range after an argument.

Conditions of the sentencing set forth by Venters are that Jones stay under the supervision of probation authorities in Michigan and that if she returns to Kentucky her probation period be extended for two more years.

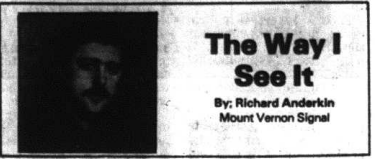

Frozen yogurt is a real crowd-pleaser, a nutritious summer dairy dessert. It need not be store-bought either.

Get out the old wooden ice cream freezer, or one of those electric models, and make your own. It will taste similar to the commercial product, but it won't cost nearly as much.

Here's the recipe which starts out with yogurt that you make at home for about 22 cents per serving. Use scalded whole milk, because the butterfat makes a smoother textured frozen product. You could substitute skim milk, but then add 1 cup whipping cream for the butterfat and smooth texture.

Heat 3 quarts of whole milk to 140 degrees Fahrenheit (or just scald it). Cool it to 120 degrees (lukewarm), then stir in 6 tablespoons of

unflavored commercial yogurt.

Put the yogurt in two or three big glass jars (such as 3-pound peanut butter jars) or a crock container and set in a warm place (85 to 110 degrees) for 3 to 6 hours. Or you could leave it overnight, but no longer than 8 hours.

Your oven is a good place to incubate the yogurt. If you have a gas oven with a constant pilot light, put the yogurt on the middle rack and shut the door.

To use an electric oven, place a pan full of boiling water (3 or 4 cups) on the lower rack and shut the door. Replace the boiling water

every hour or so.

Don't stir the yogurt while it's incubating. It should be about the consistency of commercial yogurt when it's ready. When you tip the jar, mixture should move slightly without flowing (the consistency of custard or thick gravy).

Now refrigerate the yogurt until it is thoroughly chilled, ready for making frozen yogurt.

**FROZEN YOGURT**

6 cups chilled homemade yogurt

1 1/2 cups sugar or honey (omit if you like a less-

sweet dessert)  
3 envelopes unflavored gelatin (softened in 1/4 cup cold water)  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 1/4 cups evaporated milk  
1 1/4 cups sliced peaches, blueberries or other fruit

Scald the evaporated milk, stirring once in a while to keep film from forming. Add sugar or honey, salt and softened gelatin. Allow mixture to cool.

Puree fruit with a blender, or

mash it with a fork. Stir the fruit and homemade yogurt into the cooled milk mixture and refrigerate for 2 hours or more. Now, transfer it to your ice cream freezer and proceed as for ice cream.

Make it before dinner and then let it "ripen" until you serve it. In case there's any left, put it in a regular freezer container before it melts and store it in the freezer. One cup of frozen yogurt provides nutritive value similar to that in 1 cup of milk.

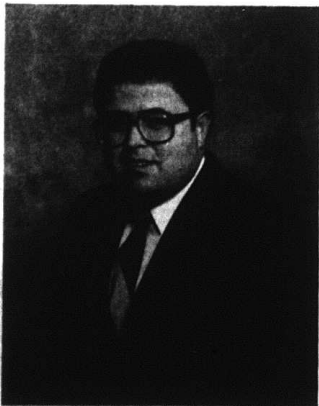

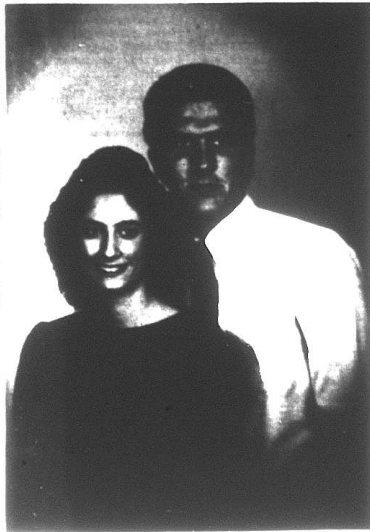
