Eight from here attend judging competition

Eight Rockcastle County youth were among over 150 youth from across the state celebrating June Dairy Month as they competed in the State 4-H Dairy Judging Contest on June 18th. Junior and Senior teams have worked through out the spring to train for this competition.

Training included the dairy quiz bowl (where juniors placed 3rd in state), the Hoard's Dairy Judging Contest, visits to Henry Hayes' and Russell Parson's dairy farms, Burdette's jersey farm near Danville as well as Eastern Kentucky University's State land Dairy.

The State contest required judging eight classes of Holstein and Jersey cattle ranging from heifers to aged cows. Senior team members were required to give oral reasons on their placings for three classes. Junior division team members were from left to right: Brad Hunt, Melissa Hayes, Larissa Hayes and Kathy Howard. Senior team members included Scott Adams (1st in Jersey, 1st in Holstein, 1st in reasons and 1st overall individual); Charlie Cameron (3rd in Jersey, 2nd in Holstein, 3rd in reasons and 2nd overall individual); Greg Brown and Anthony Lewis (6th in Holstein and 6th in reasons). Senior team members received the State Champion award with the top two members being invited back to top twelve week and possibly representing the state at the National Competition in October.

Promoting the dairy industry just comes second nature to a dairyman. But Raymond Brown puts a special effort forward. Working with a committee of businessmen, he helped get the Dairy Day Celebrations started back last year. He generously furnished all the hamburgers and assisted the Quail Homemakers in preparing the cook out. Raymond has also just completed a three year term as director on the South Eastern graded Milk association.

His main job, however, is the dairy farm located in the Ottawa section of Rockcastle County. Raymond, his wife, Brenda, daughter Reamealia, step sons Chris and Anthony Bradley live on the 94 acre farm.

Their herd consists of holstein cattle with an average of 35 cows in the milk line, eight to ten dry cows, along with 15 replacement heifers and calves brings the total to nearly 60 head.

Providing feed for this many animals requires additional crop land. Including rented land, 35 acres of corn are grown, 19 acres are cut for silage and stored in an underground bunker. The remaining 16 acres is harvested as ear corn which is ground and mixed with Purina Chow pellets for the milking ration. Double cropping wheat on 10 acres along with 16 acres of mixed grass and legumes may help provide the necessary forages. Doing custom work on the shares helps get the remaining forages needed. "I used to do a lot of custom work, but I just don't have enough time anymore."

Along with the dairy herd and crops, the family grows 3 1/2 acres of tobacco. Adding this to the swing shifts created by milking, can lead to 16 and 18 hour days.

Once again as we conclude the June Dairy Month salute, we would like to thank our dairy farm families for their dedication to the Agriculture industry.

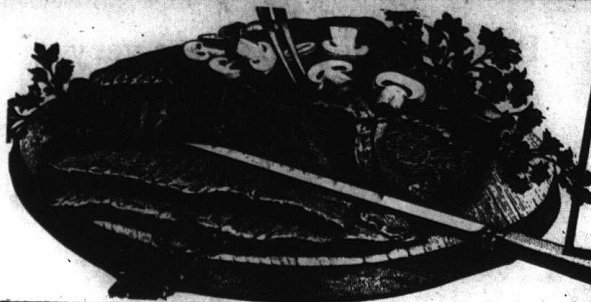
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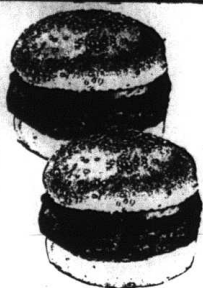
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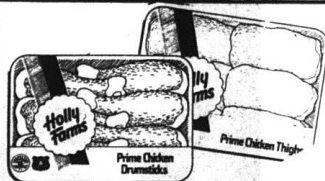

City scrubs water line up Town Hill

Bidding on the city's \$300,000 water project stalled last Wednesday night when bid amounts exceeded the money the city expect to have for the project.

To reach the amount, the Mt. Vernon council dropped one phase of the project, a 12-inch water line between city hall and the water tank area on Town Hill.

The water line project would have called for excavation and blasting along Richmond Street that would have been a traffic problem during the remainder of the summer, or until the line was installed. Bidders indicated the area is solid rock that increased the cost.

The three bids on the water line were \$194,990 and \$179,820. A third bid, the lowest of the three, was \$128,375 from Karish Construction of Mt. Vernon.

Bids on other phases of the project will probably be within range of city finances. Those include a \$123,200 bid on a 600,000 gallon ground level water tank from Caldwell Tanks, Inc., of Louisville, and a \$96,214 low bid on water plant upgrading and modifications from NAC, Inc., of Lexington.

The council will evaluate all the bids in an effort to get the project under way soon.

Money for the project is on a 50/50 basis between the city and a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

Rhodus hired for lake patrol

Jim Rhodus has been hired by the Mt. Vernon City Council on a temporary basis to patrol Lake Linville.

The council approved his appointment pending the return of policeman Wayne Denny who has been ill.

Rhodus, 36, lives on West Main Street in Mt. Vernon and formerly operated Annie's Cafe on Main Street.

The lake has been without regular police patrolling for most of the spring and has been the focus of city council discussions on several occasions.

Triple trouble predicted for local growers

Dry, hot weather in some parts of the state is causing double and triple trouble for some tobacco producers, but may be sparing them blue mold problems.

Unusually dry weather has caused newly set tobacco plants to wilt and die. Some farmers have set transplants three times already and are still having problems, said University of Kentucky Extension agronomist Gary Palmer.

"It's not the lack of water, per se, that is killing the plants, but rather a high fertilizer salts concentration around the plants that is causing the problem," Palmer said.

What, normally happens, Palmer said, is that enough rain

In Bennett Adams case

A Covington man was found guilty of first degree manslaughter last Thursday in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Bennett David Adams, 35, of Covington, had been charged with the July 31, 1986 murder of Tommy Burdette, 49, of Wildie. But, a seven-man, five woman jury found him guilty of the lesser charge at the end of the two day trial.

The jury recommended a sentence of 15 years for Adams,

falls in May and June to dissolve the fertilizer that had been applied at preplant into a larger area around the plant, lowering the concentration of the potentially lethal fertilizer salts. This year, however, short rainfall has allowed the concentration of fertilizer to remain high.

That high concentration of salts kills feeder roots quickly and stresses the plants enough that opportunistic microbes and insects are able to finish killing the plants, he said. In affected fields, loss has been from 35 to

100 percent. Although droughty conditions continue to plague some tobacco producers, another threat to

The board has the difficult task of replacing Charles B. Parsons, who resigned in May after 43 years in the school system and 19 as superintendent. Parsons last day as superintendent is next Tuesday.

Cox burned; brother jailed

A Rockcastle County man is listed in critical condition in the burn unit at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington, and his brother has been lodged in the Rockcastle County jail.

Wilburn Cox, 47, of Blue Springs, was severely burned on July 15 after his brother George Robert Cox poured gasoline on him and then set him on fire, according to a complaint signed by Elsie Cox Mullins.

George Robert Cox, 34, was arrested Friday by Deputy Sheriff Darrell Doan after a warrant was issued for his arrest. He was charged with first degree assault.

Cox appeared before District Judge William Cain. Wednesday Cain reduced Cox's bond from \$50,000 to \$5,000 cash or property. He is still being held in the jail and is scheduled for a July 1 preliminary hearing.

Truck parts found in Laurel

Truck parts from a 1982 Eagle International tractor, owned by David McCauley of Mt. Vernon, have been found in Fariston in Laurel County.

The truck was stolen Mar. 9, according to state police, and the parts were found at a garage where they were being used on another truck.

Detectives Ernie Boggs and Joe Gossett investigated the theft. Arrests in the case are expected in the next few days.

the superintendent's position, but that all four men to be interviewed Friday night are from Kentucky.

The four remaining candidates are Bige Towery, Jr., curriculum coordinator and Chapter 1 director in the local system, C.K. Cornelius, a former superintendent of Laurel County Schools, who now teaches at Mt. Vernon Elementary School and two other former superintendents, Robert Boggs of Leitchfield and Howard Hall of Brooksville.

Poynter said that besides Cornelius and Towery only one other local persons applied for the job and that was a woman. Poynter, who declined to comment on the woman, said she was not considered because she was not qualified to hold the job. He said that she did not have her superintendent's certificate which is required by state law.

"We had some very good applications and we had some bad ones as well," said board member Dr. Billy George Griffith.

"I think we have narrowed our choices to four excellent candidates," he added.

Poynter echoed much of the same sentiment. "Some of the people were not qualified, but most of the applicants were excellent. I think we have made the right decision in the four remaining men," he said.

The board chairman noted that he hoped the board would be able to reach a decision after the four interviews. Friday night mainly because of the time frame involved.

Miss Rockcastle

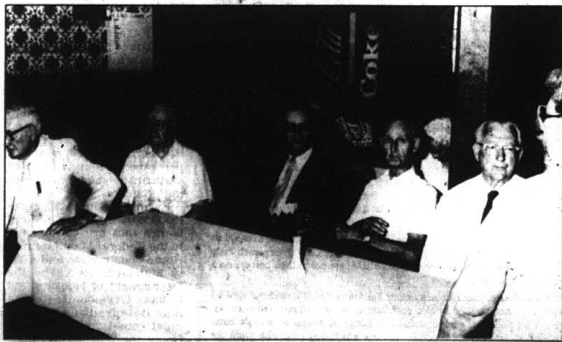
The Miss Rockcastle USA pageant will be held this year, but a date and location for the pageant has not been scheduled.

Farmers Home has new housing loans for the low income

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) now provides financing for manufactured homes for low-income and very low-income families, according to Mary Ann Baron, FmHA State Director for Kentucky.

"The authority to make loans on manufactured homes and to develop manufactured home rental projects is an extension of our single family and multi-family housing programs," Ms. Baron said. "This authority increases our ability to serve lower-income families."

Manufactured homes, sometimes called mobile homes, are designed and constructed for permanent occupancy by a single family. Manufactured homes include units at least 10 feet wide, which can be transported in one or more sections. Farmers Home will require a permanent foundation for units financed under its housing programs.

Farmers Home will make loans only on manufactured homes that are constructed to the Federal Manufactured Home Construction and Safety Standards issued by the Department of Housing and Urban Development. The manufactured units also must meet the Farmers Home thermal performance standards.

Repayment terms for manufactured home loans can be for up to 30 years for single family as well as for manufactured housing rental

DAILY MONTH SPECIAL- USING AND STORING BUTTER

Butter-melted on toast, dripping off hot corn-on-the-cob or coating down a mound of mashed potatoes -- is a delicious way to enhance food.

Proper storage of butter will ensure that it stays fresh longer.

To keep butter at its best, keep it clean, cold and covered.

Unopened butter will keep for several weeks in the coldest part of the refrigerator. Opened butter should be stored in a covered dish and placed in the refrigerator between meals. For the best flavor, it should be used within two to three days.

For longer storage, freeze butter in conveniently sized amounts. Rewrap in foil or freezer paper. Butter will keep

well in the freezer for six to nine months. It may taste off if stored longer, but it will still be safe to use.

For easy measuring, divide a one pound block of butter into four equal sticks. Use these amounts:

- 1/2 stick = 1/4 cup or 1/8 pound or 4 tablespoons
- 1 stick = 1/2 cup or 1/4 pound or 8 tablespoons
- 2 sticks = 1 cup or 1/2 pound or 16 sticks = 2 cups or 1 pound

Use measuring cups or spoons for exact amounts needed in recipes. Press butter firmly into measure until it is full. Level with the straight edge of a knife.

Although butter does add flavor to food, it is also a rich source of saturated fat and high in cholesterol. Low-fat and low-cholesterol diets usually do not

allow butter.

Butter is high in calories and provides only small amounts of a few nutrients. If you are trying to lose or maintain your weight, cut back on the amount of butter you add to food. One tablespoon of butter has 100 calories.

Here are some recipes for butter variations:

HONEY BUTTER

1/4 cup or 1 stick butter or margarine
2 cups cold honey
Beat honey and butter together until fluffy. Keep refrigerated. Spread on toast, biscuits, pancakes, waffles or other hot breads. For variety, add two tablespoons fresh orange or lemon juice and one teaspoon grated peel. Add one teaspoon cinnamon to make cinnamon honey butter. Makes 2-1/4 cups.

REDUCED-CALORIE BUTTER

3 cups chilled butter
3 tablespoons nonfat dry milk powder
1-1/4 cups ice water

Place butter, milk powder and water in a blender or beat with an electric mixer or hand beater. Whip until water is well mixed and the mixture is light and fluffy. Store in a covered container for two to three weeks, or freeze for up to three months. Makes about six cups.

STRAWBERRY BUTTER

1 cup butter or margarine, softened
1 10-oz carton of thawed sweetened strawberries

Combine strawberries and softened margarine. Beat with a mixer until smooth and creamy. Place in a container. Cover and refrigerate. Makes 1-1/4 cups.

Board selected for Forward in the Fifth local affiliate

A meeting to organize a Rockcastle County affiliate of Forward in the Fifth was held Thursday, June 18, at the Rockcastle County Hospital.

Forward in the Fifth is an organization dedicated to improving educational achievement in the Fifth Congressional district.

A study was conducted by the Mountain Association for Community Economic Development (MACEED), in Berea, that identified three factors - low expectations at home and at school, low levels of school funding, and politics - as problems contributing to our low educational achievement.

The regional organization and the Rockcastle group are working to develop creative plans to address these problems and to encourage students to reach their full potential.

The Rockcastle affiliate will be raising money to implement new programs in our community to support local schools. This money will be matched up to \$1,500 a year by the regional Forward in the Fifth organization.

Forward in the Fifth sees cooperation among parents, business leaders and teachers as being vital to improving education. Nineteen people attended the meeting. Parents, teachers, school administrators, and business people were all represented. A Board of Directors was elected consisting of 5

business people, 1 school administrator, 2 teachers, and 3 community people.

On the Board are Buford Parkerson, David Henderson, Pam Challif, Sue Hamm, Wayne Stewart, Charles Hedrick, Loreta Powell, Sam Ford, Billy Hiatt, Gary Eldridge, and Bob Fields.

The Board will hold a meeting at 7 p.m. July 9 at the hospital.

At the regional level, Forward in the Fifth has already implemented an attendance improvement program including

five districts designated as "target districts". During the meeting, the Rockcastle County School system received a plaque for participating as one of the target districts. Wayne Stewart presented the plaque to Superintendent Charles Parsons.
