

City scrubs water line up Town Hill

Bidding on the city's \$300,000 water project stalled last Wednesday night when bid amounts exceeded the money the city expect to have for the project.

To reach the amount, the Mt, Vernon council dropped one phase of the project, a 12-inch water line between city hall and the water line between city hall and the water thank area on Town Hill.

The water line project would have called for excavation and lasting along Richmond Street that would have been a traffic problem during the remainder of the summer, or until the line was installed. Bidders indicated the area is solid rock that increased the cost.

The three bids on the water line were \$194,990 and \$179,820. A third bid, the lowest of the three, was \$128,375 from Karish Construction of Mt. Vernon.

Bids on other phases of the project will probably be within range of city finances. Those include a \$123,200 bid on a 600,000 along ground level water tank from Caldwell Tanks, Inc., of Louisville, and a \$96,214 low bid on water plant upgrading and modifications from NAC, Inc., of Lexington.

The council will evaluate all the bids in an effort to get the project is no 5/30 basis between the city and a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission.



Triple trouble predicted for local growers

Dry, hot weather in some parts of the state is causing double and triple trouble for some tobacco

triple trouble for some tobacco producers, but may be sparing them blue mold problems. Unusually dry weather has caused newly set tobacco plants to wilt and die. Some farmers have set transplants three times already and are still having pro-blems, said University of Ken-tucky Extension agronomist Gary Palmer.

"It's not the lack of water, per se, that is killing the plants, but rather a high fertilizer salts con-centration around the plants that is causing the problem," Palmer

What normally happens, Palmer said, is that enough rain In Bennett Adams case

falls in May and June to dissolve the fertilizer that had been applied at preplant into a larger area around the plant, lowering the concentration of the potentially lethal fertilizer salts. This year, however, short rainfall has allowed the concentration of fertilizer to remain high.

That high concentration of salts kills feeder roots quickly and stresses the plants enough that opportunistic microbes and insects are able to finish killing the plants, he said. In affected fields, loss has been from 35 to

Jury recommends 15 years

A Covington man was found guilty of first degree manslaughter last Thursday in Rockeastle Circuit Court.
Bennett David Adams, 35, of Covington, had been charged with the July 31, 1986 murder of Tommy Burdette, 49, of Wildle. But. a seven-man, five woman jury found him guilty of the lesser charge at the end of the two day trial.

tobacco -- blue mold -- has yet to be confirmed in domestic tobacco anywhere in the U.S., said Bill Nesmith, University of Kentucky Extension plant pathologist.

"Active blue mold has been confirmed in wild tobacco in southwestern Texas, but has not been found in any commercial fields," the plant pathologist said.

Blue mold-favorable weather in Texas has permitted the sporulation of the fungus in wild tobacco. However, he said, since the wild tobacco population is town the year, the threat to domesticated crops is not as severe as in past years.

Even though hot and dry weather has made an immediate blue mold outbreak unlikely, the spirit weather has made an immediate blue mold outbreak unlikely. Nesmith warned growers that it is still too early in the season to assume that blue mold will not become a problem sometime later.



Farmers Home has new housing loans for the low income

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) can now provide financing for manufactured homes for low-income and very low-income families, according to Mary Ann Baron.
FmHAState Director for

"The authority to make loans on manufactured homes and to develop manufactured home rental projects is an extension of our single family and multi-family housing programs." Ms. Baron said. "This authority increases our abili-ty to serve lower-income

Manufactured homes, ometimes called mobile omes, are designed and conwhich can be transported in one or more sections. Farmers Home will require a permanent foundation for units financed under its hous-

units financed under its hous-ing programs.

Farmers Home will make loans only on manufactured homes that are constructed to the Federal Manufactured Home Construction and Safe-Home Construction and Safe-ty Standards issued by the Department of Housing and Urban, Development. The manufactured units also must meet the Farmers Home thermal performance

headquarters in Lexington will determine which manufactured home dealermanufactured home dealer-contractors are eligible to participate in the single family housing program. On-ly those dealer-contractors who are capable of providing acceptable service to FmHA borrowers will be certified. To be certified, dealer-

creased,
NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MT
VERNON, KENTUCKY, DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:




