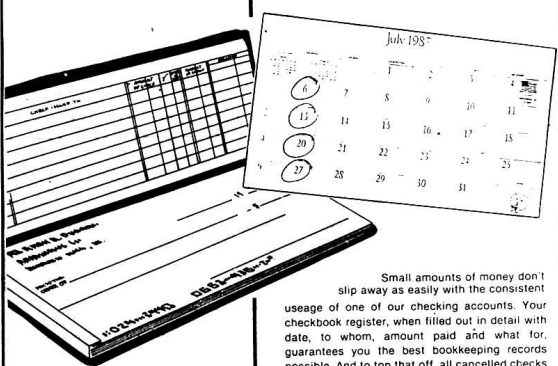

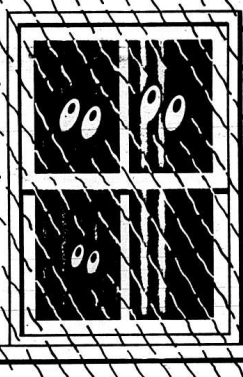

Susie Bryant in International Special Olympics

The spotlight will be on Rockcastle County when local Special Olympian, Susie Bryant travels to the University of Notre Dame in South Bend, Ind., to compete in the 1987 International Summer Special Olympics.

She will be among 88 delegates attending from the state of Kentucky and one of three chosen from an eight county area. Susie was chosen to represent Area VI because of her performance in gymnastics.

During the past two years she has attended area and state competition and holds seven ribbons and three medals for her performance.

Susie is the daughter of Ms. Teresa Bryant, of Brodhead, and attends Brodhead Elementary where she is a junior high student.

According to her mother, Susie never showed an interest in dancing or gymnastics until 1985 when she chose to compete in gymnastics for Special Olympics.

"I told her to go for it and do the best she can," commented Ms. Bryant and "I am very proud of her."

Susie was placed in special classes in the third grade, but that never deterred her determination according to her mother, "She has always liked school."

Special Olympics has helped Susie to realize that everybody can fulfill their dreams, but it may take longer for some people. Ms. Bryant doesn't know what Susie's plans include after completing high school but she feels that student's involvement in Special Olympics could possibly help them in the future when they

are faced with finding a job.

Susie will join over 5,000 other athletes from all 50 states plus foreign countries on the campus of St. Mary's College and Notre Dame Aug. 2 through Aug. 7. The athletes will be given the opportunity to meet celebrities such as Susan Saint James (Kate and Allie), Bruce Jenner, Eunice Shriver and Whitney Houston, one of the countries top recording artists, is scheduled to premier a new song during the games. The Wide World of Sports will dedicate its entire broadcast of August 15 to the International Special Olympics.

Area and State games are held every year, but International games are held every fourth year in different parts of the United States. Ms. Bryant is very proud Susie was chosen as an Interna-

Rockcastle County Special Olympic coaches feel honored to have had one of their athletes chosen, but with that honor also comes responsibility. Vernon.

Michael Radford, county coordinator, points out that this is a once in a life time chance for Rockcastle County to show off one of its own. Ms. Bryant stated, "I guess I would have to brag because it is my daughter."

The PEPP program is funded by the state Council on Higher Education and is intended to give students an opportunity to experience college-level classroom work, visit health care facilities and talk with medical professionals.

Participants must live in designated Kentucky counties such as Rockcastle County or parts of Lexington or Louisville

that have a low physician or dentist population. The theory of the program is that these students will probably return to their home counties to practice after they finish their educations.

Cox joined the program so that he could be better prepared for his college courses.

"What I like best about the program is the effort given by the teachers," said Cox.

The PEPP program also has students at the University of Kentucky and the University of Louisville.

PEPP students have the advantage of the follow-up programs available at UK and UL during their undergraduate years. These programs include counseling, guidance, and help in preparing for medical or dental school entrance exams.

High school seniors-to-be who are interested in the program should check with their guidance counselors for information forms in January or February.

Council shows concern over water bills, traffic tickets

Two Mt. Vernon residents who have received city water for years and never paid a water bill will get to pay one next month.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to require David McCauley and Mary Ida Jones to pay for water beginning with the next bill.

The two had not paid because over the years they had believed clauses in their deeds exempted them from paying. McCauley pays a sewer bill. Mrs. Jones does not have city sewer service.

City Attorney Carl Clontz told the council he had studied the documents (deeds) as requested and it was his opinion they do not confer the right of free water to McCauley and Mrs. Jones.

McCauley got his land from John Noe several years ago and

apparently considered the deed allowed him free water, since Noe had been given free water by the city for allowing the water line to cross his property.

Clontz said that the deed "does not require the city to furnish free water" forever.

Mrs. Jones got her land from Jarve Noe. At that time, the city allowed Noe free water for his family and animals for compensation for allowing water lines to cross his property.

Clontz said he did not believe the city is required to give free water "for a hundred years," especially after the land had changed hands. He reported when the new water system went into operation about 15 years ago, the council at that time asked him for an opinion on free water for both residents and he gave that council the same opinion, but nothing was ever done about it.

"It is my opinion," Clontz said, "that as described in these documents, they would not be entitled to free water."

He added that he did not believe the council could collect back bills because of the length of time involved, over five years.

The council then voted to inform McCauley and Mrs. Jones they are to begin paying when they receive their next water bill. All councilmen voted "yes."

The dismissal in District Court of two charges of reckless driving was discussed at length, and sometimes loudly, by the council.

On June 23, Larry Dwayne Burdette was issued a citation for reckless driving on West Main Street by City Policeman/Lake Linville patrolman Jim Rhodus.

Burdette was subpoenaed into court where his ticket was dismissed by Judge Walter McGuire after Burdette's father, City Councilman Larry Burdette, appeared with his son and told the judge Rhodus' jurisdiction was as a Lake Linville patrolman only and not Mt. Vernon.

Judge McGuire said Tuesday Rhodus seemed unsure of his actual duties and jurisdiction since he was new on the job, and after a discussion with County Attorney James H. Lambert, the judge dismissed the reckless driving charge.

The second ticket was issued by Rhodus on July 5 to Carl L. Morgan of Mt. Vernon on Barnett Road for a similar reckless driving charge.

Judge McGuire said he dismissed that ticket because, once again, there was a jurisdiction question and he wanted to

write a letter to County Attorney James H. Lambert stating that Rhodus is a city policeman hired to patrol Lake Linville and that, according to City Attorney Clontz, has the same jurisdiction as any city policeman.

Rhodus was hired on June 9 at a committee meeting as "temporary, part-time lake patrol unit" Wayne Denny returns to work. "Denny has been ill."

When contacted, Attorney Lambert confirmed the ticket was dismissed because he and Judge McGuire were unsure of Rhodus' duties.

"When we received the letter on his duties there will be no question any longer," Lambert

said. "We will be glad to cooperate with the city. It was just that the judge and I were not sure about his duties, so we decided until we do know we would give the boys a break."

Clontz told the council at its meeting, it is his opinion that a city policeman in a city the size of Mt. Vernon has the jurisdiction to perform his duties anywhere within the county.

At the meeting, Kenneth Hopkins, who lives on West Main Street, asked the council to enforce speeding and other traffic laws on the street.

Leo Hunt met with the council to tell them natural gas is available in abundance in the

area and that he hoped the city council would welcome any company willing to develop and promote natural gas.

Largest crowd in years attends music festival

State reports local crime facts

The state has released figures on crime in Kentucky during 1986, including those from Rockcastle.

The figures are only those that are required to be reported to the state. Some local figures are not reported.

In Rockcastle, the record shows State Police investigated 7 murders, 6 aggravated assaults, 50 burglaries, 23 larcenies and 17 vehicle thefts for a total of 103 investigations.

Sheriff Clarence Hasty and

deputies investigated 15 burglaries, 5 aggravated assaults and 10 larcenies for a total of 30.

The City of Mt. Vernon investigated one burglary and 3 vehicle thefts.

Broadhead did not report any investigations that are required by the state.

Enumerating arrests reported to the state, in Rockcastle there were arrests for the 7 murders and non-negligent manslaughter, 9 for aggravated assault, 4 for burglary, 8 for larceny-theft, and 3 for auto theft.

Narcotic arrests in Rockcastle in 1986 totaled 28. Of those, 24 were for marijuana and 4 for opium or cocaine and their derivatives.

In the area of serious crimes, such as murder, there was no percentage change statewide. However, statewide, aggravated assault rose 11.5 percent, robbery 9.4 percent, and burglary 7.5 percent.

Water skiing on way out

Water skiing on Lake Linville is on the way out.

The Mt. Vernon City Council voted Monday night to have City Attorney Carl Clontz draw up an ordinance prohibiting water skiing on the lake. Also, the speed limit for boats will be 25 miles an hour. Violation will bring a fine of \$25 to \$50. The exact date on which the ordinance will take effect is about the end of September, probably after the boating season is over. There will be no skiing next season unless the council, changes its mind.

Mayor Elizabeth Baker agreed that prohibiting water skiing will reduce the income at the boat dock and said some arrangement must be made to help Jimmy Hale, who leases the boat dock from the city, offset the money he will lose.

In his official report to the council, Hale said 444 boats were launched between June 8 and July 2, down from 814 launched in May.

The council instructed "no swimming" signs be erected at Lake Linville Beach in accordance with a ruling by the Rockcastle Health Department.

New face for water bills

City water bills have been changed in order to reflect a separate sewer charge that will go into effect with the next bill.

The new card shows payment of the bill is due on the 15th of the month. Service will be discontinued by the 20th of the month if the bill is not paid. It will cost \$25 to resume service. There will be no second notice.

As previously reported, there will be an increase in the sewer rate on the next water bill. The water rate has not changed.

Wet time

A total of 6.47 inches of rain has fallen in Mt. Vernon between July 1 and July 14, according to figures at the weather station at Cox Funeral Home, a possible record for July.

The hefty figures are compared to 3.45 inches that fell the entire month of July last year.

Most rain this year was 1.67 inches that fell on July 7, followed by 1.19 on July 13, and 1.12 on July 12 when there was half-inch hail and high winds.

Marijuana

A total of 125 marijuana plants have been found by City Policeman Bill Mink.

The plants were found on land in back of the Rockcastle Courthouse.

It was the second year that marijuana has been found growing in that location and destroyed.

Rockcastle under blue mold watch

A blue mold watch has been issued for burley tobacco producers in Eastern Kentucky, including Rockcastle.

The watch, issued by Bill Nesmith, University of Kentucky blue mold coordinator, comes after the fungus disease was confirmed in a field of burley tobacco in Hawkins County, Tenn., in the northeastern part of the state.

The watch means that conditions are favorable for a blue mold outbreak and that spores of the fungus are likely to be blowing into the region, Nesmith said.

The watch continues in effect for the following Kentucky coun-

ties: Bell, Clay, Harlan, Jackson, Knox, Laurel, Whitley, Breathitt, Knott, Lee, Leslie, Letcher, Owsley, Perry, Wolfe, Bath, Bracken.

Also, Fleming, Lewis, Mason, Menifee, Montgomery, Morgan, Robertson, Rowan, Boyd, Carter, Elliott, Floyd, Greenup, Johnson, Lawrence, Magoffin, Martin and Pike.

"Growers should realize that tobacco plants are very susceptible to blue mold when they are growing rapidly. Frequent thunderstorms and high relative humidity have provided adequate night time moisture for infection

to take place when the spores of the fungus are present," Nesmith said.

Producers should monitor their fields for signs of blue mold activity. Any suspected cases of blue mold should be reported to the county Extension agent for agriculture immediately for positive identification.

Old plant bed sites should be destroyed as soon as possible, because they provide the best growing grounds for the disease.

Nesmith said beds should be destroyed by plowing or deep disking, but not by mowing, which allows young suckers to

grow from the beds and provides an even better area for blue mold.

For crops that have not been protected, Nesmith suggests that foliar fungicides should be used. Although Ridomil 2E is not labelled for use as a foliar spray, other fungicides are available for such use. Research conducted at University of Kentucky with foliar fungicides indicates that those containing mancozeb give control superior to those not containing mancozeb.

Foliar fungicides should be sprayed weekly, using drop nozzles on high clearance and tractor-mounted sprayers, he said.

I came across a October 1977 issue of Outdoor Life magazine the other day and in it's regional (Yellow page) section a heading read, "Kentucky Is Gearing Up To Boost Turkey Flocks." The information beneath the heading stated that Kentucky's turkey restoration efforts had been plagued by repeated failures. But that a new project underway might provide the answers as to why turkey flocks which appeared to be growing would suddenly disappear for no apparent reason. The project for the first time would implement follow-up studies on turkey which were to be released in selected areas around the state. The article continued that George Wright, a biologist highly trained in telemetry technology (radio tracking) would oversee the follow-up section.

What success has Kentucky's turkey program met since that installment appeared in the October '77

issue of Outdoor Life? At the time the article was written the state's turkey population was estimated to be only around 2,000 birds, now a decade later the flock has grown to more than 15,000 birds and this is only the beginning. George Wright, who is now Fish and Wildlife's turkey program coordinator says that we are, "Just now getting a good start." Wright told me in a telephone conversation last week that he would like to see the state's flock grow to as many as 100,000 birds.

Even though the Kentucky turkey flock is expanding and doing well the state's stocking program will continue for the next 10 to 15 years. Around 1,500 wild turkeys have been released around the state since the restoration program started. Around 250 of these birds were released in 19 different counties this year. Nearby counties to receive wild birds were Bell, Knox and Whitley. The wild turkeys released over the last 10 years have

come from six different states by way of various traps.

Kentucky has the ability to support an extensive turkey population with, its vast woodlands. The state is estimated to have in the ball park of 18,000 square miles of suitable turkey habitat. In the mountainous regions of eastern Kentucky, where turkeys are really beginning to take hold, a square mile of good habitat will support five to 10 turkeys.

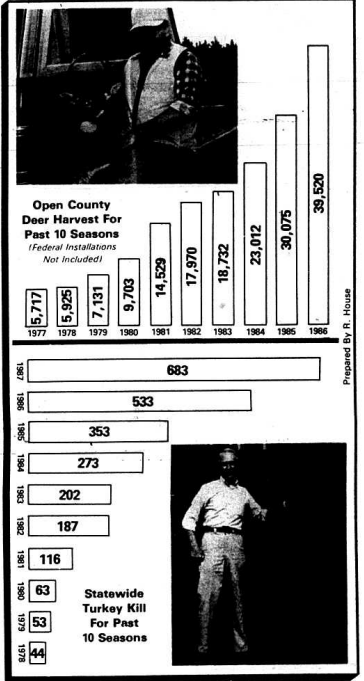
In country like the western part of the state, where forest and crop land intermingle, the turkey to square mile ratio can be much higher.

Turkey hunters are now collecting the dividends on the state's on-going restoration program. During the 1978 turkey season hunters harvested only 44 birds but the number has risen each consecutive year. This past spring gobbler season Kentucky hunters had another record setting season with 683 gobblers.

Turkey hunters were not, to one's surprise, the only Kentucky special interest group to have a record setting year. Deer hunters had their best season ever collecting 43,524 whitetail deer. Open county hunting across the state accounted for 39,520 deer while the remaining 4,004 whitetails came off federal installations.

Kentucky's turkey program is getting a lot of recognition these days but perhaps the state's number one wildlife success story is its dramatic recovery from an embarrassingly low deer population to an estimated herd of around 300,000 animals. Actually some regions west of here have more whitetails than they can handle. Deer in these high density areas have in many places surpassed the levels at which farmers are willing to tolerate.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife has liberalized deer hunting regulations in these par-

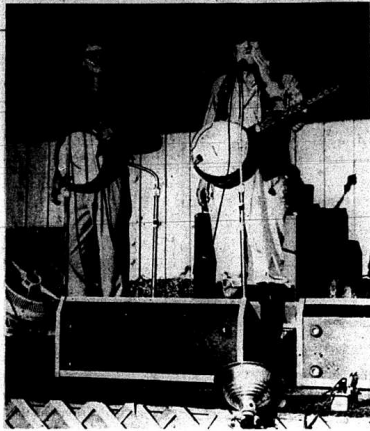

ticular areas to reduce deer numbers and to avoid problems, stemming from crop damage with local farmers.

With sufficient deer numbers in the west, wildlife officials are now focusing their attention on eastern and southeastern portions of the state. We have already seen mass deer stockings in some eastern counties and hunting regulations have this year been re-thought to benefit lagging areas.

According to a satellite survey done a few years back, the state had around 31,000 square miles of deer habitat. Good habitat in the grain producing areas of the state will support in the neighborhood of 110 deer per square mile, but in the acetate mountains, 30 whitetails per square mile would be about right.

John Phillips, head of Kentucky's deer program, expects the state's deer harvest for the up-coming season to be around 58,000 animals. That's a long shot from the 5,717 open county deer taken by Kentucky hunters 10 years ago.

The harvest numbers are sure to increase and Phillips says they may level off at between 100,000 and 120,000 deer per annual harvest.

Deer and turkey numbers have steadily grown over the past decade and we sportsmen have been constant beneficiaries with more and more deer and turkey tags filled each year. Thanks to ambitious wildlife management programs Kentucky hunters can look forward to increased opportunities to call in a wise old gobbler or line up the sights on a quality whitetail buck.

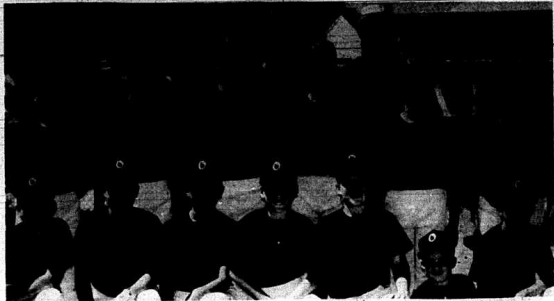

statewide basis:
During 1986, a total of 343 persons were killed in fatal accidents involving a drinking driver. This represents 43 percent of all persons killed in accidents in Kentucky during 1986.

During 1986, a total of 31 percent of the fatally injured pedestrians over 20 years old were drinking. Their average alcohol test was 0.20 percent.

A total of 94 percent of vehicle occupants killed in 1986 were not restrained (seat belts). A total of 70 percent of those vehicle occupants who were ejected from a crashing vehicle were killed.

Of the 51 child occupants (4 and under) in vehicle accidents, only 6 were secured with a child restraint.

WHAT DO YOU DO WITH ALL THAT ZUCCHINI?

A highly regarded poet-critic—Judson Jerome—says that the two most overproduced products in the country are poetry and zucchini.

He produces an abundance of both on his farm-retreat in Pennsylvania. Kentucky gardeners and home makers produce an abundance of zucchini, and now it's the time to consider what to do with them.

The fields are filled with them. Extension food and nutrition specialists with the University of Kentucky state that zucchini can be found in the market most of the year, but right now it is a better buy because — yep — there are so many of them lying around.

What do you do with zucchini? You can steam it. You can sauté it. Stuff it. Bake it. Make bread or muffins with it. Grate it. Make a variety of casserole dishes with it. Many people like to cut it in slices to serve with dip instead of potato chips.

In short, only the imagination limits the ways it can be prepared.

Besides being versatile in food preparation, zucchini has nutritional assets. A cup of raw, chopped, diced or cubed zucchini has

only 22 calories. Compare that to two potato chips, and you can see it's a weight-watcher's delight as a "dipper" in place of chips or crackers.

In addition, a cup of raw zucchini supplies about 25 milligrams of Vitamin C, or about one-half the daily requirement. Keep in mind though that the more zucchini is cooked or exposed to air, the more Vitamin C is lost.

Zucchini also supplies about ten percent of the daily requirement for Vitamin A. If you're watching fats and sodium, zucchini is a plus. A cup contains only one tenth milligram of fat, and like most vegetables, zucchini is low in sodium.

Here are some tips for using zucchini:

- Use them before they are eight inches long.
- Try them in pickle recipes. They're delicious.
- Use them raw in combination with other foods for salads.

- Peel, slice in lengthwise pieces and use in place of noodles in lasagne or other casseroles.
- Flavor zucchini with marjoram, oregano, parsley, garlic, onion, sesame seed, salt and pepper.

- Use in stir-fry cooking to replace more expensive items such as mushrooms and bamboo

Different Ways with Zucchini

Pizza Zucchini

Zucchini (5 cups, grated)
2 lbs. hamburger
2 large onions, chopped
1 lb. cheese, crumbled or shredded
Can of Mushroom soup
Can of tomato puree or spaghetti sauce (1 pint)
sweet peppers
Brown hamburger, and onions.
Take hamburger and drain, save grease. Cook zucchini in grease for 10 minutes. Then drain.
Layer hamburger, zucchini, spaghetti sauce, cheese and sweet peppers, making two layers. Pour mushroom soup on top. Bake in oven for 15 minutes at 350° F. Uncover and serve. (Also freezes well).

CHOCOLATE ZUCCHINI CAKE

½ cup white sugar
1 cup brown sugar
½ cup butter
½ cup oil
3 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon vanilla
½ cup buttermilk
2½ cups flour
2 teaspoons baking soda
4 tablespoons cocoa
½ teaspoon cinnamon
¼ teaspoon allspice
3 cups grated raw zucchini
½ cup chocolate chips, if desired
Using a large bowl, cream together sugars, butter and oil. Beat in eggs, vanilla and buttermilk. Sift dry ingredients together and add to batter. Have 3 cups grated zucchini to add last. Pour into greased and floured pan, 9 x 13 inches. Sprinkle top with chocolate chips, if desired. Bake at 325 degrees F. for 45 minutes. When cool, cut into squares and serve with whipped cream or other topping. (Whitley County Extension Service)

Zucchini French Fries

3 large zucchini, washed, peeled, and cut into (3-x½-x½") strips
All purpose flour
Salt
Catsup (optional)
Sprinkle all sides of squash strips

with flour. Fry, until lightly browned in 1 inch of oil heated to 375°. Drain; sprinkle with salt. Serve with catsup, if desired. Yield: 4 to 6 servings
