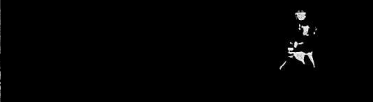

Judge Thacker hospitalized

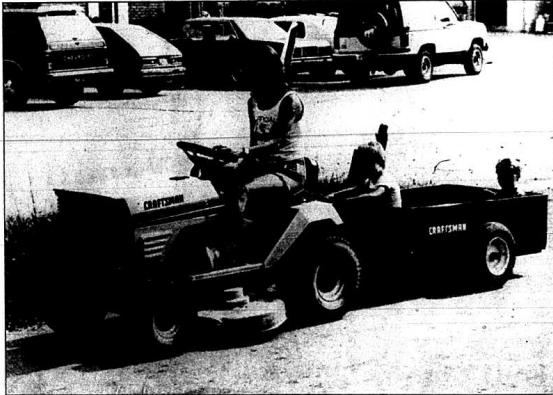
County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker is in the University of Kentucky Medical Center for tests, and if necessary, treatment.

It's been a long, long time

Mrs. Renner, sister 68 years apart

Thelma Renner had always wondered where her sister was. Was she dead? Was she an invalid? Where did she live? Did she ever think about her?

After 68 years Thelma finally got the answers to her questions. Memorial Day, after being separated from her sister Lorraine, since she was three years old, the two met again.

"I could barely remember her lying there as a baby," the 71-year-old Mt. Vernon woman said. "It was a great feeling to finally find her after all of these years."

Thelma and her daughters, Mildred and Lela, traveled to northern Ohio to meet her sister and their aunt.

"We didn't know what to expect when we got there," Thelma Renner said. "We were going to my sister's house, but we were going into a stranger's home as well. It just so happened that we showed up the same time as her husband's birthday. We really enjoyed our stay there."

Ms. Renner actually got in touch with her sister, who is now 68, in February, after she and her daughter, Della Hedge, saw a

segment of "Hour Magazine" in which twins were finally reunited after many years apart.

"I had always wondered about her, wondered what happened to her and me and Della decided to try and find her," Thelma Renner said.

The story actually began in 1917. Ms. Renner, her sisters, Lorraine, and Reba, lived with her parents, John and Myrtle Cottigam at Pine Hill.

Census shows county gained

Compared to other area counties, Rockcastle's population has been growing at a healthy rate since 1980, according to new figures from the U.S. Bureau of Census.

Rockcastle's population growth rate is 5.6 percent. The county's population has grown from 13,973 in 1980 to 14,800 currently.

The report shows Kentucky's rural counties are growing twice as fast as urban areas such as Jefferson which lost .6 percent, Campbell that lost 1.9 percent and Fayette that grew only 4.3 percent. For the record, Knox

New city sewer plant goes into operation

Eleven years after planning began, Mt. Vernon's renovated and expanded sewer plant is now in operation.

And, the plant is working well. Only the bugs remain to be worked out and that should be by the end of the month, according to Bill Hardy, design engineer for Schimpeler-Corradino Associates of Louisville, engineers for the \$1.9 million project.

"For the most part, the contractor (Titus Construction of Dayton, Ohio) did a good job," Hardy reported. "The plant will operate properly and we're satisfied. We made sure the plant has the right kind of equipment. It looks like we are in good shape. It is operating at about 95 percent."

Left to be done, other than some painting, driveway and fencing, is the final inspection, and that is not expected for about a month.

The only major question remaining is whether there will have to be necessary equipment installed to dechlorinate the effluent that runs from the plant into Town Branch. Chlorine is used in the treatment of the sewage. If so, it will probably be November before the plant is totally complete, and it will cost an additional \$23,000.

Hardy said it is necessary to meet the Clean Water Act requirement, but it may be that due to the size of the plant, a dechlorinator may not have to be installed.

"It remains to be seen" Hardy said. "If the money is needed, it

will be on a 50/50 basis, with the city paying half the cost."

The remodeled and expanded plant has a capacity of about 397,000 gallons a day. Currently, the plant is averaging about 200,000 gallons a day. Last month the total was 243,000 gallons a day.

The plant could handle up to 600,000 gallons in an emergency, but not on a sustained basis, Hardy related.

The plant is considered to be adequate for the city until the year 2005.

Unlike the previous plant, the new plant will have five employees with their work schedule arranged so that someone will be available at all times.

To date, three employees have been hired: Jim Rickels, plant operator, and Tim Kelley and William Kidwell.

Annual operating expenses for the plant totals \$188,983 annually as enumerated in the city budget, compared to \$108,557 for the old plant. Of the amount budgeted, salaries, wages, payroll taxes and insurance totals \$37,250; maintenance labor, \$31,106; bond payments, \$77,675, and depreciation, \$18,557.

It has not always been smooth sailing for the plant contractor. There was an excavation problem

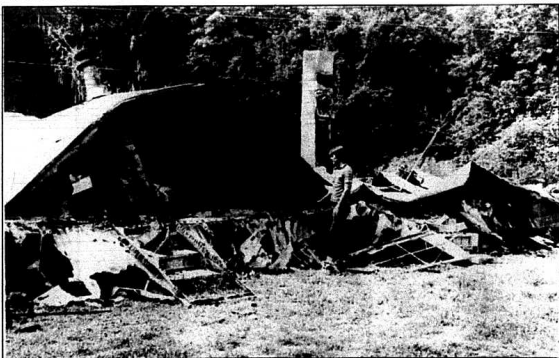

SOWING THE SEEDS OF RURAL REVIVAL

Washington and other large metropolitan centers are finally getting the message: rural America is in trouble. Small towns in Kentucky and across the nation have taken a staggering series of blows — a seven-year farm recession that still has not ended, a mining-and-manufacturing slump caused in part by foreign competition, the elimination of revenue-sharing and sharp cuts in other federal programs.

Metropolitan newspapers are beginning to notice that rural America has lost some 500,000 jobs in recent years. City dwellers are finding out that unemployment and poverty rates are now higher in rural than in urban areas and that thousands of rural businesses are falling by the wayside as farming communities lose income and population.

And I see encouraging signs that Congress might at last be ready to help our rural communities help themselves, even though the Reagan Administration is pressing as always for deeper cuts in economic development programs.

I have long believed in a bootstrap approach to our rural problems. Our rural communities are showing the entrepreneurial spirit needed to survive in a changing world. We should start supporting their efforts before they lose more population, leadership and vitality in the almost unprecedented economic battles of the 1980s.

A number of us in the Senate already are moving to provide such support at minimal cost to the government. I am a co-sponsor of the Rural Area Revitalization Act of 1987, which could be a modest first step in a drive to stimulate off-farm income in depressed rural communities.

Our bill is designed not so much to finance as to foster rural development. It would offer up to \$70 million a year in loans and grants to public and private nonprofit groups striving to help small, innovative businesses take root in farming areas.

Business loans and technical assistance would be made available through community-based groups drawing on an expanded Rural Development Loan Fund. Such groups would demonstrate rural opportunities and help make the public improvements needed to realize those opportunities. And they could receive federal grants to support their work.

Another section of the bill would authorize \$10 million a year for an effort to provide safe and affordable drinking water to isolated, low-income communities.

Our bill is designed so the future will flourish only with a healthy balance between farm and off-farm income. And this diversification process must be encouraged and supported without further delay.

Rural America represents the heart of our nation — its land, its food, its raw materials and much of its character. We in Kentucky understand this because 75 percent of our counties are rural. Now it is time for others to realize that we can still afford to allow our rural communities to keep withering on the vines of a changing and often troublesome world economy.

USDA begins sixty day public review for RCA

On July 13, USDA will begin a 60-day public review and comment period for the second appraisal report it has prepared under terms of the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act (RCA). The report, titled "The National District Conservation System (NDCS) at Mt. Vernon," is available at the local SCS office at the Agriculture Service Center. Public comments will be considered in preparing the final appraisal document. USDA will use this information to update its National Conservation Program, which includes district for all conservation programs conducted by 7 USDA agencies.

For this appraisal, USDA analyzed the best information available about land use, soil erosion, water supply and management, water quality, and related resource issues such as atmospheric deposition and wildlife habitat. It began new research to define more precisely the extent of the threat soil erosion poses to agricultural productivity and environmental quality. It used that data to project future conditions as well as to identify current problem areas.

Congress enacted the RCA in April 1977 in response to widespread concern about mounting pressure on the Nation's soil.

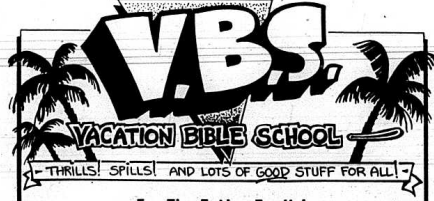

and water resources. Rapidly increasing export demands were encouraging cultivation of highly erodible land. Erosion was again becoming a severe problem as farmers abandoned traditional conservation practices, finding them incompatible with new farming methods and large equipment. There were other concerns as well—ground water mining, shortages of surface water, increasing loss of farmland to urban development, loss of wildlife habitat, and others. Congress therefore directed the Secretary of Agriculture to appraise the soil, water, and related resources of the Nation's nonfederal lands to provide an accurate picture of what and where the problems were. It also directed the Secretary to use the appraisal information to ensure that USDA programs for conserving those resources are responsive to the long-term needs of the nation.

USDA completed the first RCA appraisal in 1980 and used it to design the National Conservation Program, implemented in 1982." David Stipes said, "Information in the first appraisal was also used extensively in developing the conservation provisions of the Food Security Act."

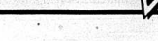

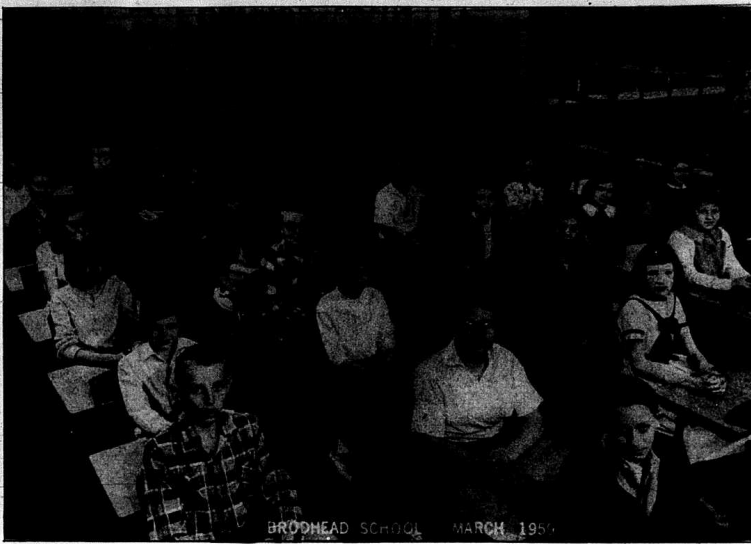

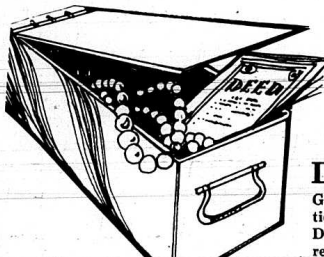

Preparation can speed Social Security application

People who plan to apply for monthly Social Security retirement, survivor, or disability benefits can help speed the process if they are well prepared at the time they apply, Bob Anderson, Social Security manager in Richmond said recently.

The applications are designed to obtain information about the worker, spouse, children, and work history, including military service and railroad employment. Applications for disability benefits also record information about the person's disabling con-

dition. A person will need certain documents to support his or her claim. Only original copies of documents or copies certified by the issuing agency can be used. Uncertified photocopies are not acceptable.

Some or all of the following documents may be required in a particular case: Birth certificate, proof of military service, W-2 form or self-employment tax return for the most recent year, proof of marriage, proof of

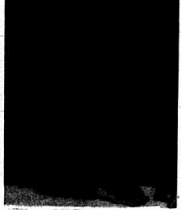

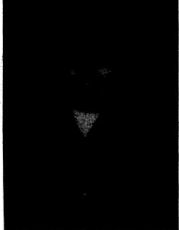

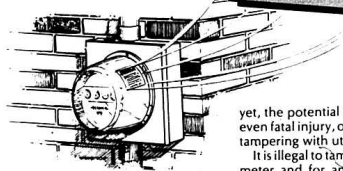

divorce, children's birth certificates, and death certificate if applying for survivor benefits. People applying for disability

benefits should have information about their work history and information about the sources that treated them for their medical condition.

A person should not delay applying for benefits because he or

she does not have all the required evidence. People at the Social Security office may be able to suggest alternative.

When possible, a person should apply 2 or 3 months before he or she wants benefits to begin. This will allow plenty of time to process the claim so checks will start on time.

People do not have to visit a Social Security office to apply. They can take care of this by telephone or they can call to set up an appointment. More information about applications can be obtained at the Richmond Social Security office, located in the University Shopping Center on the Eastern By-Pass. The telephone number is 256-5109.

Ingredients

Select fresh vegetables and fruits at their best. Fruit should be firm, or slightly underripe. Vegetables should be crisp, firm, solid and evenly colored. Use unwaxed cucumbers when you pickle whole ones, or the brine will not penetrate.

Use either cider vinegar or white distilled vinegar with a 4 to 6 percent acidity. Don't use vinegars of unknown acidity. Cider vinegar gives pickles a good flavor, but can darken light colored fruits and vegetables.

Use a pure coarse salt, such as a pickling, dairy or granulated salt. Don't use plain table salt, because it makes the brine cloudy, or iodized salt, because it might darken your pickles.

Use soft water if possible. If you must use hard water, boil it first for 15 minutes, let it stand 24 hours, then remove scum from top and ladle water from the kettle so that sediment is left in the bottom. Add 1 tablespoon of

vinegar for each gallon of boiled hard water.

Always use granulated white sugar, unless the recipe calls for brown sugar. Use fresh whole spices tied up in a cheese cloth bag, and be sure to remove them when pickles are ready for canning.

Equipment

Never use copper, galvanized brass or iron utensils for heating pickling liquid. Using enamelware that is chipped is also not a good idea. These metals may react with salts or acids and cause color changes or form undesirable compounds. Instead, use an unchipped enamelware, stainless steel,

Your bringin container could be a crock or stone jar, unchipped enamelware, large glass jar, bowl or casserole. Don't use a plastic container, galvanized bucket or tub.

You'll also need a plate or round wooden board - not yellow or pitch pine - and a weight. A glass jar filled with water works fine as a weight. (You put these on top of plate to hold cucumbers under the brine during curing).

In addition you'll need a water-bath canner, canning jars and lids, and a household scale for recipes that give ingredients by weight. For recipes and more information on pickles and relishes, contact the County Extension Office at 256-2403.

Sizzling summer catches us

It's here! The good old summertime!

Those hazy, lazy days of summer came to Rockcastle this week. Bringing with them temperatures rising into the humid, uncomfortable 90s.

It was the second time this year that a heat wave descended on the area. The first was on June 13 through 19. On June 15, the temperature was 92 at Cox Funeral Home weather station, the warmest of the year to date.

"It's hot, no doubt about that," Bud Cox agreed. "And it looks like it will be the same into next week."

Monday the temperature was 90. It was 91 on Tuesday. It could be 92 or 93 on Wednesday, while Thursday and Friday could see the mid to upper 90s.

If the heat index (temperature, humidity) is taken into account, it felt like a 100 Monday and

Tuesday.

Businesses also virtually took the days off Monday and Tuesday.

One official contributed the slow-down of urban area growth to a loss of jobs, or companies going to rural areas to build industry.

In counties surrounding Rockcastle, Jackson grew 4.6 percent; Laurel 8.8 percent; Pulaski 6.8 percent; Lincoln 1.4 percent; Madison 2.9 percent and Clay 3.8 percent.

Laurel and Pulaski are growing rapidly due to the appealing retirement areas and their proximity to Lake Cumberland. Laurel's population is 42,000. Pulaski is 48,900.

Fastest growing areas are Boone, Fulton, Jessamine, Oldham and Warren counties.

day. Only early morning post-office patrons were seen as customers decided to play it cool and stay home the remainder of the day.

"It always happens when it gets hot, no business," merchant Billy Hiatt said. "People just find shade and stay there."

Folks were hiding from the sun all over the state. It was 91 in Louisville and 90 in Jackson. Swimming pools everywhere did a landslide business.

"I could fry an egg on the hood of my car and bake a loaf of bread inside it," one local woman commented. "But it's too hot to stay out in the sun to do it."

Bob Hudgins, who operates the Jackson weather station, said no changes are expected for at least five days. The general trend will be hazy, hot, humid with muggy nights.

Technically, the upper-atmosphere winds have created a dome of high pressure that has settled over the state, forcing air earthward, warming it by 5/2

degrees for every 1000 feet it sinks, so said Hudgins. Rockcastle Countians can take heart. This heat wave is a breeze compared to the summer of 1986 when the temperature reached 116 degrees at Mt. Vernon. It remained over 100 degrees for 12 days. It was so hot, concrete roads and sidewalks expanded and blew up with a loud bang. It was not until the middle of August that temperatures were considered normal.

for awhile in the narrow valley where the plant is located. Also, too much dynamite used in blasting damaged the pump house, one of those unforeseen problems that sometimes arise during construction.

In fact, Titus had an original March completion date and is continuing to pay liquidating damages to the city for being behind schedule, an amount estimated to be about \$40,000 by the end of July.

In 1976, as noted, the city began planning to upgrade and expand the plant in keeping with the Clean Water Act passed by Congress in 1972.

The city received a 70 percent grant for the project totalling \$1,443,305. The city's share was \$481,102.

The city's share will come from an increase in sewer rates. The base residential sewer rate will be \$8.98 for the first 2000 gallons of water used. An additional cost of \$2.449 will be charged for each additional 1000 gallons. The new rates will be reflected in the August bill.

The city water rate remains at \$4.50 for 2000 gallons. But that may change when the city's \$300,000 water system renovation and expansion project is completed, possibly by the end of the year.

The combined base monthly water/sewer rate will be \$13.48 compared to the present \$6.75 for the city's 885 customers.

Tax rate set

The 1987 state real estate property tax rate has been set at 21.4 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation, down .2 from last year, according to Revenue Secretary Gary W. Gillis.

The state real estate rate must be reviewed each year and adjusted as needed to ensure that no more than a 4 percent cumulative

increase in revenues is realized over the previous year. The 1986 rate was 21.6 cents.

With the establishment of the 1987 real estate tax rate in a timely manner, local taxing districts statewide can be assured of their ability to prepare and collect tax bills upon certification of local tax rolls by the Revenue Cabinet and the proper establishment of local tax rates.



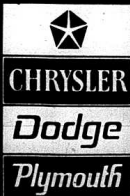

Health Department Recognition Week

July 19-25 has been proclaimed by Governor Collins as Local Health Department Recognition Week in Kentucky.

There are an array of services that are provided by local health departments in Kentucky. In an average day they inspect 27 restaurants, 15 groceries, 2 motels or hotels, 6 mobile home parks, 121 sewer systems, 4 schools, 14 milk producers and 2 food manufacturers. They provide 2700 family planning visits, 651 WIC visits, 263 prenatal visits and 110 well child visits. They lend 25 child safety seats and train 9 more local professionals in care of diabetes patients. They provide 1400 im-

munizations, 726 fluoride mouthrinses, 564 home health visits, 211 hypertension education visits and 353 pap smears along with breast self-examination instructions.

On an average day 1200 new patients are added. This is not a bad days work for a system that gets less than 2 percent of the states budget.

All of these services are provided at the Rockcastle County Health Center. If you have never visited our health center we encourage you to visit this week, or you may be one of our regular patients in need of services. Our hours are 8 - 4:30, Monday - Friday. Stop in and see us!

I learned to read; others can, too

Two years ago, I was watching television when I saw my opportunity -- a chance to read.

I only went to school for three or four years. We lived out in the country and I had to walk about five miles a day to school. A lot of days when the weather was bad -- or for other reasons -- I didn't go.

And then the rural school closed and I had no way of getting in to the city for school, so I kind of gave up.

I had tried going to night school to learn to read, but I just couldn't get it together in those big classes. One teacher just couldn't get around to each of us often enough to give us the help we needed. I learned a little, but I never made much progress.

When I saw that TV announcement about a one-on-one tutoring program, I thought, "That's exactly what I need." I was ready to drive 30 miles to participate in that program when I learned that my employer, the Torrington Co., was helping to set up a reading program at the ball-bearing plant where I work.

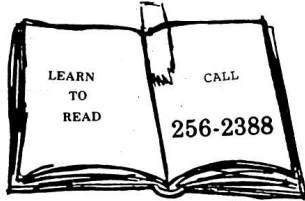
I got a good tutor and went to work. I finished skill books I through 4 and now I'm preparing for an equivalency diploma. It'll work for anybody if they want it to.

Now, in my spare time, I'm trying to get others to join the program. We're looking particularly for people who have tried before and quit. Sometimes a change of tutors -- or a change of students -- can make all the difference. And, we're trying to get people to be more open. If they've got a reading problem, they shouldn't be ashamed to talk about it.

We're pleased that more and more companies are getting involved with reading programs. It not only helps the individual, it helps the companies: A worker who can read is going to do his job better than a worker who can't read.

And it gives me a good feeling to know what little I can do to help somebody else.

It just makes me feel good. And that's what life is all about. If you can help somebody else, it makes your days.
