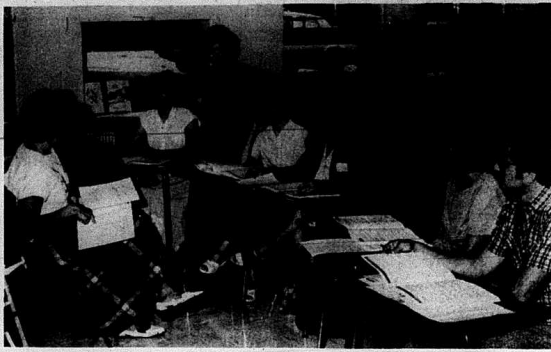

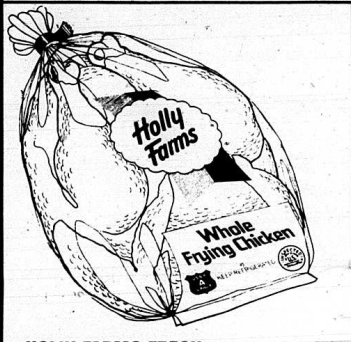

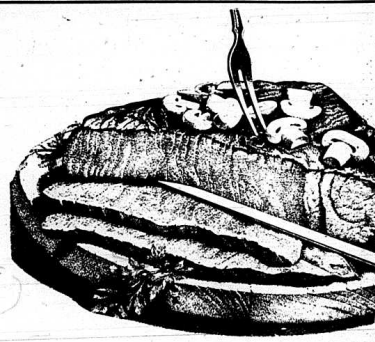

Donation gets program underway

A \$1,500 contribution from Citizens Bank in Broadhead has helped a local group of concerned citizens get on their feet and start to work.

That group is the local affiliate of Forward in the Fifth. "Forward in the Fifth is an organization striving to advance education in Southern Kentucky.

"Forward in the Fifth is not like other organizations that have done studies of the problems in the Fifth District," said Bob Fields, chairman of the local group. "Forward in the Fifth knows that the problems of education in this Congressional District lies with everyone involved to a certain extent. Our goal is not to lay blame, but to see and ask, 'What can we do to help?'" he said.

The \$1,500 contribution from Citizens Bank will allow the group to receive a matching \$1,500 grant from the regional Forward in the Fifth. This year's money is earmarked for mini-grants for teachers.

Eddie Fields, secretary of the group, explained that applications for these grants will be passed out to teachers throughout the school system by the time school begins next month.

Mrs. Fields said that the "highest integrity" would be used in determining who will receive the grants this year. "Forward in the Fifth was launched last October mainly because of the fact that the Fifth Congressional District of Kentucky, was found to have the lowest educational achievement level of any of this nation's 435 Congressional Districts, according to Rebecca Davidson, a regional staff director for Forward in the Fifth.

The staff director also explained that other Forward in the Fifth affiliates are also participating in the mini-grant program, but some are doing other things. She said that in Metcalf County, the

local affiliate is taking donated wood and making school desks for children to use while studying at home.

She said that educators believe if a student has a desk in his or her room at home they are more likely to realize that their parents have made education a high priority.

Those programs are just some of many that are going on with our county affiliates," she said.

Mrs. Davidson said that to date 14 of the 27 counties in the fifth district have organized local affiliates and that at least three more, including Rockcastle, will be taken into the regional concept within the next 30 days.

At the local group's last meeting, school Superintendent Big Towery affirmed the work of Forward in the Fifth as being an encouragement to teachers.

Hospital gets high marks for program

Some small hospitals in the state are in serious financial condition, but not so the Rockcastle County Hospital where an innovative respiratory therapy program has helped it to "survive," according to hospital Administrator Wayne Stewart.

Small hospitals are having trouble finding patients to fill their beds because of limits under the federal Medicare health-care program that determines the number of days a patient can stay. Result: Less money for the hospital.

In the case of the local hospital, it has the only program in the state providing in-hospital, long-term care for patients who need respirators to breathe. It is combined with a respiratory therapy program, Stewart said.

The hospital developed the program because only about half of the beds in the hospital's new 32-bed addition were being used. "For us it was a matter of survival," Stewart told the Lexington Herald-Leader. "We were looking for something to take up that extra space."

The program serves patients from across the state and has helped both them and the hospital. The respiratory unit is 99 percent full, Stewart noted. The hospital has a total of 58 beds.

"I guess one time we guessed right," Stewart added. "We're

just getting by, but anymore, that's success."

Failure of some hospitals has raised concern in many communities that it will become harder for some Kentuckians to get medical attention, especially acute care such as emergency and surgical services.

A change in Medicare reduced the number of days a patient can stay in the hospital. To hold down costs, Medicare began in 1983 to limit the number of days for which it reimburses hospitals for each particular illness.

If the patient needs to stay longer, the hospital gets no Medicare money for additional days.

The changes caused the average occupancy level in Kentucky hospitals to drop 26.8 percent from 1980 to 1986. The average occupancy for hospitals in the state last year was 57.5 percent.

Like Rockcastle, some hospitals have realized they need to diversify and some have added such medical care as psychiatric, physical therapy and substance abuse to try to draw in more patients.

In addition, recommendations will be made regarding promotion of tourism attractions in the Southern Kentucky region.

In addition to unveiling the tourism report, the organization's first board of directors will be announced.

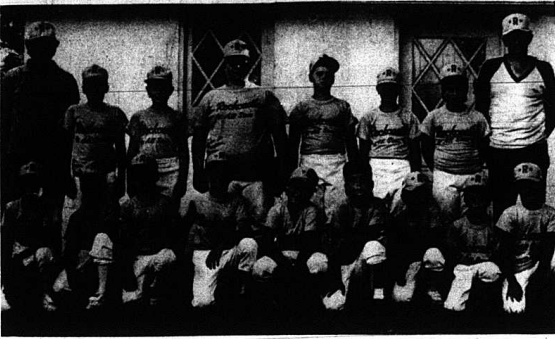

aphrodisiac and heart stimulant by some, and a cure-all by others. It is closely related to the Devils-Walking-Stick, Wild Sarsaparilla, English Ivy, and especially Dwarf Ginseng. The name ginseng is a corruption of the Chinese Jin-chen (meaning "man-like"), referring to the forked root. Asian countries provide a large market for ginseng root.

The preferred time to collect "sang" root is in the very late summer and early fall, when the seeds have turned red. At this time the seeds can be pressed onto the surface of the soil beneath the leaf layer, with a finger. This allows the plant to reproduce itself and provides for another harvest in the future. This conserves the plant. Collecting the plant before this period does not allow the plant to reproduce itself. This is a poor conservation practice and has produced many "sanged-out" areas. Dig only four-pronged plants. These plants are about four years old—the minimum age for collecting.

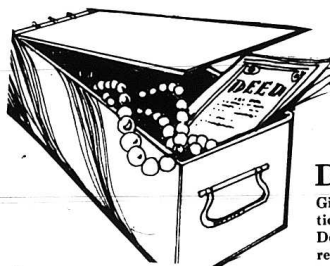

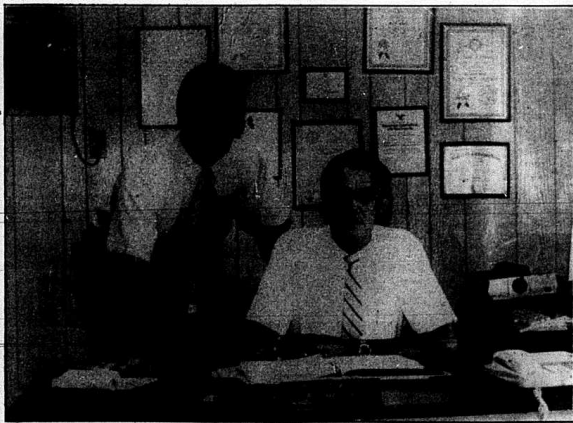
