Most CAP scholarship recipients choose to attend state schools

Nearly all the recipients of the Christian Appalachian Project's Community Service Scholarship will attend schools in Kentucky beginning this fall semester, including Barry Lee Bussell of Brodhead, who will attend the University of Kentucky.

The Christian Appalachian Project recently distributed \$26,000 in scholarships to 15 colleges and universities and one vocational school.

Of the 33 graduating high school seniors who received the scholarship, 29 will attend 11 colleges and universities and a vocational school in Kentucky. The remaining students will attend schools in North Carolina, New York, Tennessee, and South Carolina.

The Community Service Scholarship is awarded annually to graduating seniors in 25 counties of Appalachian Kentucky. They receive the scholarship based on their plans to continue their education and on their concern for their community as shown through various service activities.

Public schools are favored by two-thirds of the scholarship recipients.

Eastern Kentucky University is the greatest beneficiary of the Community Service Scholarship, receiving \$7,500 and 10 students. The University of Kentucky has been chosen by six students and has received \$4,000 while Western Kentucky University has three students attending and has received \$2,000. Two students are attending Lees College, which has received \$1,500.

Juanita Lynn Robbins, Mt. Vernon, recently attended the 1987 Forestry Camp held at the Feltner 4-H Camp in London. The camp is sponsored by the Kentucky Forestry Council.

Work starts remodeling county jail

Work has started on the long-delayed county jail renovation and extension project.

Workers for contractor McKnight and Associates of London were tearing out existing walls opposite the present jail area, and preparing to install plumbing for the addition. Necessary door frames should arrive this week, all according to company president, Delbert McKnight.

McKnight said the project has a 120-day completion date from June 23 and he expects it to be November, or even December, before it is completed depending on the availability of equipment. He said the company might have to request an extension past the contract date.

The \$86,990 project calls for additional jail cells, a drunk tank and a visiting and exercise area, all required by the Kentucky Corrections Cabinet that told the Rockcastle Fiscal Court over a year ago to upgrade the jail or close it.

A \$30,000 state grant from the Corrections Cabinet is available to finance the project.

County Judge/Executive Hubert Thacker was expected to attend a meeting of the board of Cumberland Valley Area Development District (CVADD) Wednesday to receive and then check for \$30,000 in Area Development funds, according to John L. Bruner, CVADD executive director of CVADD.

Additional money will come from a \$15,000 loan the county will obtain from a bank. Where the remaining \$11,990 comes will be left up to the fiscal court to find.

The project was initially bid by J.C. Newland Construction of Broadhead, but the project was delayed for so long that Newland had to withdraw his bid. The county then took the higher, and only other, McKnight said.

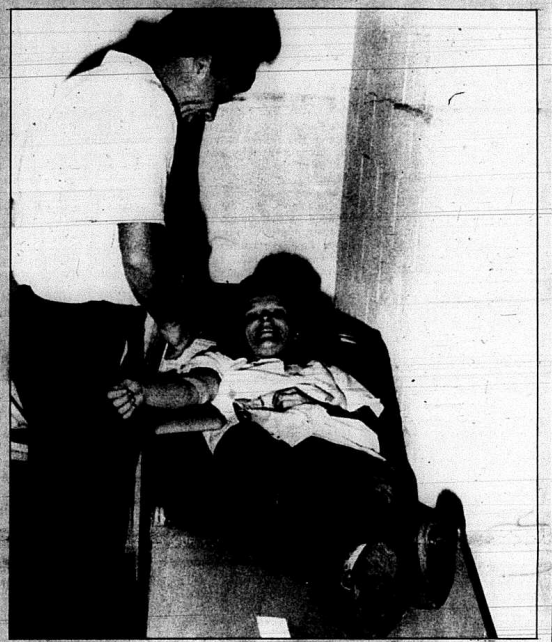

Election filing deadline draws near

There'll be a total of 14 city council seats up for election on Nov. 3, but to date, only two persons have filed petitions with County Clerk Norma Houk.

Incumbent Livingston Councilman Todd Mink has filed for re-election. At Mt. Vernon, Earl R. Nichols has filed for a council seat.

Incumbent school board member, Dr. Billy George Griffith, is circulating a petition for election to fill the three years remaining on the term of Dr. Rudolph Burdette, who resigned when he moved outside the city. That seat is the only opening on the board of education this year.

Last day for filing for the election is at 4 p.m. Aug. 17. A petition bearing 20 names of registered voters in the city in which the council seat is sought must be filed with Clerk Houk. Names on school board petitions

Council warned civil suit possible over water bill

A city resident warned the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night to continue free water to her residence or go to court.

Mary Ida Jones, accompanied by London Attorney Paul Zarkuhlen, told the council the city had "tried to take this (water) from me three times" and made it clear through her attorney, she would try to make it that time.

She did suggest a compromise. Her attorney said if the city would continue to furnish Mrs. Jones free water until she dies she will cancel the water rates to her heirs, and to anyone who might purchase the property in the meantime.

Attorney Zarkuhlen told the council it was his opinion the free water clause is still in effect and warned the council he would take the question to Rockcastle Circuit Court if the council does not agree with the compromise.

The council referred the matter to City Attorney Carl Clontz, who is on vacation, but was represented by his son, Attorney John Clontz.

Mrs. Jones got her land from the late Jarve Noe 29 years ago at which time the deed gave him free water for his family and animals as compensation for allowing the water line to cross his property.

Mrs. Jones purchased the land, and the free water has continued since that time.

When the matter came before the council at its July 13 meeting, City Attorney Clontz told the council he was of the opinion the deed does not allow free water forever.

It was pointed out that since the deed was signed, the water lines were changed about 15 years ago and no longer are used. Clontz said he told the council at that time, and on other occasions, that he did not believe the city should continue to furnish free water to Mrs. Jones and to David McCauley.

McCauley has a clause in his deed similar to Mrs. Jones' that was there when he purchased the property from John Noe several years ago. McCauley, unlike Mrs. Jones, began paying his water bill with the last billing.

During the meeting, the council once again talked about the

Lake Linville boat dock.

Jimmy Hale, operator reported boats launched between July 3 and Aug. 1 totaled 452.

He noted, "on the average, boats launched in July were down two per day from June."

"The Fourth of July weekend was included in this month's average," his report continued. "Overall percentage of business loss is estimated at a rate of 60 percent and steadily decreasing. Boaters are complaining of having problems due to weeds growing in the water near the launching ramp and dock. The marine vegetation is spreading at a rapid rate throughout the lake, especially in the more shallow areas."

The council was obviously disturbed about the weeds and agreed to try to find a remedy, if there is any.

Board of Education hires personnel for coming year

With the beginning of school only two weeks away, the Rockcastle County Board of Education hired all of the needed personnel to get things under way on Aug. 17, at its regular monthly board meeting last week.

In addition to hiring, the board heard from two disgruntled bus drivers, William Wynn of Glenway and Loretta DeBord of Broadhead.

Wynn told board members that he was upset because transportation director Richard Bray had taken him off his regular route, a route he had driven for 21 years. He told the board and Superintendent Bige Towery that he would like to stay on his old route.

DeBord told board members that Bray had promised her the next regular bus route in the area of her home on Broadhead. She said that the

believed she was treated unfairly when Carol Martin was hired to replace Browning Martin on his bus route along Ky. 70.

The board told both disgruntled parties that they should try to work out their problems with Bray before motion for a solution. Wynn was very cooperative toward both Wynn and DeBorde that he felt Bray was very cost effective in his job, but that he hoped they could get things worked out.

Evidently not satisfied by what he heard at the board meeting, Wynn went to the Department of Education in Frankfort Monday concerning the matter.

In explanation of the problem, Bray said that he rearranged three bus routes in the Roundstone area so that there would be less miles and less time involved for everyone. He said that in the past, three drivers were crossing paths with their routes and they simply made their

routes coincide with where they lived. "It is just economics, something the state has told us to do, that's all," he said.

As far as DeBord, Bray said that Carol Martin was a substitute driver for her husband for 12 years. "She was very familiar with the route. The route begins at their home and she was working with the school system long before Mrs. DeBorde," Bray said.

In other business the board voted to grant leaves of absence for Debbie Stevens and Sharon Branner, two third grade teachers at Roundstone Elementary, and Betty Jo McKinley, gifted and talented teacher for RCHS and Broadhead Elementary. They also agreed to let Melissa Hicks, a special education teacher at Mt. Vernon, out of her contract for this year. She has found employment elsewhere.

On the recommendation of Superintendent Towery the board

voted to hire Johnna Dell Ward as music teacher for the elementary grade schools.

School starts for students Tuesday

Rockcastle County Director of Pupil Personnel Buford Parkerson released the following school calendar Tuesday.

School is scheduled to begin on Aug. 17 for teachers with enrollment of students on Tuesday, Aug. 18.

Students will get their first break on Labor Day, Sept. 7. There will also be no school on Oct. 2, Nov. 26 and 27, Dec. 21 through Jan. 3, 1988, April 14 and 15 and May 10 is set as the last day of school next year.

"That is something the Broadhead P.T.A. has wanted for a long time and I am happy to see it," Board Chairman, George Poynter said.

The board recognized Mrs. Iris Young, English teacher at RCHS, for a Writing Program Grant she received from the state department. The grant totaling \$14,003 will be used in several areas to create better writing.

Donna Roberts, Thomas Garner, Regina Bell, Kelly Cummins, Deliah Brewer and Janice Miller were hired as new teachers for the 1987-88 school year.

Rockcastle County High School Principal Ronnie Cash was appointed as Rockcastle's representative to the Kentucky High School Athletic Association.

The board hired substitute teachers, who with 10 years experience and a teaching certificate will be paid \$44 a day, with teaching certificate and less than 10 years experience. Substitutes will be paid \$39. Substitutes with an emergency certificate will be paid \$34 a day. Substitutes hired last week

New superintendent has done admiral job after being left in tough position

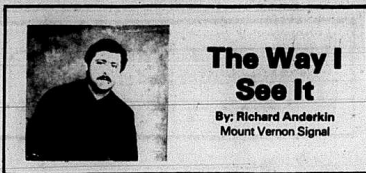
While things may not be coming up roses everywhere, they certainly seem better, at least to me, at the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

New Superintendent Bige Towery and finance officer Garlan Cummins are working hard trying to get a new school for the Mt. Vernon area.

Towery, who walked into a less than easy situation, seems to have everything under control. The control did not come easy however. Towery has worked 12 to 15 hours a day for most days since he was appointed superintendent.

At hand when he stepped into office was the recommendation on a new principal at the high school. He did that, as well as appointed a new full-time assistant and closed out a higher paying job because the need for it was not there. Last week the board hired a secretary to help with the duties of the half-time principal and saved themselves about \$16,000 in doing so.

That move was just one of many that Towery has made in his short tenure as superintendent. Last month he recommended that the board hire an elementary music teacher to replace Teresa Parront who resigned two years back. The Brodhead PTA had petitioned the board on several occasions and last week got their wish. But Towery just didn't recommend that the board hire a music teacher, he recommended that the board hire someone who could help the school system get in compliance with state regulations when it comes accreditation time.

During the board meetings, parents in attendance are brought in on conversations about things that affect the school system. Last week during the discussion of the new Mt. Vernon school,

Steve Trebleo a parent from Brodhead and a member of the Brodhead PTA, took part in a lengthy discussion about the new school. He had some good ideas that made sense. It seemed to me that his comments were listened to and that he was not imposing but taking part as parents should do.

Board Chairman George Poynter, who replaced Dr. Burdette a few months back has done an admirable job as well. During the hiring of the new superintendent, he was very open with me about the applications received and he has conducted each of the meetings very professionally.

Board members, Dr. Billy G. Griffith, Edna Cameron, Willie Taylor and Kenneth Adams all seem to work very well with Towery and seem very happy with the job he has done so far.

Sure we all expected that Towery would be the next superintendent of schools in Rockcastle County and we were right. But we have to give credit where credit is due. Towery took over a school system less than two months before it was scheduled to open with all the responsibilities that go along with that. He got a replacement for Cleston Saylor at the high school and has continued his other tasks as well.

I am sure there will be times when I don't agree with Towery about everything he does. A lot of times. But I believe he is the type of superintendent who will listen when you don't necessarily agree with him and yet be strong in his stand. He is for education and you certainly can't fault him for that.

Daily edited original form

Dear Editor,
A short time ago, a letter of mine was published in the Lexington Herald Leader. Due to the extensive editing most of the points I consider important were lost. There has been considerable interest here in the county and with the gracious cooperation of the Mt. Vernon Signal the letter is in its entirety follows.

In response to Ms. Tarpay's letter about the booping of the Japanese Representatives received at the Festival of the Bluegrass:

First let me say I do not condone rudeness in any form. However, I can certainly understand some of the frustrations that motivated it. Whether that little fiasco in the Pacific starting with Pearl Harbor is important to you is your prerogative. It is also the

prerogative of many people who retain a vivid memory of that event through actual participation or through the loss of a loved one to dissent if they wish. There are many more scattered throughout the Pacific who made the supreme sacrifice so you can have your options. (Misguided though they may be.)

You may say that these are not the same people that attacked Pearl Harbor. Physically maybe not, but some of the same attitudes are still there. I find it inconceivable to believe that a closed society which existed for over two thousand years is going to be altered to any great degree in a couple of generations. The Japanese (outside of their own family) are not a benevolent people. Their purpose in being in Kentucky is not a cultural exchange program but, to make a profit and to avoid trade sanctions that most assuredly are coming if the balance of payments is not eased with the incentive packages so generously offered by the current administration in Frankfurt, they would have been foolhardy not to come. A package virtually every American Corp. would have

found attractive if it had been offered to them.

I would not be so hard on the Japanese if a reciprocal agreement was made through the years following World War II had been in effect. For instance, a foreigner cannot own property in Japan. The Japanese, however, can buy with impunity, using our money to buy us out. What they don't buy we give them. I can give you another example of the imbalance that has existed between our two countries for so long.

In 1967, on display in a Kobe Japan Department store, was a 1968 Mustang. The price? Approximately \$10,000. That same car in the U.S. was around \$3,000 then. With a slight differential in freight, it could have been sold in Japan for roughly the same price. If a sensible agreement had been in effect, Japanese might be driving Chevrolets and Fords now.

Shintoinism (ancestor worship) is a prominent religion in Japan. I have a feeling that many Japanese get on their knees each night and thank their ancestors for starting a war with the United States. They are far better off now than they would have been left to their own devices, or for that matter had we allowed Russia to occupy them following World War II. (an interesting thought).

No accident can completely penetrate the oriental mind, but a reasonable assumption of future action can be ascertained by looking at the past. I have spent four years in Asia, mostly in Japan, that does not make me an expert by any stretch of the imagination but, it does give me some insight.

In my opinion, if the Japanese are allowed to exploit the greed which now permeates the "Me Generation", we can view the future of Central Kentucky with more than a little anxiety.

If your child is starting kindergarten this fall, you can be sure it will be a whole new world for him or her. You can help make these first days as happy as possible by preparing your child for kindergarten. "It's good to visit the school and classroom before school begins. Show your child the safest route to school and walk it several times together. If your child takes the bus, show him the bus stop and drive the route to school beforehand in your own car."

Also, if you can have a short visit with the teacher and take a look around the classroom, your child can be reassured. Talk to your child about the activities that will occur at school. Before school starts, begin a daily routine that helps your child get used to going to bed and ris-

ing in the morning at about the same time you will during the school year. Also, include time for a good breakfast in this routine and time for children to wash, dress themselves and brush their teeth.

These preparations can make the first day of school go smoothly for the whole family. Still, some children may become upset when they arrive at school.

If your child begins to cry, here are several suggestions to remember:

1. Tell your child you understand how he or she feels. Don't punish or ridicule your child for crying.
2. Quickly help your child become involved with an activity. Activity is the best way to stop the crying. Things like puzzles, water or sand play, or painting can be especially good. The teacher can help you out here.
3. Tell your child when you are ready to leave and remind him or her that you will be seeing one another in a few hours. Do not just disappear if your child is upset.

Generally it is not helpful for parents to remain in the classroom. This only seems to foster a dependence on you and prolongs your child's adjustment to school.

More often than not, however, parents are surprised by how quickly young children adjust to their first school experience! Good preparation at home can be very important in assuring such good beginnings.

PUT HOME-CANNED FOODS IN A COOL, DRY PLACE.

Store your home-canned foods in a cool, dry place. Those root

cellars of old were good insurance against jars cracking or coming unsealed from freezing or from foods losing taste appeal and nutrients from too-warm or too-cold temperatures.

Protect both your long hours in the kitchen and the quality of their home-canned products by proper storage.

Canned food stored near hot pipes, a stove, or furnace, or in direct sunlight can lose quality in a few weeks or months. They won't spoil, but they won't be as good as they should be.

A dry storage place is important, too, because dampness can cause metal lids to rust and rubber rings to rot. That could mean jars would no longer be properly sealed and food could spoil.

What happens if canned foods stored in an unheated place freeze? They will still be safe if the seal has not been broken and the jar has not cracked. However, food quality may become so poor that you don't want to eat them.

Protect canned foods stored in an unheated place by wrapping them in paper or covering them with a blanket.

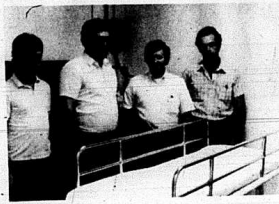

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school.

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals. Foster children may also be eligible for these meals. Families with foster children should contact the school for information regarding benefits. Additional forms are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time with each school district required to verify a sample annually. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: child's name, names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and verifying data.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed, or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

Under the provisions of the policy, a school official will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the determination, he/she may contact either orally or in writing the following official:

Martin and Tom Welch said Monday they would not be candidates. Councilman Billy Ray Doan, a recent appointed member, and Larry Burdette said they had not decided. Jackie Renner said, "as far as I know, I'm not running." Jerry Pensol, who is away at football camp, was unavailable, but earlier he had said he had not definitely decided.

At least seven names of "interested" persons surfaced during a meeting of the Mt. Vernon council Monday night.

"We've heard several names mentioned, but they have to file before we know for sure," one councilman said. "I hope people don't think this is an easy job. It takes lots of time and dedication to be successful. I just don't have the time any longer. I think there will be several good people in the running before the deadline."

At Brodhead, four councilmen seats are open. They now belong to D.A. Robbins, Ronnie Cash, Johnny Wilcox and Eddie Cash. On Tuesday, Ronnie Cash said he was undecided about seeking another term since he is now principal at Rockcastle County High School, a time consuming job. Cash served as mayor at Brodhead prior to this term on the council.

In addition to Mink at Livingston, other councilmen and women are John Phelps, Earl Baker and Sue McClure. They

have not voiced their intentions.

Mayors of the three towns, Elizabeth Baker at Mt. Vernon, Billy Bussell at Brodhead and Billy Medley at Livingston are not up for election until 1989.

In action last week, the House voted 330-10-89 to reauthorize both the A.R.C. and the Economic Development Administration, two programs which are designed to aid economically-distressed areas in Appalachia and the nation.

"While our nation is enjoying the greatest economic boom since World War II, there are many areas of Appalachia that are being left behind," Rogers said during debate on the bill. "We must make sure that we continue the programs which will help our region pull itself up out of poverty."

Under the legislation approved by the House, the A.R.C. would be authorized for \$162 million for each of the next three years. The E.D.A. program would be pegged at \$276 million annually.

"Despite all the benefits these programs have provided over the years, the problems these programs are designed to attack still exist," Rogers said. "We need the funds which A.R.C. and E.D.A. provide as seed money, to help us attract new industry, improve our education and raise our standard of living in Appalachia."

With the House action, Rogers said the bill now goes to the Senate for its consideration, where it is expected to pass.

that swimming, wading, and boats with over 10 horse power motors, are prohibited at the lake. The beach area remains closed by the Rockcastle County Health Department. An ordinance is now being drawn up

prohibiting water skiing.

At a water and sewer meeting prior to the regular meeting of the council, the council was told sewer plant contractor Tutus Construction had requested he be allowed 187 days off his contract due to weather and failure to receive equipment from suppliers.

The engineers and the Army Corps of Engineers agreed to only 16 days, the council was told, therefore Tutus owes liquidating damages totalling \$40,200.

Early in the afternoon, a preconstruction conference was held by the council for contractors for the city's \$300,000 water project, and Jack Crawford of Crawford & Crawford, engineers, of Burnside, who are engineers for the city. Crawford reported he hopes the water plant revisions and remodeling and a new 600,000 gallon water tank will be in operation by Dec. 15, weather permitting. If not, it will be April.

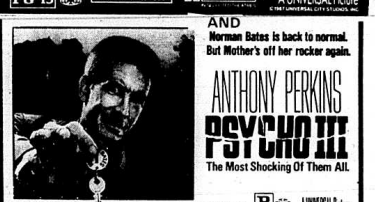
